INTRODUCTION AND FIRST READING OF ASSEMBLY BILLS

The following bills were introduced and read the first time:

ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 20—Zettel. An act to add and repeal Section 42301.15 of the Health and Safety Code, and to add Section 25541.3 to the Public Resources Code, and to add Section 379.5 to the Public Utilities Code, relating to energy resources.

ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 21—John Campbell. An act to add Section 743.2 to the Public Utilities Code, relating to electricity.

ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 22—Koretz. An act to amend Section 388.1 to the Public Utilities Code, relating to public utilities, and declaring the urgency thereof, to take effect immediately.
