Each of these bills creates a new tax break or expands an existing tax break. In total, these bills would reduce revenues by about \$300 million through 2017–18.

As I said last year, tax breaks are the same as new spending—they both cost the General Fund money. As such, they must be considered during budget deliberations so that all spending proposals are weighed against each other at the same time. This is even more important when the state's budget remains precariously balanced.

Therefore, I cannot sign these measures.

Veto Message—Assembly Bill No. 2386

To the Members of the California State Assembly:

I am returning Assembly Bill 2386 without my signature.

This bill would require one of my appointments to the California State University (CSU) Board of Trustees to be a permanent non-faculty employee of the CSU, preselected by a newly created systemwide staff council.

While the knowledge and perspective of rank-and-file employees should be sought out and considered within the decision-making authority of the board, I am not convinced that constraining the Gubernatorial appointments process is necessary when other alternatives could achieve the same result.

I would advise both the Trustees and the Chancellor to find ways to utilize the expertise of non-faculty employees in considering the many issues that come before the board.

California would benefit from having the final results from the national study before creating a state mandate on this issue.

College campuses are already required to have clear policies and procedures to deal with these reports. The state, in this case, should not have to additionally mandate an annual training schedule for all college employees.

I am returning Assembly Bill 1643 without my signature.

This bill prohibits apportionment in cases of physical injury based on pregnancy, menopause, osteoporosis, and carpal tunnel syndrome and requires that breast cancer not be less than the comparable impairment rating for prostate cancer.

I am vetoing this bill for many of the same reasons that I returned a similar measure, AB 305, last year. This bill is poorly drafted and reflects a seriously flawed understanding of both the workers' compensation system and the nature of physical disability that may result from a work-related injury. The bill would, among other provisions, mandate that impairment ratings for breast cancer be no less than the ratings for prostate cancer. It would also create broad gender-based exceptions to the core principle of apportionment: that employers are liable only for the permanent disability directly caused by their employee's work-related injury.

This measure seeks to draw a false comparison between disability ratings resulting from prostate and breast cancers, notwithstanding that these organs neither perform analogous physiological functions nor do their treatments result in similar physical limitations. There is a wide disparity in impairment levels that may result among individual women diagnosed with breast cancer and individual men diagnosed with prostate cancer, and individuals of all genders diagnosed with any form of cancer, depending on the stage at which the cancer was diagnosed, the nature of the treatment, and the degree and process of recovery. The suggestion that these two very different conditions should be rated equivalently in all cases has no basis in medical fact and upends the goals of ensuring consistency, uniformity and objectivity in ratings supported by substantial medical evidence.

On the issue of apportionment, this bill creates broad, gender-based exceptions to the rule that employers are liable only for the percentage of permanent disability directly caused by a work-related injury. As written, the bill would prohibit apportionment to, and thus require employers to pay for, a permanent disability that actually resulted from pregnancy or menopause, or from osteoporosis or carpal tunnel

syndrome where these are preexisting conditions or unrelated to work.

As I said last year, there is no place for gender discrimination in the workers' compensation system. Current law, however, already prohibits apportionment to risk factors, including gender, age, and family history. There is ample opportunity within the workers' compensation adjudicatory process for workers, their counsel, and others to raise any concerns or allegations of improper and impermissible gender discrimination in the medical evaluation or apportionment process.

California's workers' compensation system strives to treat all injured workers fairly and to ensure that all workers, regardless of gender, are adequately compensated for any permanent disability directly caused by work-related injuries. Rather than promoting equality, the statutory changes proposed by this measure would create new gender-based classifications and spur additional and costly litigation, undermining the successful reforms enacted in 2012 and the sustainability of the system.

I urge proponents of this bill to support efforts to educate medical evaluators on current laws prohibiting bias and to collaborate with my administration.

Veto Message—Assembly Bill No. 2069

Governor's Office, Sacramento September 30, 2016

To the Members of the California State Assembly:

I am returning Assembly Bill 2069 without my signature.

This bill requires each community college district to publicly post the total number of part-time faculty office hours paid divided by the total number of part-time faculty office hours that are taught.

The state recognizes the many contributions part-time faculty make in students' lives. The 2016–17 budget increased payment for part-time faculty office hours by almost \$3.7 million, bringing the total state investment to \$7.2 million. In 2015–16, we created more opportunities for part-time faculty to become full-time faculty by providing \$62.3 million for the hiring of new full-time faculty.

Although the bill's language is simple, gathering and reporting this information still has a real cost—about 10 percent of the entire allocation of funding for part-time office hours.

We would do better to spend the money on more office hours.

I am returning Assembly Bill 2086 without my signature.

This bill requires the Division of Worker's Compensation to appoint qualified clinical neuropsychologists as Qualified Medical Examiners (OMEs).

I have the same concerns with this bill as with its predecessor, AB 1542, which I vetoed last year. The changes contemplated by this bill relate to legal evaluations, not medical treatment of injured workers as suggested by the declaratory text of the measure. If enacted, the bill would create a unique lower standard for a select group of providers with a direct financial interest in being appointed as QMEs in California's workers' compensation system.

In addition to increasing benefits and stabilizing costs, the 2013 workers' compensation reforms were intended to return medical treatment decisions to doctors and reduce the excessive litigation relating to medical treatment disputes. Treatment of injuries by neuropsychologists where medically appropriate as determined by injured workers' physicians will be unchanged by a signature or veto of this measure. However, a signature would be a step backwards in the ongoing efforts to reduce unnecessary costs that do not benefit injured workers.

By specifically requiring the adoption of the regulation, however, the bill divests the Standards Board of its discretion to consider a proposed standard for adoption and instead mandates it to do so. This Board was created as an independent body and I believe that independence must be maintained in order for it to effectively perform its mission and protect all California workers.

This bill grants to the Department of Forestry and Fire Protection firefighters up to one year of "4800 time" disability leave paid at full salary and tax-free. This policy results in higher take home pay than pre-injury wages.

As stated in my veto of AB 1451 last year, costs go up significantly when this benefit is extended to new classes of employees. The state now faces over \$200 billion in unfunded pension and health liabilities. Since 2011 the costs for all this has increased by nearly \$5 billion per year—a 59 percent increase.

In light of these huge commitments, I am reluctant to extend this disability benefit at all—let alone through legislation outside the bargaining process.

I am signing Assembly Bill 1386 which permits a business or other public entity to have on hand, and available for emergency use, an epinephrine auto-injector, better known as an EpiPen. I do so because EpiPens have the potential to save the life of a person suffering a severe allergic reaction.

Nevertheless, I cannot take this action without registering my strong objection to the bill sponsor's recently reported pricing maneuvers. At the very time Mylan was boosting sales of EpiPens by sponsoring bills like AB 1386 throughout the country, it raised the cost of EpiPens from approximately \$100 for a pack of two in 2008 to over \$600 today, an increase of 500 percent. It's worth noting that during this same period, Mylan raised its CEO's annual salary to nearly \$19 million, a 600 percent increase.

State government cannot stop unconscionable price increases but it can shed light on such rapacious corporate behavior. Today, I have sent a letter to congressional leaders urging quick and decisive action to rein in these predatory practices.

Multiple efforts and investments will be needed to improve this situation—from updating water quality standards, to achieving voluntary settlements that improve flow and habitat conditions and modernizing outdated infrastructure.

These bills enact some of the major reforms to the Public Utilities Commission that were a part of the comprehensive package my Administration announced earlier this year to improve safety, governance, accountability, and transparency.

Unfortunately, two additional bills in the package—Assembly Bill 2903 and Senate Bill 1017—stalled in the Legislature and did not reach my desk. These important reforms cannot wait another year. To that end, I am calling upon the Commission to use its existing authority to take immediate action to:

- Appoint an Ethics Ombudsman.
- Establish a web portal for the Public Advisor to receive public complaints and comments.
- Create a streamlined process for more quickly releasing information to the public.
- Improve coordination with other state agencies and departments.
- Increase the Commission's presence outside of San Francisco.
- Work with the California Research Bureau to study the governance of telecommunications service.

I am also directing my Administration to work with the Commission to develop a reorganization plan that:

- Transfers those duties and responsibilities of the Commission over transportation-related entities that will be better performed by departments within the California Transportation Agency.
- Codifies the appointment of all senior executive staff who will serve at the pleasure of the Commission, including the Executive Director, the General Counsel, the Internal Auditor, and the Chief Administrative Law Judge.
- Reflects and codifies the appointment of a Deputy Executive Director for Safety and Chief Internal Auditor.

In addition, my Administration will continue to work with the Legislature to enact the remaining statutory measures included in the original reform package. Together, these administrative reforms and legislative acts will bring much needed improvement to the Commission.
