MESSAGES FROM THE GOVERNOR

The Budget Message of the Governor was received.

Budget Message by Governor Goodwin J. Knight, 1956-57 Budget

To the Senate and Assembly of the Legislature of California:

I submit the Budget for the State of California for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1956, and ending June 30, 1957, in compliance with the Constitution. This is a budget reflecting a sound condition of state finances and a prosperous

economy. It presents a forward-looking program of services for a growing State, but it calls for a careful husbanding of expenditures. It is a budget, I am happy to report, which will be financed within the existing revenue structure without new or increased taxes

Our state revenues, geared as they are to income and business activity, are much higher than our estimates of a year ago, which were in line with the forecasts of the leading economists of the Nation. Economists, so far as I can find, did not have the temerity at that time to predict the present level of prosperity and I for one do not condemn them for their conservatism I am thankful that increases in revenues, together with savings by careful fiscal management, permit us now to forecast a substantial surplus at the close of the current year instead of the anticipated deficiency we faced a year ago. The revenue estimates in this Budget for the coming fiscal year reflect the present high levels of economic activity, with forecasts of moderate increases based upon careful appraisal of the outlook. As in past years we have had the very valuable assistance of able economists in industry and finance in making these forecasts. Let me remind you, however, that our revenues respond very sensitively to a change in the national and state economy. An increase or decrease of only 1 percent means a difference of \$10,000,000 in General Fund revenues, and our estimates could easily be that much too high or too low.

You will observe that a reserve of \$10,400,000 has been set aside for appropriation for rehabilitation of flood damage in accordance with the recommendations I am making to you in the special session.

Expenditure Requirements

It will require a total of \$1,736,112,983 to meet the State's obligations and needs in the ensuing year. This is an increase of \$120,949,012 or 8.1 percent over the estimated expenditures for the current year ending June 30, 1956. Again the increase in expenditures is brought about primarily by the State's continued rapid growth. California, with nearly 13,500,000 people in 1956, has added 2,800,000 to its population in the last six years. We have grown almost three time as fast as the Nation. We have had to crowd into six years the solution of problems which other states on the average could deal with at a leisurely 16-year pace. There is no prospect for any easing of our pace in the years ahead.

A large part of the operating expenditure and capital outlay schedules for the departments and institutions of the State Government have already been reviewed by the Assembly Committee on Ways and Means and the Senate Finance Committee. I know these committees have found the Budget recommendations to have been well justified and based upon prudent and economical criteria.

State Operations

Generally the expenditure proposals for operating the agencies of the State Government follow the policy of maintaining existing levels of expenditures for an interim budget session year with only the adjustments necessary because of growth. They do not ordinarily make provision for new programs or for expansions in existing programs. We cannot, however, stand still in these days of rapid development and advancement and I am recommending orderly and moderate betterment of staffing and services in a few situations where the needs and the benefits are so well demonstrated that it would be contrary to the public interest to defer them. You have given your support quite consistently to such betterments in previous sessions and I am confident you will continue to do so. Among the most important of these are.

Mental Hugiene

The improvement in staffing and medical allotments in our mental hygiene hospitals is a continuation of our attack upon this great public health program with the objective of providing the best treatment program that modern science puts at our disposal, and we must extend our efforts to find better methods of dealing with it.

Highway Patrol

The Highway Patrol is the other principal department for which a moderate betterment is proposed for our unending war on traffic accidents. This budget provides for an increase of 270 in the patrol force as another orderly step toward the staff needed to cope with present day needs.

University of California and State Colleges

The number of students enrolling in the university and in the state colleges is increasing at rates greatly exceeding the State's population growth. There will be 7,464 more students enrolled in the state colleges in 1956-57 than in the current year, 22 percent more than the number for which we budgeted this year. The University of California must provide for an increase of 2,913 students, which exceeds the estimate on which this year's budget was based by more than 10 percent.

the estimate on which this year's budget was based by more than 10 percent. There are a number of other departments for which next year's requirements make increases greater than population growth unavoidable. The Alcoholic Rehabilitation Commission and the State Scholarship Commission, for example, will be more fully in operation next year requiring quite heavy rates of increase

The Budget makes provision for an increase in pay for state employees averaging approximately 5 percent in accordance with the recommendation of the Personnel Board to bring state pay rates into line with comparable employment in private industry and other public jurisdictions

Provision is also made for a more adequate Emergency Fund. The demands of the flood disaster which followed an extraordinarily heavy forest fire season proved that a \$1,000,000 fund is too small to cover possible needs with any margin of safety I recommend an Emergency Fund of \$2,000,000 of which \$1,000,000 would be available for the ordinary type of emergency allotments and of which \$1,000,000.

would be reserved for meeting emergency needs if we should be so unfortunate as to face another disaster.

It will be seen that for all the activities other than the special situations I have just mentioned, the proposed operating expenditures are closely in line with the

State's population growth.

I have no doubt that sound reasons can be given for expanding certain programs beyond the proposals in this Budget. There is a limit, however, as to the amount of such expansions which we can prudently finance in any one year.

Forest Protection

The State Board of Forestry and citizens groups especially concerned with the protection of the State's watershed, forest and range land point to the shocking forest fire losses of the past season and urge that a substantial expansion be made in the Division of Forestry's fire fighting facilities. We have made good progress in our state forest protection service in recent years, but we have not yet attained the ultimate goal. Any large increment in this Budget, however, would have been out of keeping with the policies the Legislature has laid down for a budget session year. I fully appreciate the importance of these natural resources to the general economy of the State and I have asked the Director of Natural Resources to make a careful evaluation of the present fire fighting facilities and present a comprehensive plan for remedying deficiencies for consideration when the next budget is being prepared.

Capital Outlay

The Budget proposes expenditures for capital outlay amounting to \$357,926,393, composed of the following separate programs: (1) the State Building Program, (2) the State Highway Program, (3) the Beach and Park Program, including provision for the 1960 Winter Olympic Games, (4) the Wild Life Conservation Program, and (5) Flood Control and Water Conservation.

State Building Program The major construction projects for state buildings are generally in line with the five-year building program submitted last year. It has been necessary, however, to accelerate the construction of teaching facilities in the state colleges and the University of California because of a much heavier increase in student enrollments than our conservative estimates of the five-year study. On the other hand, we are pleased to find that populations in our correctional institutions and state hospitals are not as great as had been anticipated and certain projects scheduled for 1956-57

can be deferred for at least one year.

The entire program for the five-year period which contemplates outlays aggregating over \$400,000,000 has had careful review and there are included in this Budget only those projects which must be undertaken without delay in order to provide for badly needed additional capacities in our institutions. There are a good many highly desirable and essential projects which must await a time when we are better able to finance them. It is more and more apparent that we must depend upon the two hundred million dollar bond issue which will be before the voters next November to

supplement current revenue funds to meet our state building needs.

State Highway Program

The Budget of highway construction and improvements as developed by the State Highway Commission proposes outlays amounting to \$237,162,456 for 1956-57, which is a slight increase over the present level of expenditures. It is unfortunate that some \$11,000,000 which otherwise would be available for this purpose must be devoted to repairing flood damage on our State Highway System. If, however, the Congress approves the President's program for augmented federal aid to the national highway system, we can anticipate a considerable acceleration in meeting deficiencies in this State.

Beach and Park Program

Since the 1955 Session, the State Park Commission and the staff of the Division of Beaches and Parks have worked diligently on a comprehensive and sound program of beach and park acquisition and development. This has been a most difficult undertaking fraught with many perplexing policy questions and problems in evaluating a great many proposals. The commission has made every effort to adopt a well-balanced program with due regard to geographic location and to the scenic, historical and recreational aspects of the State Beach and Park System. It is, of course, impossible to meet fully the desires of all groups and of all localities. It is impossible too within the limits of time and the available technical staff to make precise cost estimates. There has been the very great difficulty in distinguishing between a facility which has the qualifications of a state park and one which is merely local or regional in character. While questions undoubtedly will be raised as to some of

or regional in character. While questions undoubtedly will be raised as to some of the projects, it is my judgment that the commission overall has developed a good program under difficult conditions and I am submitting it to you without change. I recommend that the beach and park acquisition program amounting to \$25,608,045 be adopted in full in this Budget. We must recognize that a program of this magnitude cannot be accomplished in a single fiscal year. Therefore I recommend that the appropriation for acquisitions be given a five-year period of availability. It is estimated that not more than \$7,500,000 would be expended during 1956-57.

In addition to the above beach and park acquisitions, the Budget proposes more than five million dollars for development and improvements of new and existing parks, extension of the riders and hikers trails, a beginning of a new roadside rest program, and a historic ship project at San Francisco. A further feature is a recommended appropriation of \$1.000,000 for the State Park System costs involved in the Redwood Highway relocation.

The problems concerning a maritime museum and park in San Francisco have not been solved. Since it is quite possible that a state beach or park facility in this general area will be required, it is recommended that a reserve of \$2,000,000 be set aside in the State Beach Fund subject to future action by the Park Commission and

the Legislature.

In order to afford additional assurance that the beach and park acquisition program will be carried out with every safeguard I recommend that the property purchasing transactions be made subject to review by the State Public Works Board

1960 Winter Olympics

The California Olympic Commission has recommended that the initial \$1,000,000 apropriation made by the Legislature last year to finance the 1960 Winter Olympics, which will take place in Squaw Valley, be augmented to the extent of \$4,000,000, and there has been included in the Budget provision for this additional appropriation payable, as was the initial appropriation, from the State Park Fund. It is my belief that the 1960 Winter Olympics will afford California an opportional transfer of the state Park Fund.

tunity to contribute to international goodwill and understanding and that this will greatly enhance California's prestige. It will likewise advance this State's place in the field of winter sports, and the upbuilding of this important industry as a part

of California's economy.

Two engineering firms employed by the California Olympic Commission have reported that Squaw Valley can be developed into a facility to accommodate the Winter Olympics at an outside cost of \$5,000,000 and I am advised that a substantial portion of this money can be recovered out of revenues derived from admissions. television rights and the sale or lease of the physical facilities after the games are concluded. I concur in the recommendation of the California Olympic Commission and urge the appropriation of the necessary funds to assure the success of this internationally important event.

Beach and Park Financing

All of the five-year Beach and Park Program, as well as the 1960 Winter Olympics, can be financed from the accumulated and prospective revenues derived from the beach and park share of the receipts from state lands, primarily from drilling operations in the state tidelands. In fact, if there should be a marked expansion of tideland drilling operations, with heavy bonus payments as a result of the 1955 leasing legislation, the present formula dedicating 70 percent of these proceeds for beach and park purposes could concervably provide much more money than prudently could be used for this purpose, and I am recommending that a change in the formula be made so as to continue the amounts for beach and park purposes

at approximately the present levels.

Chapter 1422, Statutes of 1945, appropriated \$15,000,000 from the General Fund for acquiring additional state parks and state beaches, with the requirement that the amounts paid from state funds be matched on an equal basis. It is now apparent that the rigid matching requirement is no longer desirable; therefore the program that the rigid matching requirement is no longer desirable; therefore the program proposed in this Budget does not require matching, although it should be made clear that donations of funds or properties to augment state outlavs for certain state beach and park purposes would still be welcome and would still serve a good purpose in advancing the State Park System. Since matching should no longer be continued as an absolute requirement, and since there are ample funds from the tideland royalties to finance the program, and since the General Fund is hard pressed to meet its obligations, this Budget includes a recommendation that the unencumbered amounts remaining in the appropriation made by Chapter 1422 of 1945, estimated at approximately \$3,200,000 as of July 1, 1956, be reverted to the General Fund.

Wild Life Conservation Program

The Wild Life Conservation Program composed of projects approved by the Wild Life Conservation Board to be financed from the continuing appropriation from t'e General Fund's share of the Horse Race License fees and construction projects for the Department of Fish and Game financed from the Fish and Game Fund are continued at substantially the same level as in the current fiscal year.

Flood Control

Feather River Project

The December floods demonstrated all too forcefully the great urgency for commencing the Feather River Project at the earliest possible moment. This project now has been thoroughly studied and reviewed. It has been found engineeringly and financially feasible by empently competent authorities both in and outside the state

service.

The Water Project Authority at its recent meeting adopted a resolution recommending that we immediately devote \$26,832,000 of state funds to begin the Feather River Project and its related San Joaquin Delta Diversion Project I am in hearty approval with this recommendation and am implementing it in this Budget You will find an item to appropriate \$5,160,000 for surveys and construction plans, for acquisition of both the Oroville and San Luis dam sites and for rights of way for the relocation of the state highway and Western Pacific Railroad. These are the

metal steps which must be accomplished before any further works can be started. The adoption of this recommended appropriation will be a commitment by the State of California to proceed without delay with the construction work of relocating the railroad and the highway. It will constitute a further commitment to follow through promptly on the construction of the Oroville Reservoir itself as the next step, involving an outlay of some \$400,000,000. It is probable that contracts could not be let for the relocation construction until July of 1957, although there is some possibility under the most favorable conditions of accelerating that date by a few weeks. We will be better informed as to progress when you reconvene next January, and if at that time it appears that construction funds should be made available for letting contracts before the expiration of the fiscal year. I shall recommend the appropriation of the construction money with an urgency clause so as to make it available well within the time for meeting the earliest possible construction dates.

Between now and your next session we should have information as to what funds we can count upon from the Federal Government and be fully prepared to proceed with action toward early completion of the entire project

Local Assistance

The State's financial aid to the Public School System will amount to \$508,034,267 in 1956-57, an increase of more than \$32,800,000 over the current year. This continues to be the largest single item of expenditure from general tax sources; it also continues to be the item involving the heaviest increase. Moreover, the projections of school attendance show a continuing rate of growth in this item for many years ahead

I have already mentioned the heavy outlay for state aid to local flood control districts. The allocation of \$13,340,500 for 1956-57 is an increase of almost \$8,500,000 over the current year's allotment

Subventions for social welfare, public health and other purposes are continuing at rates more nearly in line with the general population growth.

Altogether, including both general and special funds, the State's obligations for Local Assistance will amount to \$913,845,918, or 52.6 percent of the total budgeted expenditures.

State Fiscal Outlook

While we may take satisfaction in the fact that our state finances are in a sound current condition, with moderate reserves on which to draw to help finance the Budget for the ensuing fiscal year, we must not be fulled into undue complacency as to our future financial problems. You will observe that the proposed expenditures for the next fiscal year exceed the revenues of that year by more than \$120,000,000 from all funds, that in respect to revenues and expenditures from the General Fund and its related reserve funds, the deficiency is in excess of \$104,000,000. Unless we have a substantial further expansion in our economy we still face a day of reckonme when adjustments in either the revenue structure or the basic expenditure program must be made to attain a balanced budget

Any informed person who makes a realistic appraisal of the State's obligations and expenditure requirements will find little prospect of a substantial reduction in expenditures. Heavy increases in the costs of education are mentable as our school and college age group continues to increase. To a lesser degree, the outlands for welfare, corrections, and mental hygiene will continue to grow By one means or another our water development program must be financed and we must be presented to meet heavy orders from that finally the confidence has proposed. pared to meet heavy outlays from state funds. As our fiscal problems become more difficult the need for exercising strict economy in controlling expenditures is all the more apparent. I submit that this administration has shown a good record in this regard and point to the fact that expenditures have been held to amounts well below the amounts appropriated

Sound and prudent fiscal planning and management are most essential to continue a forward-looking State Government serving the needs of a growing population with a maximum contribution to its welfare and a minimum burden upon its economy. I welcome the assistance of all public spirited groups and citizens in formulating our

future fiscal plans.

Please be assured of my full cooperation in your consideration of the State's budget problems.

ADDRESS BY THE GOVERNOR

Governor Knight then proceeded to address the Joint Convention as follows:

Address by Governor Goodwin J. Knight

I am submitting a budget which will be financed without new or increased taxes. I will summarize the highlights now. The budget message, which you will find in the Budget document, will give detailed information.

Our current financial condition is good. We shall start the year with a substantial surplus, instead of the revenue deficiency we anticipated a year ago. Revenues are much higher than last year's estimates. Economists generally did not forecast the extent of the current business boom. Furthermore, savings have been made by careful fiscal management.

The revenue estimates in this budget for the oncoming fiscal year reflect the present high levels of economic activity, with forecasts of moderate increases based upon careful appraisal of the outlook. As in past years we have had the very valuable assistance of able economists in industry and finance in making these forecasts. Let me remind you, however, that our revenues respond very sensitively to a change in the national and state economy. An increase or decrease of only one percent means a difference of \$10,000,000 in General Fund revenues, and our estimates might be at least that much too high or too low. The budget sets aside a substantial reserve for an appropriation for flood damage rehabilitation which I am recommending.

The budget estimates expenditures for 1956-57 at \$1,736,112,983, an increase of 8.1 percent over the present year. The increase is largely the unavoidable consequence of the State's continued rapid growth.

The Assembly Committee on Ways and Means and the Senate Committee on Finance have already made a thorough review of the greater part of the budget which deals with departments and institutions of the

State Government. I am informed that these committees have found the recommended expenditures to be sound and economical. Generally they have been based upon continuing the present programs with adjustments for growth, as is the policy in budgets for interim budget session years. We cannot stand still, however, in these days of rapid development and advancement, and well justified moderate betterments are recommended for a few departments, primarily Mental Hygiene and Highway Patrol.

The operating expenditures for the University of California and the State Colleges must be greatly increased because of the very heavy increases in students. These costs will continue to mount in future years as the increase in birth rate makes itself felt in the college population.

The budget makes provision for pay increases for state employees as recommended by the State Personnel Board to bring pay for the state service into line with prevailing rates of pay in private industry and other governmental jurisdictions.

Provision is also made for a more adequate emergency fund. The demands of the flood disaster which followed an extraordinarily heavy forest fire season proved that a \$1,000,000 fund is too small to cover possible needs with any margin of safety. I recommend an emergency fund of \$2,000,000, of which \$1,000,000 would be available for the ordinary type of emergency allotments and of which \$1,000,000 would be reserved for meeting emergency needs if we should be so unfortunate as to face another disaster.

Aside from these and a few other special situations where extraordinary increases are unavoidable, the proposed expenditures are in line with the State's population growth.

The budget recommends \$358,000,000 for capital outlay for substantial progress in the state building program, highway construction, the beach and park program, the 1960 Winter Olympics, wild life conservation, flood control, and the Feather River Project.

The greater part of the state building program is devoted to more teaching facilities for the University of California and the state colleges urgently needed because of the great growth in students. Provision is also made for needed expansion for the Departments of Youth Authority, Corrections, and Mental Hygiene.

The budget of highway construction and improvements as developed by the State Highway Commission proposes outlays amounting to \$237,162,456 for 1956-57, which is a slight increase over the present level of expenditures. It is unfortunate that some \$11,000,000 which otherwise would be available for this purpose must be devoted to repairing flood damage on our State Highway System. If, however, the Congress approves the President's program for augmented federal aid to the national highway system, we can anticipate a considerable acceleration in meeting deficiencies in this State.

The budget includes a comprehensive program of beach and park acquisition and development formulated by the State Park Commission. The commission and the staff of the Division of Beaches and Parks have worked diligently to develop a well balanced program with due regard to geographic location and to the scenic, historical and recreational values of the state beach and park system. The program will not,

of course, fully meet the desires of all groups and of all localities. Questions undoubtedly will be raised both as to projects which have been included and as to others which are not in the program. In my judgment, however, the commission has developed a good program under difficult conditions and I am submitting it to you without change.

The California Olympic Commission has recommended that the initial \$1,000,000 appropriation made by the Legislature last year to finance the 1960 Winter Olympics, which will take place in Squaw Valley, be augmented to the extent of \$4,000,000, and there has been included in the budget provision for this additional appropriation payable, as was the initial appropriation, from the State Park Fund.

It is my belief that the 1960 Winter Olympics will afford California an opportunity to contribute to international good will and understanding and that this will greatly enhance California's prestige. It will likewise advance this State's place in the field of winter sports, and the upbuilding of this important industry as a part of California's

economy.

Two engineering firms employed by the California Olympic Commission have reported that Squaw Valley can be developed into a facility to accommodate the Winter Olympics at an outside cost of \$5,000,000 and I am advised that a substantial portion of this money can be recovered out of revenues derived from admissions, television rights and the sale or lease of the physical facilities after the games are concluded. I concur in the recommendation of the California Olympic Commission and urge the appropriation of the necessary funds to assure the success of this internationally important event.

Beach and Park Financing

All of the five-year beach and park program, as well as the 1960 Winter Olympics, can be financed from the accumulated and prospective revenues derived from the beach and park share of the receipts from state lands, primarily from drilling operations in the state tide lands. In fact, if there should be a marked expansion of tide land drilling operations, with heavy bonus payments as a result of the 1955 leasing legislation, the present formula dedicating 70 percent of these proceeds for beach and park purposes could conceivably provide much more money than prudently could be used for this purpose, and I am recommending that a change in the formula be made so as to continue the amounts for beach and park purposes at approximately the present levels.

Chapter 1422, Statutes of 1945, appropriated \$15,000,000 from the General Fund for acquiring additional state parks and state beaches, with the requirement that the amounts paid from state funds be matched on an equal basis. It is now apparent that the rigid matching requirement is no longer desirable; therefore the program proposed in this budget does not require matching, although it should be made clear that donations of funds or properties to augment state outlays for certain state beach and park purposes would still be welcome and would still serve a good purpose in advancing the State Park System. Since matching should no longer be continued as an absolute requirement, and since there are ample funds from the tide land royalties to finance the program, and since the General Fund is hard pressed to meet its obligations, this budget includes a recommendation that the

unencumbered amounts remaining in the appropriation made by Chapter 1422 of 1945, estimated at approximately \$3,200,000 as of July 1, 1956, be reverted to the General Fund.

Wild Life Conservation Program

The wild life conservation program composed of projects approved by the Wild Life Conservation Board to be financed from the continuing appropriation from the General Fund's share of the horse race license fees and construction projects for the Department of Fish and Game financed from the Fish and Game Fund are continued at substantially the same level as in the current fiscal year.

Flood Control

The budget proposes an appropriation from the General Fund of \$2,300,000 for financing the State's share of works scheduled for 1956-57 in the Sacramento River Flood Control Project and the San Joaquin River Flood Control Project. In addition, under local assistance, there is an allocation of \$13,340,500 to the flood control districts in Los Angeles, Sonoma, Riverside, San Bernardino and Contra Costa Counties.

Feather River Project

The December floods demonstrated all to forcefully the great urgency for commencing the Feather River Project at the earliest possible moment. This project now has been thoroughly studied and reviewed. It has been found engineeringly and financially feasible by eminently competent authorities both in and outside the state service.

The Water Project Authority at its recent meeting adopted a resolution recommending that we immediately devote \$26,832,000 of state funds to begin the Feather River Project and its related San Joaquin Delta Diversion Project. I am in hearty approval with this recommendation and am implementing it in this budget. You will find an item to appropriate \$5,160,000 for surveys and construction plans, for acquisition of both the Oroville and San Luis dam sites and for rights of way for the relocation of the state highway and Western Pacific Railroad. These are the initial steps which must be accomplished before any further works can be started.

The adoption of this recommended appropriation will be a commitment by the State of California to proceed without delay with the construction work of relocating the railroad and the highway. It will constitute a further commitment to follow through promptly on the construction of the Oroville Reservoir itself as the next step, involving an outlay of some \$400,000,000 It is probable that contracts could not be let for the relocation construction until July of 1957, although there is some possibility under the most favorable conditions of accelerating that date by a few weeks. We will be better informed as to progress when you reconvene next January, and if at that time it appears that construction funds should be made available for letting contracts before the expiration of the fiscal year, I shall recommend the appropriation of the construction money with an urgency clause so as to make it available well within the time for meeting the earliest possible construction dates.

Between now and your next session we should have information as to what funds we can count upon from the Federal Government and be fully prepared to proceed with action toward early completion of the entire project.

Local Assistance

The State's financial aid to the Public School System will amount to \$508,034,267 in 1956-57, an increase of more than \$32,800,000 over the current year. This continues to be the largest single item of expenditure from general tax sources, it also continues to be the item involving the heaviest increase. Moreover, the projections of school attendance show a continuing rate of growth in this item for many years ahead.

I have already mentioned the heavy outlay for state aid to local flood control districts. The allocation of \$13,340,500 for 1956-57 is an increase of almost \$9,000,000 over the current year's allotment.

Subventions for social welfare, public health and other purposes are continuing at rates more nearly in line with the general population growth.

Altogether, including both general and special funds, the State's obligations for local assistance will amount to \$913,845,918, or 526 per cent of the total budgeted expenditures.

State Fiscal Outlook

While we may take satisfaction in the fact that our state finances are in a sound current condition, with moderate reserves on which to draw to help finance the budget for the ensuing fiscal year, we must not be lulled into undue complacency as to our future financial problems. You will observe that the proposed expenditures for next fiscal year exceed the revenues of that year by more than \$120,000,000 from all funds, that in respect to revenues and expenditures from the General Fund and its related reserve funds, the deficiency is in excess of \$104,000,000. Unless we have a substantial further expansion in our economy we still face a day of reckoning when adjustments in either the revenue structure or the basic expenditure program must be made to attain a balanced budget

Any informed person who makes a realistic appraisal of the State's obligations and expenditure requirements will find little prospect of a substantial reduction in expenditures. Heavy increases in the costs of education are inevitable as our school and college age group continues to increase To a lesser degree, the outlays for welfare, corrections, and mental hygiene will continue to grow. By one means or another our water development program must be financed and we must be prepared to meet heavy outlays from state funds. As our fiscal problems become more difficult the need for exercising strict economy in controlling expenditures is all the more apparent I submit that this administration has shown a good record in this regard and point to the fact that expenditures have been held to amounts well below the amounts appropriated.

Sound and prudent fiscal planning and management are most essential to continue a forward-looking State Government serving the needs of a growing population with a maximum contribution to its welfare

and a minimum burden upon its economy. I welcome the assistance of all public spirited groups and citizens in formulating our future fiscal plans.

First Extraordinary Session

In addition to the budget duties imposed upon you by the Constitution, there will be placed before you for consideration a number of items in an extraordinary session which I have called to run concurrently with this regular budget session.

Most of the special session proposals which you will have before you will relate to inequities or shortcomings in existing statutes, and will require little time or effort. There are, however, emergency subjects of major importance which should not endure another year of delay

before being presented to you for your attention.

Requests have been made of me for the inclusion of several hundred items for your consideration at this time. Most of them possess merit, of course, and it is regrettable that all of them cannot be offered to you for study at this time. However, it is not the intention of the people to convert the budget session of the Legislature into a modified general session, so most of the requested items must wait to receive the consideration they merit at the regular session 10 months hence.

You have been informed on details of the special session items through the formal proclamation which I have previously issued. One of them, however, is of paramount importance to the people of Cali-

fornia and merits further discussion at this time.

This is the subject of creation of a State Department of Water Resources—the formation of a single and separate agency in the framework of our State Government which will enable the State to chart a course of water conservation and development, and flood control, far into the future.

With most of the divergent views on the subject apparently reconciled, this Legislature possesses the rare opportunity of establishing a blueprint for the future prosperity, health and happiness of all of the people of the State of California, and I urge your sincere and earnest consideration of this vital proposal.

The program for the creation of this single water department represents more than 100 years of experience by previous Legislatures and some of the best minds of California. They have struggled with the complexities of this problem in an effort to resolve it to the general satisfaction of all segments of our population,

For the first time we appear to have reached a point where a water resources program can be planned and executed that will enable us to correct the inequaties imposed on us by nature in the distribution of water to all parts of California We have the opportunity to implement the California water plan with an organizational structure which will be strong enough to bear the weight of the burden placed upon it.

To gain that strength we must first eliminate our basic weaknesses. The principal weakness—and it is the one that has plagued our water resources development program for the past century—lies in the great body of California water law that is now administered by a scattered organizational framework imperfectly covered by a patchwork of administrative fabric.

These agencies have functioned with the best interests of the people as their objectives, and their staff members have diligently and faithfully executed the laws, the rules and the regulations entrusted into their care, considering the limitations and difficulties that they have worked under.

But there has been an absence, in some instances, of direct control by the people over some of their functions. There is considerable evidence of a lack of cooperation and coordination among them, as well as needless and costly duplication of effort.

This Legislature will be asked to place all agencies within our State Government, that now, in any form or manner, perform functions associated with the conservation or development of our water resources, or flood control, under one administrative roof within the jurisdiction of the proposed State Department of Water Resources.

I would like to emphasize, at this point, that in making these transfers, the agencies now functioning should not be stripped of their present responsibilities, nor should their personnel be dispersed. They could retain their present agency names, and their entire staffs, so long as they operate under the direction of the new department. In this manner we will achieve the desired objective of having a single department charged with the responsibility of developing our water program, and enable its director to function with the valuable assistance of the experience and training possessed by state employees who have devoted their talents to this phase of governmental operations. In this manner the new dapartment could begin functioning overnight without experiencing a time loss generally associated with reshuffling of responsibilities and shifting of personnel.

California is indebted to all those who, over the years, have devoted so much of their time and effort to solving our water problems. In the plan to create a new water department, several interim and standing committees of the Legislature, notably the Assembly Interim Committee on Government Organization; the Assembly Interim Committee on Conservation, Planning, and Public Works; and the Senate Joint Interim Committee on Water Problems, among others, have advanced formation of the suggested single water agency to the point where most of the divergent views have been reconciled, and where the few remaining points of difference are susceptible of rapid determination by legislative action. The extraordinary session of this Legislature can implement their work by the enactment of workable legislation.

At this special session I have also placed before you a proposal providing for the rehabilitation of public facilities damaged by the recent ravishing floods. All types of public properties, including state, city, county and other locally owned facilities, have been damaged in varying degree by the recent uncontrolled flood waters in 53 of our 58 counties. These properties include roads and highways, public sanitation facilities, levees, draining systems, bridges, schools and other public buildings.

While the Federal Government, through the Office of Civil Defense and the Army Corps of Engineers, has extended generous aid to the flood-stricken areas, and the State has assisted to the limit of available funds under my jurisdiction, there still remains a large part of the problem of assisting in repair of the damage done by the floods and

the task of restoring normal operations.

The California Highway Commission already has allocated more than \$11,000,000 for rehabilitation work on state highways in the flooded areas. This allocation includes some \$4,000,000 in emergency federal aid for which application has been made, but for which appropriations have not yet been made by the Congress. We will not know for some time the full over-all effect of the winter's flood damage on the state highway program. It is obvious, however, that necessary expenditures for flood damage repairs will mean less funds available for new construction in the future.

In the case of city, county and other locally owned agencies, many of them are financially unable to take care of the repairs or replacement of their installations damaged or destroyed by flood waters. While this is primarily the responsibility of these political subdivisions I recommend that the Legislature appropriate sufficient funds for grants to them on a matching basis to assist in necessary rehabilitation work. I further recommend that the Legislature authorize loans to any of these agencies that are financially impoverished to take care of as much of their matching contribution as may be necessary, with these loans to be repaid over a period of years.

The Feather River Project, the San Luis Project, flood control, flood damage rehabilitation, and revision of the formula for distributing of tidelands revenues, are closely interwoven factors in the governmental and financial structure we plan to construct, and which we believe will enable us to proceed, without further delay, in the paramount work of conserving, developing and controlling our California water supply.

During my tenure as Governor I have enjoyed most amicable relations with both houses of our Legislature. I am looking forward to working closely with all of you again during this session, and in the years to come.

INTRODUCTIONS

PROBLEMS OF THE LOWER KLAMATH RIVER

Report to the Legislature Pursuant to House Resolution No. 240—1955

INTRODUCTION

The committee takes this opportunity to express its appreciation and gratitude for the efforts extended and the services afforded by the following, which were so effective in helping to make successful the committee's investigation trip on the lower Klamath River on August 27, 1955, and the committee's meeting and hearing in Eureka on August 29, 1955.

Mayor George C Jacobs, through whose courtesy the committee was able to make use of the Carson Memorial Auditorium for its hearing. The Klamath Chamber of Commerce, through whose good offices the committee's boat trip up the Klamath River was made possible. Radio station KIEM, which recorded the committee's meeting on August 29th.

The Eureka Chamber of Commerce, the North Coast Council of the State Chamber of Commerce, members of the California Department of Fish and Game, and the many individuals who presented testimony at the hearing.

SUMMARY

Delineation of the Problems and Scope of the Report

For a number of years there has been developing a controversy between sports fishermen, catching salmon and steelhead, and loggers using the lower 30 to 35 miles of the Klamath River for rafting logs down river to the Town of Klamath for reloading on to trucks. The sportsmen have contended that the river was being contaminated and polluted by bark from the logs to the extent that the water was becoming untenable for fish life and that the rafting of logs during low water disturbed the river bottom in the shallower places and thereby destroyed potential spawning grounds. The loggers, on the other hand, contended that by their practices very little bark remained in the river and that log rafting could not destroy spawning grounds in the shallower parts of the river because no appreciable spawning ever took place on the lower reaches of the river but that instead most of it took place on the upper reaches or the tributary streams. This report covers a trip made by the committee on August 27th from the mouth of the Klamath River to a point approximately 32 miles above the mouth, during which the committee was able to observe conditions and take note of various activities on the river. The report also covers a hearing held by the committee on August 29th in the City of Eureka which was well attended both by the public and by individuals offering testimony relative to the problems.

Findings

- 1. Much of the logging area adjacent to the lower Klamath River is not served by roads linked to the State Highway System which would permit the hauling of logs directly by truck.
- 2. The movement of logs from the area adjacent to the lower Klamath River by means of rafting on the river is the most economical method available.
- 3. All log dumping and reloading points have installed some method of removing the bark from the river. This is accomplished by bark traps and screens or by weirs or wing dams from which the bark is periodically removed and burned on shore.
- 4. The logging industry has banded together to provide a river patroling system which secures run-away logs and reports stranded logs to a contract pickup service which assures the removal of these hazards as soon as possible.
- 5. The logging industry has agreed to abstain from rafting on certain days so that fishermen can pursue their sport without interference on those days.
- 6. Some of the loggers are "cold decking" wherever and whenever economically feasible.
- 7. The appropriate experts of the California Department of Fish and Game have stated unequivocally that there is insufficient bark in the river to be considered a menace to fish life by pollution or contamination.

- 8. The California Department of Fish and Game has stated that there is no spawning of any consequence on the lower Klamath River, but that instead the fish spawn in the upper parts of the tributaries to the river.
- 9. The California Department of Fish and Game has stated that a potential danger to fish life in the river exists on the tributaries by virtue of logging practices which tend to destroy the spawning grounds.
- 10. Since much of the fishing on the river is done by casting from the banks, the passage of sports boats up and down the river apparently causes more interference and ill-feeling than does the passage of log rafts.
- 11. There is some evidence that certain sportsmen "hog" the available space on the sand bar at the mouth of the Klamath River from which some of the best fishing in the river is to be had.
- 12. Since the lower Klamath River is, by law, a navigable waterway, the United States Corps of Engineers is the only agency having jurisdiction on the use of the river for navigational purposes, which includes log rafting.
- 13. The State Lands Commission has no jurisdiction over the river itself, but may grant permits for dumping and reloading stations on those portions of the banks of the river which are owned by the State.
- 14. The lumbering industry in the vicinity of the Klamath River represents a major factor which is vital to the economy of the region.
- 15. Sport fishing on the Klamath River also represents a factor which is of some importance to the economy of the region, but apparently not as great as the logging industry.
- 16. There is considerable evidence that the two factions involved are gradually finding solutions to their mutual problems by voluntary and cooperative action.
- 17. Since the committee's hearing in Eureka in August of 1955, the disastrous floods at the end of December of 1955 have radically changed the situation on the lower Klamath River by the destruction of all of the log dumps, the reloads, and the weirs. The floods were of such magnitude as to strip clean the banks on both sides of the river. This places the loggers in the position of being able to start from "scratch" so that they will be able to follow standard and agreed to procedures in every case where a log dump or reload is to be built.

Recommendations

It is the consensus of the committee that there is no clear-cut evidence to indicate that log rafting on the lower Klamath River is presently causing injurious effects to the salmon and steelhead fishery. Neither is there evidence that log rafting in its present form constitutes a potential danger to the fishery in the future.

The committee finds that there exists an attitude of sincere desire to cooperate on the part of responsible parties in both the logging industry and the sport fishing brotherhood to eradicate or at least to minimize as much as possible the causes of friction between the two factions. Consequently, this committee believes that no situation exists which requires remedy or alleviation by legislative means at this time. The committee recommends instead an additional period of watching and waiting to see what develops further from the cooperative efforts of the two factions.

In view of the fact that the logging industry will now have to start anew to develop facilities on the river, the committee recommends that the spokesmen for the logging industry and the spokesmen for the sport fishermen continue their sincere efforts to explore every avenue of cooperation with a view to further eliminating and minimizing the areas of friction between the two groups, particularly that acceptable standards for the design and construction of log dumps and log reloads be established, the acceptance of which would be a prerequisite to the issuance of a use permit by the State Lands Commission. In this manner the problem could be properly policed from the start.

The committee also recommends that the State Lands Commission and the State Department of Fish and Game take an active part in assisting in the establishment of the necessary standards of the design and construction of the facilities, as well as their ultimate operation.

The committee also recommends that the Department of Fish and Game be instructed to bend every effort towards assisting the two groups in finding mutually acceptable solutions to their problems. Furthermore, that the department continue to keep the area under surveillance in order that it may become aware, at the earliest possible time, of any change that may take place in the situation which could become in any way detrimental to the sport fishery on the lower river.

The committee also recommends to the Legislature that it undertake further investigations into the very serious problem of small stream and tributary pollution, contamination and destruction by improper and careless logging and other practices. Toward the same end it is believed that the California Department of Fish and Game should increase its efforts in the direction of more adequate enforcement of existing laws and regulations dealing with the problem and that it undertake more extensive investigations and studies to determine the best possible methods of control of the problem in the future, as well as correcting such damage as has already occurred.

In connection with the foregoing recommendation, the committee further recommends that this committee hold a hearing in the late summer or early fall of 1956 with the State Department of Fish and Game and the California Division of Forestry in attendance to determine the best methods of proceeding in the direction of legislation to strengthen and improve present regulations with regard to stream pollution. If possible the United States Forest Service should also be invited so that it may air its views on the subject and provide information as to federal practices in this field.

Narrative of the Committee's Klamath River Trip

On Saturday, August 27. 1955, this committee was joined by members of the Assembly Committee on Conservation, Planning, and Public Works, for a day-long trip on the Klamath River. The members embarked at the Town of Klamath in a number of small outboard motor boats and one inboard "tunnel boat" The trip first went down river towards the actual mouth to view the sand bar which occludes most of the river mouth at that time of the year and from which sport fishermen, standing almost shoulder to shoulder, were casting for salmon and steelhead. Several reload stations were viewed in operation, showing bark traps and in some cases conveyor belts for removing the bark from the traps onto the bank.

The convoy then started up river, in the course of which a number of log rafts, under tow, were encountered. The water level at this time was comparatively low and in some cases log rafts were found hung up in the shallower reaches of the river with the tow boats attempting to break them loose under maximum power effort. In every case, the rafts were finally dislodged but in the process the heavy logs in the rafts, which were primarily responsible for the snagging, caused a certain amount of gouging of the river bed which was visible as a brown discoloration in the water at that point.

Along the route the convoy first stopped to view some of the reload installations on both banks just above the Town of Klamath. Here, too, it was noted that there were bark traps, wing dams and weirs in operation. Further on up the river the convoy stopped to view landing points or dumps to which the logs were hauled from the woods by trucks and where they were sometimes debarked and then formed into rafts for the trip down river. At these points also it was noted that slack water areas were created by wing dams and weirs which were designed both to provide quiet water in which to assemble the logs into rafts and to act as bark traps

At various points along the river, on both banks, from time to time it was noted that run-away logs had become lodged. In some cases these logs had been caught aftoat by the patrol and pulled in and anchored to the shore. In other cases these logs were simply stranded when the river level fell. The committee was informed that these individual logs primarily were strays that had broken loose from rafts, although occasionally they may have floated away from a landing. Since the day of the trip was Saturday, there was no visible activity with respect to the removal of these logs by the organization under contract to the logging industry. However, the committee was assured that these logs were removed periodically and that every effort was made to assure that they would not be left to float free and become navigational menaces.

During the course of the trip up river, which reaches a point approximately 35 miles above the mouth, the committee had the opportunity to see numerous fishermen casting from both banks, generally concentrated along the deeper and quieter reaches of the river. At the same time, there were many outboard power boats in evidence either moving up and down the river or trolling. In a number of instances it was noted that the passage of these small boats interfered with lines cast from the shore

The committee noted during the trip that occasional pieces of floating bark were encountered. In some cases the bark was partially submerged so as to be a menace to the shear pins of the outboard motors. In fact, some of the boats in the convoy suffered several sheared pins during the course of the trip. The committee recognized the fact that the floating bark was one of the factors causing friction between the loggers and the sports fishermen, primarily because of the annoyance of sheared pins. However, there did not appear to be a sufficient amount of floating bark in the main river channel to constitute a contaminating danger to fish life.

The committee spent the entire day on the river stopping for lunch along the route at Blue Creek Lodge.

On the following day, Sunday, August 28, 1955, several members of the committee were taken on a tour of logging "shows" in the area immediately adjacent to the river. The tour was under the guidance of several of the local Department of Fish and Game warden personnel. These members had the opportunity to see small creeks and streams completely obliterated, in some cases, by earth moved into the stream bed to form a "cat" roadway and in other cases by being choked with logging debris. Some of the damage was current and being caused by active logging "shows." On the other hand some of the damage viewed was of very long standing, particularly where the streams had been clogged by redwood slash and debris the damage had remained over many years, since redwood decays and deteriorates very slowly.

The members of the committee viewing this damage expressed the thought that the potential threat to the fish life of the river was very great and that corrective action was urgently needed.

Highlights of Testimony Given at Committee Hearing on August 29, 1955

The following are not verbatim excerpts. They represent instead the gist of remarks made by various individuals.

Mr. Carl Anderson, representing the Association of Northern California Loggers and the Klamath River Industries Association: The Klamath River Industries Association has made an agreement to voluntarily purchase a patrol boat and hire an operator to make daily trips of inspection up the river and to insure that all logs were picked up immediately upon escape from rafts The cost of this service would be borne by the member loggers of the association. The agreement required the loggers to install bark traps at the log dumps and reloads and to operate the tow boats in such a manner as not to interfere with the sports fishermen. — — The loggers are doing everything that had been agreed to and most of the problems have been settled to everyone's satisfaction, thus appeasing the sportsmen and at the same time maintaining the vital lumber industry.

In the event of violations the association calls upon the U. S. Corps of Engineers, the enforcement group of the association, and the State Lands Commission who issue warnings and instructions or take other actions as necessary. The patrol of the river does not extend into the tributaries. — — Rafting is the most economical way to bring the logs down the river. However, if roads were built a good percentage of the logs would be trucked out of the woods instead of being rafted down river.

- Mr. V. M. Moir, representing the State Chamber of Commerce: A special study committee has been selected from the logging industry to investigate log rafting and its effect on fish life. This committee, together with members of the Fish and Game Commission, members of the staff of the Department of Fish and Game and representatives of the Forest Products Industries, after making a thorough investigation of the Trinity-Klamath Watershed, believe that present laws, if properly enforced, would take care of damage to the tributary streams.
- $Mr.\ E.\ Larry\ Myers\ of\ Klamath:$ The river is cleaner than it has been for several years; furthermore, there has been a special effort made to see that it was clean last Saturday (the day of the committee's trip) as far as practical. There is much to be desired yet in the

way of improvement, despite the expense and the effort put forth by the logging industry. Much remains to be accomplished if the recreational value of the fishery is to be preserved and if the lives of the people using the river for recreational purposes are to be protected.

The condition of the tributaries was a disgrace to the logging industry and a terrific economic loss to the people of the State of California.

Mr. Paul Vredenberg, representing the United States Army Engineers: The U. S. Army Engineers consider log rafting as a legitimate aspect of navigation. Insofar as federal laws are concerned, the organization can administer the function only on its navigational value. —— The Corps of Engineers prefers to deal with the loggers on an individual, personal basis, rather than to enter into legal proceedings with regard to removing stray logs from the river. Thus far the Corps of Engineers has received a great degree of cooperation from the loggers. —— In considering navigational control of the river fish life is not taken into account by the Corps of Engineers since it has no navigational connotations.

Three wing dams have been built on the river without authority from the Corps of Engineers. These dams destroyed some of the riffles. -- The application for the dredging of a riffle is put on public notice by the Corps of Engineers normally for 30 days to allow all interested parties to enter any comments or protests as desired. The notice is also referred to the State Lands Commission in Los Angeles, which would generally raise no objections if the dredging is in the interests of navigation. -- Objections raised by sports fishing representatives would not alter decisions made by the Corps unless they affected navigation.

Mr. J. Stuart Watson, representing the State Lands Commission: The Legislature has delegated to the State Lands Commission the management of the sovereign lands of the State, which include the Klamath River. —— The Legislature has also declared the Klamath River navigable to its junction with the Shasta River which is about 10 miles below the Copco Dam.

The State Lands Commission and the U. S. Corps of Engineers have concurrently issued permits for 10 or 12 log dumps in the upper reaches of the lower river and five reloads in the lower reaches of the river. Permits are based on specific plans submitted which cover the amount of navigable waters of the State to be occupied, the inclusion of a bark trap, the guarantee that when operations are over the project will be removed from the river, and a rental for the land occupied payable to the State based on a minimum of \$100 per year per operation, or 6.6 percent of the appraised value of the land, whichever is higher.

The only function that the State Lands Commission has in regard to dredging operations is to require that the one doing the dredging, after receiving a Corps of Engineers permit, deposit the spoils in such manner as seems most beneficial for all concerned. ——— The State Lands Commission has no authority to order a channel dredged or to deny the right to dredge one. In practice, applications for dredging operations which have been filed with the Corps of Engineers are subsequently filed with the State Lands Commission which in turn indicates to the Corps of Engineers that it has no objections. The only consideration given to a dredging operation both by the Corps of Engineers and the State Lands Commission is its effect on navigation

and not its effect on fishing or other public use purposes. -- In any case the action of the Corps of Engineers takes precedence over any actions of the State Lands Commission insofar as navigation is concerned

The States Lands Commission does not have the responsibility or duty to control navigation on the Klamath River. The Corps of Engineers has that authority but lacks the funds for the purpose and, consequently, policing functions for the Corps of Engineers is performed by the Coast Guard. In turn the Coast Guard, at present, lacks sufficient funds to patrol the Klamath River. An amount of \$15,000 would be required by the Coast Guard to adequately patrol the river, particularly during the six months critical period. Consequently, there is no inspection made by the Coast Guard at the present time.

The tributaries to the Klamath River are not considered sovereign lands of the State, if they are not navigable, and therefore do not come under the jurisdiction of the State Lands Commission. The United States, in its public lands surveys, when it designates the meander lines of a stream considers that a determination that the stream is navigable. On the other hand, if the lands are surveyed to the middle of the stream from both sides, then the State does not have ownership of the bed of that stream or creek.

- Mr. R. F. Denbo, Manager, Humboldt County and Eureka Chambers of Commerce: The two Chambers believe that the Klamath River must be used for navigation and fishing, even in the event that a highway is put on either or both sides of the river. ——— Seventy to seventy-five percent of the economy of this particular area depends on lumber, about 8 or 9 percent depends on commercial fishing and the rest of it depends on agriculture and tourists.
- Mr. Bradley Page, Secretary-Manager, Del Norte Chamber of Commerce: The Klamath River can be used to advantage by both logging enterprises and recreational enthusiasts. These lumbering operators have made sincere attempts to clean up the river and to insure a clean operation. ——— It is acknowledged that there is an area of a great difference of opinion between the logging interests and the sportsmen. However, the loggers have made a greater effort towards compromising the problems than have the representatives of the sportsmen.
- Mr. F. MacRae Thomson, representing the Paragon Plywood Company: The lumbering industry is making sincere efforts to keep the Klamath River clean and to police it according to the agreement entered into. ——— Efforts have been made to curtail operations to a certain extent during the 1955 year. At the time of the meeting there were 3 million board feet of logs cold decked at one point. This is a sufficient number of logs to make 60 rafts and represents a costly operation for the logger.

Mr. Elmer Mycrs, representing the Klamath Chamber of Commerce: The logging industry is of great importance to the Klamath area and does not present a great nuisance to fishing. —— The annoyances caused by log-rafting operations do not exceed the annoyance created by drift fishing and the passing of small sports craft. —— Permits should be issued for the channeling or dredging of certain riffles under the direction and supervision of the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers sufficient to permit navigation by small sports craft as well as log rafts and two boats. This work should be completed before July 1st of each year.

Dr. Everett Watkins, President, North Coast Conservation Council and representing the California Wildlife Federation: The sportsmen believe that over a long run revenues from sportsmen and from the fishing industry would far exceed that of the lumber industry. ——— The North Coast Conservation Council and the California Wildlife Federation do not feel that self-policing by the logging industry is effective or workable and to date there have been no stringent actions taken against non-conformers. ——— Some of the members of the Klamath River timber industries have made a sincere effort to make fishing and log rafting compatible. The others have done anything they felt necessary to get logs down the river with no regard or respect for their written agreement.

The following is recommended:

- 1. Legislation which would prevent any altering of the depth, flow and width of riffles by any means, whether by the use of wing dams, logs, dredging by tractor, or deepening channels by dragging heavy rafts through riffles.
- 2. The construction of an access road down the Klamath River from Johnsons to Klamath.
- 3. Legislation which would require a screening strip 50 feet wide along all feeder streams.

Fluctuation of the water in the river presents a very acute problem inasmuch as it might leave many small fry, migrating back down stream towards the ocean, stranded on the banks. Such stranding is also caused by washes from passing boats. —— There are laws that control the speed of operating boats on the river but there is no authority to police these laws. —— A great deal has been accomplished in the last 12 months by the lumbering industry in resolving the problems which were in controversy between it and the fishermen.

water. Such matter, incidental to the logging industry, would be sawdust, slabs, edgings and possibly excesses of bark. -- The department has objected to dredging operations in the past on the basis that dredging changes the fish's habitat and that such changes could very easily adversely affect the fish life However, the department's recommendation against dredging was ignored by the Corps of Engineers on the basis that such dredging did not adversely affect navigation.

The department, at the request of sportsmen, made an investigation of the Klamath River and found that out of 13 active sites in 32 miles of water, only two were considered generally satisfactory concerning their use of bark traps, bark screens, and bark disposals. Floating bark was found in moderate to light quantities, except at Pecwan, where a considerable amount was encountered. Ten wing dams were observed, of which one had completely changed the usual channel at a certain riffle.

The California Department of Fish and Game is installing and maintaining screens in the feeder streams on the upper reaches of the Shasta River where diversions for irrigation take place. The department is going to meter fish into the natural spawning area above Hornbrook and any excesses over that which can be properly utilized in the spawning grounds will be taken to the Mount Shasta hatchery where they will be hatched and released as fry back into the river.

The department is endeavoring, as much as possible, to maintain the tributary streams in an operating condition by trying to keep them clear and by trying to enforce the laws to prevent the clogging of streams or by actually clearing the streams at the expense of the department. — — The department feels that from information available to it, there are methods of logging that would prevent or greatly minimize the actual clogging of streams by dirt and debris. This could be done either by leaving buffer strips along the streams or employing methods to keep debris from accumulating.

Present fines assessed against violators who clog the streams are considered very trivial as compared to the actual damage done. — — One hundred thousand dollars allocated to this area for stream clearance by the Fish and Wildlife Conservation Board could be money well spent, especially from the point of experience gained from certain pilot clearances — — Even if all tributary streams were cleared it is very possible that a salmon hatchery would have to be constructed anyway to make up for the amount of salmon spawning grounds lost by the construction of the Copco Dam.

Dr. Richard Croker, representing the Department of Fish and Game: Practically all the spawning in the Klamath River is in its tributaries, virtually none taking place in the area where the log rafting occurs. This is true of both salmon and steelhead. However, the department is interested in the lower part of the Klamath River because it is the main channel by which the salmon and steelhead migrate to the upstream and tributary spawning areas and by which the fingerlings come down to the ocean.

Mr. Jack Morris (Operator of a fishing resort on the Klamath River): The State of Oregon has progressed much further with its laws in protecting fish and fishing than has the State of California in

correlation with the logging industry. -- The logging industry is not doing everything possible to minimize danger to fish life.

Mr. Bill Shackleton, representing State and Regional Water Pollution Control Board: In order for the board to take action they must be able to show an impairment of the quality of the waters of the Klamath River. ——— To date the board has not been able to establish a pollution, as that term applies, as defined by the Attorney General. In any case, the board cannot tell the operators to make corrections, that is to say they cannot designate the methods, type, design, et cetera The board can only define the conditions that must be maintained in the discharge area. ——— The Water Pollution Control Board has no jurisdiction over the navigation on the river nor any control over the amount of water released from Copco Lake.

The Water Pollution Control Board works in close coordination with the Fish and Game Department to help effect fish and game codes. The board also works closely with the State Lands Commission and local water pollution control boards. In the event of a complaint, an inspection is made by the State Pollution Control Board within five or six days after receipt of the complaint. Conditions on the Klamath in general are considered very good and the board is pleased with the cooperation that it is receiving from the loggers.

Princess Lowana Brantner, representing the Yurok Tribe of Indians: According to the records of the Indians there was a great deal of spawning in the lower Klamath of every type of fish that uses that habitat. ——— The steelhead go into the tributaries as well. ——— The Indians have noted many natural spawning grounds being ruined by the logging in the area but they have recognized that lumbering is necessary and vital to their well-being and economic stability. ——— The Indians are not against the logging industry but against bad logging practices.

Gentlemen: Pursuant to House Resolution No 189, 1955 Session of the California Legislature, your Assembly Interim Committee on Agriculture submits a preliminary report covering the functions and activities of its Subcommittee on Fairs and Expositions.

The subcommittee set forth five principal objectives to study during the interim. These included a study to improve county and district fairs for both participants and spectators in such areas as educational features of the whole fair program; the role of youth, particularly their participation in vocational-industrial education phases of the fair program; and the physical condition of fairgrounds and facilities.

The subcommittee also undertook a continuing study to assure that an equitable basis is established for allocating state funds to individual

fairs.

The subcommittee had as another of its objectives the study of the relationships between various agencies of State Government and county and district fairs and their affect on fair management, and to recommend such corrective legislation as may be required.

Upon adjournment of the 1955 Session, two Assembly Bills, Nos.

2486 and 3460, were referred to the committee for study.

The preliminary findings of the subcommittee are set forth in the pages of this report.

Due to the magnitude of the projects and the elements of time, the subcommittee submits the scope of activities which they deem important to study during the remainder of the interim. These include:

1. Investigate relationships between the state agencies and boards of directors of county and district fairs.

2. Investigate relationships between various state agencies as they affect management of county and district fairs.

3. Hold hearings on Assembly Bills Nos. 2486 and 3460.

4. Review work of Classifications Committee to determine that it coincides with legislative policy and that it establishes an equitable basis for allocating state funds to individual fairs.

5. Review the construction program now under way on the grounds of the Sixth Agricultural District, Los Angeles.

6. Continue pilot studies of vocational-industrial educational projects.

7. Review the financial conditions of all fairs and submit such find-

ings in the final report.

In submitting this preliminary report, the committee is desirous of objectively informing Members of the Legislature of its findings to date. It is also the desire of the chairman of the subcommittee to open the agenda to other subjects as necessity and time permit during the remainder of the interim.

The subcommittee will welcome any suggestions on the subject from Members of the Assembly.

DEAR Mr. CLARKE: Your Subcommittee on Fairs and Expositions, acting under the authority of your appointment, undertook five major objectives for study during the interim.

The subjects under study are of such wide scope it was impossible to cover all of the objectives on the subcommittee's agenda during the present interim. However, the subcommittee is desirous of informing the Members of the Legislature of the progress made on the various subjects under study and submits its preliminary report on the following pages.

At the outset, the members of the subcommittee were asked by Chairman Brown to familiarize themselves with the operations of district and county fairs-not only in their own districts but by visiting and comparing various fairs throughout the State.

A questionnaire was prepared for the subcommittee members to fill out upon visiting each fair in order that they, themselves, might compare one fair with another and be conversant with the problems with which the subcommittee would deal during the interim. The results of this questionnaire are summarized in the body of the report.

The subcommittee is grateful to the Division of Fairs and Expositions of the State Department of Finance for furnishing certain facts and figures contained in this report, and for the several studies now under way by it in connection with the five-year master plan of proposed operational procedures and need for capital investment funds.

The subcommittee is also indebted to the boards of directors and managers of various district and county fairs, and to the Western Fairs Association, for their splendid cooperation in connection with the studies being undertaken.

House Resolution No. 14

Relative to the creation of the Assembly Legislative Process Committee

Whereas, Many of the legislative proposals involve problems within the jurisdiction of more than one standing committee of the Assembly, and the adequate consideration of such measures requires the cooperation of such several committees in order to avoid duplicating the work of one such committee by another, and much delay in the legislative process could be avoided if it were possible to eliminate such duplication of effort and provide a means for expediting the consideration of

such measures; and Whereas, There is need for a committee equipped to ascertain facts and secure facts and information upon assigned topics from time to time during the session, a committee acting in aid of and in collaboration with the several standing com-

mittees of the Assembly; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the Assembly of the State of California, As follows:

1. The Assembly Legislative Process Committee is hereby created as an Assembly investigating committee of this session. The committee is authorized to make such studies and to take such steps as may be necessary to coordinate the work of the various standing committees of this session in considering questions before such session in order that there be no duplication of work or effort, and to make such studies as may be necessary, ascertain such facts and information, and secure such statistics for the use of the Members and committees of the Assembly as may be of

aid to them in considering and acting upon legislative proposals at this session.

2. The committee shall consist of the members of the Rules Committee. The Chairman of the Rules Committee shall be Chairman of the Legislative Process

Committee.

3. The committee is authorized to act during this session of the Legislature, including any recess, but not after final adjournment, with authority to file a final report not later than the last legislative day of said session.

4. The committee and its members shall have and exercise all of the rights, duties

and powers conferred upon investigating committees and their members by the provisions of the Joint Rules of the Senate and Assembly and of the Standing Rules of the Assembly as they are adopted and amended from time to time at this session, which provisions are incorporated herein and made applicable to this committee and its members.

5. The committee has the following additional powers and duties:

(a) To contract with such other agencies, public or private, as it deems necessary for the rendition and affording of such services, facilities, studies and reports to the committee as will best assist it to carry out the purposes for which it is created.

(b) To cooperate with and secure the cooperation of county, city, city and county, and other local law enforcement agencies in investigating any matter within the scope of this resolution and to direct the sheriff of any county to serve subpenas,

scope of this resolution and to direct the sheriff of any county to serve subpenas, orders and other process issued by the committee.

(c) To report its findings and recommendations to the Legislature and to the people from time to time and at any time, not later than herein provided.

(d) To do any and all other things necessary or convenient to enable it fully and adequately to exercise its powers, perform its duties, and accomplish the objects and purposes of this resolution.

(e) To make available to any Assembly or joint committee or any Member of the Assembly such assistance in connection with the duties of the committee or other legislative matters as the personnel under direction of the committee or its

other facilities permit.

(f) To make available to and furnish to Assembly investigating committees created at this session and to each of the members thereof such secretarial and stenographic belp as may be reasonably necessary for such committees and each of the members thereof to make and carry on the studies and investigations required by or of them by the resolutions creating such committees, and for such purposes the Legislative Process Committee may employ such additional stenographic and secretarial assistants as may be necessary, assign, re-assign and discharge such assistants and prescribe amounts, times and methods of payment of their compensation.

(g) To incur and pay such expenses of the Assembly not otherwise provided for (g) To incur and pay such expenses of the Assembly not otherwise provided for as the committee determines are reasonably necessary, during sessions, including any recess, including the repair, alteration, improvement, and equipping of the Assembly Chamber and the offices provided for the Assembly in the State Capitol and the Capitol Annex.

6. There is hereby made available to said committee so much of the Contingent Fund of the Assembly as is necessary to enable it to properly perform its duties under this resolution, to be paid from said Contingent Fund and disbursed, after certification by the chairman of the committee, upon warrants drawn by the State Controller upon the State Treasurer



such measures; and Whereas, There is need for a committee equipped to ascertain facts and secure facts and information upon assigned topics from time to time during the session, a committee acting in aid of aud in collaboration with the several standing committees of the Assembly; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the Assembly of the State of California, As follows:

1. The Assembly Legislative Process Committee is hereby created as an Assembly investigating committee of this session. The committee is authorized to make such studies and to take such steps as may be necessary to coordinate the work of the various standing commuttees of this session in considering questions before such session in order that there be no duplication of work or effort, and to make such studies as may be necessary, ascertain such facts and information, and secure such statistics for the use of the Members and committees of the Assembly as may be of and to them in considering and acting upon legislative proposals at this be of aid to them in considering and acting upon legislative proposals at this session.

2. The committee shall consist of the members of the Rules Committee. The Chairman of the Rules Committee shall be Chairman of the Legislative Process Committee.

3. The committee is authorized to act during this session of the Legislature, including any recess, but not after final adjournment, with authority to file a final report not later than the last legislative day of said session.

4. The committee and its members shall have and exercise all of the rights,

duties and powers conferred upon investigating committees and their members by the provisions of the Joint Rules of the Senate and Assembly and of the Standing Rules of the Assembly as they are adopted and amended from time to time at this session, which provisions are incorporated herein and made applicable to this committee and its members

5. The committee has the following additional powers and duties

(a) To contract with such other agencies, public or private, as it deems necessary for the rendition and affording of such services, facilities, studies and reports to the committee as will best assist it to carry out the purposes for which it is created.

(b) To cooperate with and secure the cooperation of county, city, city and county, and other local law enforcement agencies in investigating any matter within the scope of this resolution and to direct the sheriff of any county to serve subpenss, orders and other process issued by the committee.

(c) To report its findings and recommendations to the Legislature and to the

people from time to time and at any time, not later than herein provided.

(d) To do any and all other things necessary or convenient to enable it fully and adequately to exercise its powers, perform its duties, and accomplish the objects and purposes of this resolution

(e) To make available to any Assembly or joint committee or any Member of the Assembly such assistance in connection with the duties of the committee or other legislative matters as the personnel under direction of the committee or its

other facilities permit.

- (f) To make available to and furnish to Assembly investigating committees created at this session and to each of the members thereof such secretarial and stenographic help as may be reasonably necessary for such committees and each of the members thereof to make and carry on the studies and investigations required by or of them by the resolutions creating such committees, and for such purposes the Legislative Process Committee may employ such additional stenographic and secretarial assistants as may be necessary, assign, re-assign and discharge such assistants and prescribe amounts, times and methods of payment of their compensation.
- (g) To incur and pay such expenses of the Assembly not otherwise provided for as the committee determines are reasonably necessary, during sessions, including any recess, including the repair, alteration, improvement, and equipping of the Assembly Chamber and the offices provided for the Assembly in the State Capitol and the Capitol Annex.

6. There is hereby made available to said committee so much of the Contingent Fund of the Assembly as is necessary to enable it to properly perform its duties under this resolution, to be paid from said Contingent Fund and disbursed, after certification by the chairman of the committee, upon warrants drawn by the State Controller upon the State Treasurer.

My DEAR GOVERNOR. You have requested me to express to you my opinion as to the authority of the Attorney General of California to represent the interest of the I cople of the State of California before the Federal Power Commission in the rate increase proceedings instituted by the El Paso Natural Gas Company in Docket No. G-2018 and Docket No. G-4769, which proceedings are now pending before that Commission. These rate proceedings involve the rates of El Paso Natural Gas Com-

The question which you ask involves both constitutional and statutory law of the State of California and a certain amount of legal history. The Attorney General of this State belongs to the executive branch of the government. (6 Cal. Jur. (2d)

79, Section 2.) He is subject to the direction of the Governor of the State in certain situations. (Section 21 of Article V of the Constitution of California; Sections 12013-12014, Government Code.) Section 12511 of the Government Code provides:

"Attorney General in charge of State legal matters: Exceptions. The Attorney General has charge, as attorney, of all legal matters in which the State is interested, except the business of The Regents of the University of California and of such other boards or officers as are by law authorized to employ attorneys. (Emphasis supplied.)

This provision of law was a part of the Political Code as early as 1911.

This provision of law was a part of the Political Code as early as 1911.

While it is true that the Attorney General has certain common law duties and responsibilities, any such duties or responsibilities would be controlled by the statute law of this State which might conflict therewith.

A public utility regulatory body represents the public interest in that field. (U.S. V. Merchants and Manufacturers Association, 242 U.S. 178, 188, 61 L. ed. 233, 239.)

The Public Utilities Commission of Califormia exercises its power, among other things, for the protection of the public interest. (Hanlon v. Eshleman, 169 Cal. 200, 202-203; Pacific Telephone & Telegraph Co. v. Eshleman, 166 Cal. 640; Henderson v. Oroville etc. District, 213 Cal. 514, 530; Sale v. Railroad Commission, 15 Cal. (2d) 612, 617, 618.) A regulatory body belongs to the legislative and judicial departments of government. (Humphrey v. U.S., 295 U.S. 602, 628, 79 L. ed. 1611, 1619.) The Public Utilities Commission is an independent constitutional agency of 1619.) The Public Utilities Commission is an independent constitutional agency of State government and is both a court and an administrative tribunal. (Pucific Tele-

State government and is both a court and an administrative tribunal. (Pacific Telephone & Telegraph Co. v. Eshleman, 166 Cal. 640, 689.)

The Public Utilities Commission of the State exercises exclusive jurisdiction over all public utilities subject to its regulation. (Pacific Telephone & Telegraph Co. v. City of Los Angeles (Supreme Court of California), 44 A.C. 299, 307; Pacific Telephone & Telegraph Co. v. Eshleman, 166 Cal. 640, Section 701, Public Utilities Code.) The Public Utilities Act of this State is the supreme law of California (in so far as State law is conceined) in all matters touching the regulation of public utilities. This Act takes precedence over the proposition of the State Constitution. the last state law is concerned in an inatters tolering the regulation of profice utilities. This Act takes precedence over any provision of the State Constitution or of any statute which may conflict therewith. (Pacific Telephone & Telegraph Co v. Eshleman, 166 Cal. 640, 658; Pickens v. Johnson, 42 Cal. (2d) 399, 404.)

When the Commission was reorganized by Governor Hiram Johnson in 1911-1912,

the members of the Commission, who theretofore were elective officers, were made appointive. At the same time, the legal work of the Commission was taken from the Attorney General and given to an appointed attorney. The explanation given by Governor Johnson for this fundamental change was to remove the Commission and

ris attorney, as far as possible, from embroilment in political matters

Prior to the reorganization of the Commission, Section 4 of the Ruilroad Commission Act of March 19, 1909 (Chapter 312, Statutes 1909, p. 499) constituted the Attorney General the attorney for the Commission In 1911 the Legislature enacted the first Public Utilities Act in connection with the reorganized Commission. This Act became effective March 23, 1912 (Chapter 14, Statutes 1911, Extra Session 1911, p. 18.) Section 4 of the Public Utilities Act authorized the Commission to appoint an attorney for the Commission, thus superseding the Attorney General appoint an attorney for the Commission, thus superseding the Attorney General. Section 4 of the Act is self-explanatory and the contents thereof are enlightening. It reads as follows:

"The commission shall have power to appoint as attorney to the commission an attorney at law of this state, who shall hold office during the pleasure of the commission. It shall be the right and duty of the attorney to represent and appear for the people of the State of California and the commission in all actions and proceedings involving any question under this act or under any order or act of the commission, and, if directed to do so by the commission, to intervene, if possible, in any action or proceeding in which any such question is involved; to commence, prosecute and expedite the final determination of all actions and proceedings directed or authorized by the commission; to advise the commission and each commissioner, when so requested, in regard to all matters in connection with the powers and duties of the commission and the members thereof; and generally to perform all duties and services as attorney to the commission which the commission may require of him." (Emphasis supplied.)

That section is now Section 307 of the Public Utilities Code, the language being substantially the same. The language employed by the Public Utilities Act is clear, explicit and exclusionary. The Attorney General was thereby excluded from the public utility regulatory field.

The Public Utilities Act also contained a provision that, if the Commission desired the aid of the Attorney General or the aid of a district attorney, such officials must aid the Commission if the Commission requested them so to do. (Section 72, Public Utilities Act, now Section 2101, Public Utilities Code.) If the Commission does request the aid of the Attorney General or the aid of a district attorney, they do not supersede the attorney for the Commission but assist him in so far as the legal work of the commission may be concerned.

It will be noted from Section 4 of the Public Utilities Act that the attorney for the Commission has the right and the duty to represent and appear for the People of the State of California and the Commission in actions and proceedings involving any question under that Act or under any order or act of the Commission and, if directed to do so by the Commission, to intervene, if possible, in any action or proceeding in which any such question is involved. In these gas rate proceedings before the Federal Power Commission involving the El Paso Natural Gas Company, the only interest which the People of the State of California could have therein would consist of the possible passing on to them of any increased rate for gas which the Federal Power Commission might authorize El Paso to charge gas which the rederal rower Commission angle accounts to an against the California gas utilities. The only way those increased gas rates to the California utilities could have any impact upon the ratepayers of the State of California would be by the Public Utilities Commission of this State exercising its jurisdiction to pass on such rate increase to such ratepayers. Therefore, the situation presents a question under the Public Utilities Act and only under the Public Utilities Act. So it will be seen that any possible interest that the People of the State of California may have in these gas rate proceedings before the Federal Power Com-California may have in these gas rate proceedings before the rederal rower Commission derives from the possibility that increased rates authorized by the Federal Power Commission might be passed on to the ratepayers of this State by the Public Utilities Commission. Therefore, the plain language of Section 4 of the Public Utilities Act and the substantially similar language of Section 307 of the Public Utilities Code compet the conclusion that any representation on behalf of the People of the State of California, in the circumstances, is confided to the attorney for the Public Utilities Commission.

I have been Attorney and Chief Counsel for the Public Utilities Commission for more than twelve years and during that time I have no knowledge of any Attorney General undertaking to represent the People of the State of California in a public utility rate proceeding before a Federal regulatory body. On the other hand, it is commonplace for the Attorney and Chief Counsel of the Commission to represent the People of the State of California and the Commission before the Interstate Comreopie of the State of California and the Commission before the Interstate Commerce Commission, the Federal Power Commission and other Federal regulatory commissions. There are now pending before the Interstate Commerce Commission two railroad cases in which I am representing the People of the State of California and the Commission. This is the first time to my knowledge that an Attorney General has undertaken to enter this field.

Not only has the Attorney and Chief Counsel of the Commission represented the People of the State of California before Federal regulatory bodies, he has represented the People before Federal courts involving public utility regulatory matters.

In light of the specific provisions of the Public Utilities Act, the provisions of Section 12511 of the Government Code, the history underlying those provisions of law and the uniform adherence in the past to the same by all concerned, I can arrive at no other conclusion than that the Attorney General does not have lawful authority to represent the interest of the People of the State of California in the proceedings in question

Whether or not the Attorney General would have lawful authority to represent the State of California as an individual gas customer, is a matter which is not free from doubt. I do not know of any specific statutory law on the subject. Neither the Public Utilities Commission nor its attorney undertakes to represent individual customers in rate proceedings, confining their action to the general public interest of all customers of public utilities who might be affected.

Relative to Statement of Policy Regarding the State Water Plan approved by the Board of Directors of the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California, March 6, 1956

Whereas, There is need for wider distribution of the Statement of Policy Regarding the State Water Plan approved by the Board of Directors of the Metro-

Whereas, Said statement as presented by Robert B Diemer, General Manager and Chief Engineer of the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California to Members of the Legislature and representatives of the press on March 13, 1956, was as follows:

"The Directors of the Metropolitan Water District regret that there seems to be considerable misunderstanding and resulting confusion as to the position of the district in the matter of legislation pertaining to the Feather River Project.

The misunderstanding relates to two important subjects

1. The district's position as to appropriations for the FRP (Feather River Project) at this session of the Legislature
2. The district's position as to the areas of origin problem

As to the appropriations at this session of the Legislature: The district supports the approximately five million dollar appropriation as set forth in the Budget submitted to the Legislature by the Governor. In addition, the district requested of the Ways and Means Committee that sufficient money be added so that \$500,000 would be specifically allocated for the study of the coastal routes of Southern California

Representatives of the district also supported a \$200,000 appropriation requested by San Diego Further, they offered no opposition to an item of some three million dollars for reservoir sites in Santa Clara and Alameda Counties nor to smaller sums for reservoir sites in the Upper Feather River area. This position was taken after representatives of the district consulted with representatives of the areas seeking such appropriations

It is, therefore, not only inaccurate but it is misrepresentation when it is

said that the district opposes any appropriation at this session until or unless

the counties of origin question is settled. The directors are considerably puzzled and disturbed as to why such misrepresentation should persist in view of the fact, for instance, that the district's representation should persist in view of the fact, for instance, that the district's position was set forth in a supplemental Statement of Policy, made in writing and presented on March 8, 1956, to the Joint Interim Committee on Water Problems and to press representatives at such meeting. Such policy statement declared in favor of the purchase of both the San Lius and Oroville Dam sites and that (to quote the statement) . . . appropriations for both sites should be made at this session of the Legislature."

As to Number 2, the areas of origin problem. The district's position is that this question can be settled satisfactorily to all parties only by an amendment to the State Constitution. The district believes that only by such constitutional appropriations of origin problem.

amendment can either the areas of origin or the areas of need rely upon a continued supply of the water assigned them. Contrary to some reports the district would oppose any attempt to write the specific allocations of water into the Constitution

The district believes that the Constitution should provide machinery by which the amount of water available in the State can be determined and allocations to various areas made, subject to re-allocations at the instance of the

Legislature.

The district believes that such constitutional amendment should authorize the Legislature to issue bonds of the State not exceeding one billion five hundred million dollars to finance the project, so that when the constitutional amendment is adopted by the people it will be possible to proceed with the construction of the entire project.

It is for this reason that the district directors, feeling that they must protect the rights and interests of the six million people in the district, requested Governor Knight to broaden the legislative call so as to authorize the Legislature to consider the proposed constitutional amendment at the present session

of the Legislature.":

Whereas, The text of the statement referred to above was as follows:

"The Board of Directors of the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California reaffirms its statement of policy adopted August 19, 1955 and supplements it with the following:

1 That the San Luis Reservoir site be purchased concurrently with the purchase of the Oroville Reservoir site and that appropriations for both sites should be made at this session of the Legislature.

2. That the sum of \$500,000 be specifically allocated for additional studies of

coastal routes to Southern California.

The Statement of Policy of August 19, 1955 is as follows:

The Board of Directors of the Metiopolitan Water District of Southern California believes that the rapidly growing population and expanding economy of California require a sound economical State Water Plan.

I. Such plan will call for the development of all of the State's available water resources. This water program should be accomplished by feasible and sound projects to be developed from time to time by the State and other appropriate agencies in conformity with such State Water Plan established and approved by the Legislature

II. The respective rights to the use of water in the areas in which such water originates and in areas to which water in excess of the requirements of areas of origin may be exported, must be determined in order that the quantities so established can be relied upon in financing water projects and in developing the State's economy. A constitutional amendment must of necessity be adopted

to provide for direct review by the State Supreme Court.

III. The Metropolitan Water District of Southern California, under its existing governmental powers and with its present and projected distribution facilities, is now providing and will continue to provide its service area with a supplemental water supply from the Colorado River. When additional water is required to meet the increasing needs for domestic, municipal, and other beneficial purposes, the district will be prepared to deliver such water. Establishment of overlapping and paralleling water distribution facilities to serve water to Southern California areas would place a wasteful and unnecessary burden upon all of the people of the State of California, and particularly upon the residents of Southern California.

IV The Feather River Project, which includes the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta Diversion Project, appears to offer a suitable means of accomplishing such importation of additional water. Before final authorization further studies of the proposed plan and routes should be made, including adequate studies of a constal route. Water allocated to Southern California should be delivered to this district at a suitable location permitting coordination with the district's

Colorado River supplies and distribution facilities.

V. The sites for the Oroville Reservoir and San Lius Reservoir should be acquired by the State and the necessary appropriations therefor should be made. Other than for the acquisition of said reservoir sites, no money should be appropriated for rights of way, development, or construction of the Feather River Project until determination, pursuant to a constitutional amendment, of the respective rights to the use of the water to be made available by the project shall have been made and until the further studies of the proposed plan and routes shall have been obtained.";

PERMANENT STANDING RULES OF THE ASSEMBLY FOR THE 1956 REGULAR (BUDGET) SESSION

SECTION 1

LEGISLATIVE ORGANIZATION

Assignment of Desks to Members

1. Members shall be assigned to offices and desks by the Committee on Rules, and, as far as possible, the committee shall conform to the requests of members, giving due consideration to their seniority in point of service in the Assembly.

Hours of Meeting

2. The session of Assembly shall be daily, beginning at 10 o'clock a.m. (Sundays excepted), unless otherwise ordered by a majority vote of the members present.

RULES

Adoption of Standing Rules

3. The adoption of the Standing Rules shall require an affirmative recorded vote of a majority of the entire elected membership. When once adopted, such Standing Rules shall remain in effect, unless suspended or amended as provided in these Rules.

Suspension of Rules

4. Any standing rule of the Assembly may be suspended temporarily by a vote of two-thirds of the members present; provided, that such temporary suspension shall apply only to the matter under immediate consideration, and in no case shall it extend beyond an adjournment.

Amending Standing Rules

5. No standing rule of the Assembly shall be amended except by resolution adopted by an affirmative recorded vote of a majority of the entire elected membership of the Assembly.

No such resolution shall be considered until it shall have been referred to the Committee on Rules.

Temporary Rules

6. The Committee on Rules may at any time report a temporary rule. Upon adoption by an affirmative recorded vote of two-thirds of the entire elected membership of the Assembly, such temporary rule shall have the effect, for the time being, of a standing rule. If such temporary rule shall be in conflict with a standing rule, it shall supersede such standing rule only for the time being.

Parliamentary Rules

7. In all cases not provided for by the Constitution, by the Assembly Rules, or by the Joint Rules of the Senate and Assembly, the authority shall be Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedure.

Effect of Adoption of These Rules

8. The adoption of the Standing Rules of a budget session shall not be construed as modifying or rescinding the permanent Standing Rules of the Assembly for the preceding general session, nor as affecting in any way the status or powers of the interim committees created by those Rules.

Committee on Rules

9. There is a Committee on Rules which shall act as the executive committee of the House. The committee shall consist of one member appointed by the Speaker, who shall be the chairman and six other members, three of whom shall be members of the minority party and three of whom shall be members of the majority party. The chairman of each minority and majority party caucus shall within twenty-four (24) hours after the operative date of this rule, convene the party caucus of which he is chairman and provide the members thereof with ballots showing the names of the members. The members of each party caucus shall thereupon by secret ballot indicate their preference for three to be members of the Rules Committee and shall continue to ballot until three names shall have received a majority of the votes of the total number of members of the party. Following the balloting by the party caucus the chairman thereof shall file with the Chief Clerk a list of three nominees for membership on the Committee on Rules. Upon the filing of each such list, the Speaker shall immediately present the name of each nominee to the Assembly for its approval or rejection in the order filed. If approved by a majority of the elected membership of the Assembly, the nominee shall be declared elected as a member of the committee. If a nominee shall fail to receive such approval, the committee membership to which he would have been elected shall remain vacant until the chairman of his party caucus shall have filed the name of another nominee for the position which shall be the name of a member of the party caucus and selected by ballot in the same manner as the names of those previously presented and that such person shall be the nominee who shall be thereafter approved by a majority of the elected membership of the Assembly. Vacancies in the elected membership of the Committee on Rules occurring during any session of the Legislature shall be filled by election as herein provided, and such vacancies occurring after final adjournment and before the convening of the next session of the Legislature shall be filled temporarily, and until such convening, by the remaining committee members who are members of the same party as that of the member causing the vacancy. Vacancies in the appointive membership shall be filled by the Speaker. Four duly qualified members of the committee shall constitute a quorum. No member of the Committee on Rules is eligible to serve as the chairman of a standing committee.

Powers of the Committee on Rules

10. The Committee on Rules provided herein shall have the following powers:

To recommend the appointment of all attaches and employees of the Assembly not otherwise provided for by statute. It shall have authority to suspend, with or without pay, any such attache or employee for incompetency or dereliction of duty, pending final action by the Assembly.

To propose a schedule of meetings of standing committees.

To make studies and recommendations designed to promote, improve, and expedite the business and procedure of the Assembly and of the committees thereof, and to propose any amendments to the Rules deemed necessary to accomplish such purposes.

Rules and Regulations Governing Interim Committees

11. All claims for expenses incurred by interim investigating committees of the Assembly shall be approved by the Committee on Rules, or its authorized representative, before such claims are presented to the Controller.

All proposed expenditures, other than expenditures of the funds of an interim investigating committee, shall be approved by the Committee on Rules or its authorized representative before such expenses are incurred, unless such expenditure is specifically exempted from the provisions of this rule by the resolution authorizing it.

No warrant shall be drawn in payment of any claim for expenses until the approval of the Committee on Rules, or its authorized representative, has been obtained in accordance with the provisions of this rule.

The Committee on Rules shall within 30 days after final adjournment of any General Session, adopt rules and regulations governing the letting of any contract by an interim investigating committee and shall also adopt rules and regulations limiting the amount, time, and place of expenses and allowances, exclusive of salaries under three hundred dollars (\$300) per month, to be paid to employees of Assembly interim investigating committees. Copies of all rules and regulations adopted pursuant to this rule shall be distributed to the chairman of every such investigating committee, within 30 days after such final adjournment and any amendments thereto shall be so distributed within 15 days after their adoption.

Interim Committee on Rules

12. The Committee on Rules shall continue in existence during any recess of the Legislature and after final adjournment and until the convening of the next regular general session and shall have the same powers and duties as while the Assembly is in session. In dealing with any matter within its jurisdiction the committee and its members shall have and exercise all of the rights, duties and powers conferred upon investigating committees and their members by the Joint Rules of the Senate and Assembly as they are adopted and amended from time to time, which provisions are incorporated herein and made applicable to the Committee on Rules and its members.

The Committee on Rules shall for the purpose of Joint Rule No. 2 be deemed to be the Rules Committee of the Assembly.

Powers of the Interim Committee on Rules

- 13. After final adjournment and until the convening of the next regular general session, the Committee on Rules has the following additional powers and duties:
- (a) To contract with such other agencies, public or private, as it deems necessary for the rendition and affording of such services, facilities, studies and reports to the committee as will best assist it to carry out the purposes for which it is created.
- (b) To cooperate with and secure the cooperation of county, city, city and county, and other local law enforcement agencies in investigating any matter within the scope of this resolution and to direct the sheriff of any county to serve subpense, orders and other process issued by the committee.

- (c) To report its findings and recommendations to the Legislature and to the people from time to time and at any time, not later than herein provided.
- (d) To do any and all other things necessary or convenient to enable it fully and adequately to exercise its powers, perform its duties, and accomplish the objects and purposes of this resolution.
- (e) To make available to any Assembly or joint committee or any Member of the Assembly such assistance in connection with the duties of the committee or other legislative matters as the personnel under direction of the committee or its other facilities permit.
- (f) To make available to and furnish to Assembly investigating committees created at this session and to each of the members thereof such secretarial and stenographic help as may be reasonably necessary for such committees and each of the members thereof to make and carry on the studies and investigations required by or of them by the resolutions creating such committees, and for such purposes to employ such additional stenographic and secretarial assistants as may be necessary, assign, re-assign and discharge such assistants and prescribe amounts, times and methods of payment of their compensation.
- (g) To incur and pay such expenses of the Assembly not otherwise provided for as the committee determines are reasonably necessary including the repair, alteration, improvement, and equipping of the Assembly Chamber and the offices provided for the Assembly in the State Capitol and the Capitol Annex.

Committee on Engrossment and Enrollment

- 14. There is a Committee on Engrossment and Enrollment. It shall be the duty of the committee: (a) To compare all bills, ordered or considered engrossed by the Assembly, with the engrossed copies thereof; and, before they pass out of the possession of the Assembly, see that the engrossed bill is a true copy of the original, with such amendments as may have been made thereto; and said committee shall see that all engrossed bills are reported back in the order in which they were ordered engrossed. The report of the committee shall be in order at any time.
- (b) To consider and report on requests for the introduction of bills after the constitutional recess.
- (c) To assist the Speaker, upon his request, in recommending the reference of bills to the appropriate standing committee.

Standing Committees

- 15. Twenty-four standing committees of the Assembly are hereby created, upon the several subjects, and numbered respectively, as follows:
 - 1. Rules
 - 2. Engrossment and Enrollment
 - 3. Conservation, Planning, and Public Works
 - 4. Fish and Game
 - 5. Governmental Efficiency and Economy
 - 6. Revenue and Taxation
 - 7. Ways and Means
 - 8. Education
 - 9. Government Organization

- 10. Public Health
- 11. Social Welfare
- 12 Civil Service and State Personnel
- 13. Military Affairs
- 14. Municipal and County Government
- 15. Elections and Reapportionment
- 16. Judiciary
- 17. Constitutional Amendments
- 18. Agriculture
- 19. Public Utilities and Corporations
- 20. Manufacturing, Oil, and Mining Industry
- 21. Industrial Relations
- 22. Finance and Insurance
- 23 Transportation and Commerce
- 24. Livestock and Dairies

Membership of Standing Committees

16. Prior to the assignment of members to serve on the several standing committees, the Speaker shall consider the preferences of the members with regard to committee assignments, while keeping in view the practical necessity of making assignments so that members will not serve on more than one committee which meets at the same time, and the Speaker thereafter shall determine the number and members to serve on each standing committee, except the Committee on Rules which is hereinabove provided for. Upon publication in the Journal of the number of members on each standing committee, no further change in the number of members of the committee shall be made otherwise than by a majority vote of the elected membership of the Assembly.

No Member of the Assembly shall be a member of more than three standing committees except that upon appointment by the Speaker or the approval of the House a member may serve on five committees.

Creation of Interim Committees

17. A vote of a majority of the entire elected membership is necessary in order to constitute any standing committee an interim committee; and a vote of two-thirds of the elected membership is necessary in order to create any other interim or investigating committee.

Rational Organization of Committees

18. There shall be published weekly in the Assembly Weekly History during each session of the Legislature a chart showing the Rational Organization of the Standing Committees of the Assembly and showing Chairman and Vice Chairman, Number of Members, Time of Meeting, Room Number, and a meeting schedule for each day of the week.

Special Assembly Committee on Legislative Representation

19. In addition to any other committee provided for by these Rules, there shall be a committee to be known as and called the Special Assembly Committee on Legislative Representation, which is hereby declared to be a continuing body authorized to act both during and between sessions of the Legislature.

The committee shall have the rights, powers and duties prescribed in Section 9909 of the Government Code, specifically included but not

limited to the authority to grant certificates of registration as legislative advocates, and all the rights and powers of legislative investigating committees as provided by the Joint Rules of the Senate and Assembly.

The committee shall study and analyze all facts relating to legislative representation and the regulation thereof, and shall report thereon to the Legislature at each general session and from time to time as the committee deems necessary, including in the reports its recommendations for appropriate legislation.

The committee shall consist of seven Members of the Assembly appointed by the Speaker thereof at each general session of the Legislature. The chairman shall be experiented by the Speaker.

lature. The chairman shall be appointed by the Speaker.

Any vacancy occurring between general sessions shall be filled by the Speaker and the members appointed shall hold over until their successors are legally selected.

The committee is specifically authorized to appoint the Legislative Auditor as executive secretary of this committee to act without compensation.

SECTION 2 HOUSE FUNCTIONS Duties of Assembly Officers

Duties of the Speaker

- 20. The Speaker shall possess the powers and perform the duties prescribed:
- (a) To preserve order and decorum; he may speak to points of order in preference to the other members, rising from his chair for that purpose.
- (b) To decide all questions of order subject to appeal to the Assembly by any member. On every appeal, he shall have the right to assign his reason for his decision.
- (c) To have general direction over the Assembly Chamber and rooms set aside for the use of the Assembly, including the rooms for use by members as private offices.
- (d) To name any member to perform the duties of the Speaker, but such substitutions shall not extend beyond adjournment.
- (e) To appoint the membership of all standing and special committees, and their respective chairmen and vice chairmen.
 - (f) To establish a schedule of meetings of standing committees.
- (g) To have general control and direction over the Journals, papers, and bills of the Assembly.
 - (h) To act as Chairman of the Committee of the Whole.
- (i) To order the Lobby and Gallery cleared whenever he shall deem it necessary.
- (j) To assign desks to properly accredited newspaper representatives.
- (k) To authenticate by his signature, when necessary, or when required by law, all bills, memorials, resolutions, orders, proceedings, writs, warrants, and subpense issued by order of the Assembly.
- (1) The Speaker shall be ex officio member of all Assembly, joint, and interim committees with all of the rights and privileges of such membership, except the right to vote. In counting a quorum of any such committees, the Speaker shall not be counted as a member.

Funerals and Other Ceremonies and Events

21. The Speaker may designate any one or more of the Members of the Assembly as the representatives of the Assembly to attend funerals and other ceremonies and events in appropriate circumstances. The members so designated shall receive their actual and necessary expenses incurred in the performance of their duties or, in lieu of such expenses, the same allowance for accommodations, meals, and mileage as is provided by the Joint Rules for members of investigating committees.

The Speaker or any Member of the Assembly designated by him may incur such expenses as may be necessary for the purchase on behalf of the Assembly of suitable floral pieces at any such funeral or at any other such ceremony or event at which the offering of a floral tribute is appropriate.

All expenses incurred pursuant to this rule, after approval by the Speaker, are hereby ordered to be paid out of the money allocated from the Contingent Fund of the Assembly to the Assembly Committee on Rules and disbursed, after certification by the chairman of the committee, upon warrants drawn by the State Controller upon the State Treasurer.

Duties of the Speaker pro Tempore

22. The Speaker pro Tempore shall have the powers and perform the duties of the Speaker during his absence. He shall, ex officio, be a member of the Committee on Rules and shall act as chairman thereof in the absence of the chairman, but shall have no right to vote on any matter before said committee except that he shall have the right to vote when the chairman is absent.

Majority Floor Leader

23. The Speaker, after consultation with the members of his supporting majority, shall appoint one member to be his personal representative on the floor of the Assembly, who shall be known as the Majority Floor Leader.

It shall be his duty to participate in the various debates. He shall offer such resolutions, make such arrangements, points of order, and motions as may be necessary to expedite the proceedings of the Assembly and to promote harmony among its membership.

In the event of the absence or inability of the Speaker pro Tempore, for any reason or at any time, to perform the duties of his office, the Majority Floor Leader shall assume and perform such of those duties as may be required to conduct the business of the Assembly.

Minority Floor Leader

24. The minority, if any, or any organized segment of the membership may through caucus or other means designate a member to act as floor leader for it. When so acting be may be referred to as Minority Floor Leader.

Duties of the Chief Clerk

- 25. The duties of the Chief Clerk shall be as follows:
- (a) To have charge of and supervise all clerical business and printing of the Assembly.

- (b) To see that the Journals, other publications, and records of the Assembly are properly kept.
- (c) To refuse to permit any records or papers to be taken from the desk or out of his custody, except upon duly signed receipts from persons authorized.
- (d) To read or allow his assistants to read from the desk only such matters as the Speaker of the Assembly shall direct.
- (e) To have general supervision over all clerks, attaches, and employees, and to be responsible for their official acts and their performance of and regular attendance upon their duties.
- (f) To suspend temporarily any clerk, attache, or employee for incompetency or dereliction of duty, pending action by the Committee on Rules.
- (g) To perform all other duties pertaining to his office as prescribed by law or Assembly rule.
- (h) Before the commencement of any regular session of the Legislature the Chief Clerk of the Assembly shall mail to each member a blank form on which the member may indicate his committee preferences. Accompanying such blank shall be mailed a stamped envelope addressed to the Chief Clerk of the Assembly for returning such form. After their receipt, all such communications shall be delivered to the Chairman of the Interim Committee on Legislative Organization, if such a committee has been created, who shall deliver them to the Speaker immediately upon the organization of the Assembly.
 - (i) To certify to the Controller, pay rolls of members and attaches.
- (j) To certify all requisitions upon the Controller for the payment of bills incurred by the Assembly.
- (k) To order and sign for all documents and printing, subject to approval by the Speaker or a person designated by the Speaker.

Correction of Amendments

26. The Chief Clerk may, with prior approval of the Speaker, make technical changes in amendments to bills and measures, adopted by the Assembly. Technical changes are limited to those correcting spelling and punctuation and those necessary in order that the amendments fit the last form of the bill or measure.

Registration of Legislative Advocates

27. Pursuant to subdivision (d) of Section 9900, Government Code, as amended, the Legislative Auditor is hereby designated as the person embraced by the definition of "Clerk" set forth in that section.

Duties of the Sergeant-at-Arms

- 28. The duties of the Sergeant-at-Arms shall be as follows:
- (a) To attend the Assembly during its session, preserve order, announce all official messengers, and serve all processes issued by authority of the Assembly and directed by the Speaker; he shall receive his actual expenses for himself or for an assistant when executing any such process.
- (b) To see that no person is admitted to the Assembly Chamber except in accordance with the provisions of these Rules.
- (c) To have general supervision over the Assistant Sergeants-at Arms and be responsible for their official acts and their performance of and regular attendance upon their duties.

- (d) To suspend temporarily any Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms for incompetency or dereliction of duty, pending action by the Committee on Rules.
 - (e) To execute all commands of the Speaker.
- (f) To perform all other duties pertaining to his office as prescribed by law or Assembly rule.

Duties of the Chief Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms

29. The Chief Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms shall have the powers and perform the duties of the Sergeant-at-Arms during his absence.

Printing

Authority for Printing

30. The State Printer shall not charge any printing or other work to the Assembly other than provided by law or Assembly rule, except upon a written order signed by the Chief Clerk of the Assembly and countersigned by the Speaker or a person designated by the Speaker, and delivered to him prior to beginning such printing or work. All invoices for printing furnished the Assembly shall be itemized and rendered by the State Printer within 30 days after completion of said printing. When necessary, the Chief Clerk may order certain printed matter completed in advance of its regular order by the issuance of a rush order.

Printing Style, Form and Amount to Be Printed

31. Unless otherwise restricted by law or by Assembly rule, the style and form of all printing, the quality of paper to be used, the number of copies to be printed of each order, and the number of copies to be delivered to each member shall be decided by the Chief Clerk and approved by the Speaker or a person designated by the Speaker. All requests by members for additional copies of bills, documents, or other printed matter shall be referred to the Committee on Rules.

Printing Assembly History

32. The Chief Clerk shall cause to be compiled and printed during the constitutional recess a Legislative Handbook and a Semi-Final Assembly History, together with an index, setting forth a complete history showing all actions on bills, constitutional amendments, concurrent, joint, and House resolutions prior to the constitutional recess.

During the remainder of the session, the Chief Clerk shall cause to be printed and placed upon each member's desk prior to convening on Tuesday of each week, a complete History showing all actions taken upon each measure up to and including the legislative day preceding its issuance. For each legislative day intervening between the issuance of such Weekly History, there shall be printed a Daily Supplemental History showing only actions taken upon any measure since the issuance of the preceding Weekly History.

Printing of Maps

33. Maps or charts accompanying documents other than bills shall not be printed without special authority from the Assembly by a majority vote of its entire elected membership.

Miscellaneous

Admission to Assembly Chamber

34. Persons admitted to the Assembly Chamber, other than members and attaches, shall not be permitted to stand in the Lobby in the rear of the Assembly Chamber while the Assembly is in session, but shall be required to occupy the seats provided for them.

Use of Assembly Chamber

35. The Assembly Chamber shall not be used for any public or private business other than legislative matters during the sessions of the Legislature, except by consent of a majority of the entire elected membership of the Assembly.

Persons Admitted to Floor of the Assembly

36. No person other than members, officers, attaches, employees of the Legislature, former Members of the Legislature, and accredited members of the press shall be admitted to the floor of the Assembly during any session of the Assembly; provided, that a guest of any member shall be admitted upon presentation of a guest card of said member countersigned by the Speaker, such guest card being valid only on the legislative day for which it was issued.

All guests shall be seated only in the chairs in back of the rail in the rear of the Assembly Chamber and shall not be permitted to sit at the desks of the members nor stand in the rear of the Chamber while the Assembly is in session. No person other than an accredited newspaper representative shall be permitted to sit at the press desks. A special section in the Balcony shall be reserved for those holding guest cards. None of the above-mentioned persons in this rule shall engage in influencing the passage or defeat of legislation in the Assembly Chamber.

Smoking in Assembly Chamber

37. Smoking may be prohibited temporarily during any session of Assembly by a majority vote of the members present.

Fees for Witnesses

38. Each witness summoned to appear before the Assembly or any of its committee shall receive the sum of ten dollars (\$10) for each day such witness shall be required to appear, and the sum of five and one-half cents ($\$0.05\frac{1}{2}$) for each mile he shall travel in coming to and going from the place of examination.

No witness shall be entitled to his fee or mileage until after his appearance before such a committee.

Press Privileges

39. Newspaper correspondents desiring Assembly press eards and privileges shall make written application to the Speaker. The Assembly by a majority vote of the members present may revoke any press card.

The Speaker shall assign the Assembly press desks to accredited newspaper representatives authenticated by the Standing Committee of the Capitol Correspondents' Association; also the necessary rooms for the exclusive use of such accredited press representatives.

Press Photographers

- 40. Press photographers shall be authorized to take photographs at meetings of Assembly committees subject to the following conditions:
- 1. The authorization given by this rule shall apply only to photographers from or employed by accredited newspapers or wire services, and newsreel or television photographers
- 2. The authorization shall extend to all Assembly standing committees and subcommittees thereof, but shall not extend to executive meetings of such committees and subcommittees.
- 3. The chairman of the committee concerned shall be notified either orally or in writing, at any time prior to the committee meeting that a press photographer will be present.
 - 4. To the extent practical, flash cameras shall not be used.
- 5. Photographs shall be taken in an orderly and expeditious manner so as to cause the least possible inconvenience to the committee.

SECTION 3

LEGISLATIVE PROCEDURE

Speaker to Call Assembly to Order

41. The Speaker, or in his absence the Speaker pro Tempore, shall, at the hour appointed for meeting, call the Assembly to order. In the absence of both the Speaker and the Speaker pro Tempore, the Majority Floor Leader shall call the Assembly to order, and shall preside until the return of the Speaker or Speaker pro Tempore.

Roll Call and Quorum

42. Before proceeding with the business of the Assembly, the roll of the members shall be called, and the names of those present shall be entered in the Journal A majority of all the members elected to the Assembly shall constitute a quorum.

Order of Business

- 43. The order of business of the Assembly shall be as follows:
 - 1. Roll Call
 - 2. Prayer by the Chaplain
- 3. Reading of the Previous Day's Journal
- 4. Presentation of Petitions
- 5. Introduction and Reference of Bills
- 6. Reports of Committees
- 7. Second Reading of Bills
- 8. Messages from the Governor
- 9. Messages from the Senate
- 10 Motions and Resolutions
- 11. Business on the Daily File
- 12. Notices of Motions
- 13. Announcements
- 14. Adjournment

Pledging Allegiance to the Flag

44. On each Monday morning during the session, following the prayer by the Chaplain, the Members of the Assembly and its officers, attaches, and employees present in the Assembly Chamber shall pledge their allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America.

Reading, Correcting and Approving Journals

45. a. The reading of the Journal of the previous day may be dispensed with on motion by a majority of the members present.

b. All Journals of the Assembly shall be corrected by the Minute Clerk and delivered by him to the Chief Clerk within seven calendar days from the date of such Journal. Such corrected Journals may thereafter be approved by a majority vote of the members present.

c. A motion to correct any day's Journal shall be in order prior to the approval by the Assembly of such day's Journal. The approval of the Journal shall require a majority vote of the members present.

Presentation of Petitions

46. Whenever petitions, memorials, or other papers are presented by a member, a brief statement of the contents thereof may be made verbally by the introducer. Petitions are not debatable and shall be filed, or be referred to a committee as the Speaker shall determine. Mention of receipt of such presentation and its disposition shall be entered in the Journal.

Upon receipt of a petition for the impeachment of any person subject to impeachment by the Legislature, the Speaker shall, without comment or debate, forthwith refer such petition to committee.

Messages From the Governor

47. Messages from the Governor shall be delivered to the Chief Clerk or an assistant, and shall be read and ordered printed in the Journal unless otherwise ordered by a recorded vote of two-thirds of the elected membership.

Messages From the Senate

48. Messages from the Senate shall be delivered to the Chief Clerk or an assistant, and shall be read and ordered printed in the Journal. The Speaker shall forthwith refer to the proper committee all Senate bills accompanying such messages, which references shall be entered in the Journal. Assembly bills which have been passed without amendment by the Senate shall be ordered to enrollment.

Assembly bills amended by the Senate shall be ordered placed upon the unfinished business file.

Bills

Bills Defined

49. Whenever the word "bill" is used in these Rules, it shall include constitutional amendments, concurrent and joint resolutions, except as otherwise specifically provided.

Introduction and Reference of Bills

50. Each bill shall be signed by the member, or each of the members, who is an author of the bill before it is introduced. If any bill is introduced which does not contain the signature of such author or co-author, the same, on motion of the member whose name appears thereon without such signature, shall be stricken from the file by a recorded vote of a majority of the elected membership. In each legislative session, on the first day when bills are introduced under "Introduction and Reference of Bills," the roll shall be called from A to Z and then back from Z to A, and as each member's name is called, he may introduce one bill, constitutional amendment, concurrent or joint resolution.

After these two roll calls, any member desiring to introduce bills, constitutional amendments, concurrent and joint resolutions may at any time during a session send the same to the Clerk's desk.

When received at the Clerk's desk it shall, under the proper order of business, be numbered, read the first time, referred to a standing committee, be printed, and a copy placed upon the desk of each member before final passage.

All bills, constitutional amendments, concurrent and joint resolutions introduced before the standing committees of the Assembly are appointed, shall be referred to committees, references to take effect when the committees shall be appointed.

Reference of Bills to Committee

51. Immediately following its first reading, the Speaker shall refer each bill to a committee, unless upon a motion the Assembly, by a majority vote of its entire elected membership, shall refer it to some other committee. Such motion to refer a bill shall not be debatable.

Delivery of Bills to State Printer

52. After introduction, first reading and reference to committee, all bills shall be delivered to the State Printer.

Introduction of Bills After Constitutional Recess

53. Any member requesting permission to introduce a bill, except a resolution or constitutional amendment, after the constitutional recess shall send such request together with the bill to the Clerk's desk, and it shall be referred by the Speaker to the Committee on Engrossment and Enrollment. The request shall be signed by the member requesting permission to introduce the bill and, if permission to introduce is granted pursuant to this rule, such permission shall extend only to such member and his name shall be printed on the face of the bill following the words "Introduced by". The names of members who collaborated in the drafting of the bill or who wish to sponsor or indicate approval thereof shall also be printed on the face of the bill following the caption "co-authors" or "sponsors" as the case may be. Only the member who introduced a bill pursuant to this rule shall be charged with the introduction of the bill in computing the number of bills for the purposes of Section 2 of Article IV of the Constitution.

The committee shall ascertain if the granting of such request will exceed the limitations as set forth in Section 2 of Article IV of the Constitution, and if it will not, shall report back on the same legislative day each bill so referred to it. The adoption of the report of the committee granting permission to introduce any bill shall require an affirmative recorded vote of three-fourths of all members elected to the Assembly.

Departmental Bills

54. During the portion of the session prior to the constitutional recess and after the end of the second week following the convening of the session, no Member of the Assembly shall introduce any bill, other than the Budget Bill, at the request of or on behalf of any state officer, department, board, bureau, or commission, without first obtaining permission to do so. Any member who desires to introduce such a bill after the end of the second week of the session shall send it to the Clerk's desk, accompanied by a written request for permission to introduce it.

The bill may be introduced only after the adoption of a motion by the Assembly that permission be granted to the member to do so. The adoption of such a motion shall require an affirmative recorded vote of two-thirds of all members elected to the Assembly.

Standing Committee Functions

Standing Committee Rules

55. The Rules of the Assembly shall govern the conduct of all committee meetings. Each committee may adopt, by a majority vote of its entire membership, such additional rules, not in conflict with the Standing Rules, as it may deem necessary for the conduct of any business referred to such committee.

A majority of the committee members present may order a call of the committee.

Meetings of Standing Committees

56. All standing committees shall meet at the hour and place provided by schedule, unless otherwise ordered by the Assembly. No committee shall meet during any session of the Assembly without first obtaining permission from the Assembly.

Every scheduled committee meeting shall be open to the public, unless the committee, by a majority vote of its entire membership, shall order an executive session.

All bills set for hearing by any Assembly committee, except the Assembly Committee on Rules, must be published in the Daily File not less than three days in advance of such hearing; provided, that this rule shall not prevent any Assembly committee from hearing any bill on Tuesday or Wednesday, where the action of the committee or committee's chairman setting such bill for hearing was taken on the preceding Friday or Saturday and a notice thereof is published in the Daily File for the following Monday; provided, further, that no bill shall be set for hearing nor shall any notice thereof be published by any Assembly committee until that bill has been referred to such committee.

Committee Quorum

57. A majority of the membership of any standing committee shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of its business, including the adoption of any amendments to any bill. At least a majority of all members constituting such committee shall be required to report a bill out of committee.

Bills Reported Back to Assembly

58. All committees shall act upon bills referred to them as soon as practicable, and when acted upon each bill shall be reported back to the Assembly forthwith, and the chairman of each committee is charged with the observance of this rule.

Reports of Committees

59. Reports of standing and special committees shall be delivered to the Chief Clerk or an assistant, and shall be read and ordered printed in the Journal unless otherwise ordered by the Speaker or a majority vote of the members present.

Signing Bills Out of Committee

60. No bill shall be signed out of committee unless the committee has failed to hold a meeting on two consecutive scheduled dates, or having so met, has failed to have a quorum present for the transaction of business.

Committee of the Whole

61. The Assembly may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole at any time by a majority vote of the members present. While sitting as such committee, persons other than members may address the committee. The Speaker of the Assembly, or any member named by the Speaker, shall preside as Chairman of the Committee of the Whole.

A motion that the Committee of the Whole "do now rise and report back to the Assembly," shall always be in order, and shall be decided without debate. All actions of the Committee of the Whole shall be reported to the Assembly by the chairman, but shall not be entered in the Journal except upon motion and a majority vote of the members present.

Committee on Ways and Means

62. The Committee on Ways and Means shall consider all bills to appropriate money, other than the contingent expenses of the Assembly. Any bill which would require the expenditure of additional state moneys in any manner, including any bill which creates any additional state agency or office, or adds any functions, duties, or responsibilities to an existing agency or office, shall be referred to the Ways and Means Committee before being placed on third reading.

Committee Expenditures

63. No member or committee shall be permitted to incur any expense without first receiving the consent of the Assembly.

Travel Expenses of Assembly Committee Employees

- 64. Travel expenses of employees of Assembly committees shall be subject to Board of Control rules as applicable from time to state employees generally, except as follows:
- a. Committee employees shall be entitled to allowances in lieu of actual expenses for mileage, hotel accommodations and meals at the rates fixed by the Board of Control from time to time in limitation of reimbursement of actual expenses of state employees generally, or at such lesser rates as may be prescribed by the employing committee.
- b. Whenever a rule of the Board of Control requires approval of the Director of Finance or of the Governor with respect to any claim for expenses, such rule shall be applicable to committee employees but shall be deemed to require the approval of the Assembly Rules Committee rather than the approval of the Governor or Director of Finance.

In all other respects Board of Control rules shall govern as to the time, place and amount of expense allowable, and travel expense claims shall be submitted in form and supported by data and vouchers as required by Board of Control rules.

Mileage is an allowance in lieu of actual expenses of travel by private conveyance, and shall be allowed only to the operator of, and not to passengers in, a private vehicle. Mileage shall not be allowed in lieu of actual fare when travel is by train or other common carrier. Claims for

mileage must be accompanied by the license number of the vehicle and the names of state officers and employees riding as passengers.

Reports of Interim Committees

65. All interim committees, unless otherwise authorized, shall report to the next succeeding Legislature on or before the fortieth legislative day after the convening thereof.

Passage of Bills

Daily File

- 66. There shall be printed an Assembly Daily File for each legislative day following the constitutional recess, or at any time prior thereto when ordered by the Speaker. The Committee on Rules shall have charge of the Daily File of the Assembly. The following listing shall constitute the order of the Daily File:
 - 1. Special Orders of the Day
 - 2. Second Reading, Assembly Bills
 - 3. Second Reading, Senate Bills
 - 4. Unfinished Business
 - 5. Third Reading, Assembly Bills
 - 6. Third Reading, Senate Bills

All bills on the Daily File shall be called for consideration, provided compliance has been had with Rule 56, in the order of their listing, unless otherwise ordered by unanimous consent or an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members present.

Inactive File

67. Whenever a bill has been passed twice on third reading file, it shall forthwith be placed upon a special file to be known as the inactive file. When a bill has been placed on the inactive file, it may be returned to the third reading file by a request of the author; but the bill shall then be placed at the foot of the third reading file.

Record of Bills

68. The Chief Clerk shall cause to be kept a permanent record of every action taken by the Assembly on every bill, and the date of such action. Every such action and the date thereof shall also be indorsed upon such bill.

Second Reading of Bills

69. All bills shall be read the second time in the order of their appearance upon the second reading file. Upon second reading, Assembly bills reported without amendments shall be ordered engrossed, and Senate bills reported without amendments shall be ordered to third reading.

Committee Amendments

70. Committee amendments reported with bills shall be considered upon their second reading and such amendments may be adopted by a majority vote of the members present. Assembly and Senate bills amended on second reading, whether by committee amendment or amendment from the floor, shall be ordered reprinted and returned to the second reading file Assembly bills so amended shall be engrossed after printing.

71. Any member may move to amend a bill during its second or third reading and such motion to amend may be adopted by a majority vote of the members present.

Before debate four copies of the proposed amendment must be delivered to the Clerk's desk and one copy made available to the author of the bill. Bills so amended on second reading shall be treated the same as committee amendments. Any bill so amended upon second or third reading shall be reprinted and re-engrossed. The Chief Clerk shall order printed as many copies of all amended bills as he may determine to be necessary.

Consideration of Bills Re-referred to Committee

72 Whenever a bill which has been amended, and re-referred to committee, is reported out by that committee, it shall be placed on the second reading file and shall not be transferred therefrom to the regular third reading file until the following day.

Consideration of Constitutional Amendments, Concurrent and Joint Resolutions

73 Constitutional amendments, concurrent and joint resolutions may be amended by a majority of the members present and shall be treated the same as bills, except that they shall be read but once. The ayes and noes shall not be called upon the adoption of concurrent resolutions, except those presenting charter amendments or authorizing expenditures of money, unless regularly demanded or required by statute or by the Constitution.

Bills Transmitted to the Senate

74 Upon the final passage of any bill if no notice of motion to reconsider such bill be given, the Speaker shall order the bill transmitted to the Senate under signature of the Chief Clerk. Senate bills refused passage shall forthwith be returned to the Senate under similar signature.

Bills Considered During Period Prior to Final Adjournment

75 See Joint Rule 23 for provisions governing bills considered during this period.

Concurrence in Senate Amendments

76. It shall require the same affirmative recorded vote to concur in any Senate amendment to an Assembly bill as the vote required by the Constitution for the passage of such bill. It shall require an affirmative recorded vote of two-thirds of the entire elected membership of the Assembly to concur in any Senate amendment to an Assembly bill which contains an item or items of appropriation subject to reduction or elimination under the provisions of Section 34a of Article IV of the Constitution. The vote on concurrence shall be deemed the vote upon final passage of such bill. When Senate amendments to an Assembly bill are concurred in, the bill shall be forthwith ordered enrolled, and the Chief Clerk shall notify the Senate of such concurrence.

Nonconcurrence in Senate Amendments

77. If the Assembly refuse to concur in Senate amendments to an Assembly bill, and when notified that the Senate has refused to concur in Assembly amendments to a Senate bill, the Speaker shall appoint a committee of three (3) on conference, and the Chief Clerk shall immediately notify the Senate of the action taken by the Assembly and request the appointment of a like committee.

Committee on Conference

78. The Speaker, in appointing a committee on conference, shall select two members from those voting with the majority on the point about which the difference has arisen, and the other member from the minority, in the event there is a minority vote.

Whether a member has voted with the majority or minority on the point about which the difference has arisen is determined by his vote on the appropriate roll call, as follows:

- (a) The roll call on the question of final passage of a Senate bill amended in the Assembly when the Senate has refused to concur with the Assembly amendments;
- (b) The roll call on the question of concurrence with Senate amendments to an Assembly bill.

Meetings and Reports of Committees on Conference

79. The chairman of the Senate committee on conference for the same bill shall arrange the time and place of meeting of such committee. It shall require an affirmative vote of not less than two of the Assembly members and two of the Senate members constituting the committee on conference to agree upon a report, and the report shall be submitted to both the Senate and the Assembly. Such report is not subject to amendment, and if either house refuses to adopt such report, the conferees shall be discharged and other conferees appointed. No member who has served on a committee on conference shall be appointed a member of another committee on conference on the same bill The presentation and consideration of any report of a committee on conference shall always be in order, except during a roll call or when a member has the floor. It shall require the same affirmative recorded vote to adopt any conference report as required by the Constitution upon the final passage of the bill affected by such report. It shall require an affirmative recorded vote of two-thirds of the entire elected membership of the Assembly to adopt any conference report affecting any Assembly bill which contains an item or items of appropriation which are subject to reduction or elimination under the provisions of Section 34a of Article IV of the Constitution.

The vote on concurrence or upon the adoption of such conference report by the Assembly shall be deemed the vote upon final passage of such bill.

Engrossing and Enrolling Bills

80. The Engrossing and Enrolling Clerk shall engross and enroll all bills which shall come to his hands for such purpose, in compliance with provisions of Section 9503 of the Government Code, and in the order of time in which the same shall be acted upon by the Assembly.

Enrollment

81. After final passage by both houses, any Assembly bill not amended by the Senate shall be forthwith ordered by the Speaker to be enrolled, as provided in Sections 9508 and 9509 of the Government Code. The Committee on Engrossment and Enrollment shall report both the day and hour each enrolled bill is presented to the Governor, which report shall be entered in the Journal.

SECTION 4 PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE

Motions and Questions

Precedence of Motions During Debate

82. When a question is under debate or before the Assembly, no motions shall be received but the following, which shall take precedence in the order named:

First—To adjourn;
Second—To recess to a time certain;
Third—To lay on the table;
Fourth—For the previous question;
Fifth—To set as special order;
Sixth—To postpone indefinitely;
Seventh—To refer to or re-refer;
Eighth—To amend.

Questions of Order Decided Without Debate

83. All incidental questions of order, arising after a motion is made for any of the questions named in Rule 82 and pending such motion, shall be decided by the Speaker without debate, whether on appeal or otherwise.

Appeal From Decision of the Speaker

84. Any member may appeal from a decision of the Speaker without waiting for recognition by the Speaker, even though another member has the floor. No appeal is in order when another is pending, or when other business has been transacted by the Assembly prior to the appeal being taken.

Upon the appeal being seconded, the Speaker may give his reasons for the decision, and the member taking the appeal may give his reasons for making his appeal, and the Speaker shall forthwith put this question to the Assembly: "Shall the decision of the Speaker be sustained?"

An appeal cannot be amended and yields only to a motion to recess or adjourn, to lay on the table, or a question of personal privilege. If an appeal be laid on the table, such action shall have no effect on the pending question.

An appeal cannot be debated when relating to indecorum, transgression of Rules, or priority of business. A majority vote of the members present shall decide any appeal.

Speaker Explains Order of Business

85. The Speaker may, on his own motion or upon the motion of any Member of the Assembly, explain the order of business when the motion pending before the Assembly is not debatable. Such explanation is not to consume more than two minutes.

To Adjourn

86. A motion to adjourn is not debatable and cannot be amended, and is always in order, except (a) when another member has the floor; (b) when the Assembly is voting; (c) during a call of the Assembly. The name of any member moving an adjournment and also the hour at which the motion was made and adjournment taken shall be entered in the Journal. A motion to adjourn must be adopted by a majority vote of the members present.

When a motion to adjourn is made and seconded, it shall be in order for the Speaker, before putting the question, to permit any member to state to the Assembly any fact relating to the condition of the business of the Assembly which would seem to render it improper or inadvisable to adjourn. A statement shall not occupy more than two minutes and shall not be debatable.

To Recess to a Time Certain

87. A motion to recess to a time certain shall be treated the same as a motion to adjourn, except that such motion is debatable when no business is before the Assembly, and can be amended as to the time and duration of the recess. It yields only to a motion to adjourn.

To Lay on the Table

88. A motion to lay on the table is not debatable and cannot be amended.

A motion to table a bill, constitutional amendment, concurrent or joint resolution requires a majority vote of the entire elected membership.

Any motion to lay on the table, if carried by a majority vote of the entire elected membership, carries with it the main question and everything that adheres to it; provided, however, that a motion to lay an amendment on the table, if adopted, does not carry with it a bill, constitutional amendment, concurrent, joint, or House resolution.

A motion to lay an amendment on the table may be adopted by a majority vote of the members present.

The Previous Question

89. The previous question shall be put only when demanded by five members, and in this form: "Shall the question be now put?" And its effect, when sustained by a majority of the members present, shall be to put an end to all debate and bring the House to a vote only on the question then pending; except that the proponent of the matter pending shall be allowed not to exceed five minutes to close the debate.

Motion to Set Special Order

90. A motion to set any matter before the Assembly as a special order of business must be adopted by a two-thirds vote of the members elected. It is debatable only as to the propriety of setting the main question as a special order of business, and may be amended only as to the time.

Motion to Postpone to a Time Certain

91. A motion to postpone to a time certain shall be deemed and treated as a motion to set as a special order.

Motion to Postpone Indefinitely

92. When a motion is made to postpone indefinitely any bill, motion, or amendment, it opens the main question to debate. Should the motion to postpone indefinitely prevail by a majority vote of the entire elected membership, the main question shall not be acted upon again during the session.

Motion to Amend

93. A motion to amend may itself be amended, but no "amendment to an amendment" can be amended. A motion to amend is debatable, except where the main question to be amended is not debatable. Any

motion to amend may be adopted by a majority vote of the members present.

A motion to amend having been decided in the negative, shall not again be in order on the same day, or at the same stage of proceeding. A motion to amend by striking out certain words having been decided in the negative, shall not preclude a motion to amend by adding words, or a motion to amend by striking out and inserting words; but in no case shall a further amendment be substantially the same as the one rejected.

Subject to the above provisions of this rule, a motion to amend is in order during the second or third reading of any bill.

A motion to lay an amendment on the table may be adopted by a majority vote of the members present, as provided in Rule 88.

Amendment to Be Germane

94. No amendment to any bill, whether reported by a committee or offered by a member, shall be in order when such amendment relates to a different subject, or is intended to accomplish a different purpose, or requires a title essentially different from the original title of any bill.

No amendment shall be in order which adds or deletes the name of a member as an author or co-author, or which changes the original number of any bill.

Substitute Motion

95. A motion to substitute shall be deemed and treated as a motion to amend.

Motions in Writing

96. Upon request of the Speaker all motions shall be reduced to writing and shall be read to the Assembly by the Speaker before the same are acted upon.

Constitution of Motions

97. No motion, whether oral or written, shall be adopted until the same shall be seconded and distinctly stated to the Assembly by the Speaker.

Division of Questions

98. Any member may call for a division of the question, and the Speaker shall order the question divided if it comprehend propositions in substance so distinct that, one being taken away, a substantive proposition shall remain for the decision of the Assembly.

Withdrawal of Motions

99. After a motion is stated by the Speaker, or a bill, resolution, or petition read by the Clerk, it shall be deemed to be in the possession of the Assembly.

Motion to Be Germane

100. No motion or proposition on a subject different from that under consideration shall be admitted as an emendment.

Motion to Withdraw and Recall Bills

101. A motion to withdraw a bill or resolution from committee, or to re-refer a bill or resolution from one committee to another committee

may be made during the regular order of business. A motion to re-refer shall only be debatable as to the propriety of such reference, and shall require a recorded vote of a majority of the elected members.

No bill or resolution shall be withdrawn from committee and placed upon the file except upon two days' notice thereof and except by a recorded vote of a majority of the elected members.

Bills Stricken From File

102. A motion to strike from the file any bill or House resolution requires a majority vote of the entire elected membership. Such bill shall not be acted upon again during the session.

Motion to Rescind Action and Expunge Record

103. Previous to the approval of the Journal by the Assembly, any action may be rescinded and its record ordered expunged by an affirmative recorded vote sufficient to take such action originally; except that no action shall be rescinded and the record expunged by a vote less than a majority of the entire elected membership. No motion to rescind the action and expunge the record shall be made twice on the same proposition.

Whenever any action of the Assembly is rescinded and its record ordered expunged, the record of the action expunged shall not appear in any form whatsoever, but the record of the proceedings on the motion to rescind and expunge shall appear in the Assembly Journal as and when printed.

Reconsideration of Vote

104. Notice of a motion to reconsider on the next legislative day, the vote whereby any bill, constitutional amendment, concurrent or joint resolution was passed or refused passage, must be given on the same day such vote to be so reconsidered was taken.

A notice of motion to reconsider a vote must be given by a member voting on the bill, constitutional amendment, concurrent or joint resolution, and shall take precedence over all motions, except a motion to adjourn. Upon such notice of motion being given, the bill, constitutional amendment, concurrent or joint resolution shall forthwith be placed upon the unfinished business file, and no further action shall be taken prior to the next legislative day. When a notice of a motion to reconsider has once been made, the same shall be considered to be the property of the Assembly.

Any member voting on any motion, amendment, concurrence, Assembly resolution or proposition other than a bill, constitutional amendment, concurrent or joint resolution, may give notice of reconsideration of the vote whereby the same was passed or refused passage on the same day such vote to be reconsidered was taken, which notice shall suspend all further consideration until the next legislative day; provided, however, that a motion to reconsider on the same day the notice was given shall take precedence over and above such notice and upon demand of any member must be put to an immediate vote A motion to reconsider any proposition other than a bill, constitutional amendment, concurrent or joint resolution shall require an affirmative recorded vote of a majority of the entire elected membership.

No notice of motion for reconsideration shall be in order on the day preceding the last day for consideration of Assembly or Senate bills in the Assembly. No motion to reconsider shall be adopted except upon an affirmative recorded vote of a majority of the entire elected membership, except that it shall require a two-thirds vote of the entire elected membership to reconsider the vote on any matter originally requiring a two-thirds vote for its passage or adoption.

When reconsideration is granted, the bill shall resume its exact position before the Assembly previous to its being voted upon.

Call of Assembly

105. After the roll has been called, and prior to the announcement of the vote, any member may move a call of the Assembly. A majority of the members present may order a call of the Assembly, and the Speaker shall immediately order the Sergeant-at-Arms to lock all doors and shall direct the Clerk to prepare a list of absentees as disclosed by the last roll call, which list of absentees shall be furnished to the Sergeant-at-Arms. Thereupon no members shall be permitted to leave the Assembly Chamber except by written permission of the Speaker, and no person shall be permitted to enter except such member as is taken into custody as herein provided, or Senators, officers, attaches, or employees of the Legislature in the official performance of their duties.

Those members who are found to be absent, and for whom no leaves of absence have been granted, shall be forthwith taken into custody wherever found by the Sergeant-at-Arms or his assistants or any person designated by the Sergeant-at-Arms, including members of the California Highway Patrol, the State Police, and sheriffs or their deputies, and brought to the Assembly Chamber. No recess or adjournment shall be taken during a call of the Assembly During such call, the Assembly may consider and transact any matter of business by unanimous consent. No call of the Assembly shall be ordered on any matter while the Assembly is already under call. A call of the Assembly may be dispensed with at any time upon a majority vote of the members present, such action to become effective upon the completion of the roll call and the announcement of the vote upon the matter for which the call was ordered.

Resolutions

106. The adoption of any resolution authorizing the expenditure of money shall require an affirmative recorded vote of a majority of all members elected to the Assembly All House resolutions shall be numbered and shall be referred to the appropriate committee by the Speaker.

Motions and Resolutions

107. Any motion or resolution not otherwise provided for under the Rules shall be placed before the Assembly only under this order of business. Unless otherwise provided by law or Assembly rule, any motion or resolution may be adopted by a majority vote of the members present.

Adjournment

108. Adjournment for the constitutional recess or adjournment sine die shall be ordered by concurrent resolution. The resolution for adjournment sine die shall be adopted by the Assembly not less than seven days before the date set therein for such adjournment.

Members' Decorum and Privileges

Order in Speaking to Questions

109. When a member desires to address the Assembly, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to "Mr. Speaker." Upon being recognized, he may speak, confining himself to the question under consideration. When two or more members rise at the same time, the Speaker shall designate the member who is entitled to the floor.

No member shall speak more than once during the consideration of any one question on the same day and at the same stage of proceeding, except that the author of a bill or resolution or the mover of a question shall have the right to open and close the debate thereon. No member shall be allowed to speak more than 10 minutes to open and five minutes to close the debate thereon, and no member other than the author or the mover of the question shall be allowed to speak more than five minutes thereon. No member shall yield to any other member the time for which he is entitled to speak on any matter.

Leave of Absence

110. No member shall absent himself from attendance at any session of the Assembly without leave of the Assembly, and no member shall obtain such leave of absence or be excused for nonattendance, except by a two-thirds vote of all members elected to the Assembly, or by unanimous consent.

Personal Privilege

111. Any member may rise to explain a matter personal to himself and shall forthwith be recognized by the Speaker, but shall not discuss a question in such explanation. Such matters of personal privilege yield only to a motion to recess or adjournment.

Objection to Reading of Any Paper

112. Any member upon recognition by the Speaker may object to the reading of any paper before the Assembly. After such objection, the question of reading shall be determined without debate by a majority vote of the members present, upon a brief statement of its substance by the Speaker.

Members Called to Order for Transgressing Rules

- 113. a. If any member transgresses the Rules of the Assembly, the Speaker shall, or any member may, call the offending member to order. The member so called to order shall immediately take his seat, until the Speaker without debate, shall have determined whether he is in order or not. Such decision by the Speaker shall be subject to an appeal to the Assembly.
- b. If any member be called to order for offensive words spoken in debate, the person calling him to order shall state to the Assembly the words to which exception is taken. No member shall be held to answer,

or be subject to censure by the Assembly, for language used in debate, if other business shall have been transacted by the Assembly prior to exception being taken to the words spoken.

Members Voting

114. Every member in the Assembly Chamber when a roll call is required shall record his vote openly and without debate, unless the Assembly shall, by a majority vote of the members present, excuse him.

The name of any member who refuses to vote as required by this rule, after being requested by the Speaker to do so, shall be entered in the Journal of the Assembly, together with a statement that he was present and did so refuse to vote. Any member who refuses so to vote may, if he so desires, and immediately after the announcement of the vote, submit a written explanation of his failure to vote and have such explanation printed in the Journal, provided no such explanation shall exceed 50 words in length.

In addition to the entry of his name in the Journal, any member who refuses so to vote when required, and who has not been excused from doing so, may, immediately after the announcement of the vote, in the discretion of the Speaker or upon demand of any member, be summoned to appear before the bar of the Assembly for public censure by the Speaker or by any member designated by the Speaker. Censure of a member as provided by this rule shall not constitute a bar to proceedings for his expulsion from the Assembly pursuant to Section 9 of Article IV of the Constitution.

A member may submit a written explanation of his vote on any bill or House resolution, and have such explanation printed in the Journal immediately following such vote, provided no such explanation shall exceed 50 words in length.

Ayes and Noes

115. The ayes and noes shall be recorded by the electrical voting system on the final passage of all bills, or by viva voce when demanded by three members or when ordered by the Speaker, and on any other question when called for by three members or ordered by the Speaker, the names of which members shall be entered in the Journal.

Voting Not to Be Interrupted

116. When once begun, voting shall not be interrupted, except that before the vote is announced, any member may have the total pending vote flashed on the visible vote recorder. Prior to the announcement of the vote the Speaker shall inquire if all members have voted. Any member may move a call of the Assembly after the completion of the roll and prior to the final recording, but no member shall be allowed to change his vote, or have his vote recorded after the vote is announced.

Members at Clerk's Desk

117. No member or other person shall be allowed at the Clerk's desk while the ayes and noes are being recorded or the votes counted.

Tie Vote

118. In case of an equal division, or tie vote, the question shall be lost.

"Two-thirds of the Entire Elected Membership" Defined

119. Wherever the words or figures, "two-thirds of the entire elected membership" appear in any rule, it shall mean 54 votes.

Assembly Expenses Between Sessions

120. Pursuant to the powers vested in the Assembly Committee on Rules, and during such times as the Assembly is not in session, the committee is authorized and directed to incur and pay such expenses of the Assembly not otherwise provided for as the committee determines are reasonably necessary, including repair, alteration, improvement and equipping of the Assembly Chamber and the offices provided for the Assembly in the State Capitol.

It has been three months since we have had a full time judge, and feel that the board of supervisors have had time to take the matter into consideration and install one here. This community is increasing in population at a rate steady enough that a banking firm is in the process of opening a branch in this city. The board of supervisors must realize, by all the recent correspondence against the grand jury's recent proposal, that the people of this judicial district insist upon, not only a full time judge, but, the district as it is, unchanged in area.

If, in the board's opinion, there is not a person residing in this judicial district that would qualify for the position, it is suggested that the board appoint some qualified man from another area that would be able to render a full time service to

this court.

We would like to urge the board to take this matter into consideration immediately, and notify us of its decision on the matter.

Although this subcommittee report, with an analysis of the facts and issues and recommendations for legislative action, will be ready for the 1957 Legislature, in the interim it is hoped the interested parties will use the facts made available to date by the subcommittee's efforts to seek and find a fair and just solution by the process of compromise and negotiation that will be in the interests of the welfare of the entire State.

SUBCOMMITTEE ON LONG BEACH TIDELANDS

REPORT ON ACTIVITIES

June, 1955-February, 1956

By House Resolution No. 268 (June 7, 1955), the Assembly Interim Committee on Judiciary was directed (1) to ascertain, study, and analyze all facts relating to the subject matter of Assembly Bill No. 3762 of the 1955 Regular Session (a bill relating to the revenues from certain tide and submerged lands granted in trust to the City of Long Beach) and (2) to report thereon to the Assembly, including in the report the committee's recommendation for appropriate legislation.

The study directed by that resolution is in progress. Herewith is presented a summary of the work thus far undertaken.

THE SUBCOMMITTEE

Following the close of the 1955 Regular Session, the Chairman of the Interim Committee on Judiciary (at that time Assemblyman Fleury) appointed a "Subcommittee on Long Beach Tidelands" to conduct the study called for by House Resolution No. 268. The following members were assigned to the subcommittee:

Gordon A. Fleury, Chairman LeRoy E. Lyon, Jr. John J. McFall Allen Miller Caspar W. Weinberger Bruce F. Allen, ex officio William S. Grant, ex officio

Prior to the subcommittee's first meeting, Mr. Lyon resigned from the Assembly, and Mr. H. Allen Smith was appointed to the subcommittee in his place. Shortly after the committee's organizational meeting in August, Mr. Fleury resigned from the Assembly, and Mr. Thomas W. Caldecott was appointed to the subcommittee in his place; Mr. McFall was designated subcommittee chairman. Throughout the active period of the subcommittee's work, therefore, its member-hip has been as follows:

John J. McFall, Chairman Thomas W. Caldecott Allen Miller H. Allen Smith Caspar W. Weinberger Bruce F. Allen, ex officio William S. Grant, ex officio

Mr. George G. Grover, of the law firm of Clayson, Stark & Rothrock in Corona, was retained as committee counsel. Dr. Frank S. Hudson, consulting geologist and petroleum engineer of San Francisco, was engaged to study and report on land subsidence in the vicinity of Long Beach Harbor. By arrangement with the Legislative Auditor, Messrs. N. B. Keller, Fred Keating, and James Annand, of the Legislative Auditor's staff, have rendered specialized assistance to the subcommittee. Mrs. Grace Stall, Secretary of the Interim Judiciary Committee, has served as subcommittee secretary.

The appointment of Assemblymen Allen and Grant as nonvoting members of the subcommittee was in recognition of the sharp division of opinion which has characterized recent consideration of the subject of Long Beach tidelands revenues. Mr. Allen, the author of Assembly Bill No. 3762, has vigorously urged that the State remove from the City of Long Beach the management of the oil and gas production on the lands in question, as well as income therefrom. Mr. Grant, an Assemblyman from Long Beach, has opposed such legislation and has championed the claims of the city to all oil and gas revenues from those lands. The subcommittee has extended both to Mr. Allen and to the representatives of Long Beach full latitude in calling and questioning witnesses and in presenting evidence and argument.

HEARINGS

August 26, 1955: The subcommittee held an organizational meeting in the State Building in Los Angeles and adopted an agenda. Statements were presented by Chairman Fleury, by Assemblyman Allen, by Long Beach City Attorney Walhfred Jacobson, and by committee counsel.

October 13 and 14, 1955: The subcommittee convened in the City Hall at Long Beach for a brief welcoming address by Mayor George Vermillion. The remainder of the two-day meeting was devoted to a boat and bus tour of Long Beach, and particularly of the harbor area.

November 17, 1955: The subcommittee met at the Veteraus Memorial Auditorium in Long Beach, and the City of Long Beach opened its presentation. The following witnesses were heard: Congressman Craig Hosmer; Richard Carpenter, Executive Director of League of California Cities; Walhfred Jacobson, Long Beach City Attorney; Leland Wilder, Newport Beach Councilman; Daryl Neighbors, Long Beach Chamber of Commerce; Judge Lyman Sutter, Long Beach Armed Services YMCA; E. J. Amar, General Manager, Port of Long Beach; Joel E. Ogle, County Counsel, County of Orange; Robert Shoemaker, Chief Harbor Engineer, Port of Long Beach.

November 18, 1955: A joint hearing by the subcommittee and by the Assembly Interim Committee on Manufacturing, Oil, and Mining Industry, under the chairmanship of Assemblyman H. W. Kelly, was held in the Veterans Memorial Auditorium in Long Beach, devoted to the subject to land subsidence in the Long Beach Harbor area. The following witnesses were heard: Robert Shoemaker, Chief Harbor Engineer, Port of Long Beach; John R. McKinney, Chairman, Subsidence Remedial Council of Long Beach; William J. REMARKS BY REAR ADMIRAL LAWRENCE

Mr. Speaker, Distinguished Members of the California State Assembly, and Guests: I am very honored with the privilege extended to me by this body to make a brief appearance here on behalf of the Mare Island Naval Shipyard. You will recall that it was less than two years ago that the Mare Island Naval Base, of which the shippard is a segment, celebrated its 100th Anniversary. At that time the State Legislature was most generous in its participation in the observance of this birthday date of the West's oldest naval establishment. Looking back, it must be a great source of pride to you to have contributed to the marking of a history milestone. Possibly it was not fully realized that this was only a stepping stone to what was going to take place in the second century of existence, but without any doubt it going to take place in the second century of existence, but without any double to succeeded in bringing the shipyard into national prominence. Recently your confidence has been recognized in some of the developments that I am about to mention.

The great State of California is a pioneer of the Western Seaboard. Since State-

hood in 1850 it has continued its initiative and leadership in many fields. Since 1854 the Mare Island Naval Shipyard has kept pace with California. Today I want to point out to you how we are continuing to keep that pace, and how we are

accelerating this effort.

accelerating this effort.

You will recall that on this coast, Mare Island pioneered in the transition from wood to steel, from sail to coal, and from coal to oil, and now is pioneering in the transition from oil to nuclear power. It built the Navy's first tanker and later the Jupiter which was converted for use again by Mare Island as the Navy's first aircraft carrier. It built the first radio station in the Pacific. It still has the responsibility for the construction of new radio stations throughout the entire Pacific, including Japan, the Philippines, and Alaska. It has contributed 494 craft to the fleet, including the battleship California, the heavy cruiser San Francisco, as well as 50 some destroyers and escorts, and 29 submarines. During our centennial in September, 1954, which many of you attended, the Chief of Naval Operations announced the Mare Island Naval Shipyard would be designated as a building yard for nuclear propelled ships. The shipyard immediately embarked on a comprehensive training program to be prepared for this event. This involved sending many civilian training program to be prepared for this event. This involved sending many civilian

personnel and officers to various parts of the United States, such as Oak Ridge, the Westinghouse Laboratories, and the Electric Boat Company for a six months' instruction course. These men have returned, and during the past several months they have been conscientiously instructing all levels of personnel in the shipyard in the problems, difficulties and the intricacies of both the design of a nuclear propelled ship as well as the construction of the ship itself

Even the common laborer must realize that quality far beyond that used in the construction of any other type of ship must be built into a nuclear powered vessel. Welding techniques must be improved, inspection, fabrication, installation, and all of the various phases must be thoroughly understood together with the reasons in back

of them by our journeymen, our supervisors, and by management itself.

Last year Mare Island was awarded the construction of the nuclear powered submarine Sargo, the first to be built in Pacific waters. It was also awarded the basic design in construction of a guided missile submarine powered in a conventional manner with diesel engines. To be very brief, a guided missile vessel of this type was new. At least, it was new from the point of view that for the first time the ship itself was to be constructed from the ground up for this one purpose and was not to be a conversion of a standard submarine, such as Mare Island did—another first—on the

Barbero and the Tunny.

The keel of the Sargo was laid on February 21st of this year, but the significance of that occasion was overshadowed almost immediately by another history-making announcement. Mare Island design personnel, under the leadership of CDR W. E. Heronemus and CDR E. E. Kimtner, and their principal assistants, Mr. Herbert Graybeal, W. J. Imboden, P. A. Green, H. G. Ulbrich, and George C. Childs, in laying out the design criteria for the guided missile ship, recognized a very close similarity in hull size both in diameter and characteristics to the plans we had received from the Electric Boat Co. for the nuclear powered submarine Sargo. It seemed entirely possible and feasible to them that here was an opportunity to marry together two classes of vessels, and possibly provide this Nation with a weapon whose potential would be far in excess of any other we know today. With my permission, after working hours and on week ends these men made several independent studies which, when brought together, showed definitely that it could be done—that we could save over-all design time as far as the guided missile ship was concerned—we could get the ship on the building ways sooner, and because of the similarity of the major portion of it to the Sargo, we could save time in its actual construction. Obviously, when you substitute a nuclear power plant for a conventional plant, you have a more expensive final product. With the potential that appeared to be in the offing, this additional expense appeared to be well deserved

These studies were forwarded to Washington. It didn't take long for Rear Admiral A. G. Mumma, Chief of the Bureau of Ships, and for Rear Admiral A. M. Morgan, in charge of Ship Design, to realize the possibilities. Both of these gentlemen have previously appeared before this honorable body. Similarly, when they presented the problem to the Chief of Naval Operations and the Secretary of the Nava. Honorable Charles S. Thomas, a fellow Californian, they too realized that here was a new concept that could immediately be put into use. Likewise the Congress of the United States saw the tremendous potential and authorized the Navy to proceed with its plans for such a submarine, that is, a nuclear powered guided missile submarine.

The assignment was given to Mare Island.

Now in the back of your minds there may be some questions lurking about this vessel. Principally there are three major parts to the problem—the propulsion, the missile itself, and the guidance of that missile once it is launched. Let us briefly

examine each of these phases

Just what is the difference between a nuclear type bomb and a nuclear power plant? Speaking in a nuclear language, there isn't any. In the bomb we design the construction to get a fast build up of a terrific amount of energy, to contain that energy a sufficient length of time so that total fission can take place, and then to release it all at once giving us a fremendous explosion. With the nuclear power plant we do the same thing except that we control the speed of the build up of the energy, and then control its release in minute quantities so that it can be converted from heat to a source of usable power such as one finds in a normal steam cycle. You might ask, "Well, what would happen if we lost control?" In effect, we would have the same tremendous amount of energy that one finds in the bomb except that not being contained, it will melt itself down and go through the hull of the ship. To guard against this, however, all of our controls, and there are many of them—one backing up the other—are so designed that with any part of the system failing to perform its function that it will fail safely and all action will cease. To relieve your minds still more a power reactor cannot become a bomb. All experiments to make it such have been unsuccessful The shipvard personnel or the community do not have to fear either this or the possibility of radiological hazards.

Now as the second part, that of the guided missile itself: The problem of the design engineers at Mare Island is to so arrange a section of the submarine that it can house several of the Regulus type birds, that they can be loaded on this submarine, that they can be worked on within the submarine and given their routine

tests and adjustments, and that they can be brought out on deck and fired with a reasonable assurance they will hit the target several hundred miles away.

The third part, the guidance system, is a means whereby we can send a radio beam into the atmosphere in the direction of the target, and its characteristics will be such that it will tell that missile in directing its flight, how to steer itself in order to arrive at the desired destination.

The problem of the building of the missile and the guidance system are not problems of my design engineers, but the marrying together of the three principal components—power, missile and guidance system—into an over-all excellent sub-

marine is.

Now what does such a weapon mean to our future? What does it mean to Mare Island, to California, and to the Nation? Some of the intangible results will be a tremendous upgrading in the engineering knowledge existing in the whole California area. It will mean a much higher quality of work ingrained into each and every workman. We will stand to gain not only in this particular construction from that fact, but purely by association will also gain in the other work that is performed at the shippard. Pride of workmanship, shall we say, will be busting out all over. Since we are working with the new and not trying to exist on the past, we will be able to be in the forefront when it comes to the assignment of more work. Later on we will be concerned with the upkeep and repairs that will be needed for these nuclear powered types of vessels which will become more and more numerous as the Country gears itself to build them.

Consistent then with national defense needs, I feel we can look forward to a stabilized work load. However, we must guard against trying to increase that work load too much, since new construction invariably requires periods of high employment as well as low employment in various trades. The ideal is to have a certain number of vessels under construction—some beginning, some at the peak, and others finishing up. When you can have an established work load, you bring stabilization to the community such as in their school systems, transportation, housing problems, and many other factors. These can get completely upset when a large industrial organization has high periods of employment and low periods of employment within

a space of several months.

Finally, by establishing this potential we have founded the cornerstone of a capability of action and of know-how which by its existence alone will aid in giving the World, this Nation, the great State a tremendous possibility of peaceful living in the future.

What will this new weapon do? It will do almost as much as you can let your imagination conceive It can cruise for indefinite periods of time into any waters practically unchallenged. It can come to the surface, launch its missile toward a distant target and disappear again beneath the deep waters in which it exists. Can you picture anything which would be a greater deterrent to a possible unfriendly nation than the mere existence of even only a few of these guided missile submarines? You will in time, just as I am now doing, point with pride to what is being done by the 11,000 employees at the Mare Island Naval Shipyard in providing what may very well be the one big deterrent to another horrible world conflagration.

Relative to statement of policy regarding the State Water Plan approved by the Board of Directors of the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California, March 6, 1956

WHEREAS, There is need for wider distribution of the statement of policy regard-

Where State Water Plan approved by the Board of Directors of the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California, March 6, 1956; and Whereas, Said statement as presented by Robert B. Diemer, General Manager and Chief Engineer of the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California to Members of the Legislature and representatives of the Press on March 13, 1956 was

"The Directors of the Metropolitan Water District regret that there seems to be considerable misunderstanding and resulting confusion as to the position of the district in the matter of legislation pertaining to the Feather River Project.

The misunderstanding relates to two important subjects:

1. The district's position as to appropriations for the FRP (Feather River Project) at this session of the Legislature.

The district's position as to the areas of origin problem.

As to the appropriations at this session of the Legislature: The district supports the approximately five million dollar appropriation as set forth in the Budget submitted to the Legislature by the Governor. In addition, the district requested of the Ways and Means Committee that sufficient money be added so that \$500,000 would be specifically allocated for the study of the

coastal routes of Southern California.

Representatives of the district also supported a \$200,000 appropriation requested by San Diego. Further, they offered no opposition to an item of some three million dollars for reservoir sites in Santa Clara and Alameda Counties nor to smaller sums for reservoir sites in the Upper Feather River area. This position was taken after representatives of the district consulted with repre-

sentatives of the areas seeking such appropriations.

It is, therefore, not only maccurate but it is misrepresentation when it is said that the district opposes any appropriation at this session until or unless the

counties of origin question is settled.

The directors are considerably puzzled and disturbed as to why such misrepresentation should persist in view of the fact, for instance, that the district's position was set forth in a supplemental Statement of Policy, made in writing and presented on March 8, 1956 to the Joint Interim Committee on Water Problems and to press representatives at such meeting. Such policy statement declared in favor of the purchase of both the San Luis and Oroville Dam sites and that (to quote the statement) "* * * appropriations for both sites should be made at this session of the Legislature."

As to Number 2, the areas of origin problem. The district's position is that this question can be settled satisfactorily to all parties only by an amendment to the State Constitution. The district believes that only by such constitutional amendment can either the areas of origin or the areas of need rely upon a continued supply of the water assigned them. Contrary to some reports the district would oppose any attempt to write the specific allocations of water into

the Constitution.

The district believes that the Constitution should provide machinery by which the amount of water available in the State can be determined and allocations to various areas made, subject to re-allocations at the instance of the Legislature.

The district believes that such constitutional amendment should authorize the Legislature to issue bonds of the State not exceeding \$1,500,000,000 to finance the project, so that when the constitutional amendment is adopted by the people it will be possible to proceed with the construction of the entire project.

It is for this reason that the district directors, feeling that they must protect the rights and interests of the 6,000,000 people in the district, requested Governor Knight to broaden the legislative call so as to authorize the Legislature to consider the proposed constitutional amendment at the present session of the Legislature.";

WHEREAS. The text of the statement referred to above was as follows:
"The Board of Directors of the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California reaffirms its statement of policy adopted August 19, 1955 and supplements it with the following:

1. That the San Luis Reservoir site be purchased concurrently with the purchase of the Oroville Reservoir site and that appropriations for both sites should be made at this session of the Legislature.

2. That the sum of \$500,000 be specifically allocated for additional studies of coastal routes to Southern California.

The Statement of Policy of August 19, 1955, is as follows:

The Board of Directors of the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California believes that the rapidly growing population and expanding economy of California require a sound economical State Water Plan.

I. Such plan will call for the development of all of the State's available water resources. This water program should be accomplished by feasible and sound projects to be developed from time to time by the State and other appropriate agencies in conformity with such State Water Plan established

and approved by the Legislature.

II. The respective rights to the use of water in the areas in which such water originates and in areas to which water in excess of the requirements of areas of origin may be exported, must be determined in order that the quantities so established can be relied upon in financing water projects and in developing the State's economy. A constitutional amendment must of necessity be adopted

to provide for direct review by the State Supreme Court.

III. The Metropolitan Water District of Southern California, under its existing governmental powers and with its present and projected distribution facilities, is now providing and will continue to provide its service area with a supplemental water supply from the Colorado River. When additional water is required to meet the increasing needs for domestic, municipal, and other beneficial purposes, the district will be propared to deliver such water. Establishment of overlapping and paralleling water distribution facilities to serve water to Southern California areas would place a wasteful and unnecessary burden upon all of the people of the State of California, and particularly upon the residents

of Southern California.

IV. The Feather River Project, which includes the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta Diversion Project, appears to offer a suitable means of accomplishing such importation of additional water. Before final authorization further studies of the proposed plan and routes should be made, including adequate studies of a coastal route. Water allocated to Southern California should be delivered to this district at a suitable location permitting coordination with the district's

Colorado River supplies and distribution facilities

V. The sites for the Oroville Reservoir and San Luis Reservoir should be acquired by the State and the necessary appropriations therefor should be made. Other than for the acquisition of said reservoir sites, no money should be appropriated for rights of way, development, or construction of the Feather River Project until determination, pursuant to a constitutional amendment, of the respective rights to the use of the water to be made available by the project shall have been made and until the further studies of the proposed plan and routes shall have been obtained.";

What Adoption of a Concurrent Resolution May Entail

In an area where the evidence is sketchy and remote, the California Legislature has introduced a refreshing technique—a concurrent resolution purporting to state the legislative intent with respect to a statute already passed. What weight, if any, should it be given? Assembly Concurrent Resolution 42 purports to state the legis-

WHEREAS, The Legislature has enacted Senate Bill No. 1218, as amended in the Assembly April 1, 1951, adding Section 10246 to the Government Code relating to participation by the Legislative Counsel in judicial proceedings; and WHEREAS, In enacting this bill it was not the intent of the Legislature to impose any degree of limitation or restriction upon its inherent powers * * * and

be it further

Resolved. That the Legislature hereby declares that the final passage of Senate Bill No. 1218 * * * is not and shall not be construed to be in any way an indication of intent on its part to limit the power and authority of the Legislature. It should be noted that such methods of expressing legislative intent are relatively It should be noted that such methods of expressing legislative intent are relatively new and quite intrequent. If passed virtually contemporaneously with the statute, such an expression of legislative intent would appear to be quite persuasive, keeping in mind that a majority vote of both houses is necessary to pass such a resolution. But here we are dealing with an aid which ordinarily originates after legislation has been passed. The possibility of "changing" the statute is increased. There is the danger of by-passing the Governor. It would be a useful device for "manufacturing" legislative history, when current ideas have changed concerning the policy of the statute in question. Moreover, if these resolutions were used frequently, it might tempt the Legislature to draft ambiguous statutes for the purpose of straddling issues temporarily. issues temporarily.

If the circumstances showed such dangers were not present, a resolution passed ontemporaneously with a statute should be used in interpretation. If a long period of time elapses before passage of the resolution, it would obviously be of little or no value. The Legislature cannot shortcut the full statutory process by means of a concurrent resolution. Such a resolution will seldom be passed prior to a statute because if the Legislature takes time to consider the problem its specific intent will undoubtedly be expressed in the statute. Mr. Speaker: The Subcommittee on Library Problems in California of the Assembly Interim Committee, submits herewith a progress report. This progress report embodies a Report to the Assembly Committee on Education, which was made by the Survey Technical Advisory Committee of the California Library Association, working with Dr. George Bemis, Consultant to this subcommittee.

Since this report contains much data which bears on the subject assigned to the Committee on Library Problems in California, which will be useful to all persons interested in the subject, we request that the report together with this letter of transmittal be published as a separate document and this letter of transmittal published in the Journal.

This is the proper place to express the gratitude of this subcommittee to the Survey Technical Advisory Committee of the California Library Association; Ed. A. Wight, Chairman; Carl W. Hamilton; Grace Murray; Bertha D. Hellum; Katherine Laich, ex officio; and Dorothy Thomas; and, also, to Mrs. Carma Zimmerman the State Librarian, who at the time the Survey Technical Advisory Committee was appointed was President of the California Library Association.

It should be emphasized here that this subcommittee cannot undertake a survey of library problems of such scope and nature as that which has several times been proposed by legislative action to be made

by the State Library.

We can, however, by means such as this secure much of the fundamental data which serves to emphasize the diverse ways whereby our libraries are created, managed, staffed, and financed; and the complex laws relating to the same. Many of our first objectives have been covered in the present report, at no great expense to the subcommittee, and we plan to proceed as far as we can go in order to make a full report during the early days of the 1957 Regular Session.

We recommend augmentation of the allocation to the Assembly Interim Committee on Education in sufficient amount to continue our research.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CALIFORNIA RECIPROCITY COMMISSION TO THE CALIFORNIA STATE LEGISLATURE

To the Members of the Senate and Assembly of the State of California:

The Legislature created a Reciprocity Commission by Chapter 1002, Statutes of 1955, and provided, among other things, that such commission should report annually to the Legislature.

The Reciprocity Commission consists of the Lieutenant Governor, the Director of Motor Vehicles, the Director of Public Works, the State Controller, and the Commissioner of the California Highway Patrol, all serving ex officio.

The commission met on September 8, 1955, and organized, electing the Director of Motor Vehicles chairman of the commission

The commission met again on October 8, 1955, to consider a proposed uniform agreement for reciprocity and proration of fees of fleets of commercial vehicles among the states which became parties to the agreement. At this time the commission agreed in principle on the proposed uniform form of agreement and authorized the chairman of the commission to proceed with negotiations with other states, looking toward entering into the agreement.

The next meeting of the commission was held on November 14, 1955. At this meeting the commission considered and agreed upon restrictions which would be necessary to attach to the uniform agreement in order to comply with California statutes and properly protect the State of California.

The last meeting was held on November 28, 1955. The commission, at this meeting, considered the specific restrictions or reservations made by other states, accepted them, and authorized the chairman of the commission to sign the agreement in behalf of the California Reciprocity Commission.

There are now in effect proration and reciprocity agreements between the State of California and the States of Oregon, Washington, Montana, Idaho, Nevada, Colorado, Kansas, and New Mexico.

There have been further discussions between the states concerning the administrative problems of properly identifying vehicles subject to proration and certain similar administrative problems, but no further question has arisen which appears to call for consideration by the Reciprocity Commission.

Registrations under the agreements started on January 1, 1956. At this time it appears too early to attempt to evaluate the results being obtained.

Submitted herewith is a copy of the Uniform Vehicle Registration Proration and Reciprocity Agreement including conditions or restrictions of each of the states which are parties to the agreement.

Vehicle Registration Proration and Reciprocity Agreement

Pursuant to and in conformity with the laws of their respective states, the contracting states acting by and through their officials lawfully authorized to execute this agreement, do mutually agree as follows:

ARTICLE 1. Purposes and Principles

SECTION 1. Purposes of Agreement. (a) It is the purpose of this agreement to set up a system whereby any contracting state may permit

- owners of fleets of commercial vehicles operating in two or more states to prorate the registration of the vehicles in such fleets in each state in which the fleets operate on the basis of the proportion of miles operated within such state to total fleet miles, as defined herein.
- (b) It is further the purpose of this agreement to grant reciprocity to noncommercial vehicles, and to commercial vehicles engaged in interstate operations and intrastate operations incidental thereto which are not entitled to have their registration prorated under this agreement as part of a fleet. Reciprocity entitles a vehicle which is properly registered in a contracting state, as provided in this agreement, to be exempt from registration and payment of fees in each other contracting state for the purpose of engaging in any type of interstate vehicle operation in each other contracting state.
- Sec. 2. Principle of Proration of Registration. It is hereby declared that in making this agreement the contracting states adhere to the principle that each state should have the freedom to develop the kind of highway user tax structure that it determines to be most appropriate to itself, that the method of taxation of interstate commercial vehicles should not be a determining factor in developing its user tax structure, and that annual taxes or other taxes of the fixed fee type upon commercial vehicles which are not imposed on a basis that reflects the amount of highway use should be apportioned among the states, within the limits of practicality, on the basis of vehicle miles traveled within each of the states.

ARTICLE 2. Definitions

- Sec. 10. State. State shall include the states of the United States, the District of Columbia, the territories of the United States, the provinces of Canada, and the states, territories, and federal district of Mexico.
- Sec. 11. Contracting State. Contracting state shall mean a state which is a party to this agreement.
- Sec. 12. Administrator. Administrator shall mean the official or agency of a state administering the fee involved, or, in the case of proration of registration, the official or agency of a state administering the proration of registration in that state.
- Sec. 13. *Person*. Person shall include any individual, firm, copartnership, joint venture, association, corporation, estate, trust, business trust, receiver, syndicate, or any other group or combination acting as a unit.
- Sec. 14. Base State. Base state shall mean with respect to a vehicle:
- (a) In the case of a fleet vehicle designated for registration in a particular state in accordance with this agreement, the state of such registration.
- (b) In the case of a non-fleet commercial vehicle, the state from or in which the vehicle is most frequently dispatched, garaged, serviced, maintained, operated, or otherwise controlled.
- (c) In the case of a vehicle other than a commercial vehicle owned by an individual, the state of legal domicile of such individual.
- (d) In the case of a vehicle other than a commercial vehicle owned by a person other than an individual, or owned by an individual who

has no legal domicile, the state from or in which the vehicle is most frequently dispatched, garaged, serviced, maintained, operated, or otherwise controlled.

In order that this section may not be used for the purpose of evasion of registration fees, the administrators of the contracting states may make the final decision as to the proper base state, in accordance with Section 37 hereof, to prevent or avoid such evasion.

- SEC. 15. Commercial Vehicle. Commercial vehicle shall mean any motor vehicle having a gross weight in excess of 6,000 pounds and other vehicles regardless of weight used or maintained for the transportation of persons for hire, compensation, profit, or in furtherance of a commercial enterprise, or any vehicle designed, used, or maintained primarily for the transportation of property or for drawing other vehicles so designed, used, or maintained.
- SEC. 16. Fleet. As to each contracting state, fleet shall include only those commercial vehicles which actually travel a portion of their total miles in such state. A fleet must include three (3) or more commercial vehicles, at least two (2) of which are motor vehicles.
- SEC. 17. Registration. Registration shall mean the registration of a vehicle and the payment of annual fees and taxes as set forth opposite the name of each contracting state in the Appendix hereto.
- SEC. 18. Proration of Registration. Proration of registration shall mean registration of fleets of commercial vehicles in accordance with Article 4 of this agreement.
- SEC. 19. Reciprocity. Reciprocity shall mean that each contracting state, to the extent provided in this agreement, exempts a vehicle from registration and the registration fees set forth in Section 17 and the Appendix.

ARTICLE 3. General Provisions

- Sec. 30. Effect on Other Agreements, Arrangements, and Understandings. On and after its effective date, this agreement shall supersede any reciprocal or other agreement, arrangement, or understanding between any two or more of the contracting states covering, in whole or in part, any of the matters covered by this agreement; but this agreement shall not affect any reciprocal or other agreement, arrangement, or understanding between a contracting state and a state or states not a party to this agreement.
- Sec. 31. Applicability to Exempt Vehicles. This agreement shall not require registration in a contracting state of any vehicles which are in whole or part exempt from registration under the laws or regulations of such state without respect to this agreement.
- SEC. 32. Inapplicability to Caravaned Vehicle. The benefits and privileges of this agreement shall not be extended to a vehicle operated on its own wheels, or in tow of a motor vehicle, transported for the purpose of selling or offering the same for sale to or by any agent, dealer, purchaser, or prospective purchaser.
- Sec. 33. Other Fees and Taxes. This agreement does not waive any fees or taxes charged or levied by any state in connection with the ownership or operation of vehicles other than registration fees as defined herein. All other fees and taxes shall be paid to each state in accordance with the laws thereof.

SEC. 34. Statutory Vehicle Regulations. This agreement shall not authorize the operation of a vehicle in any contracting state contrary to the laws or regulations thereof, except those pertaining to registration and payment of fees; and with respect to such laws or regulations, only to the extent provided in this agreement

SEC. 35. Violations. Each contracting state reserves the right to withdraw, by order of the administrator thereof, all or any part of the benefits or privileges granted pursuant to this agreement from the owner of any vehicle or fleet of vehicles operated in violation of any provision of this agreement. The administrator shall immediately give notice of any such violation and withdrawal of any such benefits or privileges to the administrator of each other contracting state in which vehicles of such owner are operated.

SEC. 36. Cooperation. The administrator of each of the contracting states shall cooperate with the administrators of the others and each contracting state hereby agrees to furnish such aid and assistance to each other within its statutory authority as will aid in the proper enforcement of this agreement.

Sec. 37. Interpretation. The final decision regarding interpretation of questions at issue relating to this agreement shall be reached by joint action of the contracting states, acting through the administrators thereof, and shall upon determination be placed in writing.

SEC. 38. Amendment. This agreement may be amended by joint action of the contracting states, acting through the officials thereof authorized to enter into this agreement. Any amendment shall be placed in writing and become a part hereof.

Sec. 39. Effect of Headings. Article and section headings contained herein shall not be deemed to govern, limit, modify, or in any manner affect the scope, meaning, or intent of the provisions of any article or section hereof.

Sec. 40. Additional States. Additional states may become parties to this agreement by signing and accepting the terms of the agreement subject to the approval of the contracting states of any restriction, limitation, or condition imposed by such additional state upon its membership under the agreement.

ARTICLE 4. Proration of Registration

Sec. 50. Applicability. Any owner of a fleet may be permitted to register sufficient commercial vehicles of the fleet in each contracting state to produce total registration fee payments therein not less than an amount obtained by applying the proporation of in-state fleet miles to total fleet miles.

If any commercial vehicles operate in two or more states which permit the proration of registration on the basis of a fleet of vehicles consisting of a lesser number of vehicles than provided in Section 16, such fleet may be prorated as to registration in such states, in which event the vehicles in such fleet shall not be required to register in any other contracting states if each such vehicle is registered in some contracting state (except to the extent it is exempt from registration as provided in Section 31).

If the administrator of any state determines that the inclusion of vehicles as a part of a fleet for the purpose of prorating registration pursuant to this article in such state, when the vehicles will not in any

likelihood operate in such state during the registration period, would adversely affect the number of vehicles which should on the basis of fairness and equity be registered in such state, he may refuse to permit any or all of such vehicles to prorate registration in his state under this article.

SEC. 51. Determination of Number of Vehicles in a Fleet In determining the number of commercial vehicles in a fleet for the purposes of proration of registration, each individual unit of a combination of vehicles shall be counted as one vehicle.

Sec. 52. Total Fleet Miles. Total fleet miles, with respect to each contracting state, shall mean the total miles operated by the fleet (1) in such state, (2) in all other contracting states, (3) in other states having proportionate registration provisions, (4) in states with which such contracting state has reciprocity, and (5) in such other states as the administrator determines should be included under the circumstances in order to protect or promote the interest of his state; except that in states having laws requiring proration on the basis of a different determination of total fleet miles, total fleet miles shall be determined on such basis.

SEC. 53. Leased Vehicles. If a commercial vehicle is operated by a person other than the owner as a part of a fleet which is subject to the provisions of this article, then the operator of such fleet shall be deemed to be the owner of said vehicle for the purposes of this article.

SEC. 54. Extent of Privilege. Upon the registration of a fleet in a contracting state pursuant to this article, each vehicle in the fleet may be operated in both interstate and intrastate operations in such state (except as provided in Section 34).

Sec. 55. Application for Provation. The application for provation of registration shall be made in each contracting state upon substantially the application forms and supplements thereto appended to this

agreement as Exhibit I and made a part hereof.

SEC. 56. Issuance of Identification. Upon acceptance of the application, the contracting state shall issue the required license plates and registration cards for the commercial vehicles to be registered in such state and shall issue to each of the remaining commercial vehicles in the fleet which is registered in another state (except to the extent it is exempt from registration as provided in Section 31) a special identification identifying such vehicle as a part of an interstate fleet which has fully complied with the registration requirements of such state. The required license plates, registration cards, and identification shall be appropriately displayed in the manner required by the administrator of each respective state.

If the percentage of miles operated in any state by a fleet prorating its registration pursuant to this article is not sufficient to require the registration of at least one vehicle, then all of the vehicles in the fleet which are registered in another state (except to the extent they are exempt from registration as provided in Section 31) shall be treated as if they were remaining vehicles under this section and shall be issued special identification.

Sec. 57. Additions to Fleet. If any vehicle is added to a prorated fleet after the filing of the original application, the owner shall file

a supplemental application upon the same forms and supplements provided for the original application in accordance with the instructions attached thereto with respect to supplemental applications. The owner shall register such vehicle in a contracting state only if its registration is necessary in order that the proper amount of registration fees be paid in that state on the basis of the vehicles and mileage listed in the original application together with the additional vehicles and estimated mileage thereof. If no fees are payable for the registration of the vehicles in a contracting state and if the vehicle is registered in another state (except to the extent it is exempt from registration as provided in Section 31), it shall be considered a remaining vehicle in the fleet with respect to that state and shall be issued a special identification.

Sec. 58. Withdrawals from Fleet. If any vehicle is withdrawn from a prorated fleet during the period for which it is registered or identified, the owner shall notify the administrator of each state in which it is registered and identified of such withdrawal and shall return the plates, and registration card or identification as may be required by each administrator.

SEC. 59. Audits. The administrator of each contracting state shall, within the statutory authority of such administrator, make any information obtained upon an audit of records of any applicant for proration of registration available to the administrators of the other contracting states.

Sec. 60. Errors in Registration. If it is determined by the administrator of a contracting state, as a result of such audits or otherwise, that more vehicles of an applicant should be registered in such state, the administrator may require the fleet owner to register such additional vehicles of the fleet as may be necessary.

ARTICLE 5. Reciprocity

Sec. 70. Grant of Reciprocity. Each of the contracting states grants reciprocity as provided in this article.

Sec. 71. Applicability. The provisions of this agreement with respect to reciprocity shall apply only to a vehicle properly registered in the base state of the vehicle, which state must be a contracting state.

SEC. 72. Nonapplicability to Fleet Vehicles. The reciprocity granted pursuant to this article shall not apply to a vehicle which is entitled to be registered or identified as a part of a prorated fleet.

Sec. 73. Extent of Reciprocity. The reciprocity granted pursuant to this article shall permit both interstate and intrastate operation of a vehicle which is not a commercial vehicle. The reciprocity granted pursuant to this article shall permit the interstate operation of a commercial vehicle and intrastate operation which is incidental to a trip of such vehicle involving interstate operation.

SEC. 74. Other Agreements. Nothing in this agreement shall be construed to prohibit any of the contracting states from entering into separate agreements with each other for the granting of temporary permits for the intrastate operation of vehicles registered in the other state; nor to prevent any of the contracting states from entering into agreements to grant reciprocity for intrastate operation within any zone or zones agreed upon by the states.

SEC. 75. Establishment of New Residence. Whenever an individual who is the owner of a noncommercial vehicle granted reciprocity pursuant to this agreement establishes domicile during the registration period in another contracting state, he shall not be required to register his vehicle in such state until the expiration of the current registration of the vehicle unless the law of the state otherwise provides.

ARTICLE 6. Effective Date

Sec. 90. Effective Date. This agreement shall become effective on the first day of January, One Thousand Nine Hundred Fifty-six (January 1, 1956) and shall continue in full force thereafter until cancelled or revoked by the official or officials of any contracting state authorized to enter into this agreement upon 30 days written notice to the corresponding officials of the other contracting states.

Appendix

The fees and taxes to be prorated or reciprocated and the restrictions, limitations or conditions of acceptance by the respective states are as follows:

STATE OF CALIFORNIA

Fees and Taxes

- 1. Registration fee, Vehicle Code Section 370.
- 2. Weight fees, Vehicle Code Section 372.
- 3. Vehicle license fee, Revenue and Taxation Code Section 10751.

Restrictions

California exempts from the provisions of this agreement:

- 1. Non-commercial vehicles without regard to residence or gainful employment of the owner or weight in excess of 6,000 pounds gross weight which enter the State of California after the beginning of a registration year and while still displaying a legal registration plate of the former home state are exempt from registration and the payment of registration fees for the remainder of the registration year.
- 2. Two-wheel trailers having a net weight of not exceeding 1,000 pounds and a gross weight not exceeding 2,500 pounds which do not exceed 80 inches in width nor have more than 48 square feet loading space which are duly registered in another state and operated under a short term lease while being used by an operator of a private passenger vehicle to transport the lessee's personal property are exempt from registration and payment of registration fees.
- 3. Vehicles of the two classes described above cannot be considered as parts of fleets under this agreement nor can their mileage be included in the mileage of any fleet under this agreement.
- Quarterly registration of commercial vehicles as provided in Section 372.1, Vehicle Code, shall not be permitted under this agreement.

STATE OF COLORADO

Fees and Taxes

- 1. Vehicle plate fee, Chap. 16, Colorado Statutes Annotated, 13-5-23, as amended Colorado Revised Statutes 1953, 1954 and 1955.
- 2. Specific ownership tax, Chap. 16, Colorado Statutes Annotated, as amended 13-5-5, Colorado Revised Statutes 1953.

Restrictions

1. The State of Colorado reserves the right to apply the minimum weight in defining commercial vehicles as empty weight in excess of 4,500 pounds instead of gross weight in excess of 6,000 pounds.

STATE OF IDAHO

Fees and Taxes

1. Registration and gross weight fees for commercial vehicles having gross weights in excess of 6,000 pounds, Uniform Registration Act, Section 49-127, 3, 4 and 5.

Restrictions

None.

STATE OF KANSAS

Fees and Taxes to Be Prorated

1. License registration (including trailer identification) and weight fees, Statutes of 1949, Chapter 8, Article 1, and 1955 supplement of said statutes.

Fees and Taxes to Be Reciprocated

1. License registration (including trailer identification), weight and trip fees, Statutes of 1949, Chap 8, Article 1, and 1955 supplement of said statutes.

Restrictions

1. The State of Kansas is bound by the definition of a commercial vehicle as required by the law of that state which is as follows:

Commercial vehicle shall mean any vehicle used or maintained for the transportation of persons for hire, compensation, profit, or in furtherance of a commercial enterprise, or any vehicle designed, used, or maintained primarily for the transportation of property or for drawing other vehicles so designed, used or maintained except: That the term commercial vehicle shall not include any motor vehicle having a gross weight of 6,000 pounds or less if such motor vehicle is designed, used, or maintained primarily for the transportation of property.

2. The reciprocity granted by this agreement shall permit only interstate operation of commercial vehicles.

STATE OF MONTANA

Fees and Taxes

- 1. Registration fees, Revised Codes of Montana, 1947, Section 53-114, as amended.
- 2. Gross vehicle weight fees, Revised Codes of Montana, 1947, Sections 53-615 and 53-615.1, as amended.

Restrictions

1. From the definition of commercial vehicles the State of Montana is required to exempt:

Farm vehicles owned or operated by ranchers or farmers in the transportation of their own ranch, farm, orchard or dairy products from point of production to market, or of supplies, commodities, or equipment to be used on the ranch, farm, orchard, or dairy, or in the infrequent or seasonal transportation by one farmer for another for any purpose other than commercial hire of products

of the farm, orchard or dairy, or of supplies or commodities to be used on the farm, orchard or dairy.

2 With reference to proration, the State of Montana is bound by the following provision:

Any owner engaged in operating fleets of two or more vehicles in this state in interstate commerce may register and license such fleet for operation in this state by declaring the total mileage operated by such vehicles in all states and in this state during the preceding calendar year and describing and identifying each such vehicle to be operated in this state during the ensuing license year. Such statement shall also designate a sufficient number of certain vehicles to be registered and licensed under this section.

- 3. The reciprocity granted pursuant to this agreement shall permit both interstate and intrastate operation of a vehicle which is not a commercial vehicle. The reciprocity granted pursuant to this article shall permit the interstate operation of a commercial vehicle. If the vehicle engages in intrastate operations full registration fees are required.
- 4. Further, the State of Montana desires to make clear that this agreement:
 - a. Does not waive the importer's (gasoline) tax. Chapter 174, Session Laws of 1955.
 - b. Does not waive the requirement of "diesel fuel permits." Chapter 162, Session Laws of 1955.
 - c. Does not waive Railroad and Public Service Commission fees. Chapter 1, Title 8, Revised Codes of Montana, 1947, as amended.
 - d. Does not permit or provide for proration of quarterly registration and gross vehicle weight fees. Chapter 258, Session Laws of 1955.
 - e. Does not waive motor fuel taxes. Title 84, Revised Codes of Montana, 1947, as amended, and Chapter 255, Session Laws of 1955.
 - f. Does not waive "temporary trip permit" fees, where applicable. Chapter 177, Session Laws of 1955.
 - g. Does not waive the requirements of the Montana State Agricultural Department, Horticultural Division, on any loads of produce which are not sealed. Chapter 11, Title 3, Revised Codes of Montana, 1947, as amended.
 - h. Does not waive any taxes or fees that may be enacted by the State of Montana after the execution of this agreement and which would be in conflict herewith.

DEAR MR. O'CONNELL:

Question

You have asked our opinion whether there is any requirement that amendments to a bill proposed by a conference committee report be printed prior to the adoption of the report.

Opinion

From the limited research which we have been able to do in the time afforded, it appears that neither house has normally required conference reports to be printed for the use of the member prior to action thereon. Since the printing requirement was added to the Constitution of California in 1879, an unbroken practice has sanctioned the adoption of conference reports which were not in print and neither the courts nor this office have ever passed upon the validity of this procedure.

The pertinent provisions of the Constitution, however, seem to require that amendments proposed by a conference committee report be printed prior to the adoption of the report, notwithstanding the fact that the Legislature may have complied with this requirement only in very rare instances. It is our opinion, therefore, that if a member should object to the consideration of such a report in a case where the amendments have not been printed for the use of the members, the presiding officer should rule that the report may not be considered until the proposed amendments have been printed either in the Journal of the house or as a separate document. However, if either house of the Legislature does not comply with this procedure but adopts the conference report without the required printing of the conference amendments and the bill is chaptered and filed with the Secretary of State, we believe the courts of this State will uphold the validity of the act. We reach this result in view of the fact that for many years our courts have held that they will not go behind a duly authenticated and enrolled bill to inquire whether procedural requirements of the Constitution were complied with in the course of its passage

Analysis

Your question requires an analysis of Section 15 of Article IV of the California Constitution, there being no statute or rule which bears upon

the printing of conference committee amendments prior to adoption of the conference committee report. Since 1879 that section of the Constitution has provided:

"No law shall be passed except by bill. Nor shall any bill be put upon its final passage until the same, with the amendments thereto, shall have been printed for the use of the members; nor shall any bill become a law unless the same be read on three several days in each house, unless, in case of urgency, two-thirds of the house where such bill may be pending, shall, by a vote of yeas and nays, dispense with this provision. Any bill may originate in either house, but may be amended or rejected by the other; and on the final passage of all bills they shall be read at length, and the vote shall be by yeas and nays upon each bill separately, and shall be entered on the Journal; and no bill shall become a law without the concurrence of a majority of the members elected to each house" (Emphasis added)

The second sentence of this section is the one which concerns us and the Debates and Proceedings of the Constitutional Convention (1878), at pages 777 to 779, indicate that this language was proposed on the floor of the convention and was based upon similar requirements in the constitutions of Pennsylvania and Illinois In the debate on the floor of the convention, the sponsors emphasized the need for both reading and printing as a safeguard against hasty legislation and as a means for insuring that all members could know what they were approving by their votes. Opponents of the suggestion urged that such details be left to the procedural rules of the Legislature itself. The proponents were successful, the language was adopted as part of the Constitution in 1879, and it has remained unchanged to the present day.

The 1880 Legislature had difficulty in determining whether the new Constitution required bills to be read at length, and this resulted in the test case of Weill v. Kenfield, 54 Cal 111 (1880) 1 In this case, at a time when our courts appeared willing to examine the Journals of the Legislature in order to challenge the validity of an enrolled bill upon procedural grounds, the court held invalid a bill that had not been read at length on three days and where this constitutional requirement had not been suspended. This was done notwithstanding a contention that the framers of the Constitution had intended only a purely nominal reading of a portion of the bill, as was the common practice in legislative bodies, and notwithstanding the suggestion that printing was required in order to fill the need for every member to know what he was voting upon. The court said that the words "be read" were used in their ordinary, non-technical meaning. If we apply the reasoning of that court to the present question, there seems little doubt that the requirement that a bill, with the amendments thereto, be printed prior to final passage, applies to amendments made by the adoption of a conference report.

We are aware that the two houses of the Legislature have seldom, if ever, complied with this procedure and that conference reports are customarily adopted by the houses without previously printing the

amendments proposed by such reports. A spot check of the Journals of the houses since the adoption of the 1879 Constitution did not disclose an instance where the Journals show that the conference amendments were printed prior to action upon the report. The Senate Journal for May 6, 1881, at page 553, shows that a point of order was raised that amendments reported by conference committee and concurred in by the Senate on the previous day should have been printed to comply with the Constitution. The point of order was overruled but no reason for this ruling was given. It is also clear that courts are reluctant to interfere with long-continued legislative practice, and will accord great weight to the Legislature's continuous interpretation of constitutional requirements. On the other hand, in at least one instance, our Supreme Court overturned many years of legislative practice in the creation of interim committees where it found the provisions of the Constitution clear on the matter. (See, Special Assembly Interim Committee v. Southard, 13 C. 2d 497, 509.) For these reasons we have felt it necessary to investigate, to the extent possible in the time allowed, the conclusions reached in other jurisdictions on the point involved here.

The Illinois courts have repeatedly held, under a constitutional provision upon which ours was based, that conference committee amendments must be printed for the use of the members prior to adoption. (Neiberger v. McCullough, 97 N. E. 660; McAuliffe v. O'Connell, 101 N. E. 419; and Meister v. Carbaugh, 142 N. E. 189.) In the Neiberger case, the supreme court considered a constitutional provision regarding printing of bills with amendments that is the same as the provision in our Constitution. It held that a bill was invalid as not having been properly passed in a case where a bill was enacted by the adoption of a conference report that had not been printed, notwithstanding the fact that it had been the custom of the Illinois Legislature for many years to enact bills without first printing conference reports prior to their adoption. This ruling was followed in other decisions of the Illinois Supreme Court, the latest being Meister v. Carbaugh, 142 N. E. 189, decided in 1923, in which the principle was reiterated, although in the particular case the legislation was upheld for the reason that 12 years had elapsed since the enactment of the statute and the parties had lost any right to contest the validity of the act on that ground because vested rights had been created on the assumption that the act was valid.

A different conclusion was reached by the Supreme Court of Colorado in Board of Commissioners of Pueblo County v. Strait, 85 Pac. 178 In that case, the court held that a constitutional provision that all substantial amendments to bills shall be printed for the use of members before the final vote is taken on the bill did not apply to amendments recommended by a conference committee of the two houses. In that state, however, the constitution contained a specific provision that reports of conference committees could not be adopted except by a majority vote and the entry of the names voting recorded upon the journal, and the decision was apparently based in part upon this provision as constituting a recognition of the fact that amendments proposed by a conference committee were on a different basis than amendments proposed by other committees.

It is also worth referring to the practice in Pennsylvania, whose constitution was adopted in 1874 and was referred to in our constitutional debates as one of the recent precedents upon which this provision of our 1879 Constitution is based. In that state the precedents of the houses show clearly that the printing of conference reports has been required at least since 1874. (See, *Pennsylvania Manual* (1948), Decisions of the House, No. 78, at page 468; also Rules of the Senate, Rule 20, at page 326)

Two further points need clarification. The first is that the requirement for printing cannot be dispensed with by a two-thirds vote under the provisions of Section 15 of Article IV, that being permitted only with respect to the requirement for reading on three separate days. The second is that we have no doubt that adoption of the conference report constitutes "final passage" insofar as the provisions of Section 15 are concerned; it has been so treated for many years with respect to the constitutional requirement for the number of votes required, and this interpretation is incorporated into the Rules of the houses. (Assembly Standing Rule No. 79; Mason's Manual, Sec. 770 (5).) In view of the foregoing, it is our conclusion that, if the question could be raised in the courts of our State, they could very well hold that Section 15 of Article IV requires amendments proposed by a conference committee report to be printed in some form for the use of the members prior to the adoption of the report and the enactment of the bill to which the amendments are addressed. A member is entitled to insist that the conference amendments be printed for his use prior to the time they are voted upon. The situation in this regard is somewhat like the right of a member to insist that a bill be read, where that requirement has not been dispensed with by a two-thirds vote. It has hardly ever been done, but we think the right exists.

We would stress, however, that it is highly improbable that the courts of this State will ever consider this question or that they would invalidate a bill that had been enacted by a conference report without the printing of the amendments proposed therein prior to the adoption of the report. The courts in this State in a number of cases have announced what is known as the enrolled bill rule. They have held in substance that a statute, properly enrolled and authenticated, conclusively establishes not only the context of the law but the due performance of all steps requisite to its passage by the Legislature and that they will not look behind the enrolled bill to the Journals of the houses or consider other evidence that might indicate irregularities that occurred in the course of the enactment of the statute. This principle was first announced by the Supreme Court in Sherman v. Story, 30 Cal. 253 It was re-examined in County of Yolo v. Colgan, 132 Cal. 265 and in a number of later cases, such as Spaulding v. Desmond, 188 Cal. 783. In view of this well-settled doctrine, it is our conclusion that the courts will not invalidate a statute that has been enacted by the adoption of a conference report without amendments contained therein first having been printed for the use of the members.

Budget Bill-No. 2254

DEAR MR. LANTERMAN: You have submitted to us the following question:

Question

If the Legislature declares intent in the Budget Bill for immediate acquisition of sites for which an appropriation is made in Item 419.5 of the 1956 Budget Act, will that preclude the Governor from reducing or eliminating the item, or if he does reduce it, from the expenditure being made for some sites, rather than all?

Opinion

In our opinion the Legislature's statement of intent would not preclude the Governor from reducing or eliminating the appropriation in question. While the matter is not free from doubt, we believe that if he does reduce the appropriation, the agency to which the appropriation is made could purchase as many of the sites in question as it is possible for it to purchase within the limits of the reduced appropriation.

Analysis

The constitutional provisions relating to the power of the Governor to eliminate or reduce items of appropriation in the Budget Bill appear in Sections 16 and 34 of Article IV of the Constitution.

Section 34 of Article IV provides, in part:

"In any appropriation bill passed by the Legislature, the Governor may reduce or eliminate any one or more items of appropriation of money while approving other portions of the bill, whereupon the effect of such action and the further procedure shall be as provided in Section 16 of this article."

Section 16 of Article IV provides:

"Sec. 16. Every bill which may have passed the Legislature shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the Governor. If he approves it, he shall sign it; but if not, he shall return it, with his objections, to the house in which it originated, which shall enter such objections upon the Journal and proceed to reconsider it. If after such reconsideration, it again pass both houses, by yeas and nays, two-thirds of the members elected to each house voting therefor, it shall become a law, notwithstanding the Governor's objections. If any bill shall not be returned within 10 days after it shall have been presented to him (Sundays excepted), the same shall become a law in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the Legislature, by adjournment, prevents such return, in which case it shall not become a law, unless the Governor, within 30 days after such adjournment (Sundays excepted), shall sign and deposit the same in the office of the Secretary of State, in which case it shall become a law in like manner as

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if it had been signed by him before adjournment. If any bill presented to the Governor contains several items of appropriation of money, he may object to one or more items, while approving other portions of the bill. In such case he shall append to the bill at the time of signing it, a statement of the items to which he objects, and the reasons therefor, and the appropriation so objected to shall not take effect unless passed over the Governor's veto, as hereinbefore provided. If the Legislature be in session, the Governor shall transmit to the house in which the bill originated a copy of such statement, and the items so objected to shall be separately reconsidered in the same manner as bills which have been disapproved by the Governor."

As indicated by the constitutional provisions quoted the Governor may eliminate or reduce items of appropriation in the Budget Bill. Since this power is conferred upon the Governor by the Constitution, there would appear to be no basis upon which the Legislature could limit or restrict the powers so conferred. In view of this, we believe that the Governor could eliminate or reduce the appropriation in question despite the Legislature's statement of intent.

The answer to the second portion of your question is not so clear. If the Governor does reduce the appropriation in question, it is obvious that the agency to which the appropriation is made could not purchase all of the sites designated by the Legislature. Although we have been unable to find any authority for the proposition, we believe that in such case, the agency would be entitled to exercise its discretion and to purchase as many of the sites as it is possible for it to do within the limits of the reduced appropriation, and subject to revision or alteration of the agency's fiscal year budget by the Department of Finance. (See Art. IV, Sec. 1a, Constitution; Gov. C. Secs. 13320-13326, incl.) The agency in this way would be carrying out the Legislature's intent to the extent that it is possible for it to do so. This reasoning is based on the assumption that there is nothing contained in the item of appropriation or in the Legislature's statement of intent indicating that if the agency is not able to purchase all of the sites designated it shall not purchase any of such sites. We have examined Item 419 5 and have found nothing to that effect contained therein.
