Members of the Assembly: As requested by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee, the Bureau of State Audits presents its audit report concerning the communication and coordination among Child Protective Services (CPS) agencies, parole, and county probation departments regarding the release of convicted child abusers.

The report concludes that CPS agencies do not now receive inmate release information that could serve as an advance warning in protecting children from abuse. Further, legislation that takes effect in January 2000 will not fully bridge this gap in communication between law enforcement and CPS agencies. Moreover, without legislative clarification, CPS agencies may lack the authority to act even if they did receive information concerning the release of a known child abuser.

ASSEMBLY ADDRESS

BY

ANTONIO R. VILLARAIGOSA

“Let us show the nation what is possible.”

Welcome back to the first session of the 21st Century. Today marks the 150th anniversary of a revolution.

It was—and is—a bloodless revolution. Yet, it changed the nation—and it is changing the world.

This revolution had its humble beginnings in a small adobe room in San Jose, California in 1850. And its legacy continues today in Sacramento—with you and me—inside this Chamber.

One hundred and fifty years ago, the first California Assembly convened in San Jose. It was—I imagine—a bit different than what we see around us today.

The geographical make-up of the membership was something that many of you from San Francisco, and Sacramento, could envy.

Out of those first 32 Assembly members in 1850, 24 were from Northern California; Six were from the coast and Central Valley; Only two were from Los Angeles.

How times change.

But, one thing hasn't changed. Then—as now, California, and this Legislature, represented hope and promise to a growing nation . . . and to the entire world. Since the days of that first Assembly, the nation has looked to California—and its government—for leadership.

As State Librarian, Dr. Kevin Starr said: “The American people have assigned California a special role. To seek out the American future, to test it, to try its options, rejecting what doesn't work and building upon what does.

Our task then—as it has been for 150 years—is to show the nation what is possible.

What we believe, is America's hope. What we do, is America's promise. What we accomplish, is America's future. In that first Assembly—150 years ago—all 32 members were white, and all were male. Women and minorities were excluded entirely from the political process.

Yet, even in those times of legalized racism, the California Assembly showed glimmers of what was possible. The first State Assembly voted unanimously against making California a slave state. It also struck down a motion to bar freed slaves from California.

That first Assembly also shocked the nation by voting to grant women the right to own property. California led the nation in granting these rights—and the nation saw what was possible. The State Constitution also laid the groundwork for the California University system—the first of its kind—and the nation saw what was possible.

For the next fifty years—and then throughout the 20th Century—California led in:

Agriculture and Finance

Entertainment and Tourism

Manufacturing, International Trade, and High Technology.

California became what historian, Arnold Toynbee, called: *“The prism through which the United States glimpsed its future.”*

No legislative body helped shape that future more than this Legislature, and this Assembly. Members who sat where you are sitting now, set in motion the freedoms and hopes of the last Century. It is that legacy that we are now pledged—and bound by honor and duty—to continue. Yet, we go forth into the New Century, knowing our predecessors set the bar high.

In 1907, the Legislature showed what was possible in higher education by creating an unsurpassed community college system. Today, California’s university system is the envy of the world.

In 1911, the Legislature showed what was possible in enlightened leadership by approving 23 Constitutional amendments, which Teddy Roosevelt called: *“The greatest advance ever made by any state for the benefit of its people.”*

Included was the most extensive labor reform ever passed in the nation—or the world, for that matter. It limited work days for women to eight hours. It humanized child labor laws; created the first worker’s compensation laws in the country; provided the right of the Citizen’s initiative; and most importantly, it gave women the right to vote. It was six years before Congress extended women the same right.

In all these things, California led, and Congress, and the nation followed. California has been the leader in health care and care for the disabled. In 1928, the Legislature passed a Constitutional Amendment providing state aid to the disabled. Congress, and the nation followed. In 1975, the state passed the nation’s first managed health care bill. Congress, and the nation, followed.

California has long been a leader in preserving its natural resources and protecting its environment. In 1905, the California Legislature helped launch the National Parks system by giving the federal government its most precious natural wonder, the Yosemite Valley.

In 1932, the state passed the nation’s first ban on off-shore drilling on tidelands.

In 1935, we passed the nation’s first clean water act

In 1947, the first clean air act

In 1965, the first farmland protection act

In 1972, the first coastal protection act,

And in 1973, the first timber protection act.

In nearly all these critical environmental and human health issues, the state acted, and Congress, and the nation, followed.

Yet, in no more important endeavor has this state led the world than in the quest for human rights and social justice. Certainly, for minorities and women this has been a slow, and often painful process.

Yet, today, the men and women of this body stand as a symbol of opportunity for our children. When they look upon this Assembly, they see a reflection of the changing face of California.

And they see what is possible.

As a Latino, and the son of an immigrant—I am proud to follow in the footsteps of John Moreno, and Phil Soto, the first two Latinos in this Century elected (in 1962) to the State Assembly.

Today is also a day to honor Gloria Molina, the first Latina elected to the State Assembly in 1982; and of course, Cruz Bustamante, the first Latino Speaker of the Assembly, and now the first Latino Lt. Governor.

Today, the bi-partisan Latino Caucus is comprised of twenty-four members—seven Senators and 17 Assembly members. We have only begun to show the nation what is possible.

For African-Americans, the California Legislative Black Caucus—and the Legislature itself—is showing what is possible by making great strides in breaking the economic and social chains of the times.

Today is a proper day to remember Frederick M. Roberts, the first African American elected to the California State Assembly, in 1918. And a day to remember those who continued his legacy—members of distinction and courage, like:

—Byron Rumford, who authored the Rumford Fair Housing Act to end discrimination in California.

—Mervyn Dymally, the first African American State Senator; and Lt. Gov.

—Yvonne Brathwaite Burke, the first African American woman elected to the Legislature.

—Gus Hawkins, who later became the first African-American Congressman from California.

—And, of course, the first African-American Speaker, Willie Louis Brown.

They showed the nation what was possible. In Willie's case, he's still showing them.

Asian-Americans also triumphed over decades of hardships, such as the Chinese Exclusion Act, and the Internment Camps of World War II. In 1963, Alfred Song broke through to become the first Asian-American elected to the State Assembly. He was followed by March Fong Eu, who later became Secretary of State.

Today is also a proper day to honor:

Esto Broughton; Grace Dorris; Anna Saylor; and Eleanor Miller—who in 1918 were the first women elected to the California State Assembly.

And it is a day to congratulate Sheila Kuehl, the first openly lesbian member of the Assembly; and Carol Migden, another trailblazer, for their continued struggle to realize the dream of full equality for gays and lesbians in our society. You are indeed showing the nation what is possible.

Today, as we stand at the gateway to a new Century and a new Millennium, the nation and the world looks to us more than ever to show them what is possible.

They see a state with no ethnic majority. And they ask: *Can a society so diverse it represents every race, language and religion on earth, be a just and prosperous society?* I believe we must show the country . . . and the world, that the answer to this question is a resounding: “YES!”

It will not be easy. A multitude of challenges lie before us. California is increasingly a society of ‘haves’ and ‘have-nots’ . . . of those who have found their Golden Dream . . . and those who still struggle in poverty, ignorance and despair.

We are faced with the daunting tasks of upgrading our schools; cleaning up our environment; and making our cities more livable. These are not simple problems, with simple solutions. Yet, our mission is clear. We must once again show the nation and the world what is possible.

We have shown how to grow enough food to feed the world . . . now we must make sure every child gets enough to eat.

We have built the greatest public university system in the world . . . now we must make sure every child is prepared to walk through its doors.

We have created the best health care system in the world . . . now we must make sure that every family can afford to use it.

We have the best architects and builders in the world . . . now we must make sure there is affordable housing for every Californian.

We are pioneering civil rights for those of all races and religions . . . now we must make sure no Californian suffers from discrimination because of their sexual orientation.

We have the most creative and productive information systems in the world . . . now we must close the Digital Divide and make sure that every child has access to the tools of technology.

I know that among us, there won’t even be total agreement on what these challenges are—let alone how to meet them. And that is how it should be in the California State Assembly. At all times, the debate should be vigorous and in earnest.

But, I also believe the nature of that debate must be one steeped in civility. Let it not be a debate of indictment or divisiveness. Our success—the nation’s success—depends on our ability to build bridges, not burn them.

Let us be dedicated to debating our differences—then searching together for common ground. For common solutions. For the common good. Let us—with civility and common sense—focus the unmatched abilities of this State Assembly on that goal.

Let us walk forward together, and carry on the legacy of courage, innovation, and resolve, that for 150 years has been unmatched by any legislative body on earth.

Let us gladly, and humbly, assume the mantle of leadership, and act with daring and optimism. With faith and wisdom. With passion and compassion.

For on our shoulders lie not only the promise of this state, but the future of this nation, and the hope of the entire world.

Thank you, all of you, for giving me a wonderful two years. This has been an honor for me, that in my wildest dreams, I couldn't have imagined. This really is a House that is unmatched anywhere in the world. This really is a Legislative body that all of us can be proud of, and say, maybe we only had six years—but it was six years of making the world a little better. It was six years of showing the rest of the nation and the world, what you can do, when you have the will to do it.

Thank you. And most of all, let's have a great year, Members. We have much to be thankful for, and much to look forward to.
