Members of the Assembly: As directed by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee, my office conducted an audit of the California State University (CSU) system to assess CSU's handling of sexual harassment complaints against employees at the Office of the Chancellor (Chancellor's Office), California State University, Fresno, San José State University, and Sonoma State University. In general, we determined that CSU has not adequately or consistently addressed some allegations of sexual harassment.

The CSU Chancellor's Office maintains a sexual harassment policy that governs how each of its 23 campuses responds to reports of sexual harassment. We reviewed 40 cases of alleged sexual harassment by CSU employees and found various problems with campuses' handling of the cases. For example, in the absence of detailed guidelines in CSU's policy, campuses did not document a clear rationale for closing 11 of those cases without formally investigating the allegations. When campuses did conduct investigations, we found significant deficiencies in seven of the cases, which raised questions about their outcomes. Further, campuses did not consistently take disciplinary or corrective action to address problematic behavior. In one case, a campus found a faculty member responsible for sexual harassment, but it took no action for more than five years. After determining that it had missed the statute of limitations for imposing other disciplinary action, such as suspension, the campus only issued a letter reprimanding the individual for his conduct.

The problems and inconsistencies we found during this audit warrant systemwide changes at CSU. In particular, the Chancellor's Office must take a more active approach to overseeing campuses' efforts to prevent and address sexual harassment. It can do so by clarifying and closing gaps in its policies, issuing comprehensive best practices to campuses, collecting and analyzing critical data, and resuming regular reviews of its campuses for compliance with key legal and policy requirements. These efforts would help CSU better protect its students and employees from sexual harassment.

Legislative Intent—Assembly Constitutional Amendment No. 5

Dear Ms. Parker: The purpose of this letter to the Assembly Daily Journal is to clarify the intent of Assembly Constitutional Amendment No. 5 (ACA 5). I and co-authors introduced ACA 5 earlier this year to protect the fundamental freedom to marry in California.

ACA 5 would remove discriminatory language added to our state Constitution by Proposition 8 of 2008. It would affirm that the freedom to marry is guaranteed as part of existing constitutional rights to due process, equal protection under the law, pursuit of happiness and privacy, and enjoyment of life and liberty. This initiative would update our state Constitution to reflect current practice and to protect everyone's freedom to marry, regardless of gender, sexual orientation, race, or ethnicity.

ACA 5 would affirm the constitutional right to marry, as currently recognized by state and federal caselaw. It would not impact the eligibility requirements to get married or to perform a marriage, or the mechanics of issuing licenses and solemnizing marriages, all of which are set forth in statutory law. *See, e.g.*, Family Code § 400(a) (a "priest, rabbi, or authorized person of any religious denomination ... shall not be required to solemnize a marriage that is contrary to the tenets of the person's faith"); Family Code § 301 ("Two unmarried persons 18 years of age or older, who are not otherwise disqualified, are capable of consenting to and consummating marriage.") Subsequent to voter approval of ACA 5, maintaining or amending these detailed standards and procedures for marriage would remain the prerogative of the Legislature.

The U.S. Constitution protects all Americans' right to the free exercise of religious faith, including the right of clergy and religious denominations to choose which marriages they solemnize. Marriage equality for same-sex couples has now been the law of the land in California for a decade, and no clergy members or religious denominations have been forced to perform marriages that do not accord with their faith. This would remain unchanged following approval of ACA 5.

Thank you for this opportunity to clarify the intent of ACA 5.

To the Members of the California State Assembly:

I am returning Assembly Bill 1696 without my signature.

This bill would require any privately owned recovery residence that contracts with a government entity to provide documented policies and procedures related to its operations, code of ethics, and patient access to medications.

Privately owned recovery residences, as defined by this bill, are not subject to state licensure or certification. Therefore, AB 1696 would conflate requirements in existing law for licensed and certified programs providing substance use disorder recovery services with new requirements for privately owned recovery residences, which the California Department of Health Care Services does not oversee or enforce. This may create confusion among people seeking recovery services from licensed or certified programs or treatment facilities.

For these reasons, I cannot sign this bill.
