**BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF BILLS AS INTRODUCED IN THE
SENATE AT THE FIFTY-THIRD (SECOND EXTRAOR-
DINARY) SESSION (PREPARED BY LEGISLA-
TIVE COUNSEL)**

The following applies only to bills and constitutional amendments as introduced. Because of the time element no attempt has been made to digest each measure in detail. Each description purports to contain only a statement of the subject of the measure and what appears to be its principal features.

S.B. 1—MIXTER. New act.

Appropriates \$883,608 50 to Department of Natural Resources for fire prevention and suppression, including fire trails, breaks, and cooperative work with counties and other agencies

S.B. 2—KENNY. New act.

Appropriates \$2,500,000 to emergency fund specified in Item 212 of Budget Act of 1939. Money to be used for repair and restoration of property damaged or destroyed by storms and floods and for prevention of such damage and destruction.

S.B. 3—QUINN, GARRISON, SLATER, GORDON, POWERS, FOLEY, COLLIER, AND HOLLISTER. New act.

Appropriates \$1,500,000 to emergency fund specified in Item 212 of Budget Act of 1939. Money to be expended for repair or restoration, or both, of levees, flood control works, irrigation works, city and county roads and bridges, and other property damaged or destroyed by floods subsequent to July 1, 1939 and to provide for alleviating and preventing such damage. Includes administrative costs of State or department.

S.B. 4—METZGER. New act.

Appropriates \$150,000 to Department of Public Works for repair or restoration, or both, of property damaged or destroyed by floods, or to prevent such damage. To be expended only in Glenn, Colusa and Tehama counties.

S.B. 5—SWING. New act.

Appropriates \$500,000 to emergency fund specified in Item 212 of the Budget Act of 1939. Money to be spent for repair or restoration of property damaged or destroyed by storms and floods and to prevent such damage. Expenditure limited to cities of Needles, San Bernardino, Colton, Redlands, Ontario, Upland, county of San Bernardino.

S.B. 6—GARRISON, SHELLEY, POWERS AND HOLLISTER. New act.

Appropriates \$1,900,000 to Reclamation Board to augment appropriation contained in Item 206 of the Budget Act of 1939.

S.B. 7—GORDON. New act.

Creates the Napa Valley Water Authority and prescribes its powers and duties. Authorizes it to construct and operate a system in Napa County for the impounding, sale and distribution of water, including flood and surplus waters. Provides for the issuance and sale of revenue bonds. Creates a system of funds for the segregation and disbursement of income.

S.B. 8—COLLIER. New act.

Appropriates \$80,000 to Department of Public Works for flood relief in Siskiyou County.

S.B. 9—COLLIER. New act.

Appropriates \$25,000 to Department of Public Works for flood relief in Del Norte County.

Reappropriates unexpended balance of money appropriated by Chapter 760, Statutes 1937, and Chapter 678, Statutes 1939.
