## PROCLAMATION OF THE GOVERNOR

The Chief Clerk directed that the Proclamation of the Governor convening the Legislature in extraordinary session be read.

Whereupon the following Proclamation was read.

## Proclamation

## EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, STATE OF CALIFORNIA

WHEREAS, An extraordinary session has arisen and now exists requiring that the Legislature of the State of California be convened in extraordinary session, now, therefore,

I, EDMUND G. BROWN, Governor of the State of California, by virtue of the power and authority in me vested by Section 9 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of California, do hereby convene the Legislature of the State of California to meet in extraordinary session at Sacramento, California, on the seventh day of March, 1962, at 10 a. m. of said day for the following purpose and to legislate upon the following subjects:

Item No. 1 To consider and act upon legislation relative to the issuance of bonds to provide capital outlay for construction or improvement of public schools.

Item No. 2 To consider and act upon legislation to authorize the issuance and sale of general obligation bonds for site acquisition, construction and equipment for state and junior college buildings.

Item No. 3 To consider and act upon legislation relative to the issuance of bonds to provide funds for the acquisition and development of sites for the California state park system.

Item No. 4 To consider and act upon legislation relative to providing funds for the purchase of farms and homes under the Veterans Farm and Home Purchase Act.

Item No. 5 To consider and act upon legislation to increase the compensation of state officers and employees during the 1961-62 fiscal year.

Item No. 6 To consider and act upon legislation to amend Government Code Section 11570 relating to statutory salary adjustments.

Item No. 7 To consider and act upon legislation relative to calling a special election to be held June 5, 1962 and consolidated with the direct primary election to be held on that date.

Item No. 8 To consider and act upon legislation to augment Item 233 of the Budget Act of 1961 relating to the Emergency Fund.

## House Resolution No. 11

Relative to enactment of Congressman Roosevelt's bill (HR 10144) providing for a Federal Equal Employment Opportunity Act

WHEREAS, Congressman James Roosevelt introduced House of Representatives bill 10144 on February 7, 1962, and

WHEREAS, This bill would make it unlawful for employers, employment agencies and labor organizations, engaged in commerce, to discriminate on the basis of race, religion, color, national origin or ancestry, or age, except insofar as religion or age may reasonably relate to the qualifications for employment, and

WHEREAS, This bill would further provide for a federal Equal Employment Opportunity Commission to promote the purposes of this act; and

WHEREAS, Such discrimination is contrary to American principles of liberty and equality of opportunity, is incompatible with the Constitution, forces segments of our population into substandard conditions of living, foments industrial strife and domestic unrest, and

**MEMORANDUM:** Pursuant to Section 7903 of the Welfare and Institutions Code, as added by Chapter 472, Statutes of 1961, this Report of the Coordinating Council on Programs for Handicapped Children is submitted.

The Coordinating Council on Programs for Handicapped Children consists of the Director of Education, the Director of Mental Hygiene, the Director of Public Health, and the Director of Social Welfare. In addition, the Director of Youth Authority has accepted an invitation to attend sessions of the council.

The council held its first meeting on September 25, 1961, to organize. The Director of Public Health was elected chairman for the first year. The council established a staff committee and outlined the work for the first year which is to consist of "surveying the practices and needs for co-ordination" of services for handicapped children. The council will report annually pointing out the co-ordination problems within the State, discuss various facets of the problem and the potential for solution.

The council has met twice since that time and plans quarterly meetings throughout the year. There has been one meeting of the council with the agency administrators whose departments are involved in the council, concerning relationship between the council and the agencies.

The staff committee has met monthly. It is preparing a list of activities of state government for handicapped children to serve as the basis for a clear definition of problems of co-ordination and gaps in services. In addition, the staff committee is undertaking the exploration of the specific problem of care for the multiply handicapped child who is not eligible for care in state institutions for the retarded.

At its meeting on February 26, 1962, the council discussed the problems of special education for the mentally retarded who are being placed in foster homes by the State Department of Mental Hygiene, and care for multiply handicapped who are ineligible for special care not available to other children.

STATEMENT BY LEGISLATIVE ANALYST

State Construction Bond Act Program

March 19, 1962

Section 22 of Senate Bill No 1 proposes the appropriation of \$136,541,271 from bond sources, on the basis of reductions, augmentations and changes recognized by the Senate Finance Capital Outlay Committee, to date. The bond acts of 1955, 1958 and any thereafter enacted must provide the financing. The condition of the State Construction Program Fund (bonds) as shown on page 753 of the Governor's printed budget, indicates that there will be \$51,732,713 available for appropriation and expenditure on July 1, 1962 from prior bond authorizations.

Thus, the available funds will cover only a portion of the total amount proposed for appropriation. As of July 1, 1962 the most critical fund needs are for the construction of projects, proposed in the Budget Bill, that are in the final working drawing stages from prior working drawing appropriations. Equally critical would be the proposals contained in the bill for the purchase of equipment for projects already under construction and expected to be completed within the budget year. Column 2 of the attached tabulation indicates the total construction cost of those projects in the Budget Bill which will be ready to go to bid prior to December 1, 1962 on the basis of working drawings which are in the process of preparation and which were funded for working drawings only in prior budgets. The total of this column is \$43,019,775. Since the State Contract Act requires that funds be available before any project is put out to bid it would appear to be necessary that this amount of the available bond funds would need to be sequestered for the purpose of assuring that this group of projects can be put to bid as the working drawings are completed.

The column labeled "Working Drawings," indicates the total cost of working drawings for projects in the Budget Bill which are proposed either as working drawings only, with construction funding in the future, or as working drawings and construction together, as shown in the next column labeled "Construction." The total of the working

drawing column is \$5,838,096 This includes \$900,000 for preliminary plans which should be available on July, 1962 in order that the procedure of preparing preliminary plans for projects to be included in the Governor's Budget for the 1963-64 fiscal year can proceed without delay This means that the total of the working drawings alone, exclusive of the preliminary plans is \$4,938,096 It may be reasonably assumed that in the period from July 1 to December 1, 1962 not more than half of this amount would be needed to start on working drawings, for the projects involved, in order to avoid any delays in the ultimate completion date of any of the projects included in the Budget Bill This would mean that \$2,460,000 would be needed during the period mentioned in order to permit working drawings to proceed

The column labeled "Site Acquisition" shows that a total of \$8,726,100 is proposed for the acquisition of new or additional sites, in the Budget Bill Most of this total is involved in very large acquisition projects such as the acquisition of a new state college site in the South Bay area of Los Angeles at \$5 million As a practical matter the first six months of the budget year would require almost no commitment of funds for actual purchases since there is a lengthy procedure involving the choosing of a group of sites, investigating them as to suitability, actions by appropriate boards or other bodies to finally choose the site which will be negotiated for or which will go to court in condemnation However, certain funds would be required to permit the various investigations, researches, appraisals, etc. to be carried on We believe that \$500,000 would be adequate for this purpose during this six-month period

The column labeled "Construction After 12/1" indicates those projects for which working drawing funds are already available and for which working drawings are in process but which could not possibly be ready to go to bid before December 1, 1962 Consequently, the total of the column represents an amount for which cash would not be required until some time after that date

To recapitulate, there would be required (1) for going to bid prior to December 1, 1962, \$43,019,775, (2) for preliminary plans, \$900,000, (3) 50 percent of working drawings which would be \$2,460,000 and (4) \$500,000 to permit site acquisitions to proceed These would total \$46,879,775 This would be balanced against an availability of \$51,732,713 leaving a balance of \$4,852,938 to apply against (5) the column labeled "Equipment" which totals \$10,684,393

The equipment column covers the proposals in the Budget Bill for the purchase of equipment for projects which are already under construction and which in a number of cases are expected to be completed within the budget year making the purchase of equipment necessary if the projects are to be available for use upon completion However, as a practical matter we would point out that most equipment lists, particularly such a one as is proposed for Orange County State College at \$1 million for the equipping of the new science building, contain amounts for the purchase of equipment which requires long lead times, sometimes as much as 10 months or more, as well as substantial amounts for the purchase of equipment which can be delivered almost

We believe that the latter category probably comprises no more than \$3,500,000 of the total and represents the only part of the total that could be deferred until after December 1, 1962. This would leave a balance of \$7,184,393 which would need to be funded as of July 1. This in turn would leave a gap of approximately \$2,350,000 in additional funds which would be required for equipment on the basis of the calculation indicated. This \$2,350,000 would have to be provided by some means other than currently available bond funds.

**Assembly Rule No 56—No. 2683**

*Question*

DEAR MR BRADLEY You ask if Assembly Rule No 56 is violated when a bill is held at the desk for 24 hours before being assigned to a committee

*Opinion*

It is our opinion that the rule is not violated.

*Analysis*

Assembly Rule No 56 provides

“Immediately following its first reading, the Speaker shall refer each bill to a committee, unless on a motion the Assembly, by a majority vote of its entire elected membership, shall refer it to some other committee Such motion to refer a bill shall not be debatable ”

The literal meaning of the words “immediately” is “without interval of time, without delay, straightaway” (Webster's New International Dictionary, 2nd Ed, Unabridged.).



However, the courts have often construed the word to mean "within a reasonable time," stating that the word is not of precise signification and its meaning must be determined by the context in which it is used, having regard to all of the circumstances (see cases collected in 20 Words and Phrases, pp 150 et seq, 50 Cal Digest, p 351).

The Legislature has at past extraordinary sessions held bills at the desk for more than 24 hours with no challenge made to such action. At the 1954 First Extraordinary Session, Assembly Bills Nos 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, and 15, and Assembly Constitutional Amendment No 1, all were introduced on March 1 and referred to committee on March 3 (Assembly Journal March 1, 1954, pp 18 et seq; Assembly Journal, March 3, 1954, p 31).

At the 1960 First Extraordinary Session, Assembly Bill No 4 to Assembly Bill No 15, inclusive, were introduced on February 29 and March 1, and referred to committee on March 2 (Assembly Journal, February 29, 1960, p 27, Assembly Journal, March 1, 1960, pp. 30 to 32, inclusive; Assembly Journal, March 2, 1960, p 39). At the 1960 First Extraordinary Session the Speaker announced that pending his reactivation and appointment of the standing committees at the session, he would order that all bills be held at the desk without referral to a committee (Assembly Journal, March 1, 1960, p 30). On March 2, 1960, the Speaker announced the appointment of committee memberships and thereafter assigned the bills to committees (Assembly Journal, March 2, 1960, pp 38 and 39).

In view of the many cases holding that "immediately" means within a reasonable time, and in view of the precedents in the Assembly, it is our opinion that Assembly Rule No 56 is not violated when a bill is held at the desk for 24 hours before referral to committee.

WHEREAS, His keen interest in and success with young people led to his appointment in 1948 as Director of Rancho San Antonio, a home for boys located in Chatsworth, California, a position to which he brought the understanding, wisdom, strength and patience gained through years of service to the young; and

WHEREAS, It was during his directorship and in large part due to his unceasing efforts for the home that the Knights of Columbus adopted the Rancho San Antonio as their "net project"; and

WHEREAS, In 1953 Father Hill was appointed Pastor of the Immaculate Conception Church in Los Angeles and in 1955 was made Pastor of St. Anthony's Church; and

WHEREAS, During his service at St. Anthony's he has given the full measure of his ability for his church and has engaged in such activities as building a new convent, rectory and classrooms and renovating the church, the day nursery and the old convent for the Poor Clare Missionary Sisters; now, therefore, be it

WHEREAS, June 30th of this year 1962 will mark the retirement of Dudley W Frost after more than 40 years of outstanding public service in the business and industrial development of his community and this State; and

WHEREAS, Mr Frost began his long and distinguished career in 1920 as a messenger for the Key System Transit Lines and in the following 16 years he moved up through a succession of more responsible positions, culminating in that of assistant to the vice president in charge of operations, and

WHEREAS, In 1937 he became Manager of the Downtown Merchants Association of Oakland where he earned nationwide distinction for his development of what was then a new merchandising aid—a system of automobile parking lots, and was able in 1950 to establish himself in business as a parking consultant, in which he helped plan and construct some of the biggest parking facilities in our Nation; and

WHEREAS, He was appointed to the Commission of the Port of Oakland in 1946, became its President in 1951 and the following year was named Executive Director, a post which he has held to the present; and

WHEREAS, During Mr Frost's service with the Port of Oakland the port's income reached an all time high due in part to the port's revenue bond program that provided funds for capital improvements for the port, including the first petro-chemical and packaging terminal on the West Coast and new facilities for bulk handling of oil, scrap metal, grain, and cotton, and

WHEREAS, Dudley Frost helped initiate the successful campaign leading to the bond issue financing the multimillion dollar expansion of the Metropolitan Oakland International Airport which will facilitate air passenger and cargo service into the San Francisco Bay area, and he aided in the development of Jack London Square into a nationally famed restaurant center that has provided dining pleasure and entertainment for thousands of persons; and

WHEREAS, In addition to his duties with the Port of Oakland, Mr Frost's business and civic activities have included service as a member of the Oakland Housing Authority, and of both the California and Oakland Chambers of Commerce, officer and Director of the Marine Exchange and the Northern California Ports and Terminal Bureau, Vice President of the World Trade Club, and President of the Oakland Junior Chamber of Commerce, the California, Pacific Coast, and American Associations of Port Authorities, and the Airport Operators Council, and

WHEREAS, It is therefore most appropriate for this body to honor Mr Dudley W Frost upon the occasion of his retirement, now, therefore, be it

The bonds shall comply with Chapter 3 (commencing at Section 4200) of Division 5 of Title 1 of the Government Code. The board may reject any and all bids. In the event all proposals are rejected or no proposals are received, or the estimated cost of the work does not exceed five thousand dollars (\$5,000), or the work consists of channel protection, maintenance work, or emergency work when necessary in order to protect life and property from impending flood damage, the board may have the work done by force account without advertising for bids. The agency may purchase in the open market without advertising for bids, materials and supplies for use in any work, either under contract or by force account, provided, however, that materials and supplies for use in any new construction work or improvement, except work referred to in the preceding sentence, may not be purchased if the cost thereof exceeds five thousand dollars (\$5,000), without advertising for bids and awarding the contract therefor to the lowest responsible bidder."

Legislative History of Chapter 1441, Statutes of 1961—No. 1136

DEAR MR SUMNER The following is a summary of the action taken by the Legislature on Assembly Bill No 2890 (Introduced by Mr. House) which was enacted as Chapter 1441 of the Statutes of 1961.

April 21, 1961 As introduced on this date, the bill would have added Section 54908 to the Government Code to validate any tax or special assessment levied by a county water district for district purposes if the statement and map or plat which were required to be filed by February 1, 1961, were filed on or before May 1, 1961. It was an urgency measure.

April 26, 1961 From printer to Committee on Municipal and County Government.

May 26, 1961. From committee Do pass To Consent Calendar

May 29, 1961. Read second time To engrossment Reported correctly engrossed. To Consent Calendar

May 31, 1961 Urgency clause adopted Read third time, passed, title approved To Senate

(2) Public works and construction by newly incorporated cities can be commenced and continued without delay or restriction, to provide sewers, waterworks, schools, storm drains, flood control works, sanitary facilities, electric and other utility works, firehouses and facilities, police stations, streets, hospitals, and other works, structures, improvements, and facilities required for the public peace, health and safety, and immediately needed to provide for an increased population"

In order that these local agencies do not lose the opportunity of completely [sic] necessary public works, and in order to accomplish all of the purposes of Chapter 47 of the Statutes of 1944 (Second Extraordinary Session), it is necessary that the relief provided by Section 2 of this act take effect immediately."

The amendments shown in the Journal were incorporated in the printed copies of the bill.

In checking the original bill, however, we find that the set of amendments attached within the jacket of the original bill include only the changes made by the *second set* of amendments shown by the Senate Journal to have been adopted in the Senate on June 13, 1961.

June 15, 1961 Urgency clause adopted Read third time, passed, title approved. To Assembly.

June 16, 1961. (The last day of the 1961 Regular Session ) In Assembly. Concurrence in Senate amendments pending. Senate amendments concurred in To enrollment.

At this time the copies of the printed bill contained both sets of amendments shown to have been adopted in the Senate Journal. However, as indicated above, amendments to incorporate only the changes made by the second set of those amendments are attached to the jacket of the original bill.

We have been informed by the Assembly staff that the discrepancy between the printed copies of the bill and the amendments in the jacket of the bill itself was not found until after the Legislature had adjourned

The file indicates that on June 19, 1961, a correction of the printed copies of the bill was ordered and the bill was reprinted so as to include only the changes shown to have been made by the second set of amendments adopted in the Senate on June 13, 1961. This correction put the bill in the form in which it was enrolled, sent to the Governor, approved, and chaptered as Chapter 1441

There are printed in the Assembly Daily Journal for June 16, 1961, at page 5906, the Senate amendments which were forwarded to the Assembly by the Senate, read to the Assembly, and adopted by this House by a roll call vote of 72-0 These were the Senate amendments which were sent to the Assembly Enrollment Room to be placed in the enrolled bill, after the House had concurred in them

An examination of the Senate Daily Journal for June 13, 1961, page 3964, shows an entirely different set of amendments were adopted by the Senate on that date than were sent to the Assembly. Therefore, it

must be assumed that Mr. Murphy cited from pages 3972 and 3973 of the Senate Corrected Journal, and not from the Senate Daily Journal for June 13

The corrected Senate Journal for June 13, at pages 3972 and 3973, shows two different sets of amendments to Assembly Bill No. 2890 being adopted by the Senate on that date

May I hope that this explanation will show that Assembly Bill No. 2890 was properly enrolled

Commercial poker operations in such counties are particularly likely to attract syndicated criminal interests and other unsavory elements. The large commercial establishments most likely to be established in such counties present a ready opportunity for mass impoverishment of citizens of the county, with consequent jeopardy of home life and general moral decline. With a multiplicity of cities in such a county, an individual city cannot by prohibiting draw poker within its own boundaries protect itself from the consequences of the existence of poker parlors in neighboring cities. Such problems as traffic, for example, spill over from a city allowing draw poker to nearby cities that do not. And the citizens of a city prohibiting draw poker can readily go to a city permitting it, but the consequences are visited on the city in which such persons reside.

Exercising its discretion to recognize degrees of evil as well as distinctive evils, the Legislature finds that counties with a population exceeding 4,000,000 constitute a special problem, and it is reasonable classification to adopt prohibitory legislation applicable only to such counties. Recognizing further that the success of legislation in this field is dependent to a considerable degree on public sympathy therewith, the

Legislature has made operativeness of the prohibition in such a county contingent on an affirmative vote of the people, as has sometimes previously been done in the field of control of alcoholic beverage sales."

I go back to the year that Mr Lobkowitzky ran for mayor of our city He was a naturalized citizen of modest means But Joe Lobkowitzky had energy and virtue and wisdom People saw that this man had what his revered opponent lacked, they pushed him into office What do you think of that? I think that's America

Yes, I remember that election It was a pretty tame one by your Latin-American standards some lusty verbal wars between the candidates beforehand, and then a general rush to the polls But, Juanita, we Americans should look around at the shaky situations in other lands and value more the fact that our Nation is peaceful and strong and secure We know she is secure Ours is the Nation which dominates world trade, which stands strong in the silent duel of the Big Two for the preservation of world freedom, and which has fought victoriously in the front lines of two world wars to uphold what she believes and practices In short, we can feel the vast weight of America She is a bulwark

My history class has revealed a national heritage which can't help but substantiate this view We should not pride ourselves solely on the courage and wisdom of America's founders, or the growth of our Nation in less than 200 years, from obscurity to preeminence Nor should we only recognize the fact that America has, in many cases, been the leader, the first first with a working democracy first with a working written Constitution, first with such a statement as the Monroe Doctrine, or a plan for world peace, first with such safeguards of democracy as referendum and recall, first with any such action as the Marshall Plan Above all, the heritage we possess should give us a

feeling of roots, a feeling of belonging not merely to ourselves in the present, but to the whole movement which we call, 'America.'

These gifts should create in us a compulsion to repay. That's the second part of my vision of America's duties. Being an American, Juanita, should hurt. Anything of value is dear because we have had to sacrifice a little of ourselves to it. So we should do more than pay our taxes, observe the laws, and fight for our Country when called. We should live our Americanism just as we should live our knowledge or our religion. This would include everything from defending her honor verbally to flying the Flag in recognition of her dead on Memorial Day. It would necessitate an interest in local and national affairs, enough interest to get to that school board meeting or support that worthy candidate.

So, Juanita, I've outlined everything which forms the image of America in my mind. Perhaps you think that in this day of flying missiles and plastic bombs my image is no more than a noble mirage. No, I believe in America. The character of her history and her gifts has given me faith, and this faith will shape the duties I must perform. This faith is what being an American should, and does, mean to me.

**Assembly Bill No. 9, 1962 First Extraordinary Session—Draw Poker—No. 2734**

#### Question

DEAR MR WILLSON You have asked for our opinion on the constitutionality of Assembly Bill No 9 of the 1962 First Extraordinary Session if amended to apply only in counties with a population exceeding 4,000,000

#### Opinion

In our opinion the statute would be valid if there exist factual differences between such counties and all other counties, amounting to a natural, intrinsic, or constitutional distinction reasonably related to the purposes of the statute If such factual differences are deemed to exist, the inclusion in the bill of legislative findings describing such differences would strengthen the bill against constitutional attack

#### Analysis

As amended, Assembly Bill No 9 would add Section 337s to the Penal Code, to read:

“337s (a) Every person who deals, plays, or carries on, opens, or causes to be opened, or who conducts, either as owner or employee whether for hire or not any game of draw poker, including low ball poker, is guilty of a misdemeanor

“(b) Subdivision (a) shall become operative in a county only if the board of supervisors thereof by resolution directs that there be placed on the ballot at a designated county election the question whether draw poker, including low ball poker, shall be prohibited in the county and a majority of

electors voting thereupon vote affirmatively Such question shall appear on the ballot in substantially the following form-

'Shall draw poker, including low ball poker, be prohibited in ----- County? Yes ----- No -----

If a majority of electors voting thereon vote affirmatively, draw poker shall be prohibited in both incorporated and unincorporated territory in the county

"(c) Any county or city ordinances in any county prohibiting, restricting, or regulating the playing of draw poker and other acts relating to draw poker remain in effect until, pursuant to subdivision (b), the electorate of the county determines that subdivision (a) shall be operative in the county

"(d) This section applies only to counties with a population exceeding 4,000,000 "

Section 25 of Article IV of the California Constitution provides that the Legislature shall not pass local or special laws with respect to punishment of crimes and misdemeanors or in any other case in which a general law can be made applicable Section 11 of Article I requires that all laws of a general nature have a uniform operation These provisions do not, however, prevent classification if based upon a natural, intrinsic or constitutional distinction reasonably related to the purposes of the statute (*Ray v Parker*, 15 Cal 2d 275, *Werner v Southern Cal. etc., Newspapers*, 35 Cal 2d 121) Every presumption is in favor of the validity of the legislative act, and the legislative classification will not be disturbed unless it is palpably arbitrary in its nature and neither founded upon nor supported by reason (*In re Herrera*, 23 Cal 2d 206) If any state of facts can be conceived that would sustain the classification, there is a presumption of the existence of those facts (*In re Fuller*, 115 Cal 2d 425) For a case going very far in mentioning a statute apparently designed to apply to only one institution and surrounding area see *Matter of Application of Burke*, 160 Cal 300

State laws creating criminal offenses for some but not all counties appear to be very rare (see Sec 500, Pen C, applicable only to the City and County of San Francisco, the validity of which has never been ruled on by the courts) Such laws are found in Maryland (see *Salsburg v Maryland*, 346 US 545, 98 L. ed 281, fn 8), and a Maryland Sunday closing law largely exempting one county was upheld by the United States Supreme Court against the contention of denial of equal protection (*McGowan v Maryland*, 29 L W 4488) The court emphasized the breadth of legislative discretion in such classification It has been said that the test under the California constitutional provisions and the test under the equal protection clause are essentially the same (*Los Angeles County v Southern Cal Tel Co*, 32 Cal 2d 378)

As indicated above, strong presumptions favor the constitutionality of a legislative classification We cannot say that facts justifying the classification do not exist, and if the courts should conclude that the existence of such facts is conceivable, the statute would be upheld Legislative findings, while not binding on the courts are entitled to great weight (*Redevelopment Agency v Hayes*, 122 Cal App 2d 177) If relevant factual differences exist between counties over 4,000,000 and

other counties, legislative findings describing those differences could strengthen the bill against attack on constitutional grounds.

WHEREAS, There are at least six state agencies which fix salaries for employees in the California state service (1) the Legislature for certain elective officers and board and commission members; (2) the Board of Regents for University of California employees; (3) the Trustees of the State College System for State College employees; (4) the Director of Finance for certain exempt employees; (5) the San Francisco Port Authority for certain of its craft employees; and (6) the State Personnel Board for civil service employees; and

WHEREAS, Representatives of these various salary fixing authorities present separate, different, and often conflicting recommendations to the Legislature, often taking different approaches in theory of justification and application; and

WHEREAS, The California State Employees' Association and other representatives of employee organizations, particularly those representing employment segments, regularly present salary increase requests different from those advocated by the representatives of state salary fixing authorities; and

WHEREAS, The salary program presented in the Governor's Budget is often different from those recommendations by the various state salary fixing agencies and employee organizations; and

WHEREAS, The Legislative Analyst regularly presents conclusions on salary programs different from and in conflict with those of the Governor, the various state salary fixing agencies, and the various employee organizations; and

WHEREAS, The previously mentioned variety of conflicting programs presents the Legislature with extremely difficult problems of co-ordination, analysis, interpretation and decision; and

WHEREAS, Though it is recognized that these salary increase issues are of vital importance to the implementation of the program of state government and to the employees of the State, it is not reasonable to impose on the Legislature the sole burden of placing the varying views in logical context; and

WHEREAS, Because of time available for review and the pressing needs of other programs, Legislators often feel that they have not had an adequate opportunity to give this issue of salaries the attention it deserves; and

WHEREAS, This problem is particularly acute in regard to so-called "inequity" or "special" salary increase programs; and

WHEREAS, The Governor has recently taken the progressive step of establishing an informal Employee Management Conference to meet regularly to review matters relating to personnel practices and make recommendations to him; and

WHEREAS, It would be very valuable to the Legislature to have the issues in the salary increase programs clearly delineated and areas of agreement and disagreement identified, now, therefore, be it

*Resolved by the Assembly of the State of California, That the Governor be requested, through the assistance of his Employee Management Conference, to review the various salary increase programs and viewpoints which will be presented to the 1963 Regular Session of the Legislature in order to identify the programs which will be presented, the issues involved, and the areas of agreement and disagreement, and that this information be presented to the Legislature and to the various committees at the time that salary increase matters are considered*

3 Estimate the effects of fees on the growth of the radioisotope industry in California

4 Consider possible alternative means that might be used to fund the program

B If a revision of the fee schedule to relieve those who are most seriously affected is found practicable, present to the State Board of Public Health a proposed amendment of the regulation to accomplish this change at the earliest possible date.

C Present the findings and conclusions of this study, together with essential supporting information, and recommendations for any needed legislative action, to the Assembly Interim Committee on Public Health not later than October 1, 1962, and be it further

THE HONORABLE FRANK LANTERMAN, MEMBER OF THE ASSEMBLY, has asked the following questions:

1 May the Legislature grant or authorize the State Personnel Board, Department of Finance, Regents of the University of California, Trustees of the California State Colleges, or any other state agency to grant salary increases retroactive to January 1, 1962, for (a) state civil service employees, (b) state employees exempt from civil service, and (c) state officers whose salaries are fixed by statute?

2 May the Budget Bill for the 1962-1963 fiscal year be validly used to appropriate funds for salary increases covering the last six months of the preceding fiscal year?

3 If Assembly Bill No 50, as amended March 22, 1962, of the 1962 First Extraordinary Session is adopted, may funds appropriated thereby be used to pay salary increases retroactive to January 1, 1962?

The conclusions are as follows:

1 The Legislature may not grant or authorize any state agency to grant retroactive salary increases to state officers or employees unless at the time services are performed for which additional compensation is to be provided, the salary rates for such officers or employees are not fixed or definite

2 Funds appropriated by the Budget Bill for the 1962-1963 fiscal year may be used to pay salary increases for the last six months of the preceding fiscal year although such funds may not be expended prior to July 1 of the 1962-1963 fiscal year

3 Funds appropriated by Assembly Bill No 50, First Extraordinary Session, as amended March 22, 1962, under the language of Section 2 thereof may only be expended prospectively and not retroactively and no constitutional question is involved "

#### Analysis

1 Section 31 of Article IV of the California Constitution provides in part "The Legislature shall have no power to make any gift or authorize the making of any gift, or any public money or thing of value to any individual."

Section 32 provides "The Legislature shall have no power to grant, any extra compensation or allowance to any public officer, agent, servant, or contractor, after service has been rendered, "

The question has been asked whether the Legislature may grant or authorize a state agency to grant a retroactive salary increase to state officers or employees including officers whose salary is fixed by statute in the light of the above sections of the Constitution prohibiting the making of gifts or granting extra compensation by the Legislature

The granting of a retroactive salary adjustment would not appear to violate Section 31 of Article IV of the Constitution since the courts have held that the Legislature does not make a gift where funds are appropriated for a public purpose (*Dittus v Cranston*, 53 Cal 2d 284) The efficiency, retention and recruitment of public employees are directly related to rates of pay and funds expended therefor serve a public purpose

The Legislature may not, however, grant extra compensation for services already performed under Section 32 of Article IV of the Constitution This section has been held not to apply where the salary rate during the period in which service was rendered was not fixed but subject to adjustment upon a final determination of the salary-fixing authority In the case of *Johnston v Rapp*, 103 Cal App 2d 202, the board of trustees of a high school district reserved the right during a four-year contract of employment with the superintendent to adjust his compensation The court reasoned (at page 205) .

"The constitutional provision in the last mentioned section is against 'extra compensation or allowance' In the instant case the contract contains the following provision that the board 'reserves the right to increase the salary during the four year period' Such a reservation clearly indicates that the named salary was subject to increase within the discretion of the board and was not, therefore, for a fixed amount for the entire four-year period The effect

of the increase voted by the board at the end of the first year of the contract was to fix the salary for the ensuing year. It did not constitute extra compensation for the services performed and was not prohibited by section 32 of article IV of the Constitution. The result obtained was the same as if a new contract had been executed for the school year commencing July 1, 1949, and ending June 30, 1950."

This office has so held in similar situations (23 Ops Cal Atty Gen. 271, 33 Ops Cal Atty Gen 143, 8 Ops Cal Atty Gen 146)

The question was involved in the case of *Walker v County of Los Angeles*, 55 Cal 2d 626, wherein county employees sought to have the Board of Supervisors of Los Angeles County properly determine salary rates on the basis of prevailing rates in private employment. The Supreme Court held the rates to be improperly determined and the salary ordinance fixing them invalid. Against a contention that the trial court in the case had improperly decreed that the board of supervisors may provide for retroactive salaries and wages, the Supreme Court held that the salaries were improperly fixed in the first instance and could thereafter be properly fixed without violation of Section 34 of Article IV.

A leading case on this question in another jurisdiction involving the same constitutional limitation is *Timmerman v City of New York*, 69 N Y S 2d 102, affirmed 70 N Y S 2d 140. In that case, the validity of a retroactive pay increase to employees of the New York City Transit System was considered. In response to a threatened strike in February, 1946, the Mayor of New York appointed a special committee to inquire into the working conditions and wages of the transit workers. As it appeared that the committee would not come forth with findings by July 1, 1946, the beginning of the next fiscal year, the unions demanded assurances that the increases would be effective July 1, 1946, irrespective of when the committee made its findings. The Chairman of the Board of Transportation gave such assurances and a strike was averted. Eventually the increases were made retroactive to July 1, 1946, and an action was brought on the ground that this was extra compensation for services already rendered in violation of the New York constitutional provision. The court held that the retroactive increase was not unconstitutional because the services were rendered in reliance upon an agreement that if the employees continued to work after July 1, 1946, the increases decided upon would be retroactive to that date. Thus, the constitutional provision does not operate, under the holding of this case, where there is an agreement between the authorities and the employees before the services are rendered, that if the employees will continue working after the intended effective date of the increases, the increases will be made retroactive to that date.

The general principle applicable in all of the situations noted above is that where there is an arrangement either contractual or prescribed by law whereby the salary rates for public employees are not fixed during a period in which further adjustments are contemplated, the constitutional prohibition against payment of extra compensation does not apply.

The Legislature with respect to civil service employees has provided in Section 18850 of the Government Code a means whereby proposed adjustments may be made retroactively without violation of the constitutional provision. This section reads in part:

“ . . . The board [State Personnel Board] may make a change in salary range retroactive to the date of application for such change.”

As a matter of normal procedure, requests for salary adjustments are received by the State Personnel Board, investigated by the staff of the board and set for hearing before the board itself. Consequently the adjustment applied for is not passed upon by the board until some time after the request is filed. Section 18850 permits the administrative consideration of the merits of the adjustment without peril to the applicant in jeopardizing an adjustment which may be justified as of the time of application.

Under the principal stated above, the language of Section 18850 does not violate the constitutional mandate against payment of extra compensation because upon the filing of an application, the salary rate under consideration is not fixed but subject to change based upon prevailing rates in similar public and private employment. The State Personnel Board is under continuing mandate of Section 18850, Government Code, which provides:

“The board shall establish and adjust salary ranges for each class of position in the state civil service. In establishing or changing such ranges consideration shall be given to the prevailing rates for comparable service in other public employment and in private business. . . .”

Consequently, where salaries of state officers and employees are below the levels of pay in other private or public employment the State Personnel Board must study and survey such conditions in adjusting state salaries.

Furthermore, on three occasions the Legislature has appropriated funds for payment of salary increases retroactively to state officers and employees. In 1940 at the First Extraordinary Session of the 53d Legislature, Chapter 65 (Stats 1941, page 173) appropriated \$393,282.00 from the Emergency Fund and Section 2 of the chapter read as follows:

“Such of the amount hereby appropriated shall be allocated to the several state officers, departments, boards, bureaus, commissions and other state agencies in augmentation of their respective appropriations for support for the Ninety-first and Ninety-second Fiscal Years in such amounts as will make sufficient money available during said fiscal years to pay to each state employee in the state civil service whose salary or wage, or a portion thereof, is payable from the General Fund, and is less than one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150) per month, any adjustment or salary or wage to which said employee, during the Ninety-first and Ninety-second Fiscal Years, under the provisions of Section 70 of the State Civil Service Act, (1) may have heretofore been entitled if the money



therefor had been available, effective the date such employee became entitled to such adjustment, and (2) may hereafter become entitled."

In 1941 in the 54th General Session the Legislature enacted Chapter 389 (Stats 1941, Ch 1673) appropriating \$354,920 to the Emergency Fund to be expended for salary adjustments and Section 2 of Chapter 398 contained the identical language of Section 2 of Chapter 65 quoted above. In both cases the statutes indicate such moneys were to be paid for salary increases during the prior fiscal years and the employees were to receive such raises effective "the date such employees became entitled to such adjustment."

In 1951 during the Regular Session the Legislature enacted Chapter 5 (Stats 1951, page 128), in which \$3,679,652 was appropriated effective January 30, 1951, for salary raises dating from January 1 of the same year. Apparently the Legislature has acknowledged the propriety of retroactive increases under circumstances where the salary rates were not definite or fixed during the period such adjustments were under consideration. It should be noted, however, that these provisions were not questioned.

With respect to exempt employees of state government whose salaries are fixed by the Director of Finance (Gov Code §18004), employees of the University of California whose salaries are fixed by the Regents (Constitution, Art IX, §9), employees of the State College System whose salaries are fixed by the Trustees (Ed Code §22607), and other salary-fixing authority (San Francisco Port Authority, Harb & Nav. Code §1705 5), the principle is the same. Upon filing an application for salary adjustments with the salary-fixing authority, the matter of rates is opened for study and consideration. In the case of each salary-fixing authority, the discretion remains to fix a new salary either upon the date of application or whatever subsequent date is justified upon the merits of the request. Furthermore, it is possible that a salary-fixing authority could open the question of salary adjustments as an exercise of official discretion upon a date certain, conduct studies, hold hearings and if warranted take action raising such salaries as of the original date upon which the authority determined change in salary schedules might be necessary.

It is our understanding that applications have been filed with the appropriate salary-fixing authorities on behalf of all officers and employees.

A different problem exists, however, with respect to compensation of public officers whose salary is set by statute. As the Legislature is the salary-fixing authority and may act in such matters only by the enactment or amendment of existing law, no means exists whereby salary of statutory officers could be opened prior to the adoption of appropriate legislation. In other words, such salaries remained fixed and retroactive changes would constitute extra compensation for services already performed.

2 The second question asked is whether the Budget Bill for 1962-1963 fiscal year can be used to appropriate funds for retroactive salary

increases covering the last six months of the preceding fiscal year Article IV, Section 2 of the Constitution provides in part:

“All regular sessions in even-numbered years shall be known as budget sessions, at which the Legislature shall consider only the Budget Bill for the succeeding fiscal year.”

The authority of the Legislature is limited in the enactment of the Budget Bill to the appropriation of funds for the operation of state government. The Budget Bill may not contain a grant of authority as this would violate the single subject rule (Art IV, § 24, Constitution). Except for the salaries of public officials set by statute, the Legislature is not the salary-fixing authority for other state officers and employees. This function has been delegated to the various agencies as noted above.

Although funds appropriated for salary purposes may not be expended prior to the commencement of the succeeding fiscal year under the constitutional language quoted above, there would appear to be no prohibition against the expenditure of such funds for the payment of salary increases where on the basis of authority conferred upon them, salary-fixing authorities have determined officers and employees of the State were entitled to such raises prior or during the preceding fiscal year.

It has been the practice of the Legislature to enact deficiency appropriations to cover obligations of the State incurred during prior fiscal years, and the problem presented by this question is similar in nature (*Board of Fish and Game Commissioners v Riley*, 194 Cal. 37, 47).

3 The final question asked concerns Assembly Bill No 50 of the First Extraordinary Session of 1962, as amended on March 22, 1962. The bill as of that date provides in Section 1 for an appropriation of eleven million three hundred ninety-five thousand eight hundred fifty-seven dollars (\$11,395,857) as a Salary Increase Fund to be allocated upon approval of Department of Finance to various salary-fixing authorities, with some limitations. Additional amounts are appropriated from special funds to provide increases for officers or employees paid from special funds.

Section 2 of the bill reads as follows:

“The purpose of this act is to provide increases in compensation from the first day of the month after the effective date of this act to June 30, 1962, inclusive.”

This language appears to clearly state the intention of the Legislature that the increase in compensation for state officers or employees should commence on the first day of the month following the effective date of the act, if enacted. Under this language, no constitutional question arises since as a matter of statutory interpretation any increases in compensation would be prospective. It might be argued that compensation as used herein does not mean changes in salary ranges or rates as established by the salary-fixing authority to whom funds are to be allocated. Thus under this argument the ranges or rates may be changed as of January 1, 1962, but payments to employees would be made thereon only after the first day of the month after the effective

date of the act. The word "compensation" is not ambiguous, however, and refers generally to wages and the ordinary meaning of words are to be attributed to statutory language unless the context within which it is used otherwise indicates (*True v. Kirkwood*, 42 Cal 2d 602). Here there is nothing in the bill which would give weight to such an argument. Upon the plain meaning of the language the funds appropriated shall be paid for salary only after the effective date of the act.

## House Resolution No. 59

Relating to the Pasadena Home for the Aged

WHEREAS, The Pasadena Home for the Aged was started in 1911 as "Home for Aged Women" by a Pasadena group called the Emergency League, and

WHEREAS, In 1912 William A Scripps came to its support, purchased the present site with buildings and improvements at Altadena, and

WHEREAS, In 1920 the name was changed to the "Pasadena Home for the Aged" and during succeeding years an infirmary was added, men admitted as residents, fire sprinklers installed; and

WHEREAS, In 1913 it was incorporated as a charitable organization under the name of "William A Scripps Home for Aged People" and the deed to the property contained a reversionary clause which precluded eligibility of the home for tax exemption; and

WHEREAS, In 1953 the late Honorable T Fenton Knight, former Assemblyman for the old 48th Assembly District (1939-1948) requested Assemblyman Frank Lanterman of the 48th District (1951-1962) to author enabling legislation which was passed by the Legislature making eligible to tax exemption any such institution which had operated for 20 years as a nonprofit charitable institution, and

WHEREAS, The tax exemption eligibility then made it possible for the Home's board to finance with proper amortization of the encumbrance a new addition that raised the capacity of the Home to a total of 130, and

WHEREAS, The Home was formed and is operated with the primary object of taking care of people in the lower income bracket who, when they reach old age, would otherwise be very much in need, and

WHEREAS, The present average age at the home is 85, the infirmary has proved too small, a new 49-bed nursing center is being added, together with an auditorium and reception building with complete landscaping of the six acres of grounds, at a total cost of over \$900,000 and will increase the capacity of the home to 160, and

WHEREAS, 1962 marks the 50th Anniversary of the founding of the Home which has provided a sanctuary of security, dignity, care and comfort for its elderly and aged occupants who are supported by their own contract contributions, the help of endowment gifts and loving concern of the citizens of the community who serve on the Home's governing board and zealously safeguard its future stability, now, therefore, be it

*Resolved by the Assembly of the State of California,* That the members commend and congratulate the "Pasadena Home for the Aged" of Altadena, California, on the 50th Anniversary of its corporate founding and extend their best wishes for another 50 years of progress in its concern for human dignity, and be it further

**Senate Bill No. 8**—An act creating the Crestline-Lake Arrowhead Water Agency and prescribing the boundaries, organization, operation, management, financing and other powers and duties of the agency.

"The following territory, however, is excluded from the boundaries of the agency: All that portion of Township 2 North, Range 3 West, San Bernardino Base and Meridian, in the County of San Bernardino, State of California, according to U.S. Government Survey, being particularly described as follows:

Beginning at the Northwest corner of Section 10 of said Township 2 North, Range 3 West, thence Easterly along the North line of said Section 10 to the Northeast corner thereof, thence Southerly along the Easterly line of Section 10 and the Westerly line of Section 11 of said Township and Range to the Northwest corner of the Southwest one-quarter of the Northwest one-quarter of said Section 11; thence Easterly along the North line of said Southwest one-quarter of the Northwest one-quarter of Section 11 to the Northeast corner of the Southwest one-quarter of the Northwest one-quarter of said Section 11, thence Southerly along the Easterly line of the Southwest one-quarter of the Northwest one-quarter of said Section 11 and the Easterly line of the West one-half of the Southwest one-quarter of said Section 11 to the Southeast corner of the West one-half of the Southwest one-quarter of said Section 11; thence Easterly along the Southerly line of Section 11 and the Northerly line of Section 14 of said Township and Range to the North-



"Sec 2 Within 90 days after the effective date of this act, the Department of Water Resources shall hold a hearing within the area of the agency created by this act, after such public notice as deemed necessary by the department. At such hearing any interested person may appear and present testimony or evidence as to the necessity or desirability of the agency. At the conclusion of such hearing, the department shall file a report thereon with the board of supervisors of the County of San Bernardino, including in said report its recommendations as to the need for the functioning of the agency.

Sec 25 Before the agency may begin to transact business and exercise its powers, a petition requesting that the agency transact business and exercise its powers shall be presented to the Board of Supervisors of the County of San Bernardino, signed by not less than twenty-five (25) qualified electors residing within the territory of the agency, and requesting that the Board of Supervisors of the County of San Bernardino call a special election for the purpose of submitting to the voters within the territory of the agency the proposition of whether or not the agency should begin to function and exercise its powers.

The Board of Supervisors of the County of San Bernardino, within ten (10) days after the filing of said petition for the calling of said election, and if it has received the report from the Department of Water Resources pursuant to Section 2, shall call and give notice of an election to be held in the territory of the agency for the purpose of determining whether or not it shall begin to function and exercise its powers and for the selection of persons who shall serve as directors of said agency if said agency is formed.

The election shall be held not less than seventy-five (75) days, nor more than ninety (90) days from the date of the presentation of said petition to the board of supervisors, provided that the first board of directors shall be elected or chosen at the June primary in 1962. Said election shall be conducted and the first elective directors and those succeeding shall be nominated and elected pursuant to the provisions of Part 2 (commencing with Section 22600), Division 12 of the Elections Code. Said directors shall be registered to vote within the agency.

Notice of the election shall be published in a newspaper of general circulation circulated within the territory of the agency. Such notice shall be published at least twice, with an interval of at least six (6) days between the first and last publication. Publication shall be complete at least six (6) days before the date of the election.

The notice of the election shall contain:

(1) The date of the election;

(2) The name of the agency;

(3) The proposition to be voted on, as follows: "Shall the Crestline-Lake Arrowhead Water Agency begin to function and exercise its powers in accordance with the provisions of the Crestline-Lake Arrowhead Water Agency Act?"

(4) A statement that the first directors will be elected at that election, and said directors will take office if a majority of the voters, in each of the five divisions, respectively, vote that the agency shall begin to function and exercise its powers.

There shall be printed on the ballot, together with the names of the candidates for director, the following question: "Shall the Crestline-Lake Arrowhead Water Agency begin to function and exercise its powers in accordance with the provisions of the Crestline-Lake Arrowhead Water Agency Act?" Following which question, shall be the words "Yes" and "No" on separate lines, with a voting square at the right of each, in which the voter shall indicate by stamping a cross (+) his vote for or against the proposition.

If a majority of the voters, in each of the five divisions, respectively, voting on the proposition vote in its favor, the board of supervisors shall canvass the returns for directors and those five persons receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared elected. The agency shall begin to function and shall exercise its powers, and the Board of Supervisors of the County of San Bernardino, within fifteen (15) days after said election, shall by resolution enter on its minutes a declaration that the agency has begun to function and exercise its powers, giving the name of the agency, the purposes for which it is formed, and describing its boundaries.

No informality in any proceedings, including informality in the conduct of any election not substantially affecting adversely the legal rights of any person, shall invalidate the organization of the agency.

The validity of the organization of the agency shall not be contested in any proceeding commenced more than ninety (90) days after the date that the organization of the agency is complete.

If less than a majority of the votes cast at the election, in any division of the proposed agency, is in favor of the proposition that the agency should begin to function and exercise its powers, the board of supervisors shall declare the proceedings terminated and no petition requesting that the agency begin to function and exercise its powers shall be circulated and presented to the Board of Supervisors of San Bernardino County within one year from the date of said election.

SEC 27 The board of directors of the agency organized under this act shall consist of five members. Each of the five divisions in the agency, respectively, shall be represented by one director.

The term of office of each director shall be four (4) years.

All vacancies occurring in the office of director shall be filled by appointment by the remaining directors elected and appointed. An appointment to fill a vacancy in the office of director shall be for the unexpired term of the office in which the vacancy exists.

Members of the board of directors shall be elected by the voters of the agency as provided in this act.

Of the five divisional electors first elected from each of the five divisions, directors numbered 1, 3, and 5 shall hold office for four years. Directors numbered 2 and 4 shall hold office for two years. Thereafter the term of office of each director shall be four years.

The succeeding directors shall be nominated and elected at the agency general election which shall be held on the third Tuesday of April of each odd-numbered year. Such elections shall be conducted in accordance with the provisions of Part 2 (commencing with Section 22600) of Division 12 of the Elections Code."

The Secretary of State shall distribute the ballot pamphlets to the county clerks not less than 30 days before the election, and the county clerks shall commence to mail those pamphlets to the voters not less than five days before the election. The distribution of ballot pamphlets in all other respects shall be conducted in accordance with the provisions of Section 3573 of the Elections Code.

SEC. 5 At the special election called by this act there shall be submitted to the electors Section 1 of this act.

SEC. 6 Upon the effective date of this section, the author of the measure submitted pursuant to this act and two members of the other house who voted with the majority on the measure, shall be appointed by the presiding officers of the respective houses to draft the arguments for the adoption of the measure. If the measure is not adopted unanimously by the house in which it originated, one member of the house in which it originated, who voted against it, shall be appointed by the presiding officer of that house to write an argument against it. If there are no negative votes on the measure in the house in which it originated, the presiding officer of that house shall appoint some qualified person to draft an argument against it. Each argument shall consist of not more than 500 words and shall be submitted to the Secretary of State on or before the fifth day after this section takes effect.

SEC. 7 The special election provided for in this act shall be proclaimed, held, conducted, the ballots shall be prepared, marked, collected, counted and canvassed and the results shall be ascertained and the returns thereof made in all respects in accordance with the provisions of the Constitution applicable thereto and the law governing general elections insofar as provisions thereof are applicable to the election provided for in this act, provided, however, that the Governor need not issue his election proclamation until 30 days before the election."

GENTLEMEN: On June 2, 1961, a petition for the impeachment of Judge Walter C Allen, Judge of the Superior Court, Los Angeles County, was received by the Assembly of the California Legislature and referred to the Assembly Judiciary Committee. At a public hearing, held on June 9, 1961, the Judiciary Committee referred the petition to the Commission on Judicial Qualifications for study and recommendation under Article VI, Section 10b of the California Constitution. This action was taken because the Legislature, which was scheduled to adjourn sine die on June 16, 1961, would, after that date, have been deprived by law of jurisdiction over the impeachment petition. In addition, it was the consensus of the Judiciary Committee that the Commission on Judicial Qualifications was the appropriate body to consider the petition and that such a referral would give both the petitioner and judge in question a proper review of the matter.

After considering the impeachment petition, the Commission on Judicial Qualifications, on March 15, 1962, forwarded its findings to the Chairman of the Assembly Judiciary Committee for the 1961 Regular Legislative Session. The commission determined

that the facts [alleged in the petition] do not constitute grounds for proceeding further, and that there is nothing to warrant action against the judge by the Legislature.

Even though the jurisdiction of the Assembly of the California Legislature over the above-mentioned impeachment petition lapsed when it adjourned sine die on June 16, 1961, the Assembly Interim Committee on Judiciary, in order to add some finality to the action on the petition, deems it appropriate to report these findings in this matter to the Assembly.

Commending Amos Alonzo Stagg

WHEREAS, Amos Alonzo Stagg, the "Grand Old Man of Football," will celebrate his 100th birthday on August 16, 1962, at a dinner staged by the Lions Club in the Stockton Civic Auditorium, which dinner will be televised by NBC in 18 other cities, and

WHEREAS, Amos Alonzo Stagg was born in Orange, New Jersey, where he attended Orange High School, later entering Philip Exeter Academy in 1883, and then Yale in 1884, where he became one of the greatest Yale athletes of all time, and

WHEREAS, Springfield College welcomed him after two years of graduate work at Yale, for further graduate work, conferring upon him in 1891 the honorary degree of Master of Physical Education, after which, in 1892, he became a coach and a professor at the University of Chicago, and while serving there from 1932 to 1933, he was a member of the American Olympic Games Committee from 1906 to 1932, received in 1923 from Overland College the honorary degree of Master of Arts, and from Wooster College, in 1933, the honorary degree of Doctor of Law, and received, also, in 1933, the American Education Award, and

WHEREAS, Accepting, at the age of 70, the position of head coach at the College of the Pacific, he remained there until 1946, during which time he received from the Boy Scouts of America the Silver Buffalo Award for distinguished service to boyhood, from the American Football Coaches Association the Bronze Football plaque, and from Springfield College, the Edward Norris Tarbell Medallion, and was made Knight for Life of the Knights of the Round Table; and

WHEREAS, At the age of 84, in 1946 he accepted the position of head coach at Susquehanna University in Selinsgrove Pennsylvania, where his son, A. A. "Paul" Stagg, was Director of Athletics, and where he remained until 1958, when he returned to live in Stockton, and

WHEREAS, Stagg High School in Stockton was dedicated in his honor in 1959, in which year he was named by the United States Chamber of Commerce as one of the five great living Americans, and

WHEREAS, All of America's sports enthusiasts and athletes, this August the sixteenth, will pay to Amos Alonzo Stagg their very highest tribute and their deepest gratitude for his supreme leadership, now, therefore, be it

*Resolved by the Assembly of the State of California.* That the members, respectfully extend their heartiest congratulations and commendations to Amos Alonzo Stagg upon the occasion of his 100th birthday and upon his distinguished and unsurpassable coaching record, and be it further

**DIVISION 15 GOVERNOR'S COMMISSION ON AUTOMATION AND TECHNOLOGICAL DEVELOPMENTS**

160 The Legislature hereby finds and declares that experience has shown that automation and other forms of rapid technological change can cause industrial displacement and unemployment which seriously depresses the morale and productive capacity of the work force of the State; that many of those displaced or not hired

because of such developments find that there is no longer a market, or a very limited market, for their skills; that such developments generate demands for new and different skills and capabilities from those possessed by the work force; that current and prospective manpower surpluses and shortages generated by rapid technological change should be identified and appropriate steps be taken to plan for their amelioration; that advance knowledge of impending changes in work processes and their consequent manpower requirements be secured as a basis for the planning of corrective measures; that the effectiveness of public and private training and educational resources should be reappraised continuously to evaluate their capacity to produce the skills needed in a changing technology, that the steps being taken by labor and management to adjust to these changes should be identified and made known, and that it is in the interest of the State of California that such appraisals of the impact of automation and technological development on the skills required in the work force and the job opportunities available to them be made and continuously reappraised, and that the information and knowledge so gained be made available to labor, to management, and to public agencies as a basis for the planning of programs and actions to develop the skills of our work force for a changing technology, to deal more effectively with the problems of unemployment and to further the economic growth and development of the State and the well-being of its people

161 The Governor's Commission on Automation and Technological Developments is hereby created

162 The commission shall consist of two Members of the Senate appointed by the Senate Committee on Rules, two Members of the Assembly appointed by the Speaker, 18 members appointed by the Governor, and five ex officio members. In appointing the 18 members appointed by the Governor, the Governor shall appoint five who represent management, five who represent labor, and three who represent the general public. The ex officio members are the Commissioner of the Economic Development Agency and the Directors of the following State Departments: Industrial Relations, Employment, Education, and Social Welfare

163 The Members of the Legislature appointed to the commission shall serve at the pleasure of the appointing power and shall participate in the activities of the commission to the extent that such participation is not incompatible with their respective positions as Members of the Legislature. For the purposes of this division, the Members of the Legislature appointed to the commission shall constitute a joint legislative investigating committee on the subject of this division and as such shall have all powers and duties conferred and imposed upon such committees by the Joint Rules of the Senate and Assembly

164 Each member of the commission, appointed by the Governor, shall hold office for a term of four years and until the appointment and qualification of his successor

165 Vacancies shall be filled by the appointing power. Vacancies in the terms of members appointed by the Governor shall be filled for the remainder of the unexpired term

166 The members of the commission shall serve without compensation but shall be reimbursed in accordance with law for any actual and necessary expenses incurred in connection with the performance of their duties

167 The Governor shall designate one of the members of the commission as the chairman of the commission. The chairman of the commission shall have the powers conferred upon heads of state departments by Section 11181 of the Government Code

168 The commission shall meet on the call of the chairman and at such other times as the commission may, by rule, determine

169 The commission may employ and fix the compensation, in accordance with law, of an executive secretary and such other clerical and technical assistants as may be necessary

170 The commission may make recommendations to any department, board, agency, or officer of the state government for the purpose of implementing the studies of the commission

171 Every department, board, agency, officer and employee of the state government shall give and furnish to the commission upon its request such information, records and documents, including information, records, and documents required by law to be kept confidential, as the commission deems necessary or proper for the achievement of purposes of this division. If the commission obtains confidential information, records, or documents, pursuant to this section, the commission shall treat such information, records, and documents as confidential and shall not make them available for public inspection

The State Departments of Industrial Relations, Employment, and Education shall assign staff, conduct studies, make surveys and perform similar functions within the structure of the respective departments for the purposes of this division as requested by the commission, and subject to the direction of the commission

The commission may utilize personnel of the government of the United States to the extent permissible by law.



172 The commission shall:

(a) Survey and study the introduction of modern production and distribution techniques in California to determine the impact of automated processes and other technological advancements on employment opportunities, the skill requirements of industry, business, and government, the displacement of employees, and the obsolescence of skills among members of the labor force

(b) Study and analyze the processes of adjustment to automation and other technological advancements in the State's economy

(c) Conduct surveys of current public and private programs in the field of job training, retraining, and skill developments generally to evaluate their effectiveness in providing employable skills in reference to both the changing composition of the State's labor force and the changing skill requirements of industry

(d) Undertake co-ordinated surveys in the various labor markets of the State to project as best possible the basic skill requirements of industry, business, and government sufficiently in advance of need, and in the approximate quantity needed, to the end that such projections shall provide a body of usable information for the development of sound job training, retraining, and skill development programs by labor and management and responsible government agencies

(e) Encourage labor and management to undertake jointly similar surveys and projections within their respective industries and occupations to maintain a high level of private initiative in meeting the skill development requirements of both employees and employers

173 The commission, with the approval of the Director of Finance, may accept grants of funds from the government of the United States, from any department or agency of the State of California, or from any person or private agency

174 The information received from any group, firm, or individual in response to the commission's request shall be for the confidential information of the commission insofar as it relates to planning, manning, personnel, union membership, and related matters. Except as otherwise provided by law, the records of the commission shall be open to inspection by the public during regular office hours. All meetings of the commission shall be open and public

175 The commission may enter agreements with the United States or any agency thereof, or with any state or agency thereof, engaged in functions comparable to those performed by the commission for the exchange of information, studies, and surveys.

176 The commission shall submit annually to the Governor and the Legislature its findings and recommendations not later than December 31st of each calendar year.

SEC 2. There is appropriated out of the General Fund to the Commission on Automation and Technological Developments, created by this act, the sum of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) to be used in carrying out the functions of the commission, including the expenses of the joint legislative investigating committee created by this act, during the 1962-1963 fiscal year."

## House Resolution No. 84

Relating to the policy of the Board of Port Commissioners with respect to the dedication of the new terminal building complex at Metropolitan Oakland International Airport

WHEREAS, The new terminal building complex now under construction at the Metropolitan Oakland International Airport will be completed and ready for occupancy and operation later during the year 1962, and

WHEREAS, The service now provided at Oakland Airport by the certificated air carriers is not adequate to meet the needs of the Metropolitan Oakland area which can be most conveniently served by schedules at that airport, and

WHEREAS, The Port of Oakland, the City of Oakland and the Oakland Chamber of Commerce and other interested public and private agencies have for many years sought to improve the air transportation service provided at Oakland Airport, and

WHEREAS, Those efforts have been unsuccessful largely because of the refusal of the certificated air carriers to provide the needed service at Oakland Airport, and

WHEREAS, The Regional Committee for Better Service at Oakland International Airport, consisting of representatives of 50 public agencies and civic groups in the



Countries of Alameda, Contra Costa and Solano, and the Aeronautics Commission of the State of California, has been formed for the purpose of supporting and has actively supported the formal complaint filed with the Civil Aeronautics Board by the City of Oakland, Port of Oakland and Oakland Chamber of Commerce for an investigation into the inadequacy of air transportation service provided at Oakland, together with a petition that the Board take corrective action, and

WHEREAS, The new Oakland Airport to be opened later this year represents an investment of approximately \$20,000,000 in public funds provided by the Port of Oakland, the City of Oakland and the United States of America, and

WHEREAS, The said new airport facilities will include a runway 10,000 feet in length with over water approach and takeoff areas two miles in length at each end and capable of accommodating any aircraft flying today, including pure jet aircraft, and

WHEREAS, No service with pure jet aircraft is provided at Oakland Airport at the present time, and

WHEREAS, No air carrier has announced plans to provide service with pure jet aircraft at Oakland Airport upon the opening of the new airport facilities, and

WHEREAS, Some air carriers have indicated a willingness to display pure jet and other aircraft in connection with the dedication of the new airport facilities at Oakland; and

WHEREAS, The Board of Port Commissioners of the City of Oakland is of the opinion that the display of pure jet aircraft at Metropolitan Oakland International Airport at the time of the dedication of its new facilities will be misleading to the public by inducing the public to believe that service by pure jet aircraft is available at Oakland Airport when in fact the opposite is the truth, and

WHEREAS The Board of Port Commissioners of the City of Oakland has declared its policy in connection with the opening and dedication of the new facilities at Metropolitan Oakland International Airport to be as follows

1 That the dedication of the new terminal building complex shall be held and take place prior to the formal opening of the new airport runway

2 That at the time that the said new facilities are dedicated there shall not be displayed upon the airport, or operated from the airport for promotional or demonstration purposes, any aircraft of a type not regularly operated from Oakland Airport in scheduled service, now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the Assembly of the State of California, That the Assembly concurs in the above policy expressed by the Board of Port Commissioners of the City of Oakland, and be it further

*Stern Law Enforcement*

**DEATH URGED FOR DOPE PEDDLING**

By Barbara Kober

WASHINGTON, April 4th—Representative Paul A. Fino, Republican of New York, has introduced a bill to authorize life imprisonment or death for anyone selling narcotics to young people

"Stern law enforcement and stern punishment are the most effective universally recognized way to curb the flow of illicit drugs," Fino said.

He declared that the penalties we now have against narcotics violators, especially those who peddle drugs to minors, are "not commensurate with the vicious crime which is committed."

**Most in Teens**

Most addicts, if not all, acquire the drug habit during their teens, Fino said. But the pusher who sells to a minor is liable for a minimum jail sentence of 10 years—only five years longer than someone who sells to adults.

"While the penalties I propose are severe," Fino declared, "nobody will deny that the purveyor of this living death should get less, or that such a penalty is not commensurate with crime."

The Congressman pointed out that U S Narcotics Commissioner Harry J. Anslinger has gone on record many times to the effect that "strong laws, good enforcement, stiff sentences are the necessary foundation upon which any successful program must be predicated"

Fino compared his proposal, which would amend the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, to the Lindbergh Act and the aircraft piracy legislation, both of which call for the death penalty

Both of these bills have had the desired deterrent effect, Fino said, and the "insidiousness of narcotic addiction" requires similar forceful treatment

DEAR SENATOR FISHER You have requested a detailed, project-by-project analysis of the report by the Legislative Analyst printed in the March 20, 1962 Assembly Daily Journal, First Extraordinary Session (pp 51-54), dealing with the need for a State Building Bond Act on the June primary ballot Since the entire state building program is based upon scheduling capital outlay for completion at the time capacity will be needed, prompt and assured financing is vital if the population needs of the various institutional programs are to be met.

This analysis indicates that \$86,221,551 would be required prior to December 1, 1962 in order to meet these needs on schedule, as opposed to the Legislative Analyst's estimate of \$54,064,168, representing a significant understatement in that report of \$32,157,383 In addition, substantial amounts of the \$6,000,000 for site acquisition of the two new Southern California State Colleges would undoubtedly have to be committed before December if these schools are to open their doors by September 1964 as planned

In determining the minimum needs of the state building program prior to December 1, 1962, only the most strict criteria have been applied in determining need These are

- 1 Only projects required for capacity needs have been included Replacement and modernization of buildings are considered defensible, regardless of condition Projects such as cafeterias, warehouses, forestry fire stations, and research buildings are excluded
- 2 Where working drawings can be completed and put out to bid by December 1, 1962, construction funds are required Otherwise such funds are not included

- 3 Equipment is included only to the extent it is required to open and operate capacity buildings
- 4 Site acquisition funds are included only where negotiated settlements or condemnation is scheduled prior to December 1, 1962

Under these criteria, application of the \$51,732,713 available from the 1958 bond issue will still leave a balance of \$31,488,838 which must be provided if only bare capacity projects are to be kept on schedule. Completion of such projects already started will require more than the remaining bond issue of \$51.7 million, thus delaying all new capacity projects contained in the 1962-63 Budget unless additional bond authority is provided by July 1, 1962.

A detailed list of each project included in the budget (as now approved by the financial committees of the Legislature) is attached. This list demonstrates the severity of the criteria used in this analysis, and has been reviewed with the Division of Architecture, the State College Trustees, and the University of California to determine work schedules and completion dates of each project.

Although the Legislative Analyst did not consult the Department of Finance on priority programming of capacity projects due to the lack of available time, the major disagreement appears to be in the amount of construction projects which can be put out to bid by December 1, 1962. This difference of \$30,856,276 between his report and this analysis may be attributed to the necessary expediting ahead of normal schedules of several badly needed capacity projects such as the initial buildings at new campuses of Sonoma and Stanislaus State Colleges, and the Tuolumne Conservation Center where standard plans will permit completion of working drawings by November 1, 1962.

The Division of Architecture states that adequate design time is available to permit that agency to meet the working drawing completion dates required to meet their portion of the construction schedule included in this analysis. Without the new design work which your Bond Act would provide, a serious shortage of work would exist prior to December 1, 1962, requiring substantial layoff of personnel.

If the cost of the public contract work exceeds the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000), but is not in excess of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500), the board may let the contract without advertising for bids, but not until the Port Director shall have secured competitive prices from contractors interested, which shall be taken under consideration by the board before the contract is let. The board may, however, upon the recommendation of the Port Director and by a vote of five of its members, order the performance of any such construction and reconstruction or repair work by appropriate city forces when the estimates submitted as part of the Port Director's recommendation indicate that the work can be done by the district forces more economically than if let by contract.

In case of a great public calamity, such as extraordinary fire, flood, storm, epidemic or other disaster the board may, by resolution passed by a vote of five of its members, determine and declare that the public interest or necessity demands the immediate expenditure of district money in safeguarding life, health or property, and thereupon they may proceed, without advertising for bids or receiving the same, to expend, or enter into a contract involving the expenditure of, any sum required in such emergency, on hand in the district fund and available for such purpose. All contracts before execution shall be approved as to form and legality by the attorney for the district."

(2) For all commercial and industrial uses and purposes, and the construction, reconstruction, repair and maintenance of commercial and industrial buildings, plants and facilities.

(3) For the establishment, improvement and conduct of an airport and heliport or aviation facilities, including but not limited to approach, takeoff and clear zones in connection with airport runways, and for the construction, reconstruction, repair, maintenance and operation of terminal buildings, runways, roadways, aprons, taxiways, parking areas, and all other works, buildings, facilities, utilities, structures and appliances incidental, necessary or convenient for the promotion and accommodation of air commerce and air navigation.

(4) For the construction, reconstruction, repair and maintenance of highways, streets, roadways, bridges, belt line railroads, parking facilities, power, telephone, telegraph or cable lines or landings, water and gas pipelines, and all other transportation and utility facilities or betterments incidental, necessary or convenient for the promotion and accommodation of any of the uses set forth in this section.

(5) For the construction, reconstruction, repair, maintenance and operation of public buildings, public assembly and meeting places, convention centers, parks, playgrounds, bathhouses and bathing facilities, recreation and fishing piers, public recreation facilities, including but not limited to public golf courses, and for all works, buildings, facilities, utilities, structures and appliances incidental, necessary or convenient for the promotion and accommodation of any such uses.

(6) For the establishment, improvement and conduct of small boat harbors, marinas, aquatic playgrounds and similar recreational facilities, and for the construction, reconstruction, repair, maintenance and operation of all works, buildings, facilities, utilities, structures and appliances incidental, necessary or convenient for the promotion and accommodation of any such uses, including but not limited to snack bars, cafes, restaurants, motels, launching ramps and hoists, storage sheds, boat repair facilities with cranes and marine ways, administration buildings, public restrooms, bait and tackle shops, chandleries, boat sales establishments, service stations and fuel docks, yacht club buildings, parking areas, roadways, pedestrian ways and landscaped areas.

(b) The district or its successors shall not, at any time, grant, convey, give or alienate said lands, or any part thereof, to any individual, firm or corporation for any purposes whatever, provided, that said district, or its successors, may grant franchises thereon for limited periods, not exceeding 66 years, for wharves and other public uses and purposes, and may lease said lands, or any part thereof, for limited periods, not exceeding 66 years, for purposes consistent with the trusts upon which said lands are held by the State of California, and with the requirements of commerce and navigation, and collect and retain rents and other revenues from such leases, franchises and privileges. Such lease or leases, franchises and privileges may be for any and all purposes which shall not interfere with commerce and navigation.

(c) Said lands shall be improved without expense to the State, provided, however, that nothing contained in this section shall preclude expenditures for the development of said lands for any public purpose not inconsistent with commerce, navigation and fishery, by the State, or any board, agency or commission thereof, when authorized or approved by the district, nor by the district of any funds received for such purpose from the State or any board, agency or commission thereof.

(d) In the management, conduct, operation and control of said lands or any improvements, betterments, or structures thereon, the district or its successors shall make no discrimination in rates, tolls or charges for any use or service in connection therewith.

(e) The State of California shall have the right to use without charge any transportation, landing or storage improvements, betterments or structures constructed upon said lands for any vessel or other watercraft, aircraft, or railroad owned or operated by the State of California.

(f) There is hereby reserved to the people of the State of California the right to fish in the waters on said lands with the right of convenient access to said water over said lands for said purpose.

(g) There is hereby excepted and reserved in the State of California all deposits of minerals, including oil and gas, in said lands, and to the State of California, or persons authorized by the State of California, the right to prospect for, mine, and remove such deposits from said lands.

(h) Said lands shall be held subject to the express reservation and condition that the State may at any time in the future use said lands or any portion for highway purposes without compensation to the district, its successors or assigns, or any person, firm or public or private corporation claiming under it except that in the event improvements, betterments or structures have been placed upon the property taken by the State for said purposes, compensation shall be made to the person entitled thereto for the value of his interest in the improvements, betterments or structures taken or the damages to such interest.

(i) The State Lands Commission shall, at the cost of the district, survey and monument said lands and record a description and plat thereof in the office of the County Recorder of San Diego County.

(j) As to any tide and submerged lands conveyed to the district by a city which are subject to a condition contained in a grant of said lands to the city by the State that said lands shall be substantially improved within a designated period or else they shall revert to the State, such condition shall remain in effect as to said lands and shall be applicable to the district.

As to any tide and submerged lands conveyed to the district by a city which are not subject to such a condition contained in a grant by the State and which have not heretofore been substantially improved, said lands, within 10 years from the effective date of this act, shall be substantially improved by the district without expense to the State. If the State Lands Commission determines that the district has failed to improve said lands as herein required, all right, title and interest of the district in and to said lands shall cease and said lands shall revert and rest in the State."

Ballot Arguments—No. 3699

DEAR MR. BRITSCHGI. You ask the following question:

*Question*

Would it be possible, under Assembly Bill No. 66 of the First Extraordinary Session, to submit a negative argument on Senate Constitutional Amendment No. 10 of 1961 if none is on file?

*Opinion*

In our opinion it would be possible under Assembly Bill No. 66 to submit a negative argument on Senate Constitutional Amendment No. 10

*Analysis*

Assembly Bill No. 66 calls a special election to be consolidated with the direct primary election in June, and provides for the submission to the people at that election of certain bond acts now pending at the First Extraordinary Session and of Senate Constitutional Amendment No. 10 of the 1961 Session

Assembly Bill No. 66 was signed by the Governor on April 5, 1962, and took effect on that date

Section 3 of Assembly Bill No. 66 relates to the preparation and filing of ballot arguments on the measures to which it relates. The section reads as follows:

"SEC. 3 Upon the effective date of this section, the author of the measure submitted pursuant to this act, except Senate Constitutional Amendment No. 10 of 1961, and two members of the other house who voted with the majority on the measure,

shall be appointed by the presiding officers of the respective houses to draft the arguments for the adoption of the measure. If the measure is not adopted unanimously by the house in which it originated, one member of the house in which it originated, who voted against it, shall be appointed by the presiding officer of that house to write an argument against it. If there are no negative votes on the measure in the house in which it originated, the presiding officer of that house shall appoint some qualified person to draft an argument against it. Each argument shall consist of not more than 500 words and shall be submitted to the Secretary of State on or before the fifth day after this section takes effect.

“The arguments on Senate Constitutional Amendment No 10 of 1961 shall be those on file in the office of the Secretary of State on the effective date of this act.”

Insofar as Senate Constitutional Amendment No 10 of 1961 is concerned, the section states that the arguments on that measure shall be those on file in the office of the Secretary of State on the effective date of the act. It appears that the only argument on file of that date is the argument in favor of the measure.

The purpose of ballot arguments is to provide the voters with information concerning measures on the ballot. In view of this purpose, it appears reasonable to assume that a court would construe statutes relating to the submission of ballot measures liberally and would resolve any doubt in the matter in favor of the right of persons to submit arguments. Section 3 of Assembly Bill No 66 does not expressly prohibit the filing of a negative argument on Senate Constitutional Amendment No 10, but simply states that the arguments on the measure shall be those on file in the office of the Secretary of State on the effective date of the bill. It appears reasonable to assume that the purpose of this provision was to eliminate the need for an argument on the measure where one already has been filed, rather than simply to preclude the filing of arguments. Regarded in this light, we do not think it can be inferred from the provision that an argument may not be filed in the case where none is on file.

Moreover, it is significant that the first sentence of Section 3, which relates to affirmative arguments on measures submitted by Assembly Bill 66, expressly excepts Senate Constitutional Amendment 10 from its operation. No similar exception is stated in that portion of the section relating to the preparation of negative arguments. The position could be taken, therefore, that Section 3, literally, does not preclude the filing of a negative argument on Senate Constitutional Amendment 10.

In view of these considerations, we believe that Assembly Bill 66 literally can be construed to give effect to the provision that arguments on Senate Constitutional Amendment 10 shall be those on file in the office of the Secretary of State and still permit the filing of a negative argument on the measure, since no such argument is on file. The provision regarding arguments on file can be interpreted to apply only if arguments are on file. It is our opinion, therefore, that Assembly Bill 66 would not prevent the filing of a negative argument on Senate Con-

stitutional Amendment 10, and that such an argument may be submitted under the same conditions as are provided for the submission of arguments on the other bond acts to which Assembly Bill 66 relates

Notwithstanding any other provision of this Constitution or of law, the amount of any change in the compensation of Members of the Legislature resulting from the amendment to this subdivision as proposed by the Legislature at its 1962 First Extraordinary Session shall not be considered in computing benefits under the Legislators' Retirement System with respect to the service of any person and any benefits payable under that system shall not be decreased or increased as the result of such change in the amount of compensation.

**TEXT OF THE VOTE ON ASSEMBLY AND SENATE BILLS TO BE SUBMITTED TO A VOTE OF THE ELECTORS**

The text of the following Assembly and Senate bills, which have passed both houses of the Legislature, which have been approved by the Governor, and portions of which will be submitted to a vote of the electors, are entered in the Journal, together with the yeas and nays thereon.

**Assembly Bill No 51**

*An act to add Article 51 (commencing at Section 996 87) to Chapter 6 of Division 4 of the Military and Veterans Code, authorizing the creation of a debt or debts, liability or liabilities, through the issuance and sale of state bonds, to create a fund to provide farm and home aid for veterans in accordance with the provisions of the Veterans Farm and Home Purchase Act of 1943 and acts amendatory and supplemental thereto, defining the powers and duties of the Veterans' Finance Committee of 1943 and of the Department of Veterans Affairs and other state officers in respect to the administration of the provisions hereof, providing ways and means, exclusive of loans, for the payment of the interest of such debt or debts, liability or liabilities, as such interest falls due, and also for the payment and discharge of the principal of such debt or debts, liability or liabilities, as such principal matures, appropriating money for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of the article, and providing for the submission of the measure to the people at a special election to be consolidated with the 1962 direct primary election*

[Approved by the Governor April 13, 1962. Filed with the Secretary of State, April 13, 1962. Chapter 22.]

*The people of the State of California do enact as follows:*

**SECTION 1.** Article 51 is added to Chapter 6 of Division 4 of the Military and Veterans Code, to read:

**Article 51. Veterans Bond Act of 1962**

996 87 This article may be cited as the Veterans Bond Act of 1962.

996 88 The State General Obligation Bond Law, except as otherwise provided herein, is adopted for the purpose of the issuance, sale, and repayment of, and other wise providing with respect to, the bonds authorized to be issued by this article, and the provisions of that law are included in this article as though set out in full in this article. All references in this article to "herein" shall be deemed to refer both to this article and such law.

996 89 As used in this article and for the purposes of this article as used in the State General Obligation Bond Law, Title 2, Division 4, Part 3, Chapter 4 (commencing at Section 16720) of the Government Code, the following words shall have the following meanings:

(a) "Bond" means veterans bond, a state general obligation bond issued pursuant to this article adopting the provisions of the State General Obligation Bond Law.

(b) "Committee" means the Veterans' Finance Committee of 1943, created by Section 901 of the Military and Veterans Code.

(c) "Board" means the Department of Veterans Affairs.

(d) "Fund" means the Veterans Farm and Home Building Fund of 1943 created by Section 988 of the Military and Veterans Code.

(e) "Bond Act" means this article authorizing the issuance of State General Obligation Bonds and adopting Title 2, Division 4, Part 3, Chapter 4 of the Government Code by reference.

90690 For the purpose of creating a fund to provide farm and home aid for veterans in accordance with the provisions of the Veterans Farm and Home Purchase Act of 1943 and of all acts amendatory thereof and supplemental thereto, the Veterans' Finance Committee of 1943, created by Section 901, shall be and it hereby is authorized and empowered to create a debt or debts, liability or liabilities, of the State of California, in the aggregate amount of two hundred fifty million dollars (\$250,000,000), in the manner provided herein, but not otherwise, nor in excess thereof.

90691 All bonds herein authorized, which shall have been duly sold and delivered as herein provided, shall constitute valid and legally binding general obligations of the State of California, and the full faith and credit of the State of California is hereby pledged for the punctual payment of both principal and interest thereon.

There shall be collected annually in the same manner and at the same time as other state revenue is collected such a sum, in addition to the ordinary revenues of the State, as shall be required to pay the principal and interest on said bonds as herein provided, and it is hereby made the duty of all officers charged by law with any duty in regard to the collections of said revenue, to do and perform each and every act which shall be necessary to collect such additional sum.

On the several dates on which funds are remitted pursuant to Section 16676 of the Government Code for the payment of the then maturing principal and interest on the bonds in each fiscal year, there shall be returned into the General Fund in the State Treasury, all of the money in the Veterans' Farm and Home Building Fund of 1943, not in excess of the principal of and interest on the said bonds then due and payable, except as hereinafter provided for the prior redemption of said bonds, and, in the event such money so returned on said remittance dates is less than said principal and interest then due and payable, then the balance remaining unpaid shall be returned into the General Fund in the State Treasury out of said Veterans' Farm and Home Building Fund of 1943 as soon thereafter as it shall become available, together with interest thereon from such dates of maturity until so returned at the same rate as borne by said bonds, compounded semiannually.

90692 There is hereby appropriated from the General Fund in the State Treasury for the purpose of this article, such an amount as will equal the following:

(a) Such sum annually as will be necessary to pay the principal of and the interest on the bonds issued and sold pursuant to the provisions of this article, as said principal and interest become due and payable.

(b) The sum of seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000) to be used as a revolving fund to pay the expenses incurred by the State Treasurer in having the bonds prepared and in advertising their sale or their prior redemption, for expenses incurred by the committee pursuant to Government Code Section 16778, and for legal services, upon approval of the State Board of Control, pursuant to Government Code Section 16760.

(c) Such sum as is necessary to carry out the provisions of Section 90693 which sum is appropriated without regard to fiscal year.

90693 For the purposes of carrying out the provisions of this article the Director of Finance may by executive order authorize the withdrawal from the General Fund of an amount or amounts not to exceed the amount of the unsold bonds which have been authorized to be sold for the purpose of carrying out this article. Any amounts withdrawn shall be deposited in the Veterans' Farm and Home Building Fund of 1943. Any moneys made available under this article to the board shall be returned by the board to the General Fund from moneys received from the sale of bonds sold for the purpose of carrying out this article, together with interest at the rate of interest fixed in the bonds so sold.

90694 Upon request of the Department of Veterans Affairs, supported by a statement of the plans and projects of said department with respect thereto, and approved by the Governor, the Veterans' Finance Committee of 1943 shall determine whether or not it is necessary or desirable to issue any bonds authorized under this article in order to carry such plans and projects into execution, and, if so, the amount of bonds then to be issued and sold. Successive issues of bonds may be authorized and sold to carry out said plans and projects progressively, and it shall not be necessary that all the bonds herein authorized to be issued shall be sold at any one time.

90695 So long as any bonds authorized under this article may be outstanding, the Director of the Department of Veterans Affairs shall cause to be made at the close of each fiscal year, a survey of the financial condition of the Division of Farm

and Home Purchases, together with a projection of the division's operations, such survey to be made by an independent public accountant of recognized standing. The results of such surveys and projections shall be set forth in written reports and said independent public accountant shall forward copies of said reports to the Director of the Department of Veterans Affairs, the members of the California Veterans Board, and to the members of the Veterans' Finance Committee of 1943. The Division of Farm and Home Purchases shall reimburse said independent public accountant for his services out of any funds which said division may have available on deposit with the Treasurer of the State of California.

9969b. The committee may authorize the State Treasurer to sell all or any part of the bonds herein authorized at such time or times as may be fixed by the State Treasurer.

9969c. The annual rate or rates of interest on the bonds may be in multiples of  $\frac{1}{2}$  or  $\frac{3}{4}$  of 1 percent. The definitive rates of interest which the bonds hereby authorized shall bear may be determined and fixed by the Veterans' Finance Committee of 1943 by resolution adopted at or after the sale of said bonds, but not exceeding in any case 5 percent per annum payable semiannually.

9969d. Whenever bonds are sold, out of the first money realized from their sale, there shall be redeposited in the revolving fund established by subdivision (b) of Section 9969c such sums as have been expended for the purposes specified in subdivision (a) of Section 9969c, which may be used for the same purpose and repaid in the same manner whenever additional sales are made. Whenever all the bonds authorized by this article have been sold, the amount of the appropriation made by subdivision (b) of Section 9969c shall revert to the unappropriated surplus in the General Fund.

SEC. 2. Section 1 of this act shall take effect upon the adoption by the people of the Veterans Bond Act of 1962, as set forth in Section 1 of this act. Sections 2 to 9 of this act contain provisions relating to and necessary for the submission of the Veterans Bond Act of 1962 to the people, and for returning, canvassing, and proclaiming the votes thereon, and shall take effect immediately.

SEC. 3. A special election is hereby called to be held throughout the State on the fifth day of June, 1962. The special election shall be consolidated with the direct primary election to be held on that date. The consolidated election shall be held and conducted in all respects as if there were only one election and only one form of ballot shall be used. Except as otherwise provided in this act, all of the provisions of law relating to the submission of measures proposed by the Legislature shall apply to the measure submitted pursuant to this act. A separate ballot pamphlet shall be prepared, compiled, and distributed relating to such measure and other measures submitted by the Legislature to the people at special elections consolidated with the direct primary election. The Secretary of State shall distribute the ballot pamphlets to the county clerks not less than 30 days before the election, and the county clerks shall commence to mail these pamphlets to the voters not less than five days before the election. The distribution of ballot pamphlets in all other respects shall be conducted in accordance with the provisions of Section 3573 of the Elections Code.

SEC. 4. At the special election called by this act there shall be submitted to the electors Section 1 of this act.

SEC. 5. Upon the effective date of this section, the author of the measure submitted pursuant to this act and two members of the other house who voted with the majority on the measure, shall be appointed by the presiding officers of the respective houses to draft the argument for the adoption of the measure. If the measure is not adopted unanimously by the house in which it originated, one member of the house in which it originated, who voted against it, shall be appointed by the presiding officer of that house to write an argument against it. If there are no negative votes on the measure in the house in which it originated, the presiding officer of that house shall appoint some qualified person to draft an argument against it. Each argument shall consist of not more than 500 words, and shall be submitted to the Secretary of State on or before the fifth day after this section takes effect.

SEC. 6. The special election provided for in this act shall be proclaimed, held, conducted, the ballots shall be prepared, marked, collected, counted and canvassed and the results shall be ascertained and the returns thereof made in all respects in accordance with the provisions of the Constitution applicable thereto and the law governing general elections insofar as provisions thereof are applicable to the election provided for in this act, provided, however, that the Governor need not issue his election proclamation until 30 days before the election.

SEC. 7. All ballots at said election shall have printed thereon and in a square thereof, the words "For the Veterans Bond Act of 1962," and the same square under said words the following in eight-point type: "This act provides for a bond issue of two hundred fifty million dollars (\$250,000,000) to provide farm and home aid for California veterans." In the square immediately below the square containing such words, there shall be printed on said ballot the words, "Against the Veterans Bond Act of 1962," and in the same square immediately below said words, in eight-

point type shall be printed. This act provides for a bond issue of two hundred fifty million dollars (\$250,000,000) to provide farm and home aid for California veterans." Opposite the words "For the Veterans Bond Act of 1962," and "Against the Veterans Bond Act of 1962," there shall be left spaces in which the voters may place a cross in the manner required by law to indicate whether they vote for or against said act, and those voting for said act shall do so by placing a cross opposite the words, "For the Veterans Bond Act of 1962," and those voting against the said act shall do so by placing a cross opposite the words "Against the Veterans Bond Act of 1962." Provided, that where the voting of said election is done by means of voting machines used pursuant to law in such manner as to carry out the intent of this section, such use of such voting machines and the expression of the voters' choice by means thereof, shall be deemed to comply with the provisions of this section. The Governor of this State shall include the submission of this act to the people, as aforesaid, in his proclamation calling for said election.

SEC. 8. The votes cast for or against the Veterans Bond Act of 1962 shall be counted, returned and canvassed and declared in the same manner and subject to the same rules as votes cast for state officers, and if it appears that said act shall have received a majority of all the votes cast for and against it at said election is aforesaid, then the same shall have effect as heretofore provided, and shall be inoperative until the principal and interest of the habitues herein created shall be paid and discharged, and the Governor shall make proclamation thereof; but if a majority of the votes cast as aforesaid are against this act then the same shall be null and become void.

SEC. 9. Upon the effective date of this section the Secretary of State shall request the Legislative Counsel to prepare an analysis of the measure in accordance with Section 37466 of the Elections Code. The analysis shall be filed with the Secretary of State within five days after the effective date of this section.

#### Senate Bill No. 2

*An act to add Chapter 15 (commencing with Section 50951) to Division 5 of the Public Resources Code, relating to financing of a program of acquiring and developing state and county beach, park, recreational, small craft harbor, and historical sites and facilities by providing the funds necessary therefor through the issuance and sale of bonds of the State of California, and by providing for the handling and disposition of said funds, and making an appropriation therefor, and providing for the submission of the measure to the people at a special election to be consolidated with the 1962 direct primary election*

[Approved by the Governor April 13, 1962. Filed with the Secretary of State April 13, 1962. Chapter 24.]

*The people of the State of California do enact as follows:*

SECTION 1. Chapter 15 (commencing with Section 50951) is added to Division 5 of the Public Resources Code, to read:

#### CHAPTER 15 STATE PARK AND RECREATION BOND ACT

50951. This chapter may be cited as the "Camelton-Umuuk Park and Recreation Bond Act."

50952. The purpose of this chapter is to provide the necessary funds to meet the costs of developing a statewide recreational program, including the acquisition



and development of beaches, parks, recreational facilities, small craft harbor facilities and historical monuments, as hereafter provided by the Legislature.

5095.3 The expenditures of the proceeds of bonds issued pursuant to this chapter shall be as hereafter provided by the Legislature. Exclusive of the funds made available pursuant to Section 5095.9, no funds derived from the bonds authorized by this chapter shall be appropriated for any project the plans for which have not previously been approved by the Legislature.

Exclusive of the funds made available pursuant to Section 5095.9, all proposed appropriations for the program contemplated by this chapter shall be included in a section in the Budget Bill for each fiscal year for consideration by the Legislature, and shall bear the caption "State Park and Recreation Bond Act Program." Said section shall contain separate items for each project for which an appropriation is made. Such appropriations shall be subject to all limitations contained in said Budget Bill and to all other fiscal procedures prescribed by law with respect to the expenditure of state funds. Said section shall contain proposed appropriations only for the program contemplated by this chapter, and no funds derived from the bonds authorized by this chapter may be expended pursuant to an appropriation not contained in said section of the Budget Act. The Legislature shall have the power to add appropriations for approved projects to said section and to appropriate the amount for each project that it determines to be necessary, or it may reject a project or projects recommended.

5095.4 Bonds in the total amount of one hundred fifty million dollars (\$150,000,000), or so much thereof as is necessary, may be issued and sold to provide a fund to be used not carrying out the purposes of this chapter. Said bonds shall, when sold, be and constitute a valid and binding obligation of the State of California, and the full faith and credit of the State of California are hereby pledged for the punctual payment of both principal and interest on said bonds as said principal and interest become due and payable.

No funds derived from the bonds authorized by this section shall be expended for the construction of any reservoir designated as a part of the "State Water Facilities" as defined in subdivision (d) of Section 12934 of the Water Code, but such funds may be expended for the acquisition and development of beaches, parks, recreational facilities, and historical monuments at or in the vicinity of any such reservoir.

5095.5 There is hereby appropriated from the General Fund in the State Treasury such sum annually as will be necessary to pay the principal and interest on bonds issued and sold pursuant to this chapter, as such principal and interest become due and payable. There shall be collected each year and in the same manner and at the same time as other state revenue is collected, such sum in addition to the ordinary revenues of the State as shall be required to pay the principal and interest on said bonds maturing in said year, and it is hereby made the duty of all officers charged by law with any duty in regard to the collection of said revenue to do and perform each and every act which shall be necessary to collect such additional sum.

5095.6 The proceeds of bonds issued and sold pursuant to this chapter, together with interest earned thereon, if any, shall be deposited in the State Park and Recreation Fund, which fund is hereby created. All money deposited in the fund which is derived from premium and accrued interest on bonds sold shall be received in the fund and shall be available for transfer to the General Fund as a credit to expenditures for bond interest.

5095.7 Of the total amount of proceeds, ninety-five million dollars (\$95,000,000) shall be available for expenditure, in such manner as the Legislature may provide, as follows:

(a) Not less than 15 percent nor more than 25 percent of such proceeds shall be available for expenditure for the development by the State of beaches, parks, recreational facilities, and historical monuments. As used in this section, "development" means development of a substantial and permanent nature, including, but not limited to, roads, parking facilities, reservoirs, water and sewage systems, boat launching ramps, permanent buildings, and beach restoration.

(b) The remainder of such proceeds shall be available for expenditure for the acquisition of sites by the State for beaches, parks, recreational facilities, and historical monuments, and not more than two million five hundred thousand dollars (\$2,500,000) of such remainder shall be available for expenditure for fire prevention purposes, including, but not limited to fireroads, firebreaks, and water storage facilities, to protect forests with a historical, wildlife conservation, or recreational significance.

Of the total amount of proceeds to be expended pursuant to this section, not less than 40 percent thereof shall be expended in the Counties of San Luis Obispo, Kern, Inyo, Santa Barbara, Ventura, Los Angeles, San Bernardino, Orange, Riverside, San Diego and Imperial, not less than 40 percent thereof shall be expended in the remaining counties of the State, and the balance thereof may be expended in any area of the State.

5095 8 Of the total amount of proceeds, forty-five million dollars (\$45,000,000) shall be available for expenditure, in such manner as the Legislature may provide, for grants to individual counties, or to two or more counties engaged in a joint project, for projects the primary emphasis of which is the providing of regional recreational facilities for public daytime recreational use and for regional public participation. No grant shall be made for any type of project designed primarily for indoor recreation or for permanent structures designed primarily to seat spectators at recreational events. Any city may participate with a county in a project with the consent of the county, but only a county may apply for a grant.

At least 50 percent of the total amount of proceeds available for grants shall be apportioned among each of the counties in the State in the proportion that the total 1975 estimated population of each county bears to the total 1975 estimated population of all counties in the State.

For the purposes of this section the 1975 estimated population of the several counties of the State shall be as contained in a document entitled "Preliminary Projections of California Cities and Counties to 1975," published on January 3, 1962, by the Department of Finance.

Any amount apportioned for grants to a county may be received by the county as a grant in connection with a joint project with another county, or counties.

5095 9 Of the total amount of proceeds, five million dollars (\$5,000,000) shall be available, when appropriated by the Legislature, for expenditure by the Wildlife Conservation Board for recreational purposes pursuant to the Wildlife Conservation Law of 1957 (Chapter 1, commencing with Section 1430), Division 2, Fish and Game Code. The Wildlife Conservation Board is hereby designated as the board for the purposes of this section and for the purposes of the State General Obligation Bond Law for this section only.

5095 10 Of the total amount of proceeds, five million dollars (\$5,000,000) shall be available, when appropriated by the Legislature, for expenditure by the Division of Small Craft Harbors of the Department of Parks and Recreation pursuant to the Small Craft Harbors Law (Division 57, commencing with Section 5801), Public Resources Code.

5095 11 The bonds authorized by this chapter shall be prepared, executed, issued, sold, and redeemed as provided in the State General Obligation Bond Law (Chapter 4, commencing with Section 16720, of Part 3, Division 4, Title 2 of the Government Code), and all of the provisions of said law are applicable to said bonds and to this chapter, and are hereby incorporated in this chapter as though set forth in full herein.

5095 12 The State Park and Recreation Finance Committee is hereby created. The committee consists of the Governor, the State Controller, the State Treasurer, the Director of Finance, and the Administrator of the Resources Agency. For the purposes of this chapter the State Park and Recreation Finance Committee shall be "the committee" as that term is used in the State General Obligation Bond Law. Except as provided in Section 5095 9, the Department of Parks and Recreation is hereby designated as the board for the purposes of this chapter and for the purposes of the State General Obligation Bond Law.

5095 13 For the purposes of carrying out the provisions of this chapter the Director of Finance may by executive order authorize the withdrawal from the General Fund of an amount or amounts not to exceed the amount of the unsold bonds which the committee has by resolution authorized to be sold for the purposes of carrying out this chapter. Any amounts withdrawn shall be deposited in the State Park and Recreation Fund. Any moneys made available under this section shall be returned to the General Fund from moneys received from the sale of bonds sold for the purposes of carrying out the provisions of this chapter.

5095 14 The sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) is hereby appropriated from the General Fund to pay the expenses incurred by the State Treasurer in preparing and advertising the sale or prior redemption of bonds issued pursuant to this chapter, to defray expenses incurred by the State Park and Recreation Finance Committee pursuant to Section 16778 of the Government Code, and for the payment of legal services, upon approval of the State Board of Control, pursuant to Section 16760 of said code. Out of the first moneys realized from the sale of bonds issued pursuant to this chapter there shall be redeposited to the credit of bonds issued made by this section such sums as have been expended for the purposes specified in this section. The amounts so redeposited may be used for the same purposes whenever additional sales of bonds are made pursuant to this chapter. The appropriation made by this section is made without regard to fiscal years but, when all the bonds authorized by this chapter have been sold, the unexpended and unobligated balance of this appropriation shall revert to the General Fund.

SEC 2 To advise and assist the Legislature in prescribing appropriate standards, methods, conditions, and procedures for the expenditure of the proceeds from the bonds authorized by Section 1 of this act, the State Park and Recreation Program Development Committee is hereby established. The committee shall be composed of

the following members: The Director of Finance, the Administrator of the Resources Agency, the Chairman of the State Park Commission, two senators appointed by the Rules Committee of the Senate, and two Assemblymen appointed by the Speaker of the Assembly. The legislative members of the committee shall participate in the activities of the committee to the extent that such participation is not incompatible with their positions as Members of the Legislature. The appointed Members of the Legislature shall constitute a joint non-investigating committee on the subject of this section and as such shall have the powers and duties imposed upon such committees by the Joint Rules of the Senate and Assembly. The expenses of the legislative members of the committee shall be paid from the contingent funds of the Senate and the Assembly, respectively.

The committee shall submit its report and recommendations for equitable, effectively, and economically administering the expenditures of the proceeds from the bonds authorized by Section 3 of this act to the Legislature not later than the fifth legislative day of the 1963 General Session of the Legislature, provided that the committee may submit a preliminary report or reports at any time prior thereto to the Joint Legislative Budget Committee. The Legislature shall devise a method and procedures for administering the program based on said final report submitted by the committee. The committee shall cease to exist upon final adjournment of the 1963 General Session.

The committee shall appoint an executive secretary who shall serve at the pleasure of the committee. The executive secretary shall have such duties as are delegated to him by the committee. The office of the executive secretary shall cease to exist upon final adjournment of the 1963 General Session.

The sum of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) is appropriated from the General Fund to the State Park and Recreation Board, in the election committee for operating expenses incurred pursuant to this section.

SEC 3. Section 4 of this act shall take effect upon adoption by the people of the State Park and Recreation Bond Act, as set forth in Part 1 of this act. Sections 3 to 10 of this act contain provisions relating to the necessity for the submission of the State Park and Recreation Bond Act to the people, and for returning, canvassing, and proclaiming the votes thereon, and shall take effect immediately, provided, however, that the State Park and Recreation Bond Act as set forth in Section 1 of this act shall not be submitted to the people at any time unless this act is approved by a majority of two-thirds or more of the members elected to each house of the Legislature and provided further that if this act is not approved by a majority of two-thirds or more of the members elected to each house of the Legislature, Sections 4 and 5 of this act shall not become operative.

SEC 4. A special election is hereby called to be held in and about the State on the fifth day of June 1962. The special election shall be consolidated with the direct primary election to be held on that date. The consolidated election shall be held and conducted in all respects as if there were only one election and only one form of ballot shall be used. Except as otherwise provided in this act, all of the provisions of law relating to the submission of measures proposed by the Legislature shall apply to the measure submitted pursuant to this act. A separate ballot pamphlet shall be prepared, compiled, and distributed relating to such measure and other measures submitted by the Legislature to the people at special elections consolidated with the direct primary election. The Secretary of State shall distribute the ballot pamphlets to the county clerks not less than 30 days before the election, and the county clerks shall commence to mail these pamphlets to the voters not less than five days before the election. The distribution of ballot pamphlets in all other respects shall be conducted in accordance with the provisions of Section 373 of the Elections Code.

SEC 5. At the special election called by this act there shall be submitted to the electors Section 1 of this act.

SEC 6. Notwithstanding the provisions of Chapter 3 of the Statutes of 1962 (1st Ex. Sess.), upon the effective date of this section, the author of the measure submitted pursuant to this act and two members of the other house who voted with the majority on the measure, shall be appointed by the presiding officers of the respective houses to draft the arguments for the adoption of the measure. If the measure is not adopted unanimously by the house in which it originated, one member of the house in which it originated, who voted against it, shall be appointed by the presiding officer of that house to write an argument against it. If there are no negative votes on the measure in the house in which it originated, the presiding officer of that house shall appoint some qualified person to draft an argument against it. Each argument shall consist of not more than 500 words and shall be submitted to the Secretary of State on or before the fifth day after this section takes effect.

SEC 7. The special election provided for in this act shall be conducted, held, conducted, the ballots shall be prepared, marked, collected, counted and canvassed and the results shall be ascertained and the returns thereof made in all respects in accordance with the provisions of the Constitution applicable thereto and the law governing general elections insofar as provisions thereof are applicable

to the election provided for in this act, provided, however, that the Governor need not issue his election proclamation until 30 days before the election.

SEC 8. All ballots at said election shall have printed thereon and in a square thereof, the words "For the State Park and Recreation Bond Act," and in a separate square under said words, the following in eight-point type: "This act provides for a bond issue of one hundred fifty million dollars (\$150,000,000) to be used to meet the recreational requirements of the people of the State of California by acquiring and developing lands for recreational purposes." In the square immediately below the square containing such words there shall be printed on said ballot the words "Against the State Park and Recreation Bond Act," and in the same square immediately below said words, in eight-point type shall be printed "This act provides for a bond issue of one hundred fifty million dollars (\$150,000,000) to be used to meet the recreational requirements of the people of the State of California by acquiring and developing lands for recreational purposes." Opposite the words "For the State Park and Recreation Bond Act," and "Against the State Park and Recreation Bond Act" there shall be left spaces in which the voters may place a cross in the manner required by law to indicate whether they vote for or against said act, and those voting for said act shall do so by placing a cross opposite the words, "For the State Park and Recreation Bond Act," and those voting against the said act shall do so by placing a cross opposite the words "Against the State Park and Recreation Bond Act." Provided, that where the voting of said election is done by means of voting machines used pursuant to law in such manner as to carry out the intent of this section, such use of such voting machines and the expression of the voters' choice by means thereof, shall be deemed to comply with the provisions of this section. The Governor of this State shall include the submission of this act to the people, as aforesaid, in his proclamation calling for said election.

SEC 9. The votes cast for or against the State Park and Recreation Bond Act shall be counted, returned and canvassed and declared in the same manner and subject to the same rules as votes cast for state officers, and if it appears that said act shall have received a majority of all the votes cast for and against it at said election as aforesaid, then the same shall have effect as hereinafter provided, and shall be irrevocable until the principal and interest of the liabilities herein created shall be paid and discharged, and the Governor shall make proclamation thereof, but if a majority of the votes cast as aforesaid are against this act then the same shall be and become void.

SEC 10. Notwithstanding the provisions of Chapter 3 of the Statutes of 1962 (1st Ex. Sess.) upon the effective date of this section the Secretary of State shall request the Legislative Counsel to prepare an analysis of the measure in accordance with Section 5306 of the Elections Code. The analysis shall be filed with the Secretary of State within five days after the effective date of this section.

#### Senate Bill No. 19

*An act to amend an initiative act entitled "An act to establish a board of osteopathic examiners, to provide for their appointment, and to prescribe their powers and duties, to regulate the examination of applicants, who are graduates of osteopathic schools, for any form of certificate to treat disease, injuries, deformities or other physical or mental conditions, to regulate the practice of those so licensed, who are graduates of osteopathic schools, to impose upon said board of osteopathic examiners all duties and functions relating to graduates of osteopathic schools, holding or applying for any form of certificate or license, heretofore exercised and performed by the board of medical examiners of the State of California under the provisions of the state medical practice act, approved June 2, 1917, and acts amendatory thereof" approved by electors November 7, 1929, by adding Sections 2, 3, and 4 thereto and by repealing Sections 2 and 3 thereof, relating to the practice of osteopathy, said amendment to take effect upon the approval thereof by the electors, and providing for the submission thereof to the electors at a special election to be consolidated with the 1962 general election*

[Approved by the Governor April 23, 1962, Filed with the Secretary of State April 24, 1962, Chapter 48]

*The people of the State of California do enact as follows:*

**SECTION 1.** Section 2 of the act cited in the title is repealed.

**SEC. 2.** Section 2 is added to said act, to read:

**Sec. 2.** The Board of Osteopathic Examiners shall enforce those portions of the Medical Practice Act identified as Article 12 (commencing with Section 2340), Article 13 (commencing with Section 2360), and Article 14 (commencing with Section 2425), of Chapter 5 of Division 2 of the Business and Professions Code, as now existing or hereafter amended, as to persons who hold certificates, subject to the jurisdiction of the Board of Osteopathic Examiners, however, persons who elect to practice using the term or suffix "D.O." as provided in Section 2396 of the Business and Professions Code, as now existing or hereafter amended, shall not be subject to the provisions of this section, and the Board of Medical Examiners of the State of California shall enforce the provisions of said articles as to persons who make such election. After making such election, each such person so electing shall apply for renewal of his certificate to the Board of Medical Examiners of the State of California, and the Board of Medical Examiners shall issue such renewal certificates in the same manner as other renewal certificates are issued by it.

**SEC. 3.** Section 3 of said act is repealed.

SEC 4 Section 3 is added to said act, to read  
 SEC 3 This act, as amended, may be further amended or modified by the Legislature. In addition to such power to amend or modify, the Legislature shall have the power to repeal this act, as amended, in its entirety, and transfer any or all of its functions to the Board of Medical Examiners, in the event that the number of persons who are subject to the jurisdiction of the Board of Osteopathic Examiners reaches 40 or less. The Legislature shall, from time to time, appropriate to the Board of Osteopathic Examiners, and in particular for the contingent fund of such board, such sums as may be reasonably necessary for the purpose of carrying out its functions and duties.

SEC 5 Section 4 is added to said act, to read

SEC 4 This act shall be known and cited as the "Osteopathic Act"

SEC 6 Sections 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5 of this act shall take effect upon the approval of the people of the State. Sections 6, 7, and 8 of this act contain provisions relating to and necessary for its submission to the people and shall take effect immediately.

SEC 7 A special election is hereby called to be held throughout the State on the sixth day of November, 1962. The special election shall be consolidated with the general election to be held on that date. The consolidated election shall be held and conducted in all respects as if there were only one election and only one form of ballot and ballot pamphlet shall be used. All of the provisions of law relating to the submission of measures proposed by the Legislature shall apply to the measure submitted pursuant to this act, except that the arguments prepared by legislators pursuant to Article 3 (commencing with Section 4555) of Chapter 1 of Division 4 of the Elections Code shall be submitted to the Secretary of State on or before June 1, 1962.

SEC 8 Sections 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5 of this act shall be submitted to the electors at the special election called by this act.

#### Senate Bill No. 31

*This act to provide for meeting the building needs of the State by the adoption of a general construction program, by providing the funds necessary therefor through the issuance and sale of bonds of the State of California, and by providing for the handling and disposition of said funds, making an appropriation thereof, and providing for the submission of the measure to the people at a special election to be consolidated with the 1962 direct primary election.*

[Approved by the Governor April 13, 1962. Filed with the Secretary of State April 13, 1962. Chapter 23.]

*The people of the State of California do enact as follows:*

SECTION 1 This act shall be known, and may be cited, as the State Construction Program Bond Act of 1962.

SEC 2 The primary purpose of this act is to provide the necessary funds to meet the major building construction equipment and site acquisition needs for the state government, including junior colleges if legislation to provide funds for such colleges is adopted, as more particularly described in the report submitted by the Department of Finance pursuant to Senate Resolution No. 15 of the 1954 First Extraordinary Session, entitled "Report on State Building Construction Program," as revised March 7, 1962. Not less than twenty million dollars (\$20,000,000) of the proceeds from the sale of bonds pursuant to this act shall be available beginning

July 1, 1968, for expenditure for major building construction, equipment and site acquisition for junior colleges, and for the payment of interest and redemption of outstanding bonds of a school district or of a city and county issued for junior college capital outlay purposes. Nothing in this act is intended to prevent the Legislature from deviating from the specific projects mentioned in said report in utilizing the proceeds of the bonds herein authorized, provided such funds are not used for purposes specifically excluded from the program contemplated by said report or for purposes not reasonably related thereto. Nothing in this act is intended to bind the Legislature to follow the system of priorities contained in said report.

SEC 3 Bonds in the total amount of two hundred seventy million dollars (\$270,000,000), or so much thereof as is necessary, may be issued and sold to provide a fund to be used for carrying out the purposes expressed in Section 2 of this act. Said bonds shall be known and designated as State Construction Program bonds and, when sold, shall be and constitute a valid and binding obligation of the State of California, and the full faith and credit of the State of California are hereby pledged for the punctual payment of both principal and interest on said bonds as said principal and interest become due and payable.

SEC 4 There shall be collected each year and in the same manner and at the same time as other state revenue is collected, such sum in addition to the ordinary revenues of the State as shall be required to pay the principal and interest on said bonds maturing in said year, and it is hereby made the duty of all officers charged by law with any duty in regard to the collection of said revenue to do and perform each and every act which shall be necessary to collect such additional sum.

SEC 5 There is hereby appropriated from the General Fund in the State Treasury for the purpose of this act, such an amount as will equal the following:

(a) Such sum annually as will be necessary to pay the principal and interest on bonds issued and sold pursuant to the provisions of this act, as said principal and interest become due and payable.

(b) The sum of seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000) to be used as a revolving fund to pay the expenses incurred by the State Treasurer in preparing and advertising the sale or prior redemption of bonds issued pursuant to this act, to defray expenses incurred by the State Construction Program Committee pursuant to Government Code Section 16704, and for the payment of legal services upon approval of the State Board of Control, pursuant to Government Code Section 16769.

(c) Such sum as is necessary to carry out the provisions of Section 5 of this act, which sum is appropriated without regard to fiscal years.

SEC 6 The proceeds of bonds issued and sold pursuant to this act, together with interest earned thereof, if any, shall be deposited in the State Construction Fund. The moneys in the fund may be expended only for the purposes specified in this act and only pursuant to appropriation by the Legislature in the manner hereinafter prescribed.

SEC 7 A section shall be included in the budget bill for each fiscal year bearing the caption State Construction Bond Act Program. Said section shall contain proposed appropriations only for the program contemplated by this act, and no funds derived from the bonds authorized by this act may be expended pursuant to an appropriation not contained in said section of the Budget Act. The Department of Finance, which is hereby designated as the board for the purposes of this act, shall annually total the Budget Act appropriations allocated to it in this section and, pursuant to Section 16730 of the Government Code, request the State Construction Program Committee to cause bonds to be issued and sold in quantities sufficient to carry out the projects for which such appropriations were made.

SEC 8 For the purposes of carrying out the provisions of this act the Director of Finance may by executive order authorize the withdrawal from the General Fund of an amount or amounts not to exceed the amount of the un-sold bonds which have been authorized to be sold for the purpose of carrying out this act. Any amounts withdrawn shall be deposited in the State Construction Program Fund. Any moneys made available under this section to the board shall be returned by the board to the General Fund from moneys received from the sale of bonds sold for the purpose of carrying out this act, together with interest at the rate of interest fixed in the bonds so sold.

SEC 9 The bonds authorized by this act shall be prepared, executed, issued, sold, paid and redeemed as provided in the State General Obligation Bond Law (Chapter 4 of Part 3, Division 4, Title 2 of the Government Code), and all of the provisions of said law are applicable to said bonds and to this act, and are hereby incorporated in this act as though set forth in full herein.

SEC 10 The State Construction Program Committee is hereby created. The committee shall consist of the Governor, the State Controller, the State Treasurer, the Director of Finance, and the Director of Public Works, 1 of the purpose of this act the State Construction Program Committee shall be "the committee" as that term is used in the State General Obligation Bond Law.

SEC 11 Out of the first moneys realized from the sale of bonds issued pursuant to this act there shall be redeposited to the credit of the appropriation made by subdivision (b) of Section 5 of this act such sums as have been expended for the

purposes specified in said subdivision (b) of Section 5. The amounts so redeposited may be used for the same purposes whenever additional sales of bonds are made pursuant to this act. When all the bonds authorized by this act have been sold, the unexpended and unobligated balance of the appropriation made by subdivision (b) of Section 5 of this act, shall revert to the General Fund.

SEC 12 Sections 1 to 11 of this act shall take effect upon the adoption by the people of the State Construction Program Bond Act of 1962, as set forth in Sections 1 to 11 of this act. Sections 12 to 19 of this act contain provisions relating to and necessary for the submission of the State Construction Program Bond Act of 1962 to the people, and for returning, canvassing, and proclaiming the votes thereon and shall take effect immediately.

SEC 13 A special election is hereby called to be held throughout the State on the fifth day of June, 1962. The special election shall be consolidated with the direct primary election to be held on that date. The consolidated election shall be held and conducted in all respects as if there were only one election and only one form of ballot shall be used. Except as otherwise provided in this act, all of the provisions of law relating to the submission of measures proposed by the Legislature shall apply to the measure submitted pursuant to this act. A separate ballot pamphlet shall be prepared, compiled, and distributed relating to such measure and other measures submitted by the Legislature to the people at special elections consolidated with the direct primary election. The Secretary of State shall distribute the ballot pamphlets to the county clerks not less than 30 days before the election, and the county clerks shall commence to mail these pamphlets to the voters not less than five days before the election. The distribution of ballot pamphlets in all other respects shall be conducted in accordance with the provisions of Section 3773 of the Elections Code.

SEC 14 At the special election called by this act there shall be submitted to the electors Sections 1 to 11 of this act.

SEC 15 Upon the effective date of this section, the author of the measure submitted pursuant to this act and two members of the other house who voted with the majority on the measure shall be appointed by the presiding officers of the respective houses to draft the arguments for the adoption of the measure. If the measure is not adopted unanimously by the house in which it originated, one member of the house in which it originated, who voted against it, shall be appointed by the presiding officer of that house to write an argument against it. If there are no negative votes on the measure in the house in which it originated, the presiding officer of that house shall appoint some qualified person to draft an argument against it. Each argument shall consist of not more than 500 words, and shall be submitted to the Secretary of State on or before the fifth day after this section takes effect.

SEC 16 The special election provided for in this act shall be proclaimed, held, conducted, the ballots shall be prepared, marked, collected, counted and canvassed and the results shall be ascertained and the returns thereof made in all respects in accordance with the provisions of the Constitution applicable thereto and the law governing general elections insofar as provisions thereof are applicable to the election provided for in this act, provided, however, that the Governor need not issue his election proclamation until 30 days before the election.

SEC 17 All ballots at said election shall have printed thereon and in a square thereof, the words "For the State Construction Program Bond Act of 1962," and the same square under said words the following in 8-point type: "This act provides for a bond issue of two hundred seventy million dollars (\$270,000,000) for the building construction, equipment and site acquisition needs of the state government." In the square immediately below the square containing such words, there shall be printed on said ballot the words, "Against the State Construction Program Bond Act of 1962" and in the same square immediately below said words, in 8-point type shall be printed "This act provides for a bond issue of two hundred seventy million dollars (\$270,000,000) for the building construction, equipment and site acquisition needs of the state government." Opposite the words "For the State Construction Program Bond Act of 1962," and "Against the State Construction Program Bond Act of 1962," there shall be left spaces in which the voters may place a cross in the manner required by law to indicate whether they vote for or against said act, and those voting for said act shall do so by placing a cross opposite the words, "For the State Construction Program Bond Act of 1962," and those voting against the said act shall do so by placing a cross opposite the words, "Against the State Construction Program Bond Act of 1962." Provided, that where the voting of said election is done by means of voting machines used pursuant to law in such manner as to carry out the intent of this section, such use of such voting machines and the expression of the voters' choice by means thereof, shall be deemed to comply with the provisions of this section. The Governor of this State shall include the submission of the measure to the people, as aforesaid in his proclamation calling for said election.

SEC 18 If it appears that the measure shall have received a majority of all the votes cast for and against it at said election as aforesaid, then the same shall have effect as hereinbefore provided, and shall be irrepeatable until the principal and



interest of the liabilities herein created shall be paid and discharged, and the Governor shall make proclamation thereof, but if a majority of the votes cast as aforesaid are against the measure then the same shall be and become void.

SEC 19 Upon the effective date of this section the Secretary of State shall request the Legislative Counsel to prepare an analysis of the measure in accordance with Section 3706 of the Elections Code. The analysis shall be filed with the Secretary of State within five days after the effective date of this section.

*The people of the State of California do enact as follows*

SECTION 1 Chapter 15 5 (commencing with Section 19891) is added to Division 14 of the Education Code, to read

**CHAPTER 15 5 STATE SCHOOL BUILDING AID BOND LAW OF 1962**

19891 This act may be cited as the State School Building Aid Bond Law of 1962

19892 The State General Obligation Bond Law is adopted for the purpose of the issuance, sale, and repayment of and otherwise providing with respect to the bonds authorized to be issued by this chapter, and the provisions of that law included in this chapter as though set out in full in this chapter. All references in this chapter to "herein" shall be deemed to refer both to this chapter and such law

19893 As used in this chapter, and for the purposes of this chapter as used in the State General Obligation Bond Law, the following words shall have the following meanings:

(a) "Committee" means State School Building Finance Committee, created by Section 19710.

(b) "Board" means State Allocation Board.

(c) "Fund" means State School Building Aid Fund.

19894 For the purpose of creating a fund to provide aid to school districts of the State in accordance with the provisions of the State School Building Aid Law of 1962, and of all acts amendatory thereof and supplementary thereto, the committee shall be and is hereby authorized and empowered to create a debt or debts, liability or liabilities, of the State of California, in the aggregate amount of two hundred million dollars (\$200,000,000) in the manner provided herein, but not in excess thereof.

19895 All bonds herein authorized, which shall have been duly sold and delivered as herein provided, shall constitute valid and legally binding general obligations of the State of California, and the full faith and credit of the State of California is hereby pledged for the punctual payment of both principal and interest thereon.

There shall be collected annually in the same manner and at the same time as other state revenue is collected such a sum, in addition to the ordinary revenues of the State, as shall be required to pay the principal and interest on said bonds as herein provided, and it is hereby made the duty of all officers charged by law with any duty in regard to the collection of said revenue, to do and perform each and every act which shall be necessary to collect such additional sum.

On the several dates of maturity of said principal and interest in each fiscal year, there shall be transferred to the General Fund in the State Treasury, all of the money in the fund, not in excess of the principal of and interest on the said bonds then due and payable, except as herein provided for the prior redemption of said bonds, and, in the event such money so returned on said dates of maturity is less than the said principal and interest then due and payable, then the balance remaining unpaid shall be returned into the General Fund in the State Treasury out of the fund as soon thereafter as it shall become available.

19896 All money deposited in the fund under Section 19611 of this code and pursuant to the provision of Part 2, commencing with Section 16300, of Division 4, Title 2, of the Government Code, shall be available only for transfer to the General Fund, as provided in Section 19895. When transferred to the General Fund such money shall be applied as a reimbursement to the General Fund on account of principal and interest due and payable or paid from the General Fund on the earliest issue of school building bonds for which the General Fund has not been fully reimbursed by such transfer of funds.

19897 Whenever bonds are sold, out of the first money realized from their sale, there shall be redeposited in the revolving fund established in subdivision (b) of Section 19898 such sums as have been expended for the purposes specified in subdivision (b) of Section 19898 which funds may be used for the same purpose and repaid in the same manner whenever additional sales are made. Whenever all the bonds authorized by this chapter have been sold, the amount remaining in the revolving fund established by subdivision (b) of Section 19898 shall revert to the unappropriated surplus in the General Fund.

19898 There is hereby appropriated from the General Fund in the State Treasury for the purpose of this chapter, such an amount as will equal the following:

(a) Such sum annually as will be necessary to pay the principal of and the interest on the bonds issued and sold pursuant to the provisions of this chapter, as said principal and interest become due and payable.

(b) The sum of seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000) to be used as a revolving fund to pay the expenses incurred by the State Treasurer in having the bonds prepared and in advertising their sale or their prior redemption, for expenses incurred by the committee pursuant to Government Code Section 16768, and for legal services, upon approval of the State Board of Control, pursuant to Government Code Section 16760.

(c) Such sum as is necessary to carry out the provisions of Section 19899, which sum is appropriated without regard to fiscal years.

19899 For the purposes of carrying out the provisions of this chapter the Director of Finance may by executive order authorize the withdrawal from the General Fund of an amount or amounts not to exceed the amount of the unsold bonds which the committee has by resolution authorized to be sold for the purpose of carrying out this chapter. Any amounts withdrawn shall be deposited in a revolving fund to be allocated by the board in accordance with this chapter. Any moneys made available under this section to the board shall be returned by the board to the General Fund from moneys received from the sale of bonds sold for the purpose of carrying out this chapter.

19900 Upon request of the board, supported by a statement of the apportionments made and to be made under Sections 19551 to 19689, inclusive, the committee

shall determine whether or not it is necessary or desirable to issue any bonds authorized under this chapter in order to make such appointments, and, if so, the amount of bonds then to be issued and sold. A sufficient number of bonds authorized under this chapter shall be issued and sold so that seven million dollars (\$7,000,000) will be available for appointment on September 5, 1962, or as soon thereafter as such bonds can be issued and sold, and so that twelve million dollars (\$12,000,000) will become available for appointment on October 5, 1962 and a like amount on the fifth day of each month thereafter until a total of two hundred million dollars (\$200,000,000) has become available for appointment. Successive issues of bonds may be authorized and sold to make such appointments progressively, and it shall not be necessary that all of the bonds herein authorized to be issued shall be sold at any one time.

19901 In any resolution determining that the sale of all or any part of the bonds herein authorized is necessary or desirable, the committee may in its discretion adopt provisions for the interchange of bonds of different denominations, the issuance of new bonds of different denominations in lieu of, or in exchange for, bonds of a like aggregate principal amount but of different denominations, and the authentication of any bonds by the State Controller or by any deputy state controller. If authentication is so required, no bond authorized herein shall be valid unless so authenticated in the manner so required.

19902 In computing the net interest cost under Section 16754 of the Government Code, interest shall be computed from the date of the bonds or the last preceding interest payment date, whichever is latest, to the respective maturity dates of the bonds then offered for sale at the coupon rate or rates specified in the bid, such computation to be made on a 360-day year basis.

19903 The committee may authorize the State Treasurer to sell all or any part of the bonds herein authorized at such time or times as may be fixed by the State Treasurer.

19904 All proceeds from the sale of the bonds herein authorized deposited in the fund, as provided in Section 16757 of the Government Code, except those derived from premium and accrued interest, shall be available for the purpose herein provided, but shall not be available for transfer to the General Fund pursuant to Section 19895 to pay principal and interest on bonds.

19905 With respect to the proceeds of bonds authorized by this chapter, all the provisions of Section 19551 to 19689, inclusive, shall apply except:

(a) Any reference in Sections 19571 to 19689, inclusive, to "Section 165, Article XVI of the Constitution of this State" shall be deemed a reference to this chapter.

(b) Any reference in Sections 19571 to 19689, inclusive, to "Section 19704" shall be deemed a reference to "Section 19895."

SEC 2 Section 1 of this act shall take effect upon the adoption by the people of the State School Building Aid Bond Law of 1962, as set forth in Section 1 of this act. Sections 2 to 9 of this act contain provisions relating to and necessary for the submission of the State School Building Aid Bond Law of 1962, to the people, and for returning canvassing, and proclaiming the votes thereon, and shall take effect immediately.

SEC 3 A special election is hereby called to be held throughout the State on the fifth day of June, 1962. The special election shall be consolidated with the direct primary election to be held on that date. The consolidated election shall be held and conducted in all respects as if there were only one election and only one form of ballot shall be used. Except as otherwise provided in this act, all of the provisions of law relating to the submission of measures proposed by the Legislature shall apply to the measure submitted pursuant to this act. A separate ballot pamphlet shall be prepared, compiled, and distributed relating to such measure and other measures submitted by the Legislature to the people at special elections consolidated with the direct primary election. If there are no negative votes on the measure in the house in which it originated, the presiding

office of that house shall appoint some qualified person to draft an argument against it. Each argument shall consist of not more than 500 words and shall be submitted to the Secretary of State on or before the fifth day after this section takes effect.

SEC 6 The special election provided for in this act shall be proclaimed, held, conducted, the ballots shall be prepared, marked, collected, counted and canvassed and the results shall be ascertained and the returns thereof made in all respects in accordance with the provisions of the Constitution applicable thereto and the law governing general elections insofar as provisions thereof are applicable to the election provided for in this act, provided, however, that the Governor need not issue his election proclamation until 30 days before the election.

SEC 7 All ballots at said election shall have printed thereon and in a square thereof, the words "For the State School Building Aid Bond Law of 1962," and the same square under said words the following in 8-point type: "This act provides for a bond issue of two hundred million dollars (\$200,000,000) to provide capital outlay for construction or improvement of public schools." In the square immediately below the square containing such words, there shall be printed on said ballot the words, "Against the State School Building Aid Bond Law of 1962," and in the same square immediately below said words, in 8-point type shall be printed "This act provides for a bond issue of two hundred million dollars (\$200,000,000) to provide capital outlay for construction or improvement of public schools." SEC 8 The votes cast for or against the State School Building Aid Bond Law of 1962 shall be counted, returned and canvassed and declared in the same manner and subject to the same rules as votes cast for state officers, and if it appears that said act shall have received a majority of all the votes cast for and against it at said election as aforesaid, then the same shall have effect as heretofore provided, and shall be irrevocable until the principal and interest of the liabilities herein created shall be paid and discharged, and the Governor shall make proclamation thereof, but if a majority of the votes cast as aforesaid are against this act then the same shall be and become void.

SEC 9 Upon the effective date of this section the Secretary of State shall request the Legislative Counsel to prepare an analysis of the measure in accordance with Section 3566 of the Elections Code. The analysis shall be filed with the Secretary of State within five days after the effective date of this section.
