PRAYER

Upon invitation of Speaker pro Tempore Keeley, the following prayer was offered by Rabbi Hillel Cohn, of Congregation Emanu El, in San Bernardino:

On this day in 1780 the flag of our nation was born. Like so many of our other national and state observances that ought to rekindle in us a sense of our history as a people and seizing the opportunity for a renewal of our commitments to the fundamental ideals of our nation and state, the import and significance of this day has been virtually ignored. Let us, therefore, at the outset of a new day on which the elected representatives of the people of the Golden State confront new and demanding challenges, turn to our nation's flag for guidance.

We adorn our public buildings with the "red, white and blue." We carry it, the Stars and Stripes, with great pomp in parades. It is the visible tribute of a nation to its veterans as it covers their burial caskets. We pledge allegiance to the flag with great frequency, especially at the beginning of governmental meetings. But does our behavior as individuals and as a community reflect the ideals and qualities which the flag represents? Are we really committed to the attainment of what we pledge, to be a state and nation that assures "liberty and justice for all"?

In these days when we seek a resolution to our many problems, not the least of which is the energy crisis that threatens the stability and security of this great state, let us turn to our flag for guidance as to where our best energies must be directed.

While not ever formally expressed, the members of the Continental Congress did have an understanding of the meaning of the components of the Stars and Stripes.

For them the red was a symbol of hardiness and valor; the white a symbol of purity and innocence; the blue a symbol of vigilance, perseverance and justice.

How desperately we need to recapture these qualities in our individual and collective lives. And so it is in this spirit that we pray:

O God, let us, the people of the Golden State, be brave and valiant in battling for equality, economic security, the reduction of violence.

O God, let our motives always be pure, our lives innocent of wrongdoing and the perversion of justice.

O God, let us be ever vigilant of attempts to deprive people of their natural rights, perseverant of the highest standards of morality and ethics in government and just in our formulation and application of the laws that will govern this state.

To this end may the women and men who serve in this Great Assembly as the representatives of the people direct their full energies and let our salute to the flag of our great nation be a means of rededication to the principles that must ultimately guide us, the advancement of liberty and justice for all.—AMEN.
