Members of the Assembly: As requested by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee, the Bureau of State Audits presents its audit report concerning various counties' administration of their Emergency Medical Services (EMS) funds. This report concludes that while the six counties we reviewed appropriately allocate money to their EMS funds, legislation enacted after fiscal year 1990–91 has effectively reduced available funding for emergency medical services. Moreover, because of their own policies and legislative constraints, counties are not fully utilizing available EMS funds to reimburse emergency medical care providers.
