## MESSAGE TO THE CALIFORNIA STATE LEGISLATURE

First Extraordinary Session, 1963
By EDMUND G. BROWN, Governor
Delivered to the Senate and Assembly in Joint Session, July 8, 1963
Mr President, Mr Suedia, Members of the Legesiatue, my fellow Cahformans:

This is, tu all revpert, au estamanary senson of the 1963 Legislature its orrom are unusual, its porpones are compelling and its outcome will be decisive for the moden history of Cahforma

We de here because it is my eonstatutional daty to call you moto spectal session whenever I beheve the welfare of the people of Califor$111 a$ makes such actiom nerestary I stand before you to carry out a second constitutional obhgation-to set forth the specific problems
whech I regard as of such urgency and mportance as to require your mmediate attention

I will recommend solutions to the problems before us, dong so in the full knowledge that you also have constitutional rupomsibilities and that yours are both distmet and different

It is my duty to propose It is youns to dispose
This difference alone mariably leads to conflict between the executive and the legislative provens But where this conflict is based on issues and not on abstract partisanship. it has always provided a viucible m which ideas are tested and tempered

It is my hope that thas session will prove to be urrh a erucible of 1 ssues and that we will work tugether with as Juttle partisanshin a ponsable I ank only mutual understanding and tolenance, and a mutual receptance of the highest duty mposed on each of us-to act for the well-beng of nearly $18,000,000$ Calitorntans

It was recently said-and mostakenly-that I have insufficient regard for the legslatire process I have great respert both for the process and for those involved in at But my respert for the legislative process is $3 n$ no way incompatable with my emvicturn that a Governor has a duty to lead Moreover, he has a responsibility to everese all the powers of his office to secure aftirmative action on proposals he believes to be curucial to the welfare of hus state

I will contmue to press for what I behove to be minht
I will also contmue to $\quad$ espect your privilege to arme at your own decisions according to vour collective consemence

Let us, then, approach this session m the same spirit of collaboration which has produced such great achevements in service to our people in the past four years

I will now turn to the specifie ssues before us
In my proclamation, I call for action on additional state and to local school districts, on substantial augmentation of the inadequate budget now in effect, and on revenue measures to finance the necensary new fiscal commitments

Each of there inmes war before yon at the regular cucsion and we were close to agreement on all of them when time ran ont

A compromise report of your conference committee. calling for addithonal school aid of $\$ 40$ million this rear and $\$ 60$ mullion next year. was ready for action by both the Senate and $A$ wembly of supporting revemue had been avaliable

A compromise budget from your conference eommottep also was apparently acceptable-both to you and to me-if the revenucs to finance it had been avalable through enactment of my recommendatons for revenue reform

Unlake the skeleton. emeigency budget which finally eane to my denk, the compromise budget was a reabntic and suncere effort to cope with the State's most urgent requirements

The revenue reform proponals themselves had the support of a majority of both the Senate and the Assembly Only the speud provege requiring that certain changas on our bank and corporation franchse
tax laws must have a two-thirds majority forces us to have this extraordinary session at all I might point out at this time that, by coutrast, a change in tax laws covering individuals and consumers needs only a a simple majority

Were it not for the special privilege accorded banks and corporations, we would now have an aderquate budget We would now have adequate assistance to local school districts And, perhaps most important of all, we nould now have adequate revenues to finance state services not only through this year but at a minmum through next year as well
To sum it up, a handful of votes agamst melusion of banks and corporations m a pay-as-you-go revenue collection plan was all that kept the 1963 Legislature from capping a session of great achevement with a sound approarh to California's fiseal future

I will take up with you first the question of revenue which-because of its ampact on public education this year and nest-must be the keystone of all progress at this special session

In the general session, 1 came before you with a series of revenue reforms which would fund our current requirements from current income They would meet our peoples' needs withont recourse to new or higher taxes and would bring our collection procedures into line with the more modern practices of other states and the federal government

I have, since the adjournment of that session, re-examined my recommendations both in the light of general principle and of specific provisions I still beheve the principle is correct and the provisions are farr

Bat in weighing alternatives to my recommendations. I was limited to two suggestions which have been brought forth in the merim between sessions

The first is that we "learn to live" with the skeleton budget now in effect-that we mark time for a year to gauge the exact detriment to our State wheh would result from under-financing

The second is that we mpose new or higher taxes at this special session

Nether alternative seems satisfactory to me nor, I am certain, to most of you

Apart from the obrious mjustice to many millions of our citizens -ranging from the child in school to the retired teacher living on \$70 a month-under-financing of state government can only set off a cham reaction that will damage Californa for long years into the future

A state whose population grows by 600.000 a year can no more stand still than it can retreat It must aceept its new obligations It must give ats people not pauper government but the best possible govermment

As for the suggestion that we raise taxes or expand the tax base at this session, that also fails to recognuze the obvious fiscal realties

There is absolutely no need for new or higher taxes
But there is a need for more efficient collection of the taxes we now levy If, as I propose, we bring tax payments more current with the services they finance, this-m combination with our expanding econ-omy-will enable us to hold the tax line for at least two years and perhaps as long as four years.

I would still wish that my orignal recommendations might come to my desk in the form of legislation But I recognize that present crrcumstances mdicate certam changes in approach may be helpful

I am ready to take the mitiative in altering certain provisions of my orıginal program

I am also ready-as I have been m the past-to accept any workable alternative which you may devise in your deliberations

I am still convinced that the revenue needs of Californa can be met for the present without new or higher taxes, but meeting tbose needs is more important than the methods we employ

If the Legislature caus work out a different-but fair and equitablemethod of meeting the needs of Califorma, it will not concern me that it differs from my own recommendations.

Lulke most Californians, I waut above all to see the job done
My revenue recommendations are these:
(1) Approve the msurance acoelcration tax as it was amended in the Senate in the general session
(2) Approve a revised bank and corporation tax measnre which ends the mstallment payment privilege and provides for future pay-as-you-go features

The legislation I presented to you has been amended
In its new form, it will require only a smple majority in both houses and will provide a new set of procedures, meluding a three-year transition period to a systen of fully current payments The net revenue effect would be the same in 1963-64 as my origmal proposal but would vary in succeedmg years
(3) Approve a set of revised personal meome tax hills which would
(a) End the present system of installment payments for anduyduals
(b) Put personal meme taxes on a pay-as-you-go basis on January 1, 1965, with a 50 percent forgiveness of the 1964 taxes due April 15 , 1965.
(c) Exempt from meome tax lability all sugle persons whase tax would be less than $\$ 5$ and all couples whose tax would be less than $\$ 10$

This pay-as-you-go plan for personal meome taxes would mean absolutely no windfall to the State and would reciult in no additional revenue for the next two fiseal years, but it would provide substantial continumg revenues for state services thereafter. Begming in 1965-66, we would achueve this larger return of more than $\$ 50$ million a year by eliminating tax evasion, which now costs us many milhons a ycar, and by bringing our revenues curreut with our meones and our fiscal oblgations to schools and other service programs

Under this new proposal, taxpayers would begn paying taxes in current installments on January 1, 1965, for that year On April 15, 1965-when his 1964 tax came due-the taxpayer would be forgiven half of the amount-that is, the equivalent of sux months' taxes

Having paid installments for unly three months, he would actually be three months ahead By July 1, 1965, he would be exactly even and payng on a current basis, with no penalty at all in the transition

Financing of the issues before you doring the next year is not contingent on approval of the pay-as-you-go plan We can complete our
business in this special session without it Let me caution you, however, that I belseve vou could make no greater mistake than to defer action

If you approve thes plan, we have a chance of holdng the line on taxes in 1965-66 If you do not, there pan be no question that we will face new revenue requrements in that year
The pay-as-you-go plan payment of tax collection 1 s good, sound business We should and will come to it eventually The federal govemment has it New York has it under Repmblean Governor Rockefeller. Oregon has it mader Republiean Governor Hatfield And both have told me it is popular both with employees and employers who would not go back to the old system of they could

Consider, too, that 27 of the 32 states with a general personal income tax already collect it in this manner and all have found it a great improvement over the old system

Objections to current payment of taxes in Califurma have been both parthan and groundess, and are ratsed by the same forces of reaction which oppose almost everytheng most of you believe in

Support for the plan, on the other hand, has come from nearly every organzation and group whelh helped elect the majority of members un both houses of the Legulature

The self-serving use of the suse of witholding by the State Chamber of Commerce and by the banks and corporations which set policy for the Chamber has been a deep disappontment to me
During the past four years, $T$ have worked slosely with these corporate interests under the mpreswon we shared a concem for the future of Califorma and the nefds of its people I was persuaded that their approach was one of enlughtened self-minterest I thought they saw the advantage to themselve, and to theur customers in public mestments in schools, scholarships, mental health programs and humane, progressive government

I now find that they are willing to forego those programs if it means they must jom everybody else in Caluformu in a program which requires a pay-as-yon-earn approach to taxation
Let us examme some of the neerts whell camot be met with the skeleton budget now in effect but which can be met if farorable action ly given to my levenue recommendations

Of overriding importance, of course, is the necessity to provide more assistance to local school districts. This will at once mprove the quality of puble education m Califorma and ease the heavy burden that now falls on all local property tax payers

I base my recommendations for suhool ald legivation on the report of your conference committee It would merease state and by $\$ 40 \mathrm{mil}$ lion in fiscal 1963-64, and by " 60 million in fiscal 1964-65

It would also mpose new and nseful standards for expenditure and a formula for equalsing the froperty tane for school purposes on a countywide basss

The school and recommendation contans one major new feature, however It provides that the second-year program will not take effect unless the special session provides adequate revenues for the entire twoyear span of the legislation

Although addatsonal asostance to local sehonls is the most important matter before you, it is alno urgent that we remedy other defecencies in the temporary budget under whoh we aie now operating

In qeneral, I propose that you follow the lmes of the budget report prepared by your conterenec commottec gust prior to the falure of the revenue reforms at the gencial session I also propose that you add nther important items

I behere you should restore the ormmal bodert amounts for ware of errppled children Without additional fouds, thes all-mportant program of hispitalization and rehabilitation will falter before the year is out The Depariment of Public Health estimatios that G,000 youngsters wall be turned that from clontrs around thr, State because the funds are exhausted Theve are youngters for whom help must be given now or never

This program better than any other sets the terms of the thotee which has brourht us back to Sacramento

Do we save the children or do we save the money ${ }^{\text {a }}$
I attach high pronty also to an appropration for more book for local libranes And we must, to keep fath, restore funds for 760 scholarships already awarded to muttanding students in our State

These are sholars with sperial abolity-voung men and women we count on to lead the State forward in the next anneration Each of them made plans for entering school on the bawi of scholarships the State of Califorma offic ally awanded rarl, thes year For most, the withirawal of the scholarchip means drifting for a year because it is too late now to make other plans for the fall semester

I belneve, too, that you shomld angment the budget with funds for minmal salary increases for maly of our state amployen There as already ton great a gap between state salames and those in private mdustry and competing publie jumbictions

This nequity is resulting not only m large-seale reugnations from state servee among suth professional classes as mgmeery and auditors, but is making it mereanmgly difficult to recruit replarements

Fimally, I would place speesal emphasis on an appropriation for additional Farr Employment Practices Commisuon staff to administel nur new Faur Housing Law

This mportant legislation, wheh places Califorma in the forefront of states striving toward equal human nights, is without real furce or effect of we fall to prowte funds for its proper adminstration

I dum also asking $\$ 125,010$ for an executive tas study Among the items of legislation which farler at the last moment beraise of the revenue problem was a bill creating a Tax Study Commission, a mearure which had bipartisan support The tabk of appraising the localstate tax relationship is an urgent one linder the Constitution, the Governor has a mandate to propose a budget with detaled revenue proposals to support it Without this tax ctudy, that mandate camnot be properly fulfilled
I have also meluded in this bulget those items wheh I struck because they commatted the State to projects which were out of place in a
skeleton budget. or because thry committed us to long-term expenditures without any revenues in sight to support them

Approval of the revenue program would clearly justify them as angmentations

Certain persons have aserbed political motives to my actions in further reducurg the skeleton budget To them, I would say this

Funr and one-half years ago, I stood before a Legislature as Governor for the first tume I spelled ont the facts of a fiscal crisis, handed over to me by an admunstation whech had not been able to persuade members of its own party to meet its obligations

On that day. I asked for new taxe, Men of conscience of both parties displayed great political courage m meeting the challenge and in voting to approve new taxes

It was thenr courage that put California in the black, that enabled us to proreed with six new state colleges and three new Unversity of Califorma campuses, that enabled Cahforma once agam to become the most progressive and prosperous state m the Nation.

Many of them are here today, and I salute them once more
I salute them becanse they rejected the easy expedient of voting tens of millions of dollars for worthy projects m their districts and then voting aganst the new taxes needed to pay for those projects

I can respect the honest conservative who votes against both taxes and appropriations or the honest newspaper which fights both
But I cannot respect people who ask for public money for public purposes-and usually good public purposes-but who refuse to belp pay for them or suppert those who do help.

They did not help build this Country and they do not help buld California

The Cahforma Legislature is now back in session
Approach the task before you with confidence in the future of our great State and confidence in our people to sustain a system of government that looks to the future and not to the past

Accept my pledge that this adminustration will continue to exercise all possible economes in the administration of the funds you appropriate We came to the end of the fiscal year just eight days ago with a $\$ 30$ million surplus mour Treasury, despite the greatest demands for services in the long history of our State I will continue to demand naw economues of the departments in the year ahead

In wenghing dollars against human needs, consider also that our economy is moving toward new high ground, Employment is shattering all records Per capita income and sales are constantly rising And corporate profits, too, are at an all-time high

All inducations point to the most profitable year for business since World War II And Califorma, which leads the Nation in so many other respects, is also leadng m the expansion of its economic basethe bedrock on which your fiscal deliberations must rest

One cannot look at Califorma today without hope-without certanty that here we are building the best of all human societies

This surge toward the future, which you and I have the responsibility of directing, requres of us courage, not timidty-the broad view of statesmanship, not the narrow view of partisanship.

Chief Justice Earl Warren says it well Speakng of California last week, he said:
"It's a state that has guts People back there go out and do things They don't stand stll That's what makes Cahforuia great Whenever there is a chance for improvement-whenever something new or modern is needed, people back there aren't afraid to spend They get the job done-and it has always paid off They're terrific!'

I agree, and I know you agree
Let's get the job done

Proclamation-Germaneness of Assembly Bill No. 1258-No. 102 Questron
Dear Mr Qutmby. You have asked whether the provisions of Assembly Bill No 1258 of the 1963 Regular Session as amended in Senate June 15, 1963, would be germane to any atem on the proclamation calling the 1963 First Extraordmary Session

Opanzon
In our opimon, the bill is within the scope of Item 2 of the Governor's Proclamation convening the session and therefore may be considered and acted upon at the current special session

## Analysts

In Martmv Riley, 20 Cal 2d 28, at page 39, the Califorma Supreme Court stated.
" . The duty of the Legislature m special session to confine itself to the subject matter of the call is of course mandatory It has no power to legislate on any subject not specified in the proclamation. (People v Curry, 130 Cal 82 [63 Pae 516], Sumg v Raley, 13 Cal (2d) 513, 518 [90 P (2) 313]) But when the Governor has submitted a subject to the Legrslature, the designation of that subject opens for legislative consideration matters relating to, germane to and having a natural connection with the subject proper (Blackford v . Judith Basın County, 109 Mont. 578 [98 P (2d) 872, 877, 126 ALR 639], and cases cited) Any matter of restriction or limitation becomes advisory or recommendatory only and not binding on the Legislature (People v Dastract Court, 23 Colo 150 [46 Pac 281]; Long v State, 58 Tex Cr R 209 [127 S W 208, 21 Ann Cas. 405] .."
It is also to be noted that all presumptions are in favor of the constitutionality of any act passed by the Legiclature durng the special session, and such act will be held to be constatutional if by any reasonable construction of the language of the proclamation it can be sad that the subject of the legislation is embraced therem (Rartın v Raloy, ahove, at p 40)

Item 2 of the Governor's Proclamation convening the 1963 First Extraordmary Session reads
"To consider and act upon legislation relating to the support of the publie school system and revenue acts necessary therefor."

In our opmon the subject proper of the item is support for authorised eapenditures of the public school system and revenue acts necessary therefor Under the rule of law set forth above, any legislation relatung to, germane to, and having a natural comection with this subject matter would be within the scope of the item.

Assembly Bill No 1258 of the 1963 session as last amended in Senate June 15, 1063, would authorize a county supermtendent of schools; or a school district, to contract for the purpose of procuring television broadcasts for use in the educational programs of the schools, and would provide for State School Fund apportionments to uchool districts which receve such mstructional television If this authorization to contact for television were not now authorized, the prmary purpose of the hill would appear to be the enactment of legislation to enable schonls to melude a new teachng method in their educational program However, we beleve that both the county supermtendents and school district governmg boards already have this authority (see See 8857, Ed C)

Therefore the substance of the bill which is new is the part providmg for apportionment of state funds to pay for such instructional television This, we beheve, relates to the support of the publie schools and thus is within the srope of Item 2 of the proclamation convening the First Extraurdmary Session.

## Analys:s

Assembly Bill No 10 adds Section 7028 to the Education Code to authorize the Vocational Rehabilitation Service to enter co-operative agreements with other puble or private nonprofit ageneles under which the service whll provide rehabilitation services to special groups of handicapped persons for which the present staff of the serviee is not able to provide such services The proposed new section requires that such nonprofit agencies match available federal funds for such services, and provides that if federal funds are not available, the State shall not be liable for any costs of the services.

The bill does not appear to be germane to eather of the two 1 tems appearing in the Governor's Proclamation. It does not amend or supplement the Budget Bill for the 1963-64 fiscal year, nor is it a revenue act, so as to fall within the scope of Item 1 of the Proclamation Furthermore, it does not relate to the support of the public school system, nor is it a revenue act necessary therefor, as provided in Item 2 of the Proclamation.

It is our opinion, therefore, that the bill does not fall withn the scope of the Governor's Proclamation, and thus may not be considereal at the current special session.

In our opinion Assembly Constitutional Amendment No. 29 is within the scope of the proclamation

In Martin v. Ruley, 20 Cal. 2d 28, at page 39, the Calıfornia Supreme Court stated-
". . The duty of the Legislature in special session to confine itself to the subject matter of the call is of course mandatory. It has no power to legslate on any subject not specified in the proclamation (People v Cury, 130 Cal 82 [ 62 Pac 516], Swing v Ruley, 13 Cal. (2d) 513, 518 [90 P. (2) 313].). But when the Governor has submitted a subject to the Legislature, the designation of that subject opens for legisiative consideration matters relating to, germane to and having a natural connection with the subject proper (Blackford v Juduth Basin County, 109 Mont. 578 [98 P (2d) 872, 877, 126 ALR 639], and cases eited). Any matter of restriction or limitation becomes advisory or recommendatory only and not binding on the Legislature (People v. District Court, 23 Colo. 150 [46 Pac 281]; Long v. State, 58 Tez Cr 209 [ 127 S W. 208, 21 Amn Cas 405]... ."
It is also to be noted that all presumptions are in favor of the constitutionality of any act passed by the Legslature durng the specal session, and such act will be held to be constitutional if by any reasonable construction of the language of the proclamation it can be said that the subject of the legislation is embraced therein (Martin $\vee$ Raley, above, at p 40).

of the vote required to approve the meurring of indebtedness in excess of reveuue, would areommodate the finanuing of publie schools Thus, in our opinion Assembly Constitutional Amendment No 29, as amended Junc 17, 1963, is germane to and has a natural connection with the subject matter of Item 2 of the Governor's Proclamation convenmg the 1963 Frrst Extraordinary Session

Under the rule of law set forth above, any legislation relating to, germane to, and having a natural comection with this subject matter would be within the scope of the rtem

The bill prepared for you under our Request No 161 would amend the Budget Act of 1963 to probibit the expenditure of funds during the 1963-64 fiscal year for the parment of and to needy children on the basss of the unemployment of a parent or parents, and would require that the funds derived be transferred from the General Fund to the State School Fund, to be used for the support of the public schools The bill also contains a declaration by the Legislature that the anticipated revenue of the State for the 1963-1964 fiscal year is below what is required to provide funds urgently needed for the support of the puble school system, and that it is necessary to delay the commencement of new programs for which the need is not as great, in order to provide those funds.

While the bill under consideration appears to have a double purnose -the delay of a welfare program and the support of the public schools -in view of the declaration of legislative findings and the presumption of validuty which attends every legislative enactment, it appears to us that a court would hold that the promeipal purpose of the bill is to provide revenue for the support of the public schools We are of the opimon, therefore, that the bill would be held to be withm the scope of Item 2 of the proclamation convening the Fust Extraordinary Session

You have asked whether the Califorma Water Resources Development Finance Committee has the legal right to authorize the sale of general obligation bonds pursuant to the Calhfornia Water Resources Development Bond Act ${ }^{1}$ nubject to an agreement by the purchasers of the general obligation bonds that they will consent to the power revenues from Oroville Dam being pledged to pay off revenue bonds

Opmon and Analysus
The Burns-Porter Act authorizes the issuance and sale of $\$ 1,750$,000,000 of general obligation bonds "to provide funds to assint in the construction of a State Water Resources Development System for the State of California'" (Sec 12931, Wat C)

[^3]This system includes "a multiple purpose dam and reservorr in the viemity of Oroville, Butte County" (See 12934, (d), (1), Wat C) The Oroville Dam is the major power prodaring unit of the system

The Department of Water Revources has proposed to ssue revenue bonds pursuant to the provisions of the Water Conde relating to the Central Valley Project ${ }^{2}$ to finance the construction of the Oroville Dam Under this proposal, such revenue bonds would be payable from, and constitute a first lien on, the revennes derived from the sale of electric power generated at the Oroville Dam durmg the same perod that general oblgation bonds sssued pursuant to the bond act are outstanding

We have stated, however, that in our ommon the revennes derived from the sale of electrie power generated at the Oroville Dain could not be so pledged as seturity for such revenue bonds (see Op Legis Counsel, printed m A.J, Mar 28, 1963, pp 1523-1527) In that opmion we concluded that all of the revenues of the State Water Resources Develorment System, meluding the power revenues from the Oroville Dam, are pledged for the purposes expressly spectied in the bond act (see See 12937, subd (b), Wat C ), none of which purposes meludes the parment of revenue bonds The authority of the bond commattee under the bond act is limited to the creating of "a debt or debts. lability or labilities of the State of Califorma in the aggregate prucipal amount of one billon seven hundred fifty million dollars ( $\$ 1,750$, 000,000 ) on the maner and the ertent herem proneded" (Ser 12935, Wat C) We, therefore, do not believe that the bond committee has the authority to authorize the assuance of genemal ohlgation bonds pursuant to the bond act subject to the agreements in quention, for we do not belueve that system revenues may he valudly pledged to secure revenue bonds

The duty of the Legislature in special session to confine itself to the subject matter of the call is of course mandatory It has no power to legıslate on any subject not specified in the proclamation (People v Curry, 130 Cal 82 [62 Pac 516]; Swug v. Ruley, 13 Cal . (2d) 513, 518 [90 P (2) 313]) But when the Givernor has submitted a subject to the Legislature, the designation of that subject opens for legislative cousideration matters relating to, germane to and having a natural connection with the subject proper (Blackford v . Judith Basin County, 109 Mont 578 [98 P (2d) 872, 877, 126 A L R 639], and cases cited). Any matter of restriction or limitation becomes advisory or recommendatory ouly and not binding on the Legislature (Frople v District Court, 23 Colo 150 [ 46 Pac 281], Long v State, 58 Tex Cr R 209 [127 S W 208, 21 Aun Cas 405]
It is also to be noted that all presumptions are in favor of the constitutionality of any act passed by the Legislature during the special session, and such act will be held to be constitutional of by any reasonable coustruction of the language of the proclamation it can be sard that the subject of the legislation is embraced therem (Matin v Riley, above, at p 40).

Item 1 of the Governor's Proclamation conveming the 1963 First Extiaordinary Session reads
"To consider and act upon proposals to amend and supplement the Budget Bill for the 1963-64 fiscal year (enacted as the Budget Act of 1963), aud roucnue acts" (Emphasis added)
The subject of this item in our opinion is proposals to amend and supplement the Budget Bill for the 1963-64 fiscal year, and meludes revenue acts Thus, under the rule of law set out above, any legıslation relating to, germane to, and having a natural connection with this subject would be withm the seope of the 1 tem

We would note, with reference to the portion of Item 1 of the Governor's Proclamation relating to revenue acts, that the term "revenue," as related to governmental bodies, is generally defined to mean the moome from taxes, excises, customs, duties and the like which the goverumental botly collects and recelves into its treasury for public use (see Bates v Purle, (1887), 74 Cal 224, 239; 77 C J S 334)

The bill prepared for you under our Request No 287 would authorize the board of directors of a district agricultural association, subject to various conditions, to lease its racetrack for a period not to exceed

14 days per year to a person licensed to conduct a horse racing meet and would permut the Californal Horse Racmg Board to grant that number of additional racing days to such person The bill would require that any revenue derived from any such horse racing be pard into the General Fund and would declare that the proposed act is a revenue act which is enacted to provde funds necessary for the operation of the government of this State

While the ball under consideration would appear to have a donble purpose-authorizing the lease of a dhstrict agricultural association racetrack and rabing revemue necessary for the support of the government of this State-in view of the legislative derlaration and the presumption of valudity which attends every legislative enactment, it appears to us that a court nould hold that the prineipal purpose of the bill is to provide revenue for the support of the goverument of this State We are of the opmon, therefore, that the boll would be held to be withm the scope of Item I of the Governor's Proclamation conveming the 1063 First Extraordinary Session

Bank and Corporation Taxes-No. 111
Question
Dear Mr Bagley. You have asked how many votes would be required to pass a bill which would amend the Bank and Corporation

Tax Law (Sees 23001, et seq, R \& T C ) * which would make no change except to (1) eliminate installment payments and (2) require the payment this year and in each suceeeding year of the tax which would, under present law, be due and payable the following year Yum ask us to assume that enactment of the bull would result in the collection m a period of three years ( $\mathrm{e} \boldsymbol{g}$, the years of $1962,1963,1964$ ) of an amount of tax collected equivalent to that which would be eollected in four years under present law You further ask us to consider this question with the followng alternate assmoptions

1. Assuming that the bill would not change the rate or measime of the tax or the year for which the tax is mposed on a bank, corporation or financial mstitution for the privilege of exeresing its franchise

2 Assuming that the bill would not change the rate or the measure of the tax, but would result in two taxes being imposed on a bank, corporation or financial institution in one year for the privilege of exercising its franchise to conduct business during that yenr

## Opmion and fnaluszs

1 Assuming that the bill would not change the gate or measure of the tax or the year for which the tax es mposed

Under the Bank and Corponation Tax Taw, speaking generally, a tax is mposed each rear on each corporation (other than banks and financial corporations) for the privilege of exercising its franchise The measure of the tax is 55 percent of its net inoome for the preceding meome sear (Sec 23151) The corporation is required to file a return on or before the 15th day of the thed month followng the end of the close of the meome year (Sec 25401) The tax is pard un two matallments. the first installment bemg parable on the 15 th dav of the thind month following the close of the meome year (Sec 25551), and the serond motalment bemar pavable on the 15 th dar of the month month following the end of the meome year (See 25551a)

The law also mposes a tax on every bank and financial corporation eact year on the hasis of meome for the next preceding prar The rate of the tax applied to such menme is (a) the percentage of the net mome of other corporations paid as franchise taxes, plis (b) the petuentage of the net income pand b, other corporations as personal property taxes, not to exceed 95 peroent (Sees 23181, 23183, and 29186) The returns on this tax are required to be filed on or before the 15th day of the thrrd mouth following the elose of the income rear (Sec 95401 ) The tares are pavable in two mstallments The first $1 s$ pavable on or hefore the 15th day of the third month after the elose of the income year and meludes the amonnt based on the rate determmed to be the percentage pald by other corporation for framehnse taxes (Sec $25553)$ The second matallment is pavable on or before the 15 th day after the Franchise Tas Board determmes the peruentage of meome pard as personal property taxes under Section 38186a, or on or before the 15th day of the ninth month followng the clone of ith meome : edr, whehever is later The second mstallment of the tax is based on the percentage padd by other corporations as personal property tax (See 25552a)

[^8]Under this assumption, the bill in question would not affect the year for which the tax is now imposed or the rate or measure of the tax, but it would alter the time $m$ whech the tax is to be paid by requiring the payment of the tax prior to the commencement of the year m which the corporation exercises the franchise for which it is beng taxed.

Section 16 of Article XIII of the Cahforma Constitution provides, in part:
"Sec. 16 1. (a) Banks . . shall annually pay to the State a tax, at the rate to be provided by law aecording to or measured by theur uet income . . .
" (b) . . .
" 2 . The Legislature may provide by law for the taxation of corporations, their franchises, or any other franchises . . .
" 3 . Any tax imposed pursuant to this section must be under an act passed by not less than two-thirds vote of all the members elected to each of the two houses of the Legislature"
The assue thus posed by the bill in question is whether the provisions requirmg the "prepayment" of the taxes would constitute the mpositoon of a tax within the meanng of Section 16 of Article XIII so as to require a two-thirds vote.

We are unaware of any case in which the courts have considered this question. It is possible to argne that only the act that originally imposed the tax would constitute the mposition of a tax within the meanng of Section 16 of Article XIII and that any amendment that changes the rate, amount or basis of the tax or the procedures for its collection would not come withm that constitutional requirement that it be passed by not less than two-thirds vote of the members of each house of the Legislature. Such a construction would permat the Legislature to triple the tax on banks and corporations by a simple majority vote, a construction which we do not think would be adopted by the courts as contemplated by the voters in adopting Section 16 of Articlo XIII.

We have consistently taken the position that any bill which meludes provisions amending the Bank and Corporation Tax Law that causes a material change in the tax burden borne by taxpayers under that law imposes a tax within the meaning of the language of subdivision 3 of Section 16 of Article XIII of the State Constitution

On the other hand, we have held that an amendment which mercly involves the collection of the tax might be passed by an affirmative vote of a majority of the elected members of each house There is judicial support for such a construction (see Beecham v Commessoners of Internal Revenue, 28 T C 598, 600, affirmed 255 Fed 2d 103-104) We had in mind in this regard an amendment which, for example, would eliminate provisions such as contemplated by this proposal permutttrug pay ment of the tax in installments so as to require payment of the full tax upon the filmg of the return. It is possible that the courts mught also construe the provisions of the proposed bill which requires the "prepayment" of the taxes as merely mvolving the collection of the tax and not molving the mposition of a tax, however, the obvous mpact of the measure on the taxpayer would be substantal

In view of the lack of judicial authority construing the constitutional provision here molved, the safict course would be to secure the affirmative vote of two-thirds of the menherm of each house of the Legislature However, if a bill is passed bi the manout? of the members elected to each house which made no change other than to change the time of payment by eliminating the unstallinent pay ments and requing payment of the tax prior to the year m wheh the corporaino exelenses the franchise for which it is bemg taxed, we behere that the courth would sustani it

In this connection, while we have assumed, fur the purporss of jour question, that over a three-yedr period the total tax collected from a bank or corporation under the proposed bill would be equivalent to that which would be collected under the present law m four years, the advance payment would be in payment of a tas for the provige of exercising the franchise in the following year and this during the three year period, while the tax would amount to that presently collected in four years, it would also actually sepresent tax payments for the privilege of exercising the franchese for tome yats 'l'hus the payments would represent no new taxes
2. Assumnng that the bill did not change the rate on measure of the tax, but would result in both texacs bemg mposed in ane year ton the priviege of excicising the corponate franchise durng that yoa

As mdicated above, we have cousistently taken the ponition that any bull which ancludes provisions amendug the Bank and Corporation Tax Law that causes material change in the tax burden borne by the taxpayers under that law mposes a tax withn the mednug of the language of subdivision (3) of Section 16 of Article XIII of the Constrtution Therefore, if a medsure would impose, in any given ycar another tax $m$ addition to that mposed under present las for the privilege of exercismg the corporate franchise during that sar, we belueve that such a measure would clearly mpose a new tax withm the meanng of Section 16 of Article XIII of the Constitution, and would therefore requare an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members of edeh house of the Legislature

It should be noted that in discussmg the two above assumptions we have distmgushed between a bill wheh would mprels affeet the collection of the tax by altering the time of payment without changme the rate or measure of the tax dida a bill wheh would in a given yedr double the tax for that year

Dear Mr Collier You have asked us whether Assembly Constıtutional Amendment No. 1, as introduced, would preclude the Legislature from requiring the mpontion of countywide taxes by county boards of supervisor's for state public school district purposes as prepared by Assembly Bills Nos 2 or 8 or Senate Bill No 1 of the 1963 First Extraordinary Session of the Legislature

Assembly Constitutional Amendment No 1 would, among other things, add a Section 19 to Article XIII of the State Constitution to read as follows
"19 The Legislature shall have no power to impose a stateurde tax on real property, meluding but not limuted to mprovements, according to the value thereof." (Emphasis added)
The term "statewide" is not defined for the purposes of this proposed constitutional provision In the absence of such a definition it is to be presumed that such term is used in the ordmary and generally accepter sense (Hammond v MeDonald (1942), 49 Cal App 2d 671, 684)

The term "statewide" is defined by Webater's to mean "Extending thronghout the length and breadth of a state. including all parts of a state " (Webater's New International Dictionary. 2d Ed)

In view of this defintion, we thmk that it is clear that the courts would construe the proposed Section 19 of the State Constatution to prohbit the Legivature from mposing a state tax on real property wheh would extend throughout the Jength and breadth of the State, uncluding all part, of the State

The bills in question (AB 2, AB 8, and S B 1) would each require the board of supervisors of a county, except a county or city and county which comprises a single district with a prescribed tax rate, to levy and collect a tax in the county for state public school district purposes (see proposed Sec 20911, Ed C, as added by A B 2, A B 8, S B 1)

Since the tax which the bills would require to be leved in a county would be a separate and distinct tax which would not extend beyond the boundaries of the county, and the bills would not require certan counties and cities and counties to levy and collect such a tax, we
would conclude that the bills would not impose a state tax on real property which would extend throughout the State

Thus, it is our opmon that Assembly Constitutional Amendment No 1 would not preclude the Legis]ature from requing the imposition of conntywide taxes by comnty boards of supervisurs for state public school district purposes as proposed by Assembly Bills No 2 or 8 or Senate Bill No. 1.

Assembly Bull No 538 would amend Section 5882 to read as follows. " 5882 All moneys in the Small Craft Harbor Revolving Fund shall be avalable when appropmated by the Legislature for expenditure by the Department of Parks and Recreation, the Division of Small Craft Harbors Commission for the purposes of tlus division [Small Craft Harbors Law] and Section 684 of the Harbors and Navigation Code, meluding refunds " (Emphasis added)
Under Section 5882, as li would be amended by Assembly Bill No 538 , the money in the Small Craft Harbor Revolving Fund would no longer be contmoously appropriated, but it would only be available for expenditure when spectically appropriated by the Legislature

Assembly Bill No 538 would not, however, require, nor are we aware of any provision of state law which would require, that the unappropriated balance of the money in the Small Craft Harbor Revolving Fund at the end of each fiscal year revert, or be transferred, to the General Fund

In the absence of any such provision m the bill or 10 the present law we would conclude that, if Assembly Bull No 538 is enacted, the unappropriated balance of the money in the Small Graft Harbor Revolving F'und will not revert or be required to be transferred, to the General Fund at the end of each fiseal year.

Assembly Bill No 538 would amend Section $588^{2}$ to reard as follows " 5883 All money 10 the Small Craft Harbor Revolving Fund shall be avalable when approprated by the Legsiature for expenditure by the Department of Parks and Recreation, the Division of Small Craft Harbors Commission for the purnoses of this division [Small Craft Harbors Law] and Section 684 of the Harbors and Navgation Code, meluding refunds " (Emphasis added)
Under Section 5882, as it would be amended by Assembly Bill No 538, the money in the Small Craft Harbor Revolving Fund would no longer be continuously approprated, but it would only be available for expenditure when specifically approprated by the Legaslature

Assembly Bill No 538 would not, however, affect the provisions of the state law which governs the avalability of appropriations of state funds for expenditure These provisoms are contamed in Sectoons 16304 and 163041 of the Government Code *

Section 16304 of the Government Code provides, in part, that. "An appropriation shall be avalable for expenditure durmg the pexiod specrfied therein, or, if not otherwise limuted by law, for three years after the date upon which it first hecame avalable for expenditure"

Section 163041 of the Government Code now provides.
"163041 Upon the espiration of two years following the last day of the period of ats avalability, the undisbursed balance in any appropiation shall revert to and become a part of the fund from whech the appropriation was made. Subsequent to reversion any unpard encumbrance against the appropriation may be paid, with the approval of the Board of Control, from any appropriations available for the same purpose." (Emphasis added)
Chapter 400, Statutes 1963, which will become effective September 20, 1963, will amend Section 163041 of the Government Code to read as follows:
"16304 1 Disbursements in liquidation of encumbrances may be made before or during the two years following the last day an appropriation is available for encumbrance When-

[^14]ever, during such two-year period, the Director of Finance determines that the project for which the appropriation was made is completed and that a portion of the appropriation is not necessary for disbursements, such portion shall, upon order of the Director of Fmance, revert to and become a part of the fund from which the appropriation was made Upon the expiration of two years followng the last day of the period of its avanlabilty, the undisbursed balance in any appropriation shall revert to and become a part of the fund from which the appropriation uas made Subsequent to reversion any unpaid encumbrance against the appropriation may be padd, with approval of the Board of Control, from any current apppropriations avalable for the same purposes
"To the extent that appropriations are exempt from hmitations as to periods of avalability under Section 16304, they shall not be subject to the provisions of this section." (Emphasis added)
It would appear clear from Section 163041 of the Government Code, both as at now reads, and as it will be amended by Chapter 400, Statutes. 1963, that the unused portion of any money appropriated from the Small Craft Harbor Revolving Fund will, at the expiration of two years following the last day of the period of its avalability, revert to and become a part of the fund from which the appropriation was made, the Small Craft Harbor Revolving Fund

Thus, we would conclude that, if Assembly Bill No 538 is enacted, the unused portion of any money appropriated from the Small Craft Harbor Fund will not revert to the General Fund at the end of each fiscal year.

You have provided us with a eupy of Opinion No 115 of the Office of the Legislative Comiscl iclating to this identical question We have examined the legislatıve history of both Senate Bill No 407 and Assembly Bill No 58 and we have reviewed earefnlly the view expressed by the Legslative Counsel concennng this matter We anoce with the summary of the legislative hotory of the two lult and the analys of the problem contained in the opmon of the Legislative Comsel

We also agree with the conclusion of the Legislative Counsel, namely, that in view of the considerations set forth in the Targhlative Counsel's opinion, a court would hold that the reference to Welfare and Institutions Code Section 456 contained in Senate Bill No 497 would be treated as a typographical or madvertent error and read as a reference to Section 458 of the Welfare and Institutions Code and that Senate Bill No 497 would not be held to have amended or repealed the existing provisions of Welfare and Institutious Code Section 456

Dear Mr Burton : You ask the following question:
Question
Would Senate Bill No. 497 of the 1963 Regular Session eliminate Section 456 of the Welfare and Institutions Code, which fixes the personal property allowances for public assistance reeıpients?

## Opznzon

While the matter is not free from doubt, we do not think Senate Bill No 497 would elımınate Section 456 of the Welfare and Instıtutrons Code

## Analysis

Senate Bill No 497 of the 1963 Regular Session, on its face, purports to amend and renumber Section 456 of the Welfare and Institutions Code Section 456, coutaned in the existing code, fixes the maximum personal property allowances for public assistance recipients The section of the same number in the bill relates to an entirely different subject, and requires the grantiog of a special need allowance for certam eash purchases made by recipients.

We have exammed the bill in all of its amended forms, and it appears clear that the bill actually was intended to amend Section 458 of the code, mstead of Section 450 As orminally introduced, it amended and renumbered Section 14301 of the code to be Section 4315 Later 11 the session, the Legirlatnre enacted Assembly Bill No 58, containing an urgency clanse, and renumbering Section 14301 to be Section 458 After the enactment of Assembly Bill No 58, Senate Bill No 497 was amended to change the reference to Section 4315 to Section 456, and, in makmg the change, the section was also revised to reflect other changes effected by Assembly Bill No 58 Either due to a typographual error or a misreading of the section number appearing m Assembly Bill No 58, the section was designated as Section 456 instead of Section 458

The difficulty in this situation arises from the fact that the bill, to all intents and appearances, seems to amend Section 456 of the code, and could be so construed by a court, if the court refuses to go behind the enrolled bill to diseoter what actually transpired The possibility that a court might take this approach must be recognized, and if it does, the result would be to elminate existing Section 456, fixing personal property qualifications

We are inclined to believe, however, that if the matter were called to the attention of the court, that it would follow the primary principle of statutory construction, and would endeavor to give effect to the Legislature's intention in enactug the bill We recognize that the primciple of statutory construction is dependent on the existence of am-
biguity on the face of the statute involved, but we think that such ambiguity exists

In the first mstance, if the section contaned ne the bill is construed to be Section 456, and thus to elmmate existmg Section 456, references to Section 456 in other sections of the Welfare and Institutions Code would be meamingless (see, eg, Sections 453, 454).

Secondly, the section contaned in the bill is basically the same in content as Section 458 contained $m$ Assembly Bill No 58. Therefore, there would be two secions substantially the same in content, despite the fact that nerther bill purported to add the particular section to the code, and both proposed to amend an existing section, which, in itself, is substantially the same in content as the two new sections

Thirdly, Seuate Bill No 497 proposes to amend and renumber Section 456 Yet, the section is renumbered to be Section 456 which, in itself, suggests an error on the part of the Legislature

In view of these considerations, we are of the opinion that Section 456, contaned in Senate Bill No 497, should be read as Section 458, and that a court would so hold
