RE: Tentative Agreement/Memorandum of Understanding for the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees (AFSCME), Council 57, Local 2620, AFL-CIO, Bargaining Unit 19

Dear Senators De León and Fuller, and Assembly Members Rendon and Mayes: The Department of Human Resources (CalHR) reached a new Tentative Agreement with AFSCME, Council 57, Local 2620 representing Bargaining Unit 19. Upon approval of the Legislature and the Governor, and ratification by the membership, this agreement will be effective July 1, 2016 through July 1, 2020.

This agreement will roll over language from past agreements and make several changes to address the state's retiree health care costs and associated unfunded liabilities. The state and Bargaining Unit 19 have agreed to begin to phase-in the prefunding of retiree health care benefits with the goal of each contributing 50 percent of the actuarially determined normal cost by July 1, 2019. In addition, Bargaining Unit 19 members first hired on or after January 1, 2017, will need to work longer to become eligible for retiree health benefits and once vested will receive a lower employer contribution toward retiree health benefits.

Finally, members will receive a three and a half percent General Salary Increase (GSI) effective January 1, 2017 and July 1, 2017, a two and a half percent GSI effective July 1, 2018, and a two percent GSI effective July 1, 2019.

In accordance with Government Code Sections 3517.5, 19829.5, and Senate Rule 29.4, I am forwarding copies of the Tentative Agreement, including legislative and fiscal summaries. The Legislative Analyst will be forwarded a copy for analysis, and the Secretary of the Senate and the Clerk of the Assembly will be forwarded copies to make them noted as available for review in the daily journals.
