Relative to commending the Honorable George C. Runner, Jr.

WHEREAS, The tenure of the Honorable George C. Runner, Jr., with the California State Assembly is drawing to a close following six years of exemplary service, and it is appropriate at this time to highlight the many achievements of his illustrious career and to extend to him the highest commendations of the people of the state; and

WHEREAS, Elected to the California State Assembly in 1996, George Runner represented the 36th Assembly District, which includes the cities of Lancaster, Palmdale, and Santa Clarita in Los Angeles County; and

WHEREAS, Assembly Member Runner brought distinction to himself on the Assembly Republican leadership team, first as Minority Whip, and then as Vice Chair of the Assembly Budget Committee for four consecutive years; and

WHEREAS, He has served on the Assembly Committees on Appropriations, Health, and Housing and Community Development and as a member of the Joint Committee on Fairs Allocation and Classification and was appointed to the Select Committee on Aerospace Industry, the Select Committee on Long-Term Planning for Commercial and General Aviation Airport Capacity, and the Joint Committee to Develop a Master Plan for Education; and

WHÉREAS, Among Assembly Member Runner's successful legislative measures include his Categorical Reform bill, a pilot project which streamlines how funds are designated based on a school's individualized needs; the Military Family bill, which provides a permanent exemption from nonresident tuition at all University of California, California State University, and California Community Colleges for active military personnel and their families; his HOV Lane bill, which made the High Occupancy Vehicle lanes on State Route 14 available to single-occupant drivers during noncommuter hours; the Joint Strike Fighter tax credit, which provides \$250 million in tax credits for wages and equipment used in the production of the Joint Strike Fighter; and Proposition 11, authored by Assembly Member Runner in 1998, to allow local governments to enter into sales tax revenue sharing agreements; and

WHEREAS, Many California groups and organizations have recognized Assembly Member Runner's leadership, and his most recent honors include his designation as 2000 Legislator of the Year by the California Network of Educational Charters, Council of College and Military Educators, League of California Cities, and California State University, and 2000 Outstanding Legislator of the Year by the California State Sheriff's Association; and

WHEREAS, Prior to his election to the California State Assembly, George Runner was a member of the Lancaster City Council and served as Vice Mayor and Mayor, whereupon during his mayoral term the California Business Journal named Lancaster California's No. 1 mid-size city with which to do business; and

WHEREAS, In 1977 he founded Desert Christian Schools, one of the largest private, interdenominational preschool through high schools in the state, and he currently is Chairman of the Board; and

WHEREAS, After attending local public schools in Lancaster, George Runner graduated from the University of Redlands with a Bachelor of Science degree in business management and he holds a graduate certificate in management from Azusa Pacific University; and

WHEREAS, He has held many local leadership positions, such as President of the League of California Cities, Desert/Mountain Division, member of the Board of the Lancaster Economic Development Corporation, and Antelope Valley YMCA, and he is a member of the Lancaster Rotary Club; and

WHEREAS, Assembly Member Runner and his wife Sharon are the proud parents of two children, a son, Micah, and a daughter, Rebekah; and

WHEREAS, Through his public service activities he has made a significant impact on the people of the 36th Assembly District and throughout the state, and he will be greatly missed by those individuals with whom he has been associated; now, therefore, be it
