Members of the Assembly: As requested by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee, the Bureau of State Audits presents its audit report concerning the Chancellor's Office's administration of the Economic Development Program. In addition, the report addresses the Chancellor's Office and the Department of Education's (department) process for preparing the Needs Assessment and State

Plan for Vocational Education. This report concludes that the Chancellor's Office lacks adequate control over the Economic Development program. Specifically, the Chancellor's Office did not comply with its own procedures for awarding Economic Development Program grants, and did not ensure that community colleges complied with grant requirements.

The report also concludes that the Chancellor's Office and the department inappropriately circumvented state controls by using fiscal agents to obtain the services of a specific contractor. In addition, the Chancellor's Office and the department submitted erroneous and misleading information to the Department of General Services as support for its requests for approval of contracts and amendments. Finally, by using fiscal agents to pay the contractor neither the Chancellor's Office nor the department can assure that the amounts paid to the contractor were appropriate or reasonable.

Members of the Assembly: As required by the Budget Act of 1995, the Bureau of State Audits presents its audit report concerning the reasonability and equitability of the charges the Board of Equalization (board) assesses special tax jurisdictions (STJ) for the administration of their transactions-and-use tax program. This report concludes that the cost model used by the board to calculate STJ assessments reflects a significant policy decision to allocate the board's basic, or infrastructure, costs of operating its tax administration system to STJs and local governments. We recommend that the State's policy makers examine the policy decision.

In addition, the board inappropriately charged the STJs nearly \$6.6 million for costs associated with its administration of two unrelated statewide sales taxes from fiscal year 1993–94 through 1995–96. Further, the board used estimates of workload that either were developed without benefit of workload studies or were not updated since they were developed using data from fiscal year 1987–88. Finally, the board based its cost allocations to individual STJs, in part, on proportion of revenue rather than entirely on key indicators of

workload resulting in some STJs being overcharged a total of nearly \$1.7 million and others being undercharged the same amount.
