Proclamation

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, STATE OF CALIFORNIA

WHEREAS, An extraordinary occasion has arisen and now exists requiring that the Legislature of the State of California be convened in extraordinary session, now, therefore,

I, EDMUND G. BROWN, Governor of the State of California, by virtue of the power and authority in me vested by Section 9 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of California, do hereby convene the Legislature of the State of California to meet in extraordinary session at Sacramento, California, on the ninth day of April, 1962, at 12 noon of said day for the following purpose and to legislate upon the following subject.

To consider and act upon the Budget Bill for the succeeding fiscal year and revenue acts necessary therefor.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Great Seal of the State of California to be affixed this sixth day of April, 1962.

WHEREAS, Former Assemblyman William A. Munnell has been appointed to the Superior Court bench in Los Angeles County and has retired from the Assembly of the State of California after 10 years of dedicated and distinguished service to the people of this State and the 51st Assembly District, and

WHEREAS, William A. Munnell was born in Marshalltown, Iowa, on October 9, 1920, and at the age of 2 moved to Los Angeles, California, where he attended Brooklyn and Humphreys Grammar Schools, Garfield High School and the University of Southern California, and

WHEREAS, After receiving his law degree from the University of Southern California Law School, William A. Munnell entered into the practice of law and embarked upon the career of public service which led to his recent and most appropriate appointment as a Superior Court Judge for the County of Los Angeles, and

WHEREAS, It was in 1951 that he was first elected to the Legislature as Assemblyman for the 51st Assembly District, and in the ensuing 10 years he made an immeasurable contribution to the people of his district and our State by his sound, practical approach to legislative questions and the keen statesmanship with which he undertook the various problems facing the Assembly, and under his effective leadership numerous legislative measures of vital and lasting importance to the people of this State were enacted into law, and

WHEREAS, During his years with the Assembly, William A. Munnell served as Majority Floor Leader from 1959 to 1961, Minority Floor Leader from 1957 to 1958, Chairman of the Assembly Finance and Insurance and Industrial Relations Committees and as member of the Elections and Reapportionment, Revenue and Taxation, and Ways and Means Committees, and

WHEREAS, His interest in fiscal affairs, water resources, and labor management problems, particularly unemployment insurance and workmen's compensation, enabled him to aid in the solution of many problems in these areas, and

WHEREAS, William A. Munnell was also tirelessly active in numerous civic groups and in the affairs of the Democratic Party, in which he held the posts of Chairman of the State Central Committee from 1958 to 1960 and Southern California Chairman in 1960 and 1961, and

WHEREAS, William A. Munnell, in addition to his many public activities, is also a devoted husband to his wife, Charlotte, and the father of four handsome children, William John, Mary Louise, Betty Jean and David Brian, now, therefore, be it

ADDRESS BY GOVERNOR EDMUND G. BROWN

Governor Brown then proceeded to address the Joint Convention as follows.

Second Extraordinary Session

BUDGET MESSAGE

by Governor EDMUND G. BROWN

Transmitted to the California Legislature Monday, April 9, 1962

To the Senate and Assembly of the Legislature of California:

On February 5th, I presented to you a \$2,885,523,247 Budget for the 1962-63 fiscal year

I concluded my Budget Message with these words

"I submit this budget to you with the utmost respect, and with confidence that your ultimate judgment will not stem from narrow parti-

sanship, but will reflect your traditionally broad outlook on what is required to keep California in the position which she is just achieving, that of first among equals in this great union."

That, in summary, is again my message to you today

The events of recent weeks have not altered by respect nor dimmed my confidence in the eventual result.

The legislative process works

Sometimes it confuses before it clarifies. Often it seems a needlessly harrowing maze of parliamentary entanglements and partisan barriers

Yet, more often than not, this complex process refines and illumines.

The proposal of one man is examined and tested by scores of men, each equipped with his own prides and prejudices; then a consensus emerges.

No two of us here would ever prepare exactly the same budget for the State of California

A budget is a series of hundreds of choices, of a multitude of decisions based on economic, social and political views which are, in turn, rooted in individual experience and environment

I thus find far more remarkable how much agreement we have reached on this budget than how much disagreement there has been.

As I proposed this budget originally, it called for the expenditure of approximately \$2 billion 885 million.

As it came from the Joint Conference Committee of your two houses last Tuesday night, it had increased to approximately \$2 billion 891 million

As I resubmit this budget to you today, it calls for expenditures of approximately \$2 billion 888 million.

The range, you will note, is very limited

Even more significantly, if all the actual cuts offered by members of the minority party on the Assembly floor had been agreed to, these various amounts would have been only about \$7 7 million less

And if all the \$9 2 million in augmentations offered on the Assembly floor by members of that same minority, had also been accepted, the amounts would have been some \$1 5 million more

I use all these figures not for themselves alone, but because I think they are of overriding significance in our remaining consideration of the 1962-63 Budget.

We have all been focusing our concern on an area of difference of less than one-half of 1 percent of the total budget. This reflects no basic division among us, but rather reveals an amazing bipartisan consensus on the basic needs of this great State. It indicates that what differences exist, except in the case of the views of a few extremists, are of little importance in relation to the whole.

The lesson seems to be clear. The time has come for reasonable and responsible men to resolve these small differences and get on with the work of California.

I have no doubt that occasional extremist outcries still will echo through the councils of conciliation, but I confidently expect that they will be ignored.

I hope too that we will take no more time in assessing responsibility for what happened in the Assembly last week.

The hour was late, the issues hard-fought and the feeling high.

What is important now is that the legislative process resume its briefly interrupted work.

We are all Californians before we are either Democrats or Republicans. Most of us belong to a great progressive, forward-looking tradition in this State that has lent strength and stability to leaders of both parties and has brought California to the very threshold of national leadership.

Surely, there is more that unites us than divides us. Surely, we can agree as rational and responsible men on the fiscal program that will mark our passage over that threshold into the new era of California's primacy among the states.

I would turn now to the business of the day, to the new budget proposal itself.

As you will note, it is, with but a few exceptions, the budget proposal which was unanimously recommended by the Conference Committee of your two houses.

In explaining the reasons for the exceptions taken, I feel two major purposes can be served.

First, I hope to outline a number of the specific issues still requiring resolution.

Second, and more important, I hope to make clear the character and texture of the budget decisions involved.

The making of a budget is not a study in blacks and whites, or even of goods and bads.

It is a study in priorities, of choices of timing and emphasis, of the balance between planning and action, and of reconciliation of the desirable and the possible.

I thought my proposal of February 5th was a sound and reasonable one, and I still do.

I thought your Conference Committee proposal of April 3d a sound and reasonable one, and I still do.

And I think the proposal I herewith submit to you is also sound and reasonable.

Each of these proposals was and is honestly, if narrowly, balanced.

Each recognized, and continues to recognize, this growing State's great needs.

Each steadfastly adheres to strict standards of austerity and economy.

But there are differences, and I can best illustrate the character of these differences by outlining the few changes between the Joint Conference budget and the one I submit today.

To begin, I am not providing for the \$13 million in contingent funds of the Assembly and Senate.

To insure legislative independence, this amount is traditionally determined by the two houses and placed in the budget by the Conference Committee.

I am following that tradition once more by leaving this determination and action to the Legislature itself.

I propose decreases in three other items, an increase in one, and changes in three others which have no major effect on budget totals.

On review, I recommend that the Disaster Office be given \$146,500 less for certain equipment than the Conference Committee proposed for its purposes.

I recommend that the Department of Public Health be given \$125,250 more in order to meet the most urgent requirements of its anti-smog research program. This is immediately critical in the Los Angeles-Long Beach metropolitan area, but it also has state-wide importance for the future.

I recommend that the Division of Corporations be allocated \$102,908 less, eliminating 14 positions which were called into question by the Legislative Analyst and members of the minority in the Assembly. A new workload review indicates that these positions can be eliminated without damage to essential services.

I propose deletion of the special \$645,000 item for salary increases for state college faculty members.

In this case, I recognize the need and desirability of such an increase and the bi-partisan support it has in the Legislature.

The fact is, that this budget remains in very narrow balance.

If such a salary increase is to be provided, however, I suggest that it be financed primarily from the State College System's share of the \$3.3 million fund proposed for all state salary inequity adjustments.

That share alone would not be sufficient for the proposed 11% state college faculty adjustment increase, but it could be adequately supplemented from the small General Fund surplus without unbalancing the entire budget.

If such action is contemplated, the Legislature should give equal consideration to a similar adjustment for faculty salaries at the University of California. If the same funding approach were used, the budget would again remain in balance.

Because of the very small General Fund surplus now contemplated, however, I can no more recommend such a procedure on these salaries now than I could when I originally presented the 1962-63 Budget. But I do recognize the legislative concern, and sympathize with it. Should you again choose to act affirmatively on the faculty salary adjustment, I would not use an item veto unless the action would actually put the budget out of balance. That I cannot and will not tolerate.

The three other changes I have made in the Joint Conference Committee budget proposal are these:

1. I have reinstated my original recommendation that the portion of the 5% salary increase due to begin July 1 go to all except judges and those statutory officials receiving more than \$24,500 annually. I feel strongly that there should be not cutoff at the \$18,600 limit set by the Joint Conference Committee. Both the State Personnel Board and the Department of Finance are prepared to testify to the grave management problems posed by such a limitation, largely in terms of meeting higher salary levels in private business, especially for members of the medical, legal and engineering professions.

2. I have not included the language of proposed Item 348.1 on capital outlay for the California Water Project, regarding it as unnecessary.

3. I have deleted Section 32.1, which in effect is a written guarantee that the Department of Finance do what it has already proposed to do.

in the original budget presentation—produce a minimum amount of estimated savings beyond all other identified economies of \$6 million.

Throughout my term of office, the department has always met, and often exceeded, the amount of unidentified management savings pledged in the budget.

It will continue to do the best possible management job, and the guarantee proposed in Section 32.1 would neither add to nor subtract from the resulting savings.

I also wish to record my acceptance of one major capital outlay addition made by the Legislature to my original budget proposal.

I refer to the \$47 million program for speedy construction of a new system of facilities for the mentally retarded. The Administration had planned to offer this proposal in 1963, but I am pleased at the legislative decision to accelerate this program and have therefore endorsed it in the proposal before you.

That completes my summary. When you look at the vast, forward-looking programs of California in education, in water, in mental health, in highways, in aid to the aged and the needy, in all the areas of economic and social progress in California, our minor differences fall into a proper perspective.

Let us now consider those differences in this larger, indeed panoramic perspective.

As I have looked at this budget in detail once again, I have added one new test that I now recommend to you.

I kept before me these questions:

Is this just an expenditure or is it an investment? Does this look to the future as well as to the present? Will this pay a human dividend in one or five or ten or twenty years, a dividend of education or health or standard of living or civilization for our sons and daughters and their children?

If the answers were yes, the expenditure is in this budget proposal. If the answers were no, you will not find the item before you.

In closing, I want to speak briefly to a related fiscal problem on which the Legislature is now completing action.

You have chosen to put five bond issues on the June primary ballot, and I have consented to that procedure.

I originally proposed that two traditional issues—the \$200 million school construction loan issue and the \$270 million capital construction program bond issue for higher education and other state institutions—be voted on in June because of the early need for funds in those two programs.

Now, three others are scheduled to appear on the ballot at the same time—largely because of minority insistence in the Assembly that all be on the same ballot.

Most members of this minority have simultaneously declared that they favor all five bond issues and have, in fact, voted for them.

I hope that all of us, whether members of the majority or minority parties, will now feel an equal responsibility to support and work for these vital bond issues.

They are all long-term investments in physical facilities to meet the needs of generations of Californians yet to come, and are thus well within California's careful, conservative investment pattern.

The time before all these issues go before the people is suddenly very short.

We must therefore begin the process of explanation of these issues with all due diligence and that process must go forward without partisanship or petty political maneuvering.

The future of California is far more important than the personal political welfare of any one individual, and I ask that my fellow candidates of both parties join me in pledging not to lose sight of that central principle of political responsibility in this election year.

In closing, I wish to express my personal appreciation for past and present co-operation to the many Members of the Legislature of both parties who are retiring or seeking other offices after this session.

During the four legislative sessions of my present term of office, this State has once more asserted progressive national leadership with a program of achievement seldom matched in either California or her sister states.

My primary thanks go to resolute Democratic majorities, but many of these programs were made possible by the support of Republicans acting in the responsible party tradition of Hiram Johnson and Earl Warren.

To all retiring Legislators then, I offer my personal regards and the gratitude of the people of California. I also wish you a speedy and successful resolution of the issues still before you.

Subject: Women for Peace, Their Policies and Testimony
Before the Joint Committee on New School Building
Shelter Facilities

ASSEMBLY, CALIFORNIA LEGISLATURE

Since I have publicly criticized such organizations as the Women for Peace, I feel that I should make known to the membership of the Legislature, the press, and the public, the reasons that caused me to reach the unfortunate conclusion that the activities of this organization and those like it are not in the best interests of the United States. I find some of the testimony given to the Joint Committee on the Feasibility of Fallout Shelters in New School Construction by the Women for Peace inaccurate, and after researching those statements I feel that the inaccuracies are deliberate.

On January 29, 1962, in San Francisco the committee heard testimony from, among others, Dr. Lucille Green, who said, "I speak as a member of the Co-ordinating Committee of the Women for Peace of the East Bay Area," which she describes as "a spontaneous, grass roots movement for disarmament and peace," and states "we women have done our home work," and thereupon cites the numerous publications they have studied *including* Congressional Hearings.

With this background she testified as follows:

"And why assume an attack will be by *nuclear* weapons? It could as well be by chemical or biological weapons. In this case, according to former chief chemical officer of the U.S. Army, General Creasy, who apparently didn't hear the testimony here this morning, but wrote, nevertheless, in the New Republic, October 23, 1961, a very short time ago, that shelters would guarantee sure death."

She then started to quote General Creasy's remarks about ventilating systems, at which point I asked her to yield for a question since I was familiar with General Creasy's remarks. Although I had advised her of this fact, Dr. Green insisted,

"Well, apparently from this *direct quote*, he is not convinced that fallout shelters will protect against chemical and biological weapons."

Here are the facts. General Creasy did *not* write in the New Republic of October 23, 1961. A man named John R. Rague of Massapequa Park, New York, quoted General Creasy *out of context* in a letter, which he directed to the New Republic, and it was published in their October 23, 1961 issue. (See Exhibit No. 1.)

The statements of General Creasy taken out of context were from the report of the Hearings before the Committee on Science and Astronautics, U.S. House of Representatives on June 16, 1959, and the statement in question appears on page 6. (See Exhibit No. 2.)

"Therefore, if we go around gearing up our civil defense with underground shelters, to protect against the atomic bomb, and instead of having the atomic bomb, when the guided missile comes over, it has a chemical or biological warhead, instead of saving people you are guaranteeing sure death or sure sickness or whatever effect the particular warhead is designed to produce "

However, on the *same page* and in fact almost directly above the statement quoted (which is why I make the charge that the misinterpretation is deliberate) is the following sentence:

"However, it is certainly true if we don't gear up to protect against a broad range of chemical and biological agents, we are inviting use of just this type of attack."

Furthermore, in that same report (p 22) General Creasy states as follows

"It is my feeling if we are going to build underground shelters, then they must be equipped with the proper ventilating devices to insure that the chemical and biological agents don't get into them "

Aside from such inaccuracies, the Women for Peace seem to have developed a mental block with regard to any information which might lead to a conclusion different from their policies. The strangest of their beliefs is that such purely defensive measures as shelters constitute, as Mrs Frances Kinsley states, "an aggressive act," and the statement by:

Dr Lucille Green "It could thus make our leaders and the Russians believe it would be politically 'safe' to engage in war, and thus increase the likelihood of war "

Obviously the US Civil Defense is not "an aggressive act" if the Soviet Union also is engaging in such activities. The mental block is demonstrated in the following testimony

Assemblyman Conrad "Do you admit that the Russians have a civil defense program?"

Dr. Green: "No, I do not "

Assemblyman Conrad "You do not believe that they have?"

Dr Green "I do not believe that "

Here again, the ladies seem to have neglected their homework. For "Life" in its October 27, 1961 issue, under "Events and Insights" has an article devoted to the book "Civil Defense in the Soviet Union" by Leon Goure (*Sec Exhibit No 3*)

RUSSIA IS READY WITH FALLOUT SHELTERS

Mrs Khrushchev's soothing statement recently that Russians are not building fallout shelters was accepted by most Americans because that was what they had been told all along. What Mrs Khrushchev failed to say is that Russia has already built its shelters and already has a superior civil defense

organization. This challenging revelation (to us) is made in a scholarly book, "Civil Defense in the Soviet Union," by Leon Goure of the Rand Corporation.

Russian civil defense efforts have never really flagged, says Goure, since World War II. Through the regular state machinery, civil defense discipline and information are handed down from the top echelons and soundly drummed into the masses. Since 1955, 64 hours of compulsory training have been given to every one of some 30 million members of DOSAAF, an auxiliary organization of the armed forces. Trained even more intensively are the regular civil defense corps (the MPVO), which Mrs. Khrushchev's husband has boasted is more than 22 million strong. Training covers survival procedures not only for nuclear attack but for chemical and bacteriological warfare as well. An estimated 30 million gas masks have already been issued.

To give another example, there are such Soviet publications as "Medical and Civil Defense in Total War." (*See Exhibit No. 6*)

There are references throughout the book to standby plans for the populace to take shelter in an attack and one statement refers to plans "to expand the network of *existing* shelters."

Admittedly activities within the Soviet Union are shrouded in mystery, but other nations, who for generations have made a practice of military preparedness, have shown the ability to stay out of war. Switzerland is the traditional example, but from a standpoint of civil defense the prime example is Sweden. If the Women for Peace consider the leadership of the United States eager to engage in a war with the Soviet Union because we are thinking in terms of fallout shelters, how do they reconcile such statements with the history of Sweden, which has probably the most complete system of civil defense in existence?

The Women for Peace have an explanation for that too. Sweden is concerned only with fallout resulting from a war in which they do not intend to participate. Says Mrs. Frances Kinsley:

"If a nuclear war comes between the Soviet Union and the United States, the Swedes expect that they will be caught in the middle of it."

and

"It isn't the situation that we are confronted with here where a nation which is principally involved in any idea of future conflict will be constructing shelters for no other purpose than the expectation of war."

Here again are the *facts*: The Swedish system has been widely presented to the American people through television programs, as well as a document entitled "*If War Comes*," which was issued in the name of King Gustaf Adolf by Tage Erlander from the Palace at Stockholm in May 1961 and which has been translated for American distribution.

(See Exhibit No. 4) The Swedish shelter system is *not* designed solely against fallout. Here is the description (p. 11):

"Standard shelters are available in all large centers in apartment houses built after 1945."

"Standard shelters offer the best possible protection generally available. They can withstand the building's collapse and protect against gas and radioactive contamination. They also protect against the effects of atomic bombs at some distance from the blast."

Note that the Swedes are protecting themselves against a direct attack, *not* the fallout claimed by Mrs. Kinsley. And why? Here again is the Swedish report (p. 2):

"Modern war is total. An aggressor will try by every means to make us surrender. Through invasion . . . he will try to occupy the country. He will attack military and civilian targets by air forces and rockets."

and

"Total war must be met by total defense. Sweden has the will to defend herself, can defend herself and shall defend herself."

But worse than the misstatements of the Women for Peace is their defeatist attitude. One of these ladies, Mrs. Marion W. Powelson, describes herself as "Mrs. Paul Revere." This designation is unfortunate. The original Paul Revere alerted the American people to an enemy against which they took courageous action. Mrs. Powelson, setting herself up as a military strategist, makes this amazing statement:

"In the Army when a battalion has lost only 10 percent of its men, they consider it useless and it is pulled back."

The record of American units which have fought on to victory with casualties running over 50 percent is something Mrs. Powelson apparently has never heard of. But an even more amazing statement of defeat appears later on:

"Do you know about the wolf? When the wolf is frightened he fights as hard as he can, then if defeat draws near, he stands suddenly and exposes his jugular vein to the opposition."

Presumably then, America will offer her throat to the Soviet threat. How can anyone express such an attitude after our record of fighting against Hitler's threat to take over the world? Again Dr. Lucille Green gives the answer of the Women for Peace:

"The times have changed."

and

"Nobody would win a war."

How can any American, living in what is still the most powerful nation in the world, make such statements when (again see Exhibit No. 4) the ruler of tiny Sweden has the courage to say (p. 21):

"International law permits free (or guerrilla) warfare . . . the enemy shall never be left in peace, but must be harassed all

the time by raids against headquarters, vehicle columns, military camps, stock, etc "

I recognize the difficulty of criticizing any group . . . especially a women's group supposedly devoted to something which is near and dear to us all, namely the idea of peace I would, I think, be more charitable in my own statements if it were not for the viciousness . . . coming strangely from Women for Peace . . . with which they describe persons who hold conflicting views Thus, we find Mrs Marion Powelson describing their opposition in the following terms.

"Calculations of this sort seem to delight the type of mind hidden under head bones labelled Edward Teller and Herman Kahn. These minds, *I can't call them truly human, . . .*"

Has Mrs. Powelson, in her bitter denunciation of Edward Teller, forgotten his background? Here is a man Hungarian-born whose native land has known the terrors of *both* Fascism and Communism—who was one of those who aided America in her war against Nazi tyranny Why is he denounced when he urges us to protect ourselves against Communism?

An even more frightening aspect with regard to the Women for Peace is that they will not state firmly and unequivocally that they will support the use of American armed might if their compassionate appraisal of the Soviet Union is in error . . . if America awakes one morning to find herself facing a Pearl Harbor of atomic bombs delivered by the Soviet Union

For example, the "home work" of the Women for Peace includes an article entitled "Let's Stop the Fallout Shelter Folly" by William L. Scherer, which appeared in "Good Housekeeping" (*See Exhibit No. 5*) Even that article contained this statement (p. 152)

"Obviously there is a point at which we would choose to risk extinction itself rather than to face living as slaves of a barbarian conqueror."

However, when *this* part of the article is quoted to the Women for Peace, they equivocate They refuse to say "yes, if that were the case, we should fight" Instead they come up with such evasive replies as

Dr. Lucille Green "There is a point at which we must resist We must resist in a way that will be effective "

Again, compare such weasel words with the firm resolve of the Swedes (*See Exhibit No. 4, p 21 and 22*)

"The enemy shall never be left in peace . . . free (guerilla) warfare prepares and expedites final liberation . . . you fight with your life at stake; but remember that so do the soldiers at the front and the men in the free war *Collaboration with the enemy is high treason . . .* Help your fellow countrymen . . . Go on fighting relentlessly "

Those who disagree with the suicidal policies of such organizations as the Women for Peace are usually charged with advocating a preventive

war. An excellent answer to that was given by General Creasy (*See Exhibit No 2, p 24*):

"I think I disavowed any intention of talking about preventive wars. But you prevent wars by occupying a position, a posture, if you will, as well as a position, that makes it undesirable for other people to start wars with you. Your posture is the thing that keeps him from wanting to slug it out with you. But your relative position must also be maintained. If you permit him to push you further back into a corner, whether he does this geographically or financially, you have lost the war."

I realize that individual members of these so-called "peace groups" may be sincerely in error or drawn to these organizations by such personal tragedies as the death of a son in the last war. But, a study of their *policies* and their *statements*, with all the inaccuracies and evasions contained therein, convinces me that *somewhere* within such groups are forces that give aid and comfort to our enemies. . . forces bent on making our Nation so weak as to invite the very attack the Women for Peace say must never occur.

House Resolution No. 18

Relating to Dr. Frank C. Baxter

WHEREAS, Dr. Frank C. Baxter, M.A., Ph.D. (Cantab.), D.F.A., Litt.D., Professor Emeritus of English at the University of Southern California, is a noted teacher and lecturer on the literature of England and America, and especially on Shakespeare, the history of humor, and the history of books and printing, and

WHEREAS, He is the first (as an individual) to receive the George Foster Peabody Award for television education, which was presented to him on April 11, 1956, for distinguished achievement in TV in 1955. The Peabody Award has been variously described as "the Pulitzer Prize of the Fifth Estate," "the prestige award of the industry," and "the goal of every producer in radio and television"; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Baxter has also won the Sylvania Award, seven "Emmys" from the Academy of Television Arts and Sciences, the Ohio State University Award (twice) in addition to a score of other honors, including the Westinghouse Broadcasting Company Paul Revere Award given him in 1961, which noted that television had been enriched by "his wit and wisdom"; and

WHEREAS, Although his TV experience dates from the early experimental period in the '30's when America's first TV station went on the air in Los Angeles, Dr. Baxter did not become a full-time TV personality until the fall of 1953 and his "Shakespeare on TV" was the first college course to be taught on TV for academic credit in South California. "Shakespeare on TV" has also been offered for college credit by Mills College, Oakland, California, the University of Hawaii, and the University of San Francisco, and

WHEREAS, He soon became nationally known through three semesters of "Shakespeare on TV", "Now and Then," on which he read and discussed the world's great literature over 55 stations of the CBS television network coast-to-coast each Sunday for one year in 1954-55, and "Renaissance on TV," on which he appeared in the spring of 1956; and

WHEREAS, Five of his program series have been broadcast on the Nation's many educational TV stations, supplied by the Educational TV and Radio Center of Ann Arbor, Michigan, and New York, including three series of "Shakespeare on TV" one

of 'Renaissance on TV,' and the latest series, 'The Written Word' (the history of the book), filmed by the Cinema Department of the University of Southern California, and

WHEREAS, Dr. Baxter played the role of 'Dr. Research' in the national network Bell System Science Series one hour color TV programs on science produced and directed in 1956-57 by Frank Capra; these were, "Our Mr. Sun," "Hemo, the Magnificent," "The Strange Case of the Cosmic Rays," and "The Unhatched Goddess." A continuation of this series, produced by Warner Brothers, so far includes "Gateways to the Mind," "The Alphabet Conspiracy," "The Thread of Life" (on genetics), and the forthcoming "About Time" (on time and relativity), with Dr. Baxter as the central figure, and

WHEREAS, Dr. Baxter has an extensive American and European educational background, having done his undergraduate work at the University of Pennsylvania (*Summa cum laude* and prizeman, 1923), where he also later received his M.A.; his Doctorate is from the University of Cambridge, England, where he was a member of Trinity College. He was formerly associated with the faculties of the University of Pennsylvania, Swarthmore College, and the University of California. During World War I, he served in the Army Medical Corps in the A.E.F. Dr. Baxter is a former president of the local chapter of Phi Beta Kappa, he was the first Chairman of the USC Senate, and served formerly (for eight years) as chairman of his department, and

WHEREAS, For nearly 25 years, Dr. Baxter's reading of Christmas prose and verse was an annual tradition on the campus, many alumni and friends of the university came for miles to attend, and

WHEREAS, Dr. Baxter celebrated in 1955 his 25th anniversary of teaching at Southern California and received an honorary degree of Doctor of Letters (Litt.D.) at the 72d annual commencement exercises of the university. The degree was conferred by President Fred D. Egge, D., upon Dr. Baxter "in recognition of his leadership in the field of literature." The citation accompanying his honorary degree read, in part: "Long before the advent of television he was known among his colleagues as a man of unusual talent, and among his students as a superlative teacher. Today this acclaim is echoed across the country wherever there is a television set. Two years ago he demonstrated that his ability to turn a phrase from wit to wisdom in the space of a hyphen was as effective before a television camera as before a class. Since then, he has won nearly every award given for the best educational program on television." Another local institution, the well known Los Angeles College of Osteopathic Physicians and Surgeons, conferred the degree of Doctor of Fine Arts on Dr. Baxter in June 1956. In 1958 he received a second honorary Litt.D. from Ripon College, Wisconsin, and a third honorary Litt.D. from Elmira College, New York, and

WHEREAS, At the full convention of Toastmasters International on August 27, 1959, Dr. Baxter received the first Golden Gavel Award, now awarded annually to a speaker. The award was conferred for "service in bettering the arts of communication", and

WHEREAS, Other awards received by Dr. Baxter were from the Adult Education Association of Los Angeles, American Shakespeare Festival Theatre and Academy of Connecticut, Benjamin Franklin Award of the Los Angeles Printing Week Council, Brandeis University National Women's Committee, California Federation of Women's Clubs, Dupont Foundation Citation, Los Angeles Junior Chamber of Commerce, National Association for Better Radio and Television, National Citizens Committee for Educational Television, New Jersey State Fair (two Blue Ribbons for TV), Optimist International of Los Angeles, Rotary Club of Los Angeles, The Shakespeare Club of New York City, *TV Magazine*, *TV-Radio Life Magazine*, Tau Kappa Alpha, national forensic honor society, which named him "Speaker-of-the-Year" in 1954, and *Wisdom Magazine*, which gave him an achievement award for 1956. Dr. Baxter's name is on a Coral Star along Hollywood's new Walk of Fame, and

WHEREAS, Dr. Baxter has appeared in significant local and network programs such as "Open End," the Westinghouse "Reading Out Loud" series, the Chicago "At Random" and "V.I.P." programs, "Telephone Hour", "Playhouse 90," as host, "Intertel," as local host, "March of Dimes," the Armed Forces Radio and Television, and

WHEREAS, His Sylvania Award was for the Nation's best local educational program in 1953 and the five "Emmys" were for the best local public service or educational programs in Los Angeles between 1953 and 1960, and the other two for Dr. Baxter as the outstanding male personality on TV in the Los Angeles area in 1959 and 1959, and

WHEREAS, Dr. Baxter's hobbies include reading, book collecting, and the designing and making of models, charts, etc., to illustrate the history of human records and the history of the theater. Accounts of two of these models have appeared in national magazines: a working model of a printing press (about 1500), and another of Shakespeare's Globe Theater. Almost all of the visual materials used on his television programs are made by him, and

WHEREAS, During 1954-1955 Dr Baxter served on the Advisory Committee of Five to the Academy of Television Arts and Sciences, as a member of the Awards Committee, and later as one of the Academy's Board of Governors and Governor Brown of California appointed Dr Baxter to the California Committee on Educational Television and he is Chairman of the Curators Committee of the Hollywood Motion Picture and Television Museum, construction of which will begin in 1962; and

WHEREAS, The outstanding achievements of this truly remarkable man are further recognized by his being awarded the traditional Apple of Gold Award in Los Angeles on Teacher Remembrance Day by the International Senior League on the occasion of Dr Baxter being selected the 1962 Teacher of the Nation, now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the Assembly of the State of California, That the Legislature hereby joins in sincerely commending Dr Frank C Baxter on his outstanding contributions and to congratulate him on being named 1962 Teacher of the Nation, and be it further

Resolved, That the Chief Clerk is directed to transmit a suitably prepared copy of this resolution to Dr Baxter

House Resolution No. 19

Relative to the creation of the Assembly Interim Subcommittee on Tax Exemptions

Resolved by the Assembly of the State of California As follows

1 The Assembly Interim Subcommittee on Tax Exemptions is hereby created and authorized and directed to ascertain, study, and analyze all facts relating to authority of counties, cities, cities and counties, and districts to exempt from taxation or limit amount of taxation upon improvements on real property and upon personal property

2 The subcommittee shall consist of five members who are also members of the Interim Committee on Revenue and Taxation The Chairman of the Interim Committee on Revenue and Taxation shall appoint the chairman and the other four members thereof

3 The subcommittee is authorized to act during this session of the Legislature, including any recess, and after final adjournment until the commencement of the 1963 Regular Session, with authority to file its final report not later than the 5th legislative day of that session

4 The subcommittee and its members shall have and exercise all of the rights, duties and powers conferred upon investigating committees and their members by the provisions of the Joint Rules of the Senate and Assembly and of the Standing Rules of the Assembly as they are adopted and amended from time to time at this session, which provisions are incorporated herein and made applicable to this subcommittee and its members

5 The subcommittee has the following additional powers and duties

(a) To select a vice chairman from its membership

(b) To contract with such other agencies, individuals, public or private, as it deems necessary for the rendition and affording of such services, facilities, studies and reports to the subcommittee as will best assist it to carry out the purposes for which it is created

(c) To co-operate with and secure the co-operation of county, city and county and other local law enforcement agencies in investigating any matters within the scope of this resolution and to direct the sheriff of any county to serve subpoenas, orders and other process issued by the subcommittee

(d) To report its findings and recommendations to the Legislature and to the people from time to time, and at any time, not later than herein provided

Now, as to whether you talk glibly about a lysergic acid, here I think I would take an entirely different picture. Our detection devices, and to a degree our protection devices must be triggered, must be so geared that they will be triggered by a particular chemical molecule, or a particular electrical impulse, or a piece of microorganisms of a certain size.

So if Russia then comes up with one that has a different technical formula, it probably will not respond to our detection devices, so we might be living in a false paradise if we think we have detection devices and quite clearly we make it easier to the Russians if we tell them what our own formulas are. So I prefer not to talk about this. I only talk about those which have already been talked about in the past. There again, why hide something that already has been laid out on the table.

I could speak also to the general subject. I pointed out no one knows whether these things are held under the national policy that applies to chemical warfare as such. I do not think this is a problem that we have faced up to very squarely.

I have been asked whether or not the United States should be at this time gearing up to protect themselves defensively against this type of attack.

I have felt that the problem of an organization such as the Chemical Corps is not to state whether or not there is going to be a war, and you don't gear up for defense, civil defense, national defense, unless you really think there is going to be one, or unless this is part of your deterrent program. However, it is certainly true if we don't gear up to protect against a broad range of chemical and biological agents, we are inviting use of just this type of attack.

Whether they would be the pyrotechnical or the more deadly biological or chemical agents is not the point for the minute. The real point is that practically all of these things are heavier than air.

Therefore, if we go around gearing up our civil defense with underground shelters, to protect against the atomic bomb, and instead of having the atomic bomb when the guided missile comes over, it has a chemical or biological warfare instead of saving people you are guaranteeing sure death or sure sickness or whatever effect the particular warhead is designed to produce. As you go underground, you must have ventilation and as you put in ventilating fans and as you put in air-conditions you simply guarantee, instead of the agent waiting as the wind vents to wait for it, it will go down that particular intake you have conveniently arranged and hit your citizens. If you go further and look at the immediate capabilities, we delivered material only with a guided missile. We needed an airplane to take it in, but I have every confidence in time someone will tie in the Republic of other missiles so it will come in without this guidance. Let us take this huge fleet of Russian submarines—and I won't give the number because (a) I am not sure what the number is and (b) because I am sure the Russians do—put a number of them off the coast 100 to 200 miles out and have them put this material out either as a cloud or with a guided missile which can be thrown into our population centers. In the first place one must assume they really do not want to bomb all the docks in New York. They do not really want to destroy the Pittsburgh steel mills. There is no percentage in it. They are very realistic people. They would

General CLEGG: It is my feeling if we are going to build underground shelters, then they must be equipped with the proper ventilating devices to insure that the chemical and biological agents don't get into them.

Mr. DUBOVSKO: And if we cannot build the proper amount of underground devices to take care of the millions of people who would be exposed to such attack, should there not be information disseminated so people would know what to do in event of an attack of this type?

General CLEGG: Yes, sir.

Mr. CLEGG: And do you feel enough information is being given out in this area?

General CLEGG: I do not believe the American people are going to read any information on a subject when the American Government says this is too horrible to use and we are not going to use it. I think that is one of the basic problems we have to overcome. I did not say that to elude your question. There has been considerable information put out.

In the room we have about 40 odd people more or less. My article on psychochemicals came out in a magazine that has—is it 13 million people who read it? I would bet you that not a quarter of the people in this room had read the article or heard of it before this hearing this morning.

Mr. FETTER: Maybe we can see how many.

General CLEGG: How many people had heard of this article in *The Week* magazine before this morning?

[Show of hands. Three.]

General CLEGG: That is my point. This is probably one of the widest circulated pieces of information media there is.

Mr. DUBOVSKO: There was a showing of three hands in the room.

General CLEGG: I will raise mine and make it four.

Mr. DUBOVSKO: Does that not indicate a real effort must be made and rather than just hit this one medium we should use all the other media and again in the most highly professional manner possible—television, radio, and other means of communication as well?

General CLEGG: Yes, sir. I still go back to the policy, you must have a policy we are going to use these things, if we find them good. If we don't and them good let us stop working on them.

The Chairman: Let me say, General, I read it, too, as did Mr. McCormack.

General CLEGG: But I think you did get my point. It is awfully hard to get information to the American people unless you have a national policy.

Mr. DUBOVSKO: Of course, General, you say if we are not going to use it, we must throw it away. That does not bind a potential enemy.

General CLEGG: Your point is very well taken. I should like to make one more point there. The only way you can make a defensive system, is by visualizing the offensive action. So we are really trapped.

If we think there is anything to these agents, we have got to keep on digging at them offensively so that we may have a means for defense. This is important because the things that we have now were unheard of 5 or 6 years ago, and if we did not have a vigorous offensive program we could not have a vigorous defensive program.

General CREASY I do not think there is any question that one of the things that these materials will do is to change your behavior pattern, but if you leave the answer the man wanted it would be just happenstance. You give irrational answers.

The CHAIRMAN It tears down completely his moral fiber for the time being?

General CREASY I don't think I could answer that question, Mr Brooks. I don't think I even know the answer to it.

The CHAIRMAN You have not gone that far in your experiments?

General CREASY No. At least, if they have I am not aware of it.

The CHAIRMAN But at least it completely changes his behavior pattern?

General CREASY Yes.

The CHAIRMAN Mr Hechler.

Mr HECHLER I can't get it through my thick head how it prevents a war or starts a war. Here I think we might get into a rather long discussion which we could draw out at length which would not be profitable to this committee. But I do think it is dangerous and borders on the irresponsible to suggest one.

General CREASY Yes. I think I disavowed any intention of talking about preventive wars. But you prevent wars by occupying a position, a posture, if you will, as well as a position, that makes it undesirable for other people to start wars with you.

Your posture is the thing that keeps him from wanting to slug it out with you. But your relative position must also be maintained. If you permit him to push you further back into a corner, whether he does this geographically or financially, you have lost the war.

Someplace in this series of withdrawals, he has really struck this blow. He has started this war. I think we must further define what this point is.

Mr HECHLER Yes.

The CHAIRMAN Mr Fulton.

Mr FULTON May I ask the reporter to provide me with a copy of that last answer at the close of the hearing. I think that it is very good and want to quote it on the floor on the foreign aid bill.

My question is, does the person receiving the effect of the psychochemicals know of the effect that he was receiving from them?

General CREASY No, sir; he does not.

Mr FULTON So that really some foreign enemy could already be subjecting us in the United States to such things and we would not know it.

General CREASY I think it is quite—

Mr FULTON How can we determine it? What is the test to see whether we are already being subjected to them? Are we under it now? Are we the ones receiving it now, are we the rabbits and guinea pigs? I don't know.

General CREASY You will have to call another witness.

Mr McDONOUGH I am a little suspicious. [Laughter.]

General GREASY I have suspected a lot of people about it

Mr. FULTON Mine is really a serious question How are we to know? It could start in slightly and then go more and more and where does your perception of such a thing begin or end?

Russia is ready with
fallout shelters

Mrs Khrushchev's soothing statement recently that Russians are not building fallout shelters was accepted by most Americans because that was what they had been told all along. What Mrs Khrushchev failed to say is that Russia has already built its shelters and already has a superior civil defense organization. This challenging revelation (to us) is made in a scholarly book, *Civil Defense in the Soviet Union*, by Leon Gouré of the Rand Corporation.

Russian civil defense efforts have never really flagged, says Gouré, since World War II. Through the regular state machinery, civil defense discipline and information are handed down from the top echelons and soundly drummed into the masses. Since 1955, 64 hours of compulsory training have been given to every one of some 30 million members of DOSAAF, an auxiliary organization of the armed forces. Trained even more intensively are the regular civil defense corps (the MPVO), which Mrs Khrushchev's husband has boasted is more than 22-million strong. Training covers survival procedures not only for nuclear attack but for chemical and bacteriological warfare as well. An

estimated 30 million gas masks have already been issued.

While their US counterparts are still learning basics most MPVO workers are already specialists. Separate squads handle the moving of people into shelters, the transport for evacuating cities, the repair of public utilities and other vital installations (such as sealing off a radioactive sewer), the supply of noncontaminated food to disaster areas, medical aid, fire fighting, decontamination of people, clothing, buildings and terrain—even veterinary care for blitzed beef.

As a result, most Russians know the different warnings for "threatening situation alert," "air raid alert," and "chemical alert," and know what to do in each case. As for bomb shelters, though there are few private ones, huge secret blastproof caverns have been built for key scientific, military and party personnel, and public fallout shelters have been prepared in city basements and subways. "I have pointed out the vents in pictures of Moscow buildings shown me by our own officials," says Gouré. "They are hard to find only if you don't know what to look for."

Total war requires a total defense. Every citizen must be prepared to do his utmost in the total defense—in the armed forces, civil defense, war production, national supplies, medical care, in the homes. Everyone must also know how to protect himself against the dangers of modern war, and to realize how essential it is to preserve his calm and balance even in critical situations.

The citizens of Sweden are urged to study carefully the contents of this booklet. Consider how you and your family will act if war comes.

TOTAL WAR—TOTAL DEFENSE

Modern war is total. An aggressor will try by every means to make us surrender. Through invasion across the land borders, over the sea and by air, he will try to occupy the country. He will attack military and civilian targets by air forces and rockets—our armed forces, railroad centers, power plants, factories and oil supplies, cities and communities. He will try to prevent our imports of essential commodities, by sinking merchant vessels and by demolishing the ports. He also may want to harm people and animals, by spreading contagion. He will also try to undermine our spirit of resistance by propaganda and rumors. Activities of the Fifth Column—at work already in peacetime—will be intensified by espionage and sabotage.

Total war must be met by total defense.

We must defend ourselves regardless of the assaults and hardships we have to face. The stake is our freedom and independence, our existence as a free nation.

Sweden has the will to defend herself, can defend herself, and shall defend herself.

Resistance will be relentless and continue in all circumstances. This depends on you—your contribution, your determination, your will to survive.

WE WILL NEVER GIVE UP. ANY STATEMENT THAT RESISTANCE SHALL CEASE WILL BE FALSE.

SWEDEN'S GOVERNMENT IN WARTIME

Sweden is governed in war as in peacetime in accordance with her Fundamental Laws. Any "government" established in a different order is illegal.

YOU ARE BY DUTY BOUND TO OBEY THE LEGAL GOVERNMENT AND TO COMPLY WITH ITS INSTRUCTIONS.

If your husband has been called up, you can reach him under his field post number, or, if this is unknown to you, under the address of his regiment. Never write the field post number and the regiment's address at the same time. Write the addressee's vital statistics number (draft number) and the regiment's (squadron, corps) symbol.

Evacuees will be registered in the quartering community, where you must state, among other data, your latest place of registration, home address, the new address in the quartering community and the name of your host.

Date reported at the time of registration will be used by your home post office in order to establish your forwarding address. The record thus established will also help your relatives to make inquiries about you.

PROTECTION AGAINST ATTACK

Modern weapons can have a devastating effect. However, there is a good chance to protect yourself against them, provided you know what facilities are available. Find out the whereabouts of the nearest shelter—at home and at your place of work. If there is no shelter within reach, plan how best to protect yourself.

Standard shelters are available in all large centers in apartment houses built after 1945. Standard shelters offer the best possible protection generally available. They can withstand the building's collapse and protect against gas and radioactive contamination. They also protect against the effects of atomic bombs at some distance from the blast.

Rock shelters offer good protection against radiation but do not protect against cave-in and fire.

During an occupation, follow the orders and instructions given over the radio or by other means by Sweden's lawful government.

What Does International Law Say?

International agreements were concluded after World War II to protect civilians, prisoners of war, the wounded and the sick during a war. All nations which signed the Geneva Conventions of 1949—

including great powers such as the United States and the Soviet Union—are bound by them

Regardless of the great hardships of an occupation, we shall always assert the rights of the civilian population in all respects.

The Civilian Convention includes the following provisions

that physical or moral force may not be exerted in any form,
that nobody may be punished for the crime of others,
that terror, pillage, and reprisals are forbidden, and
that forced removal or deportation to another country may not occur

Free Warfare

International law permits free (or guerilla¹) warfare, provided its participants are under responsible leadership, provided they are in uniform or wear badges or other marks of identification, and provided they carry their weapons in full view. Military units and other armed groups remaining in an enemy-occupied area shall resort to free warfare

Free warfare gives us the advantage of our knowledge of our own area and of how to move in it. The enemy shall never be left in peace but must be harassed all the time by raids against headquarters, vehicle columns, military camps, stocks, etc. The enemy must be forced to disperse its forces, which will give our main forces better chances of success. Free warfare prepares and expedites final liberation

The Resistance Movement

Resistance movements were born in occupied countries during World War II. They increased in strength and significance as the occupying power hardened its grip. It requires courage and good nerves to participate actively in the resistance movement. International law offers no protection for those actively engaged in the resistance movement. You fight with your life at stake, but remember that so do the soldiers at the front and the men in the free war

Do not give the enemy any assistance whatever, apart from humanitarian aid. Refrain from personal relationship with him. Disclose no information about Sweden's total defense. Do not take part in propaganda directed against Sweden, but counteract it. Collaboration with the enemy is high treason

Remember

We must all demand more of ourselves in war than in peace. You can accomplish more than you think. Your resources grow in times of danger. KEEP CALM—HAVE FAITH IN YOURSELF—HELP YOUR FELLOW COUNTRYMEN—COOPERATE WITH THE AUTHORITIES—GO ON FIGHTING RELENTLESSLY—
WE NEVER GIVE UP

countries have learned how to construct a 50-megaton bomb, with an explosive power of 50 million tons of TNT.

The figures today presumably are worse. But the government in Washington has not lately taken the people into its confidence on this. And for the most part, the scientists remain silent.

merely taking to fall-out shelters. One national publication, whooping it up for a massive private shelter program, asserts that if everyone had a shelter, the number of our dead in an all-out nuclear assault "might" be reduced from 160 million to 85 million or even less.

It "might" be. But who really knows?

Perhaps, as I suspect, there is no authoritative answer. The consequences of nuclear warfare unleashed on a massive *continued*

Elaborate Shelter Plan Outlined by Russians

Program Revealed in 3-Year-Old Booklets,
Gas Masks and Special Clothes Envisaged

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Soviet Union claims to be planning an elaborate system of civil defense shelters plus the mass distribution of gas masks and special protective clothing.

These claims, which contrast sharply with Russian charges that the U S civil defense program reflects war-mongering, were revealed Thursday in a 403-page translation of an official Soviet document.

Although the information comes from a publication 3 years old, U S officials say it represents the latest open literature on the subject.

Called "Medical and Civil Defense in Total War," the volume was placed on sale by the Commerce Department's Office of Technical Services. It was originally published in 1959 by the Byelorussian Ministry of Health, and was written by J. F. Snpron and F. P. Zverev.

No Hint of Progress

The book, based on lectures given at a medical institute in Minsk in 1955-58, gives no hint of how much progress has been made in carrying out the various plans.

In discussing steps to be taken in the event of an attack alert, the authors state that every citizen "must have his own gas mask, a cape made of white, close-knit material, individual first aid kits, and protective stockings and gloves."

No mention is made of whether these items have been distributed, although the text makes clear elsewhere that the articles of clothing are of special design and material.

The book differs sharply from American civil defense literature in giving almost as much attention to germ and gas warfare as to the hazards of nuclear attack. The effects of gases and methods of medical treatment occupy 64 pages compared with 67 pages devoted to radiation sickness.

Propaganda Attack

The volume is heavily laced with political propaganda and starts with an attack on "the aggressive ruling circles of certain capitalist states." The actions of these unnamed countries are given as the motivation for a Soviet civil defense program.

There are references throughout the book to stand-by plans for the populace to take shelter in an attack and one statement refers to plans "to expand the network of existing shelters."

Any such network is not visible to foreigners in the Soviet Union and pamphlets distributed in Moscow lean to makeshift shelters. Villagers are advised to use cellars. Apartment dwellers are told that in case of a bomb attack the safest place is middle floor.
