

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It is the duty of the Legislative Counsel to assist the Members of the Legislature, upon request, in the drafting and amendment of bills and resolutions; to prepare or assist in the preparation or amendment of legislative bills at the suggestion of the Governor or of any judge of a court of record or of any committee of the Legislature; upon request, to advise any state officer as to the preparation of bills to be submitted to the Legislature; and to cooperate with any legislative committee appointed to carry on investigations between sessions of the Legislature.

LEGISLATIVE AUDITOR

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Joint Rule No. 37 provides * * * "the Legislative Auditor shall assist any Member of the Legislature or any committee thereof in any matter, and to that end shall make available to such members or committees any records, documents, or other data under his control."

The Legislative Budget Committee ascertains facts and makes recommendations to the Legislature and to the houses thereof concerning the state budget, the revenues and expenditures of the State and of the organization and function of the State, its departments, subdivisions and agencies with a view of reducing the cost of State Government and securing greater efficiency and economy.

In 1943, the committee was made repository for all documents and materials of all committees, except standing committees, when the work of such committees is concluded.

Assembly Standing Rule 12.5 and Senate Standing Rule 9.7 delegated to the Legislative Auditor the duties of the Chief Clerk of the Assembly and the Secretary of the Senate to receive and file registration information as is required to be filed by Chapter 8 of Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 2 of the Government Code, regulating legislative representatives.

The office of the committee is under the direction of A. Alan Post, Legislative Auditor, and is located in Room 306 of the State Capitol; telephone GILbert 2-4711, Local 4656.

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In cases of injury, please inform the Speaker of the Assembly or the Chief Clerk of the Assembly and write or phone direct to the State Compensation Insurance Fund, Forum Building, Sacramento, phone GI 2-4711, Extension 4706, who will assist you in the preparation of a proper report. See Joint Rule 41 (S. C. R. 15, Res. Chap. 87, Stats. 1953) for Industrial Injury Reports.
