Members of the Assembly: As requested by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee (audit committee), the Bureau of State Audits presents its audit report concerning the California Environmental Protection Agency (Cal/EPA) and its entities involved in the cleanup of properties contaminated by hazardous materials and waste, the Department of Toxic Substances Control (Toxics) and the State Water Resources Control Board (State Water Board). The audit committee requested that we provide information on how many orphan sites and sites with orphan shares exist in the State, as well as how much funding is needed and how much is directly available to clean up those sites.

This report concludes that insufficient data exists to determine the number of orphan sites and sites with orphan shares, and that liability concerns and funding constraints can impede their cleanup and redevelopment. Specifically, state law does not require Toxics and the State Water Board to maintain a database to capture this information. However, Toxics' database that tracks contaminated properties currently reports 46 orphan sites and, as of January 1, 2003, its program that addresses properties with orphan shares has three sites eligible to receive orphan share compensation. Due to insufficient data in the State Water Board's database that tracks contaminated sites, we were unable to identify the number of orphan sites under its jurisdiction. However, the State Water Board's unaudited data indicate that it has only seven orphan sites to which it has committed a total of \$1.4 million in state resources. Further, the State Water Board does not have orphan shares because even though some share of the cleanup costs is not attributable to a responsible party, each party must assume full responsibility for those costs.

Although Toxics' primary funding source for cleanup, an environmental fee levied on corporations, has remained relatively stable, the State has recently reduced the amount of General Fund appropriations made available to cover cleanup costs. For example, the Cleanup Loans and Environmental Assistance to Neighborhoods Account received \$85 million in General Fund appropriations during fiscal year 2000–01, but \$77 million was transferred back to the General Fund in the subsequent fiscal year. However, Toxics anticipates that it needs between \$124 million and \$146 million for the long-term remediation of existing orphan sites and \$2.4 million in orphan share compensation during fiscal year 2003–04.

Veto Message—Assembly Bill No. 80

Governor's Office, Sacramento July 21, 2003

To Members of the California State Assembly:

I am returning Assembly Bill 80 without my signature.

This bill would result in an unfunded liability for some of California's largest counties such as Alameda, Los Angeles, and San Diego, because the employee's contribution would not be adequate to fund this benefit under this bill. Furthermore, the Department of Finance believes this measure inadvertently would allow a retiree to double dip, i.e. collect a

pension for his out of state employment at the same time California taxpayers are paying for that very same employment service.

While I fully believe in supporting our public safety employees, the current fiscal difficulties facing California preclude me from increasing employee benefit packages, that are not cost neutral, upon counties when their ability to provide vital services and current staffing levels are in jeopardy.

To the Members of the California Legislature:

I am signing Assembly Bill 142, which requires any property acquired by the San Diego River Conservancy to be acquired through the Public Works Board pursuant to the Property Acquisition Law.

As this bill was moving through the Legislature, concern was expressed that the statutes setting forth the powers and duties of the conservancy do not expressly prohibit the conservancy from acquiring property through the use of eminent domain. However, unless specifically authorized, the conservancy would not have eminent domain powers. Furthermore, acquisitions made by the conservancy would be from recent voter-approved bonds which specifically state that the bond funds can be used to acquire land from willing sellers only.

With this clarification of the Conservancy's powers, I am signing AB 142.

To the Members of the California Legislature:

I am signing Assembly Bill 223 because it returns California law to the point at which it has been for the last twenty years preceding the decision in *Smith v. Rae-Venter* (2002). This bill codifies a body of case law holding that an employee is successful on appeal even if the court awards an amount that is the same or lesser than previously awarded by the Labor Commissioner.

The hearings held by the Labor Commissioner are intended to provide a prompt, low cost resolution for employer-employee wage disputes. Furthermore, Labor Code Section 98.4 mandates that the Division of Labor Standards Enforcement provide legal representation to claimants in employer-filed de novo appeals when the employee is unable to afford counsel. The Division now represents over 800 claimants per year in these de novo proceedings. California taxpayers who pay for attorney representation in these appeals cases should be entitled to have the attorney's fees and costs reimbursed if the employee prevails. Ninety percent of all de novo appeals are filed by employers. Moreover, in the six months since the *Smith* decision, the division's workload has tripled in this area, indicating that the decision may have given incentive to parties to file costly court appeals, rather than to resolve the matters at the less costly administrative level.

Finally, I would note that not only does AB 223 return California law to the holdings in the twenty years of cases before *Smith*, it is also consistent with laws in other large states, such as New York and Texas.

I am pleased to sign Assembly Bill 812, which will assist in the development of a state-of-the-art regional transportation hub serving the San Francisco Bay area community and its millions of visitors by providing the necessary approval from the Legislature for the demolition of the Transbay Terminal Building located in San Francisco.

Concurrent with my action today in signing this measure, the California Department of Transportation has executed a cooperative agreement with the City and County of San Francisco and the Peninsula Corridor Joint Powers Board, that transfers the property of the existing Transbay Terminal Building and surrounding properties currently owned by the Department of Transportation. This agreement ensures that the state's financial interests will be protected, as well as the completion of the west approach of the San Francisco-Oakland Bay Bridge seismic retrofit and replacement project, which is a vital public safety project.

I am pleased to take these actions today to sign this measure and execute a transfer agreement that protects the State's interests and allows this important Bay Area transportation improvement project to proceed. The attached letter from Director Jeff Morales outlines the details of the agreement.

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Governor's Message, Assembly Bill No. 812—Attachment

Dear Governor Davis: In 2001, you vetoed AB 1419 (Aroner), legislation that would have transferred the Transbay Transit Terminal and certain nearby undeveloped parcels from the State to San Francisco for construction of a new regional transit facility, with no consideration provided to the State. The bill failed to protect the State's interests, as discussed in detail below. In vetoing the bill, you directed the Department to pursue administrative means of transferring the properties in order to allow the important transportation improvement to proceed, and at the same time addressing the State's interests. Today, we have executed this transfer. In accordance with this agreement, and pending certain conditions, the properties will be transferred to the Transbay Joint Powers Authority (Authority) and the City and County of San Francisco.

The administrative transfer is a significant improvement over the transfer approved by the Legislature, as noted below. First, AB 1419 created conflicts with timely delivery of the seismic retrofit of the West Approach to the San Francisco-Oakland Bay Bridge. We now have protections to insure that this vital safety project will not be delayed as a result of the transfer. AB 1419 would have required the State to perform the environmental cleanup of the property. Under our agreement, that responsibility is the Authority's, saving the State at least \$20 million. Under AB 1419, the State would have lost all lease revenue currently generated from the properties immediately. With our agreement, the State will continue to receive lease revenues even after the transfer is complete. By transferring the property, the State avoids costs of at least \$300 million that would be needed to bring the existing property up to code, seismic safety, and other requirements. Further, our agreement includes a reversionary clause that returns the property, or the cash equivalent, to the State in the event that the Authority is unable to meet its obligations. Funds from the sale of any excess property will go into an interest-bearing account, and can be used only for construction of a new terminal. All funds, including interest, will be returned to the State if the new terminal is not constructed. Successful completion of the project will represent a major improvement in regional and interregional transportation without any additional State investment required. The combination of these savings and benefits clearly exceed the revenues the state could theoretically gain through the sale of non-operating right-of-way property surrounding the terminal.

AB 812, which has been approved by the Legislature, is consistent with the agreement to transfer the Transbay Transit Terminal, and will allow the project to proceed.

In vetoing AB 1419, you expressed appropriate concerns for protecting the interests of California taxpayers. I am pleased that we

have been able to address those concerns, and have executed a transfer that protects the State's interests, and allows this key transportation improvement to proceed.
