EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT STATE OF CALIFORNIA

WHEREAS, An extraordinary occasion has arisen and now exists requiring that the Legislature of the State of California be convened in extraordinary session, now, therefore,

- now, therefore,

  I, Edunding G Brown, Governor of the State of California, by virtue of the
  power and authority in me vested by Section 9 of Article V of the Constitution
  of the State of California, do hereby convene the Lexislature of the State of
  California to meet in extraordinary session at Sacramento, California, on the 26th
  day of June, 1962, at 12 noon of said day for the following purpose and to legislate
  upon the following subject:
- 1 To consider and act upon legislation to propose to the people an act providing for the issuance of bonds to provide funds to meet the building construction, equipment and site acquisition needs of the University of California. California State Colleges, public junior colleges, facilities for the mentally ill and retailed, correctional institutions and conservation camps, and forestry fitefighting facilities.

# ADDRESS BY GOVERNOR EDMUND G. BROWN

Governor Brown then proceeded to address the Joint Convention as follows:

#### MESSAGE TO THE LEGISLATURE By Governor Edmund G. Brown Special Session Convened June 26, 1962

To the Senate and Assembly of the Legislature of California:

I have convened this special session for one purpose only—to permit us to consider together the submission of a bond issue to the voters on November 6 for the financing of California's most argent public building needs for the next two years

A similar proposal was before the voters June 6 and was defeated Under most circumstances, all of us would have regarded such a decision as conclusive.

As you know, however, there are a number of highly unusual factors involved in the defeat of Proposition 3

Neither its title nor its wording were sufficiently descriptive of its urgent purpose—the financing of construction of facilities for the University of California, the state college system, and public junior colleges, for facilities for treatment of the mentally ill and retarded; for narcotic control and other correctional institutions and camps, and for fire control facilities

I have received hundreds of communications from leaders and voters of both parties who believe the lack of a clear statement of purpose was responsible for the defeat of Proposition 3, and who have asked for a special session for its resubmission

They have been joined in this request by many organizations dedicated to the public purposes involved Their concern is not only with the failure to provide adequate information to primary voters of the specific contents of the proposal, but with the equal failure to communicate the urgent needs involved in the brief time available before the primary election

All segments of higher education, including the private colleges and universities which would not benefit directly, have also urged another submission

So too have those concerned with the equally vital need to provide hospital beds and facilities for the mentally ill and retarded—currently in such short supply that there is now a growing waiting list for hospitalization of retarded children.

So too have our correctional authorities administering strict new narcotic control policies and sentences

My mail appears to reflect an almost unanimous consensus among thoughtful Californians that the bond issue should be re-submitted.

There also have been a wide variety of suggestions for changes and improvements I have given each careful and dispassionate consideration

Having weighed the various equities and necessities involved, I am again proposing a \$270 million bond issue measure, but incorporating the following improvements:

- (1) The bond issue will be titled Proposition A-1 and will appear at the top of the list of other proposals on the November ballot.
- (2) The title and the actual "FOR" and "AGAINST" language on the ballot will specify the character of the facilities to be financed, thus removing any possible "blank check" concerns There will be a provision requiring that 80 percent of the \$270 million be spent for higher education facilities, instead of the previous declaration of intent, which was not binding.
- (3) A clause permitting junior colleges to use their funds to pay debt service has been removed and this measure requires that all funds go for new construction.

In addition, I am submitting with this measure a full project-byproject list of classes of expenditures under this bond act.

Only those already approved in the 1962-63 Budget are fully committed. The others represent the best present estimate of what the agencies involved will submit to the Legislature for inclusion in the

1963-64 Budget The list cannot and should not be binding because it is, as always, subject to final executive and legislative action, but it does permit public evaluation of the general program.

Most of the other changes proposed involve variations based on what

I regard as undesirable principles

Some would attempt to set up competition among the various programs needed to meet the challenges of California's growth. They would, for example, pit the needs of higher education against the needs of the mentally ill and retarded, foreing a choice between two equally critical programs—although not of equal size. Some would even put the various segments of higher education in competition, pulling apart that which the Master Plan for Higher Education has pulled together with resulting efficiency and economy in our educational effort.

Another approach has been to suggest that we put the financing on a "take care of this year and let next year take care of itself" basic This shortsighted proposal completely ignores the continuing character of our expansion needs and the long-term planning required to meet them. It would also presume an expensive special election sometime in 1963

I think the proposal I am recommending is a far more candid, complete measure, offering the voters the best opportunity for an informed decision in November.

As a matter of information, I also want to assure you that your actions will not alter the fact of a balanced 1962-63 Budget

You approved a balanced budget Of \$141 million in capital outlay expenditures, \$89 million was contingent upon approval of a new state construction bond issue.

The primary election decision on Proposition 3 did not unbalance the budget. It simply dictated that \$89 million in projects not be constructed, and language already in the budget provided for that eventuality.

The same language will permit the expenditure of that \$59 million in projects, however, if another proposal is placed on the November

ballot and 1s approved

There is no fiscal or budget crisis involved No matter what the decision of the Legislature or of the voters, there will be no deficit. The State's general fund revenues are coming in at almost exactly the predicted rate. We have just had another \$100 million bond sale at below the national average of interest rates for such bonds—the surest possible sign of sound credit and national confidence in the fiscal integrity of this administration.

The crisis we face is far different It is a crisis of the progressive consensus in California—the bi-partisan agreement that every investment California has made in its future has brought more than ample dividends, whether that investment has been in education, water, highways or state mental and correctional institutions or other programs to conserve and develop our human and natural resources and potential

This bond issue offers nothing new. The pattern of investment is the same that we have had in California since World War II, the pattern that has brought us true primacy in the American union.

siding

That pattern was developed with the support of both Democrats and Republicans. This is not the time to let the tides of population sweep over and inundate what we have built in California by working together.

As I told you earlier this year, growth and quality have been the hallmarks of modern life in California.

This bond issue is urgently needed to sustain both. The future of the kind of California we have built is at stake

Let me add this:

I am not opening the special session for submission of another park and recreation bond issue at this time

To date, there has been little indication of the kind of bipartisan

support that has been offered the construction bond issue

If, however, the Republican Party's legislative leadership will work with the Democratic Party's legislative leadership to provide bipartisan support for a specific park and recreation bond issue proposal, I will consider reopening the session.

I know you join me in hoping that we can take care of the urgent business of the State swiftly and well this week, and without clouding the results of our work with needless partisan controversy.

DEAR MR. CHNIMUS I have the honor to transmit Bulletin No. 39-60, "Water Supply Conditions in Southern California during 1959-60" As the most recent in a series of annual reports, the hulletin was prepared pursuant to Sections 225 and 226 of the California Water Code

220 of the Califolnia Wafer Code
During the report period, precipitation was again generally below normal throughout the area In coastal regions, precipitation was approximately 70 percent of mean, and major stream runoff amounted to about 28 percent of mean
Continuation of the drought has also meant that the supply of water available in the area has diminished This is evidenced by a decrease in the amount of water stored in surface reservoirs (down to 18 percent of capacity on October 1, 1960, from 23 percent of capacity a year earlier), a general lowering of ground water levels, and a rather marked increase in the volume of water imported

The Metropolitan Water District of Southern California and the City of Los Angeles imported an all-time high of 1,758,000 acre-fect of water through their aqueducts. This represents a 16 percent increase over their importations of water in the previous year

Despite such large increases in volume of imported water, ground water levels continued to decline Consequently, sea water continued to intrude ground water basins in coastal areas, degrading water quality in portions of those basins. Rather large advances of intuding sea water were noted in the ground water basins in the Ovarar Plain of Ventura County and the coastal plain of Orange County In view of the extent and complexity of water supply problems discussed in this bulletin, those programs which seek to alleviate or solve such problems appear to warrant commined attention and support.

Nothing in this paragraph shall prevent a committee from acting with regard to a bill referred to it where the only action taken is to cause the bill to be reported to the Assembly with the recommendation that amendments be adopted and the bill be reprinted as amended and re-referred to the committee-

The several standing committees and their chairmen are directed to adopt a procedure which assures that no committee shall commence the hearing of any bill after the hour of six o'clock pm at an afternoon meeting of the committee or after the hour of 11 o'clock p.m. at an evening meeting, but the hourings on a bill commenced prior thereto may be continued thereafter for such period of time as the committee deems necessary.

#### Subject, 1962 Third Extraordinary Session Re: State Bond Issues

GENTLEMEN Your attention is invited to the following suggestions in respect of resubmission of state bond issues which were rejected at the June 5 primary election.

# State Construction Program Bond Act

As a part of its continuing study of subjects affecting the broad public interest, the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce studied very carefully the \$270,000,000 State Construction Program Bond Act (Proposition No 3 on the June ballot) As a result of its consideration, the State and Local Government Committee recommended that the measure be opposed However, because time prevented the scheduling of spokesmen representing the university and state colleges, the action

of the Chamber's Board of Directors, upon motion of the study committee chairman, was to take NO POSITION on Proposition No 3

The need of the university and state colleges for additional facilities was never questioned by the study committee. However, the injection of an entirely new philosophy for state financing of capital improvements of junior colleges, and the proposed use of state bond funds to pay debt service on bonds already voted by junior college district electorates was severely criticized. The people of California deserve the opportunity to vote on this issue separately. Furthermore, the "disclaimer" language in Senate Bill No. 31 (1962 First Extraordinary Session) as to the expenditure of funds and the elimination of requirements to follow priorities gave the legislation a "blank check" aspect which many prudent citizens resented

Now the Legislature has been summoned into extraordinary session on June 26 to consider resubmission of this proposal to the electorate in November. Our board of directors has taken action to endorse resubmission of a proposal for needed university and state college capital projects and other essential state construction—but urges strongly that important changes be made.

First, the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce recommends:

- (a) That the Legislature refuse to include in any proposed state bond issue authorization of bond fund expenditures to pay debt service on junior college district bonded indebtedness;
- (b) That the Legislature exclude from any proposed state band issue, funds for junior college district capital outlays, at least until such time as local tax sources, as measured by existing legislation, are exhausted

We would strongly oppose the allocation of funds for payment of detect service on presently authorized or outstanding junior college district bonds. We would also oppose the use of state funds for junior college construction purposes, at least until such time as the junior college districts (including junior colleges which are financed as a part of unified school districts) have exhausted their local borrowing capacity.

We know of no junior college district which has exhausted its present legal bonding capacity, and few are even near it. While the integration of junior colleges into the Master Plan for Higher Education may be sound in concept, it is our belief that substantial state assistance under the ADA formulae and the eligibility of the junior colleges to participate in the State School Building Aid Program provide adequately, on the financial level, for junior colleges

The fact that the vast majority of jumor college students live in the districts that support the college appears to us to lend validity to the argument that local tax sources should be used, at least to legislatively established limits Local junior college districts are now under control of local boards of education who are responsible to the people living within them Local boards are now entirely responsible for junior college capital construction. We should oppose dilution of this responsibility through the offer of state funds

Second, the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce recommends:

That the Legislature exclude from any state bond proposals language similar to that contained in Senate Bill No. 31 (Chapter 23, 1962 First Extraordinary Session, Section 2) which would permit it to deviate from planned projects or release it from the requirement of following priorities.

We urge that a priority list of projects, to be financed from the proceeds of the bond issue, be established—and followed—and that language releasing the Legislature from the responsibility of following priorities be omitted from any bond proposal contemplated by the extraordinary session.

In our own local school districts a so-called "bond bible" is made up prior to submission of bond proposals to the electorate—and, when the authorization to issue bonds is approved by a two-thirds vote of the electorate, that "bond bible" is followed, and the citizens of the Los Angeles City School Districts can rely on the project listings to be constructed in the order of their greatest need. While our local bond issues failed to garner the necessary two-thirds vote at the June election—due, many of us believe, to the fact that there were so many questions about the state bond proposals among thoughtful citizens that a "NO" psychology developed and affected the results on the local issues; however, our local bond issues did receive a substantial majority of affirmative votes—which was certainly not the ease with State Propositions No 3, No. 4, and No. 5.

It has been widely suggested that Proposition No 3 on the June ballot was defeated because of confusion over the purposes for which the funds were to be expended This we doubt. But some confusion could not be avoided with the "disclaimer" language in the bill. And it also may well be true, and we believe it is, that the negative result was influenced by an awareness that its approval would inject a new philosophy of junior college capital financing and control (which goes with the purse-strings), and embark the State of California on a new financing program which, once established, could grow to tremendous proportions—even to the point of injuring the possibility of providing adequately for university and state college capital requirements.

Third, the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce believes that the Legislature should require that a study be made of the long-term budgetary impact of the state construction bond financing program on the State's financial responsibilities—and inform itself regarding it.

Consternation has frequently been voiced regarding the state budget because, with the passage of time, the portion subject to policy determination by the Legislature continues to shrink. May we point out that continuation of the present program of financing capital improvements from bond funds indefinitely can only aggravate this condition, because the State will, within a very few years, face the situation where annual bond maturity appropriations (not subject to policy determination) will equal or exceed the annual capital outlay program to be financed by bond sales—with the added frustration that interest payments (also

not subject to policy determination) will become a substantial and non-productive state expense This is a situation which must be FACED—AND SOLVED—on a current basis.

The Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce believes, as do the responsible public officials of California, that we cannot afford to have state institutions, the university, or the state colleges unable to handle the expanded numbers that must be accommodated, due to our growth in population It is important, in our opinion, in appealing for voter support, that the electorate of California be asked to approve only those projects that have been clearly justified as necessary to meet those needs, and that long-term borrowing should be proposed only for those projects which cannot be financed in any other way

The chamber hopes that these observations and suggestions will be of assistance to you in determining the form in which the state con-

struction bonds will be resubmitted to the electorate

#### State Park and Recreation Bonds

The Governor has suggested that the Legislature may be requested to resubmit the Park and Recreation Bond Program (Proposition No 5 on the June ballot) which was so decisively defeated.

The Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce urges that this proposal NOT be resubmitted—at least in the same form as that rejected by the voters

Our organization has a long record of supporting proper and fully justified development of public park and recreation areas. Our study of Proposition No 5 caused the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce to oppose the measure because of our conviction that the expenditure of funds in the manner set forth in the proposal (Senate Bill No 2, Chapter 24, 1962 First Extraordinary Session) could not be justified The increase in amount from the original \$100,000,000 recommended by the Governor to \$150,000,000 was not supported by appropriate study or indication of need It is our belief that lack of urgency provides ample time for a more thorough study of statewide needs than has been made available thus far to the people of California.

The Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce urges that this proposal be held for the 1963 General Session, at which time, we would hope, sufficient careful consideration can be devoted to this problem to develop a program which will deserve support Certainly, we feel that the electorate of California should not be faced with essentially the same proposal in November which it rejected in June-particularly on a ballot which is already heavily weighted with 22 state propositions, plus two initiative constitutional amendments

You may find the attached tabulation interesting. It should be borne in mind that resubmitted state bonds will face an uphill struggle, at best Every effort should be made to submit to the people proposals for essentials only.

#### Water-No. 4326

DEAR MR LOWREY You have asked us three questions relating to two recent actions brought by the Johnson Rancho County Water District and the Stone Corral Trugation District against the California Water Commission and the Yuba County Water Agency. These questions are set forth and considered separately below

#### Question No 1

What is the effect of the alternative writs of mandate and prohibition granted against the California Water Commission?

#### Opinion and Analysis No 1

It is our understanding that the following factual situation gave rise to the dispute in question.

The subject matter of the action here involved is two applications for permits, numbered 5631 and 5632, to appropriate unappropriated water of the State from the Yuba River. These applications were originally filed by the Department of Finance, a predecessor of the California Water Commission, and are each now held by the commission (see Pt. 2 (commencing with Sec 10500), Div. 6, Wat C.)

Under the provisions of Section 10504 of the Water Code, the Yuba County Water Agency has requested an assignment and the Johnson Rancho County Water District has requested a release from priority of these two applications from the California Water Commission.

The California Water Commission, and a subcommittee of the commission, have held hearings on this matter as required by Section 10504.1 of the Water Code. The subcommittee has filed its recommendations with the commission, but the commission itself has not made any decision or order with respect to the two competing agencies.

Prior to a decision upon this matter by the commission, the Johnson Rancho County Water District filed a petition for an alternative writ of mandate and for a writ of mandate or prohibition in the alternative in the Sacramento County Superior Court. The Stone Corral Irrigation District at the same time filed a petition for an alternative writ of prohibition and for a writ of prohibition in the Tulare County Superior Court. Each of these courts has granted the alternative writs requested, and has ordered the California Water Commission and the Yuba County Water Agency to desist and refrain from further proceedings in connection with the assignment of the applications in question or to show cause why this should not be done Hearings on these court orders have been set.

We think it is clear from the orders of the two courts granting the two writs that the California Water Commission is commanded to desist from granting, and the Yuba County Water Agency is commanded to desist from accepting, assignment of the applications in question, until further order by the court Thus, the effect upon the commission is that it still holds these applications pursuant to law (Sec. 10504, Wat C), and it cannot assign them to the Yuba County Water Agency, if at all, until the courts have acted upon this matter.

#### Question No 2

What will be the effect upon the request of the Yuba County Water Agency for the assignment of these applications from the California Water Commission of the petitioners are finally successful in their superior court actions for a writ of mandate or a writ of prohibition?

#### Opinion and Analysis No 2

If the superior court should enter final judgment commanding the California Water Commission to refrain from assigning the applications to the Yuba County Water Agency, it would appear that the situation would revert to the status quo In other words, the applications would still be held by the commission for the purposes specified by law. The commission could then release from priority or assign the applications, pursuant to Section 10504 of the Water Code, to agencies other than the Yuba County Water Agency.

It should be noted, however, that the judgment of the court may order reconsideration of the case and order the respondent to take further action on the case (see Sec. 1094.5, subd. (e), C.C.P.), or the case may be appealed to a higher court by either party (see Sec. 1094.5,

subd. (f), C.C.P.). The result of such an order or an appeal is highly conjectural and therefore we offer no opinion on these matters.

Question No 3

If a writ of mandate or a writ of prohibition is finally granted prohibiting the California Water Commission from granting the applications in question to the Yuba County Water Agency, what effect would such a prohibition have upon other water projects in Northern California, including the Oroville Dam and the State Water Plan?

#### Opinion and Analysis No 3

The actions in question involve only the applications sought by the Yuba County Water Agency and thus any writs finally granted would not directly affect any other water projects However, as mentioned in our answer to your previous question, the final granting of a writ of mandate or a writ of prohibition would result in the applications in question being available for assignment or release from priority to agencies other than the Yuba County Water Agency. To this extent, then, the final granting of such a writ might affect other water projects in Northern California.

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#### TEXT OF AND VOTE ON SENATE BILL TO BE SUBMITTED TO A VOTE OF THE ELECTORS

The text of the following Senate bill, which has passed both houses of the Legislature, which has been approved by the Governor, and portions of which will be submitted to a vote of the electors, is hereby entered in the Journal, together with the year and mays thereon:

#### Senate Bill No 3

An act to provide for meeting the building needs of the State by providing the funds necessary therefor through the issuance and sale of bords of the State of California, and by providing for the handling and disposition of sald funds, and making an appropriation therefor, and providing for the submission of the measure to the people at a special election to be consolidated with the 1962 general election

[Approved by the Governor July 12, 1962 Filed with the Secretary of State July 12, 1962, Chapter 2 ]

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

Section 1 The purpose of this act is to provide the necessary funds to meet the building construction, equipment and site acquisition needs for California State Colleges, public junior colleges, the University of California, facilities for the mentally ill and retarded, narcotics control and correctional institutions, conservation camps, and forestry fire-fighting facilities. The bond proceeds shall be used only for the purposes specified by this section. Not less than eighty percent (80%) of the total amount of bonds authorized to be issued under this act shall be used. for the building construction, equipment and site acquisition needs of the California State Colleges, public junior colleges, and the University of California At least twenty million dollars (\$20,000,000) of the bonds authorized to be issued under this act shall be used only for building construction, equipment and site acquisition

this act shall be used only for brilding construction, equipment and site acquisition for public junior colleges

Szo 2. Bonds in the total amount of two hundred seventy million dollars (\$270.000,000), or so much thereof as is necessary, may be issued and sold to provide a fund to be used for carrying out the purposes expressed in Section 1 of this act Said bonds shall be known and designated as State Construction Program bonds and, when sold, shall be and constitute a valid and binding obligation of the State of California, and the full faith and coedit of the State of California are benely pledged for the punctual payment of both principal and interest on said bonds as said principal and interest become due and payable

SEC 3. There shall be collected each year and in the same manner and at the same time as other state revenues of the State as shall be collected, such sum in addition to the ordinary revenues of the State as shall be required to pay the principal and interest on said

revenues of the State as shall be required to pay the principal and interest on said bonds maturing in said year, and it is hereby made the duty of all officers charged

bonds maturing in said vent, and it is hereby made the duty of all officers charged by law with any duty in regard to the collection of said revenue to do and perform each and every act which shall be necessary to collect such additional sum SEC 4 There is hereby appropriated from the General Fund in the State Treasury for the purpose of this act, such an amount as will equal the following:

(a) Such sum annually as will be necessary to pay the principal and interest on bonds issued and sold pursuant to the provisions of this act, as said principal and interest become due and harable

(b) The sum of seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000) to be used as a revolving fund to pay the expenses incurred by the State Treasurer in preparing and advergences incurred by the State Construction Program Committee pursuant to Government Code Section 18765, and for the parament of legal services upon approval of the State Board of Control, pursuant to Government Code Section 18760

(c) Such sum as is necessary to carry out the provisions of Section 7 of this act, which sum is appropriated without regard to fiscal years

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SEC. 5 The proceeds of bonds issued and sold pursuant to this act, together with interest earned thereon, if any, shall be deposited in the State Construction Program Fund The money in the fund derived from the sale of bonds authorized by this act may be expended only for the purposes specified in this act and only pursuant to appropriation heretofore or hereafter made by the Legislature in the manner hereinafter preseribed

SEC 6. A section shall be included in the Budget Bill for each fiscal year bearing the caption State Construction Bond Act Program Said section shall contain proposed appropriations for the program contemplated by this act No funds derived from the bonds authorized by this act nav be expended pursuant to an appropriation unless the appropriation is contained in said section of the Budget Act of 1962 or in said section of any subsequent budget act. For this purpose this act may be cited as the State Construction Program Bond Act of 1962 The

this act may be cited as the State Construction Program Bond Act of 1962 The Department of Finance, which is bereby designated as the board for the purposes of this act, shall annually total the Budget Act appropriations referred to in this section and, pursuant to Section 16730 of the Government Code, request the State Construction Program Committee to cause bonds to be issued and sold in quantities sufficient to carry out the projects for which such appropriations were made SEC 7 For the purposes of carrying out the provisions of this act the Director of Finance may by executive order authorize the withdrawal from the General Fund of an amount or amounts not to exceed the amount of the unsold bonds which have been authorized to be sold for the purpose of carrying out this act. Any amounts withdrawn shall be deposited in the State Construction Program Fund. Any moneys made available under this section to the board shall be returned by the board to the General Fund from moneys received from the sale of bonds sold for the purpose of carrying out this act, logether with interest at the rate of interest fixed in the bonds so sold.

SEC 8 The bonds authorized by this act shall be prepared, executed, issued,

SEC 15 The special election provided for in this act shall be proclaimed, held, conducted, the hallots shall be prepared, marked, collected, counted and canvassed and the results shall be ascertained and the returns thereof made in all respects in accordance with the provisions of the Constitution applicable thereto and the law governing general elections insofan as provisions thereof are applicable to the election provided for in this act; provided, however, that the Governor need not issue his election proclamation until 30 days before the election.

SEC 16 All ballots at said election shall have printed thereon in bold face type and in a square thereof, the words: "For bonds to provide state college, junior college and university facilities; to provide facilities to care for mentally retarded and mentally ill and to provide narcotics control, correctional and forest fire-fighting facilities? In the square immediately below the square containing such words there shall be printed on said ballot in bold face type the words: "Against bonds to envolved state college, junior college and university facilities; to provide facilities to care for mentally retarded and mentally ill and to provide narcotics control, correctional and forest fire-fighting facilities?" In each square containing the language specified above, immediately below that language and enclosed in parentheses, there shall be printed, in 8-point type, the words: "This act provides for a bond issue of two hundred seventy million dollars (\$270,000,000). Eighty percent (80%) of the total amount of the bond issue will be used for the building construction, equipment and site acquisition needs for the California State Colleges, the public junior c ment and site acquisition needs for the California State Colleges, the public junior colleges and the University of California. Opposite the words: "For bonds to provide state college, junior college and university facilities; to provide facilities to care for mentully retarded and mentally ill and to provide narcotics control, correctional and forest fire-fighting facilities," and the language immediately following such statement, and "Against bonds to provide state college, junior college and university facilities; to provide facilities to care for mentally retarded and mentally ill and to provide narcotics control, correctional and forest fire-fighting facilities," and the language immediately following such statement, there shall be left spaces in which the voters may place a cross in the manner required by law to indicate whether they vote for or against said act. Those voting for said bonds shall do so by placing a cross opposite the words: "For bonds to provide state college, junior college and university facilities; to provide facilities to care for mentally retarded and mentally ill and to provide narcotics control, correctional and forest fire-fighting facilities; to provide facilities to care for mentally needed and enertally ill and to provide narcotics control, correctional and forest fire-fighting facilities; to provide facilities for care for mentally retarded and mentally ill and to provide narcotics control, correctional and forest fire-fighting facilities," provided that where the voting of said election is done by means of voting machines used pursuant to law in such manner as to carry out the intent of this section, the use of such voting machines and the expression of the voters' choice by means thereof, shall be deemed to comply with the provisions of this section. The measure shall appear on the ballot and in the ballot pamphlets in substantially the following form:
