PRAYER

Upon invitation of Speaker pro Tempore Lowenthal, the following prayer was offered by Reverend Bob Oshita:

When I was about nineteen years old, while backing out of a friend's driveway, my rear tires became stuck in a shallow ditch that was carved out for street repair. As I applied power, my car popped out of the ditch and shot out into the street. I scraped the entire side of a car driving by. It was the first accident that I had caused, and I felt so bad. For days, I was visibly upset with myself. After a few days, my mother said sternly, "Okay, that's enough. You got in an accident." Then she said slowly, "It was an accident. You didn't do it on purpose. If you did it on purpose, then we'd never let you drive again. But you got in an 'accident.' You didn't get in a 'purpose.'"

I think because English was her second language, she would sometimes speak so literally. Unintentionally, she made me laugh trying to imagine getting in a "purpose." But I understood. Sometimes things go wrong. Sometimes things go terribly wrong. And although we know so many things could have been done better, we also know that what happened in the last week at Washington D.C.'s Reagan Airport and in Philadelphia were horrific accidents.

They are being investigated. Responsibilities will be assessed, shared and taken. But right now, still remains a time for grieving; a time for empathy and caring; a time when we recall when our lives have been blindsided by tragedy, and our hearts go out to the victims and their families. Last Thursday morning, we opened our Floor Session with a Moment of Silence.

Let every moment of silence we share, also be our "wake-up call" that in an instant, our lives can be blindsided by tragedy. In realizing again that life holds no guarantee of tomorrow, our Wisdom Eyes open, and we know that we must hold close the people we love while we have them. Love them and thank them now; not tomorrow or the next time we see them. With Wisdom Eyes open, we know again NOT to take for granted the time we have to be together.

Namo Amida Butsu—Let us live with kindness and gratitude beyond words.

MESSAGE CONCERNING CLEMENCY

To the Members of the Senate and Assembly of the State of California:

In accordance with Article V, Section 8 of the California Constitution, Penal Code section 4807, and Government Code section 12017, I submit to you a report on the clemency grants I issued in 2024. I pardoned 61 people, granted commutations of sentences to 18 people, and granted reprieves to 3 people.

This report includes the pardon, commutation, and reprieve certificates, and the application forms submitted for each.

My constitutional authority to grant clemency in criminal cases in the form of pardons, commutations of sentence, and reprieves is an important part of California's criminal justice system that can promote accountability, rehabilitation, public safety, make jails and prisons safer, and correct unjust results in the legal system.

MESSAGE CONCERNING 2024 PAROLE CASES

To the Members of the Senate and Assembly of the State of California:

I submit this report as required by Article V, Section 8, Subdivision (b) of the California Constitution.

The parole process in California, a critical cornerstone of our criminal justice system, is made stronger by the efforts of many in state government, including the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation under the leadership of Secretary Jeff Macomber.

At the end of 2024, after decades of service to the State of California, Jennifer Shaffer retired from her role as Executive Officer of the Board of Parole Hearings. For the past 14 years, Executive Officer Shaffer has demonstrated dedication and vision. Her considerable achievements during her tenure at the Board have made our justice system more fair and our communities safer.

I am also grateful to our community partners who provide rehabilitative programming in prisons and reentry services in the community, the attorneys who represent incarcerated people in the parole process, victim advocates and representatives, prosecutors, and the people in prison, on parole, and post-parole who have committed themselves to rehabilitation and accountability.

Finally, I acknowledge and thank crime victims and survivors for their participation in the parole process. I have been inspired by their courage and resilience.
