To Members of the California State Assembly:

I am signing Assembly Bill 806 to correct an unintended consequence of Chapter 1132, Statutes of 2002. Chapter 1132 established standards for wage scales in specified service contracts with the State by imposing a requirement that all employees working under a contract with the State of California be paid 85 percent of the wages and benefits that would be paid if the job were held by a state employee. Those requirements put persons with developmental disabilities who work in such contracts in jeopardy of losing current and future job opportunities to work for the State.

AB 806 will ensure that developmentally disabled persons continue to have job opportunities and work to become self-sufficient without increasing costs to the State.

Members of the Assembly: As requested by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee, the Bureau of State Audits presents its audit report concerning the California Department of Corrections' (department) plans to build a new condemned-inmate complex at California State

Prison, San Quentin (San Quentin). This report concludes that the department's current condemned-inmate facilities at San Quentin do not meet many of the department's design standards for maximum-security facilities, increasing the risk of escape and posing potential safety concerns to both staff and inmates. Accordingly, the department requested and received spending authority of \$220 million to build a new condemned-inmate complex at San Quentin, which the department estimates will be completed by 2007.

In analyzing where it should house its male condemned population, the department considered certain existing prison facilities but concluded that most of them would not be appropriate, due primarily to their remoteness from metropolitan areas. However, the department's analysis did not consider all alternatives, including the possibility of building the new complex at other locations. Additionally, the department's analysis did not consider all relevant factors, such as annual operating and maintenance costs. Because the department's analysis was incomplete, we can conclude neither that San Quentin is the best location for the new condemned-inmate complex nor that a better location exists. Nonetheless, benefits and drawbacks exist for both the continued use of San Quentin as a prison and its reuse for other purposes. Benefits for continuing to house the condemned-inmate population at San Quentin include, among other things, providing a timely solution to San Quentin's condemned-inmate housing problem. However, in committing to build a new complex to house male condemned inmates at San Quentin, the State will forgo the opportunity to help Marin County address certain needs.

Members of the Assembly: As requested by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee, the Bureau of State Audits presents its audit report concerning counties' administration of their Emergency Medical Services (EMS) Funds. This report concludes that although the counties we reviewed are making an effort to administer their EMS Funds properly, some of their practices do not comply with state laws or could benefit from better controls over disbursements. Over half of the counties affected by a statutory requirement that limits the growth of certain revenues for their EMS Funds are not aware of the limitation. Counties generally comply with other statutory requirements for EMS Fund revenues, but they either did not have all the necessary or reasonable controls in place for disbursement from their EMS Funds or made certain unallowable or questionable payments from their physician, hospital, or discretionary accounts. In addition, some

counties reported significant balances remaining in the revenue derived from penalty assessments collected by the courts as of June 30, 2002, raising questions about whether physicians and hospitals are receiving all the reimbursement possible. However, recent legislation will now require counties with surplus funds to proportionally reimburse additional amounts to qualifying physician claims. Finally, we found few counties report that their EMS Funds were audited for any purpose.
