



Appropriates \$400,000 to Department of Public Works for flood relief in Butte County.

S.B. 32-COLLIER. New act.

Appropriates \$80,000 to Department of Public Works for flood relief in Shasta County.

S.B. 33—BREED, DELAP, PARKMAN, RICH, McCORMACK, AND TICKLE. New act.

Appropriates \$500,000 to emergency fund specified in Item 212 of Budget Act of 1939 to be expended by Department of Public Works for repair or restoration of levees, flood control works, irrigation works, city and county roads and bridges and other property damaged or destroyed by storms and floods after January 1, 1940. Expendable only after State Engineer estimates cost, prepares budget and files report with Department of Finance, Department of Public Works, Secretary of Senate and Chief Clerk of Assembly, and only if an equal or greater amount is made available by the political subdivision, district or other agency, except the State,
