Members of the Assembly: This report presents the results of a follow-up audit of the California Department of Motor Vehicles (Motor Vehicles) related to certain recommendations made in 2013 by the California State Auditor (state auditor). In April 2013 the state auditor issued a report titled *Special Interest License Plate Funds: The State Has Foregone Certain Revenues Related to Special Interest License Plates and Some Expenditures Were Unallowable or Unsupported*, Report 2012-110. The 2013 report included recommendations aimed at ensuring that Motor Vehicles charges the correct fees for special interest license plate (special plate) transactions, advertises special plate fees in its publications consistent with state law, and periodically assesses the cost and benefits of updating its automated systems for charging administrative fees.

This report concludes that Motor Vehicles has not fully implemented two of the three recommendations we followed up on from our April 2013 report. Specifically, Motor Vehicles is charging lower fees than required by state law for two of 25 special plates we reviewed. Motor Vehicles agrees and stated it will begin charging the correct fees for these two special plates by March 31, 2016. Additionally, Motor Vehicles is not advertising correct fees for 12 special plates in its publications. Although we noted that the volume of transactions for these 12 special plates was small in fiscal year 2013–14, the volume of transactions could change in the future, and advertising errors on special plate transactions may dissuade individuals who are considering purchasing special plates from doing so.

Motor Vehicles has fully implemented the third recommendation that it periodically assess the cost and benefits of updating its automated systems to reflect its up-to-date administrative costs. Specifically, Motor Vehicles reviewed the cost and benefits in 2013 and completed the update to its automated systems in December 2014. Further, Motor Vehicles stated that it will assess the cost and benefits of updating the systems once every two years.

Members of the Assembly: This report presents the results of our high risk audit concerning weaknesses in the controls over the State's information systems. California's government agencies maintain an extensive range of confidential and sensitive data, including Social Security numbers, health records, and income tax information. In the past few years, retailers, financial institutions, and government agencies have increasingly fallen victim to cyber attacks. If unauthorized parties were to gain access to the State's information systems, the costs both to the State and to the individuals involved could be enormous.

For state entities that report directly to the governor (reporting entities), the California Department of Technology (technology department) is the primary state government authority responsible for ensuring the confidentiality, integrity, and availability of state information systems. However, we found that it does not provide adequate oversight or guidance to reporting entities. When we performed compliance reviews at five reporting entities, we found deficiencies at each. Further, 73 of 77 reporting entities responding to our survey indicated that they had not achieved full compliance with information security standards. In fact, 22 respondents stated that they did not expect to reach full compliance with the information security standards until 2018 or later, with 13 indicating that they would be out of compliance until at least 2020. As a result of these weaknesses and the technology department's failure to provide effective oversight, some of the State's critical information systems are potentially vulnerable and pose an area of significant risk to the State.

Finally, a number of other state entities—such as constitutional offices and those in the judicial branch—are not currently subject to the technology department's information security standards or oversight. We intend to assess the information security risks associated with these entities and, depending on the results, will consider whether to expand our high risk designation to include them.

Members of the Assembly: Pursuant to the California Whistleblower Protection Act, the California State Auditor presents its investigative report summarizing investigations that were completed between July 2014 and June 2015 concerning allegations of improper governmental activities.

This report details 10 substantiated allegations involving several state departments. Through our investigations, we found failure to seek competitive bids, failure to increase rental rates, waste of state funds, failure to properly dispose of surplus state property, an improper gift of public funds, and neglect of supervisory duties. In total for the 10 substantiated allegations, we identified over \$4.2 million in wasted funds, improper payments, and misuse of state time.

For example, California Correctional Health Care Services improperly used a master agreement when it procured \$17 million in goods and services to upgrade the electrical infrastructure within state prisons beginning 2011. Of this \$17 million, it wasted \$3.2 million because it paid the contractor to do nothing more than process invoices of the subcontractor, who performed all of the work. Furthermore, Correctional Health Care improperly paid the contractor \$1.6 million in advance for goods and services that the subcontractor did not provide until nearly a year later.

Another investigation revealed that the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) failed to increase rental rates to reflect fair market value for state land rented by wireless communications companies. Caltrans' failure to increase rates cost the State nearly \$883,000 in revenue from July 1, 2012, through September 30, 2014.

State departments must report to the state auditor any corrective or disciplinary action taken in response to recommendations made by the state auditor no later than 60 days after we notify the agency or authority of the improper activity and monthly thereafter until corrective action is completed.

Members of the Assembly: This report presents the results of a follow-up audit of the Los Angeles Unified School District (district) related to recommendations made in 2012 by the California State Auditor (state auditor). In November 2012 the state auditor issued an audit report titled *Los Angeles Unified School District: It Could Do More to Improve Its Handling of Child Abuse Allegations*, Report 2012-103. The 2012 audit report included recommendations aimed at ensuring the district appropriately reported allegations of misconduct to the Commission on Teacher Credentialing (commission) and increased its oversight of open allegations so that misconduct investigations proceed in a timely manner. In May 2015 the state auditor initiated a follow-up audit to evaluate the status of the three recommendations made to the district in the 2012 audit.

This report concludes that the district has implemented our recommendation to notify the commission of certificated employees accused of misconduct in accordance with state law. Our 2012 audit found that the district often did not properly notify the commission when employees resigned, retired, were dismissed, or otherwise terminated while an allegation of employee misconduct was pending. The results of our follow-up audit found that the district failed to send required notifications to the commission within the time frames outlined in state law, in only three of 92 instances (3 percent) we reviewed. In contrast, our 2012 report found that, in at least 144 out of 429 cases (34 percent), the district failed to notify the commission in a timely manner.

The district is now resolving allegations of misconduct by its employees in a more timely manner. Our previous audit report found that the district did not promptly investigate some allegations in a timely manner and we recommended that the district increase its oversight of open allegations. In response, the district created the Student Safety Investigation Team (investigation team) in its central office to handle all allegations of sexual misconduct. Our review of the district's new policies and procedures and 12 allegations investigated by the investigative unit showed that the district has made improvements in the time it takes to investigate an allegation. The district is now completing its investigations within an average of five months, or 50 percent faster than what we observed during the 2012 audit. We also found that the investigation team complied with the district's policy of completing investigations within 120 working days for the 12 cases we reviewed.

Members of the Assembly: This report presents the results of a follow-up audit the California State Auditor conducted concerning the efforts by Laboratory Field Services (Laboratory Services)—within the California Department of Public Health (Public Health)—to implement recommendations from an audit report that we issued in September 2008. The report titled *Department of Public Health: Laboratory Field Services' Lack of Clinical Laboratory Oversight Places the Public at Risk*, Report 2007-040, examined Laboratory Services' ability to oversee clinical laboratories (labs) that analyze human specimens such as blood, tissue, and urine so that medical professionals can make diagnoses and prescribe treatment.

In this follow-up audit, we found that Laboratory Services is still not performing the oversight activities with which it is entrusted and its management of the program remains inadequate. Laboratory Services has not fully implemented many of the recommendations from our September 2008 audit report. Laboratory Services still only inspects approximately half of California labs and it does not have a process to ensure that it is aware, in a timely manner, when out-of-state labs that are licensed in California fail required proficiency testing. Laboratory Services also continues to not investigate all the complaints it receives and has issued only a small number of sanctions in the past seven years even though it is responsible for overseeing more than 22,100 labs. Moreover, we found that Laboratory Services made an unauthorized fee increase in January 2014 that has resulted in labs overpaying it more than \$1 million in fees, and since 2008 it has collected more than \$12 million in lab fees that it has not spent. Finally, Laboratory Services has missed opportunities to more effectively use its limited personnel by partnering with other organizations that could help it meet its workload obligations under state law.

Since the problems that have plagued Laboratory Services have persisted since our last audit, we believe the State's consumers have, in effect, been relying on federal oversight the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) provides through its administration of the Clinical Laboratory Improvement Amendments of 1988 (CLIA). In fact, we believe Laboratory Services' oversight of lab facilities largely duplicates federal oversight with no meaningful benefit to consumers. State law and CLIA are nearly equivalent in their mandates, and the oversight required is redundant: Both Laboratory Services and CMS collect fees from labs to perform inspections, monitor proficiency testing, investigate complaints, and issue sanctions. The Legislature should repeal state law requiring that lab facilities be licensed by the

State, thus reducing the regulatory and financial burden on lab facilities while continuing to enforce the State's requirements for laboratory personnel.

Members of the Assembly: As authorized by California Health and Safety Code, Sections 1179.25 and 1179.58, the California State Auditor presents this audit report concerning the Children's Hospital Program (program).

This report concludes that the California Health Facilities Financing Authority (authority), which administers the program, has awarded and disbursed most of the bond proceeds from the Children's Hospital Bond Acts of 2004 (2004 act) and 2008. The authority's activities related to awarding grants generally complied with laws and regulations. Further, the authority has a process for monitoring grants and has made payments to grantees in accordance with the law. Additionally, the authority established a process to ensure that its requests for, and the subsequent sale of, general obligation bonds to finance the program are reasonable and appropriate, resolving the high fund balance issue discussed in our previous report.

On the other hand, the authority adopted amendments to its program regulations that directly conflict with provisions in the act. The 2004 act gives each grantee hospital until June 30, 2014, to apply for funds until the hospital reaches its grant limitation. After this date, if funds remain, the 2004 act allows any of the eligible hospitals to apply for them and the authority is required to make the remaining funds available for this purpose. In May 2014 the authority adopted amendments to the program regulations to extend the application deadline to June 30, 2018. However, the amended regulations prohibit eligible hospitals that already received awards up to the grant limit from submitting any applications for additional funding until July 1, 2018. As a result, the authority's amendments to the program regulations effectively reserve \$67.9 million in remaining 2004 act funds for Loma Linda—the only hospital awaiting a 2004 act award as of June 30, 2014.

Members of the Assembly: This report presents the results of a follow-up audit of the Employment Development Department (EDD) related to a recommendation made in 2012 by the California State Auditor (state auditor). In March 2012 the state auditor issued a report titled *Federal Workforce Investment Act: More Effective State Planning and Oversight Is Necessary to Better Help California's Job Seekers Find Employment*, Report 2011-111. The 2012 report included a recommendation aimed at ensuring EDD maximizes grant funding opportunities related to workforce investment.

This report concludes that EDD, in response to our recommendation, updated the grant seeking procedures it uses for identifying, reviewing, and choosing whether to apply for federal discretionary grant opportunities related to workforce investment. However, it did not consistently prepare executive summaries that include the factors it considered, record its decisions whether to pursue or forgo grants, or retain supporting documentation as its procedures require. Specifically, EDD did not prepare an executive summary for three grants for which it was eligible to apply. For four other grants EDD prepared an executive summary, but either did not include the factors it considered in making its decisions about whether to apply, its decisions about whether to apply, or both. We also identified three grants for which EDD was eligible to apply that it did not include on its Grant Research Tracking Sheet.

Additionally, during our review we found that the California Workforce Investment Board (state board) also researches potential grant funding for workforce investment and that the state board and EDD are in the process of formalizing policies that will delineate each entity's role in seeking grant funding. However, the state board currently lacks a formal process for identifying and evaluating grant funding opportunities and does not track or consistently document the results of its efforts. Specifically, the state board provided documentation indicating it considered applying for two grants, but could not explain why it ultimately chose to forgo these opportunities. Only after making inquiries of EDD were we able to obtain documentation supporting the state board's decision.

Members of the Assembly: This report presents the results of our high risk review concerning California's level of emergency preparedness. Two key California agencies that oversee statewide emergency preparedness are the California Department of Public Health (Public Health) and the California Governor's Office of Emergency Services (Emergency Services). Public Health is responsible for preparing Californians for public health emergencies such as the December 2014 measles outbreak and overseeing public health disaster planning while Emergency Services' mission is to protect lives and property by preparing for, protecting against, responding to, recovering from, and mitigating the impacts of all hazards and threats.

Both Public Health and Emergency Services have made improvements to the State's level of emergency preparedness. In our September 2013 high risk report, we noted that Public Health and Emergency Services faced challenges as they attempted to meet their objectives and lacked fully developed strategic plans to guide their emergency preparedness efforts. In our current review, we found that Public Health has begun to use specific measures to monitor its progress toward achieving its objectives. We also found that Public Health has improved how it tracks its employees' completion of required emergency preparedness trainings and uses additional tools and assessments to improve the State's preparedness for emergencies. Additionally, we found that Public Health's federal funding has stabilized over the last three fiscal years, allowing it to sustain its emergency readiness capabilities. In our reassessment of Emergency Services we found that it has updated its strategic plan, developed related performance measures, and has begun to report on them.

As a result of these improvements, we do not believe emergency preparedness at Public Health and Emergency Services should continue to be designated as an area of high risk under our state high risk program. However, we will continue to monitor the issue at both agencies to ensure each maintains its emergency preparedness capabilities.

Members of the Assembly: As requested by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee, the California State Auditor presents this audit report concerning the State Superintendent of Public Instruction's (state superintendent) oversight of the Inglewood Unified School District (district).

This report concludes that the district's finances and operations have not significantly improved under the state superintendent's control. In July 2012 the district's five-member school board requested emergency funding from the State, citing the possibility that it would be financially insolvent by January 2013. When the governor signed Senate Bill 533 (SB 533) (Chapter 325, Statutes of 2012), the State provided the district with access to emergency funding and also required that the state superintendent assume control of the district—until such time that both he and his state administrator conclude that the district can sustain the improvements made to its finances and operations.

Despite projecting a balanced budget for fiscal year 2015–16, the district has demonstrated a sustained history of deficit spending, where expenditures exceed revenue. Furthermore, the district is still forecasting declining enrollment that can negatively affect district revenues, which are based on the average daily attendance of its enrolled students. The district cannot continue indefinitely with its pattern of deficit spending, and the state superintendent and his recently appointed third state administrator will have to make difficult financial decisions should the district's student population, and its related revenue, continue to decline.

The state superintendent also expects the district to make significant improvement in various operational areas, including community relations, personnel management, pupil achievement, financial management, and facilities management. However, after three years, the district is still far from meeting the state superintendent's expectations. The Fiscal Crisis Management and Assistance Team (FCMAT) annually measures the district's progress towards achieving these expectations and has consistently concluded that the district has yet to fully implement and comply with various state standards. Achieving and sustaining higher scores from FCMAT is an important milestone towards ultimately restoring local control over the district. However, the state superintendent and his state administrator lack a publicly available action plan that prioritizes FCMAT's nearly 700 recommendations for improvement. With continually low scores from FCMAT and a

continued pattern of deficit spending, those living in the district and other stakeholders may lose confidence in a state-administered approach to recovery.

Members of the Assembly: As requested by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee, the California State Auditor presents this audit report concerning the Central Basin Municipal Water District's (district) planning, operations and management, long-term financial viability, and control environment.

This report concludes that the district's board of directors (board) has failed to provide the leadership necessary for the district to effectively fulfill its responsibilities. For example, we found that the board failed to ensure that the district maintained stability in key executive management positions throughout our review period. Further, we found that the board failed to take basic steps to ensure the district's long-term financial viability, including engaging in long-term financial planning and performing the necessary study to ensure the district's water rate structure is appropriate and that it will collect sufficient revenues to meet its costs. Finally, the board's actions contributed to the district losing its insurance coverage, forcing the district to purchase insurance with higher premiums for considerably less coverage than in previous years.

The board also violated state law in 2010 when it improperly approved the establishment of a legal trust fund without adequate public disclosure. Further, it lacked a means of ensuring expenditures made from the \$2.75 million trust fund were appropriate. In addition, the district consistently engaged in questionable contracting practices. For example, we found that the district often inappropriately circumvented its competitive bidding process when it awarded contracts to vendors. The district also spent thousands of dollars of public funds on purposes unrelated to its mission, some of which very likely constitute gifts of public funds, which are prohibited by the California Constitution.

Additionally, the district did not always follow its policies for hiring employees, which led it to hire certain individuals who did not possess the necessary qualifications for their positions and to incur unnecessary expenses. In one instance, the district paid more than \$22,000 for an employee to obtain a bachelor's degree, when possession of such a degree was already a minimum requirement to qualify for his high-level position. Ultimately, this individual did not obtain his degree during his employment with the district. We also found that some of the benefits the district offers its board members may be overly generous, as it

provides them with full health benefits and a generous automobile allowance, even though their work is essentially part-time. Finally, we noted multiple instances in which the district paid for unreasonable travel and meal expenses for both its board members and staff.

Although the district has recently taken some steps to address these issues, the magnitude of the problems we found suggests that the district could benefit from a different governance structure. The district's board is currently publicly elected, yet the board's customers, to which it should be held accountable, are those various entities the district wholesales water to which is, in turn, then sold throughout the district. If the Legislature chooses to change the governance structure, it could consider a structure in which the board would be composed of members appointed by the district's direct customers. Such a change would not be a novel approach—as we note, it is already used by certain other water agencies in the region—and it would enable the district's customers to hold the board accountable when it takes actions or makes decisions that are not in the best interests of the district.

Members of the Assembly: As required by California Public Contract Code, Section 19210, the California State Auditor (state auditor) presents this audit report concerning the procurement policies and practices of the Judicial Council of California (Judicial Council). The California Public Contract Code generally governs how state entities should enter into contracts and acquire goods and services. Enacted in 2011, the California Judicial Branch Contract Law (Judicial contract law) requires judicial branch entities to follow procurement and contracting policies that are consistent with the California Public Contract Code and substantially similar to the provisions contained in the *State Administrative Manual* and the *State Contracting Manual*. In addition, judicial contract law requires the Judicial Council to adopt and adhere to the *Judicial Branch Contracting Manual* (judicial contracting manual), and to submit semiannual reports to the Legislature and state auditor itemizing most of its contracting activities.

This report concludes that the Judicial Council is generally complying with the judicial contract law and has corrected nearly all of the problems with its procurement and payment practices that we identified in our audit report published in December 2013. In our previous report we found that the Judicial Council did not always competitively bid contracts as required, correctly score vendor bids, or document its reasons for using a non-competitive procurement process.

For this audit we reviewed 60 procurements and found that in each instance the Judicial Council followed relevant procurement requirements. We also found that accounting staff correctly followed the Judicial Council's payment process for the 60 payments we reviewed. Judicial Council staff are in the process of correcting one deficiency we found: the judicial contracting manual does not include required standards related to the minimum fuel economy of purchased vehicles.

In contrast to the progress it has made in its procurement policies and practices, the Judicial Council has not fully implemented the controls required to address the pervasive weaknesses we identified in the general controls over its information systems. The two information systems whose general controls we reviewed contain data that the Judicial Council uses for its day-to-day operations, and for creating the semiannual reports. The weaknesses we identified continue to compromise the security and availability of these information systems.
