ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 149—Zettel. An act to amend Section 17052.2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code, relating to taxation, to take effect immediately, tax levy.

ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 150—Reyes. An act relating to Internet access.

ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 151—Reyes. An act to add Section 18034 to the Education Code, relating to public libraries.
