Members of the Assembly: As required by Chapter 716, Statutes of 1992, the Bureau of State Audits presents its audit report concerning the way the Department of Health Services (department) processes reimbursement requests for certain prescribed drugs under the California Medical Assistance Program (Medi-Cal). These requests are known as drug treatment authorization requests (TARs). This report concludes that even though the number of drug TARs received by the department has increased dramatically during the

six months from June 1995 through November 1995, the department has made significant improvement in processing drug TARs within one working day and has reduced its backlog of unprocessed drug TARs.

Members of the Assembly: As requested by the California Legislature and through language in the Supplemental Report of the 1995 Budget Act, the Bureau of State Audits presents its audit report concerning the Office of Emergency Services (OES). In a broad-scope performance audit, we look at whether a department:

- Has fulfilled its mission and responsibilities and the extent that its programs are meeting the desired objectives (effectiveness); and
- Can accomplish its goals by streamlining, economizing, or generally performing its operations smarter, cheaper, and quicker (efficiency).

In this report, we evaluated OES's efficiency and effectiveness at meeting its mission to coordinate emergency activities during disasters and expedite recovery from disasters. We conclude that OES is very effective during the immediate response to emergencies. However, it has had limited success in meeting its responsibilities in the area of processing disaster assistance claims due to both federal policies and procedures and its own administrative shortcomings. We also found that OES has significant administrative weaknesses. Specifically, it has not been able to justify its request for staffing increases, has not adequately anticipated its cash flow needs, and has not effectively managed its contracts or its use of information technology.
