Dear Mr. Wilson: I would like to provide you an update on the Employment Training Panel's (ETP) Strategic Plan for fiscal

year (FY) 2001–02. Briefly the mandate of the Panel is to administer a statewide economic development program that supports California's economy by ensuring that employers have the trained workers necessary to compete in the global economy. The program's priority is the retraining of incumbent workers of businesses challenged by out-of-state competition. The Panel also funds training of unemployed workers for high-skill, high-wage, secure jobs.

The enabling legislation for ETP requires that the Panel submit an annual Strategic Plan to the Governor and Legislature by July 1. At its June 2001 meeting, the Panel reviewed and heard public comment on its draft FY 2001–2002 Plan. We then directed the Panel staff to begin to finalize the Plan's provisions for submission to the Governor and Legislature.

We recognize that there is a slight delay in the filing of the plan, and we would appreciate special consideration this year. Several Panel members, including myself, were appointed in March 2001. We are working diligently to become more familiar with the operation of the Panel and to reach consensus on the major goals for the coming year. This newly constituted Panel has wished to take an active role in the drafting of the Plan, consistent with the intent of the enabling legislation. We are carefully considering and prioritizing our goals in order to ensure that our finite funds are used effectively to benefit California's workers and its economy.

Members of the Assembly: As requested by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee, the Bureau of State Audits presents its audit report concerning the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority's (MTA) compliance with applicable state and federal laws designed to protect driver and public safety and its procedures for monitoring the secondary employment of its part-time bus drivers.

This report concludes that the MTA lacks an adequate system to prevent all violations of federal and state driving and on-duty time restrictions. For example, the MTA does not have the ability to effectively prevent all drivers from exceeding 10 hours behind the wheel since it cannot track actual driving time. In addition, although the MTA is taking positive steps to collect complete data on it drivers' secondary employment, it needs a more consistent approach to identify bus drivers working for multiple employers who exceed driving and on-duty restrictions. Furthermore, the MTA does not take full advantage of citation information provided by the Department of Motor Vehicles to ensure it applies its discipline process equitably to all bus drivers. Finally, unreliable or missing data in MTA's accident monitoring system hinder its ability to determine whether driver fatigue contributes to an accident.

Members of the Assembly: As requested by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee, the Bureau of State Audits presents its audit report concerning the operations of the Department of Insurance's (department) Conservation and Liquidation Office (CLO). Specifically, we reviewed the operations of the CLO that are outside the control structure of the State and the effectiveness of the department's oversight process in monitoring the operations of the CLO.

This report concludes that the CLO does not adequately safeguard and conserve insurance companies' assets by following prudent business practices and adhering to established controls. Further, the department has not adequately overseen the operations of the CLO. During our review, we identified significant weaknesses in the CLO's inventory and asset identification process. As a result, the CLO failed to promptly safeguard insurers' assets. Further, we noted that the CLO does not effectively managed its contracts, its hiring practices need improvement, and it has spent at least \$6 million on an automated claim processing system that does not meet its overall needs. In addition, the CLO uses a basis to allocate certain of its costs to insurers that is not equitable. We also found that the CLO has not recently updated its estate closing plans or prepared cash flow projections as a means for ensuring that investment decisions are optimized.

Moreover, the department and the CLO have not addressed many of the issues raised in our previous two audit reports, nor has the department ensured that the CLO takes corrective action on the findings reported by other external auditors and the CLO's internal auditor. Finally, the CLO has yet to establish comprehensive conflict-of-interest policies and guidelines for its employees and vendor contractors.

To Members of the California State Assembly:

I am returning Assembly Bill 1228 without my signature.

This bill would allow railroads to report their property holdings by county, rather than by individual tax rate area, for purposes of property taxation. The bill would also require county auditors to make one-time adjustments to local jurisdictions' tax bases to incorporate revenue from railroad unitary property.

This is a well-intentioned bill that provides for greater efficiencies in determining the tax obligations of the railroad industry. However, I am vetoing this bill because it would result in a reimbursable state mandate for county implementation costs that could exceed \$150,000, and those costs would not be offset by a gain in property tax revenue. This has been a difficult budget year and the state cannot afford to absorb any unnecessary costs.

#### Veto Message—Assembly Bill No. 1635

To Members of the California State Assembly:

I am returning Assembly Bill 1635 without my signature.

Under current law, employees have the right to inspect their own personnel records. This bill would permit employees to obtain a copy of those records, and would authorize employers to charge either a maximum copying fee of ten cents per page or an amount specified in an applicable collective bargaining agreement.

While it would modify existing law governing personnel records, this bill contains no provisions to protect the privacy of other individuals who may be identified in the personnel records. Without measures that ensure the privacy of those individuals and the confidentiality of a company's legitimate proprietary information, the potential for harm of this measure outweighs the possible benefits.

To the Members of the California Legislature:

I am signing Assembly Bill No. 441, however, I am vetoing the \$40 million appropriated in the bill as there are sufficient funds remaining in the Proposition 98 Reversion Account to fund this measure. I am setting sufficient funding aside in that account for subsequent legislation to fulfill my commitment for \$40 million of equalization funding.

I also object to the intent statement in the bill to fully meet the funding targets by the 2006–2007 fiscal year. Any consideration for future equalization funding will be contingent on sufficient revenues to meet other, higher priorities. Because I have already approved nearly \$2.3 billion in discretionary funding increases for school districts beyond statutory requirements in the prior two budgets, and because the state is already in compliance with court requirements for equalized funding, I do not believe that further equalization funding is of a sufficiently high priority to require the level of commitment intended by this statement

when there may be more pressing priorities for school reforms that can help ensure increased student achievement.

To Members of the State Assembly:

I am signing Assembly Bill 212 with great reluctance.

It is my general belief that local land use disputes should be settled without state interference. The difference of opinion that exists between the City of Tustin, the Santa Ana Unified School District and the Rancho Santiago Community College District can and should have been resolved by the directly elected representatives of those local government agencies.

At issue is the redevelopment of the former Tustin Marine Corp Air Base. The base is within the City of Tustin and their designation as the Base Reuse Authority is appropriate. However, the needs of the overlapping school districts must be considered as the master plan for the 1600-acre area is prepared.

Land is scarce in this densely populated area, and the remaining open land in private ownership is prohibitively expensive for the two districts. Yet, new school facilities are needed to ease overcrowding and to accommodate future growth.

I am persuaded that the districts' request for land is not unreasonable. These two school districts are among the most severely overcrowded in the State. The Santa Ana Unified School District is responsible for the education of nearly 60,000 students and expects enrollment to grow by 40% in the next five years. Almost one half of the students in this district currently attend school in over 900 portable classrooms. The Rancho Santiago Community College District had a 45% increase in enrollment between 1995 and 1999. I would also note that the Department of the Navy indicates it does not intend to convey any base property until there is an agreement on the acceptability of the entire base reuse plan.

I am calling on the three agencies to continue their efforts to reach an agreement. Further, I am signing AB 212 based on a commitment from the principal authors that they will introduce urgency legislation specifying that a final agreement between the City of Tustin, the Santa Ana Unified School District, and the Ranch Santiago Community College District will supercede the provisions of the bill.

I am signing AB 434 that would provide for the transfer of property originally bought by the California Department of Transportation (CalTrans) for construction of the Hatton Canyon freeway to the Department of Parks and Recreation for the purpose of developing a state park.

The Hatton Canyon bypass project, originally conceived of in the 1930's, would have constructed a four-lane freeway through beautiful, coastal Hatton Canyon in Monterey County. The project has languished over the years because of the difficult struggle to balance development and growth with environmental preservation.

I am pleased to announce, however, that, after more than seventy years of debate, the CalTrans, with support from local residents and regional transportation authorities, is canceling the Hatton Canyon

bypass project.

I applaud the efforts of all those who participated in striking this tenuous balance between transportation needs and environmental integrity. I am directing Caltrans to work with Monterey County and local transportation authorities to make improvements necessary to the existing Route 1. I am also directing the Department of Parks and Recreation to develop a plan to ensure Hatton Canyon remains the environmental asset that it is into perpetuity.

I am signing Assembly Bill 423, which would establish Farm Labor Contractor Verification and Enforcement Units within the Department of Industrial Relations (DIR) and make various changes to farm labor contractor requirements.

This bill responds to the main objection I expressed to the bill I vetoed last year by eliminating mandatory jail time for growers and

farm labor contractors who violate the law, and instead expands monetary penalties for repeat offenses. This bill will target only those individuals who knowingly and willfully fail to pay wages. According to the California District Attorney's Association the provisions in this bill require greater elements of proof than existing law and thus protect growers and farm labor contractors from inadvertent violations. This high standard will however target the worst offenders, which is the stated intention of the author and advocates for this bill.

I am hopeful that these increased penalties will cause repeat violators of California's wage and hour laws to think twice before failing to pay those men and women who perform much of this state's hardest work under the toughest conditions. The penalties imposed, while stiffer than most, are not unique to other industries that rely on seasonal or predominantly migrant labor. Employers in the garment industry, for example, are subject to one year in prison and/or penalties of up to \$30,000 for repeat violations of labor laws in the apparel manufacturing industry.

The bill also <u>permits</u> local district attorney's office, *if desired*, to establish farm labor contractor enforcement units and to coordinate with the Rural Crime Prevention Programs. This provision is <u>not mandated</u>, and should not in any way impinge upon the funding or <u>purpose</u> of the RCPP to provide for the protection and safety of the state's agricultural industry.

This bill and other legislation I have signed are intended to protect the vitality of California's \$27 billion agricultural industry, including the health and safety of farmworkers. Last year I signed AB 1338, a bill that increases wage surety bonds and requirements for farm labor contractors. New legislation this year, SB 1125, will allow growers to use those wage surety bonds and license fees to pay for damages arising from labor law violations. These bills in combination with AB 423 establish the most significant package of agricultural labor law enacted in the past 20 years. Thus, I will not consider any major additional legislation in this area until these measures are fully implemented and their impacts understood by all of the parties involved in this issue.

I am signing AB 426 which will increase the tax relief provided to senior citizen homeowners and renters, enact several sales tax relief provisions for agriculture, and revise the formula used to trigger a sales tax rate reduction in order to make that reduction easier to achieve. This measure will provide significant, ongoing tax relief to the targeted beneficiaries.

Some technical corrections to this measure will, however, be required. In order to better clarify the intent of the 2001–02 budget agreement between the Administration and the Legislature, the State sales tax exemption for diesel fuel used in farming should better define that it is intended only to apply to delivery to the first destination from the farm. This will target the benefits to those intended—the farmers.

The 2001–02 budget agreement was for the Senior Citizens' Property

Tax Assistance and Renters' Tax Assistance Program to increase by 45 percent for an additional cost of \$75 million. However, due to a drafting error, this bill is technically deficient in that it increases the maximum income threshold of program participants, rather than the benefit levels. I am requesting that subsequent legislation be passed as soon as the Legislature returns that corrects this technical deficiency and provides the tax relief intended for these programs. In an effort to ensure that these taxpayers are not delayed in receiving their existing level of assistance, I request that the Franchise Tax Board issue two checks to each claimant. Issuance of the first check would begin immediately based on the benefit levels that existed prior to enactment of AB 426. A second check would be issued as soon as the Franchise Tax Board can feasibly implement and calculate the supplemental benefit pursuant to the corrected legislation.

Although I regret the need for the delay in taxpayers receiving their full benefit, I am pleased that the ultimate goal of a significant, increased level of ongoing benefits for these taxpayers will be achieved.

I am signing Assembly Bill No. 430. However, I am concerned the Legislature did not continue the statutory cost controls requiring the regional centers to administer their contracts within the amounts in the annual Budget Act. Allowing this provision to sunset could result in unrestrained cost increases for services to the developmentally disabled. While during the last five years the population served by regional centers has increased 20.3 percent, regional center expenditures have increased 74.4 percent. Heretofore, statute, recognizing fiscal crises and uncertainty, has specified that regional centers could not incur a deficiency by requiring them to live within budgeted amounts. As a temporary measure, this requirement sunset on June 30, 2001. However, I requested the Legislature make this provision permanent. In order to track regional center costs and prevent unrestrained cost increases, I am directing the Department of Developmental Services to closely monitor regional center expenditures and report that information quarterly to my office.

I am also concerned about Section 14.5 that permits applicants for the Healthy Families Program (HFP) to provide signed statements as to the value or amount of household income.

This provision was included in the State's waiver request to the federal government to add parental coverage through the HFP as a component of the State's actions to align the HFP with the Medi-Cal Program. The use of different income documentation standards between the two programs results in confusion for families and creates a barrier to enrollment of eligible children. Current Medi-Cal regulations provide for use of signed statements of income when other documentation is unavailable. Although the State's waiver request is still under review at the federal level, a key area of review by federal officials has focused on the State's efforts to coordinate coverage between Medi-Cal and Healthy Families.

Use of applicants' signed statements of income may place the program at some risk for enrollment of non-eligible children. However, basic program integrity standards remain in place and will include a requirement that statements of income be signed under penalty

of perjury.

I am directing the Managed Risk Medical Insurance Board (MRMIB) to promulgate regulations that would restrict the use of applicants' statements of income to instances when other sources of income documentation are unavailable. To assist the Administration and the Legislature in evaluating this policy change, I am also asking the MRMIB after six months of implementation to report on the percentage of applicants that use this method of income documentation.

WHEREAS, ultimately, the Douglas Playground Award will fund a total of 400 playgrounds and is offering valuable grant writing assistance, a streamlined proposal process, and a list of resources for schools to access in their planning activities; now, therefore, be it
