WHEREAS, The tenure of the Honorable Thomas M. Calderon with the California State Assembly is drawing to a close following four years of exemplary service, and it is appropriate at this time to highlight the many achievements of his illustrious tenure and to extend to him the highest commendations of the people of the state; and

WHEREAS, Elected to the California State Assembly in 1998, Thomas Calderon represented the 58th District, which includes the cities of Montebello, Norwalk, Whittier, Pico Rivera, Santa Fe Springs, South El Monte, South Whittier, and Los Nietos; and

WHEREAS, During his tenure in the Legislature, Assembly Member Calderon authored and supported legislation that protects workers, including Assembly Bill 931, which established a certification process for electricians, making licensing a requirement in the field for the first time in the state's history, and enhancing safety for workers in the industry; and

WHEREAS, He was the first Floor Jockey in the Assembly for Senate Bill 1877, designed to protect the rights of hard-working men and women in the janitorial field by providing job stability when a new vendor takes over an existing janitorial contract; and

WHEREAS, He focused on improving workers' compensation benefits and access, and recently wrote Assembly Bills 749, 1176, and 1177, which will ensure that employees receive necessary medical treatment if they are injured on the job; and

WHEREAS, Along with improving the quality of life for California's workers, Assembly Member Calderon's legislative focus was aimed at promoting equity and fairness related to insurance issues, cleaning up contaminated California groundwater basins, and improving the quality of education in California; and

WHEREAS, During his first session in the Legislature, he authored Assembly Bill 2880, a state budget "trailer bill," which provided

\$1.84 billion in discretionary funds for California school districts, and he paved the way for school districts to attract more qualified teachers with Assembly Bill 1117, which set the minimum teacher salary at \$32,000, and in 2000 the program was expanded to increase beginning teacher salaries to \$34,000; and

WHEREAS, Assembly Member Calderon worked to make California a safer place to live and work by drafting legislation preventing the spreading of contaminated groundwater and providing greater protection for California residents who live near methadone clinics by increasing state oversight; and

WHEREAS, He brought local educators, law enforcement, health groups, and community organizations together for a variety of district events, including a School Safety Summit, Diabetes Awareness Fairs, Earth Day Festivals, and a Senior Services Fair, and he arranged for a group of 200 students to participate in the second annual Cesar Chavez Walk-a-thon; and

WHEREAS, He was one of the four members who organized the Assembly Insurance Committee investigations in the behavior of former Insurance Commissioner, Chuck Quackenbush; and

WHEREAS, He was instrumental in working with the Governor to provide millions of dollars in capital projects throughout the 58th Assembly District, including Whittier's Greenway Trail, Pio Pico State Park in Pico Rivera, and funding for specialized buses in the Montebello Unified School District; and

WHEREAS, Assembly Member Calderon brought distinction to himself as Chair of the Assembly Committee on Insurance and as a member of a number of key committees in the Assembly, including Education, Governmental Organization, Utilities and Commerce, and Water, Parks and Wildlife, and he was named Chairman of the Select Committee on San Gabriel Valley Groundwater Contamination and the Southern California Water Caucus; and

WHEREAS, Born in East Los Angeles and raised in Montebello, Thomas Calderon graduated from the University of California, Santa Barbara, with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Literature and attended graduate school in Ohio, where he taught Freshman English and Composition; and

WHEREAS, In 1993 he was elected to the Montebello Unified School District Board of Education, an urban school district located just east of Los Angeles, and as a school board member and board president in 1997, he worked to raise the quality of education for all students in the community; and

WHEREAS, Assembly Member Calderon lives in Montebello with his wife, Marcella, and their children, Cameron and Victoria; and

WHEREAS, Through his public service activities he has made a significant impact on the people of the 58th Assembly District and throughout the state, and he will be greatly missed by those individuals with whom he has been associated; now, therefore, be it

WHEREAS, The tenure of the Honorable Mike Briggs with the California State Assembly is drawing to a close following four years of exemplary service, and it is appropriate at this time to highlight the many achievements of his illustrious tenure and to extend to him the highest commendations of the people of the state; and

WHEREAS, Assembly Member Briggs was elected to the California State Assembly in 1998 as representative of the 29th District, which includes the cities of Fresno, Clovis, Visalia, and Exeter; the counties of Fresno and Tulare, the first and second richest agricultural counties in the nation, respectfully; and other important areas including Woodlake, Ivanhoe, Farmersville, and the Sequoia/Kings Canyon National Parks; and

WHEREAS, Assembly Member Briggs was first elected to public office in 1994 to the Fresno City Council, where he represented District 1 near his Tower District home, and during his term the crime rate in the city dropped dramatically in every category; and

WHEREAS, As a member of the Fresno City Council, Assembly Member Briggs was named "Fresno's Number One Crime Fighter" by a local television news anchor, after he joined his close friend and neighbor, Mike Reynolds, in passing the "Three Strikes You're Out" initiative; and

WHEREAS, Assembly Member Briggs moved quickly to provide relief to citrus growers who were devastated by a harsh freeze in December 1999 by authoring Assembly Bill 762, relating to property tax deferment; and

WHEREAS, He authored Assembly Bill 761 to save rural hospital facilities throughout California, by providing nearly \$3 million in additional funding to help facilities keep their doors open to rural residents; and

WHEREAS, Assembly Member Briggs sought to enact a constitutional amendment to dedicate all sales taxes collected from the sale of gasoline to transportation projects in California; and

WHEREAS, He improved the quality of education in Central Valley schools by securing equalization funds that dramatically increased per-pupil funding to school districts in the 29th Assembly District; and

WHEREAS, Assembly Member Briggs served as Vice Chair of the Assembly Environmental Safety & Toxic Materials Committee, which has had an impact on the activities of both business and agriculture, and he also provided leadership as a member of the Committees on Agriculture, Energy Costs & Availability, Governmental Organization, Insurance, Public Employees, Retirement & Social Security, Revenue & Taxation, and Information Technology; and

WHEREAS, A native of the 29th District, Assembly Member Briggs graduated from Clovis High School, where he was active in the Future Farmers of America, and went on to earn a Bachelor of Science degree in business and a Master's degree in classical guitar from California State University, Fresno; and
