Legislative Intent—Assembly Bill No. 499

RE: Assembly Bill 499, Chapter 914, Statutes of 1998

Dear Mr. Chief Clerk: It has come to my attention that my bill, AB 499 relating to educational equity, contains a drafting error, as it was chaptered at Chapter 914, Statutes of 1998. I am writing to correct the error that occurred at the time the amendments were taken to the bill April 9, 1997.

Prior to the passage of AB 499 (1997–98), the Education Code's prohibition of discrimination against students was enforceable through a civil action for legal and equitable relief. It was the legislature's express intent in enacting AB 499 to limit that private right of action under the Education Code, by requiring students to go through an administrative grievance process prior to the pursuit of civil remedies other than injunctive relief. Under the existing law at the time, no such administrative process was mandated prior to the pursuit of civil remedies, but the civil remedies themselves existed.

AB 499, as introduced, stated that, "the amendments of Section 262.3 of, and the addition of Section 262.4, to the Education Code made by this act do not constitute a change in, but are declaratory of, existing law." In the April 9, 1997 amendments the bill limited the cause of action clarified in Section 262.3 and Section 262.4 of the Education Code and the language cited above was deleted. However, inadvertently, this language was not replaced with legislative intent language stating that the bill was limiting an existing cause of action.
