LEGISLATIVE BUDGET COMMITTEE AND LEGISLATIVE AUDITOR

The Legislative Budget Committee through its Legislative Auditor stands always ready to serve the Members of the State Legislature individually or collectively in conducting investigations and reporting facts for legislative purposes.

Joint Rule No. 37 provides * * * "the Legislative Auditor shall assist any Member of the Legislature or any committee thereof in any matter, and to that end shall make available to such members or committees any records, documents, or other data under his control."

The Legislative Budget Committee ascertains facts and makes recommendations to the Legislature and to the houses thereof concerning the state budget, the revenues and expenditures of the State and of the organization and function of the State, is departments, subdivisions and agencies with a view of reducing the cost of State Government and securing greater efficiency and economy.

In 1943, the committee was made repository for all documents and materials of all committees, except standing committees, when the work of such committees is concluded.

Assembly Standing Rule 12.5 and Senare Standing Rule 9.7 delegated to the Legislative Auditor the duties of the Chief Clerk of the Assembly and the Secretary of the Senate to receive and file registration information as is required to be filed by Chapter 8 of Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 2 of the Government Code, regulating legislative representatives.

The office of the committee is under the direction of A. Alan Post, Legislative Auditor, and is located in Room 306 of the State Capitol; telephone GI lbert 2-4711, Local 4656.

LEGISLATIVE REFERENCE SERVICES STATE LIBRARY




