Members of the Assembly: As requested by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee, the Bureau of State Audits presents its audit report concerning our review of whether the California Public Utilities Commission (commission) promptly resolves the various types of administrative proceedings it is responsible for conducting. This report concludes that few of the 1,602 proceedings the commission initiated between January 1, 2000, and June 30, 2003, were actually subject to statutory deadlines. Additionally although the commission did not complete 11 percent of its proceedings within statutory requirements when applicable, or within its own internal guidelines, most times it did. Commission staff provided various reasons, including delays caused by the commissioners themselves, delays caused because the outcomes of some proceedings were dependent on other decisions or investigations, or delays that occurred when the commission purposely kept certain proceedings open to take up related issues or to manage multiple phases. In processing its more informal advice letters, which the commission uses to approve minor requests from utilities, two factors contributed to delays: One was that some had a lower workload priority and the other was that some required formal resolution or investigation.

Finally, according to several reports prepared by the Department of Finance between February 1998 and February 2003, the commission lacks an adequate tracking system that would allow it to provide quantifiable justification to support its requests for staffing. Thus, although the commission cited workload and inadequate staffing as

contributing to delays in processing its formal proceedings and advice letters, it was unable to provide us with any staffing workload analyses to support its belief.

Members of the Assembly: As required by Chapter 310, Statutes of 1995, the Bureau of State Audits presents its audit report concerning the Department of Transportation's (department) revenues and expenditures authorized by the Seismic Retrofit Bond Act of 1996 (Bond Act). This report concludes that the department has ensured that seismic retrofit projects funded with bond proceeds are consistent with the purpose of the Bond Act. As of June 30, 2003, the department had spent \$1.87 billion of the \$2 billion authorized by the Bond Act. In addition, the department has nearly completed its reimbursement of the State Highway Account and the Consolidated Toll Bridge Fund for expenditures incurred during fiscal years 1994–95 and 1995–96 as required by the Bond Act. As of June 30, 2003, the department had reimbursed the two funding sources \$89.7 million of the \$114 million that is owed to them.

Members of the Assembly: As requested by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee, the Bureau of State Audits presents its audit report concerning our review of the processes used by the California Integrated Waste Management Board (board) and local agencies, including local enforcement agencies (LEAs), to grant permits for and to monitor solid waste sites.

This report concludes that the board had not finalized regulations for construction and demolition debris sites when a large fire broke out at the Archie Crippen Excavation Site (Crippen Site), a site that accepted

this type of material, in Fresno, putting public health and safety at risk. Representatives of several agencies visiting the Crippen Site before the fire failed to cite the operator or require remediation of conditions that ultimately made the fire difficult to suppress. Also, the board does not track sites that fall into the excluded regulatory tier because it is not required to do so. However, these sites may grow or begin to receive other types of waste, potentially posing a risk to public health and the environment without the board's or the LEAs' knowledge if the operator does not notify them of any change in activity. In addition, the board does not complete its reviews of each LEA every three years, as required by law, to ensure they are appropriately enforcing the California Integrated Waste Management Act of 1989.

Members of the Assembly: As requested by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee, the Bureau of State Audits presents its audit report concerning the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority's (MTA) decentralization of its bus operations into five service sectors. This report concludes that it is too early to predict service sector success, but opportunities for certain improvements exist. Before the MTA established sectors, it did not perform any cost-benefit analyses or fiscal projections, nor did it fully consider alternatives to sectors. Thus, the MTA has reduced its ability to measure the effectiveness or efficiency of its sector implementation. Despite the MTA's limited analysis, our review generally did not find negative effects associated with the MTA's decentralization of bus operations. However, the MTA is still attempting to resolve some issues affecting sectors that existed before it decentralized its operations.

Although the MTA provided training to the governance councils on their various responsibilities, the MTA has not communicated adequately with them about some pertinent issues, such as limitations that currently prevent it from calculating cost savings for sectors. Thus, it risks having governance council members form incorrect assumptions about the MTA's capabilities and becoming frustrated with the MTA's seeming lack of attention to issues the council members believe are important. Additionally, weaknesses in the methods the MTA uses to

advertise governance council meetings could cause it to miss opportunities to use these meetings effectively as a means of improving community input into bus operations and tailoring services to local needs.

Members of the Assembly: As requested by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee, the Bureau of State Audits presents its audit report concerning the State Water Resources Control Board's (state board) and the Regional Water Quality Control Boards' (regional boards) collection of fines and their administration of water quality improvement projects funded with fines collected in accordance with the Porter-Cologne Water Quality Control Act (State water quality act).

This report concludes that, as allowed by law, there is no correlation between the amount of fines collected by a given regional board and the amount the regional board receives from the state board. Over the last five fiscal years, 1998-99 through 2002-03, the regional boards collected about \$26 million from fines and the state board has either spent or committed to spend \$24.9 million for water quality improvement projects throughout the State. Further, the state board received almost \$21 million from a legal settlement between the State and Atlantic Richfield Company and Prestige Stations, Inc., and shortly after committed to spend \$19.2 million of those funds. While the regional boards have three options for either recovering at least a portion of the money, or otherwise retaining some of the benefits of their enforcement actions, not all the regional boards are fully utilizing these options. Moreover, despite appearing to focus on the main goal of ensuring that public and private entities comply with the State water quality act, regional boards sometimes fail to follow through on enforcement actions. Finally, the state board's staff does not always obtain written information on proposed water quality projects before submitting them to the state board for review. As a result, staff does not always fully analyze the proposed water quality projects and the state board may not be able to make a fully informed decision regarding which projects are the best use of state funds.

Members of the Assembly: As required by Chapter 804, Statutes of 2002, the Bureau of State Audits presents its audit report concerning California's education institutions that receive federal student aid and must comply with the federal Jeanne Clery disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Crime Statistics Act (Clery Act).

This report concludes that institutions sometimes report inaccurate or incomplete statistics in their annual reports because the Clery Act does not always provide clear definitions. In a few instances, institutions have developed their own policies to address the lack of clarity, which further increases the risk of inconsistent reporting of campus crime statistics among institutions. Finally, our review found that some institutions did not maintain documentation of the incidents included in their annual reports. Thus, it is difficult to determine whether the institutions are accurately and consistently reporting incidents from year to year.

Members of the Assembly: As requested by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee, the Bureau of State Audits presents its audit report concerning the Department of Health Services' (Health Services) activities to address provider fraud in the California Medical Assistance Program (Medi-Cal). This report concludes that although Health Services performs a number of Medi-Cal fraud prevention and detection activities, it is missing some components of a comprehensive and coordinated strategy for addressing provider fraud. It is currently working to implement some of these missing components, such as estimating the extent of fraud in the program, but it has not yet completed its assessment. Without this information, it cannot know whether it is overinvesting or underinvesting in its antifraud activities or allocating antifraud resources in the right areas.

Additionally, Health Services continues to experience delays in processing some provider enrollment applications, and this becomes critical as new legislation effective January 1, 2004, requires it to grant

provisional provider status to applicants if its processing of provider enrollment applications does not meet certain time and notice requirements. Further, it does not ensure the consistent screening of providers before enrolling them in the Medi-Cal program and that all enrolled providers continue to meet eligibility requirements. Health Services could also achieve more effective results by expanding the use of one of its antifraud activities, and needs to complete its negotiations on a required agreement that could be structured to better coordinate its investigative efforts with the California Department of Justice. Although Health Services communicates and shares information during various meetings of its antifraud committees and task forces, because it lacks an individual or team with the responsibility and authority to ensure Medi-Cal fraud control issues are addressed recommendations promptly implemented, some well-known problems, such as those we report on, may continue to go uncorrected. Finally, Health Services needs to better monitor the potential fraud unique to managed care.
