KNIGHT, Governor of the State of California, by virtue of the power and authority in me vested by Section 9 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of California, do hereby convene the Legislature of the State of California to meet in extraordinary session at Sacramento, California, on the thirty-first day of March, 1958, at 2 p.m., of said day for the following purpose and to legislate upon the following subject:

To consider and act upon the Budget Bill for the succeeding fiscal year and revenue acts necessary therefor

INTRODUCTION, FIRST READING, AND REFERENCE

Scope of Session—No. 2667

DEAR MR. BEAVER: You have asked whether under the Governor's Proclamation for the 1958 Second Extraordinary Session appropriation bills for the support of state agencies *other than the Budget Bill* may be considered by the Legislature.

In our opinion the answer is in the affirmative.

Under Section 9 of Article IV of the State Constitution the Legislature has no power to legislate as a special session on any subjects other than those specified in the proclamation convening the session (*Martin v. Riley*, 20 Cal. 2d 28, 39). The designation of a subject by the Governor, however, opens for legislative consideration *any matter relating to, germane to, and having a natural connection with the subject matter* (*Martin v. Riley*, supra).

The Governor's Proclamation for the 1958 Second Extraordinary Session issued March 31, 1958, at 2 p.m., specified the following subject for legislative consideration:

"To consider and act upon the Budget Bill for the succeeding fiscal year and revenue acts necessary therefor."

In our opinion the basic subject specified by the Proclamation is support of the State Government for the ensuing fiscal year and bills which are strictly appropriation bills for the support of agencies of the State Government are germane to that subject and can properly be considered at the 1958 Second Extraordinary Session.

LOWREY: You have advised us that the Chairman of the Assembly Committee on Ways and Means has stated that the committee will hear no appropriation bills in the Second Extraordinary Session unless a letter from the Governor is presented permitting their enactment prior to the enactment of the Budget Bill. You have asked us whether any law or rule requires this action.

It is our opinion that there is no restriction either by law or rule on the hearing and reporting out by the Assembly Committee or Ways and Means of any appropriation bill prior to the enactment of the Budget Bill at the Second Extraordinary Session, although the provisions of Section 34 of Article IV of the State Constitution prohibit placing such bills upon final passage in either house prior to final enactment of the Budget Bill.

At the Second Extraordinary Session the Assembly adopted House Resolution No. 4 providing that the Standing Rules of the 1958 Budget Session shall constitute the Temporary Standing Rules for the Second Extraordinary Session. We have examined those rules carefully and find nothing therein that purports to impose a restriction upon the Assembly Ways and Means Committee or any other committee with respect to the hearing and reporting out of appropriation bills prior to enactment of the Budget Bill of that session. The only pertinent rule that we find in Standing Rule 60 which requires all committees to act upon bills referred to them as soon as practicable, and when acted upon each bill shall be reported back to the Assembly forthwith. There is nothing in the Assembly Rules similar to Senate Standing Rule 11.1 which provides that until the Budget Bill is finally enacted no standing committee shall report any appropriation bill for passage except for bills making appropriations for legislative expenses and emergency bills recommended by the Governor, whose letter of recommendation shall be produced before the committee before action is taken by the committee.

The only constitutional restriction with reference to appropriation bills is contained in Section 34 of Article IV which provides in part that "Until the Budget Bill has been finally enacted neither house shall place upon final passage any other appropriation bill, except emergency bills recommended by the Governor, or appropriations for the salaries, mileage and expenses of the Senate and Assembly."

The Second Extraordinary Session was convened to consider and enact the Budget Bill of 1958, and it is our opinion that this constitutional amendment applies to the consideration of appropriation bills at that session (although it does not apply to appropriation bills at the First Extraordinary Session since that session was not convened for the purpose of enacting the Budget Bill). However, the constitutional provision by its terms applies only to final enactment of other appropriation bills in either house and does not in any way restrict committee action on such bills. While the Senate has by rule restricted such committee action there has not in the past been a similar rule in the Assembly, nor is there one at this time. In the absence of such a rule there is no restriction imposed by the Assembly upon consideration of appropriation bills by the Committee on Ways and Means and it may therefore follow the practice of hearing such bills and reporting them out to be placed on file for consideration by the House at the appropriate time, in accordance with the precedents established at all general sessions at which such appropriation bills could be introduced and acted upon.

DEAR ASSEMBLYMAN LANTERMAN: Pursuant to your request for an estimate of the cost of continuing the Legislature in session, we are submitting the following.

In estimating direct legislative costs of continuing the session beyond the 30-day Budget Session, we have not considered the cost of legislative salaries and the cost of certain staff services, such as the Legislative Counsel and our own office, which are continuing operations or costs

whether or not the Legislature is in session. The elements of cost which appear to be directly related to the length of the session would be the salaries of legislative attaches paid on a daily or weekly basis, the per diem allowance to members of the Legislature, and printing costs. We have estimated these costs on a daily basis to be as follows:

Salaries of attaches ---	\$6,100
Legislative per diem ----	2,160
Printing -----	3,500
Total daily cost -----	\$11,760

The figures referred to above would represent direct legislative costs. There would, of course, be other indirect costs in various agency budgets, such as the extra cost of maintaining and servicing the Capitol Building including such things as extra elevator service, garage service, et cetera. Although these indirect costs cannot be estimated, it would appear that they would not exceed the direct legislative costs per day.

Substitution of Separate Appropriation Bills for the Budget Bill—No. 3039

DEAR MR. GEDDES: The attached list shows a possible breakdown of the Budget Bill into 72 separate appropriation bills, intended to comply with the "single item of appropriation" requirement of Section 34, Article IV of the Constitution. This list has been compiled by an analysis of Assembly Bill No. 1 of the Second Extraordinary Session, and shows the items in that bill which would be covered by each separate bill.

While it is possible that the total number of bills could be reduced by combining support and capital outlay expenditures, we think this comes close to setting the safe minimum number of bills. It is also possible that the actual drafting of the bills would demonstrate that some items cannot be combined as indicated in the attached list.

There are also several "control" sections in the Budget Bill, which either cannot be incorporated in the separate bills, or can be incorporated in part only. For example, see, Section 5, requiring approval of preliminary plans; Section 6, continuing the availability of certain funds for the University of California; Section 7, permitting reimbursement of the Division of Architecture for certain expenditures prior to July 1, 1958; Section 22, relating to the filling of vacant positions; Section 23, permitting the advance obligations of funds to recruit academic personnel; Sections 24 and 25, relating to the purchase of motor vehicles; Sections 27 and 28, relating to carpets and to cafeterias.

Finally, the drafting of these bills will be no simple matter. The Budget Bill is so arranged as to reflect in separate items expenditures from different funds, and for different periods of availability. In drafting the separate bills, each must contain one total amount that is appropriated, and two schedules, one showing the source of funds, and the other the amount to be expended. In addition, the "control" sections of the Budget Bill must be fitted in if the desires of the Legislature are not to be entirely defeated in some instances. Finally, to balance the Budget, it will be necessary to provide for a transfer of funds in several instances.

The task is not impossible of performance, but it will require careful attention to detail if the constitutional requirement of a single item of appropriation in each bill is to be satisfied, and if the intent and desires of the Legislature are to be satisfied. As a matter of procedure, in fact, we are prepared to recommend that a much larger number of bills be introduced than the number indicated, so that each bill will parallel a particular segment of the Budget Bill. It seems to us that this procedure would facilitate committee and floor consideration of the bills,

and it would make the drafting and printing problem much easier despite the necessity for handling the additional bills.

Reappropriation of Previous Budget—No. 3041

DEAR MR. GEDDES: You have asked if there is any provision in our Constitution for an automatic reappropriation of the last year's Budget, if no Budget Act is passed.

There is no provision to this effect in our Constitution, and in the absence of an appropriation there is no authority to expend money in the State Treasury (Const. Art IV, Sec. 22).

In this connection, we note that there has in the past been some misunderstanding concerning the effect of Section 34a of Article IV.

That section requires that appropriations from the General Fund be enacted by a two-thirds vote of the members of each house if such appropriations exceed a "base amount" calculated upon past appropriations plus 5 percent per year. While this section refers to the appropriations of the "preceding fiscal year" for purposes of computation, it does not reappropriate such sums automatically.

Statement by Mr. Weinberger

I signed the Conference Committee report and will vote for it only because it seems to me to be one step better than nothing at all.

After considerable thought I have concluded that it is important enough to try to secure agreement on a Budget now, and thus end the continuing uncertainty as to future normal state operations, including schools, public health, institutions and everything else that the State does, even though such a decision, by the insistence of the Senate leadership, requires that we bring our program of water development almost to a halt.

The provisions in the Budget for flood control and flood relief and for a continuance of the engineering on various phases of the Feather River Project are, of course, better than nothing. Because of the insistence of two of the three Senate conferees that they would not even consider the question of a special session or a constitutional amendment (which is, at the very least, as urgently needed in the north as it is in the south) there will now be further delay, in a situation which brooks no delay, before we see the day when surplus waters are brought to relieve arid regions all over California, and when the benefits of true flood control can be secured for all of California.

If we adopt the Budget based upon this conference report, we will have at least lessened the danger of impairing California's credit by ending the ridiculous spectacle of a State without appropriations for schools, hospitals, institutions, and every other phase of state activity. We also will have taken significant steps to relieve flood damage, and we will have made a semi-start to cooperate with the Federal Government in flood control projects. But we have once again postponed the time when we must inevitably come to grips with the heart of the problem: the settlement by constitutional amendment of the allocations of the waters of California to all parts of the State, and the permanent basis upon which to build real flood control.

We have also, by postponing the requisition of necessary real property for reservoirs and dam sites, and rights of way, probably required the State to spend a great deal more money for these needed works than if we had appropriated for them now, and we may have foreclosed our opportunity to establish a sound joint basis for bargaining with the Federal Government equally in the construction of the San Luis Reservoir, one of the key units of both the Feather River Project and the Federal San Luis Project.

A vitally needed supplement to this Budget—indeed the only thing that can remove the delays in California's water program inherent in this Budget—is the calling of a special session to enable us to work out a constitutional amendment fairly and equitably settling the water rights for all of California in time for the voters to pass upon this November. Otherwise, we will have at least two years more delay, and we will be brought immeasurably closer to the decision of these problems that are so all-important for the whole State by an initiative constitutional amendment rather than one drawn by the Legislature itself representing the whole State.

LETTER FROM GOVERNOR

DEAR GLENN: In response to your inquiry of today, I am pleased to state to you now that I will be happy to assist the Legislature in the solution of our water problems by doing either of the following things:

1. I will forthwith call a special session of the Legislature for the purpose of legislating on our water problems, and water problems only, any time the 18-man Legislative Committee formally notifies me that they have reached an agreement on a constitutional amendment to be submitted to the Legislature for the purpose of solving the water rights problems.

2. I will call a special session of the Legislature for the consideration of water problems, and water problems only, on June 9, 1958, or November 10, 1958, or on any other date in 1958, agreeable to the Members of the Legislature, whenever a substantial number of Members of the Senate and Assembly assure me that they are ready to consider and approve a constitutional amendment with reference to water rights for Northern California and Southern California.

Whereupon the Members of the Assembly extended their congratulations to Mr. Driscoll.

Mr. Weinberger asked for, and was granted, unanimous consent that the following statement of principles by the California Water Commission be ordered printed in the Journal:

STATEMENT OF THE CALIFORNIA WATER COMMISSION ON PRINCIPLES TO SERVE AS THE BASIS FOR A PROGRAM OF WATER DEVELOPMENT ON A FIRM, CONTINUING BASIS**Foreword**

The tremendous growth of population and agricultural and industrial development in California has made imperative the immediate and continuing development of additional water supplies on a state-wide basis.

It is the firm belief of this commission that it is the continuing responsibility of the State, in co-ordination with other agencies at all levels, to assure that this water development is accomplished.

In line with such responsibility, the State has developed over a period of 10 years of study, the California Water Plan.

In order that this plan be accomplished on a firm, continuing basis, the commission believes that certain existing laws and principles should be broadened, clarified and strengthened. Existing law on the subject of protection to the areas of origin is not clear, is limited to certain streams and areas, and offers questionable protection. There are existing clouds on the integrity of state contracts with its political subdivisions and other agencies. Provision also must be made to assure firm supplies of water to areas of deficiency.

The commission respectfully submits the following principles to serve as a firm basis for the fullest implementation of the California Water Plan to the benefit of all areas of the State:

1. The California Water Plan should be accepted by the Legislature as a broad guide or framework within which all future water development should take place, taking into consideration that the plan may be modified from time to time as conditions warrant.

2. There should be a firm and continuing obligation on the State that the water needs of all areas of the State be met, when and where they occur, and as projects to satisfy those needs are found necessary and feasible.

3. There should be provision for firm contracts between the State and local agencies to provide water from state projects. There should be a constitutional amendment to prevent contract impairment. During the operation of a state project, should temporary deficiencies occur, contracts should provide that any water from such projects should be prorated among all project users.

4. The State should be committed to replenishment of the Delta Pool in amounts necessary to meet contract commitments therefrom after the needs of the Delta are satisfied.

5. Any water development program must respect all existing water rights.

6. In the allocation of waters from export projects, constructed by any agency, only those waters surplus to the reasonable ultimate needs of the areas of origin should be made available for permanent beneficial use in other areas of the State.

7. Applications by the State to appropriate water in furtherance of an overall plan (state filings) should be permanently exempted from a showing of diligence until assigned by the State for construction purposes.

8. It should be the policy of the State to encourage development of California's water resources, in line with the California Water Plan, by the Federal Government and local interests.

9. When a major export project is constructed by the State within a watershed, the State should participate in development of upstream projects in the watershed when found necessary, engineeringly feasible, and economically sound.

10. A continuing program of conserving waters of streams tributary to the Sacramento Valley will be necessary to provide for the increasing needs of that valley and to replenish the Delta to satisfy the requirements of the Delta and areas of deficiency. In addition, a program of import from the north coastal streams eventually will be necessary to fully accomplish these purposes.

11. In order to accomplish the objectives set forth in this statement, a water development fund, dedicated to both local and export projects within the scope of the California Water Plan, should be established on a continuing basis. An established portion of such a fund should be earmarked for local development.

In recommending these principles, the California Water Commission has included only broad policy, and makes no suggestions as to language or detailed provisions which would incorporate such policy into law. The commission also respectfully recommends that the Legislature take action to implement and supplement these principles by statutory policy on such matters as definition of reimbursable and nonreimbursable costs, pricing of water, marketing of power, and others relating to the construction and operation of state water projects.

It is emphasized that while these matters are being considered and acted upon, the progress in water development already started must move ahead without interruption and with adequate appropriations.

2. I will call a special session of the Legislature for the consideration of water problems, and water problems only, on June 9, 1958, or November 10, 1958, or on any other date in 1958, agreeable to the Members of the Legislature, whenever a substantial number of Members of the Senate and Assembly assure me that they are ready to consider a constitutional amendment with reference to water rights for Northern California and Southern California and that in their

opinion there is a reasonable probability for agreement on a constitutional amendment or, in any event, upon the request of a majority of the members of each house.

Analysis of Proposed Joint Rule No. 29.5—No. 3210

DEAR MR. ANDERSON: You have asked us for an analysis of proposed Joint Rule No. 29 5.

In general, the proposed rule would limit a Committee on Conference on the Budget Bill (1) in recommending new items of appropriation, to those previously considered in committee or on the floor and (2) in recommending increases in items of appropriation, to no greater increase than had previously been considered in committee or on the floor. No limit would be placed on the recommendation of amendments not constituting an appropriation of money, or on the decrease or elimination of items of appropriation.

The proposed joint rule would allow a Committee on Conference on the Budget Bill to recommend only the adoption of amendments to that bill which will:

- (1) Decrease or eliminate an item of appropriation
- (2) Add an item of appropriation, if an amendment adding such item has been adopted by one house and deleted by the other, or if such an amendment has been proposed in any committee or on the floor in either house and refused adoption. No such added item shall increase the maximum amount appropriated by such item beyond the maximum amount of such amendment or proposed amendment.
- (3) Increase an item of appropriation in the bill, if the item has been amended by one house with the other house refusing concurrence, or if an amendment to the item has been proposed in any committee or on the floor in either house, and refused adoption. No increase, so recommended, shall increase the maximum amount appropriated by such item over its maximum amount as introduced, as amended in either house, or as fixed by any such proposed amendment, whichever is greater.

The proposed rule would also authorize a Committee on Conference on the Budget Bill to recommend the adoption of other amendments to the bill, if the amendments do not constitute an appropriation of money.

The proposed rule would also provide that if a rule is submitted in violation of the rule, a question of order may be raised in either house and, if it is determined that the rule has been violated, a new Conference Committee shall be appointed pursuant to Rule 29.

The facts constituting the urgency are as follows:

This bill would reappropriate funds to make further studies of crossings of San Francisco Bay. Due to the Budget being passed so late in the session it is necessary for this bill, if it is to be passed at this session, to be acted upon in both houses prior to the final approval of the Budget Bill. It appears highly important that further study be given to appropriate crossings of San Francisco Bay.

I, therefore, recommend consideration of Assembly Bill No. 19, of the Second Extraordinary Session, as an emergency measure.

STATEMENT

By Charles Edward Chapel, Member of the Assembly

Made on the Floor of the Assembly, Monday, April 14th, at 11 45 a.m.

For the first time in the history of the State a Budget Bill has failed of adoption during the Budget Session of the Legislature.

This failure stems from sectional differences over California water development problems, more particularly over failure to get together on the approval of the budget for the Department of Water Resources recently organized. It is unthinkable that this difference over a single item in the Budget should continue to cause delay in the adoption of the Budget for other functions of Government. Therefore, the impasse must be broken and since all other attempts to obviate the impasse have failed, I offer this suggestion which I believe can be used for a basis of agreement.

This suggestion consists of three principal parts

(1) Making a final attempt to pass the Budget with the support items for the Department of Water Resources plus a reasonable amount not to exceed \$10,000,000 for flood control projects in which the Federal Government has indicated willingness to co-operate;

(2) Failing in the above, I suggest offering only the support items for the Department of Water Resources without any flood control; or

(3) Failing in either (1) or (2) remove all appropriations for the Department of Water Resources from the Budget with the understanding that the Governor may call a special session of the Legislature to deal with this problem prior to the end of the fiscal year.

It is well to understand that the Department of Water Resources was created for the purpose of planning and constructing water development and flood control projects for the interest of the entire State. Since its creation it has been headed by a very capable man, Mr. Harvey Banks, who has surrounded himself with a very able staff. Their planning and designing has been meritorious but due to the aforementioned sectional impasse they are being completely prevented from proceeding with any construction. It is now apparent that unless this sectional difference can be resolved the mistake has been made of creating an organization to construct which can do no construction under the impasse.

It would be the part of wisdom after a cooling off period, when the Legislature has been convened under less hectic circumstances than persist presently, that one of two things should occur. Either the sectional differences be resolved so that desperately needed construction may progress immediately, or reduce the Department of Water Resources to a bureau status of a Department of Public Works, abolishing the Department of Water Resources entirely.

It is completely compatible with statewide interest in California that the Federal Government should continue to participate in the planning and construction of both flood control and water development projects. The Department of Water Resources in bureau status could continue to serve statewide interests by planning and designing and co-operating with federal agencies, with the result that California would receive a

share of the federal contribution for construction of these projects in relation to California's contribution to the federal income.

**THIRD ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CALIFORNIA
RECIPROCITY COMMISSION TO THE
CALIFORNIA STATE LEGISLATURE
(Section 218(f), California Vehicle Code)**

To the Members of the Senate and Assembly of the State of California:

COMMISSION MEMBERSHIP

Hon. Harold J. Powers, Lieutenant Governor; Paul Mason, Chairman, Director of Motor Vehicles; Robert C. Kirkwood, State Controller; C. Max Gilliss, Director, Department of Public Works; and Bernard R. Caldwell, Commissioner, Department of California Highway Patrol.

The California Reciprocity Commission was created by Chapter 1002, Statutes of 1955.

The commission is empowered under the law (Vehicle Code Section 218) to enter into agreements and arrangements with other states, territories, or possessions of the United States, District of Columbia, and foreign provinces or countries, which, in the commission's judgment, will secure for vehicle owners substantially equivalent exemptions, benefits, and privileges in the licensing of their vehicles best calculated to promote the interests of this State. The prime responsibility of the commission is to make possible free movement of heavy interstate vehicles and to secure payment of license fees in proportion to the use of the highways of this State as related to total fleet miles traveled by such vehicles in all states.

HISTORICAL BACKGROUND

Reference is made to the Commission's Second Annual Report to the Legislature, filed March 6, 1957.

LEGISLATIVE CHANGES

The 1957 Regular Session of the Legislature passed a new statute providing specific authority for the Reciprocity Commission to negotiate and enter into special border zone agreements with neighboring states. This new enactment will be found under Section 218.1 of the Vehicle Code.

Technical amendments were also enacted relating to Sections 218 and 219 of the Vehicle Code. These amendments provide an optional method of prorating fees in connection with interstate commercial vehicles.

COMMISSION BUSINESS

There were no significant developments requiring the commission to convene during the calendar year 1957.

There is attached to this report an Exhibit "A" which is an analysis of the users and revenues collected under the proration of registration agreement as contrasted to the possible revenue that would have been received by the State under its former mirror type reciprocity law.

It is significant to note that there are increases in the number of vehicles being registered under the prorate fee system and a further increase in revenue as contrasted to the first year of operation under the plan.

The administrators of the several states, in co-operation with the Council of State Governments, Western Region, have continued to explore the possibilities of negotiating an Atlantic to Pacific Coast Reciprocal Agreement through further contact and negotiations with representatives of the southern states reciprocity group.

Substantial progress has been made in this direction and tentative drafts of an agreement, which would provide for either reciprocity or proportional registration have been made and are being reviewed in an effort to reach an agreement.

Administrators of the States of Nevada, California, and Utah have continued to explore reciprocity and registration problems peculiar to their respective states.

Substantial progress is being made toward concluding an agreement with the State of Nevada to establish a special reciprocity zone extending 50 air miles on either side of the border between the two states.

Utah, which is not presently a member of the compact, is likewise negotiating with California in an effort to arrive at some agreement concerning an equitable arrangement for the collection of fees in connection with interstate commercial vehicles.

Sacramento, California

GENTLEMEN:

Assembly Bill No. 15, of the Second Extraordinary Session, as amended in the Assembly on April 17, 1958, which appropriates the sum of \$505,000 to pay the increase provided in any increased salary range established during the 1957-58 Fiscal Years by the Personnel Board, and being entitled "An act making an appropriation for salaries of employees of the state departments, declaring the urgency thereof, to take effect immediately,"

in my opinion constitutes an emergency bill within the meaning of that term as used in Section 34 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of California, the consideration of which should not await the final enactment of the Budget Bill.

The facts constituting the emergency are as follows:

The State Personnel Board is delegated the authority by the State Constitution to fix and adjust salaries of state employees. Under the State Civil Service Law, and under such authority the State Personnel Board has increased certain salaries effective during the 1957-1958 fiscal year. If the act is not passed, it will be impossible for the State to pay such salaries which heretofore have been fixed by the State Personnel Board, and the provisions of the Constitution and Statutes will be defeated thereby.

I, therefore, recommend consideration of Assembly Bill No. 15, of the Second Extraordinary Session, as an emergency measure.

Resolved, That the Chief Clerk of the Assembly is hereby directed to take charge of arranging and preparing the bills, books, and all other records of the Assembly and filing the same with the Secretary of State, as provided by law, subsequent to adjournment of the 1958 Second Extraordinary Session of the Legislature; and shall have charge of indexing, correcting, reproofing and proofreading, and otherwise preparing the Journal and the Final History of the Assembly of the 1958 Second Extraordinary Session of the Legislature; such indexing, correcting, comparing, and proofreading of the Assembly Journals and Final History shall be performed by the State Printer under the direction of the Chief Clerk of the Assembly, making the information therein contained readily available for the use of the Members of the Legislature, state officers, and the general public as a permanent record of the business transacted during the 1958 Second Extraordinary Session. He shall also have charge of compiling, preparing, and having printed after adjournment, a Final Calendar of the legislative business of the 1958 Second Extraordinary Session

of the Legislature, said calendar to comprise a history of all bills introduced and their authors, the numbers that shall have become law; those that have been refused passage; an index to all measures introduced; and any and all such information as will provide a complete history of the session's business and a guide for the information of subsequent sessions of the Legislature.

When the Final Calendar is prepared, the Chief Clerk is directed to forward one copy of the Final History to each public library in the State which may apply for same, and one copy to each Member of the Assembly; and one copy of the complete unbound chapters to each Member of the Assembly.

PRESS RELEASE

Governor Goodwin J. Knight, April 23, 1958

Governor Goodwin J. Knight tonight issued the following statement: The action of the Legislature is reassuring proof that our system of representative government is equal to the difficult task of achieving fair compromise between seemingly irreconcilable positions.

I consider this substantial budget appropriation for state water development a wonderful victory for people of good will in all sections of the State.

At times the outlook for resolving differences of opinion in a constructive way was bleak indeed. Time and again the easy thing to have done, for my administration or for the Members of the Legislature,

would have been to explode in anger, frustration, and bitter recriminations. Effective leadership, however, demanded the less spectacular but more productive method of conciliation. I am proud to say that other than occasional outbursts on the part of a few, determination to seek an equitable solution prevailed.

Patience was not always easy to maintain throughout this trying period. But it was the watchword that guided my daily actions and those of the responsible leaders of the Legislature. In prolonged committee meetings, in repeated conferences in my offices, the Members of the Legislature stayed on the job and achieved a final victory.

The people of California today have every right to be proud of their elected representatives, whose action confirmed my oft-expressed confidence that they could and would reconcile their differences and find a fair solution to this problem.

With this appropriation, the program on certain important aspects of the plan for state water development will proceed at a rapid pace and we will achieve a full year's work of tremendous importance to both Northern and Southern California.
