PERMANENT STANDING RULES OF THE ASSEMBLY FOR THE 1962 REGULAR (BUDGET) SESSION

SECTION 1

LEGISLATIVE ORGANIZATION

Assembly General Officers

1 The general officers of the Assembly whose names and titles shall appear on the frontispiece of all publications are

Speaker

Speaker pro Tempore Majority Floor Leader Minority Floor Leader Chief Clerk

Assignment of Desks to Members

2 Members shall be assigned to offices and desks by the Committee on Rules, and, as far as possible, the committee shall conform to the requests of members, giving due consideration to their seniority in point of service in the Assembly

Hours of Meeting

3 The session of Assembly shall be daily, beginning at 10 o'clock am (Sundays excepted), unless otherwise ordered by a majority vote of the members present

RULES

Adoption of Standing Rules

4 The adoption of the Standing Rules shall require an affirmative recorded vote of a majority of the entire elected membership When once adopted, such Standing Rules shall remain in effect, unless suspended or amended as provided in these Rules

Suspension of Rules

5 Any standing rule of the Assembly may be suspended temporarily by a vote of two-thirds of the members present, provided, that such temporary suspension shall apply only to the matter under immediate consideration, and in no case shall it extend beyond an adjournment

Amending Standing Rules

6 No standing rule of the Assembly shall be amended except by resolution adopted by an affirmative recorded vote of a majority of the entire elected membership of the Assembly

No such resolution shall be considered until it shall have been referred to the Committee on Rules

Temporary Rules

7. The Committee on Rules may at any time report a temporary rule Upon adoption by an affirmative recorded vote of two-thirds of the entire elected membership of the Assembly, such temporary rule shall have the effect, for the time being, of a standing rule If such temporary rule shall be in conflict with a standing rule, it shall supersede such standing rule only for the time being

Parliamentary Rules

8. In all cases not provided for by the Constitution, by the Assembly Rules, or by the Joint Rules of the Senate and Assembly, the authority shall be Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedure

Effect of Adoption of These Rules

9 The adoption of the Standing Rules of a budget session shall not be construed as modifying or rescinding the permanent Standing Rules of the Assembly for the preceding general session, nor as affecting in any way the status or powers of the interim committees created by those Rules.

Committee on Rules

10 There is a Committee on Rules, which shall act as the executive committee of the House The committee shall consist of one member appointed by the Speaker, who shall be the chairman and six other members, three of whom shall be members of the minority party and

three of whom shall be members of the majority party. The chairman of each minority and majority party caucus shall within twenty-four (24) hours after the operative date of this rule, convene the party caucus of which he is chairman and provide the members thereof with ballots showing the names of the members. The members of each party caucus shall thereupon by secret ballot indicate their preference for three to be members of the Rules Committee and shall continue to ballot until three names shall have received a majority of the votes of the total number of members of the party Following the balloting by the party caucus the chairman thereof shall file with the Chief Clerk a list of three nominees for membership on the Committee on Rules Upon the filing of each such list, the Speaker shall immediately present the name of each nominee to the Assembly for its approval or rejection in the order filed If approved by a majority of the elected membership of the Assembly, the nominee shall be declared elected as a member of the committee If a nominee shall fail to receive such approval, the committee membership to which he would have been elected shall remain vacant until the chairman of his party caucus shall have filed the name of another nominee for the position which shall be the name of a member of the party caucus and selected by ballot in the same manner as the names of those previously presented and that such person shall be the nominee who shall be thereafter approved by a majority of the elected membership of the Assembly Vacancies in the elected membership of the Committee on Rules occurring during any session of the Legislature shall be filled by election as herein provided, and such vacancies occurring after final adjournment and before the convening of the next session of the Legislature shall be filled temporarily, and until such convening, by the remaining committee members who are members of the same party as that of the member causing the vacancy. Vacancies in the appointive membership shall be filled by the Speaker Four duly qualified members of the committee shall constitute a quorum No member of the Committee on Rules is eligible to serve as the chairman of a standing committee.

Powers of the Committee on Rules

11 The Committee on Rules provided herein shall have the following powers:

To appoint all attaches and employees of the Assembly not otherwise provided for by statute It shall have authority to suspend, with or without pay, any such attache or employee for incompetency or dereliction of duty, pending flual action by the Assembly

To make studies and recommendations designed to promote, improve, and expedite the business and procedure of the Assembly and of the committees thereof, and to propose any amendments to the Rules deemed necessary to accomplish such purposes

Rules and Regulations Governing Committees

12 All claims for expenses incurred by interim investigating committees of the Assembly shall be approved by the Committee on Rules, or its authorized representative, before such claims are presented to the controller

All proposed expenditures, other than expenditures of the funds of an interim investigating committee, shall be approved by the Committee on Rules or its authorized representative before such expenses are meurred, unless such expenditure is specifically exempted from the provisions of this rule by the resolution authorizing it

No warrant shall be drawn in payment of any claim for expenses until the approval of the Committee on Rules, or its authorized representative, has been obtained in accordance with the provisions of this rule.

The Committee on Rules shall provide for the payment of mileage to Members of the Assembly for travel incurred in connection with legislative committee business not chargeable under Joint Rule No 36 to the funds allocated to a specific committee Such mileage shall be paid from the Contingent Fund of the Assembly upon certification of claims therefor to the Controller by the Committee on Rules or its authorized representative The Committee on Rules shall adopt rules and regulations limiting the amount, time and place of such mileage

The Committee on Rules shall adopt rules and regulations governing the letting of any contract by an interim investigating committee and shall also adopt rules and regulations limiting the amount, time, and place of expenses and allowances, exclusive of salaries under three hundred dollars (\$300) per month, to be paid to employees of Assembly interim investigating committees or other Assembly committees.

Such rules may provide for allowances to committee employees in lieu of actual expenses for nuleage, hotel accommodations, and meals at the rates fixed by the committee from time to time in limitation of reimbur-sement of actual expenses of committee employees generally, or at such lesser rate as may be prescribed by the employing committee

Mileage is an allowance to a committee employee in heu of actual expenses of travel. When travel is by private conveyance mileage shall be allowed only to the operator of, and not to passengers in, a private vehicle Claims for mileage by private conveyance must be accompanied by the license number of the vehicle and the names of state officers and employees riding as passengers.

Copies of all rules and regulations adopted pursuant to this rule shall be distributed to the charman of every such investigating committee and of any other Assembly committee that has employees

Interim Committee Reports

13 The chairman of each Assembly interim committee shall submit in the letter of transmittal of the final report the total expenses of the committee, including the amount expended for expenses of the members, the number of hearings held, the name of, and amount paid to, each consultant, the name of, and amount paid to, each committee employee, and the amount expended for other goods and services, in the form prescribed by the Committee on Rules

Employees of Committees

14 Every applicant for employment by any committee of the Assembly or by a subcommittee of any such committee, shall prepare a formal application for such employment on forms prescribed by the Assembly Committee on Rules The application shall include a statement of his present employment, his employment during the preceding two years, and such other pertinent information as the committees

require The application shall be certified under penalty of perjury, and any willful false statement or omission of a material fact shall be punishable as perjury. If the application discloses any fact that indicates that the applicant has a personal interest that would conflict with the faithful performance of his duties, the applicant shall not be employed. All applications shall be retained in the records of the committee.

An employee of any committee of the Assembly or of a subcommittee of any such committee, shall not engage in any employment, activity, or enterprise which has been determined to be meanistent, incompatible, or in conflict with his duties as such employee or with the duties, functions, or responsibilities of the committee or subcommittee by which he is employed. Each such employee shall immediately report in writing to the chairman of the committee or subcommittee by which he is employed, any other employment, activity, or enterprise he engages in while so employed, and shall transmit a copy of such report to the Assembly Rules Committee.

Assembly Contingent Fund

15 The Assembly Committee on Rules is the committee provided for in Section 9127 of the Government Code. The balance of all money in the Assembly Contingent Fund, including money now or hereafter appropriated, except such sums as are specifically made available for the expense of designated interim committees or for other purposes, is hereby made available to the Assembly Committee on Rules for any charges or claims it may incur in carrying out the duties imposed upon it by these rules or by Assembly or joint resolution. The money made available by this rule includes the unencumbered balances of all sums heretofore made available to any Assembly or joint interim committee by the Assembly, upon the expiration of such committee, and shall be expended as provided in these rules.

Interim Committee on Rules

16 The Committee on Rules shall continue in existence during any recess of the Legislature and after final adjournment and until the convening of the next regular general session and shall have the same powers and duties as while the Assembly is in session. In dealing with any matter within its jurisdiction the committee and its members shall have and exercise all of the rights, duties and powers conferred upon investigating committees and their members by the Joint Rules of the Senate and Assembly as they are adopted and amended from time to time, which provisions are incorporated herein and made applicable to the Committee on Rules and its members.

Powers of the Committee on Rules

- 17 Both during sessions, and after final adjournment and until the convening of the next regular general session, the Committee on Rules has the following additional powers and duties:
- (a) To contract with such other agencies, public or private, as it deems necessary for the rendition and affording of such services, facilities, studies and reports to the committee as will best assist it to carry out the purposes for which it is created

- (b) To co-operate with and secure the co-operation of county, city, city and county, and other local law enforcement agencies in investigating any matter within the scope of this resolution and to direct the sheriff of any county to serve subpoenas, orders and other process issued by the committee
- (c) To report its findings and recommendations to the Legislature and to the people from time to time and at any time, not later than herein provided
- herein provided
 (d) To do any and all other things necessary or convenient to enable
 it fully and adequately to exercise its powers, perform its duties, and
 accomplish the objects and purposes of this resolution
- (e) To make available to the Assembly, or to any Assembly or joint committee, or to any Member of the Assembly such assistance in connection with the duties of the committee or other legislative matters as the personnel under direction of the committee or its other facilities negative.
- (f) To make available to and furnish to the Assembly, and to Assembly investigating committees created at this session and to each of the members thereof such clerical, secretarial and stenographic help as may be reasonably necessary for the Assembly to carry out its work, and for such committees and each of the members thereof to make and carry on the studies and investigations required by or of them by the resolutions creating such committees, and for such purposes to employ such additional stenographic and secretarial assistants as may be necessary, assign, re-assign and discharge such assistants and prescribe amounts, times and methods of payment of their compensation.
- (g) To meur and pay such expenses of the Assembly not otherwise provided for as the committee determines are reasonably necessary including the repair, alteration, improvement, and equipping of the Assembly Chamber and the offices provided for the Assembly in the State Capitol and the Capitol Annex

Committee on Engrossment and Enrollment

- 18 There is a Committee on Engrossment and Enrollment It shall be the duty of the committee (a) To compare all bills, ordered or considered engrossed by the Assembly, with the engrossed copies thereof, and, before they pass out of the possession of the Assembly, see that the engrossed bill is a true copy of the original, with such amendments as may have been made thereto, and said committee shall see that all engrossed bills are reported back in the order in which they were ordered engrossed. The report of the committee shall be in order at any time.
- (b) To assist the Speaker, upon his request, in recommending the reference of bills to the appropriate standing committee

Standing Committees

- 19 Twenty-six standing committees of the Assembly are hereby created, upon the several subjects, and numbered respectively, as follows.

Membership of Standing Committees

20 Prior to the assignment of members to serve on the several standing committees, the Speaker shall consider the preferences of the members with regard to committee assignments, while keeping in view the practical necessity of making assignments so that members will not serve on more than one committee which meets at the same time, and the Speaker thereafter shall determine the number and members to serve on each standing committee, except the Committee on Rules which is hereinabove provided for Upon publication in the Journal of the number of members on each standing committee, no further change in the number of members of the committee shall be made otherwise than by a majority vote of the elected membership of the Assembly.

No Member of the Assembly shall be a member of more than three standing committees except that upon appointment by the Speaker or the approval of the House a member may serve on five committees

Creation of Interim Committees

21 A vote of a majority of the entire elected membership is necessary in order to constitute any standing committee an interim committee; and a vote of two-thirds of the elected membership is necessary in order to create any other interim or investigating committee

Special Assembly Committee on Legislative Representation

22 In addition to any other committee provided for by these Rules, there shall be a committee to be known as and called the Special Assembly Committee on Legislative Representation, which is hereby declared to be a continuing body authorized to act both during and between sessions of the Legislature

The committee shall have the rights, powers and duties prescribed in Section 9909 of the Government Code, specifically including but not limited to the authority to grant certificates of registration as legislative

advocates, and all the rights and powers of legislative investigating committees as provided by the Joint Rules of the Senate and Assembly.

The committee shall study and analyze all facts relating to legislative representation and the regulation thereof, and shall report thereon to the Legislature at each general session and from time to time as the committee deems necessary, including in the reports its recommendations for appropriate legislation

The committee shall consist of seven Members of the Assembly appointed by the Speaker thereof at each general session of the Legislature The chairman shall be appointed by the Speaker

Any vacancy occurring between general sessions shall be filled by the Speaker and the members appointed shall hold over until their successors are legally selected

The committee is specifically authorized to appoint the Legislative Analyst as executive secretary of this committee to act without compensation

Filling Interim Period Assembly Office Vacancy

22.5 In the event a vacancy in any office, except Speaker, elected by the membership of the Assembly occurs during the interim period between sessions, the Committee on Rules shall fill the office until the convening of the next session of the Legislature. If a vacancy occurs in the office of Speaker during the interim period between sessions, the Committee on Rules shall notify the membership within 15 days from the time the vacancy occurs and shall call a caucus of the membership of the Assembly for the purpose of filling the vacancy. This caucus shall be held at the State Capitol within 30 days from the time the vacancy occurs. Notice of the caucus shall be in writing and shall be mailed not less than 10 days prior to the meeting of the caucus If the Committee on Rules fails to act within 15 days from the time the vacancy in the office of Speaker occurs, the Chief Clerk of the Assembly shall act in its place following the procedure set forth in this rule Any person selected to fill any vacancy pursuant to this rule shall hold the office until the convening of the next session of the Legislature

Vote and Procedure Required Under Rule 22.5

22.6 The vote required for the selection, pursuant to Rule 22.5, by the Assembly caucus of a person to fill a vacancy, as prescribed by said rule, shall be a majority of the entire elected membership of the Assembly. The procedure for selecting the Speaker at the caucus shall be the same as the procedure required for the election of the Speaker at a regular session.

SECTION 2 HOUSE FUNCTIONS

Duties of Assembly Officers

Duties of the Speaker

- 23 The Speaker shall possess the powers and perform the duties prescribed
- (a) To preserve order and decorum, he may speak to points of order in preference to the other members, rising from his chair for that purpose

- (b) To decide all questions of order subject to appeal to the Assembly by any member. On every appeal, he shall have the right to assign his reason for his decision
- (e) To have general direction over the Assembly Chamber and rooms set aside for the use of the Assembly, including the rooms for use by members as private offices
- (d) To name any member to perform the duties of the Speaker, but such substitutions shall not extend be ond adjournment
- (e) To appoint the membership of all standing and special committees, and their respective chairmen and vice chairmen
 - (f) To establish a schedule of meetings of standing committees
- (g) To have general control and direction over the Journals, papers, and bills of the Assembly
 - (h) To act as Chairman of the Committee of the Whole
- (1) To order the Lobby and Gallery cleared whenever he shall deem it necessary
- (1) To assign desks to properly accredited newspaper representatives
- (k) To authenticate by his signature, when necessary, or when required by law, all bills, memorials, resolutions, orders, proceedings, writs, warrants, and subpoenas issued by order of the Assembly
- (1) The Speaker shall be ex officio member of all Assembly, joint, and interim committees with all of the right and privileges of such membership, except the right to vote In counting a quorum of any such committees, the Speaker shall not be counted as a member.
- (m) The Speaker shall, at each general session, appoint a Member of the Assembly to serve on the Judicial Council and shall have the authority in the interim between general sessions to fill any vacancy in such position that occurs during such interim

Funerals and Other Ceremonies and Events

24 The Speaker may designate any one or more of the Members of the Assembly as the representatives of the Assembly to attend funerals and other ceremonies and events in appropriate circumstances. The members so designated shall receive their actual and necessary expenses incurred in the performance of their duties or, in lieu of such expenses, the same allowance for accommodations, meals, and indeage as is provided by the Joint Rules for members of investigating committees

The Speaker or any Member of the Assembly designated by him may incur such expenses as may be necessary for the purchase on behalf of the Assembly of suitable floral pieces at any such funetal or at any other such ceremony or event at which the offering of a floral tribute is appropriate.

Upon the death of a Member of the Assembly, the Speaker or any Member of the Assembly designated by him shall meur such expenses as may be necessary for the purchase on behalf of the Assembly of a Bear Flag for use in connection with the funeral and burial of said member, which flag shall be presented to the family of said member

The Speaker or any Member of the Assembly designated by him may incur such expenses, not exceeding \$5,000 per fiscal year, as may be necessary on behalf of the Assembly in connection with ceremonies and

other events which are attended by the Speaker or by a Member of the Assembly pursuant to the Speaker's request This paragraph does not include expenses for which a member is entitled to reimbursement under Joint Rules 35 or 36, or which are proscribed by Sections 2 or 23b. Article IV of the Constitution "Expenses" as used in this paragraph constitute expenses of the Assembly within the meaning of Rule 130

All expenses incurred pursuant to this rule, after approval by the Speaker, are hereby ordered to be paid out of the money allocated from the Contingent Fund of the Assembly to the Assembly Committee on Rules and disbursed, after certification by the chairman of the committee, upon warrants drawn by the State Controller upon the State Treasurer

Duties of the Speaker pro Tempore

25 The Speaker pro Tempore shall have the powers and perform the duties of the Speaker during his absence He shall, ex officio, be a member of the Committee on Rules with all of the rights and privileges of such membership except the right to vote

Majority Floor Leader

26 The Speaker, after consultation with the members of his supporting majority, shall appoint one member to be his personal representative on the floor of the Assembly, who shall be known as the Majority Floor Leader

It shall be his duty to manage the daily file and to participate in the various debates by making such motions, points of order, or other arrangements as may be necessary to expedite the proceedings of the Assembly and he shall be responsible for the presentation of all matters which relate to the order of business, and to the promotion of harmony among the membership

The Majority Floor Leader shall be ex officio a member of the Committee on Rules with all the rights and privileges of such membership except the right to vote.

In the event of the absence or mability of the Speaker pro Tempore, for any reason or at any time, to perform the duties of his office, the Majority Floor Leader shall assume and perform such of those duties as may be required to conduct the business of the Assembly.

Minority Floor Leader

27 The minority if any, or any organized segment of the membership may, through caucus or other means, designate a member to act as floor leader for it When so acting he may be referred to as Minority Floor Leader.

The Minority Floor Leader shall be ex officio a member of the Committee on Rules with all rights and privileges of such membership except the right to vote.

Duties of the Chief Clerk

- 28 The duties of the Chief Clerk shall be as follows.
- (a) To have charge of and supervise all clerical business and printing of the Assembly
- (b) To see that the Journals, other publications, and records of the Assembly are properly kept.

- (e) To refuse to permit any records or papers to be taken from the desk or out of his custody, except upon duly signed receipts from persons authorized.
- (d) To read or allow his assistants to read from the desk only such matters as the Speaker of the Assembly shall direct.
- (e) To have general supervision over all clerks, attaches, and employees, and to be responsible for their official acts and their performance of and regular attendance upon their duties
- (f) To suspend temporarily any clerk, attache, or employee for incompetency or dereliction of duty, pending action by the Committee on Rules
- (g) To perform all other duties pertaining to his office as prescribed by law or Assembly rule
- (h) Before the commencement of any regular session of the Legislature the Chief Clerk of the Assembly shall mail to each member a blank form on which the member may indicate his committee preferences Accompanying such blank shall be mailed a stamped envelope addressed to the Chief Clerk of the Assembly for returning such form After their receipt, all such communications shall be delivered to the Chairman of the Interim Committee on Legislative Organization, if such a committee has been created, who shall deliver them to the Speaker immediately upon the organization of the Assembly.
 - (1) To certify to the Controller, pay rolls of members and attaches.
- (j) To certify all requisitions upon the Controller for the payment of bills incurred by the Assembly
- (k) To order and sign for all documents and printing, subject to approval by the Speaker or a person designated by the Speaker

Correction of Amendments

29 The Chief Clerk may, with prior approval of the Speaker, make technical changes in amendments to bills and measures, adopted by the Assembly Technical changes are limited to those correcting spelling and punctuation and those necessary in order that the amendments fit the last form of the bill or measure

Registration of Legislative Advocates

30 Pursuant to subdivision (d) of Section 9900, Government Code, as amended, the Legislative Analyst is hereby designated as the person embraced by the definition of "Clerk" set forth in that section.

Duties of the Sergeant at Arms

- 31 The duties of the Sergeant at Arms shall be as follows.
- (a) To attend the Assembly during its session, preserve order, announce all official messengers, and serve all processes issued by authority of the Assembly and directed by the Speaker, he shall receive his actual expenses for himself or for an assistant when executing any such processes
- (b) To see that no person is admitted to the Assembly Chamber except in accordance with the provisions of these Rules
- (c) To have general supervision over the Assistant Sergeants at Arms and be responsible for their official acts and their performance of and regular attendance upon their duties

- (d) To suspend temporarily any Assistant Sergeant at Arms for incompetency or dereliction of duty, pending action by the Committee on Rules
 - (e) To execute all commands of the Speaker
- (f) To perform all other duties pertaining to his office as prescribed by law or Assembly rule.

Duties of the Chief Assistant Sergeant at Arms

32 The Chief Assistant Sergeant at Arms shall have the powers and perform the duties of the Sergeant at Arms during his absence

Printing

Authority for Printing

33 The State Printer shall not charge any printing or other work to the Assembly other than provided by law or Assembly rule, except upon a written order signed by the Chief Clerk of the Assembly and countersigned by the Speaker or a person designated by the Speaker, and delivered to him prior to beginning such printing or work All invoices for printing furnished the Assembly shall be itemized and rendered by the State Printer within 30 days after completion of said printing. When necessary, the Chief Clerk may order certain printed matter completed in advance of its regular order by the issuance of a rush order.

Printing Style, Form and Amount to Be Printed

34 Unless otherwise restricted by law or by Assembly rule, the style and form of all printing, the quality of paper to be used, the number of copies to be printed of each order, and the number of copies to be delivered to each member shall be decided by the Chief Clerk and approved by the Speaker or a person designated by the Speaker All requests by members for additional copies of bills, documents, or other printed matter shall be referred to the Committee on Rules

Printing Assembly History

35 The Chief Clerk shall cause to be compiled and printed a Legislative Handbook as soon as practicable after the commencement of the session

During the session, the Chief Clerk shall cause to be printed and placed upon each member's desk prior to convening on Tuesday of each week a complete History showing all actions taken upon each measure up to and including the legislative day preceding its issuance. For each legislative day intervening between the issuance of such Weekly History, there shall be printed a Daily Supplemental History showing only actions taken upon any measure since the issuance of the preceding Weekly History

Publication of Names of Guests of Assembly

36 The Chief Clerk shall cause to be printed a suitable publication containing the names of the guests extended the courtesies of the Assembly when, in his judgment, such a publication is advisable. A copy of each publication so printed during the session shall be filed with the Secretary of State and made a part of the Appendix to the final approved Journal for the session.

Printing of Maps

37 Maps or charts accompanying documents other than bills shall not be printed without special authority from the Assembly by a majority vote of its entire elected membership

Miscellaneous

Admission to Assembly Chamber

38 Persons admitted to the Assembly Chamber, other than members and attaches, shall not be permitted to stand in the lobby in the rear of the Assembly Chamber while the Assembly is in session, but shall be required to occupy the seats provided for them

Use of Assembly Chamber

39 The Assembly Chamber shall not be used for any public or private business other than legislative matters during the sessions of the Legislature, except by consent of a majority of the entire elected membership of the Assembly

Persons Admitted to Floor of the Assembly

40 No person other than members, officers, attaches, employees of the Legislature, former Members of the Legislature, and accredited members of the press shall be admitted to the floor of the Assembly during any session of the Assembly, provided, that a guest of any member shall be admitted upon presentation of a guest card of said member countersigned by the Speaker, such guest card being valid only on the legislative day for which it was issued. No person required to register pursuant to Section 9906 of the Government Code shall, under any circumstances be admitted to the Assembly Chamber while the Assembly is in session.

All guests shall be seated only in the chairs in the back of the rail in the rear of the Assembly Chamber and shall not be permitted to sit at the desks of the members nor stand in the rear of the Chamber while the Assembly is in session. No person other than an accredited newspaper representative shall be permitted to sit at the press desks. A special section in the baleony shall be reserved for those holding guest cards. Neither any person mentioned in this rule nor any other person shall engage in influencing the passage or defeat of legislation in the Assembly Chamber; provided, that this sentence is not applicable to Members of the Legislature.

Smoking in Assembly Chamber

41 Smoking may be prohibited temporarily during any session of Assembly by a majority vote of the members present

Fees for Witnesses

42 Each witness summoned to appear before the Assembly or any of its committees shall receive the sum of ten dollars (\$10) for each day such witness shall be required to appear, and the sum of five and one-half cents (\$0.05!) for each mile he shall travel in coming to and going from the place of examination

No witness shall be entitled to his fee or mileage until after his appearance before such a committee

Press Privileges

18

43 Newspaper correspondents desiring Assembly press cards and privileges shall make written application to the Speaker The Assembly by a majority vote of the members present may revoke any press card

The Speaker shall assign the Assembly press desks to accredited newspaper representatives authenticated by the Standing Committee of the Capitol Correspondents' Association, also the necessary rooms for the exclusive use of such accredited press representatives

Press Photographers

44 Press photographers shall be authorized to take photographs at meetings of Assembly committees subject to the following conditions.

1 The authorization given by this rule shall apply only to photographers from or employed by accredited newspapers or wire services, and newsreel or television photographers

2 The authorization shall extend to all Assembly standing committees and subcommittees thereof, but shall not extend to executive meetings of such committees and subcommittees

3 The charman of the committee concerned shall be notified either orally or in writing, at any time prior to the committee meeting that a press photographer will be present

4 To the extent practical, flash cameras shall not be used

5 Photographs shall be taken in an orderly and expeditious manner so as to cause the least possible inconvenience to the committee

Legislative Reference Service

445 In addition to the powers and duties otherwise vested in it, the Assembly Committee on Rules has the powers and duties vested in it by this rule The Assembly Committee on Rules shall supervise the operation of a Legislative Reference Service. The Legislative Reference Service, subject to the supervision of the Assembly Committee on Rules, shall perform the following functions:

(a) Secure for or make available to the Assembly, its commutees, and Members of the Assembly, studies, reports, and any information necessary or useful to the Assembly, its committees, or members

- (b) Conduct research or assist in conducting research to compile or acquire for the Assembly, its committees and members, studies, reports, and any information necessary or useful to the members in performing their services to the State If the research requested would extend over a long period of time or would require the use of specialized personnel not available to the director, it shall refer the legislator or committee requesting the research to appropriate public or private research agencies
- (c) Maintain a current record of all research projects being conducted pursuant to the direction or request of the Assembly or by any committee thereof and a file of research projects being undertaken by other public and private research agencies on topics which are under study by the Legislature
- (d) Upon request, furnish information and advice to the Assembly Committee on Rules concerning legislative research needs and the merits of specific research projects.

The Legislative Reference Service shall render the services as provided in this rule to an Assembly committee or to a Member of the Assembly upon request, but shall not perform the functions assigned by law or by the rules of the Legislature to the Legislative Counsel, the Legislative Analyst or the Auditor General

All requests and all information relating thereto given to the Legislative Reference Service by any legislator or committee shall be kept confidential and shall not be revealed to others without the consent of

the member or committee making the request,

Every Assembly committee, upon the conclusion of its work or at the end of each legislative session in the case of standing committees, shall deliver to the Legislative Reference Service for use and custody, available to the Members of the Assembly, all documents, data, reports, and other materials that have come into the possession of such committee and which are not included within the final report of such committee to the Assembly

The Assembly Committee on Rules shall report to the Assembly at the commencement of each regular session, including therein a review and evaluation of the activities of the Legislative Reference Service

The Assembly Committee on Rules is authorized to expend a sum not to exceed twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) annually out of the Assembly Contingent Fund for expenses of the Legislative Reference Service established pursuant to this rule.

SECTION 3 LEGISLATIVE PROCEDURE

Speaker to Call Assembly to Order

45 The Speaker, or in his absence, the Speaker pro Tempore, shall, at the hour appointed for meeting, call the Assembly to order. In the absence of both the Speaker and the Speaker pro Tempore, the Majority Floor Leader shall call the Assembly to order, and shall preside until the return of the Speaker or Speaker pro Tempore.

Roll Call and Quorum

46. Before proceeding with the business of the Assembly, the roll of the members shall be called, and the names of those present shall be entered in the Journal A majority of all the members elected to the Assembly shall constitute a quorum

Order of Business

- 47 The order of business of the Assembly shall be as follows:

- 2 Prayer by the Chaplain
- 3 Reading of the Previous Day's Journal
- 4 Presentation of Petitions
- 5 Introduction and Reference of Bills
- 6 Reports of Committees
 - Second Reading of Bills
- 8 Messages from the Governor
- 9 Messages from the Senate
- 10 Motions and Resolutions 11 Business on the Daily File
- 12 Announcements
- 13 Adjournment

Bills Defined

Pledging Allegiance to the Flag

48 On each Monday morning during the session, following the prayer by the Chaplain, the Members of the Assembly and its officers, attaches, and employees present in the Assembly Chamber shall pledge their allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America. The Speaker shall, on various other occasions with special reference to days of patriotic significance, invite the Members of the Assembly and its officers, attaches, employees, and guests present in the Assembly Chamber to join in the pledge of allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America.

Reading, Correcting and Approving Journals

49 a The reading of the Journal of the previous day may be dispensed with on motion by a majority of the members present

b. All Journals of the Assembly shall be corrected by the Mimite Clerk and delivered by him to the Chief Clerk within seven calendar days from the date of such Journal Such corrected Journals may thereafter be approved by a majority vote of the members present

e A motion to correct any day's Journal shall be in order prior to the approval by the Assembly of such day's Journal The approval of the Journal shall require a majority vote of the members present

Presentation of Petitions

50 Whenever petitions, memorials, or other papers are presented by a member, a brief statement of the contents thereof may be made verbally by the introducer. Petitions are not debatable and shall be filed, or be referred to a committee as the Speaker shall determine Mention of receipt of such presentation and its disposition shall be entered in the Journal

Upon receipt of a petition for the impeachment of any person subject to impeachment by the Legislature, the Speaker shall, without comment or debate, forthwith refer such petition to committee

Messages From the Governor

51 Messages from the Governor shall be delivered to the Chief Clerk or an assistant, and shall be read and ordered printed in the Journal unless otherwise ordered by a recorded vote of two-thirds of the elected membership

Messages From the Senate

52 Messages from the Senate shall be delivered to the Chief Clerk or an assistant, and shall be read and ordered printed in the Journal The Speaker shall forthwith refer to the proper committee all Senate bills accompanying such messages, which references shall be entered in the Journal Assembly bills which have been passed without amendment by the Senate shall be ordered to enrollment

Assembly bills amended by the Senate shall be ordered placed upon the unfinished business file

Bills

53 Whenever the word "bill" is used in these rules, it shall include constitutional amendments, concurrent and joint resolutions, except as otherwise specifically provided

Digests of Bills Introduced

54 No bill shall be introduced unless it is contained in a cover attached by the Legislative Counsel and unless it is accompanied by a digest prepared and attached to the bill by the Legislative Counsel, showing the changes in the existing law which are proposed by the bill If any bill is presented to the Chief Clerk for introduction which does not comply with the foregoing requirements of this rule the Chief Clerk shall return it to the member who presented it

The digest shall be printed on the bill as introduced in distinctive

type upon the lower part of the first page thereof

Introduction and Reference of Bills

55 Each bill shall be signed by the member, or each of the members, who is an author of the bill before it is introduced. If any bill is introduced, which does not contain the signature of such author or co-author, the same, on motion of the member whose name appears thereon without such signature, shall be stricken from the file by a recorded vote of a majority of the elected membership. In each legislative session, on the first day when bills are introduced under "Introduction and Reference of Bills," the roll shall be called from A to Z and then back from Z to A, and as each member is name is called, he may introduce one bill, constitutional amendment, concurrent or joint resolution

After these two roll calls, any member desiring to introduce bills, constitutional amendments, concurrent and joint resolutions may at any time during a session send the same to the Clerk's desk

When received at the Clerk's desk it shall, under the proper order of business, be numbered, read the first time, referred to a standing committee, be printed, and a copy placed upon the desk of each member before final passage.

All bills, constitutional amendments, concurrent and joint resolutious introduced before the standing committees of the Assembly are appointed, shall be referred to committees, references to take effect when the committees shall be appointed

Introduction of House Resolutions

Each House resolution shall be signed by the member, or each of the members, who is an author of the House resolution before it is introduced, if there are more than four (4) co-authors, then a special roll call form providing a space for additional signatures must be attached to the House resolution before introduction. These forms may be obtained at the Clerk's desk

Number of Resolutions by Member

55.5 With the exception of resolutions relating to Members or former Members of the Legislature, no member shall introduce more than five resolutions in any session which are for the purpose of commendation or congratulation of any person or organization or for the purpose of expressing sympathy, regret, or sorrow upon the death of any person

Reference of Bills to Committee

56. Immediately following its first reading, the Speaker shall refer each bill to a committee, unless upon a motion the Assembly, by a majority vote of its entire elected membership, shall refer it to some other committee. Such motion to refer a bill shall not be debatable.

Digests of Bills Amended in Senate

56.1 Whenever the Senate anends and passes an Assembly bill the Legislative Counsel shall, within one day after the bill is passed by the Senate, prepare and transmit to the Speaker and to the Chief Clerk of the Assembly, a brief digest summarizing the effect of the Senate amendment. The Chief Clerk of the Assembly shall cause said digest to be printed in the Daily File immediately following any reference in said file to the bill covered by the digest. No such bill may be acted upon until said digest has been received. This rule shall not be applicable during the last seven days of the session.

Delivery of Bills to State Printer

57 After introduction, first reading and reference to committee, all bills shall be delivered to the State Printer

Standing Committee Functions

Standing Committee Rules

58 The Rules of the Assembly shall govern the conduct of all committee meetings Each committee may adopt, by a majority vote of its entire membership, such additional rules, not in conflict with the Standing Rules, as it may deem necessary for the conduct of any business referred to such committee

A majority of the committee members present may order a call of the committee.

Meetings of Standing Committees

59 All standing committees shall meet at the hour and place provided by schedule, unless otherwise ordered by the Assembly No committee shall meet during any session of the Assembly without first obtaining permission from the Assembly

Every scheduled committee meeting shall be open to the public, unless the committee, by a majority vote of its entire membership, shall order an executive session

All bills set for hearing by any Assembly committee must be published in the Daily File Two full days, exclusive of Sundays on which no session of the Assembly is held, shall intervene between the day of the first publication and the day upon which the bill is heard in committee, and publication shall be made in each Daily File which is published on the intervening days No bills shall be set for hearing nor shall any notice thereof be published by any Assembly committee until that bill has been referred to such committee Nothing in this paragraph shall prevent a committee from acting with regard to a bill referred to it where the only action taken is to cause the bill to be reported to the Assembly with the recommendation that amendments be adopted and the bill be reprinted as amended and re-referred to the committee

The several standing committees and their chairmen are directed to adopt a procedure which assures that no committee shall commence the hearing of any bill after the bour of six o'clock p m at an afternoon meeting of the committee or after the bour of 11 o'clock p m at an evening meeting, but the hearings on a bill commenced prior thereto may be continued thereafter for such period of time as the committee deems necessary

Withdrawal of Bills for Amendment

595 Upon request of the author of a bill, the chairman of the committee to which the bill has been referred may, by his individual action taken independently of any committee meeting, cause the bill to be reported to the Assembly with the recommendation that amendments submitted by the author be adopted and the bill be reprinted as amended and re-referred to the committee

The provisions of Rule 59 do not apply to action taken under this rule

Notwithstanding the provisions of any other rule, such bill shall not be placed on the second reading file for the adoption of such amendments

Committee Quorum

60 A majority of the membership of any standing committee shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of its business, including the decision to recommend the adoption of any amendments to any bill. At least a majority of all members constituting such committee shall be required to report a bill out of committee.

Bills Reported Back to Assembly

61 All committees shall act upon bills referred to them as soon as practicable, and when acted upon each bill shall be reported back to the Assembly forthwith, and the chairman of each committee is charged with the observance of this rule. The chairman of each committee shall, insofar as practicable, report back bills in the same order as they were acted upon by the committee.

Subject Matter of Bill Recommended for Interim Study

62. Whenever it is the decision of a standing committee that a bill referred to such committee shall not be given a do-pass recommendation but that the subject matter of the bill should be referred to an appropriate interim committee for study, such standing committee shall retain the bill in its possession and report its recommendation to the Assembly that the subject matter of the bill be referred to the Committee on Rules for assignment by it of such subject matter to an appropriate interim committee

Nothing in this rule shall be construed to prohibit a committee from subsequently reconsidering a bill and reporting it to the Assembly with a do-pass or do-pass as amended recommendation or from reporting it out of committee without further action on the final day of the session.

Committee Chairman as Author

63. No chairman of a standing committee, except the Chairman of the Committee on Ways and Means, shall preside at a committee hearing to consider a bill of which he is the sole author or the lead author

Reports of Committees

64. Reports of standing and special committees shall be delivered to the Chief Clerk or an assistant, and shall be read and ordered printed in the Journal unless otherwise ordered by the Speaker or a majority vote of the members present

Signing Bills Out of Committee

65 No bill shall be signed out of committee unless the committee has failed to hold a meeting on two consecutive scheduled dates, or having so met, has failed to have a quorum present for the transaction of business

Committee of the Whole

66. The Assembly may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole at any time by a majority vote of the members present While sitting as such committee, persons other than members may address the committee The Speaker of the Assembly, or any member named by the Speaker, shall preside as Chairman of the Committee of the Whole

A moinor that the Committee of the Whole "do now rise and report back to the Assembly," shall always be in order, and shall be deeded without debate All actions of the Committee of the Whole shall be reported to the Assembly by the chairman, but shall not be entered in the Journal except upon motion and a majority vote of the members present.

Committee on Ways and Means

67 The Committee on Ways and Means shall consider all bills to appropriate money, other than the contingent expenses of the Assembly Any bill which would require the expenditure of additional state moneys in any manner, including any bill which creates any additional state agency or office, or adds any functions, duties, or responsibilities to an existing agency or office, shall be referred to the Ways and Means Committee before being placed on third reading

Committee Expenditures

68 No member or committee shall be permitted to incur any expense without first receiving the consent of the Assembly

Reports of Interim Committees

69 All interim committees, unless otherwise authorized, shall report to the next succeeding Legislature on or before the fifth legislative day after the convening thereof

Printing of Reports

70. All requests for the printing of reports of Assembly interim committees shall be by resolution

No resolution for the printing of a report of an Assembly interim committee shall be considered for adoption until it has been referred to the Committee on Rules. The Committee on Rules shall determine the number of copies needed, and whether or not the report shall be printed in the Journal. In no event shall more than 1,000 copies of any interim committee report be authorized by the Committee on Rules on the first printing, exclusive of the Journal copies, if the report is to be printed therein, unless the Committee on Rules finds and determines that there is a special need for that report in greater numbers.

Upon determination by the Committee on Rules that additional copies of an Assembly interim committee report are required at any time following the first printing of the authorized number of copies, the Committee on Rules may authorize one or more additional printings in the numbers found by it to be necessary and may make funds available therefor.

The State Printer shall hold the type for each Assembly interim committee report for a period of 90 days from the date of the first printing or for such time as the Committee on Rules deems necessary

No Assembly interim committee report shall contain more than 100 pages, including the front and back cover thereof and any appendix, unless a greater number of pages has been approved and authorized by the Committee on Rules

Daily File

Passage of Bills

71 There shall be printed an Assembly Daily File for each legislative day when ordered by the Speaker The Committee on Rules shall have charge of the Daily File of the Assembly. The following listing shall constitute the order of the Daily File

- Special Orders of the Day 2 Second Reading, Assembly Bills
- 3 Second Reading, Senate Bills
- 4 Unfinished Business
- 5 Third Reading, Assembly Bills
- 6 Third Reading, Senate Bills
- 7 Adoption of Resolutions

All bills on the Daily File shall be called for consideration, provided compliance has been had with Rule 61, in the order of their listing, unless otherwise ordered by unanimous consent or an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members present

Copies of Bills for Action Upon Bill on Floor

72 No bill may be considered or acted upon on the floor of the Assembly unless and until a copy of the printed bill as introduced and a printed copy of each amended form of the bill has been placed upon the desks of the members

Inactive File

73 Whenever a bill has been passed twice on third reading file, it shall forthwith be placed upon a special file to be known as the mactive file. When a bill has been placed on the mactive file, it may be returned to the third reading file by a request of the author; but the bill shall then be placed at the foot of the third reading file

Record of Bills

74 The Chief Clerk shall cause to be kept a permanent record of every action taken by the Assembly on every bill, and the date of such action Every such action and the date thereof shall also be indorsed upon such bill

Second Reading of Bills

75 All bills shall be read the second time in the order of their appearance upon the second reading file Upon second reading, Assembly bills reported without amendments shall be ordered engrossed, and Senate bills reported without amendments shall be ordered to third reading All bills reported out of committee shall be placed on the second reading file for the next legislative day and shall not be read a second time except under that order of business

Committee Amendments

76 Committee amendments reported with bills shall be considered upon their second reading and such amendments may be adopted by majority vote of the members present Assembly and Senate bills amended on second reading, whether by committee amendment or amendment from the floor, shall be ordered reprinted and returned to the second reading file Assembly bills so amended shall be engrossed after printing

Committee amendments reported with bills shall be prepared by, or approved as to form by, the Legislative Counsel Four copies of the committee amendments to Assembly bills and five copies of the committee amendments to Senate bills must be delivered to the Clerk's desk

Adoption of amendments to any bill in the Assembly prior to third reading, other than by a roll call, shall not preclude subsequent consideration in committee or on the third reading of the bill, of such amendments, or any part thereof, by the Assembly.

Amendments From the Floor

77. Any member may move to amend a bill during its second or third reading and such motion to amend may be adopted by a majority vote of the members present

No amendments to a bill offered from the floor, except committee amendments reported with bills, amendments offered with a motion to amend and re-refer a bill to committee, amendments deleting any number of words, amendments adding a total of not more than 25 words, or amendments previously printed in the Journal, shall be in order unless and until a copy of the proposed amendments has been placed upon the desks of the members. If a copy of amendments adding a total of 25 words or less is not placed on the desks of the members, it shall be made available to the author of the bill, and the amendments shall be read in their entiriety by the Clerk prior to debate

Amendments offered from the floor during a bill's second or third reading either (a) shall be prepared by, or approved as to form by, the Legislative Counsel or (b) shall be submitted on a form available from the Chief Clerk

Before debate four copies of the proposed amendment to Assembly bills, and five copies of the proposed amendment to Senate bills, must be delivered to the Clerk's desk Bills so amended upon second or third reading shall be reprinted and re-engrossed The Chief Clerk shall order printed as many copies of all amended bills as he may determine to be necessary.

Consideration of Bills Re-referred to Committee

78 Whenever a bill which has been amended, and re-referred to committee, is reported out by that committee, it shall be placed on the second reading file and shall not be transferred therefrom to the regular third reading file until the following day.

Consideration of Constitutional Amendments, Concurrent and Joint Resolutions

79 Constitutional amendments, concurrent and joint resolutions may be amended by a majority of the members present and shall be treated the same as bills, except that they shall be read but once The ayes and noes shall not be called upon the adoption of concurrent resolutions,

except those presenting charter amendments or authorizing expenditures of money, unless regularly demanded or required by statute or by the Constitution.

Bills Transmitted to the Senate

80 Upon the final passage of any bill if no notice of motion to reconsider such bill be given, the Speaker shall order the bill transmitted to the Senate under the signature of the Chief Clerk Senate bills refused passage shall forthwith be returned to the Senate under similar signature.

Bills Considered During Period Prior to Final Adjournment

81 See Joint Rule 23 for provisions governing bills considered during this period.

Concurrence in Senate Amendments

82. It shall require the same affirmative recorded vote to concur in any Senate amendment to an Assembly bill as the vote required by the Constitution for the passage of such bill. It shall require an affirmative recorded vote of two-thirds of the entire elected membership of the Assembly to concur in any Senate amendment to an Assembly bill which contains an item or items of appropriation subject to reduction or elimination under the provisions of Section 34a of Article IV of the Constitution The vote on concurrence shall be deemed the vote upon final passage of such bill When Senate amendments to an Assembly bill are concurred in, the bill shall be forthwith ordered enrolled, and the Chief Clerk shall notify the Senate of such concurrence

Nonconcurrence in Senate Amendments

83 If the Assembly refuse to concur in Senate amendments to an Assembly bill, and when notified that the Senate has refused to concur in Assembly amendments to a Senate bill, the Speaker shall appoint a committee of three (3) on conference, and the Chief Clerk shall immediately notify the Senate of the action taken by the Assembly and request the appointment of a like committee.

Committee on Conference

84. The Speaker, in appointing a committee on conference, shall select two members from those voting with the majority on the point about which the difference has arisen, and the other member from the minority, in the event there is a minority vote

Whether a member has voted with the majority or minority on the point about which the difference has arisen is determined by his vote on the appropriate roll call, as follows

- (a) The roll call on the question of final passage of a Senate bill amended in the Assembly when the Senate has refused to concur with the Assembly amendments,
- (b) The roll call on the question of concurrence with Senate amendments to an Assembly bill

Meetings and Reports of Committees on Conference

85 The Chairman of the Senate committee on conference for the same bill shall arrange the time and place of meeting of such committee. It shall require an affirmative vote of not less than two of the

Assembly members and two of the Senate members constituting the committee on conference to agree upon a report, and the report shall be submitted to both the Senate and the Assembly Such report is not subject to amendment, and if either house refuses to adopt such report, the conferees shall be discharged and other conferees appointed. No member who has served on a committee on conference shall be appointed a member of another committee on conference on the same bill The presentation and consideration of any report of a committee on conference shall always be in order, except during a roll call or when a member has the floor lt shall require the same affirmative recorded vote to adopt any conference report as required by the Constitution upon the final passage of the bill affected by such report. It shall require an affirmative recorded vote of two-thirds of the entire elected membership of the Assembly to adopt any conference report affecting any Assembly bill which contains an item or items of appropriation which are subject to reduction or elimination under the provisions of Section 34a of Article IV of the Constitution

The vote on concurrence or upon the adoption of such conference report by the Assembly shall be deemed the vote upon final passage of such bill

Engrossing and Enrolling Bills

86 The Engrossing and Enrolling Clerk shall engross and enroll all bills which shall come to his hands for such purpose, in compliance with provisions of Section 9503 of the Government Code, and in the order of time in which the same shall be acted upon by the Assembly

Enrollment

S7 After final passage by both houses, any Assembly bill not amended by the Senate shall be forthwith ordered by the Speaker to be enrolled, as provided in Sections 9508 and 9509 of the Government Code The Committee on Engressment and Enrollment shall report both the day and hour each enrolled bill is presented to the Governor, which report shall be entered in the Journal

Adoption of Resolutions

88 House resolutions and concurrent resolutions that do not require a recorded roll-call vote, such as resolutions of congratulation or sympathy, except resolutions regarding Members or former Members of the Legislature, shall be listed under a separate heading in the printed Daily File They shall be considered for adoption under that order of business, or at any other time as determined by the Speaker

SECTION 4

PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE

Motions and Questions

Precedence of Motions During Debate

89 When a question is under debate or before the Assembly, no motions shall be received but the following, which shall take precedence in the order named

First—To adjourn; Second—To recess to a time certain, Third—To lay on the table; Fourth—For the previous question; Fifth—To set as a special order, Swith—To postpone indefinitely, Seventh—To refer to or re-refer, Eighth—To amend

Questions of Order Decided Without Debate

90. All incidental questions of order, arising after a motion is made for any of the questions named in Rule 89 and pending such motion, shall be decided by the Speaker without debate, whether on appeal or otherwise

Appeal From Decision of the Speaker

91. Any member may appeal from a decision of the Speaker without waiting for recognition by the Speaker, even though another member has the floor. No appeal is in order when another is pending, or when other business has been transacted by the Assembly prior to the appeal being taken.

Upon the appeal being seconded, the Speaker may give his reasons for the decision, and the member taking the appeal may give his reasons for making his appeal, and the Speaker shall forthwith put this question to the Assembly "Shall the decision of the Speaker be sustained?"

An appeal cannot be amended and yields only to a motion to recess or adjourn, to lay on the table, or a question of personal privilege. If an appeal be laid on the table, such action shall have no effect on the pending question

An appeal cannot be debated when relating to indecorum, transgression of rules, or priority of business A majority vote of the members present shall deade any appeal

Speaker Explains Order of Business

92 The Speaker may, on his own motion or upon the motion of any Member of the Assembly, explain the order of business when the motion pending before the Assembly is not dehatable. Such explanation is not to consume more than two minutes

To Adjourn

93 A motion to adjourn is not debatable and cannot be amended, and is always in order, except (a) when another member has the floor, (b) when the Assembly is voting, (c) during a call of the Assembly. The name of any member moving an adjournment and also the hour at which the motion was made and adjournment taken shall be entered in the Journal A motion to adjourn must be adopted by a majority vote of the members present

When a motion to adjourn is made and seconded, it shall be in order for the Speaker, before putting the question, to permit any member to state to the Assembly any fact relating to the condition of the business of the Assembly which would seem to render it improper or made sable to adjourn A statement shall not occupy more than two minutes and shall not be debatable

To Recess to a Time Certain

94 A motion to recess to a time certain shall be treated the same as a motion to adjourn, except that such motion is debatable when no

business is before the Assembly, and can be amended as to the time and duration of the recess. It yields only to a motion to adjourn

To Lay on the Table

95 A motion to lay on the table is not debatable and cannot be amended

A motion to table a bill, constitutional amendment, concurrent or joint resolution requires a majority vote of the entire elected member-

Any motion to lay on the table, if carried by a majority vote of the entire elected membership, carries with it the main question and everything that adheres to it, provided, however, that a motion to lay an amendment on the table, if adopted, does not carry with it a bill, constitutional amendment, concurrent, joint, or House resolution

A motion to lay an amendment on the table may be adopted by a majority vote of the members present

The Previous Question

96 The previous question shall be put only when demanded by five members, and in this form "Shall the question be now put?" and its effect, when sustained by a majority of the members present, shall be to put an end to all debate and bring the House to a vote only on the question then pending; except that the proponent of the matter pending shall be allowed not to exceed five minutes to close the debate.

Motion to Set Special Order

97 A motion to set any matter before the Assembly as a special order of business must be adopted by a two-thirds vote of the members elected. It is debatable only as to the propriety of setting the main question as a special order of business, and may be amended only as to the time

Motion to Postpone to a Time Certain

98 A motion to postpone to a time certain shall be deemed and treated as a motion to set as a special order

Motion to Postpone Indefinitely

99 When a motion is made to postpone indefinitely any bill, motion, or amendment, it opens the main question to debate Should the motion to postpone undefinitely prevail by a majority vote of the entire elected membership, the main question shall not be acted upon again during the session.

Motion to Amend

100 A motion to amend may itself be amended, but no "amendment to an amendment" can be amended A motion to amend is debatable, except where the main question to be amended is not debatable. Any motion to amend may be adopted by a majority vote of the members present.

A motion to amend having been decided in the negative, shall not again be in order on the same day, or at the same stage of proceeding A motion to amend by striking out certain words having been decided in the negative, shall not preclude a motion to amend by adding words, or a motion to amend by striking out and inserting words; but in no

case shall a further amendment be substantially the same as the one rejected.

Subject to the above provisions of this rule, a motion to amend is in order during the second or third reading of any bill.

A motion to lay an amendment on the table may be adopted by a majority vote of the members present, as provided in Rule 95.

Amendment to Be Germane

101. No amendment to any bill, whether reported by a committee or offered by a member, shall be in order when such amendment relates to a different subject, or is intended to accomplish a different purpose, or requires a title essentially different from the original title of any bill

No amendment shall be in order which adds or deletes the name of a member as an author or co-author, or which changes the original number of any bill

or any our

Substitute Motion 102. A motion to substitute shall be deemed and treated as a motion to amend.

Motions in Writing

103. Upon request of the Speaker all motions shall be reduced to writing and shall be read to the Assembly by the Speaker before the same are acted upon

Constitution of Motions

104. No motion, whether oral or written, shall be adopted until the same shall be seconded and distinctly stated to the Assembly by the Speaker.

Division of Question

105. Any member may call for a division of the question, and the Speaker shall order the question divided if it comprehend propositions in substance so distinct that, one being taken away, a substantive proposition shall remain for the decision of the Assembly

Withdrawal of Motions

106. After a motion is stated by the Speaker, or a bill, resolution, or petition read by the Clerk, it shall be deemed to be in the possession of the Assembly.

Motion to Be Germane

107. No motion or proposition on a subject different from that under consideration shall be admitted as an amendment

Motion to Withdraw and Recall Bills

108. A motion to withdraw a bill or resolution from committee, or to re-refer a bill or resolution from one committee to another committee may be made during the regular order of business. A motion to re-refer shall only be debatable as to the propriety of such reference, and shall require a recorded vote of a majority of the elected members.

No bill or resolution shall be withdrawn from committee and placed upon the file except upon two days' notice thereof and except by a

recorded vote of a majority of the elected members

Re-reference of Measures on File

109. A motion to re-refer a bill or resolution that is on the Assembly Daily File to committee may be made during the regular order of business. The motion shall only be debatable as to the propriety of such reference, and shall require a recorded vote of a majority of the elected members.

Bills Stricken From File

110 A motion to strike from the file any bill or house resolution requires a majority vote of the entire elected membership. Such bill shall not be acted upon again during the session.

Motion to Rescind Action and Expunge Record

111 Previous to the approval of the Journal by the Assembly any action may be resembled and its record ordered expunged by an affirmative recorded vote sufficient to take such action originally, except that no action shall be resemded and the record expunged by a vote less than a majority of the entire elected membership. No motion to reseind the action and expunge the record shall be made twice on the same proposition.

Whenever any action of the Assembly is rescinded and its record ordered expunged, the record of the action expunged shall not appear in any form whatsoever, but the record of the precedings on the motion to rescind and expunge shall appear in the Assembly Journal as and when printed

Reconsideration of Vote

112 (a) A motion to reconsider on the next legislative day (1) the vote whereby any bill was passed or refused passage, or (2) the vote whereby any motion, amendment, concurrence, Assembly resolution or proposition other than a bill was passed or refused passage, must be made on the same day the vote to be reconsidered was taken. No motion to reconsider shall be in order on the last day, or the day preceding the last day, for consideration of Assembly or Senate bills in the Assembly No motion to reconsider shall be adopted unless it receives an affirmative recorded vote of 41 members, except that it shall require such a vote of 54 members or 60 members, respectively, to reconsider the vote on any matter originally requiring 54 votes or 60 votes, as the case may be A motion to reconsider may be voted on without a second

A motion to reconsider a vote must be made by a member voting on the question, and shall take precedence over all motions, except a motion to adjourn. Upon such motion being made, the matter to be reconsidered shall forthwith be placed upon the unfinished business file, and no further action shall be taken prior to the next legislative day. When a motion to reconsider has once been made, the same shall be considered to be the property of the Assembly. When reconsideration is granted, the matter to be reconsidered shall resume its exact position before the Assembly previous to its being voted upon

(b) Any member voting on any motion, amendment, concurrence, Assembly resolution or proposition other than a bill may move to take up on the same day the motion to reconsider such a question, previously made by another member. The motion to take up the reconsideration on the same day shall take precedence over the motion to reconsider.

and upon demand of any member the motion to take up the reconsideration on the same day must be put to an immediate vote. If the motion to take up the reconsideration on the same day is adopted, the motion to reconsider shall be the next order of business before the house.

Call of Assembly

113 After the roll has been called, and prior to the announcement of the vote, any member may move a call of the Assembly A majority of the members present may order a call of the Assembly, and the Speaker shall immediately order the Sergeant at Arms to lock all doors and shall direct the Clerk to prepare a list of absentees as disclosed by the last roll call, which list of absentees shall be furnished to the Sergeant at Arms Thereupon no members shall be permitted to leave the Assembly Chamber except by written permission of the Speaker, and no person shall be permitted to enter except such member as is taken into custody as herein provided, or Schators, officers, attaches, or employees of the Legislature in the official performance of their duties

Those members who are found to be absent, and for whom no leaves of absence have been granted, shall be forthwith taken into custody wherever found by the Sergeant at Arms or his assistants or any person designated by the Sergeant at Arms, including members of the California Highway Patrol, the State Police, and sheriffs or their deputies, and brought to the Assembly Chamber No recess or adjournment shall be taken during a call of the Assembly During such call, the Assembly may consider and transact any matter of business by unanimous consent No call of the Assembly shall be ordered on any matter while the Assembly is already under call A call of the Assembly may be dispensed with at any time upon a majority vote of the members present, such action to become effective upon the completion of the roll call and the announcement of the vote upon the matter for which the call was ordered

Resolutions

114 The adoption of any resolution anthorizing the expenditure of money shall require an affirmative recorded vote of a majority of all members elected to the Assembly All House resolutions shall be numbered and shall be referred to the appropriate committee by the Speaker

Motions and Resolutions

115 Any motion or resolution not otherwise provided for under the Rules shall be placed before the Assembly only under this order of business Unless otherwise provided by law or Assembly rule, any motion or resolution may be adopted by a majority vote of the members present

Adjournment

116 Adjournment sine die shall be ordered by concurrent resolution. The resolution for adjournment sine die shall be adopted by the Assembly not less than seven days before the date set therein for such adjournment.

Members' Decorum and Privileges

Order in Speaking to Questions

117 When a member desires to address the Assembly, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to "Mr Speaker." Upon being recognized, he may speak, confining himself to the question under consideration. When two or more members rise at the same time, the Speaker shall designate the member who is entitled to the floor.

No member shall speak more than once during the consideration of any one question on the same day and at the same stage of proceeding, except that the author of a bill or resloution or the mover of a question shall have the right to open and close the debate thereon. No member shall be allowed to speak more than 10 minutes to open and five minutes to close the debate thereon, and no member other than the author or the mover of the question shall be allowed to speak more than five minutes thereon. No member shall yield to any other member the time for which he is entitled to speak on any matter.

Motions

118 When a member desires to make a motion, he shall obtain recognition as provided in Rule 117 Upon being recognized he shall open by stating his motion, except in the case of a nomination, and in any other case shall not speak to the merits of the motion at that time and shall confine his remarks to those necessary to explain the motion. If the motion is in order and is seconded, it shall be stated to the Assembly by the Speaker If the motion is debatable, the member who made it shall then be entitled to recognition to open the debate thereon.

When a member obtains the floor during debate upon any question that is pending before the Assembly and addresses the Assembly regarding the merits of the pending question, he shall not be permitted to conclude his debate by making any motion or by demanding the previous question

Leave of Absence

119 No member shall absent himself from attendance at any session of the Assembly without leave of the Assembly, and no member shall obtain such leave of absence or be excused for nonattendance, except by a two-thirds vote of all members elected to the Assembly, or by unanimous consent

Personal Privilege

120 Any member may rise to explain a matter personal to himself and shall forthwith be recognized by the Speaker, but shall not discuss a question in such explanation. Such matters of personal privilege yield only to a motion to recess or adjournment

Objection to Reading of Any Paper

121 Any member upon recognition by the Speaker may object to the reading of any paper before the Assembly After such objection, the question of reading shall be determined without debate by a majority vote of the members present, upon a brief statement of its substance by the Speaker.

Members Called to Order for Transgressing Rules

122 a If any member transgresses the Rules of the Assembly, the Speaker shall, or any member may, call the offending member to order.

The member so called to order shall immediately take his seat, until the Speaker without debate, shall have determined whether he is in order or not Such decision by the Speaker shall be subject to an appeal to the Assembly

b If any member be called to order for offensive words spoken in debate, the person calling him to order shall state to the Assembly the words to which exception is taken No member shall be held to answer, or be subject to censure by the Assembly, for language used in debate, if other business shall have been transacted by the Assembly prior to exception being taken to the words spoken

Members Voting

123 Every member in the Assembly Chamber when a roll call is required shall record his vote openly and without debate, unless the Assembly shall, by a majority vote of the members present, excuse him

The name of any member who refuses to vote as required by this rule, after being requested by the Speaker to do so, shall be entered in the Journal of the Assembly, together with a statement that he was present and did so refuse to vote Any member who refuses so to vote may, if he so desires, and immediately after the announcement of the vote, submit a written explanation of his failure to vote and have such explanation printed in the Journal, provided no such explanation shall exceed 50 words in length

In addition to the entry of his name in the Journal, any member who refuses so to vote when required, and who has not been excused from doing so, may, immediately after the announcement of the vote, in the discretion of the Speaker or upon demand of any member, be summoned to appear before the bar of the Assembly for public censure by the Speaker or by any member designated by the Speaker Censure of a member as provided by this rule shall not constitute a bar to proceedings for his expulsion from the Assembly pursuant to Section 9 of Article IV of the Constitution

A member may submit a written explanation of his vote on any bill or House resolution, and have such explanation printed in the Journal immediately following such vote, provided no such explanation shall exceed 50 words in length

Compensation and Expenses of Member Convicted of Felony

124 If a Member of the Assembly is convicted of a felony by a superior court, his right to further compensation or expenses is thereupon suspended and his membership on any interim committee is suspended If such conviction becomes final, the right of the member to further compensation or expenses shall terminate and any compensation or expenses withheld shall be forfeited to the State If a conviction is reversed by an appellate court or a motion for a new trial is granted and the member is thereafter found not guilty or the charges against him are dismissed, the amounts of the withheld compensation or expenses shall be paid to the member and the suspension of his committee membership shall terminate

Whenever a member is convicted of a felony in the superior court, the Assembly Rules Committee shall give written notice to the State Controller, directing him to discontinue any further payments to the member unless and until the Rules Committee notifies the State Con-

troller that the member has been found not guilty or that the charges against him are dismissed. The State Controller shall not draw any warrant payable to any such member except as provided in this rule

Ayes and Noes

125 The ayes and noes shall be recorded by the electrical voting system on the final passage of all bills, or by viva voce when demanded by three members or when ordered by the Speaker, and on any other question when called for by three members or ordered by the Speaker, the names of which members shall be entered in the Journal

Voting Not to Be Interrupted

126 When once begun, voting shall not be interrupted, except that before the vote is announced, any member may have the total pending vote tlashed on the visible vote recorder. Prior to the announcement of the vote the Speaker shall inquire if all members have voted. Any member may move a call of the Assembly after the completion of the roll and prior to the final recording, but no member shall be allowed to change his vote, or have his vote recorded after the vote is announced

Members at Clerk's Desk

127 No member or other person shall be allowed at the Clerk's desk while the ayes and noes are being recorded or the votes counted

Tie Vote

128 In case of an equal division, or tie vote, the question shall be lost

"Two-thirds of the Entire Elected Membership" Defined

129 Wherever the words or figures, "two-thirds of the entire elected membership" appear in any rule, it shall mean 54 votes

Assembly Expenses Between Sessions

130 Pursuant to the powers vested in the Assembly Committee on Rules, and during such times as the Assembly is not in session, the committee is authorized and directed to incur and pay such expenses of the Assembly not otherwise provided for as the committee determines are reasonably necessary, including repair, alteration, improvement and equipping of the Assembly Chamber and the offices provided for the Assembly in the State Capitol

He received a term of 1 year and 6 months and served 1 year and 3 months in prison. He was finally discharged from prison on July 14, 1916. Certificate of rehabilitation issued March 30, 1960, by the Superior Court of Los Angeles County Granted August 28, 1961.

KELLON BARTEE, Prison No. A.14302, was convicted of the crime of manstructure in Solano County in March 1050. He necessed a team of 5 years and seried 2 years 2 days in prison before being released on parole on March 17, 1982. He was discharged from parole on March 15, 1955. Certificate of rehabilitation issued May 22, 1961, by the Superior Court of Solano County Granted December 21, 1961.

WARREN K BILLINGS, Puson No. 10099, was convicted of murder in the first degree in the City and County of San Francisco in September 1916. After serving twenty-three years in prison he was released on October 19, 1939, after a majority of the Justices of the Supreme Court had recommended to Governor Culbert L.

Olson that Billings sentence be commuted to time served On September 15, 1945, he was granted a certificate of tebabilitation by the Superior Court of San Mateo County as evidence that he had led an honest, upught life and had exhibited good moral character On December 19, 1961, a majority of the Justices of the California Supreme Court recommended that Governor Brown grant Billings' application for a pardon At the time the pardon was granted be had been without parole supervision without meadent for twenty-two years Granted December 21, 1961.

PRESENTATION OF THE GOVERNOR

Hon. Glenn M Anderson, Lieutenaut Governor of the State of California, then presented His Excellency, Edmund G Brown, Governor of the State of California, to the Joint Convention.

ADDRESS BY GOVERNOR EDMUND G. BROWN

Governor Brown then proceeded to address the Joint Convention as follows

To the Senate and Assembly of the Legislature of California.

I present to you a \$2,885,523,247 Budget for the 1962-63 fiscal year It is the fourth consecutive soundly balanced Budget transmitted to you by this Administration

It is the third consecutive Budget requiring no new taxes

It recognizes in size and scope that this is the year when California takes its destined place as the first State in the Union, as the leader

in population, in government, in education, and in dedication to the principles of equal opportunity

It contemplates no major new expenditure programs

It includes increases in existing programs only where they are required by growth and quality, the two traditional hallmarks of life and government in California

It is once more based on an allocations system which guarantees that the state government will live within its resources without impairment of that level of services which has made California the most attractive State in the Umon—to its citizens, to new population and to new industry and commerce

It adheres to strict standards of austerity and economy

Expenditure increases were limited to those areas in which direct services to people were involved. New administrative workload and overhead costs were pared from departmental budgets, even when formulas and ratios justified the requests involved. The only major exceptions were in our revenue collecting agencies where added staff costs demonstrably would produce even more added revenue.

I renew my annual invitation to the Legislature to produce even more economies to reduce this Budget wherever possible without stunting the State's growth or reducing the quality of its essential services

I also renew my pledge to economize in the administration of this

Budget

I believe the record of the past three years reveals that both the invitation and the pledge are sincere

As evidence, I offer the fact that this Administration has averaged \$27 million a year for the last three years in savings from legislative appropriations. In the 10 years prior to my election, two preceding administrations averaged \$15 million and \$14 million respectively.

This last year we have also held thousands of authorized positions vacant for long periods of time in order to achieve greater productivity and slow the expansion of the work force

Together, in these three years, you and I have restored Cahfornia's fiscal responsibility, returned its bonds to an envied status in the national financial market place and turned a \$68 million deficit into a \$20 million surplus

At the same time, we have kept faith with the future of this great State

This Budget is founded not alone on principles of economy, but on a deep conviction that we must meet both the needs of the present and the challenges of the future

The major cost increases in this massive Budget testify to our adherence to the principle of investment—investment in the education of our youth, investment in the development of water and the other great natural resources, and investment in people and programs designed to make California a better place to live and work

Consider education, the area in which the largest growth is taking place and in which the most significant new investments are being made

Local school districts will have 212,000 more students next year, bringing the total to 3,775,000 students in the elementary and secon-

dary grades through junior college. The districts will receive \$58 million more in operating and debt service costs. The total proposed expenditure is \$863 million.

The rapidly expanding State College System will have 8,500 more students in 1962-63, bringing the total enrollment to 86,440. The trustees, the 16 present campuses and the two new ones will receive \$19 million more in state funds for operation and construction purposes The total proposed expenditure is \$149 million

The great University of California, destined to double in size in this decade, will admit 5,128 more students in 1962-63, increasing total enrollment to 57,203. The proposed state-supported budget for the university calls for an increase of \$16 million. The total proposed state contribution is \$197 million.

Next in importance among the few major increases are those resulting from 1961 legislation to improve health care for the aged and meet other deficiencies in the State's programs for the aged, the blind and the disabled. The forecast last year was for a \$70 million increase in these items in 1962-63, the first full year of operation. The estimate now is for \$54 million.

Another major cost factor is the first general pay increase for state employees in two years, a 5 percent raise to be retroactive to January 1 of this year on the urgent recommendation of the State Personnel Board, the official fact-finding agency on proper state salary levels That will cost \$39 8 million in 1962-63.

State employees themselves have helped to finance this raise with increased productivity. Their efforts in work improvement plans and their money-saving suggestions submitted through the Merit Award System have also helped give impetus to the formulation of new standards of efficiency and economy in many departments.

If you examine the Budget in another way, a different kind of increase factor stands out Of the entire Budget, \$1,514,200,000, or some 55 percent, is in local assistance, an increase of \$145 6 million in school, welfare, health and flood control programs administered at the local level where the burden would otherwise fall on the property taxpayer

California continues to have the largest local assistance program of any state

Fortunately, this Budget was prepared at a time of growing prosperity in California and the Nation

The revenue estimates on which it is predicated reflect the same steadfast confidence and faith in California's future that I expressed in less auspicious circumstances just one year ago.

Our determination then to press forward with anti-recession measures in partnership with the federal government has been more than justified by events

In almost every category of economic activity, California is at record highs and is continuing its steady upward climb

Having doubled personal income in California in the last decade, we should see another increase of 8 6 percent in 1962 The Nation's income will go up only 6 8 percent

The employment situation, already better, will continue to improve As the State's population increases another 600,000, requiring 245,000 new jobs for proper support, we actually anticipate the creation of 288,000 new jobs That would permit a welcome and substantial reduction in unemployment

This splendid economic climate in California is not an accident Government and industry and labor have worked hard to create and sustain it

Recent comprehensive national surveys show that California is the leading choice of business executives for new and expanded plant capacity, not only because of our large and growing market, but because of the high level of publicly financed education here, a level essential to the advanced technology of most modern industry

This is especially true of the Nation's burgeoning new business giant, the interrelated electronics and space exploration industries. It is in such areas that California's unique investment in higher education is paying dividends not only in culture and civilization, but in new levels of personal income and prosperity.

This Budget, just as the other budgets I have transmitted to you,

has other contributions to make to a thriving economy.

There is an accelerated thrust in the California Water Program as it surges toward peak construction activity at Oroville and at the San Luis Reservoir, and the Nation's finest highway program is progressing ahead of schedule

We are also continuing our assault on the ills of our society with some marked successes

Despite our huge growth in population, a splendid treatment program has reduced the number of mentally ill in our state institutions to the lowest point in eight years

The Prisoner Conservation Camp Program has a record number of adult and juvenile offenders doing useful and self-rehabilitating work in our forest and wilderness areas. Without their firefighting efforts in the last two years, untold thousands of acres more of California forests would have gone up in smoke

The comprehensive narcotics program begun last year is still gathering momentum, but has already swept hundreds of addicts off the streets and out of the contagious centers of infection. This is a costly program, but one worth every dollar we have to pay to rid ourselves of this sordid traffic in human inserty and degradation.

These, and other comparable expenditures, are largely in the pattern pioneered in previous years of this Administration

In one area, however, I am supporting a drastic new approach to a task at which the State has long been laboring with only partial success

I feel that our recreation programs have not kept pace with our needs

Despite the greatest fiscal and planning effort of any Administration in the State's history, we still have not met the challenge fully Lands which should be held for public use have slipped away into private hands because of inadequate funds for acquisition The costs of other available and desirable lands is moving swiftly out of the range of the

limited public purse, and within 10 years will be completely beyond our resources

Moreover, much property now held is not adequately developed to meet immediate public demand for recreational facilities

Therefore, with this Budget, I plan to submit a \$100 milhon bond issue proposal to finance an immediate five-year program of acquisition of land for beach, park and other recreational purposes

At the same time, I am earmarking the General Fund money heretofore used for acquisition to accelerate the pace of our development program from \$4 million to \$6 million a year

I will ask that the Legislature place the new recreation bond issue

on the general election ballot

If it is approved, as I confidently expect, then I would ask that the Legislature work out, at the 1963 Session, a method and program of acquisition which would take into account not only the needs of the State as a whole, but those of individual communities, counties and regions

The 1962-63 Budget contemplates other bond financing but with only one other basic variation from the traditional pattern of use of long-term capital outlay bonds in California That one is of critical importance, however

To the category of institutions for which proper expenditures from state construction bonds can be made legally, now meluding the University of California, the State College System, mental hospitals, prisons, government buildings and other purely state institutions, I propose we add the State's junior colleges

Because the Master Plan for Higher Education adopted in 1960 calls upon the jumor colleges to assume a major new role in meeting added statewide responsibilities in the field of higher education, a beginning capital outlay appropriation of \$5 million was authorized by the Legislature last year

It was agreed by all concerned, however, that no permanently satisfactory solution to the shared responsibility of the State and junior

college districts was achieved at that time

The Coordinating Council for Higher Education is now hard at work on this matter, and I am confident that the 1963 Session of the Legislature, acting after it has had the benefit of the council's study and advice, will be able to write adequate legislation covering the very complex problem of financing new junior college facilities cooperatively.

It will be important that there be funds available immediately to implement that decision next year, and I am therefore asking that the new state construction bond issue be so written as to permit the Legislature to use construction bond funds for jumor college facilities

As of the beginning of the new fiscal year, only \$52 million of the state construction bonds authorized in 1958 will be available to meet the capital outlay needs of \$141 million projected in this Budget

I therefore ask this session of the Legislature to place a new bond issue of \$270 million on the June primary ballot to meet the remaining needs for 1963-63 and the probable needs in 1963-64

Building at the new campuses of the University of California and the State College System will be at its highest level for the next few years as the five-year building plan submitted with this Budget discloses. In addition, as indicated above, junior college assistance, perhaps as much as \$20 million, may be required in the 1963-64 Budget.

Thus, more than 80 percent of the total \$270 million bond issue will be devoted to meeting the drastic needs of our institutions of higher education as they absorb the first full impact of the postwar population boom

The increased use of bonds in these two areas is more than offset by decreased use in two other areas

The declining volume of new bond sales required to sustain the selfliquidating California Veterans' Farm and Home loan program will permit drastic reduction in the renewed bond authority sought and the amount to be offered

Instead of the \$400 million issue required two years ago, I am recommending that the new issue be limited to \$250 million for the next two years without making any changes or restrictions in the loan program. Ample funds on hand will permit the issue to wait to go on the general election ballot in November.

The bond program for assistance in local school construction has done its job well in reducing drastically the number of double sessions in the State There is now for the first time in years no backlog of requests waiting on a priority basis

The slackening of demand makes it possible for me to recommend that we reduce the two-year school construction bond issue from the \$300 million level authorized two years ago to \$200 million for the next two years

I would further recommend that this issue be placed on the primary ballot in June with the \$270 million state construction bond issue

The net effect of these four proposals will be to reduce rather than to increase the number of general obligation bond sales in California during the next fiscal year while shifting the focus of long-term financing to the areas of greatest need

California has already sold more than \$500 million in bouds this year, and, because of steadily increasing confidence in California's fiscal soundness, it has sold them at the lowest rates of interest since the state surpluses of the postwar years disappeared in the prior Administration

Yet, next year, we will be able to make a \$50 million sale of water bonds if necessary and still hold the total to little more than \$400 million

To any among you with lingering doubts as to California's fiscal health. I would gite two remarkable facts

California has the lowest net bond debt among nine comparable industrial states and ranks 37th in the Nation

California ranks 27th among the states in tax rate per \$100 of personal income

In the last 10 years, the tax rate per \$100 of personal income in all states has gone up an average of 20 percent and in such industrial states as New York and Pennsylvania has gone up 36 percent and 50 percent respectively California's rate is up just 5 percent.

The fiscal moral is clear Together you and I have kept economic faith with the people of California and with their future.

SUMMARY

In summary, this Budget totals \$2,885,000,000, including \$141,-000,000 of bond financing of essential State building needs. It represents an increase of almost \$199 million, or 6.7 percent over current year requirements. Total revenues will reach \$2,653,000,000, a corresponding increase of 8 percent.

Of particular importance are the General Fund obligations of \$1,917,000,000 contained in this total, up 10 percent over current requirements General Fund income for this Budget is anticipated at \$1,883,000,000, a comparable increase of 10 percent over the present year.

The following Budget Message of the Governor was received

Budget Message by Governor Edmund G. Brown

To the Senate and Assembly of the Legislature of California

I present to you a \$2,885,528,247 Budget for the 1962-63 fiscal year It is the fourth consecutive soundly balanced Budget transmitted to you by this Administration

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It is the third consecutive Budget requiring no new taxes. It recognizes in size and scope that this is the year when California takes its destined place as the first State in the Union, as the leader in population in government, in education, and in delication to the principles of equal opportunity.

It includes necesses in existing programs only where they are required by growth and quality, the two traditionals hilmarks of life and government in California. It is once more based on an allocations system which guarantees that the state government will have within its resources without impairment of that level of services which has made California the most attractive State in the Union—to its citizens, to new population and to new industry and commerce. It adheres to strict standards of austerity and economic Expenditure increases were limited to those areas in which direct services to people were involved. New administrative workload and overhead costs were pared from departmental budgets, even when formulas and ratios justified the requests involved. The only major exceptions were in our revenue collecting agencies where added staff costs demonstrably would produce even more added revenue.

I renew my annual invitation to the Legislatine to produce even more economies to reduce this hugget wherever possible without strating the State's growth or reducing the quality of its essential services.

I also renew my pledge to economize in the administration of this Budget
I believe the record of the past three years reveals that both the invitation and

the pledge are sincere. As evidence, I offer the fact that this Administration has averaged \$27 million a year for the last three years in savings from legislative appropriations. In the 10 years prior to my election, two preceding administrations averaged \$15 million and \$14 million respectively.

This last year we have also held thousands of authorized positions vacant for long periods of time in order to achieve greater productivity and slow the expansion of the work force

of the work force
Together, in these three years, you and I have restored California's fiscal responsibility, returned its bonds to an envied status in the national financial market place
and turned a \$98 million deficit into a \$20 million surplus.
At the same time, we have kept faith with the future of this great State
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Next in importance among the few maior increases are those resulting from 1961 legislation to improve health care for the aged and meet other deficiencies in the State's programs for the aged, the blind and the disabled The forcest last year was for a \$70 million increase in these items in 1962-63, the first full year of operation The estimate new is for \$74 million. Another major cost factor is the first general pay increase for state employees in two verts, a 5 percent raise to be retroictive to January I of this vent on the urgent recommendation of the State Personnel Board, the official fact-finding agency on moper state salary levels. That will cost \$30.8 million in 1962-63. State employees the object of homoce this raise with increased productivity. Their efforts in work majorement plans and their money-saving suggestions submitted through the Merit Award System have also helped give impetus to the formulation of new standards of chiciency and economy in many departments. 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The revenue estimates on which it is predicated reflect the same steadfast confidence and faith in California's tuture that I expressed in less auspicious circum-Stances just one year ago
Our determination then to press forward with anti-recession measures in partner-

ship with the federal government has been more than justified by events.

In almost every category of economic activity, California is at record highs and is continuing its steady upward climb

Having doubled personal income in California in the last decade, we should see another increase of 86 percent in 1962. The Nation's meome will go up only 68

percent The employment situation, already better, will continue to improve As the State's population increases another 600,000, requiring 245,000 new jobs for proper support, we actually anticipate the creation of 288,000 new jobs. That would permit a welcome and substantial reduction in unemployment.

This splendid economic chimate in California is not an accident. Government and industry and labor have worked hard to create and sustain it.

Recent comprehensive authoral surveys show that California is the leading choice of business evecutives for new and expanded plant capacity, not only because of our large and growing market, but because of the high level of publicly financed education here, a level essential to the advanced technology of most modern industry. This is especially true of the Nation's burgeoing new husness grant, the interrelated electronics and spice exploration industries. It is a such areas that California's unique investment in higher education is paying dividends not only in culture and civilization, but in new lovels of personal income and prosperity.

This Budget, just as the other bidgets I have transmitted to you, has other contributions to make to a thriving concern the California Water Program as it surges toward peak construction activity at Oraville and at the San Lius Reservoir, and the Nation's finest highway program is progressing ahead of schedule.

The comprehensive narrostus program begun last year is still gathering momentum, but has uheady swept hundreds of addicts off the streets and out of the contagous centers of infection. The 1962-63 Budget contemplates other bond financing but with only one other basic variation from the traditional pattern of use of long-term capital outlay bonds in California. That one is of critical importance, however.

To the category of institutions for which proper expenditures from state construction bonds can be made legally, now including the University of California, the State College System, mental hospitals, privous, government buildings and other purely state institutions. I propose we add the State's numor colleges.

Because the Master Plan for Higher Education adopted in 1969 calls upon the junior colleges to assume a major new role in meeting added statewide responsibilities in the field of higher education, a beginning capital outhy appropriation of \$5 million was authorized by the Legislature last year.

It was agreed by all concerned, however, that no permanently satisfactory solution to the shared responsibility of the State and junior college districts was achieved at that time.

As of the beginning of the new fiscal year, only \$5.2 million of the state construction bonds authorized in 1958 will be available to meet the capital outlay needs of \$441 million projected in this Budget.

I therefore ask this session of the Legislature to place a new bond issue of \$270 million on the June primary ballot to meet the remaining needs for 1962-63 and the probable needs in 1963-64.

Building at the new campuses of the University of California and the State College System will be at its highest level for the next few years as the five-year building plan submitted with this Rudget discloses. In addition, as indicated above, nanor college assistance, perhaps as much as \$20 million, may be required in the 1963-64 Budget.

Thus, more than 80 percent of the total \$270 million bond issue will be devoted to meeting the driving needs of our institutions of higher education as they absorb the first full impact of the postern population boom. Conveyances pursuant to this authority are made at a price equal to 50 percent of the fair market value of the property conveyed, based on the highest and best use of the property at the time it is offered for disposal of for disposal

tor disposal All necessary determinations and findings have been made by GSA for converance of this property to the city Completion of the transaction has been deferred until January, 1902, to allow the city time to obtain the necessary funds for its purchase through a bond election to be held in November, 1901. Under the etremistances, we believe that it is incumbent upon the State and the city to co-ordinate their respective requirements for acquisition of this acreage for park and recention activities. In the absence of an indication from the city that it wishes to amend or withdraw its application, we plan to proceed with the conveyance of the property to the city if the necessary funds become available.

THE HONORABLE MALCOLM H. MERRILL, M D, DIRECTOR OF PUBLIC HEALTH, and THE HONORABLE JAMES M SHUM-WAY, COUNTY COUNSEL OF SOLANO COUNTY, have each requested the opinion of this office on questions relating to the new California Restaurant Act We have consolidated the questions into a single opinion. The questions asked are

- 1. Does the selling for consumption off the premises of food, by a church, PTA. or other nonprofit organization come under the provisions of the California Restaurant Act
 - (a) If sale is to members only?
 - (b) If sale is to members and guests?
 (c) If sale is to the general public?
- 2 Does the serving of a meal by a church, PTA or other nonprofit organization come under the provisions of the California Restaurant Act.
 - (a) If service is to members only?
 - (b) If service is to members and guests?
 - (c) If service is to the general public?
- 3 Must every school building be classified as a restaurant under the terms of this act even though there is no cafeteria in the building?
- 4 May food prepared in a private home be consumed in a school building by adults or children at an activity not sponsored by or under the control of the school? In other words, may potluck meals be served in any school buildings at any time when the food has been prepared in private homes?
- 5 May school employees bring foud prepared in their private homes to the school or school-owned building for consumption solely by other employees of the district during their rest period or coffee break?
- 6 Under the terms of the California Restaurant Act, is it possible for food prepared in a private home to be offered for sale, sold, or given away at a school or in a school building at any time by any group? ("Any group" refers to pupils, employees of the school district, parents of school pupils, and persons with no direct affiliation with the school)

The conclusions are ·

The California Restaurant Act does not apply to the selling to the public of food for consumption off the premises by a nonprofit organization, nor does the act apply to the serving of meals by such organization to its members and the members' guests if no employee or member is assigned full time to care for and operate equipment used in such arrangement. However, it does apply where such organization serves meals to the public. These conclusions are not affected by the character of the ownership of the premises, that is, whether private or school-owned. If the activity is subject to the Restaurant Act, then the food served may not be prepared in a private home. The employees of schools or other organizations may serve food prepared in their own homes and brought to the place of employment for the purpose of serving the same solely to the employees of the school or organization so long as no employee is assigned full time to care for and operate the equipment involved in the food serving activity. The California Restaurant Act forbids the serving in a restaurant of food prepared in a private home.

Analysis

The California Restaurant Act (Chapter 633 of the California Statutes of 1961) comprises Sections 28520 through 28696 of the Health

and Safety Code (All section references are to the Health and Safety Code unless otherwise specified) Whether a particular activity is subject to the provisions of the California Restaurant Act depends upon whether the activity constitutes a restaurant as that term is defined in Section 28522. That section provides as follows.

"'Restaurant' means any coffee shop, cafeteria, short-order cafe, luncheonette, tavern, cocktail lounge, sandwich stand, soda fountain, private and public school cafeteria or eating establishment, in-plant or employee eating establishment, and any other eating establishment, organization, club, including veterans' club, boardinghouse, guesthouse, or political subdivision, which gives, sells, or offers for sale, food to the public, guests, patrons, or employees as well as kitchens in which food is prepared on the premises for serving elsewhere, including catering functions The term 'restaurant' shall not include itinerant restaurants, vending machines, vehicles, cooperative arrangements by employees who purchase food or beverages for their own consumption and where no employee is assigned full time to care for or operate equipment used in such arrangement, or private homes, nor shall the term 'restaurant' include private clubs or other nonprofit organizations which purchase food or beverages for the consumption of their members and where no employee or member is assigned full time to care for or operate equipment used in such arrangement "

The first question describes activities exemplified by the traditional cake sales conducted by churches, the P T A, and other nonprofit organizations for the purpose of raising funds to finance their activities. The determinative characteristic of this activity is the sale of food for consumption off the premises. The definition of a restaurant in Section 28522, quoted above, commences by enumerating several specific types of establishments which are classed as rectaurants, such as coffee shop, cafeteria, sandwich stand, school cafeteria, and others. These are all establishments which commonly serve food for consumption on the premises. The enumeration continues with the all-inclusive generic term "any other eating establishment," and twice more uses the term "eating establishment."

This phraseology shows an intent on the part of the Legislature to include in the definition of the word "restaurant" that type of eating operation where food is served to the public, not sold to the public for consumption by the purchaser at lus own home. The section speaks in terms of "gives, sells, or offers for sale," rather than serves. However, to say that the Legislature intended that the act apply whenever food is sold, given away, or offered for sale to the public for consumption at the purchaser's home, would be to broaden the definition to include such food-selling establishments as grocery stores, meat markets, and candy stores. This, we think, the Legislature did not intend

The occasional cake sale type of food selling operation by a church or other nonprofit organization is distinguishable from the catering type of operation, in that the latter operation contemplates the preparation and serving of the food including the furnishing of serving utensils. Webster's New International Dictionary, 2d edition, unabridged, defines "caterer" as "one who provides provisions and service" (Emphasis added) Consequently, we believe that the Legislature by expressly including the catering type operation where food is

prepared in a central kitchen for service elsewhere did not thereby intend to include the traditional cake sale in definition of "restaurant". This is confirmed by the Legislature's words "kitchens in which food is prepared on the premises for serving elsewhere, including catering functions" (Emphasis added)

We, therefore, conclude in answer to the first question that the California Restaurant Act does not apply to the selling of food to the public for consumption at the purchaser's home by a church, PTA or other nonprofit organization

The second question describes the serving of a meal by a church, P TA or other nonprofit organization to members, members and their guests and to the public The last sentence of section 28522 refers to nonprofit organizations That sentence provides in part:

"nor shall the term 'restaurant' include private clubs or other nonprofit organizations which purchase food or beverages for the consumption of their members and where no employee or member is assigned full time to care for or operate equipment used in such arrangement".

By this exclusion the Legislature, in our opinion, intended that the definition of "restaurant" include those establishments or organizations which have for their primary purpose and function the serving of food and exclude nonprofit organizations such as church groups and parentteacher groups which serve food as a mere incident of some nonprofit purpose or function Thus, if such a nonprofit organization serves a meal to its members and does not have a member or employee assigned on a full-time basis to care for and operate the equipment, the California Restaurant Act does not apply If, on the other hand, such nonprofit organization serves meals to the public, it does not come within the exclusion If the nonprofit organization serves its members, together with its members' guests, the problem becomes more complex because the exclusion speaks in terms of "members" However, the Legislature must have known that this type of organization usually allows members to bring guests. In our opinion, the mere fact that guests of some of the members consume a meal does not take the activity out of the exclusion However, if the ratio of the number of members to the number of "guests" becomes so disproportionate as to evidence a ruse for the purpose of evading the statute, the act no doubt would apply.

In the third question we are asked whether every school building is classed as a restaurant even though there is no cafeteria in the building. The definition of "restaurant" includes private or public school cafeterias. If there is no food served in a school building, it is, of course, not a restaurant. The only problem that might arise is when a building in which no school cafeteria is located is used for the purpose of the serving of a meal by a nonprofit organization. In such case the activity should be analyzed as set forth above in the answer to Question No. 2, that is, whether the organization is in fact a nonprofit organization, whether it serves food to its members or to the public, and whether a member or employee cares for and operates the equipment on a full time basis.

In the fourth question we are asked whether food prepared in a private home may be consumed in a school building at an activity not

sponsored by or under the control of the school Section 28571 provides in part as follows:

"No food or beverage prepared in a private home shall be used in the preparation of foods or beverages, offered for sale, sold, or given away in a restaurant" (Emphasis added)

If the activity is classed as a restaurant, the above quoted provision prohibits the serving of food prepared in a private home. If, on the other hand, the activity is not classified as a restaurant, then there is no prohibition upon the serving of food which has been prepared at home. In the exclusion there is no distinction made between the serving of food on school premises by a nonprofit organization which is affiliated with a school and by one which has no connection with a school but which is permitted by the school to carry on this activity on school premises. Consequently, in determining the answer to this question in any given instance, the analysis must be, as pointed out in answer to the second question, to wit, whether a nonprofit organization is serving the public or only its members and their guests, and whether a member or employee cares for and operates the equipment on a full time basis.

We are asked in the fifth question whether school employees may bring food which is prepared in their private homes to the school for consumption solely by other school employees during their rest period or coffee break This question is somewhat similar to the fourth question above, in that Section 28521 prohibits the serving in a restaurant of food prepared in a private home Section 23522, above quoted, contains another exclusion, as follows.

"The term 'restaurant' shall not include itmerant restaurants, vending machines, vehicles, co-operative arrangements by employees who purchase food or beverages for their own consumption and where no employee is assigned full time to care for or operate equipment used in such arrangement "(Emphasis added)

Thus, there is an exclusion created for an activity which might otherwise be classified as an employee eating establishment within the definition of "restaurant" By this exclusion, school employees may bring food prepared in their own homes to the school for consumption solely by other employees during their coffee break if no employee is assigned full time to care for and operate any equipment used in such arrangement.

DEAR MR BRITSCHGI

You have furnished us with a copy of a letter received from a registered legislative advocate and have asked for our opinion on the questions raised by him. The pertinent portion of the letter reads as follows.

"During the interim I attend interim committees to listen to the debt and to report to my principals the trends in legislative matters. True, while before or after the meeting I might meet with legislators to pass the time of day. Now then, if I were to go to San Francisco to attend a Public Health Committee meeting and make no presentation and have no witnesses, are these expenses to influence the passage of legislation? Prior to now we have always been of the opinion that these were reporting ventures and no legislation was either passed or defeated at interim committees, and have not kept track of those expenses except for our principals to reimburse us Is it your opinion or the opinion of the committee that we should file these expenses."

In our opinion the legislative advocate should report these expenses if he attends such meetings pursuant to his engagement for the purpose of influencing legislation

Section 9906 of the Government Code requires "Any person who shall engage himself for pay or for any consideration for the purpose of attempting to influence the passage or defeat of any legislation" to register "before doing anything in furtherance of such object" After registration such person must "so long as his activity continues, file—a detailed report under oath of all money received and each expenditure of twenty-five dollars (\$25) or more during the preceding calendar month in earlying on his work." The report must also contain other specified information

The "activity" referred to in Section 9906 is obviously activity involving (1) attempts to influence legislation (2) as a paid legislative advocate, or stating it in another way, activity undertaken pursuant to a contract to attempt to influence legislation and recognized by the parties to the contract as assisting in achieving the objectives of that contract This construction of "factivity" is supported by the requirement that a report be made of expenditures incurred "in carrying on his work"—a phrase which obviously covers expenditures for activities required by the contract.

Under the particular facts related to us the individual apparently is registered under subdivision (a) of Section 9906 Therefore, we assume that he has contracted for a consideration to attempt to influence legislation

He must render monthly reports for periods in which his activity has continued. He must include in such report expenditures made in carrying on his work. Under the facts stated the individual's only "activity" is to attend interim committees, listen to the proceedings, and report to his principals the trends in legislative matters. If this is done pursuant to the contract whereby he engaged himself for pay or any consideration for the purpose of influencing legislation then his "activity" has continued and he would be required to render a report under subdivision (b) of Section 9906 Any expenditures made in connection with such activity would constitute expenditures made "in carrying on his work" and would have to be included in the report We note that under the facts stated it appears that the individual is reimbursed by his principal for expenses incurred in connection with attendance at the interim committee meetings. This indicates that both parties to the contract recognize that the individual's activities in connection with the interim committee meetings are undertaken pursuant to his contract to attempt to influence legislation and that they will further the objectives of that contract. The acts of the parties under a contract afford one of the most reliable means of arriving at their intention (Commercial Discount Co v Cowen (1941), 18 Cal 2d 610, 615).

Motor Vehicles' Delinquent Fees and Taxes—No. 1717

DEAR MR BEAVER

Question

You have asked whether a bill to provide for a reduction in the penalties for the late registration of station wagons, electric powered vehicles and out-of-state vehicles originally registered in this State, and in the penalties for the delinquent payment of vehicle hierose fees for trailer coaches, could be considered at the 1962 Budget Session

Opinion

In our opinion such a hill could be considered at the 1962 Budget Session

Analysis

The Legislature at a budget session may consider "only the Budget Bill for the succeeding fiscal year, revenue acts necessary therefor, the approval or rejection of charters and charter amendments of cities, countres, and cities and countres, and acts necessary to provide for the expenses of the session" (Art IV, Sec 2, Cal Const.)

There has been no judicial construction of the term "revenue act" as used in the constitutional provision which we have quoted. However, we believe that the test which would be followed by the courts as to whether a particular measure constitutes a "revenue act" is whether the principal object of the measure is the production of revenues for the State that are available for appropriation by the Budget Bill, either by increasing or decreasing such revenues. This test has been used by the courts in determining the meaning of the term "bill for raising revenue" in the constitutional requirements of other states that all bills for raising revenue shall originate in the lower house of the state legislature (see Public Utilities Commission v. Manley (Colo.), 60 Pac. 2d. 913, 916; Dearboin v. Johnson (Ala.), 173. 80. 864, 865). It is also the test applied in determining whether a bill is a revenue or regulatory measure (see Maryland Theatrical Corp. v. Broman (Md.), 24. Art. 2d. 911, 913-914). The Attorney General has also used this test in determining whether a measure is a revenue act. (15. Ops. Cal. Atty. Gen. 81).

The result of the enactment of a bill of the kmil here in question would be a reduction in the amount of revenue available for appropriation by the Budget Bill because of a reduction in revenues accruing to the State from the payment of penalties for the delinquent registration of station wagons, electric powered vehicles, and out-of-state vehicles originally registered in California, and from the payment of penalties for delinquent beense fees for trailer coaches. Therefore, we think that it is clear that the bill under consideration would constitute a revenue act within the meaning of Section 2 of Article IV.

The remaining question is whether such a revenue act is necessary for the Budget Bill

Section 34 of Article IV of the State Constitution states that the "budget shall be accompanied by an appropriation bull covering the proposed expenditures, to be known as the Budget Bill" This establishes a relationship between the Budget Bill and state revenues, for the budget is designed to comprehend "all proposed expenditures" and "all estimated revenues" (State Const., Art. IV, Sec. 34)

The apparent purpose of the provision in Section 2 of Article IV of the State Constitution that permits the Legislature at a budget session to consider revenue acts necessary for the Budget Bill for the succeeding fiscal year is to enable the Legislature to use its best judgment in adjusting upward or downward the revenues of the State with reference to proposed expenditures for the ensuing fiscal year, in order to avoid either a deficit or excess meome in the State Treasury. The necessity for any such act with respect to the Budget Bill presents principally a question of fact, the determination of which is to be made by the Legislature

It is our opinion, therefore, that if the Legislature makes such a determination by enacting the bill in question at the Budget Session, the courts will consider the legislation a revenue act necessary for the Budget Bill

The committee believes that the system of holding all hearings before subcommittees has worked exceptionally well. The system has permitted a greater number of hearings with greater frequency. The success of the subcommittee system is evidenced by the unusually high attendance of members at the hearings.

Since the adjoirnment of the last session the full committee has met twice on August 15, 1961, and on February 2, 1962, in Sacramento The Subcommittee on Tax Administration has met three times: October 25-26 in San Francisco, October 27 in Sahnas, November 20-21 in Los Angeles; the Subcommittee on Property Taxation four times. September 21-22 in San Diego, November 6-7 in Inglewood, December 18 in San Francisco, and December 19 in Richmond, the Subcommittee on Revenue Sources twice October 12-13 in Los Angeles and October 25-26 in San Francisco The Subcommittee on ACA 43 has not met to date

III. Findings and Recommendations on Major Subject Matters Studied

- 1 HR 415 (Wilson)—Francing of Road and Street Deficiencies Under the terms of HR 445 the committee is required to report not later than March 1, 1962 Additional statements on this subject have been received and are presently being analyzed by the Subcommittee on Revenue Sources A report will be made on or prior to the due date
- 2 HR 280 (Hawkins)—Property Tax Deferral for Senior Citizens. The proposal embodied in the resolution is that taxes on the homes of citizens over 65 years of age would be deferred and would become a lien on the property at the time of transfer of ownership A state revolving fund would reimburse the temporary tax loss to local government.

The committee believes that this proposal, because of the lien feature, is not a satisfactory answer to this difficult problem

The committee intends to continue to give attention to this problem with emphasis on the advisability of granting a \$1,000 exemption for property owners over 65 years of age for the property and improvements in which they reside, similar to the veterans' exemption.

3 HR 377 (Hawkins)-Standard Assessment Ratio

Richard Nevius of the State Board of Equalization informed the committee that some additional time would be needed to secure a consensus of opinion among county assessors as to a workable formula for establishing uniform ratios of assessed value to full cash value

The committee will give its attention to such proposals as the Board of Equalization and/or the various county assessors may make prior to the 1963 Session

4 HR 284 (Flournoy)—Tar Exemption for Certain Homes for the Aged

The "welfare exemption" set forth in Section 214 of the Revenue and Taxation Code has been extended to exempt the property of several homes for aged persons of the middle to upper income group, under the decision last year in the case of Fifield Manor v County of Los Angeles.

The committee finds that in California some \$10.000,000 in property is now exempt under this ruling and previous court decisions. Taxes lost to local governments are conservatively estimated at \$838,000 annually. Almost one third of this assessed valuation is controlled by Fifield Manor. In e., and the Southern California-Arizona Conference of the Methodist ('hurch (which entered the Fifield Case as amicus cui ae').

The committee will hold an additional hearing on this matter prior to the 1963 Session and will attempt to formulate equitable reform legislation to prevent abuses of the intent of the welfare exemption

5 AB 250 (Pattee)-Sales Tax on Food.

Further refining amendments have been prepared for this bill as a result of a public hearing in Salinas. Under these amendments the sales tax would not apply to food sold to farm laborers by a concessionaire hired by the farmer if the price charged for such food is the same as that price established by international agreement to which the United States is a party under which nationals of another country enter this State to work as farm laborers.

If a bill embracing these qualifying amendments is introduced at the 1962 Session this committee will recommend favorable consideration by the Legislature

6. AB 3147 (Rees)—Possessory Interest Tax

On January 12, 1962, the chairman of the committee, Assemblyman Charles H Wilson, sent a letter to Governor Edmund G Brown personally recommending a special session call on this important item of legislation

This committee concurs in that recommendation and portions of that letter are hereby incorporated as the committee's report on AB 3147, as follows.

On November 7, 1961, the Subcommuttee on Property Taxation held a public hearing in Inglewood on the subject of AB 3147 (Rees). Extensive testimony was heard in favor of this bill. No opposition testimony was offered by any person

The bill adds Sections 107.2 and 107.3 to the Revenue and Taxation Code and relates to the taxation of possessory interests. If passed by the California Legislature, it would have the effect of returning to a permanent basis the taxation of possessory interests in land and improvements that basis of taxation which existed prior to 1956.

The bill does not create an exemption in any way. It simply provides that the private tenant's interest under such a lease shall be valued at its market value determined in accordance with the same standards used for valuing such leases when the same are being taken by the courts in condemnation proceedings

This means that the lease only has a value to its holder to the extent that economic rent on the property in question exceeds the rent being paid to the public body as lessor

This was the rule established for taxation by the California Supreme Court in Blun Lumber Company v. County of Los Angeles, 216 Cal. 474, decided in 1930 It is the rule under which such leases were consistently valued throughout the State of California for tax purposes by county and city assessors for a period of 26 years thereafter

It is also the basis of valuation of similar interests in other states for tax purposes to the extent that they are not, by statute, entirely exempted from property taxation. Even in California the interest of the beneficiary is entirely exempted in the San Francisco Harbor by a special statutory provision.

Public bodies presently engaged in leasing land at harbors and airports, primarily, although this seems also to be the case in certain marinas and other public developments, have strenuously represented to the committee that the effect, since 1956, of disregarding the rental in valuation for tax purposes of these possessory interests has in effect made the leasing bodies pay the taxes instead of private tenants. This seems unfair since, by general provision of the Constitution, publicly owned and used property is exempt from taxation.

Certain extreme instances of hardship at the Los Angeles Airport, at the Long Beach Harbor, and elsewhere throughout the State have been eited to the committee.

The bill has been strenuously supported, not only by the Port Authorities Association of California, but by representatives of public harbor, port and airport managements.

With reference to the detailed provisions contained in the bill, particularly subsections 3 and 4 of paragraph 1, and all of paragraph 2, myestigation by the committee determined that they simply restate the manner in which these possessory interests were successfully as

sessed in Los Angeles County from 1930 to 1956, and during most of that time used in other maritime counties of the State.

§9906 Registration by lobbyists Form and manner of registration Report of receipts and expenditures Application of section Compilation and printing of information (a) Any person who shall engage himself for pay or for any consideration for the purpose of attempting to influence the passage or defeat of any legislation by the Legislature of the State of California or the approval or veto of any legislation by the Governor of the State of California shall, before doing anything in furtherance of such object, register with the Clerk of the Assembly and the Secretary of the Senate and shall give to those officers in writing and under oath, his name and business address, the name and address of the person by whom he is employed, and in whose interest he appears or works, the duration of such employment, how much he is paid and is to receive, by whom he is paid or is to be paid, how much he is to be paid for expenses, and what expenses are to be included. He shall also, at the time of registering, submit to the clerk and the secretary a written authorization from each person by whom he is employed to act m furtherance of such object Such person shall again register at each succeeding general session of the Legislature and again submit at that time the information and authorization required by this subdivision (a), unless he at the time is no longer engaged for pay or other consideration for the purposes hereinabove specified

(b) Each such posson so registering shall, between the 1st and 15th day of each calendar month, so long as his activity continues, file with the clerk and secretary a detailed report under outh of all money received and each expenditure of twenty-five dollars (\$25) or more during the preceiving calendar month in carrying on his work; to whom paid; for what purposes; the total of all expenditures during the preceding calendar month; and the names of any papers, periodicals, magazines, or other publications in which he has caused to be published any articles or editorials; and the proposed legislation he is employed to support or oppose. The provisions of this section shall not apply to any person who merely appears before a committee of the Legislatine of the State of California in support of or opposition to legislation, nor to any public official acting in his official capacity; nor in the case of any newspaper or other regularly published periodical, radio or tele-

vision station (including any individual who owns, publishes, or is employed by any such newspaper or periodical, radio or television station) which in the ordinary course of business publishes news items, editorials, or other comments, or paid advertisements, which directly or indirectly urge the passage or defeat of legislation, it such newspaper, periodical, radio or television station or individual, engages in no further or other activities in connection with the passage or defeat of such legislation, other than to appear before a committee of the Legislation of the State of California in support of or in opposition to such legislation; nor to a person when representing a bona fide church solely for the purpose of protecting the public right to practice the doctrines of such church (Emphasis added)

Use of School Building Aid Funds-No 1758

DEAR MR KILPATRICK.

Question

1 May the Local Allocation Board apportion state school building and funds for the paving of streets contiguous to school sites? 2 May gas tax money allocated to cities be used for such work on local streets?

Opinion

In our opinion the answer to both questions is "yes"

Section 19562 * of the Education Code provides

"19562 In addition to the purposes for which apportionments may be made to school districts under Section 19560, apportionments may also be made to school districts for the construction, repair, attachment or development of off-site facilities, utilities or improvements which the board determines are necessary to the proper operation or functioning of the school facilities for which apportionments are made, all of which purposes are hereby declared to be, and are, public works "

This section, in our opinion, clearly allows the State Allocation Board to apportion state school building and money to school districts for the improvement, including paving, of streets contiguous to school sites. Under this section the State Allocation Board may determine not only whether it will apportion any money whatsoever for the purposes prescribed in the section, but also the amount of money to be apportioned and consequently the extent or scope of the off-site facility, utility, or improvement for which it apportions money.

Section 203 of the Streets and Highways Code allows the expenditure of gas tax money for the construction of a street connected with the school premises on which a school building is constructed with state school building and money when the city requires the construction of the street. The section reads

4203 Whenever a school district constructs a school building for the construction of which any apportionment is made pursuant to Chapter 16 of Chapter 19 of Division 3 of the Education Code and the city, city and county, or county in which such school building is situated requires the construction of any street or road connected with the school premises on which such school building is constructed, the State Allocation Board shall review the requirement and recommend to the governing body of the city, city and county, or county a plan of construction adequate to meet the needs of the school district and the safety of the public. If a different plan of improvement or improvement to higher standards than that recommended by the State Allocation Board is required by the governing body of the city, city and county or county, the additional cost thereof shall be borne by the city, city and county, or county in which such school building is situated Notwithstanding any other provision of this code or any other law limiting the purposes for which money allocated to cities, cities and counties, or counties from the Highway Users Tax Fund or the State Highway Fund may be expended, any of the money so allocated may be expended for the construction of the streets or roads referred to in this section

^{*} Part of the State School Building And Law of 1952 (commencing with Ed. C. Sec. 1993.) which provides for the apporticement of state school building and money to school districts of the Local Allocation Board.

"Nothing in this section shall be construed to require each cost in included in any charge made pursuant to this section to be separately stated"

The word "construction" is defined to mean construction, reconstruction, replacement, or any improvement except maintenance as defined in Section 27 of the Streets and Highways Code (S & H C, Sec 29) The word "maintenance" is defined to include the preservation of roads in the safe and usable condition to which it has been improved or constructed, but does not include reconstruction or other improvement. Hence, Section 203 of the Streets and Highways Code authorizes the use of gas tax money to pave a street connected with the site of a school building constructed with state funds if the paving is a construction, reconstruction, replacement or other maintenance, except a maintenance which merely preserves the road in its pre-existing safe and usable condition.

It should also be noted that, in general, gas tax money can be used by a city for the construction of streets in the system of major city streets and for the maintenance of major city streets and secondary city streets (S & H C. Sec 195)

DEAR ASSEMBLYMAN KILPATRICK Pursuant to your request for current information relative to state tax collections, state subventions and property tax collections, by county, similar to tabulations printing in the Assembly Journal for April 3, 1957, June 8, 1959, and March 25, 1960, we are submitting the following schedules

Schedule 1 shows state tax collections and state subventions for each of the counties, and in total for 1960-61 Subventions are the actual amounts of direct contributions and shared revenues exclusive of allocations or payments from Highway Users Tax Fund to cities shown in the Controller's report. State tax collections represent the following as shown for 1960-61 on page A-40 of the printed budget for 1962-63.

Sales tax collections and personal income tax are allocated by county as these are reported by the respective tax collecting agencies. All other tax sources have been allocated on the basis of population. In the last column of Schedule 1 is shown the relationship between this calculated amount of state tax payments in each county and the amount of state subventions to the county.

Schedule 2 deals with assessed valuations and property tax levies in each of the countres for the 1960-61 fiscal year. The average tax rate expressed in the next to the last column is as reported in the 1960-61 Annual Report of the State Board of Equalization.

Schedule 3 shows counties listed in the order of the percentage which subventions bear to state tax collections in the counties from highest to lowest, as shown in Column 6 of Schedule 1 It also shows the assessed valuation per capita, property tax levies per capita, and property tax per \$100 of assessed valuation, with the rank of each county on the basis of the last named factor, from lowest to highest

HOUSE RESOLUTION NO. 445

Assembly, California Legislature 1961 General Session

Introduced by Mr Charles H Wilson

Relating to an interim study of the financing of the county and city food and street network needs

WHEREAS. The Department of Public Works has reported that a more than 12-billion-dollar deficiency exists on the county road and city street network throughout the State of California, and Whireas, The Legislature has been requested to provide a means of producing revenue to help correct this deficiency, and Whireas, Several methods of producing the needed revenue have been proposed, now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the Assembly of the State of California. That the subject matter of this resolution be referred to the Committee on Rules for reference to the appropriate interim committee or committees, for study and a report to the Legislature not later than March 1, 1962

Read and adopted June 16, 1961

I. SCOPE OF THE REPORT

The subcommittee takes note of the excellent work done by the Division of Highways of the State Department of Public Works in preparing a very thorough and factual report on road and street deficiencies as directed by Senate Concurrent Resolution No 62 of the 1959 Session of the Legislature The subcommittee accepts the statistical findings contained in the "SCR 62 Report" as to existing and projected gross deficiencies in the several counties and cities of the State as factual

At the outset the subcommittee limited itself to consideration of the subject of the need, if any, for additional state assistance through legislation in the field of revenue and taxation, and attempted so far as was possible to avoid consideration of such subjects as the relationship of city streets and county roads to the overall motor vehicle transportation problem, the efficacy of local transportation planning, or priorities as between freeways, collector or arterial streets, and secondary or residential streets

The subcommittee believes that its mandate from the committee, and in turn the committee's mandate from the Rules Committee was limited to the study of additional state financial participation in local road building and improvement projects in the coming years

II. HEARINGS

The subcommittee held two public hearings on the subject matter of House Resolution No. 445 The first was held in the new State Building in Los Angeles on October 12-13 and the second in the State Building in San Francisco on October 25-26

Much of the testimony presented was from officials of local government and was necessarily repetitions in nature. By and large those presenting testimony are to be commended for factual and detailed accounting of present and future financial needs.

The subcommittee was particularly impressed with the presentation of the San Fernando Valley Wide Committee on Streets and Roads, an organization representing chambers of commerce and other community organizations in an area of Los Angeles County which has experienced phenomenal population growth in recent years. Officials of the Valley Wide Committee presented a proposal at the Los Angeles hearings which will be discussed below under "Findings" It was apparent to the subcommittee that these public-spirited citizens had spent many hours of study in preparing the presentation made before our subcommittee, and before other public bodies and private associations.

III. FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1 As of October 31, 1961 there were 8,940,184 motor vehicles registered in the State of California By 1980 it is estimated that more motor vehicles will be registered in the State than there were human inhabitants as of the 1960 federal census. The Legislature has a continuing responsibility to make certain that the system of vehicular transportation is as adequate as we can make it.
- 2 Califorma's highways are generally understood to be the finest in the Nation Our fine highway system is the result of a policy decision made many years ago to devote a major portion of the material resources available to state government to the development and improvement of our public highways. The subcommittee finds that 20.9 percent of the total expenditures by the state government in the current fiscal year is devoted directly to financing highway transportation

Without implying criticism in any way the subcommittee believes that many local governmental agencies have not evidenced to date a similar commitment in the appropriation of revenues presently available to them

In fact, testimony before the subcommittee revealed that there is a lack of uniformity between the 58 countries and the 372 cities (incorporated as of last June) as to the portions of present state subventions of revenues derived from motor vehicle and highway user taxes actually devoted by local governments to road and street construction and improvement.

We believe that it is reasonable for the Legislature to anticipate a more uniform standard of commitment of revenues from both present state subventions and local revenue sources to street and road projects before any additional assistance from the State is considered

3 The proposal made by representatives of the San Fernando Valley Wide Committee on Streets and Roads was that the Legislature authorize local county boards of supervisors to impose by ordinance an annual motor vehicle registration fee of \$10 for each passenger vehicle and from \$20 to \$30 for each truck. This proposed legislative authorization is similar to the present law on the 1 percent sales tax which is imposed by most county and city governments on top of the State's 3 percent tax

We believe that this type of approach should be considered only if requested by a number of county boards of supervisors sufficient to convince the Legislature that the proposal for such a state legislative authorization is widely supported by these governmental agencies Our subcommittee invited representatives of associations of county and city officials to solicit resolutions from boards of supervisors and city councils formally requesting state authorization for a local motor vehicle registration fee.

Only a few such requests have been directed to our attention. The subcommittee must therefore conclude that there is not sufficient interest in this type of approach

Notwithstanding this finding, the subcommittee believes that such a local tax merits additional study

4 The only other specific proposal considered by the subcommittee was that of raising the state gasoline tax. The subcommittee finds that, while a great number of states impose a higher per gallon tax on gasoline than does California, in almost all cases the revenues derived are not devoted as they are in this State exclusively to highway construction and maintenance Further, in no state are the public highways used to such a great extent as in California This State leads the Nation in gallons of gasoline sold per year

The subcommittee believes, however, that the gasoline tax, predicated on the belief that gallons of gasoline consumed can be approximately equated with highway use and that the costs of building and maintaining highways should be borne in proportion to the extent of use, is the most equitable base for revenue for highway, road and street projects

- In considering an increase in the gasoline and diesel fuel taxes we believe that the Legislature should be mindful of the present system of careful state control over the expenditures in state highway projects The subcommittee cannot recommend an increase in these taxes nor the allocation of a greater share of the revenues from these taxes so long as the above cited disuniformity among the counties and cities in the degree of local effort exists
- 5. The subcommittee believes that any increase in state taxes or any increase in the "local share" of these revenues from present taxes would be inadvisable unless the Legislature is prepared to require greater control over the expenditure of such funds, ie, a mandatory standard proportion of local financial contribution as against state contribution in local road and street construction and improvement proj-

ects, a statewide master plan for overall vehicular transportation encompassing freeways, highways, arterial and collector streets, and county roads, and similar state requirements

- The subcommittee believes, to the contrary, that any such imposition of statewide standards and state control over the expenditure of revenues derived from state subventions to local governments would seriously impair the traditional concepts of "home rule" Local governments have only recently given the Legislature evidence of their continued commitment to the "home rule" approach to solving problems which are essentially local in character
- 6 The subcommittee reiterates its belief that, while the State should take an interest at close hand in all aspects of the system of vehicular transportation, the improvement of existing city arterial and collector streets yields a demonstrable benefit, largely economic in character, to the local community which undertakes such improvement projects The economic enhancement that safe and adequate major streets bring to a local community more than justifies, we believe, the public expense involved

7 Specifically, the subcommittee recommends

- a That the Assembly Interim Committee on Revenue and Taxation be empowered to continue to receive and analyze specific proposals from local and state agencies and private persons and organizations on the subject matter of House Resolution No 445 for further report to the 1963 Session.
- b That the subject matter of House Resolution No 445 also be referred to that interim committee of the Assembly competent to make judgments on the complex questions of overall transportation planning, construction priorities, and related questions not directly associated with the subject of new state revenues (but including the subject of revision of the present state-local sharing of present revenues for highway purposes);
- c That the Senate be invited to participate in the continuing study of this subject, perhaps through the creation of a special joint committee consisting in part of the chairmen of the Assembly and Senate committees dealing with highway transportation and the Chairmen of the Assembly and Senate Committees on Revenue and Taxation

INTRODUCTION

On October 29, 1960, the California State Polytechnic College football season came abruptly to an end As the team left a foggy Toledo airport, bound for Santa Maria, its plane crashed, killing 22 of the 48 passengers aboard and mjuring the others

The crash has been called by some the "worst accident involving an American athletic group ''1 It has resulted in tragic loss of life, serious injuries, broken family units and a host of intricate legal complexities

Because of its concern for those affected by the Cal Poly disaster, the Assembly of the State of California requested the Assembly Interim Committee on Judiciary to inquire into the nature of the crash and the problems arising from it 2 This report is submitted in response to that request.

THE CRASH

Transporting an entire football team across the country is, at best, an expensive process, especially for small schools with rather meager athletic funds For its game with Bowling Green State University, California State Polytechnic College officials were quoted a rate of almost \$10,000 by scheduled airlines. Far more reasonable was the \$6,748 70 offer made by Independent Airlines Association, of Washington, DC, which arranges flights for a number of nonscheduled carriers around the Country That Independent Airlines was a responsible firm seemed obvious it had recently received a letter from E R Quesada, then Administrator of the Federal Aviation Agency, which read, in part, as follows:

You have set an enviable goal for the rest of the industry. Your achievement speaks well for the nigid safety standards and careful adherence to the principles of air safety 3

The contract was negotiated with Independent Airlines Association and Arctic-Pacific, Inc., with principal offices in Oakland, California, was designated as the carrier to make the trip. The aircraft to be used was a Curtiss Wright Super C-46F It had been leased by Arctic-Pacific, Inc , from the Barter Island Company, Spenard, Alaska

Flight plans called for the carrier to leave Oakland on October 27, pick up the California State Polytechnic College team in Santa Maria and fly them to Toledo, arriving on October 28 After transporting the Youngstown University football team to and from a game in New Haven, Connecticut, it would return to Toledo and, on October 30, board the California State Polytechnie College group and return them to Santa Maria

On the evening of October 30, the Toledo Express Airport was enveloped in fog All regular air carriers had cancelled both inbound and outbound flights due to poor visibility Shortly before the Arctic plane took off, the weather report was partial obscuration with visibility at zero. Arctic-Pacific, Inc minimums for takeoff from the Toledo Express Airport were 300 feet ceiling and one-mile visibility, or 400 feet ceiling and 3-mile visibility

The pilot of the aircraft, Captain Donald L J Chesher, a man with 6,361 flying hours behind him, debated whether to take the plane up 4

After inspecting the runway, he decided to go ahead The Civil Aeronautics Board describes the events that followed

At 22 01, the aircraft was heard to pass the tower Surviving passengers [felt] a swerve to the right followed by a swerve or violent swerve back to the left during the latter part of the takeoff run These swerves were followed by an abrupt or lurching type takeoff Passengers also described a shuddering or vibration shortly after takeoff followed by a left wing-down, nose-down attitude Passengers aboard the aircraft and earwitnesses positioned on the airport stated they heard perceptible changes in the sound of the engine or engines These witnesses also describe a momentary silence prior to the impact noise. The impact was described by witnesses as a "dull boom." At no time after the aircraft [clashed in] the taxiway had it been seen by any of the personnel on the airport due to heavy fog 5

As the airplane crashed it separated at about the wings. The forward portion cartwheeled for several yards and was engulfed in flames. The rear portion escaped serious damage

CIVIL AERONAUTICS BOARD STUDY

The airplane disaster was studied by the Civil Aeronautics Board. Its findings include the following 6

1 No en route inspections were made of Arctic-Pacific, Inc. by the Federal Aviation Agency during the year 1960 Neither the Operations or Maintenance Federal Aviation Agency Air Carrier Inspectors assigned to Arctic-Pacific, Inc. had inspected the ill-fated carrier during the previous 11 months of operation because of duties with other assigned carriers

2 The left engine of the crashed carrier was an Air Force surplus engine which had been overhauled in 1957 Arctic-Pacific, Inc. purchased the engine in 1960 from a salvage company Pitor to installation on the aircraft, the engine was not adequately inspected internally in accordance with Civil Air Regulations

3 The engine was delivered to Newark Air Service, a certificated repair station, for installation on the aircraft Newark Air Service failed to attest to the "airworthiness" of the engine as required by Civil Air Regulations

- 4 The left engine of the carrier experienced a power loss of some magnitude, either because of engine maloperation, or because the throttles were retarded by the crew in an attempt to get back to the airport, or both. The most likely sources of engine maloperation were
 - a Ground-fouled spark plugs caused by black carbon deposits on them Such deposits result when aircraft engines are groundoperated at low power for a considerable length of time, as these were The majority of spark plugs would have functioned normally, however, had the engines been run up properly just prior to takeoff

b The prevailing weather conditions at the time of the accident—low temperature and high humidity—which could have been conducive to spark plug fouling

c A disconnected intake pipe gland nut

5 The pilot, Captain Chesher, experienced difficulty controlling the direction of the airplane as he was taking off Recognizing his inability to maintain the aircraft on the runway, he had to elect whether to abort the takeoff or make a premature liftoff The decision was made to continue and a premature liftoff resulted

6 The maximum allowable takeoff weight for the aircraft for departure from the Toledo Express Airport was 46,850 pounds. By estimation, the actual weight at takeoff was 48,859 pounds, 1,759 pounds over the maximum gross weight of the aircraft and 2,009 pounds over the maximum allowable takeoff weight at Toledo.

The conclusions of the board were stated, in part, as follows

The board believes that the loss of power caused by the maloperation of engines not properly runup immediately prior to takeoff and the swerring takeoff due to erratic engine performance and poor visibility resulted in a premature takeoff. The pilot was unable to remain airborne due either to a stall condition or a loss of power, or both

The board determines the probable cause of this accident was loss of control during a premature liftoff. Contributing factors were the overweight aircraft, weather conditions, and partial loss of power in the left engine.

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE?

Within hours after the news of the airplane disaster had reached California, many public-spirited citizens were offering financial contributions to those affected by the erash Several funds were quickly established to administer assistance to the needy Citizens from the Bakersfield, California area raised and distributed approximately \$6,000 to the students and their families from Kern County who were involved in the accident A trust fund of \$500 was established by the residents of Paso Robles, California for a child of one of the victims of the erash

The largest source of financial assistance has been provided by the Cal Poly Memorial Fund Established by the administration, alumniand students of California State Polytechnic College on November 2, 1960, it has now been incorporated as a nonprofit corporation in the State of California As of February 3, 1962, total receipts of the Fund, from the Mercy Bowl charity football game and other contributions, totaled \$207,193.75 Disbursements, as of that date, amounted to \$47,-193.75 These were used for the following (1) funeral, mortuary and cemetery expenses, (2) medical expenses not covered by insurance; (3) minimal living expenses for students, or wildows and orphans of students, unable to provide for their own needs or for whom other financial assistance was not available, and (4) emergency needs of those directly involved in the crash

The future of the Cal Poly Memorial Fund is indefinite, due to the uncertainty of future revenues. Its present receipts will enable it to

continue, in some amount, the above-mentioned disbursements. In addition, all known student bills incurred as a direct result of the accident will be paid, and a \$6,000 college scholarship will be established for each child of a student affected by the crash

LEGAL COMPLEXITIES

The serious injuries and loss of life resulting from the airplane disaster have created a host of intricate legal problems Liability for the accident has been alleged against most connected with it. As of this date, however, none have assumed legal responsibility. Thus, a multitude of lawsuits are now pending in the courts.

Arctic-Paeific, Inc, the now defunct airline which carried the Cal Poly group, is named in many of these suits. So are Independent Airlines Association, which arranged the flight, and Barter Island Com-

pany, lessor of the Arctic-Pacific, Inc aircraft

The United States Government which, through the Federal Aviation Agency, is responsible for airplane transportation throughout the Country, has been named as defendant in numerous suits brought under the Tort Claims Act. In addition, several complaints have been filed against the State of California, as principal for the school officials who had a part in negotiating the Toledo trip

The student body association at California State Polytechnic College, the school football coach and various companies servicing the crashed aircraft have been joined as defendants in many of these proceedings

Aretic-Paeific, Inc carried insurance on its carrier with underwriters of Lloyds of London and the British Aviation Agency Both groups have refused to honor any claims on the ground that their policies were void if Arctic-Pacific, Inc operated a carrier which was not "airworthy" The claimants contend that the plane was "airworthy" and, even if it was not, liability exists under the policies if the pilot was negligent in operating the aircraft A declaratory rehef action, in which all plaintiffs and defendants have been joined, is now pending in the federal district court to finally determine these issues.

While the courts prepare to determine where the habilities for the crash lie, other procedures for obtaining compensation are being instituted. Several plaintiffs have filed sizeable claims before the California State Board of Control. In addition, a number of students, claiming to have been employees at California State Polytechine College, have filed for relief under the Workmen's Compensation Law.

FINDINGS AND CONCLUSIONS

The California State Polytechnic College airplane disaster has resulted in loss of life and serious injuries. It has taken men from their families and created severe financial hardships for many. The Assembly Interim Committee on Judiciary is strongly sympathetic to those affected by the crash and hopes that they will, in some way, be compensated for their losses

Upon whom should this burden of compensation fall? Generally, our system of justice places it upon those whose action or nonaction has caused the loss in question. The plaintiffs, quite properly, have

chosen to adjudicate this issue in the courts. Until that action is completed the amount of loss suffered will not be known

The courts could conceivably find that no one is legally responsible for the airplane crash. Should this determination be made, the plantiffs could appeal to their legislative representatives for rehef in the form of a claim by legislative appropriation. The amount of rehef and the circumstances under which it may be given are necessarily questions for future Legislatures. Therefore, the Assembly Interim Committee on Judiciary recommends that no action be taken by the Legislature at this time.

Airplane Crash Compensation-No. 1940

DEAR MR SUMNER You have asked us to discuss the legal problems which would be involved in legislation to compensate survivors and dependents of those killed in the crash of the airplane in October, 1960, carrying the California State Polytechnic College football team

We have assumed that the compensation contemplated is in addition to any rights for damages which the survivors and dependents may have at law House Resolution No 356 of 1961 (Assembly Journal, 1961, p 4934) making the subject of compensation to such persons an item of study for an appropriate interim committee, states as one of the reasons why relief is needed, that "Litigation has not yet provided relief and gives no indication of doing so without expensive and lengthy loss of time and resources." Therefore, we have not considered what rights the survivors and dependents might have in a legal action as a plan to provide compensation for the survivors and dependents, which the survivors and dependents could accept without obligation and without limiting their legal rights against the State

The main problem with legislation of the type contemplated is that it might be characterized as providing for a gift in violation of Article IV, Section 31, of the Constitution However, there is the possibility that this problem may be avoided if the Legislature makes a direct appropriation to the survivors and dependents under the claim bill procedure.

The California Constitution, Article IV. Section 31, prohibits the Legislature from authorizing the making of any gift of public money or other thing of value to any individual, municipal, or other corporation. In California an obligation based only on moral consideration is not sufficient to satisfy this provision (Conlin v Board of Supervisors (1893), 99 Cal 17) However, an appropriation does not violate the gift provision if it is made for a public purpose and is of some benefit

For a discussion of the legal problems involved in a legislative appropriation to compensate those affected by the California State Polytechnic College airplane disaster, see Appendix A, Legislative Counsel's opinion

to the governmental agency appropriating such funds (Patrick v. Riley (1930), 209 Cal 350; Alameda County v Janssen (1940), 16 Cal. 2d 276).

A person who has a claim against the State, the settlement of which is not provided for by law, may present his claim to the Legislature for consideration Under the present legislative claim procedures, the State Board of Control is authorized to examine and adjust claims against the State and, with the approval of the Governor, report to the Legislature such facts and recommendations concerning them as it deems proper (see Gov C, Sees 600 et seq.)

The Legislature may then appropriate funds to the Secretary of the State Board of Control for the payment of such claims (see, e.g., Item 276, Budget Act of 1961) The Secretary may thereafter withdraw this money from the Treasury and pay those claims against the State which the Legislature has approved.

However, it is not necessary that all claims approved by the Legislature be processed through the Board of Control. Section 625 of the Government Code provides

"This article shall not be construed an exclusive means for presenting claims to the Legislature nor as preventing the Legislature from making such appropriations as it deems proper for the payment of claims against the State which have not been submitted to the board or recommended for payment by it pursuant to this article."

Thus, if the Legislature desires to make a direct appropriation for the payment of a claim, it may include the claim in the budget or a claim bill without first submitting the claim to the Board of Control. It should be noted that if this procedure is used, the survivors and relatives of those involved in the air crash would be considered claimants and presumably should, in some manner, make claims against the State.

It is next necessary to consider what types of claims may be approved by the Legislature In the case of Stevenson v. Colgan (1891), 91 Cal 649, a statute made an appropriation for the relief of petitioner and provided that the money paid pursuant thereto should be accepted in full payment of all claims petitioner may have against the State for services or otherwise The act appropriated a sum of money payable to Stevenson, which the State Controller refused to pay. Thereupon Stevenson brought a mandamus action to order the Controller to make payments in accordance with the act. The answer of the Controller alleged that Stevenson had no valid claim against the State of California and that the services and expenditure of money by Stevenson which constituted the foundation of his claim had been made prior to the admission of California as a state. The Controller contended that the appropriation made by the Legislature was intended to be a gift to Stevenson However, none of the facts alleged in the Controller's answer appeared upon the face of the legislation in question. The court declared that in passing upon the constitutionality of a statute it must confine itself to a consideration of those matters which appear upon the face of the law and those facts of which it can take judicial notice. The court declared:

"When the right to enact a law depends upon the existence of facts, it is the duty of the legislature before passing the bill, and of the governor before approving it, to become satisfied in some appropriate way that the facts exist, and no authority is conferred upon the courts to hear evidence, and determine, as a question of fact, whether these co-ordinate departments of the state government have properly discharged such duty" (at p. 652)

While the court declared that if the facts were as alleged in the answer of the defendant the act under consideration should never have been passed, it was not competent for the court to receive evidence to establish such facts and thus to impeach and overthrow a law, which upon its face and independent of proof is presumptively valid (see also Rankin v Colgan (1891), 92 Cal 605)

In the case of Bourn's Hart (1892), 93 Cal 321, the court held invalid a statute making an appropriation to pay the claim of the petitioner where the act showed on its face that he was a guard at the state prison who had suffered the loss of his arm while in the discharge of his duties under the orders of his superior officer, and where the court concluded for the purpose of the decision that the loss of his arm was to be attributed to the negligence of his superior officer. The court declared that the State was under no legal liability in these circumstances and that the Constitution prohibited the Legislature from appropriating funds to pay such a claim.

Following these decisions the practice developed of enacting claim bills which did not contain any statement as to the fact, upon which the claim was based and which showed only the name of the claimant, the amount of the claim and the fund from which the claim was to be paid. The present procedure is to appropriate funds in the Budget Act to the Secretary of the State Board of Control and to designate the fund from which the appropriation is to be paid (see Budget Item.)

276, Budget Act of 1961; Stats 1961, Ch 888)

In the case of Dittus v Cranston (1959), 53 Cal 2d 284, the State Controller, upon the advice of the Attorney General, rejected a portion of the budget item appropriation to be paid to the Secretary of the State Board of Control The appropriation, according to the records of the Board of Control, was to be paid to certain fishermen and fish processing companies. The situation arose out of the enactment of two statutes in 1957. One of the statutes closed certain waters to commercial fishing for shad and salmon (Stats 1957, Ch 960, F & G C, Sec 8670). The other (Stats 1957, Ch 2099, p 3722) declared that it was the public policy of the State to reimburse, where possible, persons whose boats, nets, and other fishing equipment were rendered valueless by the enactment of Section 8670 of the Fish and Game Code Such persons were given permission to file claims with the Board of Control and the board was to make a full report thereon to the Legislature during the 1958 Regular Session. In its opinion the court stated the rule of judicial restraint exercised by courts in passing upon legislation, and reaffirmed the Stevenson case, supra.

to discuss and determine that the purpose of the Legislature in appropriating funds to purchase the property of fishermen and fish processing companies could have been to encourage complance with the law closing the area to commercial fishing. The fact that the court found it necessary to discuss and approve the action of the Legislature in this case raised some doubt as to the extent the court would look at the fact's behind legislative claim bills.

However, in the second case of Dittus v Cranston (1960), 186 Cal App 2d 837 (hearing denied by California Supreme Court January 25, 1961, 186 Cal App 2d 843), the Third District Court of Appeal upheld another claim appropriation enacted by the Legislature to pay the widow of a legislator a sum equal to the amount of salary the legislator would have received if he had finished his term. The court followed the rule of judicial restraint set forth in the first Dittus case However, it rested its decision primarily on the Stevenson case, supra, stating that such case presented a striking parallel to the case before it The respondent urged that the court could take judicial notice of certain facts which did not appear on the face of the law In brief, the facts were that the legislator did not earn the salary paid to his widow and there was no specific legislative authority to pay such salary to her. The respondent, therefore, claimed that the appropriation and the purpose of the Legislature in enacting it was to make a gift to the legislator's widow The court then stated:

"We think it is now apparent that the rule declared in Stevenson v Colgan, supra, is decisive of this case

"Although, as said in Stevenson v Colgan, supra, 'it may be difficult to assign any good reason' for the expenditure of public funds involved 'this does not affect the question of the power of the legislature to so provide, nor authorize the court to declare that the act was enacted in absolute disregard of the constitution'"

Perhaps the reason the court in the first *Dittus* case, involving fishing equipment, felt it necessary to approve the action of the Legislature was because the Legislature had adopted a law stating that the owners of the fishing equipment should be reimbursed by the State (Stats 1957, Ch 2099). In the second *Dittus* case, involving a payment to a legislator's widow, there was no prior enactment containing any reference to facts upon which the claim appropriation was based

From the above review it appears that the claim procedure would be the procedure that would present the least problems since claim appropriations do not include the facts upon which the legislative action is based. It would seem that the claim appropriation could either be made in the Budget Act or by a separate appropriation bill. It could follow a form similar to the claim appropriation made to the Secretary of the State Board of Control (see Item 276, Budget Act of 1961; Stats 1961, Ch 888).

The difficulty with adopting an act, appropriating funds, for example, to "all survivors and dependents of those killed in the airplane crash carrying the football team of the California State Polytechnic College," is that the facts upon which the legislative action is based appear upon the face of the law Where language of this nature is used, the problems

of gift and the adoption of a special law are present (Cal Const, Art IV, Secs 25 and 31, Bown v Hart (1892), 93 Cal 321, Patty v Colgan (1893), 97 Cal 251; Frohlinger v Richardson (1928), 63 Cal App 2001

It also appears that the Legislature should make the claim appropriations directly, as authorized by Government Code Section 625. The State Board of Control should not process these claims since, if the board is used, it would probably be necessary to enact a statute declaring that it is the policy of the Legislature to grant certain funds to the survivors and dependents here involved Such legislative action would be necessary in order to insure approval of the claims by the board Otherwise, the board might consider and deny these claims on the basis that the claimants have an adequate remedy at law. If the Legislature enacts a law stating that it is the legislative policy for the Board of Control to approve these claims, the enactment would, of necessity, contain information or facts to guide the board. The situation would then be similar to the first Dittus case, involving fishing equipment (see Stats 1957, Ch 2099) and a court might find it necessary to consider the merits of the legislative action and to examine the facts behind the claim appropriation

Even if the procedure outlined above is followed, it is impossible to predict what a court would do it claim appropriations to survivers and dependents of the air crash are challenged. It should be remembered that the court in the Stevenson and both Dittus cases has reserved the right to take judicial notice of facts related to the law under consideration. In the Stevenson and second Dittus cases the court decided not to take such notice even though it may have had the facts before it. However, if a situation arises in the future where an appropriation is made which is outrageously against public policy and is clearly a violation of a constitutional provision, the court might decide to take judicial notice of certain facts behind the appropriation or in some other manner declare the appropriation invalid.

However, if the court applies the law as it did m the Stevenson and the second Dittus cases, then an appropriation made directly by the Legislature under the claim procedure would be upheld because the legislative enactment would be valid on its face and the court would not examine the facts behind the law upen which the Legislature's action was based

Early Sunday, October 30, 1960, inquiries were received by the college regarding a "vehicle" by which individuals and organizations could contribute funds to be used for the alleviation of financial distress of survivors and dependents of those killed in the airplane accident on October 29, 1960—the accident involving the Cal Poly football team A committee was established representing the college administration, San Luis Obispo Campus, Kellogg-Voorhis Campus, Alumni Association, the San Luis Obispo and Kellogg-Voorhis Student Bodies Formation of the committee was approved by the president of the college, and the first meeting of the committee occurred on November 2, 1960 At the second meeting of the committee "Criteria for Acceptance and Disbursements of Memorial Funds" were adopted Those criteria have been widely publicized and are included below.

The Memorial Fund Committee was incorporated on June 1, 1961 as a nonprofit corporation in the State of California As such, exemption from State Franchise Tax was approved Minutes of the Memorial Fund Committee and Board of Directors are confidential, however, the fiscal records are open to public inspection

Disbursements

Disbursements from the fund have been made for the following types of expenses: funeral, mortuary and cemetery expenses, medical expenses not covered by insurance, living expenses for those unable to provide for their own needs, living expenses for widows and orphans for whom other financial assistance was not available, emergency needs of those directly involved in the crash.

It had not been planned at the meeption of the Memorial Fund to have to meet medical or funeral expenses. The failure of the airline company to keep its commitment regarding the coverage of all such expenses has imposed a severe hardship on those involved; therefore, the Memorial Fund has been used to alleviate financial distress in these areas.

Plans

There is as yet no definite knowledge of when living allowances can or should be terminated. There is as yet no definite knowledge of when medical emergencies will be discontinued; hence, specific estimates of cost in these two areas cannot be determined Last Apil the Board of Directors of the Fund established the following goals, however, on the basis of the kinds of expenses previously incurred and estimates for the future.

\$75,000 for scholarships for the children involved (approx. \$1500 per year for four years of college education for each child)

60,000 Medical Expenses

35,000 Funeral Expenses

30,000 Individual and Family Maintenance Costs

50,000 Memorial Loan Fund

\$250,000 Total

Based on the experience subsequent to last April, it appears that the estimates for scholarships, funeral expenses and loan funds are realistic. The estimate of need for only \$30,000 for individual and family maintenance costs now appears grossly inadequate. Favorable medical insurance provisions have made it possible now to reduce the estimate for medical expenses to \$40,000 and to increase accordingly the individual and family maintenance allowances to \$50,000.

HOUSE RESOLUTION NO. 321

Relating to the Keeping of State and County Records

House Resolution No 321 of the 1961 Legislative Session, which was referred to this committee for study by the Committee on Rules, asks for a report on the keeping of records in the State Capitol at the 1962 Budget Session, with the remainder of the findings due in 1963

Records in the State Capitol are predominantly legislative records of which there are two types records and correspondence of each member and committee records

The records and correspondence of each member is personal in nature, and the keeping and disposition of such material is solely the prerogative of the member.

Under Joint Rule No 37, records of legislative committees are to be turned over to the office of the Legislative Analyst when the committee has "concluded" its work The question of when a committee has concluded its work and what records should be preserved is one that Legislative Analyst A Alan Post feels probably must be left to the chairman of the committee The Analyst's office does not receive committee records at the completion of each two-year interim, but rather receives the records of the committees on completion of their work over a long period of time

Upon receipt of the records by the Analyst's office an inventory is made of the contents, a receipt is given the chairman for the records, and a permanent index is made for use by the Legislature on request

The records are stored in a vault on the second floor of the Capitol Annex in the offices now occupied by the Legislative Counsel—offices which, when the Capitol was built, were intended for use by the Analyst's staff At the present time, approximately 80 transfer cases of committee materials are stored in the vault—which is about one-half the maximum capacity.

Regarding recordkeeping policies of the administrative agencies within the State Capitol, a program of paper work management and control was instituted during 1961 to clarify responsibility in the creation of maintenance of and disposition of records and to achieve savings in the use of space and equipment

A survey by the Organization and Cost Control Division of the Department of Finance, which was completed in April, 1961, turned up the following figures

"During the fiscal year 1959-60 approximately 25,000 state workers with annual salaries amounting to \$113 million were engaged in producing or handling records on a full-time basis. If we add the time spent by administrative, professional, technical, and institutional personnel in processing records, total personnel costs for paperwork handling would approximate \$200 million.

"The 25,000 full-time paper workers occupy 2,000,000 square feet of office space, with an average annual rental value of \$8 million. This space is equal to four Employment Buildings. In addition, space to house the 600,000 cubic feet of records stored in office files costs more than \$2 million annually. The office space required for these records is equivalent to three Motor Vehicle Buildings.

"The information available on the total file cabinet inventory of the State is incomplete. We have estimated, however, that it would take the equivalent of 80,000 five-drawer letter-size file cabinets to store these records. The cost of these cabinets would amount to approximately \$10 million at current prices. Replacements or additions to the file cabinet inventory cost the State \$250,000 annually. The State's inventory of small office machines such as typewriters, adding machines, and calculators, estimated at \$30 million, requires replacements or additions costing \$3 million per year Rental costs of tabulating machines and electronic data processing equipment currently amount to \$23 million annually.

"State agencies pay approximately \$2 million each year for stationery, commercially printed forms, and small office supplies such as pencils, rulers, staplers, and paper clips Another \$4 million is spent for letterheads, reports, and forms printed by the State Print-

mg Office

"The overall cost of current record-making and record-keeping activities of the state government is approximately \$135 million annually. This is 29 percent of the State's estimated total expenditure for state operations during fiscal year 1959-1960 If the part-time effort of administrative, professional, technical and institutional personnel is included, the total cost would exceed \$200 million"

Subsequently, a new paperwork management program has been instituted and responsibilities for control of records has been divided between three groups—the agency involved, the Department of Finance, and the Secretary of State.

Each agency ·

- 1 Appoints an individual who is responsible for the overall coordination of paperwork management activities in the agency
- 2 Provides effective controls over the creation, maintenance, and use of records in the conduct of current business
- 3 Inventories its records and establishes retention periods for the various types of records
- 4 Disposes of records after approval of disposition schedules by the Department of Finance
- 5 Submits to the Department of Finance such reports as may be required for administration of the program
 - 6 Provides training for records personnel.
- 7. Controls the purchase of new file equipment and ensures that existing equipment is utilized efficiently.
- 8 Co-operates with the Department of Finance in applying standards and techniques designed to improve the administration of the State's paper work management program

In the Department of Finance, the Organization and Cost Control Division:

- 1 Establishes standards, procedures, and techniques for the administration of the program.
- 2 Develops general disposition schedules for classes of records common to most agencies.

- 3 Advises agencies in the techniques of developing a records inventory and establishing retention periods
- ventory and establishing recention periods

 4. Establishes and maintains a forms control program for all state standard forms
- 5 Assists agencies in the installation of systems to manage forms, reports, correspondence, directives, and files.
- 6 Obtains such reports from agencies as may be required to administer the program and evaluate its progress Prepare and distribute periodically a consolidated report on statewide progress under the program
- 7 Assists agencies in controlling the purchase of file equipment and ensures that present equipment is utilized fully.
- 8. Collaborates with the office of the Secretary of State to develop standards for the operation of all state records centers.

The Audits Division .

- 1 Approves disposition schedules submitted by the agencies, provided proper recognition has been given to the administrative, legal, fiscal, and historical or research values of the records
- 2 Reviews agency paperwork management practices, during the course of its regular audit, to determine whether they conform to established standards in SAM
- 3 The Budget Division reviews agency requests for records equipment, personel, and office space in order to determine whether standards prescribed in Section 1640 have been met

In the Office of the Secretary of State,

- 1 Central Record Depository
 - a Provides low-cost records center facilities for the storage and servicing of mactive agency records
 - b In collaboration with the Department of Finance, develops standards for the operation of state record centers
 - e Prepares and submits such reports as may be required by the Department of Finance on the volume, use, rate of records accessions and disposals, and other aspects of the State's records center program
 - 2 Archives
 - a Identifies, preserves, and makes available to the public those records which have enduring value for historical or research purposes
 - b Reviews records disposition schedules to select archival materials

General disposition schedules have been drawn up for a great many records that are statewide in nature and used by all agencies. For example, Form 682, authorization for overtime, is recommended for disposition two years after the Department of Finance audit. For the complete list, see State Administrative Manual Number 1646 1

Where records are not covered by general disposition schedules, agencies are expected to make a decision on the detention period for the records using the following criteria:

1 Administrative uses value and necessity of the record as an administrative tool in carrying out the functions for which the agency was established.

2 Legal requirements: total time a record must be retained to comply with specific statutes or rules of government agencies, or to protect the legal rights and interests of the State.

3. Fiscal requirements total time required for the performance of a variety of fiscal activities, including auditing, collection, and

budgeting

4 Historical and research values identification of records of enduring value which reflect significant historical events and document the administrative history and development of an agency.

The Assembly Interim Committee on Social Welfare has, in the main, consisted of staff work and attendance by individual members of the committee at various public and private agency conferences, work shops and sessions. In addition to traditional interim committee functions, the committee has assumed the responsibility for payment of two members' attendance to the Governor's Commission on Aging, and the Governor's Chuzeus' Committee to review social welfare in California. The objective of this committee is the independent reporting of audit findings which can be effective in aiding the Legislature and the executive branch to establish sound fiscal and administrative policies for state government. It is our behef, as a result of testimony given before this committee, that current financial operations at Squaw Valley State Park are not in the best interests of the State and its taxpayers.

In a 21-month period—April 1, 1960 to December 31, 1961—excess of combined expenditures over revenues at Squaw Valley cost the State \$902,904 California incurs a net loss of approximately \$25,000 on Squaw Valley each month At the same time, citizens using State-subsidized facilities—which are actually controlled by private concessionaires—pay the same pinces as those using private recorts Federal legislation, moreover, may require that the State lose even larger amounts. The attached report contains your committee's review of these problems, as well as recommendations for action

State College Teachers' Salaries-No. 2491

DEAR MR DELOTTO

Question

You ask whether the Trustees of the California State Colleges may adjust salaries of employees of the trustees by classification or merit, or both, once a blanket budgeted amount is provided to the trustees for a fiscal year

Opinion

In our opinion the trustees may do so

Analysis

Section 22607 of the Education Code provides.

"The trustees shall establish and adjust the salaries and classifications of all academic, nonacademic, and administrative positions and neither Section 18004 of the Government Code nor any other provision of law requiring approval by a state officer or agency for such salaries or classifications shall be applicable thereto. In establishing and adjusting such salaries, consideration shall be given to the maintenance of the state colleges in a competitive position in the recruitment and retention of qualified personnel in relation to other educational institutions, private industry or public jurisdictions which are employing personnel with similar duties and responsibilities. The establishment and adjustment of salaries for nonacademic employees shall be in accordance with the standards prescribed in Section 18850 of the Government Code. The trustees, however, shall make no adjustments which require expenditures in excess of existing appropriations available for the payment of salaries."

In our opinion, this provision clearly authorizes the Trustees of the California State Colleges to adjust salaries of its employees so long as the adjustments require no expenditures in excess of the appropriation available for the payment of salaries.

- Dear Mr Unruff In compliance with House Resolution 361, Section 12, the following brief general progress report of the activities of the Assembly Interim Committee on Civil Service and State Personnel is submitted
- 1 This committee has held four two-day hearings during the interim period to date. Following is a list of subject matters and bills which have been studied, together with a short summary of the status of each:
- (a) AB 802 (Hawkins) (Provides that where a civil service exammation is written in part, the weight to be given to the oral phase of the examination together with all other phases of the examination exclusive of the written phase shall not exceed 15 percent of the total weight of the examination) This bill was heard in Los Angeles on February 15, 1962, and further study is indicated
- (b) AB 1340 (Meyers) (Eliminates prohibition against State Personnel Board making salary adjustments which require expenditures in excess of existing appropriations available for salary increase purposes) This bill was heard in San Francisco on March 5, 1962, and further study is contemplated
- (c) AB 1966 (Kennick) ("The California Plan"-Public Employees Representation) Three hearings have been held on this controversial subject; two in San Francisco and one in Los Angeles. Further hearings are contemplated in this regard, and legislation will undoubtedly be proposed after further investigation
- (d) AB 2585 (Meyers) (Workmen's Compensation Includes State Police and State Harbor Police within those persons to whom certain presumptions concerning hernia, tuberculosis, heart trouble and pneumonia apply with respect to injuries on the job, and who are entitled to leave of absence with pay in lieu of temporary disability payments when disabled on the job) Two hearings have been held on this bill; one in Los Angeles, and one in San Francisco It is planned to hold another hearing in Sacramento and legislation is contemplated after further investigation
- (e) AB 3128 (Meyers) (Polygraph tests Provides that no state agency shall demand, require, request or permit any applicant for employment or any employee to submit to or take a polygraph, he detector, or similar test or examination as a condition of employment or continued employment) Two hearings have been held on this very controversial subject and it is planned to study this subject further, after which legislation is contemplated

The following bills which were referred to this committee for study have not been heard to date, but action is contemplated during the remaining interim period:

(a) AB 649 (Z'berg) (Retirement allowances of members of State Employees' Retirement System)

(b) A.B 1337 (Meyers) (Death Benefits under State Retirement System)

(c) A B 2601 (Shell) (Los Angeles Metropolitan Transit Authority—establishment of civil service system)

(d) AB. 3078 (Meyers) (Uniform schedule of penalties for state employees)

In addition, the following subjects which were referred to our committee for study and investigation will be on the agenda during the remaining interim period: H R. 409 (Health Insurance), the hiring of retired employees; and nonmember retirement credit

GENTLEMEN Pursuant to House Resolution No 361, Section 12 (1961) the Interim Committee on Constitutional Amendments herewith submits a summary of its activities for the period June, 1961, through February, 1962

1. Interim Study of Constitutional Amendments

Following the adjournment of the 1961 Regular Session, the Assembly Rules Committee assigned ten (10) constitutional amendments to the Committee on Constitutional Amendments for study during the current interm In addition, AB 3065, relating to ACA 89, was also assigned to the committee for study Budget items relating to public fund investment and constitutional reform were also assigned to the committee.

Assembly Constitutional Amendment No 75 (Carrell) and A C A. 77 (Bane) relating to reapportionment of senatorial districts were assigned to this committee Inasmuch as a special committee to study Senate reapportionment was appointed pursuant to action of the 1961 Session of the Legislature, the Chairman of the Committee on Constitutional Amendments suggested to the Speaker of the Assembly that to avoid duplication with respect to these subjects that the Committee on Constitutional Amendments should not make an independent study on these proposed constitutional amendments until such time as the special committee rendered their report

The subject of public fund investment was included in A.C.A. 45 (Reagan) and A.C.A. 50 (Don A. Allen) and this study is being made by the Joint Senate and Assembly Commutee on Public Investment and Pension Funds appointed pursuant to action of the 1961 Session

The following constitutional amendments which had been heard by the Committee on Constitutional Amendments during the Regular Session of 1961 were assigned for interim study by the Rules Committee to the committees hereinafter designated A C A 28 (Chapel) Judiciary; A C A 31 (Charles H Wilson) Revenue and Taxation, A C A 35 (Pattee) Fish and Game, A C A 43 (Kilpatrick) Revenue and Taxation, A C A 83 (Lanterman) Elections and Reapportionment; and A C A 90 (Meyers) Municipal and County Government

2. Committee Hearings

On January 15 and 16, 1962, the committee conducted hearings in San Francisco relating to the subject matter of A CA. 38 (Francis) and took such subject matter under advisement. It has not as yet been determined whether additional hearings will be held on this subject matter.

On March 6, the committee held a joint meeting in Sacramento with the Assembly Committee on Ways and Means relating to the proposal to submit a Constitutional Amendment repealing Section 4, Article IX of the State Constitution respection the School Land Fund It has not as yet been determined whether additional hearings will be held on this subject

3. Proposed Studies

The authors of A C A. 65 (Charles H Wilson) and A C A. 73 (Don A Allen) have advised the committee that they do not desire to have hearings held upon the subject matter of their respective constitutional amendments

Arrangements are presently being made to hold hearings on the remainder of the constitutional amendments and other items referred to the Committee on Constitutional Amendments for study

2 Synanon, Narcottes Rehabilitation Center, Santa Monica, October 19, 1961

The committee was interested in appraising the work of this privately organized and sponsored narcotics rehabilitation center. We made a personal inspection of the facilities and heard testimony from a number of residents, sponsors, and professional persons who aid the foundation on a voluntary basis.

This foundation offers a unique opportunity to compare the results of rehabilitation efforts in a voluntary program with those made within the Department of Corrections The existence of such a private program also offers valuable possibilities for collecting comparative data on costs

3. Dangerous Drugs, Increased Restrictions

Los Angeles, October 20, 1961

The Governor's Special Study Commission on Narcotics recommended that the same penalities, regulations and controls that now apply to illegal trafficking in narcotics should be extended to illegal trafficking in dangerous drugs. This hearing was held to learn whether this recommendation would receive substantial support from the medical profession. An overwhelming majority of witnesses opposed the recommendation

4. Police Procedures and the Laws of Arrest Sacramento, December 13 and 14, 1961

This hearing encompassed the following subjects: The new Disorderly Conduct Statute; civil liability of peace officers; the use of citations in heu of arrests for certain misdemeanors, arrests later termed detentions; telephone calls for arrested persons; and Section 834a P.C., prohibiting forceful resistance to any arrest—whether lawful or unlawful

5 Minimum Standards for Local Jails

Sacramento, January 15 and 16, 1962

(This was a hearing of the Subcommittee on Custodial Institutions)

This hearing was designed to solicit suggestions from local officials as to possible methods of bringing substandard local jails up to statutory minimum standards

No further hearings are planned on the Synanon Foundation or the increased regulation of Dangerous Drugs

Further hearings are planned on Police Procedures, Laws of Arrest, and Minimum Jail Standards

The Assembly Interim Committee on Education established four subcommittees for the interim period 1961-63 These subcommittees are Public School Finance, Adult Education, Special Education, and Higher Education The following report will describe the activities of each of the respective subcommittees

Because of the number of hills assigned to the committee and the ongoing nature of the school finance study being made, no recommendations as to legislation are made at this time.

There have been 12 meetings of the various subcommittees, approximately 19 more are scheduled.

Subcommittee on Public School Finance

Chairman: Richard T Hanna

Members: Casey, Collier, Flournoy, Porter, Reagan, Winton

Pursuant to House Resolution No 330, the Rules Committee assigned this committee the study of the system of state and local financial support of the public school system

According to this mandate and at the request of this committee, A Alan Post, the Legislative Analyst, is preparing studies in depth on the various aspects of school finance Extensive reports, and in some cases, questionnaires, have been completed and presented at seven meetings to date on the subjects of State School Fund; County School Service Fund, Basic and Equalization Aid Further reports will be presented at public meetings on the subjects of Special Education, Driver Education: Pupil Transportation, Growth Apportionment, Project-connected Pupils; Final Apportionment

The subcommittee is also considering general matters relating to clucation Teachers' Retirement, District Reorganization, the subject matter of Senate Bill 939 (Teachers' Retirement)

Further studies and meetings are projected through July, 1962. There will be subsequent hearings on the recommendations contained in the Legislative Analyst's study, and consideration of the bills and measures assigned to this subcommittee.

Subcommittee on Adult Education

Chairman: Charles B Garrigus

Members: Bruce F Allen, Brown, Hanna, Hegland, Sedgwick, Waldie

Pursuant to House Resolution No 320, this subcommittee is assigned a study of the subject of adult education. There has been special emphasis placed upon determining the need for retraining programs to meet the problem of labor displacement caused by automation and office factors.

The first hearing, in Fresno in November 1961, evidenced a need for improved haison between industry, labor, education and employment. The needs and surfeits of the labor market are not being fully anticipated in the planning of retraining programs.

A second meeting is scheduled in Los Angeles to bring together representatives of labor, industry and the State Departments of Education and Employment This hearing will seek answers to specific questions about the way each group foresces production changes requiring new skills, and their plans for cooperation with the other agencies Further study is necessary before responsible legislation can be considered

Subcommittee on Special Education

Chairman: Carlos Bee

Members: Busterud, Casey, Cusanovich, Elliott, Gaffney

Pursuant to various resolutions and bills, hearings are being held on Divergent Youth Education, Emotionally and Physically Handicapped, Neurologically Handicapped, Aviation Education, Public Speaking Programs and Child Day Care

There is much controversy over the problem of education for the emotionally handicapped, and much interest in the other areas, especially that concerning help to divergent youth at the elementary and junior high school level. Three hearings have been held on a group of measures: A B 2602, A B 2389 and H R 167, all dealing with the divergent youth problem. Three hearings are scheduled to consider. A B 2629 relating to public speaking in the secondary schools, A B 2708 relating to teachers of the mentally and physically handicapped, and the general subject matter of education of emotionally, physically and neurologically handicapped minors.

Subcommittee on Higher Education

This subcommittee has been assigned AB 2240 relating to a State Colleges biennial evaluation; AB 2769 relating to scholarships to the California Maritime Academy; AB 3085 relating to Junior College Boards, and ACR 32 relating to the admission policies of the University of California and the state colleges

The subcommittee met in October of 1961 at the University of California at Los Angeles to hear opinions of the representatives of the educational institutions on the effectiveness of the Master Plan for Higher Education It was clear from this meeting that more time was needed to judge the Master Plan.

Another hearing is planued in September 1962 at the University of California at Davis to again consider progress reports of the institutions and persons charged with the operation of the Master Plan. At that time the new State College Board of Trustees, and the Coordinating Council for Higher Education will have formulated plans. The subcommittee can then, with better perspective, consider recommendations for the 1963 Session of the Legislature

Chairman Sedgwick has scheduled a hearing in July to consider the evaluation of state colleges called for in A B 2240

I. Introduction

By virtue of HR 361, of the 1961 Session of the Legislature, the Assembly Interim Committee on Elections and Reapportionment was created and assigned for study "the subject matter embiaced in the Elections Code, uncodified laws on the same subject, and matters relating to elections and reapportionment."

Subsequently, a number of House resolutions and the subject matter of several unsuccessful bills were referred to the committee for study by the Committee on Rules

In conducting its work, the committee has recognized that the bills and resolutions which have been introduced have resulted from various problems that exist An attempt has been made to study the underlying problem—its extent and magnitude—and then, if needed, proposed solutions to the problem, including but not limited to the particular bill referred to the committee

To date, the committee has held five one-day hearings and an organizational meeting. Two days were spent examining the need for political party reorganization, another two days were devoted to hearing the pros and cons of AB 1263 relating to Communists on the ballot; and one hearing was devoted to voting machines and literacy tests

II. Political Party Reorganization

As a result of legislation introduced by Assemblyman Bert DeLotto in 1961, AB 2312, and referred to this committee, a comprehensive survey into all phases of political party organization is being conducted to determine what, if any, changes are needed in the statutory framework in which the parties operate.

Primary interest to date has been centered on the organization and functions of the county and state central committees, the question of pre-primary endorsements, and the relationship of unofficial and official party organizations

In many areas of California, seats on the Democratic and Republican County Central Committees are going begging There apparently is just not enough citizen interest in scrying on the county committees to inspire people to seek office.

The average voter, thus, as left without any say as to how his party is to be run in the county as he generally has no candidate alternatives on the ballot (Where there are candidate alternatives, however, the situation is not much better. There is virtually no press coverage of the county committee races, the job is not worth, in the eyes of the candidates, the spending of a great deal of money in order to become known to the voter, and the districts are too large to campaign on an individual basis. The result is often, as described by one county committee member, a "lottery" where place on the ballot and designation under the name are all important. There are instances where voters have had definite issues placed before them and candidate alternatives available. Some races in San Bernardino and Santa Clara Counties are examples. Often, too, the various Republican and Democratic clubs play a role in informing the voter.)

In 32 California counties, from 1954 through 1960, candidates exceeded vacancies in only 27 percent of the district races. In 562 districts, 46 percent of the total, there were fewer candidates than vacancies. Yet, even the prospect of becoming a member of the county central committee without a contest failed to attract candidates.

Cumulative, statewide, 5,677 candidates filed for 5,453 seats—and on the Republican side, there were less candidates than vacancies across the board By removing San Francisco County, the same would hold true for the Democrat's

Under consideration as possible solutions to this problem are providing for election of committeemen from a smaller district than at present—possibly by precinct, the appointment of some of the members of the county committees by nominees and unofficial party groups, and making the duties of a county committeeman more meaningful

A related problem involves the timing in the election of both the county committeemen and the state party officers. There is a turnover in both offices after the June primary and while new officers and committeemen are getting accustomed to their duties, a vacuum results. As the campaigns are under way as much as six months prior to this time, this seriously interferes with the work of the party in this vital area.

Julius A Leetham, Chairman of the Republican Central Committee of Los Angeles County, speaking before the committee in Berkeley, observed, "The election of the County Central Committee at the primary necessitates re-organization of programs developed for the general campaign, and shifts and change-overs in party leadership, just at the beginning of the general campaign. Time and energy which should be devoted to the party's candidates must be expended on reorganization which, however innimal, cannot help but disrupt the smooth functioning of political campaigns."

Most of the witnesses presenting testimony to the committee to date have discussed the question of preprimary endorsements-now accomplished in California by voluntary groups, the California Democratic Council and the California Republican Assembly—with the general consensus being that such endorsements are a valuable and necessary part of the political process Speaking before the committee, Dr Joseph P Harris, Professor of Political Science at the University of California. cited the fact that, where no endorsements are made, candidates are often elected because of a similarity in name to a well-known figure or other factors extraneous to the candidate's ability. In addition, an endorsement is only valuable when it carries some weight with the voters Otherwise it becomes a liability and as long as the California primary is open to all comers it cannot be abused, according to Professor Harris

Speaking in opposition to preprimary endorsements, Mr Vincent Monroe Townsend, 38th Congressional District Director of the Repubhean Assembly, declared they violate the spirit of the direct primary

and should be curtailed

The committee is also studying a number of secondary topics related to political party reorganization

III. Assembly Bill No. 1263

At the present time California law prohibits from the ballot any party which advocates the overthrow of the government by force or violence The existing law, which is Section 6431 of the Recodified Elections Code, reads as follows: "No party shall be recognized or qualified to participate in any primary election which either directly or indirectly carries on, advocates, teaches, justifies, aids, or abets the overthrow by any unlawful means of or which directly or indirectly carries on, advocates, teaches, justifies, aids, or abets a program of sabotage, force and violence, sedition or treason against, the government of the United States or of this State "

Assembly Bill No 1263 would name the Communist Party specifically within this statute Prior to 1953, the law was worded in a similar manner but was declared unconstitutional by the California Supreme Court by Communist Party v Peck in 1942 More recently a Legislative Counsel's opinion, cited by Assemblyman Robert W Crown at the October 6, 1961 meeting of the committee, declared that AB 1263 would be held unconstitutional by the courts

Proponents of the bill feel that the court would not adhere to the principle of stare decicis and uphold a new law on the subject as constitutional They note that the USSR was an ally of our government in 1942 and cite decisions and statutes since that time which have found the Communist Party to be an agent of a foreign power seeking to overthrow the government of the USA

Also pointed out is the fact that, in Black v Cutter Laboratories the Communist Party was not considered to be a legitimate political party Further, the proponents point out that under the present statute the finding would have to be made based on evidence that the Communist Party definitely falls within existing Code Section 6431 Under the bill they feel all that would be necessary is to show that the Communist Party was participating and this would be illegal per se

Opponents of the bill pointed out that the bill is unconstitutional and that current law has successfully kept the Communist Party off the ballot. In order to qualify for a place on the ballot, a party must file a petition in which voters equal to 1 percent of the vote in the last gubernatorial election declare their intention to affiliate with the party. Even if the party could muster 44,000 people who would be willing to state that they were Communists, the party still could not qualify for the ballot as Section 6431 would preclude any such eventuality In addition, they note no Communist identified on the ballot as such has ever been elected to office in California. It is more likely that Communists will disguise themselves and run under other party labels —a situation which A B 1263 aids and abets Recent federal legislation, they argue, did not make membership in the Communist Party a crime but simply required that they register as agents of a foreign government and outlawing the party by name is ineffective because all the party has to do is change its name if it wants to attempt to run a slate of candidates.

It is doubtful that any legislation on this subject will be proposed by the committee for action at the 1963 Session of the Legislature for the reason that the proponents are taking the issue directly to the people in the form of an initiative constitutional amendment. The vote of the citizens at large would then be controlling, one way or another, providing the proponents can get enough signatures to qualify for the ballot.

IV. Miscellaneous

Among other items considered by the committee thus far are: a proposal for mandatory use of voting machines in all but California's two smallest counties; a measure which would require literacy tests at the time of registration; a technical change in the registration of former aliens, and a proposed addition to the nonprofit corporation law relating to political corporations

These subjects have all been taken under advisement by the committee and a complete report will be made to the 1963 Session of the Legislature.

Six subcommittees of the Finance and Insurance Committee have conducted a total of seven public hearings to date

Three inquiries have aroused such wide interest that the committee will publish a preliminary report this spring in order to make its findings a matter of record. The subjects to be covered in the report include fire insurance, land sale contracts and the Cal-Vet insurance program.

insurance

A. Fire Insurance

The General Insurance Subcommittee has conducted two public hearings on the fire insurance surcharge prescribed for property owners in three mountainous areas of Southern California by the Pacific Fire Rating Bureau.

No further hearings are planned but developments are being watched closely in view of the probability that legislative recommendations will be made to the 1963 Legislature.

B. Cal-Vet Insurance

On July 14, 1961, the Assembly Rules Committee gave this committee jurisdiction over the insurance program of the Department of Veterans Affairs by virtue of the reassignment of the subject matter of two bills (AB 2926 and AB 2927) for interim study. Accordingly, a Subcommittee on Veterans Mortgage Insurance was appointed and on October 17 a public hearing on the fire and hazard insurance agreement with the National American Insurance Company was held in San Francisco.

Primarily because the current five-year agreement is between the DVA and one insurer (in contrast to the 238 insurance companies participating in the previous agreement) it has aroused some controversy. The hearing gave both sides the opportunity to present their

views in detail before the committee and the committee has obtained an Attorney General's opinion on the legal issues involved

Although no further hearings are planned, the committee's interest in the matter continues

C. Health Insurance

House Resolution No 390 authorizes a broad investigation into the cost, availability and quality of service rendered under all types of prepaid health programs On January 30, 1962, the Subcommittee on Prepaid Medical Care conducted a public hearing on a number of subjects in this field. The subject matter of Assembly Bills Nos 568, 569, 570 and 2083 was given particular attention at that time

Study in this field indicates that serious instances of misrepresentation and fraud have occurred and are likely to occur with regard to nonprofit health service organizations as a consequence of the total lack of regulation and/or scrutiny by the government. The committee will probably recommend corrective legislation.

D. Automobile Insurance

A study of the cost and availability of Public Liability Coverage, as well as an inquiry into charges of discrimination and arbitrary cancellation, will be undertaken later this year.

E. Miscellaneous Insurance Problems

The committee has had assigned to it several matters, such as insurance producers' beenses, for interim study. These will be considered subsequent to the 1962 Budget Session

A. Workmen's Compensation

Several problems in the field of workmen's compensation were referred to the Finance and Insurance Committee for interim study On December 12 the Subcommittee on Workmen's Compensation held an exploratory hearing on the subject of rehabilitation Draft legislation, based largely on A B 278 of the 1961 Session, provided the basis for discussion. Judging from the wide divergence of views on the draft, further hearings will be necessary before the committee can make its final recommendation. In the course of these hearings attention will be given to the other items referred to this committee through the Rules Committee.

B. Unemployment insurance

HR 420 authorizes a study of a number of facets of the Unemployment Insurance program (e.g., the role of merit rating, attachment to the labor market, increased participation of women and retired persons in the labor market) In addition, HR 421 calls for a study of the feasibility of including agricultural workers in the program These studies will be consummated in the next several months

Finance A. Land Sale Contracts

A hearing by the Land Sale Contracts Subcommittee was held in Richmond Several hundred home buyers in Contra Costa, Napa, and Solano Counties were placed in a distressed condition due to the failure of the fee owner of the properties to forward payments to holders of encumbrances against the properties.

AB, 856, AB, 1607 and 1608 and AB 2179, which were assigned to Finance and Insurance for interim study by the Rules Committee were considered in light of the testimony regarding the distressed tracts.

Further hearings on this method of selling real property may be scheduled

Legislation is necessary to give adequate protection to home buyers purchasing by means of land sale contract financing. Bills will be prepared for the 1963 Regular Session.

B. Sale of Trust Deeds

In order to assess the effectiveness of the Real Property Securities Dealer Law a hearing was held in San Francisco on November 30

The Subcommittee on Trust Deeds heard testimony on the need for liceusing appraisers of real property and the necessity of regulating trustors who are actively engaged in the buying and selling of real property on which they borrow money.

Additional hearings of the Trust Deed Subcommittee may be held prior to preparing amendments to the omnibus Real Property and Real Property Securities Dealers Law (AB 1344) enacted in 1961

C. Construction Financing

Data has been collected relative to contract retention practices by prime contractors of homes and buildings. In general the allegation has been made that the interim retention of 10 percent of the amount owing the subcontractor or material dealer has shifted the burden of financing from the prime contractor to the subcontractor.

Hearings scheduled for this summer will study the problems relative

to hen laws, trust funds and bonding

D. Lending Institutions

The committee is in the process of compiling the responses made by savings and loan associations to a letter sent by the committee requesting schedules of fees and charges and the criteria to be used in arriving at the size of the fee to be charged on home purchase and home construction financing

A hearing on the above subject is not contemplated at this time

Assigned to this committee for interim study were 15 items on specific subjects—11 House resolutions, one Assembly concurrent resolution and three Assembly bills for which resolutions were not submitted In addition, Assembly Joint Resolution No 7, of a general nature, was assigned this committee.

The committee held a one-day organizational meeting on August 22, 1961, at which all items before the committee were reviewed and priorities for committee attention established. Six of the 15 specific items before the committee were judged to be related to AJR 7. Thus, study of AJR 7 involves study of six separate items. During the period covered by this report, the committee has studied 7 of the 15 items assigned to it. Three hearings were held and the subjects and preliminary findings are summarized below.

Problems of Commercial Fisheries—A J R. 7 (H.R. 333, H.R. 360, H.R. 362, A.B. 535, A.B. 536, A.B. 1314)

The problems of commercial fisheries in California are not easily summarized In the simplest terms, there are three outstanding conflicts: (1) domestic vs. foreign industries, (2) commercial vs. recreational fishing, and (3) commercial and recreational use vs. military use of ocean space. Only the second of these is within the full responsibilities of this committee.

The committee held a hearing, September 28, 1961, in Long Beach on Southern California Ocean Space Conflicts, which aimed at unravelling the specific nature of conflict among types of boats, types of

gear, types of fish sought and fishing area restrictions

Realizing, however, that solution to many of the problems of commercial fisheries in California are of an interstate, state-federal, or international nature—and therefore outside the scope of this committee's activities—the chairman and the consultant traveled to Washington, D.C., in August 1961 to encourage federal attention to the problems This trip was instrumental in precipitating a hearing in California by the Subcommittee on Merchant Marine and Fisheries of the US Senate Interior and Insular Affairs Committee. The hearing was chaired by Senator Clair Engle; the subject was Problem of Declaring Pacific Fisheries.

Much excellent testimony was presented by members of the scientific community Informed sources have intimated to this committee that new federal legislation will be proposed at the 1962 Session of Congress Information from the Senate hearing and from this committee's hearing in Long Beach should result in a comprehensive report on those aspects of the total fisheries problem which he in state jurisdiction. However, another hearing by this committee will probably be necessary sometime during the summer of 1962 and no statement on the desirability of new state legislation can be made at this time

II. Status of Salmon and Steelhead on the North Coast-H.R. 241

California has long been famous for its anadramous fish resources—primarily the King Salmon and Steelhead They compose a major part of the State's sport fishery and the commercial fishery is not inconsequential Because the most critical portions of the fishes' life cycle are spent in fresh water, their populations have been severely affected by the State's economic progress—dams, mining, logging, irrigation, pollution and so forth

A noticeable decline in anadromous fishes has occurred Concern over this matter prompted the second of the committee's hearings during this interim. The hearing, entitled Status of Salmon and Steelhead on the North Coast, was held in Crescent City on October 10, 1961. Much useful testimony was presented by the Department of Fish and Game, local officials and citizens, the Regional Water Pollution Control Board, and the U.S. Forest Service.

The committee finds this problem increasingly acute Certain legislation now on the books, particularly AB 261, which provides for consideration of fish and game and other recreational resources within initial project costs for dams and related water developments, open ways for mitigating the present trend. However, much more comprehensive planning will be required before these means may be implemented. The present policy of piecemeal alleviation of anadromous fish losses can only lead to the total loss of this valuable resource.

Accordingly, the committee's consultant has undertaken a comprehensive review of present policies and the directions which new and needed planning must take It is likely that further legislation will be recommended

III. Fish and Game Commission-H.R. 367, H.R. 307, H.R. 369

Three items relating to the Fish and Game Commission were referred to this committee for interim study

House Resolution No 367, introduced by Assemblyman Pattee, would instigate a constitutional amendment to abolish the present Fish and Game Commission and replace it with a Joint Legislative Commission.

The other two resolutions were introduced by Assemblywoman Davis at the request of the Associated Sportsmen (1) to have the director of the Department of Fish and Game appointed by the commission rather than by the Governor, (2) to have the Fish and Game Commission hold certain additional hearines in setting the fish and game policies as they apply to seasons and bag limits

A subcommittee of this committee was appointed to study these proposals and Assemblyman Pattee assumed its chairmanship. The sub-

committee held a hearing in San Francisco on December 6, 1961, which generated considerable interest in the press

The subject of this hearing differed significantly from the subject matter of other hearings of the committee in that it dealt primarily with policy.

Opinion at the hearing was unanimously opposed to aboushment of the commission. It was about equally divided on the proposal to change the responsibility of the director of the department and was generally in favor of the proposal to increase the number of the commission's meetings. It is likely that new legislation will be recommended in regard to the contents of H R 369.

IV. Deer Management

In light of the long-standing controversy over the Department of Fish and Game's policy of management of California deer herds, the committee undertook a recount of the returns of deer tags from the 1961 season. The department's figures have been questioned on a number of occasions from outside, though not disinterested, sources

We found no significant discrepancy (none greater than one-half of one percent—attributable to human error in counting) in the total number of tags. However, the committee questions the breakdown of total take by deer management units and intends to investigate further It could be that perhaps new legislation may be presented on this subject at the next general session.

V. Future Plans of the Interim Committee

Three items related to AJR 7 and five other items remain to be heard before the committee We estimate that at least four more hearings and possibly seven will be required for adequate treatment Funds permitting, these hearings will be scheduled as soon as possible after the 1962 Budget Session

Chairman Mrs Davis feels it mandatory that the committee receive recognition for adequate funds in order to be able to employ a consultant well-versed in the field of fish and game. She feels that the Office of the Legislative Analyst is of no help to the committee due to a continual turnover in staff and that they cannot, therefore, give proper evaluation of the budget of the Department of Fish and Game

The Department of Finance does not have a specialist in this field and suce the federal moneys forthcoming from Dingell-Johnson and Pitman-Robertson are allocated according to federal law and expended at the discretion of the Department of Finance and the Director of the Department of Fish and Game, and since a great amount of money is involved, Mrs. Davis feels it would be wise for a private firm of accountants, solely responsible to our Fish and Game Committee, to make an accounting of the books of the Department of Fish and Game Therefore, consideration must be given in the budget for such a contract

PROGRESS REPORT OF THE ASSEMBLY INTERIM COMMITTEE ON GOVERNMENT ORGANIZATION

June 1961-March 1962

I. Introduction

The Assembly Interim Committee on Government Organization was created by House Resolution No 361 of the 1961 Legislature to study "the subject matter embraced in the Government Code relating to State Government, uncodified laws relating thereto, laws relating to alcoholic beverage control, liquor law enforcement, and borse racing, and other matters relating to the organization and operation of State Government."

Three two-day hearings have been held to date—two on the subject of architectural competitions and the work of the California State Division of Architecture Background material has been collected on the other topics assigned to the committee for study, and hearings will be held when time and funds permit On the subject of horse racing—a topic on which the committee has accumulated considerable information—we have delayed any hearing on the subject until the California Horse Racing Board comes to a decision on the question of granting thoroughbred racing days to Los Alamitos Race Track

11. Architectural Competitions and the Division of Architecture

In studying legislation by Assemblymau Thomas M. Rees calling for architectural competitions for certain classes of buildings, the committee held a two-day hearing on the subject—one at San Jose State to get a close look at buildings designed and built under the direction of the Division of Architecture and one at Berkeley to examine similar buildings produced as a result of architectural competitions

At San Jose State, the committee discovered that a million dollar library unit designed by the Division of Architecture and opened in 1956 is now closed because the floors have developed a sag of up to 23 inches in places. It was estimated that over one hundred thousand dollars would be needed to repair the structure. Mr. Charles Herd, Chief Construction Engineer of the Division of Architecture, testified that the division wasn't sure what caused the sagging but was studying the problem, as they didn't want to make the same mistake again.

After touring the campus, Assemblyman Rees noted that almost every major building built in the last four years had major cracks in the concrete and that Centennial Hall-a classroom building-was a potential disaster area due to poor planning on the stairways.

Dr Richard Tansey, Professor of Art History at San Jose State, told the committee that the new art building was a botched job and not

functional

At Berkeley, Dr William Wurster, Dean of the College of Environmental Design and a nationally renowned architect, explained the role of the architectural competition in developing the University of California He observed that the first competition held in 1899 and 1900 put the University on the map and "gave it an international status that it never would have had otherwise" Recent buildings at the University developed as a result of competitions are the Student Union and Residence Halls.

III. Alcoholic Beverage Control

Several problems relating to alcoholic beverage control have come to the attention of the committee. One major problem is the fact that the costs of liquor licenses when transferred are continuing to rise For the first six months of 1961, the average transfer cost of an off-sale license was \$11,536; for the last six months of 1961, the average transfer cost was \$14,198.

Counties in which licenses are transferred for substantial sums are those to which licenses cannot be transferred under present intercounty transfer provisions Yet, there are a number of related factors which make one license in a county much more valuable than others. One of the causes for the increase in the transfer price is the fact that there are not enough licenses available to meet the demand

Several suggestions to solve the problem were proposed Alcoholic Beverage Control Director Malcolm Harris proposed a prohibition on the transfer of a license that was not connected to a business.

Other proposals forwarded were to prohibit all transfers and provide for the issuance of unlimited licenses at the state level; to prohibit the issuance of new licenses and provide for a free flow of intercounty transfer of licenses; and to prohibit chain stores from holding any more liquor licenses

The Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control indicates that a problem in enforcing the current law regarding Alcoholic Beverage Control violations exists Some licensees are continuing to violate the provisions of the ABC. Act time and time again, and there is no method by which the department can take action to get compliance. The situation arises when the department revokes or suspends a license and the licensee appeals the decision to the courts. While the appeal is pending, which is often a matter of years, the licensee continues to violate the law. The problem is particularly acute in the fair trade areas.

Several other matters relating to alcoholic beverage control are also under study, including the definition of "university" for the purpose of the exclusionary limits around campuses, ambiguous language relating to the order of a parent, fines based on the volume of business, and problems of licensees who remain open after hours for activities other than serving food.

Dear Speaker Unruh In compliance with your request I respectfully submit herewith a brief summary of the activities to date of the Assembly Interim Committee on Governmental Efficiency and Economy A separate record of attendance for members is attached

To date this committee has held hearings and made studies concerning eight items of legislation refeired to it by the Rules Committee. Four field studies have been made Numerous conferences have been held with federal, state and local agencies, including the California Attorney General, Real Estate Commissioner, Corporation Commissioner, State Planning Office, State Building Standards Commission, Urban Renewal and Community Redevelopment agencies, and many civic, labor, professional, and community organizations

A major interest of this committee since July, 1961, has been the study of subdivision practices, both in-state and out-of-state. In cooperation with the California Real Estate Commissioner, and the Oregon and Nevada Real Estate Commissions, as well as County Extension Service officials and local businessmen, a subcommittee and staff field trip of several days was made to study the laws and representative land promotions in those two states in addition, the chairman and staff together or separately have made on the spot studies of numerous subdivisions in Kern, Los Angeles, San Bernardino, Riverside and Imperial Counties

As the result of this work to date, the Cahfornia Real Estate Commissioner has expanded and strengthened the highly important subdivision public report, issued a number of new regulations, and secured from the Attorney General a formal opinion enabling the use of broad powers under the 1955 Subdivision Act untouched prior to this time. In addition, voluntary action by both subdividers and mass media has been pledged toward raising standards in land sales and advertising. I expect to hold additional hearings on this general subject.

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Studies Concluded

Studies have been concluded on H.R. 245, A.B. 3006, H.R. 136, and H.R. 304, One more hearing in the general field of Employment Train-

mg and Economic Development is contemplated at the present time. The committee will have legislative proposals for consideration for recommendation to the Legislature These would be in addition to any preliminary recommendations.

Preliminary Findings

The committee's investigations in the fields of employment training and economic development have necessarily ranged over a variety of subjects, all of vital public concern These include unemployment, retraining of workers, the youth employment problem, school "dropouts," relationship of employment to delinquency, minority group problems relating to employment training and unemployment, public school employment training facilities, private employment training institutions, the physically and mentally handicapped and their employment problems, and the technological displacement of workers, and automation

The committee has found that federal appropriations for vocational rehabilitation have increased at an accelerated rate while state appropriations have increased at a slower rate. This fiscal year approximately \$1,860,000 in federal funds is available to California but cannot be matched. Next year the figure will be \$3,100,000 with the prospects of a further increase the year following. To match the money would require approximately 49 percent state matching.

A major concern of the committee has been automation and technological change in general, their economic and social impact, and their relationship to legislative and general governmental responsibilities. Automation may be leading mankind toward a golden age, but without proper safeguards it could produce serious social and economic disturbances in the process. Its effects have already been serious. While the committee has compiled considerable information from testimony of witnesses on this subject, which will be digested in its final report, it believes a more thorough and concentrated study should be made by a special subcommittee of the Industrial Relations Committee on this subject.

Preliminary Recommendations

While its final recommendations will not be submitted until its studies have been completed and the final report submitted, the committee does wish to make the following preliminary recommendations:

- 1 That the Assembly create a Subcommittee of the Industrial Relations Committee on the subject of automation, such committee to consist of five members to be appointed by the Chairman of the Industrial Relations Committee, including one to be designated by him as chairman
- 2 That the Legislature adopt a joint resolution memorializing Congress to enact legislation providing for funds to the states for employment training programs similar to S 1991, the "Manpower Development and Training Act of 1961," now pending in the Congress of the United States
- 3 That the Governor place on special call—and a bill be enacted—to make possible the utilization of unmatched federal funds in the vocational rehabilitation budget for the purpose of providing vocational rehabilitation services to young and handicapped adults in special classes in public schools.

- 4 That consideration be given to providing additional matching funds for federal funds for the vocational rehabilitation of handicapped persons
- 5 That the Governor place on special call and a bill be enacted permitting the State to use Short-Doyle Act moneys received from counties to match federal funds available to the State, but not being used at the present time, for the vocational rehabilitation of mentally handicapped persons
- 6 That SB 20 of the 1961 Regular Session, be broadened to extend its exemptions to persons certified by the Bureau of Vocational Rehabilitation of the Department of Education during the processing prior to their actually receiving vocational training

1. Committee Organization

Pursuant to House Resolution No 228, Chairman Edward E Elliott of the Assembly Interim Committee on Industrial Relations appointed the following members of the full committee to constitute the Assembly

Interim Subcommittee on Industrial Safety · Edward M. Gaffney (Chairman), George E Brown, Jr., Lou A Cusanovich, W. A. "Jimmie" Hicks, and John T. Knox. At the request of the subcommittee chairman, the full committee secretary and consultant have acted in staff capacities for the subcommittee.

Introduction

During the first nine months of the 1961-62 interim period, the Assembly Interim Committee on Judiciary undertook a heavy schedule of activity Six days were devoted to public hearings at which intense consideration was given to eight subjects. In addition, various bits of background information were submitted to the committee members to be read and digested in preparation for the hearings.

The following are those subjects which the committee has specifically devoted its attention to thus far Unless otherwise noted, no further hearings on these matters have been scheduled. They will be considered by the committee, however, at a series of executive sessions to be held during the coming months.

1. Pre-trial Conferences

Section 575 of the Code of Civil Procedure allows the Judicial Council to promulgate rules governing pre-trial conferences in civil cases arising in superior and municipal courts. Pursuant to this authority, the Judicial Council has required mandatory pre-trial conferences in all civil cases in superior courts except cases requiring less than two hours to try and trials de novo upon appeal from a justice or small clams court.

The Judicial Council rule has met with strong opposition from some segments of the bench and bar who argue that, while a pre-trial conference is conducive to the efficient administration of justice in some cases, it is not so in all cases. These groups conclude that pre-trial conferences should be made discretionary with the parties involved in the dispute or the judge trying it and that legislation should be enacted to this effect.

AB 1745 (Z'berg), introduced at the recent session, provided for discretionary pre-trial conferences. Failing passage, its subject matter was referred to the Judiciary Committee for interim study

A hearing was held on the matter in September It took place in Monterey in conjunction with the State Bar Convention and the Conference of California Judges Convention Testimony was taken from members of the bench and bar, who represented both points of view on this subject

The California State Bar and the Judicial Council are now attempting to reach a mutually acceptable compromise regarding the pre-trial conference problem. This would be done by amending the rules for the superior courts, which are promulgated by the Judicial Council. The Judiciary Committee plans to review the compromise agreement before determining whether legislation is needed in this area.

2. Judges' Retirement Provisions

At each general session, the Legislature is confronted with bills relating to judges' retirement. Generally, these bills propose to alter the conditions and manner in which a judge can become eligible for retirement benefits

Because of the depleted condition of the Judges' Retirement Fund and the need for uniformity in its provisions without regard to individual situations, the subject matters of most of the judges' retirement bills introduced at the past session were referred to the Judiciary Committee for interim study.

At a hearing in September, a representative of the Conference of California Judges testified that extension of judicial service credit for nonjudicial service is creating a serious overdraft in the Judges' Retirement Fund. It is contemplated that legislation will be introduced at the next general session to correct this problem

3. Judges' Salaries

California is among a minority of states which stagger the salaries of judges in major trial courts upon a population basis. Some have questioned whether population is an equitable and logical criterion upon which to base the compensation of our superior and municipal court judges. Accordingly, the subject was scheduled for interim study by the Judiciary Committee.

At the September hearing, the Conference of California Judges took the position that no change should be made in the present law staggering the compensation of superior and municipal court judges. They reasoned that judges in superior and municipal court districts with smaller populations are, in effect, "part-time" judges, and that to pay these individuals the same as "full time" judges would be inequitable

Since there seems to be a correlation between the population of a superior or municipal court district and the man hours required of a judge in that district, no legislation altering the present salary schism in those courts is contemplated

4. Adoptions

During the recent session, numerous pieces of legislation concerning adoption law were introduced Private and county adoption agencies, the State Department of Social Welfare, the State Bar and various citizens interested in adoption procedures participated in the formulation and discussion of these measures After extensive hearings, the subject matters of most of the bills were referred to the Judiciary Committee so that a thorough and complete interim study might be undertaken

Hearings on this matter were held in San Francisco, in November, and in Los Angeles, in January Many pages of transcripts are now filled with conflicting arguments concerning our present adoption laws and the interpretation of them

Because of the complexities involved in this area, and the diametrically opposed positions of many who are involved in the adoption field, the committee has not, as yet, determined whether legislation is called for Much additional time will be devoted to this subject during the committee's forthcoming executive sessions

5. Interlocutory Decree of Divorce

A B 207 (George A Willson), introduced at the past legislative session, would have reduced the interlocutory period of divorce in California from one year to three mouths. The measure, which failed passage, is based upon the premise that California's present waiting period is not realistic and, instead of being in the public interest, actually encourages immorality. This subject was referred for interim study by the Judiciary Committee so that a thorough exploration of all its ramifications could be made.

The subject was considered, along with adoption law, at the committee's November and January hearings Members of the bench and bar, academicians involved in the field and interested citizens presented their views at that time

As with adoptions, the interlocutory divorce waiting period involved exceedingly complex policy problems. For this reason, further study in executive session will be needed before the advisability of legislation can be determined.

6. Compensation of Jurors

At the recent legislative session, A B 493 (O'Connell) was introduced and heard by the Assembly Judiciary Committee. The purpose of the bill was to encourage service on junes and would have required the employer to assume the cost of jury service by allowing the employee time off for jury duty without loss of pay. Because the question of who should assume the financial burden of jury duty presents a farreaching policy problem, and a possible constitutional issue, the subject was referred for interim study.

This matter was considered at a hearing on February 7 Representatives from employer and employee groups presented testimony to the committee It has not, as yet, been determined whether legislation relating to this problem will be introduced at the next general session

7. Marriage Powers of Judges and Other Civil Officials

At the recent session, the Judicary Committee was confronted with proposals to allow retired judges to solemnize marriages, to permit other evil officials, such as county clerks and court commissioners, to conduct the marital ceremony, and to amend the law governing the times during which judges can collect fees for performing marriages. As the hearings progressed, doubt was laised in some members' minds as to the wisdom of allowing increased secular certification of what many consider to be an essentially nonsecular occasion. Further, the committee questioned whether performance of a civil marriage should be a service

for which payment can be exacted. For these reasons, the subject matters of most of the measures were referred for interim study

The proposals were considered by the committee at its February 7 hearing Support for them by the bench, bar and interested citizenry was almost negligible. It has not been determined whether legislation will be introduced on these matters at the next general session

8. California State Polytechnic College Airplane Disaster

On October 29, 1960, an airplane carrying the California State Polytechnic College football team crashed in Toledo, Ohio Twenty-two of the 48 persons aboard were killed, including 16 players and a student manager. The remaining passengers were injured, some so seriously that they have not yet recovered. The crash has been called by some the worst accident involving an American athletic group

Because of its concern for those affected by the Cal Poly disaster, the Assembly requested the Judiciary Committee to inquire into the nature

of the crash and the problems arising from it

The committee, after studying the disaster, submitted its report to the Assembly on March 9, 1962 Since legal actions for damages resulting from the accident are now pending in the courts, no legislative measures to compensate the victims of the crash were recommended at this time.

DEAR MR UNRUH In compliance with your request of January 9, 1962, the following is a Progress Report of the Assembly Interim Com-

mittee on Legislative Representation

On July 19, 1961, letters were sent to all registered legislative advocates who represented city, county and state governments asking if they saw need to have a meeting on the lubbying activities on the city, county and state level From the replies received, it was indicated that there was no need at the present time to have a hearing on this matter

In the latter part of July, 1961, the list of legislative advocates, their addresses and their associations was printed, and all legislative offices and legislative advocates were either mailed copies or furnished them if their offices were in the Capitol The number amounted to 515 legislative advocates with association registrations of 492

On September 27, 1961, an opinion from the Legislative Counsel was received with regard to the reporting of advocates' expenses during the interim period Copies of this opinion were forwarded to all registered legislative advocates informing them that if they had expenses of over \$25 for any one month they were required by law to file a Form 3 with the Legislative Budget Committee All advocates received a copy of this opinion for their files

On November 2, 1961, an opinion from the Legislative Counsel was received with regard to the reporting of testimonal dinner tickets. This opinion was for information purposes and copies of it were furnished to the Budget Committee and it will be distributed to advocates rather than mailed.

An opinion was received by this committee from the Legislative Counsel asking for a detail of the statement "influence of legislation" as it pertains to legislative advocates. This opinion, dated January 30, 1962, was printed in the Assembly Daily Journal on February 6, 1962. All advocates have this opinion available to them through the Legislative Budget Committee.

A check system has been worked out between the Legislative Budget Committee and the Assembly Committee on Legislative Representation When the Form 3 (expense form) has been received by the Legislative Budget Committee, a list of those received is sent down and checked off in the Assembly Committee office Each advocate has a separate expense card for each association he is registered for showing the months of 1961 and his registration date The cards for 1962 are prepared and January Form 3's are being processed This way it is shown at a glance which advocates are tardy in the filing of forms due on the 15th of the month. If the advocates have not had expenses of over \$25, they are not recurred by law to file this form

The Form 3 has been revised with a space to show the months for which the advocates have been mactive The new Form 3, along with the check list, should come out to a balance of months for which they had expenses and those which had none If there is a month missing, it will be called to the advocates' attention so that they may file the form

Many questions have been raised in the interim period with regard to this filing A study of this area during the coming interim should provide a satisfactory solution. A meeting on this subject for the purpose of clarification to the Legislature and to the legislative advocates is expected.

During the interim period also the Assembly Committee on Legislative Representation was informed of many changes in the list as published in 1961. There have been many terminations and they have been noted. The committee also had requests for the Legislative Advocates book by advocates, libraries and interested individuals. These requests were complied with, with the exception that copies of the advocate books were held out for the Budget Session of the Legislature and the committee furnished all legislative offices with an extra copy during the 1962 Budget Session. The notations of changes in addresses of the advocates and terminations and some other corrections were made and distributed to all offices rather than having it reprinted. The changes are not so numerous as to warrant another printing of the book during the coming interim period.

A meeting of the Legislative Representation Committee was held in Room 2170 on February 6, 1962 The purpose of the meeting was to call to the attention of the committee members the changes in registration of advocates and to pass on the applications of the new registration. The committee passed on the list and it was printed in the Assembly Daily Journal on that date Distribution was made on the same day of the supplemental list, and the copy of the advocates book held out for this purpose

It has been the aim of the Assembly Committee on Legislative Representation to put the sections of the Government Code which affect advocates into working order Many advocates are not aware of the regulations of the code as they pertain to their filing of expense forms during the interim and, in a great number of cases, the committee has not been notified of terminations or changes in the registrations of advocates

A new application form has been suggested to the Legislative Budget Committee so the advocates can list a telephone number. This number would be listed in the advocates book when it was compiled. Many requests have been received for telephone numbers where the advocates may be reached, and unless the committee has been notified beforehand, the numbers are not available.

It is hoped that this is the information requested of this committee. If you would like, I will be only too glad to discuss this matter with you. The committee is working to maintain the records of the Legislative Budget Committee and those of the Assembly Committee on Legislative Representation in close harmony. It has worked out well at present and it is anticipated that it will continue in the future

Government Code—Chapter 8 Regulation of Legislative Representation

Registration by lobbyists Form and manner of registration Report of receipts and expenditures Application of section Compilation and printing of information (a) Any person who shall engage himself for pay or for any consideration for the purpose of attempting to influence the passage or defeat of any legislation by the Legislature of the State of California or the approval or veto of any legislation by the Governor of the State of California shall, before doing anything in furtherance of such object, register with the Clerk of the Assembly and the Secretary of the Senate and shall give to those officers in writing and under oath, his name and business address, the name and address of the person by whom he is employed, and in whose interest he appears or works, the duration of such employment, how much he is paid and is to receive, by whom he is paid or is to be paid, how much he is to be paid for expenses, and what expenses are to be included He shall also, at the time of registering, submit to the clerk and the secretary a written authorization from each person by whom he is employed to act in furtherance of such object. Such person shall again register at each succeeding general session of the Legislature and again submit at that time the information and authorization required by this subdivision (a), unless he at the time is no longer engaged for pay or other consideration for the purposes hereinabove specified

(b) Each such person so registering shall, between the first and fifteenth day of each calendar month, so long as his activity continues, file with the clerk and secretary a detailed report under oath of all money received and each expenditure of twenty-five dollars (\$25) or more during the preceding calendar month in carrying on his work; to whom paid; for what purposes; the total of all expenditures during the preceding calendar month; and the names of any papers, periodicals, magazines, or other publications in which he has caused to be published any articles or editorials; and the proposed legislation he is employed to support or appose The provisions of this section shall not apply to any person who merely appears before a committee of the Legislature of the State of California in support of or opposition to legislation, nor to any public official acting in his official capacity; nor in the case of any newspaper or other regularly published periodical, radio or television station (including any individual who owns, publishes, or is employed by any such newspaper or periodical, radio or television station) which in the ordinary course of business publishes news items, editorials, or other comments, or paid advertisements, which directly or indirectly urge the passage or defeat of legislation, if such newspaper, periodical, radio or television station or individual, engages in no further or other activities in connection with the passage or defeat of such legislation, other than to appear before a committee of the Legislature of the State of California in support of or in opposition to such legislation; nor to a person when representing a bona fide church solely for the purpose of protecting the public right to practice the doctrines of such church (Emphasis added)

DEAR MR BRITSCHGI You point out that subdivision (b) of Section 9906 of the Government Code requires a legislative advocate to file, between the first and fifteenth day of each calendar month, "so long as his activity continues," a report of money received and expenditures You ask whether this requirement applies only during legislative sessions or is year-round

In our opinion the requirement applies year-round so long as the advocate's activity continues,

Section 9906 of the Government Code provides, in part

"(a) Any person who shall engage himself for pay or for any consideration for the purpose of attempting to influence the passage or defeat of any legislation by the Legislature of the State of California or the approval or veto of any legislation by the Governor of the State of California shall, before doing anything in furtherance of such object, register ..."

"(b) Each such person so registering shall, between the 1st and 15th day of each calendar month, so long as his activity continues, file with the clerk and secretary a detailed report under oath of all money received and each expenditure of twenty-five dollars (\$25) or more during the preceding calen-

dar month in carrying on his work

The activity referred to—that of influencing passage or defeat of legislation or approval or veto by the Governor—can be carried on between sessions as well as during sessions Subdivision (b) requires that so long as his activity continues, the advocate shall file the prescribed report "each calendar month," and there is no language which qualifies this to mean "each calendar month during the session" We therefore conclude that the reporting requirement applies year-round

Testimonial Dinner Reporting by Legislative Advocates—No. 900 Question

DEAR MR BRITSCHOI You have asked whether a registered legislative advocate, under the provisions of the statute regulating legislative representation, must report the purchase of tickets to a testimonial dinner for a legislator. The receipts from the sale of such tickets will be used to finance the election campaign of the legislator.

Opinion

In our opinion such expenditures are not required to be reported

Analysis

The provisions of the statute regulating legislative representation which are applicable to your question are Sections 9901 to 9903, inclusive, and Sections 9905 and 9906 of the Government Code These are the provisions which require any person (including a corporation), except a political committee, who solicits, collects or receives money

or any other thing of value to be used principally to aid, or the principal purpose of which is to aid, in influencing the passage or defeat of legislation, to report expenditures to the Legislative Analyst, and which also require any person (or corporation) who engages himself for pay for the purpose of influencing legislation to register and report expenses

This office has consistently expressed the view that the purpose of these provisions is to require the reporting of only those expenditures which are made by persons who have solicited or received money for the purpose of influencing legislation, or who have engaged themselves for pay to influence legislation, and which are expended for that purpose or in the course of such activities. That is, it would appear that there must be specific intent to effect such purposes in order for the statute to be

applicable to any given transaction

With respect to this particular expenditure, there is apparent no intent except to honor a legislator for his past public services or at most to influence his re-election as a legislator If it could be shown that the expenditure was made with the specific intent that certain prospective legislation might thereby be influenced, this could perhaps cause the statute to become applicable. However, the provisions regulating legislative representation are penal statutes and we do not believe that a court would give them such extensive application as to say that an intent to honor a legislator or to influence the election of a candidate for the Legislature is per se equivalent to an intent to influence legislation To give such extensive application to these provisions would appear to be contrary to the accepted rules of the construction of crimmal statutes. It is well established that a penal statute should be construed to reach no further than its words and that no person should be made subject to its terms by implication (In re Twing, 188 Cal 261, 265, People v Tisdale, 57 Cal 104, 107)

Dear Mr. Britschel. You have furnished us with a copy of a letter received from a registered legislative advocate and have asked for our opinion on the questions raised by him. The pertinent portion of the letter reads as follows.

"During the interim I attend interim committees to listen to the debate and to report to my principals the trends in legislative matters True, while before or after the meeting I

might meet with legislators to pass the time of day. Now then, if I were to go to San Francisco to attend a Public Health Committee meeting and make no presentation and have no witnesess, are these expenses to influence the passage of legislation? Prior to now we have always been of the opinion that these were reporting ventures and no legislation was either passed or defeated at interim committees, and have not kept track of those expenses except for our principals to reimburse us Is it your opinion or the opinion of the committee that we should file these expenses?"

In our opinion the legislative advocate should report these expenses if he attends such meetings pursuant to his engagement for the purpose

of influencing legislation

Section 9906 of the Government Code requires "Any person who shall engage himself for pay or for any consideration for the purpose of attempting to influence the passage or defeat of any legislation" to register "before doing anything in furtherance of such object" After registration such person must "so long as his activity continues, file... a detailed report under oath of all money received and each expenditure of twenty-five dollars (\$25) or more during the preceding calendar month in carrying on his work " The report must also contain other specified information

The "activity" referred to in Section 9906 is obviously activity involving (1) attempts to influence legislation (2) as a paid legislative advocate, or stating it in another way, activity undertaken pursuant to a contract to attempt to influence legislation and recognized by the parties to the contract as assisting in achieving the objectives of that contract This construction of "activity" is supported by the requirement that a report be made of expenditures incurred "in carrying on his work"-a phrase which obviously covers expenditures for activities required by the contract.

Under the particular facts related to us the individual apparently is registered under subdivision (a) of Section 9906 Therefore, we assume that he has contracted for a consideration to attempt to influence

legislation

He must render monthly reports for periods in which his activity has continued He must include in such report expenditures made in carrying on his work. Under the facts stated the individual's only "activity" is to attend interim committees, listen to the proceedings, and report to his principals the trends in legislative matters. If this is done pursuant to the contract whereby he engaged himself for pay or any consideration for the purpose of influencing legislation then his "activity" has continued and he would be required to render a report under subdivision (b) of Section 9906. Any expenditures made in connection with such activity would constitute expenditures made "in carrying on his work" and would have to be included in the report. We note that under the facts stated it appears that the individual is reimbursed by his principal for expenses incurred in connection with attendance at the interim committee meetings. This indicates that both parties to the contract recognize that the individual's activities in connection with the interim committee meetings are undertaken pursuant

to his contract to attempt to influence legislation and that they will further the objectives of that contract. The acts of the parties under a contract afford one of the most reliable means of arriving at their intention (Commercial Discount Co. v Cowen (1941), 18 Cal. 2d 610, 615)

A. Summary of Interim Activities

- 1 Committee Hearings
- a On August 9, 1961, your committee met in Monterey to organize for interim work. The committee held an informal discussion concerning the subject matters assigned for study These included:
 - AB 358 (Rees, 1961), relating to the purchase of colored oleomargarine for state institutions.
 - (2) HR 429 (Britschgi, 1961), relating to the study of the cost of labor in the production of milk
 - AB 1259 (Porter, 1961), relating to unfair practices in the sale of milk and dairy products
 - HR 244 (Belotti, 1961), relating to the production and marketing of manufacturing milk

It was agreed to hear all measures assigned to the committee at each of its hearings in various parts of the State

- b On October 4, 1961, your committee met in Anaheim to hear witnesses from the State Department of Agriculture and from industry relating to AB 1259 and AB 358 Five witnesses testified regarding AB 1259 and four witnesses were heard on AB 358
- e On October 5, 1961, your committee met in Anaheim to hear seven witnesses testify regarding H R, 429 and six witnesses regarding HR 244
- d On January 30, 1962, your committee met in Petaluma and obtained testimony from 12 witnesses relating to A.B. 1259, H.R. 244, and H.R 429.

2. Research

1. Tentative Hearings

With the support of your committee, the State Department of Agriculture entered into a contract with the University of California to carry on studies relating to the pricing of milk for manufacturing uses

Approximately 40 percent of the total commercial milk production of California is utilized for manufacturing purposes. Of this amount, about half is supplied from "excess" Grade A production and the remainder from Grade B or manufacturing milk. Thus, these two sources of supply of milk for manufacturing are in direct competition for the "market" for dairy products. Inasmuch as the Grade A portion of this supply comes under the price jurisdiction of the Bureau of Milk Stabilization but the Grade B (or manufacturing) portion does not, certain inequities appear to have resulted in the returns to some producers of manufacturing milk Legislation designed to bring all milk prices under control has been introduced in the 1959 Legislature (S.B. 1167) and in the 1961 Legislature (S.B. 40), and both bills were referred for further study to the Interim Committee on Livestock and Dairies.

The present research project is designed to investigate procedures which might be used to establish prices for milk for manufacturing purposes. The specific objectives of this study are.

a To analyze and evaluate the basis for establishing different use (price) classifications for milk for manufacturing purposes, and to determine the appropriate number of classes for such milk in California markets

b To develop procedures for estimating appropriate price levels for milk used for dairy product manufacture

c To devise a method whereby payments for milk for manufacture can be "pooled" to provide uniform returns to all producers

B. Proposed Studies

In addition to the particular assignment to study AB 358, HR 429, AB 1259, and HR 244, attention has been called to several important and related problems. These include

a The problem of unregulated Grade A milk which developed in 1959 after the establishment of a classified price system for Grade A milk for Class II and Class III purposes In an attempt to handle the inequities which occurred, the stabilization and marketing plans were revised in October, 1961, but it is as yet too early to ascertam whether the desired result has been accomplished—eliminating the handling of over-contract Grade A milk on an unregulated basis

b The controversy over the definition of "distributor" in accordance with A B 777, Chapter 288, of the 1961 Session Upon review of all types of licenses by the Bureau of Milk Stabilization, some operators failed to qualify within the department's interpretation of the law Many of these operators have objected to the department's ruling that their licenses would not be renewed Some administrative hearings and perhaps some litigation will be required for resolution of this problem

c The problem relating to the pricing of milk on a fat and solids not fat basis, in accordance with the provisions of AB 2742, Chapter 2146, of the 1961 Session The establishment of minimum prices on a

milk fat and nonfat basis, as required by the bill, has proved to be very difficult. Further hearings on the subject have been scheduled in the hope that an acceptable method can be determined.

d The problem of developing a single class of milk, without reference to pools, classes, or grades. It has been suggested that this could simplify the administration of a price plan, if it were possible to achieve

e The problem of the general lack of knowledge about what charges go into the price of a quart of milk, particularly the labor cost component More public information on this subject has been considered desirable

C. Related Matters: Litigation

1. In March, 1960, an action was filed by the United States Government to enjoin the Director of Agriculture and the Attorney General from enforcement of minimum prices for fluid milk sold to military installations. In April, 1961, the court ruled that the Department of Agriculture could not enforce either its minimum producer prices or minimum wholesale prices in the sale of milk to military establishments Although a Stay Order was issued in July, 1961, removing that portion of the injunction relating to the producer price, the department encountered difficulty in enforcing the minimum producer price. In a suit tried before the Tulare County Superior Court, the judge ruled that the State had no jurisdiction. The United States Supreme Court on January 15 advised the department it would hear the appeal from the Federal District Court decision, and it is hoped that a favorable decision will be obtained, thereby overruling the Tulare County Superior Court decision.

(Relating to this litigation, proposed legislation is expected to be introduced in the Congress of the United States authorizing the federal establishment of a prevailing Class I price for the purpose of milk sales to the federal government)

2 In a recent lawsuit before the Santa Clara Court, a ruling had been made that dock operation and producer ranch operations are legally the same, there being uo basis for distinguishing between the two for price purposes. If upheld throughout the State, this decision could have an important effect upon the present price differentials existing between the two operations.

It is anticipated that during the period prior to the 1962 Session, additional hearings will be held by your committee in various parts of the State as yet unrepresented. In addition, your committee is always interested in hearing from the industry and from the state enforcement agency on current problems encountered. These and related matters will continue to receive eareful study.

Interim Hearings to Date August 14, 1961-The Military and Veterans Affairs Committee held its organizational meeting at the University of California, Riverside. Testimony was taken on S.B. 857, (Shaw), on the advisability of the State's acquisition of the former U.S. Naval Hospital at Corona for use as a veterans' home and hospital The committee toured the installation.

October 16, 1961-The committee held a public hearing at the State Building, Los Angeles, on the following AB 2344, (Rees), requires bid call for life insurance coverage for Cal-Vet program purchasers; AB 2731, (Rees), limits time veterans have to apply for Cal-Vet loans; A B 2915, (Marks), authorizes Cal-Vet loans for fallout shelters; A.B. 3070, (Meyers), appropriates \$60,000 to reinstate claims services programs of veterans organizations, and HR 375, (Frew), military leave policies Although not scheduled, the committee also heard additional testimony on SB 857.

November 7, 1961-The committee inspected the rehabilitation program at the California Veterans Home, Yountville, and took Northern California testimony on AB 2915, AB. 3070 and HR 375.

December 11, 1961—The subcommittee on military service rights, chairmanned by Assembly man Don Mulford, met in Sacramento to hear testimony concerning the rights of servicemen called from the reserves and National Guard to active duty as a result of the Berlin crisis

February 5, 1962—The committee met in Sacramento to hear testimony on state civil defense preparations

Future Plans

The committee presently has no plans for additional hearings, however, at some of the earlier sessions there were indications more information might be required before the committee can submit its final report to the 1963 Session. This is particularly true in the field of civil defense, which has been subject to rapid change in recent months. In this field and perhaps others, the possibility of the need for additional hearings cannot be ruled out.

Legislation Proposals

As of this date the committee has made one specific recommendation for legislation. It has urged Governor Brown to place on special call the subject matter of A B 2915, (Marks), relating to the authorization of Cal-Vet loan funds for fallout shelters

Additional legislative proposals probably will be made in the committee's final report for the 1963 General Session.

2 October 25 and 26, 1961 (San Francisco)—Bay Area Regional Planning, Multi-Purpose Metropolitan District, State Metropolitan Advisory Body

- November 16 and 17, 1961 (Los Angeles)—Multi-Purpose Metropolitan Districts, State Metropolitan Advisory Body, Investment of County Retirement Funds through Lease-Purchase Arrangements, Municipal Sewer and Parking Districts
- 4 January 17, 1962 (Sacramento)—Supervisorial Redistricting; Authority of Boards of Supervisors over Independent Special Districts

Résumés follow of committee activities in each of the subject areas it has studied (including studies still in progress) together with a list of auticipated future studies

Studies Which Have Been Concluded

- 1 Bay Area Regional Planning (AB 2560—Rumford, AB 3044—Meyers) Hearings have disclosed that local jurisdictions in the San Francisco Bay area feel that necessary regional planning can be, and in fact is being, satisfactorily accomplished by voluntary agreements and by voluntary associations (eg Association of Bay Area Governments) Need for legislative creation of such a district has not been demonstrated
- 2 Municipal Sewer District Acts of 1911 and 1939 Committee hearings have industed that consolidation of these statutes is both feasible and desirable. The committee is preparing suitable legislation for introduction at the 1963 General Session.

Parking Districts

(a) Vehicle Parking District Act of 1943 and Parking District Act of 1951 (A B 1847—Bradley)

A suggested consolidation of these two statutes has been shown to involve little opportunity for genuine consolidation Wording similar provisions of each act similarly would effect some technical improvement

(b) Mumcipal Parking Revenue Bond Law of 1949 This statute is apparently unnecessary. It has apparently never been used and never will be Legislation will be prepared to repeal it.

Studies in Progress

Metropolitan Arcas (AB 2728—Rees; AB 1530—Rees)

Hearings in both the San Francisco and Los Angeles metropolitan areas have elected little expression of support, either popularly or from local jurisdictions, for areawide multipurpose districts as a practicable solution to problems of metropolitan organization Proposals for a state metropolitan advisory body encountered similar reaction At the present time the policy of local jurisdictions toward multi-purpose districts is in a state of flux. The League of California Cities, which had formerly endorsed the principle of the multi-purpose district, withdrew its endorsement after the 1961 legislative session until its policy could be fully re-examined at a state-sion until the produced a strong policy statement disapproving multi-purpose districts. The County Supervisors Association of California, while not withdrawing its former endorsement of the principle of multi-purpose districts, has emphasized that

this policy may well change as a result of a spring conference of that organization. An additional hearing may be held

Investment of County Retirement Funds Through Lease-Purchase Arrangements (AB 1921—Bradley)

Such contracts between a county and a county retirement fund are alleged to be of questionable constitutionality because they enable a county to meur long-term debt without approval by the electorate They are also assailed on the grounds that the interlocking nature of a board of supervisors and a county retirement fund board makes difficult any attempt at arms length dealing. Finally, such agreements are alleged to have a generally adverse effect on the marketability of California municipal bonds. The committee is endeavoring to determine the truth of these allegations and to decide upon the propriety, worth and need of such agreements. No future hearings are anticipated

3 Supervisorial Redistricting—(AB 2100—Bradley, AB 2323—Burton).

It has been amply demonstrated that county supervisorial redistricting is not performed on any regular basis and that in many counties large population changes have occurred since previous redistricting efforts. Numerous arguments have been advanced, however, that population equality should not be the sole dominant factor in redistricting, the factors of assessed valuation and rural representation have been stressed as equally important alternatives. The committee's present efforts are directed at finding a suitable formula for regular supervisorial redistricting which will achieve some measure of population equality. No future hearings are anticipated.

Authority of Boards of Supervisors Over Special Districts (A B 2853, 2855, 2856—Bradley)

The committee hearing on this subject was exploratory in nature and centered mainly on the general question of whether boards of supervisors should be allowed to initiate consolidation or dissolution proceedings in special districts within their jurisdiction. There has been general approval of this type of power provided appropriate procedural safeguards would be established. No future hearings are anticipated.

Anticipated Future Studies

Improvement Acts of 1911, 1913, 1915

Committee action will be directed at consolidating, restating and generally clarifying these important but sometimes confusing and contradictory statutes

2 County Employees (A B 2092—Rumford; A B 2673—Waldie). The committee plans to explore proposals—

(a) to establish a prevailing rate wage standard for county employees, and

(b) to require compulsory civil service in counties with a population of 25,000 or greater

 Construction in County Road Camps and Industrial Farms (A B 192—Hegland) The committee plans to review the present limitations on the amount of construction, improvement or repairs which may be done by inmates of industrial farms or road camps on the facilities thereof

MR SPEAKER AND MEMBERS OF THE ASSEMBLY A total of six hearings and five field trips were held by the Assembly Interim Committee on Natural Resources, Planning, and Public Works and its subcommittees during the interim period from June, 1961 through February, 1962

Roadside Fires

The committee held a hearing in Arbuckle on October 17, 1961, on roadside fires on state highway rights of way at which time the Northern California Frie Chiefs' Association presented the results of a questionnaire on this problem which had been circulated among all the fire districts north of Fresno County This questionnaire detailed information on the number of roadside fires, the equipment and manpower furnished by the districts to suppress these fires, and the cost to each of the districts involved in such fire suppression. This was found to be a complex problem and another hearing on the subject was held in Sacramento on February 19, 1962.

Forest Practice Act

At Eureka on October 19, 1961, the committee received testimony on the logging practices on the California North Coast and other phases of the Forest Practice Act Various suggestions for the revision of the Forest Practice Act were presented by the industry representatives.

On October 18 the committee toured the Mendocino National Forest observing brush conversion Of particular interest was the controlled burning, conversion of chamise to grass, making all resources of forest lands—soil, water, wildlife and recreation—fully productive in accordance with the multiple use principle On October 19, 1961, the committee toured up the divide to the coastal slopes of the main Redwood belt, arriving in Eureka for the afternoon hearing on October 20. The

committee toured the Simpson Lumber Company operations on October 21, and after a short briefing by their chief forester, the group boarded special company buses to travel on private truck roads to see at first hand the company's North Fork logging operations.

The Harlow Fire

At the urgent request of Assemblyman Gordon Winton, the committee scheduled a hearing in Fresno on October 30, 1961, in order to hear testimony relative to the Harlow Fire in Madera County which burned in excess of 42,000 acres, cost two lives, destroyed some 80 to 90 homes and businesses, completely wiped out the communities of Ahwahnee and Nipimawasee and cost somewhere in the neighborhood of \$2,000,000

Subcommittee on Fort Funston

The subcommittee met in San Francisco on October 31, 1961, to hear testimony on AB 3120 which provides funds for the acquisition of Fort Funston as a state park On November 1, the subcommittee was conducted on a tour of the Fort Funston property. In the November 7 election, the City of San Francisco voted bonds to purchase the Fort Funston property from the federal government.

Subcommittee on Bay and Water Pollution

The Subcommuttee on Bay and Water Pollution heard testimony on December 27, 1961, in San Francisco relative to the following bills AB 3057, public officers elected to water pollution control hoard; AB 3089, adding two members to State Water Pollution Control Board; AB 3091, industrial waste and sewage discharges; and HR 408, investigation of pollution of waters of California The problems of water pollution are continuing ones and it will be necessary to schedule further hearings on these subjects during the ensuing internal

Testimony was also heard on AJR 45, establishing a federal water pollution control research facility in California, and the subcommittee was conducted on a field trip to view various locations in the Bay area for such a facility on December 28

Fire Problems

On February 19, 1962, the committee heard further testmony at a hearing in Sacramento on the following subjects (1) The use of chemicals as a fire prevention measure on roadsides and forest lands; (2) Air and ground contracts for emergency fire fighting equipment, and (3) Adding auxiliary booster pumps to 100 Civil Defense fire trucks to convert them to mobile units for fire suppression Legislation will undoubtedly be introduced on the last item at the 1963 Session of the Legislature.

Proposed Hearings

It appears that a hearing on pollution should be held in Southern California Speaker Unruh, the University of Southern California and other interested parties have indicated a strong desire for such a hearing for the area south of the Tehachapis

One additional hearing is scheduled to be held in Bakersfield in April relative to a proposed wilderness area in Kern County Proposed dates are now scheduled for April 23 and 24

Other Activities

In an effort to secure information on the use of excess equipment by the various soil conservation districts throughout the State, a questionnaire was circulated among the districts inquiring as to their need for such equipment. The compilation of data secured from this questionnaire is available in the committee office.

Chairman Lowrey was invited to participate in a Conference on Land and People held in Washington, D.C. on Monday, January 15, 1962, at the invitation of Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman In his capacity as Chairman of the Natural Resources Committee, Mr Lowrey was authorized by the Speaker to attend this conference

Assembly Interim Committee on Public Health

Authorization and Organization

The Assembly Interim Committee on Public Health, created by House Resolution No 361 of the 1961 Regular Session of the Legislature, was by the terms of that resolution, assigned, "the subject matter of the Health and Safety Code and the subject matter of the healing arts in the Business and Professions Code, all uncodified laws relating thereto, and other matters relating to the public health" In addition, the following specific topics were assigned to the committee by the Assembly Rules Committee

- (1) Air Pollution (AB 1228, AB 2406, HR 411)
- (2) Cosmetology (AB 244, A.B 1056, AB 1057)
- (3) Fire Protection (A.B 132, AB 3024, HR 296, H.R 380)
- (4) Hospitals and Medical Facilities (A B 567, A.B 843, A B 1279, A B 1550, A B 1942, A B 2738, H R 447)
- (5) Detention of Mentally III (AB 2519)
- (6) Narcotic Addict Treatment (H R. 300, H R 353)
- (7) Radiation Protection (HR 331)
- (8) Trailer Parks (A B 496, A B 2029)

In order to facilitate the study of these matters, the committee organized into subcommittees. Their activities are reported as follows

Subcommittee on Air Pollution and Radiation Protection

Members: Thelin (Chahman), Cameron, Marks, Rumford, Wolfrum Meetings: Los Angeles, October 10, 1961 San Francisco, November 7, 1961 San Francisco, December 11, 1961

Fuel Additives and Smog

On October 10, 1961, the subcommittee held a hearing on the composition of motor fuels and the use of fuel additives in relation to the creation of smog

The central issues discussed at the hearing involved the effects of lead additives (tetraethyl lead and tetramethyl lead) on the exhaust fumes, their further effect on smog conditions, and finally their impact upon the health of the people of California Testimony was offered on the three points by witnesses from the Citizen's Auti-Smog Committee, the Department of Public Health, the Ethyl Corporation, the Kettering Laboratory of the University of Cincinnata, and the Western Oil and Gas Association

The Bureau of Air Sanitation of the Department of Public Health is at the present time undertaking a continuing study of lead blood levels As of February 26, 1962 the data have supported the conclusion which the department had offered in October: as yet there is no evidence that exposures to lead in community air pollution have resulted in a hazard to health, in increasing body lead storage, or in chronic lead poisoning.

X-Ray Equipment Regulation and Licensing

November 7, 1961 the subcommittee heard testimony on the progress made by the Department of Public Health in drafting regulations governing X-ray devices HR 331 directed the Public Health Com-

mittee to study the regulations being promulgated and report its findings to the Assembly by March 9, 1962. This subject, therefore, has been covered in a separate report which concludes that X-ray equipment used by doctors and dentists produce 95 percent of man-made radiation to which the public is exposed, and thus of necessity these machines should be subject to registration and inspection. It was also found that the regulations drafted for this purpose conform closely to the authoritative standards set by the National Committee on Radiation Protection, and that the regulations adopted by the Board of Public Health on December 8, 1961 have been accepted by the practitioners in the medical and dental professions.

Fallout Shelters and Public Agencies

During the afternoon session of November 7, the subcommittee heard testimony from state and local officials on the status of plans for fallous shelters within their governmental jurisdictions. The Director of the State Disaster Office testified that a uniform shelter program is part of the national defense posture, and that it is expected that Congress will take action on a program during its 1962 Session. Testimony was also heard that several localities are going ahead with programs

The investigation of radiation problems and public health is one of the areas of continuing study by the Public Health Committee

Bay Area Air Pollution Control District Tax Increase

Assembly Bill No 1228 would have raised over a two-year period the maximum tax rate of the Bay Area Air Pollution Control District from the present one cent to a maximum of two cents Testimony at the December 11, 1961 hearing of the subcommittee indicated that the board of directors of the district feels that a maximum of one and six-tenths cents would be sufficient to finance an increased field inspection program There was no opposition presented at the hearing, but complete accord on the implementation of the program has not been reached among the six counties affected The committee has been informed that no further action will be requested during the special session

A burning permit hill, A B 2406, will not be studied by the sub-committee

Subcommittee on Cosmetology

Members: Hegland (Chairman), Cunningham,

Meeting: San Diego, October 11, 1961

At this hearing, attended by approximately 250 persons, testimony was given on AB 244, AB 1056, and AB 1057 Each of these bills would alter in a significant manner the cometology sections of the Business and Professions Code There is general agreement that the code is deficient in several aspects and further study is anticipated in view of the active interest in this subject

Subcommittee on Fire Protection

Members: Mulford (Chairman), Coolidge, Dahl, Grant, Wolfrum Meeting: Los Angeles, December 1, 1961

Containers for Flammable Liquids

Assembly Bill No 132 relates to the storage and sale of flammable liquids in glass containers. At the direction of the chairman of the subcommittee, the State Fire Marshal has held a meeting with interested parties and differences have been resolved. The committee is planning no further study on this subject, and legislation will be introduced in the 1963 Session.

Hotel Fires

The purpose of Assembly Bill No 3024 was to find a means of reducing hotel fires caused by carelessness with eigarettes Under such an amendment guilt on the part of the person in whose name a hotel room was registered would have been presumed Legislative Counsel Opinion (No 1176 Dec 27, 1961) states that such an approach would be unconstitutional as a violation of due process No legislation or further study of this measure is contemplated

H.R 296-Fire Protection

The subcommuttee at the time of its hearing in Los Angeles held discussions with representatives of the Los Angeles City Fire Department relative to the staggering losses in Bel Air and Topanga Canyons, and toured the entire area to observe the loss of property and watershed It was demonstrated in the Bel Air fire that undoubtedly homes with wood shingle roofs suffered a higher incidence of damage. In the opinion of the subcommittee further investigation on this subject appears to be in order.

Subcommittee on Hospitals and Medical Facilities

Members: Dahl (Chairman), Cameron, Coohdge, Cunningham, Dills, Mulford, Rumford, Wolfrum Meetings: Los Angeles, November 2 and 3, 1961; Oakland, November 27 and 28, 1961

This subcommittee has conducted hearings on six bills, as well as inquiring into the future building requirements of the Department of Public Health, and an examination of the compliance with state regulations by nursing homes in Los Angeles City and County

- 1 B 567—proposed that hospitals licensed by the State be required to file with the State Department of Public Health a schedule of fees and charges for all services and goods ordinarily provided by the hospital The committee heard testimony that there was not a pressing need for such legislation since there was no evidence that abuses in billing by hospitals were occurring
- A B 843—was introduced due to evidence that out-of-state laboratories have been issuing test results from medical speamens without actually examining the speamens. The Chief of the Laboratory Field Services of the Department of Public Health indicated at the hearing that the use of unlicensed, unscrupulous, out-of-state laboratories is one of the most important uncontrolled issues facing the State at the present time Proposals for remedying the problem are now under consideration by the committee, and legislation is anticipated for the 1963 Session
- AB 1279 and 1550—Testimony was also heard on two proposals to require the sale of certain drugs to be carried out under the supervision

of a registered pharmacist, and to further regulate the distribution of drugs in hospitals

A B 1932—The present law does not permit a local district hospital to hire doctors to provide emergency care. This bill was introduced to alleviate a particularly pressing problem of emergency facilities in a district hospital in Alameda County Alternative means of remedying the situation are being explored by local jurisdictions and the medical profession, and no further hearings are planned.

AB 2738—Testimony was presented on this proposal relative to the transfer of responsibility for the filing of birth and death certificates from the county recorders in certain countries to the county health departments, and indicated that with new advances in microcopying, the epidemiological needs of county health departments can be met without further legislation.

HR 447—Inquiry was made into the factors associated with the present location in Berkeley of the Department of Public Health, its plans for expansion due to increases in its legislatively-determined work load and health research, and the attendant problems of a change of location to Sacramento. The subcommittee has referred the matter to the full committee for further hearings.

Subcommittee on Narcotics and Mentally III

A B 2519—Relates to detention of the mentally ill, and a hearing on this subject will be held within the next few months

Exempt Narcotic Prescriptions

Testimony was heard at the November 6 meeting on exempt narcotic prescription procedures particularly as related to changes proposed in A B 2582 introduced in the 1961 Session. The Bureau of Narcotic Enforcement recommended that certain medicinal narcotic preparations prescribed on a single copy prescription be placed on a triplicate prescription system reportable to them. Witnesses testified there was not sufficient justification for a change in the present law.

Subcommittee on Trailer Parks

Members: Lunardi (Chairman), Grant, Hegland, Holmes

Legislation referred to this subcommittee has been set aside upon advice from the sponsors that the issues would be satisfactorily resolved by recent legislative action permitting the Division of Housing to promulgate rules and regulations governing recreational and temporary trailer parks Hearings will not be held unless it is found that accord cannot be reached between the industry and the Division of Housing.

The Assembly Interim Committee on Public Utilities and Corporations was created by House Resolution No. 361 of the 1961 Legislative Session This interim committee has held five meetings during the period June 1961 through February 1962, as follows.

July 28, 1961—Los Angeles—Organizational Meeting September 13, 1961—Newport Beach—H R No 222 November 2, 1961—San Francisco—H R No 222

December 11 and 12, 1961—Los Angeles—A B No 152 February 15 and 16, 1962—San Francisco—Air Carriers

House Resolution No. 222, relative to licensing of boat operators. A progress report, as required by this resolution, was filed with the Assembly on February 5, 1962, and printed in the Assembly Daily Journal on February 6, 1962

In the study of licensing of boat operators, considerable testimony was received relative to the overall study of boating safety and education required by House Resolution No 352 Since the studies required by these resolutions are of interrelated subjects, the committee feit that any recommendation on licensing of boat operators could not be made pending the completion of the study into the whole field of boating.

Some preliminary conclusions can be reached concerning secondary problems in this field.

- 1. The lack of safety requirements and operator beensing of sightseeing vessels operating on non-navigable state waters (sightseeing vessels operating on navigable waters are controlled by the United States Coast Guard) is an area where corrective legislation is indicated
- 2 The failure to maintain records on citations issued for California boating law violations results in an inability for local justices to determine previous violations by boating operators. Before any effective decision can be made on licensing of boat operators a proper recordkeeping program on citations issued and disposition of cases must be established
- Testimony received to date indicates a decided lack in enforcement of boating regulations Further study on this subject will be included on studies under House Resolution No. 352

A B 152-California Commercial Air Operators and Air Service:

Two meetings have been held to date on the desirability and necessity of regulation of wholly intrastate airline and air charter operations. This committee has received widely diversified testimony on the need for this type of control, ranging from support by individual communities to relative consistent opposition by the airline industry and charter operators. This committee received a thorough briefing of the federal government's activities from Washington representatives of the Federal Aviation Agency and Civil Aeronautics Board

While additional studies will still be required on this subject, a secondary problem of lack of uniform insurance requirements for commercial operating aircraft appears to exist. This committee will watch with interest proposed legislation before the current session of Congress prior to additional hearings on this subject

House Resolution No 416—Natural gas supply House Resolution No 417—Car rentals

House Resolution No 448-Los Angeles Metropolitan Transit Authority

* House Resolution No 352-Regulations of boating * Assembly Bill No 1552-For-hire vessels

It is anticipated that public hearings on the above listed subjects will be held after the conclusion of the preliminary staff investigations

A. Summary of Interim Activities

1. Committee Hearings

Following the adjournment of the 1961 Regular Session, the Assembly Rules Committee assigned 48 items (38 bills and 10 resolutions) to your Committee on Transportation and Commerce for study during the current interim. To date, the full committee and the Transportation Safety Subcommittee have held seven days of hearings and received testimony from 106 witnesses on 20 of the assigned items.

On September 14, 1961, your committee met in San Francisco to consider AB 2102 (Bruce F Allen), relating to motor vehicle sales, and AB 2796 (Meyers), relating to motor vehicle repair shop licensing

On September 15, 1961, your committee met in Redwood City to consider A B 2264 (Bradley), relating to minimum age for drivers' licenses and H.R. 262 (Dahl), relating to weight restrictions on city streets

On November 15, 1961, your committee conducted an exhaustive hearing devoted exclusively to various proposals for periodic motor vehicle inspection A B 639 (Rees) and A B 2135 (Chapel); H R. 150 (Ralph M Brown) and H R. 323 (Chapel).

A hearing scheduled for November 16, 1961, in Los Angeles was canceled at the request of Assemblyman Carrell, author of HR. 394 (relating to auto dealers and sales practices) which was to be heard at that hearing The subject matter has not been rescheduled.

On November 17, 1961, your committee held a hearing in the Palm Springs City Hall on A B 641 (Dahl), relating to glazing materials in auto glass.

2. Staff Research

As directed by House Resolution No. 323, an intensive comparative study was initiated on periodic motor vehicle inspection systems currently operative in other areas. To date, all states and cities having some type of inspection program have responded to the committee's request for information and material A complete analysis of this material will appear in the committee's final report to the 1963 Legislature

Similarly, a comparative study directed by House Resolution No. 349 (Thomas) is under way on the establishment and operation of port authorities in various areas of the United States, Canada and South America.

3. Related Activity

During the period covered by this report, your committee was presented at a Joint Meeting on Highway Safety Compacts called by the Western Governor's Conference and the Western Interstate Committee on Highway Policy Problems These groups will meet again in 1962 on driver beenses and vehicle safety equipment legislation to be presented to the California Legislature in 1963 and committee representatives will be in attendance to assist in drafting these proposals

B. Proposed Studies

1. Tentative Hearings

Immediately following adjournment of the 1962 Budget Session, your committee tentatively plans a hearing on sand blasting and blowing problems and efforts of the Division of Highways to cope with this situation on state highways in desert areas

A two-day hearing has been scheduled for late August, 1962, on seven bills and resolutions authored by Assemblyman Meyers, all relating to various aspects of transportation facilities and planning in the San Francisco Bay area.

A two-day hearing-field trip will be conducted in 1962 on the desirability and feasibility of establishing a port authority for the operation of the Los Angeles and Long Beach harbors

No additional meetings are contemplated on those subject matters already heard unless committee members desire further information not readily obtainable by conference or correspondence

2. Staff Research

During the remainder of the interim, the comparative studies of vehicle inspection and port authorities cited above will be completed Additionally, a project will be undertaken to implement A CR 85 (Mills), relating to the effectiveness of New Jersey's driver license suspension and revocation system and accident prevention clinics

C. Transportation Safety Subcommittee

1. Committee Hearings to Date

Pursuant to paragraph 2 of House Resolution No 227, Chairman Beaver appointed the following members of the full committee to constitute the Assembly Interim Subcommittee on Transportation Safety Edward M Gaffiney (Chairman), Frank P. Belotti, Joseph M Kennick, Vernon Kilpatrick, W Byron Rumford, and Chet Wolfrum (ex officio). At the request of the subcommittee chairman, the full committee secretary and consultant have acted in staff capacities for the subcommittee. 12—L-4515

On October 19, 1961, the subcommittee held a meeting in Los Angeles to consider right-of-way proposals (AB's 1653, 1654, 1655, 1656, Wolfrum, AB's 2245 and 2246, Holmes), auto tail light legislation (AB 2581, Kennick, and AB 2612, Porter) and school zone markings (AB 67, Carrell, and AB 1331, Grant)

On October 31, 1961, the subcommittee met in San Francisco to discuss compressed airbrake safety devices and administration of Section 26310 of the Vehicle Code A subsequent hearing and field trip on this subject was held at the Institute of Transportation and Traffic Engineering in Richmond, December 5, 1961 Both sessions drew more than capacity crowds

2 Proposed Studies

The subcommittee will continue its investigation into vehicle equipment and rules of the road proposals assigned for study by the full committee and two tentative hearings have been scheduled, one for the Bay area and the other in Los Angeles

A. Summary of Interim Activities

1. Committee Organization

Pursuant to paragraph 2 of House Resolution No 227 (1961), Chairman Jack A Beaver of the Assembly Interim Committee on Trans-

portation and Commerce appointed the following members of the full committee to constitute the Assembly Interim Subcommittee on Transportation Safety Edward M Gaffney (Chairman), Frank P Belotti, Joseph M Kennick, Vernon Kilpatrick, W Byron Rumford, and Chet Wolfrum (ex officio) At the request of the subcommittee chairman, the full committee secretary and consultant have acted in staff capacities for the subcommittee.

The subcommittee was assigned various measures dealing with vehicle equipment and rules of the road for study. To date, the subcommittee has held three days of hearings and received testimony from 35 witnesses on 12 of those assigned items.

2. Committee Hearings to Date

On October 19, 1961, the subcommittee held a meeting in Los Angeles to consider right-of-way proposals (AB.'s 1653, 1654, 1655, 1656, Wolfrum, AB.'s 2245 and 2246, Holmes), auto tail light legislation (AB 2581, Kennick, and AB 2612, Porter) and school zone markings (AB 67, Carrell, and AB 1331, Grant)

On October 31, 1961, the subcommittee met in San Francisco to discuss compressed airbrake safety devices and administration of Section 26310 of the Vehicle Code. A subsequent hearing and field trip on this subject was held at the Institute of Transportation and Traffic Engineering in Richmond, December 5, 1961. Both sessions drew more than capacity crowds.

B. Proposed Studies

1. Tentative Hearings

During the remainder of the interim, the subcommittee contemplates conducting four hearings on the following subjects: lumber trucking loading and unloading requirements (Eureka), vehicle lighting equipment and highway signs and markings (Bay area), seat belts and other safety equipment (Los Angeles); and farm labor transportation and implements of husbandry problems (Fresno)

2. Field Trips

The subcommittee will conduct two field trips to investigate the adequacy of runaway truck escape ramps on the Grapevine and Cuesta Grade highways, and to investigate the possibility of such additional facilities as may be necessary. These field trips will be designed to implement a motion unanimously adopted by the subcommittee at its San Francisco hearing on October 31, 1961.

Areas of Study

1 Ground Water (H R. 179)

The resolution directing this study calls for an examination of the "legal, physical, economic and managerial problems of full utilization of the ground water basins of this State". These underground basins supply slightly more than one-half of the total water used annually in California. The committee, therefore, is approaching its ground water studies on the broadest possible basis.

The continued depletion of these ground water reserves in many areas of the State, particularly in certain parts of Southern California, has become an acute problem Although in recent years several revolutionary recharge projects have been instituted in these areas by local districts, the serious threat to this vital water supply remains Additional ground water problems result from sea water intrusion in our coastal areas

The committee's seven days of ground water meetings held thus far were primarily to assess the nature and severity of ground water problems, to learn what local areas are doing to reinedy these problems, and to learn more about the relationship of these ground water problems to the surface supplies to be provided by the State Water Facilities

There has been virtually no significant ground water legislation in the past and interest in ground water matters has developed only in recent years. The committee has found that the lengthy court procedures for adjudication of pumping rights which now exist are further complicated by a paneity of pumping records and geologic information on ground water basins.

Experience indicates that because of these factors several years of further experimentation and analysis undoubtedly will be required before comprehensive legislation can be drafted which will provide answers to our major ground water problems on a statewide basis Consequently, further field hearings will be held during the remainder of this year Drawing upon the material collected at these field hearings.

2. Expenditure Control (H.R. 368)

The complex subject of internal fiscal control of expenditures for the State Water Facilities by the Department of Water Resources under the continuing appropriation authority of the Burns-Porter Act is being studied by a subcommittee (Assemblyman Carley V Porter, Chairman) A public hearing was held in August and staff work in this regard is still being undertaken However, the subcommittee submitted a detailed progress report on its unital findings to the Speaker of the Assembly on January 2, 1962 Further study of this subject is anticipated

3. Relocation Agreements (H.R. 435)

The Central Valley Project Act includes special procedures (Water Code Sections 11590-11595) for the execution of agreements between the Department of Water Resources and public utilities and state agencies for the relocation of utility and state agency property needed to make way for state water projects. These procedures were studied by this committee during the 1959-60 interim and the modifications in these procedures which were proposed at the 1961 Session (A B 2136) have been referred to further interim study.

House Resolution No 435 requests the Department of Water Resources to submit proposed relocation agreements to the committee 30 days prior to execution and authorizes the committee to study these agreements and to hold public hearings on them "if the committee... finds a hearing is appropriate to protect the public interest"

The committee has limited the agreements studied to those involving more than \$100,000 and thus far has reviewed several agreements. At this date it has not been necessary to hold any public hearings on relocation agreements, but this study is a continuing one and hearings may be held in the future.

4 Saline Conversion and Nuclear Energy

For several years a subcommittee (Assemblyman Jack A. Beaver, Chairman) has conducted a continuing investigation of current saline water conversion and nuclear energy developments on the state and national level A hearing of the subcommittee was held in December 1961 to receive the latest information available and to review the State's activities in these areas Particular attention is being directed by the subcommittee to the possibilities of utilizing nuclear energy to meet power requirements of the Feather River Project Further hearings by the subcommittee will be scheduled from time to time.

5 Study of District Laws (H.R. 434)

House Resolution No 434 directs the committee to "study the subject of the laws relating to the organization, powers and duties of water districts and to direct the committee to submit an analysis of existing district laws and the reasons for their variations." The committee staff is compiling this information, which is intended to serve as a source document for the Legislature. No hearings have been scheduled on this subject, which will continue for the remainder of the interim.

6. Other Studies

Most of the individual bills assigned to the committee for study pertain either to general programs of assistance for local projects or specific project appropriations. Hearings will be held on these bills during the summer and fall of 1962. It is anticipated that these hearings will profit from information becoming available through the continuing investigations and planning activities of the various state agencies.

ASSEMBLY INTERIM COMMITTEE ON WAYS AND MEANS Progress Report 1962 (February)

The Assembly Interim Committee on Ways and Means is considering eight subjects during this interim period. They are: 1—State Long-Range Budgeting and Forward Planning, 2—Special Funds; 3—State Purchasing, 4—Capital Outlay; 5—Leave Pay, 6—Lake Earl, 7—Institutional Costs, 8—Tourist Trade

An organizational meeting of the entire interim committee was held in Monterey on September 7, 1961, under the chairmanship of Assemblyman Jesse M Unruh, Los Angeles At this meeting preliminary discussions of all study subjects were held

Following the election of Mr Unruh to the Speakership of the Assembly, Assemblyman Robert W Crown, Alameda, was named Chairman of the Ways and Means Committee

On November 20, 1961, at Los Angeles, a second meeting of the entire Assembly Interim Committee on Ways and Means was held, focusing on the long-range budgeting study but including also progress reports by subcommittee chairmen and others involved in the studies

Long-Range Budgeting and Forward Planning

The study of Long-Range Budgeting and Forward Planning is being considered by the committee as a whole. This is an attempt to find and propose methods of overcoming the weaknesses of year-to-year budget development by looking to the fiscal effects of programs over a five-year or longer period. Preliminary research in this subject has been contracted to the firm of Griffinhagen-Kroeger of San Francisco, which will present a report to the committee before the close of the interim period.

At the Los Angeles meeting, Mr Louis Kroeger presented an outline for the long-range budgeting study indicating that this would necessarily be a pilot study yet one which would attempt to advance to the point of outlining forecasting and programming techniques that will be directly applicable by the Legislature to actual budget-making processes

Special Funds

The Special Funds study is also under consideration by the commuttee as a whole This is a continuation of a legislative program started during the 1961 Regular Legislative Session. The objective is to inquire into those areas where special funds might be eliminated by incorporation into the General Fund to permit more flexible legislative and administrative control in the economical utilization of state moneys.

State Purchasing

The Subcommittee on State Purchasing, pursuant to H R. 451, is looking into the relative costs of various methods of textbook adoption and school supply purchasing A hearing was held in Fresno on December 20 and 21, 1961, at which progress on the recommendations of the Ways and Means Committee Report of April 27, 1961, regarding textbook production and disposition was surveyed. It was found that movements had been made in the recommended directions, but major problems remained in production cost accounting procedures and statewide distribution procedures.

This subcommittee will hold about five additional hearings on this subject matter.

Capital Outlay

The Subcommittee on Capital Outlay, pursuant to HR 460, is surveying the relative costs of all methods employed by the State in acquiring office space At a hearing in Sacramento on December 19, 1961, evidence was presented to indicate that the State generally fares better in owning rather than leasing its buildings, even when local tax losses are considered However, other considerations enter, such as the duration of the State's need in a particular area

Efficiency of utilization is also a key factor in ultimate costs to the taxpayer, and will be closely considered in subsequent hearings. Parking is another major consideration in state operated facilities, and the subcommittee will be investigating the possibility of establishing a standard policy for all departments as to acquisition and fees

Also included in this subcommittee's work will be an investigation of possible misuse of state automobiles, pursuant to H R 407

Leave Pay

The Subcommittee on Leave Pay, pursuant to HR 456, is studying the matter of leaves of absence for public employees. The study has been restricted to the areas of temporary military leave for training, leave for specialized job training, and under AB 64, leave for Civil Air Patrol search and rescue missions.

A nationwide survey of states' practices regarding temporary military leave has been conducted showing that in almost every case the privileges are less than those granted by California Private industry in California generally allows less also, but several agencies have expressed concern that a cutback in state allowances might adversely affect the National Guard and Army Reserve programs At least two public hearings are to be scheduled following the budget session

Lake Earl

Pursuant to ACR 51, the Subcommittee on Lake Earl will hold hearings this summer to consider development and conservation problems in the Lake Earl watershed area in northwestern California near the Oregon border

Institutional Costs

The Subcommittee on Institutional Costs is concerned with costs of maintaining inmates in state prisons and patients in state hospitals

The major part of the subcommittee's work will relate to sentencing and parole practices of the prison authorities, considered especially from an efficiency standpoint A first hearing on this subject was held on February 6 and 7, 1962 At least two subsequent hearings and visitations at various prisons are planned

Information is being prepared in anticipation of the release later in 1962 of the Master Plan for Mental Hygiene, at which time the subcommittee will study its financial consequences

Tourist Trade

The Subcommittee on Tourist Trade held its first hearing in Anahem on January 11 and 12, 1962, at which time considerable support was expressed by public and private organizations for the establishment of a state office to coordinate general activity in aiding Cali-

forma's tourist industry. It was reported that ours is the only state without such an office

A major concern of this committee is the current overcrowding of existing parks and campgrounds and programs for developing new facilities, particularly in depressed areas of the State where recreation may be the only potential major industry. Further hearings in this field will be held in Monterey, San Francisco and Redding

The Ways and Means Interim Committee has two additional bills from the 1961 Session under study, $\Delta\,B$ 2549 extending the period for which state highway funds may remain credited to counties for their use, and $\Delta\,B$ 3148 which would make expenditures from the State Highway Fund subject to the same budgetary and fiscal controls as other expenditures of state funds

House Resolution No 331

Relating to X-ray equipment used in professional offices

Whereas, Assemble Bill No. 1975, a bill having overall coverage of atomic power and ionization, contains provisions for the regulation and licensing of X-ray equipment used in professional offices, and Whereas, The inclusion of such X-ray equipment was for the purpose of having

legislation which could be the basis of agreements with the federal government on radiation control, and

WHEREAS, It has been asserted that statutes perfaming to X-ray equipment used in professional offices should be separate and distinct legislation and not combined with other problems of radiation, and

WHEREAS. That assertion was recognized by the members of the Public Health Committee when they provided that the portion of Assembly Bill No. 1975 which telates to such heresing shall not take effect until July 1, 1962, and WHEREAS. The delay in operation was provided with the intent that an interim study be made of the regulation and hereising of X-ray equipment and that the recommendations of such interim study be used as the basis for legislation in the event an item on such subject is included by the Governor in any special session, now, therefore be it

Resolved by the Assembly of the State of California, That the Assembly Committee on Rules is beight directed to assign to the appropriate interior committee for study the regulation and becoming of X-ray equipment and to direct such committee to report its findings to the Assembly by the fifth calendar day of the 1962 Regular Session

Summary

The regulations dealing with X-ray machines in professional offices which have been promulgated by the Department of Public Health recognize the very important distinction between regulation of the X-ray machine and the professional use to which it is put. The inclusion within the Radiation Control Law of 1961 of the authority to regulate X-ray machines used in the healing arts permits a comprehensive approach to the problems of radiation which can work to the advantage of both the regulated and to the purpose for which the legislation was passed—the protection of the health and safety of the people of California

Conclusion

There is no need at the present time for amendments to the Radiation Control Law sections dealing with X-ray machines in professional offices

Introduction

In 1961 the California Legislature passed AB 1975, the Radiation Control Law, which had two closely related purposes

To serve as a basis for the transfer of federal regulatory authority over sources of ionizing radiation to the State

To serve as a statutory framework for the issuance for the first time within the State of regulations dealing with X-ray machines (including fluoroscope machines) within professional offices

This report will refer to this second purpose

The enactment by Congress of the 1959 amendments to the Atomic Energy Act (Public Law 86-373) portends to have a considerable effect upon the role of the states in the regulation of certain radioactive sources Until these amendments were adopted, the federal government, specifically the Atomic Energy Commission, had virtually complete jurisdiction. The changes in the law provide for a decentralization of certain aspects of the regulation of radioactive sources to the state level providing that each state which applies for assumption of the responsibility meets $\Delta \to C$ requirements.

As of February 1, 1962, California and 12 other states had passed legislation permitting them to enter into agreements with the A E C 1

Section 25830 of the Health and Safety Code reads

The Governor on behalf of this State, may enter into agreements with the federal government providing for discontinuance of certain of the federal government's responsibilities with respect to sources of ionizing radiation and the assumption thereof by this State Such agreements shall become effective only when ratified by law

X-Ray Machines and Public Health

While the inclusion of authority within the Radiation Control Law to permit the Department of Public Health to issue regulations on inspection and operation of X-ray devices was not an integral part of the anticipated agreement with the A E C, the reasoning which led to the coupling of the programs centered on the fact that the type of hazard to the public health is identical The effects of radiation are the same whether received from medical and dental X-rays, industrial exposure, or fallout At the present time there are over 21,000 X-ray machines in California producing an estimated 95 percent of the population's man-made exposure to radiation 3 It is acknowledged that the reduction of medical and dental exposure by only a few percent would be "more than equivalent to eliminating all other sources of man-made radiation exposure" 4

Unwarranted exposure to radiation must be avoided if the immense and acknowledged benefits from the use of atomic energy and X-rays are to be fully realized Several studies have indicated that there is unnecessary exposure to patients and operating personnel as a result of faulty techniques and hazardous equipment. Even though an X-ray machine initially meets the manufacturer's standards and specifications, it should continue to be subject to inspection for compliance with state regulations. The National Committee on Radiation Protection after many years of maintaining that the public safety could be adequately secured through the method of "education and voluntary compliance" has recognized that "conditions are changing rapidly and that state control may become a necessity with the accelerating growth of radiation uses." "5

Procedure in the Formation and Adoption of the Regulations

After the adoption of the Radiation Control Law, the State Board of Public Health appointed a 12-member Advisory Committee consisting of representatives from medicine, medical radiology, dentistry, medical physics, industry, labor, and local health departments. This group examined in detail and made revisions in the first draft of reg-

ulations prepared by the Bureau of Radiological Health in the Department of Public Health, based on model regulations proposed by the A E C, the US Public Health Service, and the Council of State Governments as well as recommendations from the National Committee on Radiation Protection 6

The Advisory Committee's action resulted in a second draft which was circulated to approximately 500 persons in affected professions and industries, followed by public hearings held October 17 in Los Angeles and October 20 in Berkeley At these meetings the tentative regulations were subject to full discussion and subsequently a third draft was prepared by the Advisory Committee utilizing information received through oral and written comments that had been offered. After review by the Coordinator of Atomic Energy Development and Radiation Protection,7 the State Board of Public Health on December 8, 1961, adopted the regulations. At this meeting no basic changes were reauested.

The Regulations

These regulations add California to the list of at least 19 other states which have control programs for X-ray equipment 8 The regulations adopted by the Board of Public Health consist of five groups.9

- Registration of Sources of Radiation
- Licensing of Radioactive Materials
- Standards for Protection Against Radiation
- Transportation of Radioactive Materials
- 5. Participation by Local Health Departments

It is group three, Article 7, dealing with "Special Requirements for the Use of X-rays in the Healing Arts," which is particularly relevant to this report These requirements follow closely the specifications recommended by the most authoritative body on the subject, the National Committee on Radiation Protection 10

The Assembly Interim Committee on Public Health at its hearing on November 7, 1961 in San Francisco received testimony from interested parties on the regulations. No strong objections to the intent of these regulations, nor to their specific content were voiced Dr Eugene Ziegler representing the Joint Legislative Committee of the California State Dental Association and the Southern California State Dental Association, suggested that the necessarily highly technical language of the regulations should be translated into terminology which the practitioner could more easily understand and implement 11 Dr. John Heslep, Acting Chief of the Bureau of Radiological Health has indicated to the committee that the bureau will issue a descriptive summary clarifying the requirements of the regulations which should resolve this difficulty

The Implementation of the Regulations

The size of the inspection staff is closely tied to the fee of five dollars for each reportable radiation machine 12 At the present time it is antrespated that approximately 2,000 machines per year will be inspected, with priority assigned to those areas where potential improvement is greatest

Commenting on the implementation of the program at the November 7 hearing, Dr Heslep stated,

we would prefer not to call this an inspection, actually because our hope is that the greatest purpose that can be accomplished by our people as they enter a practitioner's office is to point out to him some of the operational problems with respect to controlling unnecessary exposure and to convince him by rational argument that (he) should do certain things in certain ways to provide this protection 13

With regard to the place of professional judgment he declared that, a point that I stressed was that we have no intent or desire of interfering with the professional judgment. What we're talking about really here are some physical engineering factors that influence the amount of radiation exposure in a procedure, and our intent is to make these factors as favorable as possible from this standpoint 14



(b) The amount charged for property returned by customers when that entire amount is refunded either in cash or credit, but this exclusion shall not apply in any instance when the customer, in order to obtain the refund, is required to purchase other property at a price greater than the amount charged for the property that is returned For the purpose of this section refund or credit of the entire amount shall be deemed to be given when the purchase price less rehandling and restocking costs are refunded or credited to the customer

(c) The amount charged for labor or services rendered in installing

or applying the property sold

(d) The amount of any tax (not including, however, any manufacturers' or importers' excise tax) imposed by the United States upon or with respect to retail sales whether imposed upon the retailer or the consumer

GENTLEMIN In accordance with the requirements of Section 11011 of the Government Code, submitted herewith is the "Annual Report to the State Legislature on Surplus Proprietary Lands", by the Department of Vinance On October 10, 1961, the department instructed each state agency under the subject "Annual Inventory and Report of Excess State Land," to review all lands under its jurisdiction and submit a report thereon to the Department of Finance The instructions read in part as follows "The report will in all cases include a statement that a review of all lands owned by the agency has been made, and will list those lands determined to be excess Lands previously reported as excess shall not be included in the current report."

shall not be included in the current report."

In response to the above, the various agencies have declared 11 purcels comprising 212.4 acres to be surplus to their foreserable needs. The salable properties, having an estimated value of \$672,010 are described in detail in the body of this report. It is recommended that bills be passed in the manner prescribed in said Section 11011 by each house of the Legislatine, in this, its current session, authorizang the sale, exchange or other disposition of these properties. The department has caused such bills, now before you, to be introduced for this purpose. Since commencement of the present surplus property disposal pugnam established by the Legislature in 1951, the Department of Finance has caused approximately 7,400 acres of 1 and to be sold or permanently encumbered and returned to the tax rolls with the exception of those properties conveyed to foul tax-exempt governmental agencies. The cumulative total revenue resulting from the department's activities over the years has been \$6,832,491.12 including \$2,527,237.12 produced in the past calendar year. This latter amount unkindes proceeds from the sale of hie parcels to state agencies operating almost entirely on funds derived from non-state sources.

The volume of sales in 1961, increased substantially over previous years. In spite of this the revenue did not reach the amount forecasted.



REMARKS BY MR. MONAGAN RELATIVE TO ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 1 Mr. Speaker and Members:

I do not know whether I appear before you as the farcical leader of the task or as leader of the task "farce" as Mr Crown has so aptly identified us In either case, no long, dramatic, impassioned, inflammatory statements are necessary at this time.

Most apropos of the occasion would be the remarks of Abraham Lincoln, who stated that the world will little note nor long remember what we say here However, the people of California will long note and remember what we do here this year and for many years to come.

We have been challenged by the Governor and by the majority party leaders to reduce the budget that the Governor refers to as austere and balanced We accepted this challenge, knowing that the job would be difficult Mr. Crown has already alluded to the fact that the Legislature has no control over a major portion of the finances of the State of California. In addition, many political implications are involved, as the majority party attempts to protect—and properly so—our Governor, who is a member of their party. It would be extremely difficult for them to propose any substantial cuts in a budget that the Governor has referred to as finely balanced and austere

Mr Crown has also referred to our nonappearance before the Ways and Means Committee We were waiting for the Ways and Means Committee to properly perform its function and, if they had met the challenge of major reductions in the budget, it would not have been necessary for us to make any additional suggestions.

Now let us talk about the related facts to this problem The Administration in this budget is spending down to their very last nickel. Surplus, estimated at the end of the current fiscal year, is minute in comparison to a nearly \$3 billion budget Even under the most rosy of economic conditions and if everything they say comes to pass, they still must balance their budget by pulling out of thin air a \$6 million forced savings program.

We have heard a great deal of conversation about a balanced budget. Let's properly place this in focus. This budget is no more balanced than my meager budget at home. They are doing this by using up the last dollar of a surplus created by the largest tax increase in the history of California in 1959; by transferring moneys from special funds to the General Fund that will never again be available, and by use of \$\frac{1}{2}\$141 million in bonds, a substantial portion of which the people of California have not yet authorized

We have noted in the last four years a 45 percent increase in state expenditures, that is parallel to only a 13 percent increase in population

The most fantastic of their suggestions is that the revenues for the State of California will increase by better than 10 percent in general

funds in the next year. The figures show that in the last 10 years, discounting 1959, we have averaged only a 7 percent increase in revenues. Under the best of circumstances, these revenue trends do not measure up. They are based on extremely optimistic estimates that are sharply in doubt, even more so now that President Kennedy stated only last week that the "economic performance has fallen below expectations". A 1 percent decrease in these revenue estimates is equivalent to more than \$25 million and is the real reason why we have attempted to find reductions in the budget or additional revenues to offset this eventuality.

All services of government required for and requested by our eitizens have some ment and are only limited by our ability and willingness to meet these obligations and responsibilities by paying the price either in taxes or in long-term debt.

I would have far more respect for the Executive Branch and the Department of Finance if they had honestly faced the facts as they exist and asked for the necessary merease in taxes that are required to meet this gigantic expenditure program, as detailed in the budget. Election year politics, of course, do not permit this candid approach.

I have a great deal of respect for the legislative process and for the integrity of Mr. Crown, the members of the Ways and Means Committee and all of my colleagues It is my hope that they would meet the challenge of economic chaos ahead before presenting this budget for our consideration. We have waited until the last moment to suggest ways of bringing the budget in balance, because of the experience that we have noted in the Ways and Means Committee where milliondollar augmentations have been made and eleventh-hour reductions have been instituted without any witnesses or full consideration

Today we had before us amendments that would have made it possible to reduce this budget by approximately \$15 million. All were rejected by the majority party. Other specific suggestions have been made that would meet our legislative responsibilities in this economic challenge, but all have been ignored. Under conditions of both the current and forecast of our state expenditures and revenue program, it is imperative that we reduce spending. Although all programs of state expenditures have some merit, it is my contention that we cannot afford all in every degree. In the form that we have before us, this is not even the Governor's budget and I would suggest that even he would not approve it.

I ask for a 'No' vote

Bulletin No 99 recommends that local interests continue to proceed with development of their water resources as fasts as is economically possible so that the possibility for the loss of right to appropriate water which would be induced by the inclination of the Monticello Project, will be kept to a minimum To that end, the information presented in this bulletin should serve to help the local people understand the necessary steps that should be taken toward their solution

Memorrs of the Legislature of the State of Cauforna Gentlemen 1 have the honor to transmit herewith Bulletin No 93 of the State Department of Water Resources, entitled "Saline Water Demineralization and Nuclear Energy in the California Water Plan"

The various processes used in producing fresh water from the oceans, and the present and predicted future costs for the most promising processes are described in this bulletin The possible application of nuclear energy to sea water conversion and to the energy demand for pumping water supplies developed by the State Water Faultities and developed Facilities are discussed.

Although no saline water demineralization technique yet developed can compete with the costs of large-scale development of natural sources of water in California, with the costs of large-scale development of natural sources of water in California, it is probable that saline water conversion plants will have a definite place in the water program The Department of Water Resources will continue to take a definite and continuing interest in those areas of research and development that may have promise of eventually producing low-cost converted water. The study of the applications of nuclear energy to the various aspects of the problem of development of a practical and economic water program is of prime importance to the welfare of this State. The Department of Water Resources will maintain continued and detailed surveillance of developments in this field and their application


