It is the duty of the Legislative Counsel to assist the Members of the Legislature, upon request, in the drafting and amendment of bills and resolutions; to prepare or assist in the preparation or amendment of legislative bills at the suggestion of the Governor or of any judge of a court of record or of any committee of the Legislature; upon request, to advise any state officer as to the preparation of bills to be submitted to the Legislature; and to co-operate with any legislative committee appointed to carry on investigations between sessions of the Legislature.

The Legislative Bill Room is maintained under the direction of the Department of Finance pursuant to Section 9790 of the Government Code. It is the duty of the Legislative Bill Room at each session to file for distribution for the use and convenience of the Members of the Legislature all bills, resolutions, journals, histories and other documents ordered by the Senate or Assembly. Legislative bills and publications are also available to the general public for free distribution, not to exceed two copies of any such bill or publication. However, in accordance with Joint Rule 13 of the Legislature, no complete listing of bills is available for free distribution but may be obtained on a subscription basis from the Legislative Bill Room at a price fixed by the State Printer.

LEGISLATIVE REFERENCE SERVICES

CALIFORNIA STATE LIBRARY

Library and Courts Building, Capitol Avenue Between 9th and 10th Streets
Hours: Monday-Friday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

The State Library offers the resources of its collection of some 620,000 volumes.

The Administrative-Legislative Reference Service answers informational questions and does limited research for legislators and the legislative staff, and assists them in their use of the library. The service compiles bibliographies on any requested subjects; it prepares monthly and distributes to all legislators an annotated list of recent publications relating to studies of legislative committees. In assisting legislators, it utilizes the facilities of all sections of the library and the special knowledge of their librarians. Legislators may channel all their requests through the Administrative-Legislative Reference Service, or if they prefer, apply directly to any of the other public sections of the library; these sections are described below.

The California Section provides books and other materials on the history, description, resources and industries of the State.

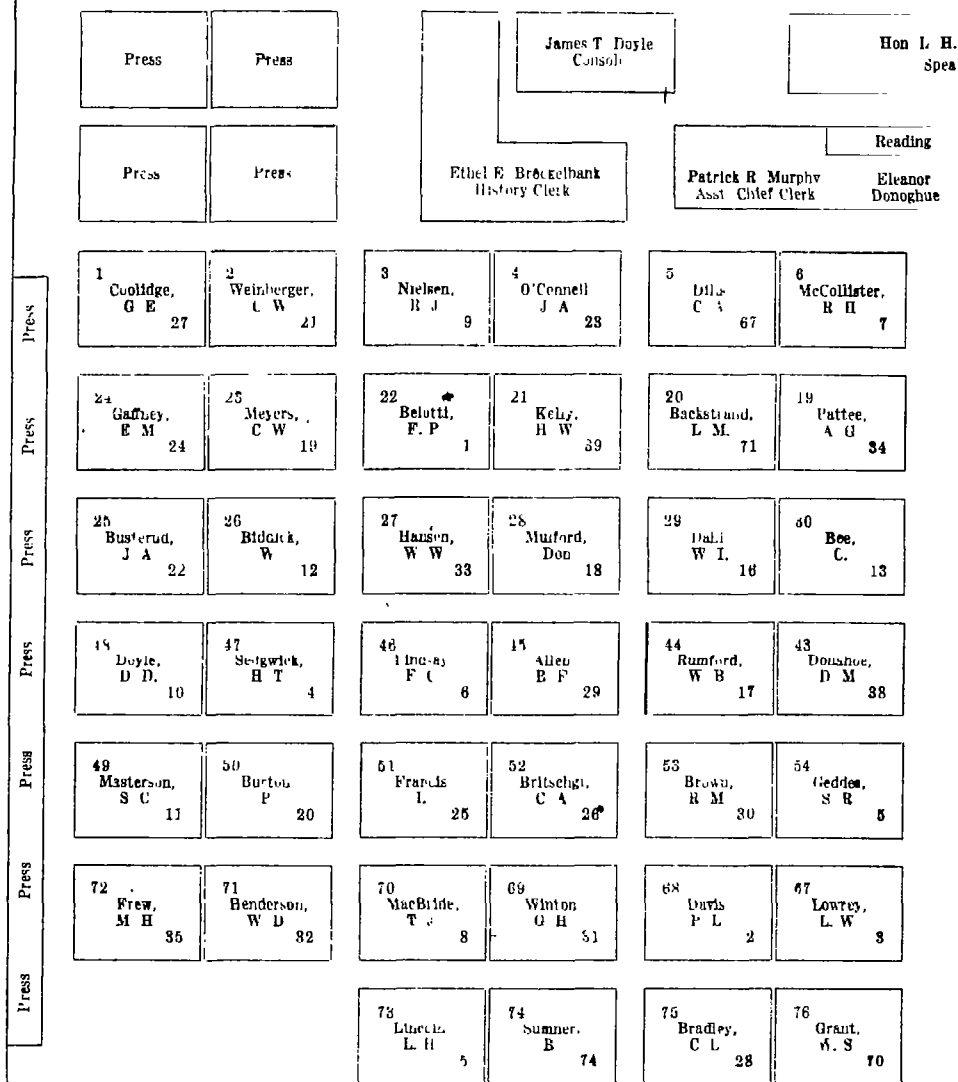
The Government Publications Section offers official documents of Federal, State, county, municipal, and foreign governments. It maintains complete files of the Journal of the California Legislature and an extensive collection of other California state publications.

The Law Section maintains the bills and journals of previous sessions of the California Legislature, and the statutes and court reports of other American states, the United States, Great Britain, Canada, and Australia. It makes available compiled laws on a wide variety of subjects and the bills, reports, calendars, and proceedings of the current session of Congress.

The Reference Section, which provides library assistance to the general public, is equipped to supply information along lines of general interest: history, economics, sociology, science, technology, and current events. About 2,000 current magazines provide the latest information on subjects in their fields.

Joint Rule No. 37 provides * * * "the Legislative Analyst shall assist any Member of the Legislature or any committee thereof in any matter, and to that end shall make available to such members or committees any records, documents, or other data under his control."

The Legislative Budget Committee ascertains facts and makes recommendations to the Legislature and to the houses thereof concerning the state budget, the revenues and expenditures of the State and of the organization and function of the State, its departments, subdivisions and agencies with a view of reducing the cost of State Government and securing greater efficiency and economy.

In 1913, the committee was made repository for all documents and materials of all committees, except standing committees, when the work of such committees is concluded.

Pursuant to subdivision (d) of Section 9900, Government Code, as amended, the Legislative Analyst is designated as the person embraced by the definition of "Clerk" set forth in that section. (Assembly Rule No. 28, and Senate Rule No. 9.7.)

The office of the committee is under the direction of A. Alan Post, Legislative Analyst, and is located in Room 306 of the State Capitol; telephone III ekory 5-4711, Local 4656.

WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION
