It is the duty of the Legislative Counsel to assist the members of the Legislature, upon request, in the drafting and amendment of bills and resolutions; to prepare, or assist in the preparation or amendment of legislative bills at the suggestion of the Governor or of any judge of a court of record or of any committee of the Legislature; upon request, to advise any State officer as to the preparation of bills to be submitted to the Legislature; and to cooperate with any legislative committee appointed to carry on investigations between sessions of the Legislature.

This office is under the direction of Fred B. Wood and is located at Room 220 of the Capitol; telephones, Capital 2800, Local 865.

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Bills and Journals of previous sessions of the California Legislature, reports of State departments, the statutes and court reports of other American States, the United States, Great Britain, Canada and Australia and compiled laws on a wide variety of subjects are available for use. The bills of current sessions of the more important State legislatures and the bills, reports, calendars and proceedings of the current session of Congress are also on file.

**BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF BILLS AND CONSTITUTIONAL  
AMENDMENTS AS INTRODUCED IN THE SENATE AT  
THE FIFTY-THIRD (EXTRAORDINARY) SESSION  
(PREPARED BY LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL)**

*The following applies only to bills and constitutional amendments as introduced. Because of the time element no attempt has been made to digest each measure in detail. Each description purports to contain only a statement of the subject of the measure and what appears to be its principal features.*

**S.B. 1—SWING AND CRITTENDEN.** Amends Secs. 2007, 2227 and 2229, repeals Sec. 2226, W. & I. C., relating to agreements as to real property required of recipients of old age aid.

Deletes authority to require agreements and provides for release by boards of supervisors of existing agreements.

**S.B. 2—FOLEY.** Amends Sec. 2227, repeals Secs. 2226 and 2229, W. & I. C., re release of agreements of recipients of old age aid concerning real property.

Deletes authority of boards of supervisors to require such agreements. Cancels existing agreements and provides procedure for such cancellation.

**S.B. 3—METZGER.** Adds Sec. 250.1, F. & G. C., re fish and game district 1G.

Permits taking deer in game refuge 1G during 1940 as provided for taking deer in district 1.

**S.B. 4—KENNY.** Adds Sec. 3745, Veh. C., re undercover plates.

Permits issuance of license plates for exempt vehicles regularly used by law enforcement officers, the record of which is not to be open to public inspection.

**S.B. 5—BROWN.** Adds Sec. 862c, Act 5233, re powers of cities of sixth class.

Permits agreements with and acceptance of contributions from U. S., State, or agency of either, in connection with water supply of city.

**S.B. 6—BREED.** Amends Secs. 232 and 3775, Veh. C., re installation of motor or engine in vehicle.

Provides for notice to Department of Motor Vehicles of installation and payment of fee. Owner of 3 or more vehicles to pay fee only when vehicle sold. Bill not to modify powers of department to make rules as to temporary transfers of engines.

**S.B. 7—BREED.** Amends Sec. 164, Veh. C., re notice to legal owner as to registration numbers.

Deletes requirement that department give notice to legal owner of registration numbers assigned to vehicles owned by him. Requires department to make information available to him at office of department if owner gives notice before December 1 of preceding registration year.

**S.B. 8—BREED.** Amends Secs. 210 and 252, repeals Secs. 211, 212, 213 and 214, Veh. C., re nonresident permits.

Deletes provisions for obtaining and displaying nonresident permits.

**S.B. 9—BREED.** Amends Secs. 66 and 67, Veh. C., re definitions of owner and legal owner.

Includes in definition of owner the State, or any county, city and county, city, district, or political subdivision when entitled to possession of vehicle under lease, lease-sale, or rental-purchase agreement for 12 months or more.

Includes in definition of legal owner the renter or lessor of such vehicle.

Exempts vehicles operated by State, county, city and county, city, district, or political subdivision as lessee under lease, lease-sale, or rental-purchase agreement granting possession for 12 months or more.

S.B. 11—BREED. New Act. Cancels vehicle registration penalties and license fees under section 378, Veh. C., and Act 5135 (the in lieu tax) as to vehicles operated by State, county, city and county, city, district, or political subdivision under lease-sale or rental-purchase agreement of duration of 12 months or more.

S.B. 12—BREED. Amends Sec 374, Veh. C., re exemption from registration fees.

Exempts from registration fees vehicles operated by State, county, city, district, or political subdivision as lessee under lease-sale or rental-purchase agreement of duration of 12 months or more.

S.B. 13—BIGGAR, GORDON AND CRITTENDEN. Amends Sec. 70, Act 1404, State Civil Service Act, re salary adjustments.

Provides that if money available is sufficient for only a limited number of adjustments, Department of Finance shall so certify and lowest salaried employees shall receive adjustments in preference to others.

S.B. 14—KENNY. Amends Sec. 11, Act 5135, the vehicle in lieu tax.

Allocates 5 per cent, rather than indeterminate sum not exceeding 3 per cent, of money in motor vehicle license fee fund to motor vehicle support fund for use of Department of Motor Vehicles

S.B. 15—FLETCHER, KENNY AND PHILLIPS. Amends Secs. 3 and 5, Act 1489, re Colorado River commissioner.

Provides that commissioner shall act under direction of the Colorado River Board. Deletes provision that board is advisory.

Authorizes conferences with representatives of other States in Colorado River basin and the United States and others re development of basin, use of waters, and protection of interests of State and United States.

S.B. 16—KENNY. Amends Sec. 5, Act 8494, The Personal Income Tax Act.

Changes rates to vary between 1 per cent on net income not in excess of \$3,000 to 15 per cent on net income in excess of \$250,000.

S.B. 17—KENNY. Amends Sec. 5, Act 8494, The Personal Income Tax Act, to change rates of tax.

S.B. 18—KENNY. Amends Sec. 10, Act 8494, The Personal Income Tax Act, re credits.

Changes setup from allowing exemptions to allowing credits after tax has been computed, and specifies amounts of credits to be allowed.

S.B. 19—KENNY. Amends Secs. 8 and 9.3, Act 8494, The Personal Income Tax Act.

Provides for deduction for interest, taxes and licenses to extent constituting ordinary business expense, and limits other such deductions to \$500.

Provides that where charitable contributions are made in property the basis of property for determining gain or loss or the market value, whichever is lower, is amount of contribution.

S.B. 20—KENNY. Amends Secs 7 and 9.4, Act 8494, The Personal Income Tax Act.

Changes basis for determining gain or loss on sale of capital assets

S.B. 21—KENNY. Amends Sec. 12, Act 8494, The Personal Income Tax Act.

Provides, in effect, that income of trust established by parents for support of children is taxable to parents.

S.B. 22—KENNY. Amends Secs. 4, 4a and 23, Act 8488, the Bank and Corporation Franchise Tax Act.

Changes minimum rate on financial corporations (other than banks) from 4 per cent to 5 per cent.

Changes minimum rate on banks from 8 per cent to 9 per cent.

S.B. 23—KENNY. Amends Secs. 4 and 23, Act 8488, the Bank and Corporation Franchise Tax Act.

Changes minimum franchise tax from \$25 to \$25 or 1/20 of 1 per cent of the value of bank's or corporation's assets in this State, whichever is greater, but this tax is not to exceed \$10,000.

S.B. 24—KENNY. Amends Sec. 8, Act 8488, the Bank and Corporation Franchise Tax Act.

Limits dividend deduction to dividends received from bank or corporation 95 per cent of whose stock is owned by taxpayer, or by taxpayer and any other bank or corporation 95 per cent of whose stock is owned by (1) the taxpayer or (2) another bank or corporation 95 per cent of whose stock is owned by taxpayer.

S.B. 25—KENNY. Amends Sec. 8, Act 8488, the Bank and Corporation Franchise Tax Act.

Prohibits deduction for interest if (1) indebtedness on which interest is paid matures more than one year from date and the obligation to pay interest is conditional upon or measured by the amount of the earnings or profits of the taxpayer, or (2) the obligation has no fixed rate of maturity.

Provides that where charitable contribution is made in property, the basis of the property for purpose of determining gain or loss from sale thereof, or the fair market value of the property at the time of contribution, whichever is lower, is the amount of the contribution.

S.B. 26—KENNY. Amends Sec. 14, Act 8488, the Bank and Corporation Franchise Tax Act.

Changes provisions regarding transactions between affiliated banks and corporations.

S.B. 27—KENNY. Amends Sec. 3, Act 8494a, The Corporation Income Tax Act of 1937.

Raises rate from 4 per cent to 5 per cent.

S.B. 28—KENNY. Amends Sec. 7, Act 8494a, The Corporation Income Tax Act of 1937.

Restricts gross income dividend deduction to dividends received from another corporation 95 per cent of whose stock is owned (1) by taxpayer, or (2) by taxpayer and another corporation 95 per cent of whose stock is owned by taxpayer or by still another corporation 95 per cent of whose stock is owned by taxpayer.

S.B. 29—KENNY. Amends Sec. 7, Act 8494a, The Corporation Income Tax Act of 1937.

Makes same change as to corporations covered by this act as S.B. 25 makes as to corporations affected by act amended thereby.

S.B. 30—KENNY. Amends Sec. 14, Act 8494a, The Corporation Income Tax Act of 1937.

Changes provisions regarding transactions between affiliated corporations.

**S.B. 31—KENNY.** Amends Sec. 24, adds Sec. 24.1, Act 3796, the Alcoholic Beverage Control Act.

Increases tax on distilled spirits sold by rectifiers and wholesalers.

Imposes floor tax on distilled spirits held for sale by on or off-sale distilled spirits licensees. Not applicable if packages of distilled spirits bear excise stamps evidencing payment of distilled spirits excise tax under section 24 of this act.

**S.B. 32—KENNY.** Amends Sec. 32, Act 3796, the Alcoholic Beverage Control Act.

Increases tax on beer, still wine, and sparkling hard cider.

**S.B. 33—KENNY.** Amends Sec. 23, Act 3796, the Alcoholic Beverage Control Act.

Increases beer tax from \$ .62 to \$1.55 per barrel.

**S.B. 34—KENNY.** Amends Sec. 5, Act 3796, the Alcoholic Beverage Control Act.

Increases license fees of beer manufacturers, distilled spirits manufacturers, rectifiers, distilled spirits wholesalers, beer and wine wholesalers, retail package off-sale beer and wine licensees, on-sale beer licensees, on-sale beer and wine licensees and distilled spirits manufacturers' agents.

**S.B. 35—KENNY.** Amends Secs. 4 and 5, Act 8495, the Inheritance Tax Act.

Increases rate of tax.

**S.B. 36—KENNY.** Amends Secs. 14 to 18, inc., Act 8495c, the Gift Tax Act of 1939.

Increases rate of tax.

**S.B. 37—KENNY.** New act, the Severance Tax Act.

Imposes tax on privilege of severing petroleum, natural gas or natural gasoline from the earth and prescribes the rates.

To be administered by State Board of Equalization. Money to be deposited in Severance Tax Fund and used for administration, payment of refunds, and payment into the general fund.

**S.B. 38—KENNY.** New act, the Tobacco Tax Act.

Imposes tax on cigarettes, cigars, and other forms of tobacco. Requires permit to deal in tobacco.

Administered by State Board of Equalization. Money to be used for administration, refunds, and payment into general fund.

**S.B. 39—KENNY.** New act, the Tobacco Use Tax Act.

Supplements Tobacco Tax Act (S.B. 38) by imposing tax on storage, use or other consumption of tobacco products in this State.

Provisions as to administration and proceeds similar to those in Tobacco Tax Act.

**S.B. 40—KENNY.** Amends Sec. 22, Act 5130d, the Transportation Tax Act.

Deletes provision exempting carriers who operate solely within cities, between cities, or between cities and private property. Exempts gross receipts from transportation wholly within limits of private property.

**S.B. 41—KENNY.** Amends Act 3421, re horse race licenses.

Increases the license fee paid to the State from flat 4 per cent to 4 per cent on first ten million dollars and 8 per cent on all over ten million dollars handled during one meeting in the wagering pools. Provides that total deduction by licensee shall not exceed 12 per cent and the odd cents on redistribution.

**S.B. 42—GARRISON, WAGY, HOLLISTER AND POWERS.** Adds Sec. 5.8, Act 8493, the Retail Sales Tax Act of 1933, and adds Sec. 4.11, Act 8495a, the Use Tax Act of 1935.

Exempts from both acts gross receipts from sales of live stock and poultry of a kind the products of which ordinarily constitute food for human consumption.

**S.B. 43—FLETCHER, KENNY, QUINN, BIGGAR AND COLLIER.** Adds Sec. 5014, Pub. Res. C., re funds.

Adds provision that all money in State Park Maintenance and Acquisition Fund not otherwise appropriated is appropriated to be expended for operation, maintenance, and extension of State park system.

**S.B. 44—SLATER.** New act. Appropriates \$313,850.82 from general fund for support of Department of Social Welfare during 91st and 92d fiscal years.

Transfers same amount from the old age administration account in the social welfare fund to the general fund.

**S.B. 45—FLETCHER.** Adds Sec. 3817c9, Pol. C., and Secs. 4258.7 and 4258.7, Rev. & Tax. C., re installment payments of taxes and redemption from tax sales.

Extends ten-year payment plan by permitting commencement of payments in installments, on or before July 1, 1941 on property sold to State on or before July 6, 1939. Payment to include certain interest from July 1, 1937, to date of payment.

**S.B. 46—KENNY.** Amends Secs. 130 and 130.1, Veh. C., re records of Department of Motor Vehicles.

Excepts from records open to public inspection those re physical condition of operators or chauffeurs. Permits department to give out information or sell copies of records at charge sufficient to pay cost. Provides for fees to be paid by persons in business of examining records.

**S.B. 47—COLLIER, KENNY, POWERS AND METZGER.** New Act.

Generally validates, so far as State and Federal Constitutions permit, organization, boundaries, selection or appointment of governing officers or boards, acts, proceedings, and bonds of public bodies defined in Sec. 1, subd. (a).

**S.B. 48—SHELLEY.** New act. Appropriates \$5,000,000 for relief of hardship and destitution due to and caused by unemployment.

**S.B. 49—SHELLEY.** New act. Appropriates \$95,500,000 for relief of hardship and destitution due to and caused by unemployment, including not to exceed \$750,000 for administrative expenses of Controller.

Provides for use of \$50,000 of appropriation as revolving fund of Relief Administrator when cash payments are necessary. Also provides for use of \$500,000 of appropriation as revolving fund to be used in connection with Surplus Commodities Stamp Plan.

**S.B. 50—BIGGAR, CRITTENDEN, METZGER, MIXTER, NIELSEN, PHILLIPS AND WAGY.** New act.

Appropriates \$27,736,708 for relief of hardship and destitution. To be expended under Relief Expenditure Act of 1940 (see S. B. 51).

Provides for disbursement pursuant to schedule in Sec. 3 of bill from June, 1940, to May, 1941, inclusive. Provides for allocation to counties on basis of direct relief costs during fiscal year 1938-1939. Allocates \$3,000,000 as equalization fund for use in cases of abnormal increase of relief load in county. Allocates \$200,000 for administrative costs of Controller. None of appropriation available for support of State Relief Administration.

Effective only if Relief Expenditure Act of 1940 takes effect.

**S.B. 51—BIGGAR AND OTHERS.** New act, the Relief Expenditure Act of 1940.

Provides for expenditure of relief appropriations. Applies to all appropriations for relief for expenditure in 91st and 92d fiscal years, except those in 1939 budget act, in Chapter 668, Stats. 1939, and acts specifically providing otherwise.

Constitutes counties sole agencies through which appropriations are to be expended. Appropriation not to be expended except for relief of persons eligible under relief act, but act not to limit eligibility for relief except as to moneys appropriated. Permits counties to establish own standards of relief, within eligibility rules.

Limits relief of family to \$60 per month. No appropriation is subject to supervision of Department of Social Welfare, and no county is obliged to administer relief other than as governmental agency under Relief Act and by use of money from appropriation subject to act.

Act to expire October 1, 1941.

**S.B. 52—SHELLEY AND KENNY.** Amends title and Sec. 8, Act 2450, re Golden Gate International Exposition.

Authorizes securing of holding of convention of either, or both, major political parties in 1940.

Appropriates \$150,000

**S.B. 53—GARRISON, JESPERSEN, HOLLISTER, KENNY, POWERS AND SHELLEY.** Adds Sec. 18a, Act 1315, the Central Valley Project Act of 1933

Authorizes issuance of \$50,000,000 of bonds in order to carry out and perform such objects or purposes of act as may be requested by Secretary of Interior. Provides for redemption of such bonds.

**S.B. 54—KENNY.** Adds Sec. 4442, Pol. C., re transfers from special funds to general fund when insufficient cash in latter

Provides for transfer upon determination by Governor that it can be made without interfering with objects for which special fund created. Provides for repayment from general fund when it contains sufficient "unapplied money" as that term is used in bill.

Limits amount of highway and motor vehicle money transferred under bill to \$5,000,000.

**S.B. 55—KENNY AND PHILLIPS.** Adds Sec. 580d, repeals Sec. 580c, C. C. P., re deficiency judgments.

Repeals and reenacts provisions without change in effect.

**S.B. 56—KENNY.** Adds Sec. 1354, Veh. C., re taking of bail by members of highway patrol.

Permits taking amount of bail indorsed on warrant being served by member of patrol.

**S.B. 57—SWING AND OTHERS.** Amends Secs. 2007 and 2227, repeals Secs. 2226 and 2229, W. & I. C., re aid to aged.

Repeals provisions re agreements not to transfer property by recipient of aid and claims of county against recipient's estate.

Cancels existing agreements and provides procedure to effect cancellation. Provides alternative procedure if courts hold statutory cancellation invalid.

**S.B. 58—SEAWELL.** New act. Makes appropriation for legislative printing, etc.

**S.B. 59—QUINN AND BIGGAR.** Amends Act 3895, re itinerant merchants.

Redeines itinerant vendor to restrict definition to person who buys farm or timber products for resale and transports them on public highways to point outside county where acquired for purpose of reselling them. Defines farm products. Repeals bond provisions. Provides for suspension and revocation of licenses. Adopts certain administrative provisions of Public Utilities Act and provides for procedure and enforcement of act.

**S.B. 60—SHELLEY, FOLEY, KENNY, HOLLISTER, GARRISON AND JESPERSEN.** Amends Act 2450, re Golden Gate International Exposition.

Appropriates \$516,266 to commission and provides for participation in fair in 1940. Authorizes use of \$85,000 in connection with county exhibits. Commission given broad general powers to conduct activities and promote increased attendance. Powers outlined in Sec. 5 of act as added by bill.

Provides for disposal or demolition of property on termination of fair, and deposit of proceeds in State treasury.

**S.B. 61—SHELLEY.** Amends Sec. 4, Act 3603, re industrial loan companies.

Specifies that additional charge permitted shall be for every kind or character of service including brokerage.

Provides that total interest and other charges on loans of less than \$100 shall not exceed  $2\frac{1}{2}$  per cent per month

**S. B. 62—JESPERSEN AND HOLLISTER.** New act, the California State Housing Authority Law.

Creates authority with five members, appointed by Governor for staggered terms. To undertake slum clearance and projects for housing persons of low income.

Area of operation defined in Sec. 6 of bill and, in general, not to overlap jurisdiction of existing local authorities. Powers of authority outlined in Sec. 22.

Provides for issuance of revenue bonds, payable from revenue or grants and contributions of U. S. or others.

**S.B. 63—JESPERSEN AND HOLLISTER.** Amends Secs. 2, 3 and 4, Act 3484, the Housing Corporation Law, re aid by public bodies to housing projects pursuant to California State Housing Authority Law. (See S. B. 62.)

Amends act to include appropriate references to proposed California State Housing Authority Law. Changes reference from Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works to the United States Housing Authority.

Provides for cooperation as to projects within area adjacent or contiguous to area in which public body may act.

**S.B. 64—KEATING.** Amends Act 5215, re municipal utilities.

Extends act to apply to counties, cities and counties, districts, or public corporations which have power to make improvements covered by the act. Amends title of bill to delete specification of water works, electric power works, gas works, lighting works and other public works and utilities and refers to public utilities and works and improvements mentioned in the Improvement Act of 1911. Incorporates by reference certain portions of the Improvement Act of 1911, Improvement Bond Act of 1915, and the Street Opening Act of 1903.

**S.B. 65—KENNY.** New act.

Appropriates \$75,000 for expenditure by Adjutant General for construction and equipment of aviation hangars, barracks, etc., and for conditioning landing fields, for California National Guard.

**S.B. 66—BIGGAR.** New act.

Appropriates \$525,000 to emergency fund to be allocated for salary adjustments of employees paid from general fund and drawing less than \$150 per month. Applies to adjustments to which such employees have or may become entitled. Covers civil service and non-civil service employees.

**S.B. 67—JESPERSEN** Amends Sec. 10883, adds Secs. 10885.1 to 10886, repeals 10886, Ins. C., re certificates of advancement of mutual life insurer on stipulated premium plan with provision for assessment.

Provides for certificates of advancement to evidence advances for organization, to promote or conserve insurers' business, or to enable it to qualify as mutual reserve insurer or to comply with laws.

Provides for payments to holders and for redemption of certificates. Provides for certificate of advancement fund to be created by setting aside not over 4% of gross premium income of insurer. Sets out form for certificates.

**S.B. 68—JESPERSEN.** Amends, repeals and adds various sections of Div. 10, H. & S. C., re narcotics.

Amends provisions of the division on narcotics in many particulars relating to definitions, records, prescriptions, offenses, penalties, addicts, the seizure and sale of vehicles used in violating the narcotic law, and abatement of buildings, etc., so used.

**S.B. 69—KENNY AND RICH.** Adds Sec. 443.2, Pol. C., re payment of State warrants in legal tender.

Provides for payment in coin or currency of U. S. which is legal tender at time of payment, and for endorsement on warrant that it is so payable.

**S.B. 70—SHELLEY.** Amends Sec. 6.4, adds Sec. 54.1, Act 3796, the Alcoholic Beverage Control Act, re alcoholic beverages.

Extends through 1940 privileges of San Francisco Bay Exposition and commissioners of foreign governments exhibiting at fair in connection with importers licenses and imported beverages.

Permits manufacturer of beer or wine to have interest in on-sale license and location at one location at fair.

**S.B. 71—PARKMAN.** Adds Division IX, Pub. Res. C., re soil conservation.

Codifies provisions of Stats. 1938 (Ex. Sess.): 7:48, as amended. Makes some substantive changes. Deletes provision that board of directors of soil conservation district may by unanimous vote determine unreasonableness of land use. Leaves question of reasonableness of land use to courts. Adds to provisions re enforcement, provision for injunctive relief in case of violation of land use regulations. Makes other changes incident to codification and to clarify procedure. Otherwise, has same general scope and effect as present law.

**S.B. 72—BREED.** Repeals and reenacts Chapter 3, Stats. 1940 (S. B. 11).

Cancels registration penalties and license fees under Sec. 378, Veh. C., and Act 5135 (the in lieu tax) as to vehicles operated by State, county, city, city and county, district, or political subdivisions under certain lease, lease-sale, or rental-purchase agreements.

**S.B. 73—SWING.** New act, the Tobacco Tax Act.

Imposes tax on sale of cigarettes, cigars, and other tobacco. Administered by State Board of Equalization.

Appropriates (a) \$500,000 for enforcement of this act and Tobacco Use Tax Act, (b) money for refunds and judgments against State under said acts, and (c) balance for expenditure by Department of Social Welfare as aid to counties for maintaining aged persons under Old Age Security Law, to be allocated to counties by the department.

**S.B. 74—POWERS.** Amends Sec. 2, Act 2970, the Use Fuel Tax Act of 1937.

Excepts from definition of "motor vehicle" a self-propelled vehicle operated exclusively on a road constructed or owned by private persons and maintained by them; and provides that "highway" as used in act does not include such a road.

**S. B. 75—SWING.** New act, the Tobacco Use Tax Act.

Imposes tax on storage, use or consumption of cigars, cigarettes and other forms of tobacco. (See S. B. 73.)

**S. B. 76—SEAWELL.** New act.

Appropriates \$30,000 for contingent expenses of Senate at special session, including expenses of committees created at the session.

**S.B. 77—KENNY.** Adds Sec. 18b, Act 8198, the Street Opening Act of 1903, re refunding, reassessment, and adjustment of improvement assessments and assessment bonds.

Permits municipality to bear part of cost of certain improvements in consideration of the more than local use thereof. Provides procedure for paying bonds and assessments and for reimbursing assesses who have already paid.

**S.B. 78—KENNY.** Adds Sec. 28e, Act 8199, the Improvement Act of 1911, re refunding, reassessment, and adjustment of improvement assessments and assessment bonds.

Permits municipality to bear part of cost of certain improvements in consideration of the more than local use thereof. Provides procedure for paying bonds and assessments and for reimbursing assesses who have already paid.

**S.B. 79—McBRIDE.** New act.

Provides for expenditure of one-half of one per cent of appropriations for relief during 91st and 92d fiscal years in conjunction with National Youth Administration program. Of this one-half of one per cent, one-half thereof is to be expended through Department of Education, one-third through Department of Natural Resources, and one-sixth through SRA.

**S.B. 80—BIGGAR.** New act.

Appropriates \$350,000 for relief, to be expended in pioneering production of economic plants of a kind ordinarily imported from foreign countries, including perfume, drug, dye, tanning, and oil plants.

Provides for separate agency within SRA to administer appropriation so as to enable persons on relief to become self-supporting. Permits sale of products in any channel of trade and use of proceeds for further relief of persons whose labor and services produced such products.

**S.B. 81—BIGGAR AND OTHERS.** New act.

Appropriates \$12,200,000 for relief until June 1, 1940, including not over \$200,000 for Controller's expenses. To be available: \$5,500,000 during February and March, 1940; \$3,500,000 during April, 1940, and \$3,000,000 during May, 1940.

Lay-offs of personnel, if necessary, to be on basis of seniority. Reduction of relief, if necessary, to be prorated. Eligibility as of date of act to continue.

Not less than 82 per cent to be expended directly for relief. Not over 3 per cent for works projects. Limits expenditures for production for use projects to one-third of amount for works projects.

Limits family allowance to \$58 per month. Permits additional relief in forms other than cash and in extraordinary cases. Sets up residence requirements (Sec. 9). Prohibits after April 1, 1940, relief to aliens unless entry is shown prior to July 1, 1924, or unless legal entry is shown since that date. Requires, after April 1, 1940, applicant to show eligibility under oath.

Prohibits, after April 1, 1940, allowance to family, member of which is paying conditional sale or similar installments of over \$5 per month except for essential food or clothing. Requires all relief money to be spent by recipients for food, rent, utilities and other necessities.

Prohibits, after April 1, 1940, expenditure for relief of family possessing over one automobile unless license plates for all over one are surrendered to SRA.

Prohibits certain political activities (Sec. 15).

**S.B. 82—PHILLIPS AND OTHERS.** New act.

Appropriates \$480,000 to State Relief Administrator and Relief Commission to be expended through the State Department of Agriculture for distribution of surplus commodities in conjunction with the Federal Government or agency thereof. Authorizes department to select other agency for the purpose. Eligibility to be determined pursuant to California Unemployment Relief Act of 1935 but not by Department of Agriculture.

S.B. 83—SHELLEY. Amends Act 3796, the Alcoholic Beverage Control Act, re the Golden Gate International Exposition

Extends exemption as to importers' licenses and importing so as to apply through 1940.

Permits beer or wine manufacturer to have interest in one location and its license, fixtures, etc., at the exposition in 1940 if Board of Equalization is notified of the selection of the location by the manufacturer.

S.B. 84—SWING. New act. Validates organization, boundaries governing officers, or boards, acts, proceedings and bonds of school districts of all kinds.

S.B. 85—GARRISON. New act. Provides for submission of A.C.A. 6 (Res. Ch. 20), re old age liens, to people at election on November 5, 1940.

S.B. 86—PHILLIPS, BROWN, DEUEL, MAYO, MIXTER, NIELSEN, AND WAGY. at the request of the Joint Fact-Finding Committee on Employment. New act.

Creates the California Department of Employment to which are transferred all the duties and jurisdiction of the Relief Administrator, Relief Commission, Department of Social Welfare, Department of Employment, and the California Employment Commission. Provides that the various county governments shall administer both unemployment and indigent relief and that they may contract with credit agencies to investigate the financial condition of applicants. Counties may enter into agreements for the joint administration of this act or the indigent act.

Requires five years' residence of all persons who enter the State after June 1, 1940. The three-year requirement is retained for persons who entered before that date, but during either of those periods the applicant must not have received public or private assistance except from legally responsible relatives. Persons meeting the residence requirement for indigent aid and those receiving relief from the SRA or WPA prior to June 1, 1940, must also be assisted. Determination of residence as among the various counties is provided for.

Limits the total relief allowance to \$58 except in extraordinary cases where additional aid may be extended in kind. Provides that all income with specified exceptions (sec. 52) must be deducted. Retains the alien restriction now contained in S.B. 81.

Declares ineligible persons any member of whose family is making payments upon a chattel mortgage or conditional sales contract in excess of \$5.00 a month. License plates for all other than one automobile shall be delivered to the county. Provides for a work program.

Requires that not less than 82% of the State's contribution shall be expended for direct grants to relief clients. Provides that the State shall pay  $\frac{2}{3}$  of the direct and administrative costs and the county shall pay  $\frac{1}{3}$ . Provides that the State shall contribute  $\frac{1}{2}$  of the sums expended by the counties for old age security after deducting the amount of the federal subvention.

Prohibits certain political activities. Provides for the transfer of unemployment relief by January 1, 1941.

S.B. 87. KENNY, PHILLIPS, FLETCHER. Amends sections 3 and 5 of the Colorado River Control Act.

Deletes requirement that the board should act in an advisory capacity to the commissioner and adds as the duty of the commissioner under the direction of the board to confer with representatives of other states in the Colorado River Basin concerning problems arising out of the use of the waters in the Colorado River system.

S.B. 88. QUINN. New act.

Reenacts the provisions of Chapter 26 of the Statutes of 1940 as an urgency measure. Appropriates \$46,500 for the maintenance of the State park system.

S.B. 89. MIXTER. Amends sections 120, 157, 2630, 4106, 4110, 4153 and 4946, repeals and adds Chapter 4, Part 7, Division I, adds section 2630.5, Revenue and Taxation Code, repeals and adds section 3819a, Political Code, re redemption of property and transfer of tax redemption duties from auditor and treasurer to tax collector.

Makes tax collector the redemption officer and transfers to him certain duties of auditor and treasurer.

Provides for preparation of abstracts of delinquent lists.

**S.B. 90. PHILLIPS, BROWN, DEUEL, MAYO, MIXTER, NIELSEN, SEAWELL AND WAGY.** New act, re relief.

Appropriates \$25,347,091 and unexpended balance of appropriation made by Ch. 12, 1st Ex. Session 1940, for relief of hardship and destitution and administration of act to March 31, 1941, including not over \$500,000 for administrative expenses of Controller.

To be expended as follows:

The rate per month is optional but rate per quarter mandatory. Money unexpended in one quarter may be expended in subsequent quarter.

Limits expenditures to 82 per cent for cash, wages, property and services; 3 per cent for work relief projects of which not over one-third may be spent for self-help cooperatives, production for use projects, consumer cooperatives or direct production projects; and 15 per cent for administration.

Limits allowance to \$58 per month per family, but permits relief in excess of that in commodities, services or relief in kind in extraordinary cases. Provides for deduction of net cash income of members of family. Restricts relief to certain residents (sec. 10) and prohibits relief to certain aliens (sec. 11). Requires applicant to establish eligibility. Prohibits relief to family making payments of \$5 or more on installment purchases other than for food or clothing. Requires expenditure of relief money for necessities. Prohibits relief to family having more than one automobile unless license plates for extra ones are delivered to SRA. Prohibits certain political activities. Permits State to employ services of credit agencies.

Makes other restrictions on expenditure of appropriation.

**S.B. 91—BREED.** Amends Secs. 232 and 377.5, Veh. C., and repeals Ch. 7, first extraordinary session, 1940, re installation of motor vehicle engines and motors.

Repeals Ch. 7 (S.B. 6), first extraordinary session, 1940, and reenacts provisions thereof as urgency measure.

**S.B. 92—BREED.** Amends Secs. 210 and 252, repeals Secs. 211, 212, 213 and 214, Veh. C., and repeals Ch. 13, first extraordinary session, 1940, re non-resident permits.

Repeals Ch. 13 (S.B. 8), first extraordinary session, 1940, and reenacts provisions thereof as urgency measure.

**S.B. 93—BREED.** Amends Sec. 164, Veh. C., repeals Ch. 23, first extraordinary session, 1940, re registration of vehicles.

Repeals Ch. 23 (S.B. 7), first extraordinary session, 1940, and reenacts provisions thereof as urgency measure.

**S.B. 94. PHILLIPS.** Adds section 39, Unemployment Relief Appropriation Act of 1940, re use of revolving fund.

Provides that revolving fund for financing Federal Food Stamp Plan may also be used for financing Federal Stamp Plan for commodities or goods other than food.

**S.B. 95. KENNY, QUINN, BIGGAR.** New act.

Appropriates \$42,000 from State park maintenance and acquisition fund for operating and maintaining State park system during 92d fiscal year. Expenditure subject to Budget Act of 1939.

**S.B. 96. KENNY.** Amends sec. 8, Unemployment Relief Appropriation Act of 1940 (1940 (1st Ex. Sess.) Ch. 45), re relief allowances.

Includes among items not to be considered in determining total relief allowance, supplemental relief allowances granted to those working on work relief projects.

**BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF SENATE BILLS—Continued**

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S.C.A. 1—SWING. Adds Sec. 23, Article XX, Constitution.

Creates Alcoholic Beverage Commission to administer liquor control laws, five members, one from each district created by section. Succeeds to powers of State Board of Equalization re liquor.

Provides for local option ordinances and for refusal of retail licenses by commission.

S.C.A. 2—SWING AND OTHERS. Adds Sec. 13, Art. XVI, Constitution, re old age aid.

Gives Legislature plenary power re cancellation of agreements and liens as to property of recipients of old age aid. Not to affect A. C. A. 1 of 1939 if latter adopted at November election in 1940.
