Members of the Assembly: As directed by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee, my office conducted an audit of the In-Home Supportive Services (IHSS) program. Our assessment focused on the California Department of Social Services (Social Services) and four counties: Butte, Kern, San Diego, and Stanislaus. The following report details the audit's findings and our conclusion that the State and these counties must take action to ensure that all Californians who are elderly and of low income or who are disabled (recipients) receive authorized IHSS services.

Our review found that the IHSS program serves more than 591,000 recipients, helping them live independently in their own homes and avoiding long-term care arrangements that would be much more costly to the State. However, a growing number of recipients—tens of thousands each month—do not receive the services for which they qualify because the State and counties alike have failed to complete mandatory annual planning activities intended to ensure care for all recipients. We further found that the counties generally do not process IHSS applications in a timely manner, nor do they ensure the timely provision of care for all recipients. Unless the State and counties address these deficiencies, the number of recipients who lack care will likely increase as the need for IHSS services grows.

Additionally, we found that caregivers throughout the State receive pay that is at or near minimum wage, and caregivers earn significantly less than a living wage in each county. In fact, many caregivers who work full time would qualify for public assistance. Moreover, the IHSS program's funding structure is inequitable and discourages counties from significantly raising wages. These low wages could make recruiting a sufficient number of caregivers challenging both currently and in the future, especially when 32 of the 51 counties that responded to our survey indicate that they already lack enough caregivers to provide each qualified recipient with all approved services.

Members of the Assembly: As directed by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee, my office presents this audit report regarding the city of Blythe (Blythe), which we conducted as part of our high-risk local government agency audit program.

This report concludes that Blythe is a high risk city because of the significant risks it faces related to its financial and operational management. Blythe improved the condition of its general fund dramatically over the past several fiscal years through sustained budget cuts and some increased revenue. However, the city's general fund reserve is roughly half the recommended level and would likely be insufficient to carry the city through an economic downturn. The city also has no long-term financial plan, but it does have a number of significant funding needs, such as investment in public safety due, in part, to the number of vacant buildings that are associated with crimes such as arson.

Other inadequate city management practices have created operational risks for Blythe. In particular, the city waited more than a decade to update its service fees and for years has subsidized many city services with general fund revenue. As a result, two of its enterprise funds have accumulated debts of \$2.8 million. Finally, the city also lacks sufficient contract management protocols, which puts it at risk of fraud, waste, and improper payments.

To address these concerns, we present several recommendations, such as developing a strategic plan to prepare for long-term financial and operational challenges, and developing a policy for updating rates and fees once every five years. We also recommend that Blythe identify initiatives to address risks associated with its high vacancy rate and apply for available grants to support this effort.

Members of the Assembly: As directed by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee, my office conducted an audit of the city of El Cerrito (El Cerrito) as part of our high-risk local government agency audit program. Our assessment focused on El Cerrito's financial and operational risks, and the following report details the audit's findings and conclusions. In general, we determined that the city is at high risk of financial instability because of its continual overspending, poor budgeting practices, and lack of a comprehensive plan to address its financial challenges, all of which threaten the future provision of city services.

El Cerrito depleted its financial reserves in fiscal year 2016–17 and has since relied on short-term loans to continue operating. The city's poor budget development practices have led to substantial increases in budgeted expenditures that it cannot afford. Poor budget monitoring practices have also allowed city departments to routinely overspend. For example, El Cerrito's city management department spent a total of \$1.9 million beyond its budget from fiscal years 2015–16 through 2019–20, even after the city approved budget increases for each of these years. Moreover, even though El Cerrito recently proposed spending reductions of \$1.7 million for fiscal year 2020–21, we question whether those reductions are realistic, given the absence of specific detail in the city's budget, which should explain how the city's departments intend to achieve the reductions.

To address these concerns, we present several recommendations, such as documenting the assumptions and data the city uses to develop projections of revenue and expenditures, providing monthly updates to the city council on the city's budget status by department, and developing and implementing a comprehensive financial recovery plan. In addition, we recommend that El Cerrito seek opportunities for savings by conducting a comparative analysis of the city's total compensation for its employees and by recovering additional costs of its fee-based services.
