**Proclamation**

Executive Department, State of California

WHEREAS, an extraordinary occasion has arisen and now exists requiring that the Legislature of the State of California be convened in extraordinary session, now, therefore,

I, RONALD REAGAN, Governor of the State of California, by virtue of the power and authority in me vested by Section 3 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of California, do hereby convene the Legislature of the State of California to meet in extraordinary session at Sacramento, California, on the sixth day of November, 1967, at 3 00 P. M. of said day for the following purpose and to legislate upon the following subject:

To consider and act upon legislation relative to the reapportionment of the state's Congressional districts.

Relative to the Queen Mary

WHEREAS, One of the most beautiful and historic ships ever to sail upon the oceans of this world, the majestic and graceful Cunard liner Queen Mary, will soon grace the harbor of the City of Long Beach, and

WHEREAS, Truly a "Queen" in fact as well as in name, she rendered outstanding service in wartime as well as peacetime and was the object of worldwide affection; and

WHEREAS, The Queen Mary departed England for the last time on October 31, 1967, to arrive in Long Beach, California, December 9, 1967, climaxing a 15,000 mile, 89-day trip which will include stops in Cherbourg, Lisbon and the Canary Islands, crossing the Atlantic to Rio de Janeiro, steaming around the Horn at the tip of South America for the first time, calling at Valparaiso, Chile, Lima, Peru, and Balboa, Canal Zone, and concluding with the four-day run from Acapulco to Long Beach; and

WHEREAS, Her triumphant maiden voyage in 1936 marked the beginning of a glorious career, and

WHEREAS, Having survived the Great Depression, she then enjoyed a few fleeting years of gaiety before serving gallantly in the war; and

WHEREAS, Peacetime service was resumed on July 31, 1947, and returning along with this service was the old-time gaiety that the Queen Mary had known so well, and

WHEREAS, People expected the best from the Queen Mary and no other ship ever possessed such power to bring out the best in people; and

WHEREAS, Like the Queen Mother herself, she is the symbol of an era that emphasized quality in all things, and she reflects such sterling traits as strength of character, stateliness, and devotion to duty, and

WHEREAS, As she approaches her retirement, having conquered the sea for many years, the Queen Mary will leave an empty feeling in the hearts of many of those who had the pleasure of enjoying her most comforting service, now, therefore, be it

*Resolved by the Assembly of the State of California,* That the Members of the Assembly and the people of the State of California welcome the Queen Mary to Long Beach, California, and wish for her the greatest fame and popularity that she has known, as one of the world's most cherished museums.

#### House Resolution No. 4

Relative to the 60th Anniversary of Memorial Hospital of Long Beach

WHEREAS, Memorial Hospital of Long Beach, one of the nation's leading community medical centers and the largest single nongovernment hospital on the West Coast, will observe its 60th anniversary of care for the people of Southern California on November 21, 1967, and

WHEREAS, Memorial Hospital of Long Beach has brought credit to California for a myriad of innovations and achievements in patient care, medical research and medical education, and

WHEREAS, For pioneering better patient care and more effective cost controls, Memorial Hospital this year was cited in the U S Congress as "a model of the best being accomplished by our hospitals and as a prototype of what we should look for in the hospitals of today and tomorrow", and

WHEREAS, Memorial Hospital's Directors, Trustees, Medical Staff Members, volunteers and employees have risen to meet the challenges posed by increasing population, inflation, and rapid changes in the science of medicine and, in so doing, set the pace for other hospitals in the country, and

#### House Resolution No. 5

Relative to an Open Meeting and Public Records Advisory Committee

The members of the advisory committee shall annually elect one of their members as chairman. The advisory committee shall meet at the call of the chairman and the Assembly Judiciary Committee shall consult with and seek the advice of the advisory committee. The advisory committee shall advise the members of the Assembly Judiciary Committee and shall advise and make recommendations in its subject area of public meetings and public records and access thereto by the public.

The advisory committee may receive testimony from the public and from officials of public entities on matters involving its responsibilities and may express its conclusions and advice by resolution when appropriate.

It is the intention of the Assembly that the advisory committee shall be kept apprised and fully informed on all matters of policy and contemplated action involving open meetings of public entities and access by the public to public records by the Assembly Judiciary Committee and by Members of the Assembly.

All meetings of the advisory committee shall be open and public as shall all records thereof.

The Assembly Rules Committee shall pay from the Contingent Fund of the Assembly to the members of the advisory committee travel expenses and a per diem allowance incurred while on the business of the advisory committee at the same rate as that paid to Members of the Assembly.

## Proclamation of a State of Disaster

Executive Department, State of California

WHEREAS, the laws of the State of California empower the Governor to proclaim a State of Disaster in an area or region of this state affected or likely to be affected by certain conditions of extreme peril to persons and property within the state, which proclamation shall be in writing and shall take effect immediately upon its issuance; and

WHEREAS, I, as Governor of the State of California, have found and do hereby find

1. That conditions of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property within this state have arisen and now exist as a result of major and widespread fires which have occurred in large areas within the Counties of Los Angeles, Orange, San Diego and Ventura.

2. That the aforesaid conditions are of such severity that local authority in areas directly affected is inadequate to cope with these conditions of extreme peril by reason of their magnitude

3. That the Boards of Supervisors of the Counties of Los Angeles, Orange, San Diego and Ventura have proclaimed a local disaster to exist within their respective counties;

4. That the Chairmen of the Boards of Supervisors of the Counties of Los Angeles, Orange, San Diego and Ventura have requested the Governor to proclaim a State of Disaster in their respective counties; and

5. That the aforesaid conditions of extreme peril warrant and necessitate the proclamation by the Governor of the existence of a State of Disaster

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Ronald Reagan, Governor of the State of California, by virtue of the powers and authority vested in me by the Constitution and laws of this state, do hereby proclaim that a State of Disaster exists in the Counties of Los Angeles, Orange, San Diego and Ventura, and

I DIRECT that this proclamation shall take effect immediately, and that as soon hereafter as possible this proclamation be filed in the office of the Secretary of State of the State of California, and that widespread publicity and notice be given to this proclamation.

WHEREAS, The State of California has a unique and pressing air pollution problem, which is caused in large part by the emission of motor vehicle air pollutants which consist of toxic hydrocarbons, carbon monoxide, and oxides of nitrogen; and

WHEREAS, The ever-increasing quantity of those toxic and noxious gases in our atmosphere constitutes a serious health hazard to the people of this state, especially within the Los Angeles basin, where the problem far exceeds that found in any other major city in this county; and

WHEREAS, The United States Congress was considering federal legislation, including the Dingell amendment, which would have precluded the State of California from adopting and enforcing, without the consent of the federal government, stricter requirements relating to the emission of motor vehicle pollutants than those established by the federal government; and

WHEREAS, Radio Station KLAC, even though a commercial broadcaster and to a degree dependent financially upon the industries who were involved in the pressing issue of air pollution, initiated a stimulating and enlightening series of programs entitled the "Breath of Death" which contributed greatly to the public awareness of the danger of this federal legislation; and

WHEREAS, The communicasters and station promotion people of Radio Station KLAC requested the people to register their dissent to this preempting federal legislation, and the response was overwhelming, as they were rewarded with over 370,000 post cards from people in the Los Angeles area, 330,000 of which were taken directly to Washington, D C., and

WHEREAS, It was the efforts of civic-minded organizations and people, commercial or otherwise, such as Radio Station KLAC, which caused the Dingell amendment to be defeated and the voice of the citizenry to be heard, now, therefore, be it

WHEREAS, He is a past president of the Compton Junior College Board of Trustees, a former Deputy Commissioner of Boy Scouts, a former chairman of the Red Cross, and a former member of the Board of Trustees of the Norwalk State Hospital, and he is a member of the Compton Rotary Club, the Willowbrook Coordinating Council, Phi Delta Kappa, Phi Kappa Tau, Elks, Eagles, the Democratic County Central Committee for the 38th Assembly District, and the Compton Veterans Service Center Board, and

WHEREAS, As a member of the California Assembly, Carley Porter has demonstrated great legislative skill as chairman for eight years of the Committee on Water, as chairman for 10 years of the Los Angeles County delegation in the Assembly, as chairman of the Ways and Means Subcommittee 1A on Agriculture, Natural Resources, and Water Resources, as chairman of the Joint Legislative Committee on the San Francisco Bay-Delta Study, as chairman of the California Advisory Committee on Western States Water Planning, and as a member of the Joint Legislative Ethics Committee, the Constitutional Revision Commission, and the Joint Committee on Water Problems, and

Strike out all of the WHEREAS clauses and the Resolved clauses of the printed measure, as printed on page 9 of the Assembly Journal for November 6, 1967, and insert

"WHEREAS, The Queen Mary was launched by a bottle of Australian wine by the young Queen Mary at Clydebank, England, on September 26, 1934, and WHEREAS, On March 21, 1936, this gallant ship left her birthplace and sailed down the river to the sea, watched by over a million persons, and

WHEREAS, The Queen Mary is 1,020 feet long and 118 feet wide with a gross tonnage of 81,273, exceeding the heights of the Eiffel Tower (984 feet), Los Angeles' tallest building, the Union Bank (538 feet), the Los Angeles City Hall (464 feet), and Niagara Falls, and

WHEREAS, She sailed on her maiden voyage for New York on May 27, 1936, carrying the largest marine risk insurance ever written, plus 1,849 passengers and a crew of 1,200, including 800 stewards; and

WHEREAS, Lady Mabel Fortescue-Harrison, one of England's most prominent astrologers, wrote in the London Times on that day "Most of this generation will be gone, including myself, when this event occurs, but the Queen Mary will know her greatest fame and popularity when she never sails another mile and never carries another paying passenger;" and

WHEREAS, In August, 1936, the Queen Mary sailed to Southampton in 3 days, 23 hours, and 57 minutes, wresting the mythical Blue Ribbon from the liner Normandie; and

WHEREAS, The Members have learned with deep regret of the death of Dr. Julian A. McPhee on November 10, 1967, and

WHEREAS, Dr. McPhee was the recently retired President of California State Polytechnic College who served in that capacity for 33 years, and

WHEREAS, His length of service as President of Cal Poly, as it is popularly known, exceeded the combined total on the terms of offices of the six individuals who preceded Julian A. McPhee as the head of the institution and made him the senior president of the seventeen colleges in the California State College system; and

WHEREAS, His long and illustrious career in education was built upon a foundation of his own education which began soon after his birth in San Francisco in 1898 and took him through the University of California at Berkeley from which he received his bachelor's degree in 1917 and his master's in 1928, and

WHEREAS, He served his country in 1918 and 1919 as a commissioned officer in the United States Navy during World War I and served the University of California for a short while as an assistant farm advisor in Merced County; and

WHEREAS, His service to public education in California began as a teacher of vocational agriculture at Gilroy Union High School in 1920 and continued there for five years during which time he served also as vice principal and adult evening school principal, and

WHEREAS, His service as an employee of the State of California began in August, 1925, when he was appointed Assistant State Supervisor of Agriculture, and continued through the next four decades with his talents being quickly recognized, resulting in his promotion in 1926 to Chief of the State Bureau of Agricultural Education, a position he held until 1944 when he became State Director of Vocational Education; and

WHEREAS, The outstanding programs of vocational agricultural education and vocational education in this state received great impetus under the vital and energetic leadership of Julian A. McPhee during the period from 1925 to 1949 which impetus included the founding of the California Chapter of the Future Farmers of America of which he was the state advisor for nearly two decades; and

WHEREAS, He had the unusual ability and dynamic energy not only to do outstanding work in these state-wide vocational education leadership roles but simultaneously, from 1933 to 1949, he jointly carried out his responsibilities as Chief of the Bureau of Vocational Agriculture and later as State Director of Vocational Education while carrying out the duties of President of the California State Polytechnic College; and

WHEREAS, President McPhee applied his outstanding talents and energy as well as his missionary zeal to the development of the struggling, little polytechnic school in San Luis Obispo which had only 104 students and a \$150,000 annual budget when he took over as president in 1933; and

WHEREAS, President McPhee worked diligently with his faculty, his students, the State Department of Education, the State Board of Education, and the California State Legislature, and more recently the Trustees of the California State Colleges, to build the California State Polytechnic College into a college with an international reputation for excellence, until today it is the largest agricultural college in terms of enrollment in the United States and the largest undergraduate engineering school in the West; the college has three campuses, 11,000 full-time students, a total capital outlay investment on about 4,000 acres of land at three campus locations of about \$100 million dollars, and an annual operating budget of about \$11,000,000; and

WHEREAS, This outstanding record of service to the people of the State of California, and particularly to the youth who have profited by the development of educational programs which lead to career opportunities in many occupations and professions is partially measured in terms of the outstanding graduates of the college, which include since 1942 more than 12,000 who have received bachelor's degrees, 600 who have received master's degrees, and 860 technical diplomas; and

WHEREAS, During these years of dedicated service to public education and higher education in the State of California President McPhee also found time to serve his state and nation in many other capacities, including, Director, Food Production War Training during World War II; Director, Veterans Training for California, and head of the Naval Flight Preparatory School and Naval Academic Refresher Unit programs at Cal Poly in which 4,700 naval cadets were trained between 1943 and 1946; and

WHEREAS, The successful educational programs at the California State Polytechnic College were recognized by substantial gifts to the college, one in 1933 from the Charles B. Voorhis family of the 157-acre Voorhis School for Boys in San Dimas, and one in 1949 from the W. K. Kellogg Foundation of the 800-acre Kellogg Arabian Horse Ranch which has since that date been transformed into one of the most beautiful of the California state college campuses; and

WHEREAS, His dedication to his work in education was second only to his family life which began in November 1918, with his marriage to Miss Alma C. Doyle and produced six beautiful daughters, all of whom married, and these marriages brought to the McPhees 31 grandchildren, now, therefore be it

*Resolved by the Assembly of the State of California,* That the Members express their deep regret and their personal loss to the widow, children and grandchildren of Dr. Julian A. McPhee, a truly remarkable man the State of California was indeed honored and privileged to have serve it so well and for so long; and be it further

**Assembly Bill No. 3**—An act to repeal Chapter 1 (commencing with Section 30000) of Division 16 of, and to add Chapter 1 (commencing with Section 30000) to Division 16 of, the Elections Code, relating to reappointment of congressional districts

The question being: Shall the Assembly concur in the following Senate amendments to Assembly Bill No. 3?

#### Amendment No. 1

On page 1 of the printed bill, strike out lines 10 and 11, and insert.

"1. The Counties of Del Norte, Humboldt, Mendocino, Napa and Sonoma, together with all that portion of the County of Marin lying northerly of the following described line:

Beginning at the intersection of the northern boundary of the Dixie School District as it existed on January 1, 1967 and the easterly boundary of the County of Marin located in San Pablo Bay, thence westerly along the northerly boundary of the Dixie School District as it existed on January 1, 1967 to its intersection with the center line of State Route 101, thence southerly along the center line of State Route 101 to its intersection with the northerly boundary of the City of San Rafael as it existed on January 1, 1967, thence westerly along the northerly boundary of the City of San Rafael to its intersection with the northerly boundary of the San Rafael School District as it existed on January 1, 1967, thence generally northwesterly along the northerly boundary of the San Rafael School District to its intersection with the westerly boundary of the San Anselmo School District as it existed on January 1, 1967, thence northwesterly and southwesterly along the boundary of the San Anselmo School District to its intersection with the northerly boundary of the Fairfax School District as it existed on January 1, 1967; thence southwesterly along the northerly boundary of the Fairfax School District to its intersection with the easterly boundary of the Lagunitas School District as it existed on January 1, 1967, thence generally southwesterly along the easterly boundary of the Lagunitas School District to its intersection with the northeasterly boundary of the Bolinas-Stinson School District as it existed on January 1, 1967, thence southeasterly along the easterly boundary of the Bolinas-Stinson School District to its intersection with the shoreline of the Pacific Ocean, shall constitute the First Congressional District.

2. The Counties of Alpine, Amador, Butte, Calaveras, El Dorado, Inyo, Lassen,

Madera, Matiposa, Modoc, Mono, Nevada, Placer, Plumas, Shasta, Sierra, Siskiyou, Trinity, Tehama and Tuolumne shall constitute the Second Congressional District.

3 All that portion of the County of Sacramento bounded and described as follows:

Relative to memorializing Major General Bruno Hochmuth

WHEREAS, It was with the most sincere and profound sorrow that the Members of the Assembly of the State of California learned of the death in South Vietnam, as a result of hostile enemy action, of one of the most illustrious and able officers in the service of this Nation, Major General Bruno Hochmuth, the Commanding General of the Third Marine Division, and

WHEREAS, General Hochmuth was a distinguished, inspiring combat leader and one of the Marine Corps' brilliant commanders, and

WHEREAS, A native of Houston, Texas, he was graduated from Texas A. & M. in June 1935, and the following month was commissioned a Second Lieutenant in the Marine Corps, and

WHEREAS, He completed basic school in Philadelphia and joined the Marine Detachment at the Texas Centennial in Dallas in June 1936, and in December 1936, he was assigned to the Second Battalion, Sixth Marine Regiment in San Diego and later served briefly with the Sixth Marines in Shanghai; and

WHEREAS, He received a short transfer to the Fourth Marines, with whom he served for two and one-half years, then returned to the United States and to the Seventh Defense Battalion in September 1940, going with that battalion to Samoa in February 1941, and

WHEREAS, During World War II, he was assigned to posts in Camp Lejeune, North Carolina, and Quantico, Virginia, then participated in the campaigns at Saipan and Tinian as Assistant Operations Officer with the Third Amphibious Corps and then commanded the Third Battalion, Fourth Marines, in the Okinawa campaign, and

WHEREAS, In August 1945, he landed in Japan as Executive Officer of the Fourth Marines, and on September 2nd he attended the formal surrender ceremony at Yakosuka; and

WHEREAS, After his return to the United States in August 1947, Major General Hochmuth served three years with Headquarters Marine Corps, then following graduation from the Industrial College of the Armed Forces, Fort McNair, Washington, D.C., he commanded the Second Marines, Second Marine Division, Camp Lejeune, and

WHEREAS, Major General Hochmuth instructed at the Canadian Army Staff College, Kingston, Ontario, for two years, then served with the Third Marine Division in Japan and Okinawa before returning in August 1956 to Quantico to serve as a member of the Advanced Research Group, Marine Corps Educational Center; and

WHEREAS, He served as chief of staff at the Recruit Depot in San Diego from 1957 to 1959, and while there became a Brigadier General, and in 1960, he became deputy chief of staff for research and development at Headquarters Marine Corps and was promoted to major general while so serving in 1963; and

WHEREAS, On November 15 1963, Major General Hochmuth became commanding general at the Marine Corps Recruit Depot in San Diego, and served there until his request to be transferred to Vietnam was granted on February 14, 1967; and

WHEREAS, Being a Marine in the finest tradition of the Corps, General Hochmuth requested permission to go to Vietnam because he believed this was a crucial test for world freedom to which he could contribute, and

WHEREAS, In Vietnam he did not retire to a command post distant from battle, but typically was in the midst of the fighting, lending courage, inspiration and example to the men in his command, and

WHEREAS, He will not only be remembered for his outstanding dedication to his country but also for his outstanding leadership in worthwhile community organizations, among which are included the Salvation Army, Red Cross, U.S.O., YMCA, United Community Services, Kiwanis, Navy Relief, and the San Diego Symphony; now, therefore, be it

*Resolved by the Assembly of the State of California* That the Members of the Assembly pay this tribute to Major General Bruno Hochmuth, a leader whose integrity and principles engendered love in all who knew him, and whose life may be summed up in five words—courage, action, integrity, dedication, accomplishment; and be it further

WHEREAS, Mr Stark entered the service of the newly created Youth Authority in 1943 as Chief of Delinquency Prevention Services, was appointed Chief of the Division of Field Services in 1945, and was named Director and Chairman of the Youth Authority Board in 1952 and continued to serve as such under four Governors, Earl Warren, Goodwin J. Knight, Edmund G. Brown, and Ronald Reagan; and

WHEREAS, Under Mr Stark's guidance and leadership, the California Youth Authority has achieved a world-wide reputation for innovative and progressive programs in the treatment of youthful offenders, having begun the development of psychiatric treatment programs at Youth Authority institutions which are providing new insight into the rehabilitative needs of its wards and pioneering the creation of a Division of Research to provide a continuing analysis and review of the Authority's many programs; and

WHEREAS, Mr Stark stimulated the development of a multiplicity of programs, both institutional and noninstitutional, to make individualization of treatment a reality, including programs for community treatment, short term intensive institutional programs, work programs in reforestation, probation subsidies to individual counties, and a system of camps, which collectively have reduced the number of institutionalized wards and lowered the rate of recidivism; and

WHEREAS, In 1966 the community treatment program pioneered by Mr. Stark was hailed by the President's Crime Commission as a blueprint for a national strategy to combat crime and delinquency and he has planned and carried out an extensive modernization of the Authority's institutions to provide the most effective possible facilities for wards while under rehabilitative custody; and

WHEREAS, Nationally and internationally reputed in his field, Mr Stark was a member in 1949 of a special commission to study German youth programs on the staff of General Lucius Clay, founded and was first President of the Juvenile Compact Administrators' Association in 1955 was chairman of the Advisory Committee to the National Governors' Conference Subcommittee on Juvenile Delinquency from 1963 to 1966 and was chairman of the 1967 National Governors' Conference on Juvenile Delinquency in Chicago, Illinois; and

WHEREAS, From 1943 to 1960 Mr Stark was executive secretary of the Governor's Advisory Committee on Children and Youth and founded, named, and organized the Knothole Gang at Wrigley Field in Los Angeles, which later expanded nationwide under Mr Stark's leadership and made it possible for underprivileged boys and girls to attend baseball games at all major league parks; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Stark has been recognized with numerous awards in his field, having received the Dan E. Koshland Award as the outstanding social work execu-

tive in California in 1949, the Pepperdine Award as the Outstanding Man in the Correctional Field in 1966, and the Distinguished Service Award of the California Congress of Parents and Teachers on May 12, 1967; now, therefore, be it

## MESSAGES FROM THE GOVERNOR

The following message from the Governor was received, and, by unanimous consent, ordered printed in the Journal:

Governor's Office, Sacramento

To: Members of the Senate and the Assembly

The recent decision of the California State Supreme Court has made it necessary for me to add to the call of the 1967 Second Extraordinary Session of the Legislature a request that the Legislature clarify its intent in the wording of the California Medical Assistance Program.

We are also asking the Legislature to go ahead with proposals that it conduct its own audit of the program, using an independent accounting firm, to insure that projected figures in this complex program have equal validity to both the Legislature and the Administration. Such an audit in no way, however, changes the need for a clarification of the intent of the law.

The Supreme Court decision in *Morris vs Williams* invalidated regulations adopted by the Health and Welfare Administrator under authority we believed the Legislature had given him.

The regulations were designed to provide health care services to the limit of appropriated funds for all persons covered by the program.

These regulations were the result of a careful study made by the 11-member Health Review and Program Council established by the Legislature to advise the administrator in the conduct of the Medical Assistance Program.

The Court's decision, though recognizing that the administrator must operate the program within appropriated funds, requires him to eliminate all medically indigent persons from the program before reducing any services granted to welfare recipients.

The medically indigent are needy persons not on welfare but with insufficient resources to meet their basic medical needs.

In effect, the Court ruling has tied the hands of the Administration in its effort to provide life-saving medical services for all needy California citizens.

The Court's interpretation of what it construes to be legislative intent has also severely limited the flexibility needed to administer this program.

To have a sound program with the administrative flexibility needed to meet changing conditions, I recommend the following legislation.

A concise and workable definition of the term "feasible." This and related terms are used in numerous places in the California Medical Assistance Act. The absence of clear definition causes unreconcilable conflicts which not only eliminate administrative flexibility but also can result in endless litigation over every decision made in operating the program.

A clear re-statement of legislative intent that the Health and Welfare Agency Administrator has been given discretion to either reduce services to all beneficiaries or reduce the number of beneficiaries, or a combination of both, in order to operate the program within annual appropriations. The Court's required elimination of up to 160,000 medically indigent from the program will cause a massive shift of responsibility for their health care to the county taxpayers.

This will not only result in an estimated annual loss of \$70 million in Federal matching funds but will also place the financial burden of their care on the counties. For example, It is estimated that the annual fiscal impact on Los Angeles County could be as high as \$60.5 million; Alameda \$7 million, San Diego \$6 million, San Francisco \$5 million, Fresno \$2.5 million.

A reduction in the interval between the time that services are provided and bills must be submitted for payment. The current six-month interval creates severe difficulties in determining current program expenditures during any fiscal year and in projecting program costs for subsequent fiscal years.

Enactment of these measures is essential if we are to carry out our responsibilities as mandated by the Legislature.

Positive and continuing efforts must be made to assure medical treatment for those who truly need it. New state taxes are not the solution to this problem. It is our responsibility to the people of this state to find a way to administer this program within existing funds and still furnish necessary medical treatment.

We herewith submit for inclusion in the journals of the respective houses a statement of population statistics for congressional districts embodied in Assembly Bill No. 9 of the 1967 Second Extraordinary Session.

The statistics are based on 1960 federal census figures, using federal census tracts and information provided by the United States Bureau of the Census.

Thirty-seven of the thirty-eight congressional districts deviate in population from the ideal size district of 413,620, by less than 5 percent. One district, the 2nd Congressional District, deviates by 8.1 percent. This resulted from a change of boundaries of District No. 16 which was made to reduce the existing 20 13 percent variation. It was determined that this change could be best effected by removing Madera County from this district. Since District No. 2 is the only existing district with a low percent of variation which is contiguous to Madera County, it was the only district in which Madera County could be placed without dividing the county. Thus, the 8.1 deviation was necessary to preserve the political integrity of Madera County.

**WHEREAS**, The Members of the Legislature have received copies of resolutions from various local and county school boards on the subject of the timely enactment of school finance legislation, and

**WHEREAS**, The point is well made that the late enactment of additional school financing complicates the budget-making process of local school districts, and

**WHEREAS**, The Constitution of the State of California requires that the annual state Budget Bill must be enacted prior to the time that any appropriation measures are passed in either house of the Legislature—save for the sole exception that the Governor of California may recommend passage of an appropriation bill in advance of the enactment of the Budget Bill, and

**WHEREAS**, The enactment of the Budget Bill, pursuant to other provisions of the California Constitution, requires a two-thirds vote of all eligible members, that is, the vote of 54 members of the Assembly and 27 members of the Senate, and

**WHEREAS**, The practical circumstances requiring a two-thirds vote of the Legislature and the enactment of the Budget Bill before any significant school finance legislation may be passed, inevitably delays the work of the Legislature in expediting school finance legislation, now, therefore, be it

*Resolved by the Assembly of the State of California* That the governing boards of local school districts are requested to study the feasibility of supporting an amendment to the California Constitution which will eliminate the necessity for a two-thirds vote of the Legislature for the enactment of the Budget Bill or modify the same to require only a two-thirds vote of those present and voting, in order that the enactment of the Budget Bill not be precluded by the determined opposition of a minority of the members of one or both houses of the Legislature, and be it further

*Resolved*, That the governing boards of local school districts are requested to consider the feasibility of supporting a separate constitutional amendment authorizing the passage of school finance legislation prior to the enactment of the Budget Bill, whether the required vote for the Budget Bill is altered or not; and be it further

*Resolved*, That the Chief Clerk of the Assembly is directed to transmit a copy of this resolution to the Superintendent of Public Instruction, the President of the State Board of Education, and the president of the governing board of each school district in California

WHEREAS, The intent of the Horse Racing Law as specifically expressed in the statutes "to encourage agriculture and the breeding of horses in this state," has been consistently recognized as designed to serve and protect the owners and breeders in all segments of the horse racing industry, and

WHEREAS, The California Horse Racing Association, operating at Bay Meadows, has for the past 16 years equally divided the racing opportunities between Quarter Horse races and Harness Horse races, and

WHEREAS, The application of the California Horse Racing Association, a lessee of the Bay Meadows race track, for a straight harness meet in 1968 has been approved by the California Horse Racing Board, and

WHEREAS, The California Horse Racing Board has granted the Peninsula Racing Association, also a lessee of Bay Meadows race track, seven weeks of Quarter Horse racing, to be run at night at the same time that Golden Gate track will be racing Thoroughbreds; and

WHEREAS, There are no existing facilities at Bay Meadows to run a night racing meet, and no conclusive evidence was presented to the California Horse Racing Board that such facilities will be available before the scheduled starting of the 1968 meet on May 23; and

WHEREAS, The only available nine weeks of daytime racing in the bay area has all been allotted to the Harness Horse racing industry, and

WHEREAS, The Quarter Horse racing industry should be protected by the preservation of their continued use of one-half of these daytime racing opportunities which they have shared for the past 16 years; and

WHEREAS, The loss of racing days for the 1968 season to the Quarter Horse racing industry in California, which has been estimated by the Stanford Research Institute to represent an investment of over 100 million dollars, and the loss of employment to the hundreds of people dependent upon this industry would have a serious economic impact on the economy of the state, now, therefore, be it

*Resolved by the Assembly of the State of California*, That the California Horse Racing Board is requested to reconsider the assignment of racing days to both the Quarter Horse and Harness Horse racing associations in the bay area, and specifically to consider (1) the approval of nine weeks of combination Quarter Horse and Harness Horse racing to be presented by the California Horse Racing Association on the available daytime racing days, or (2) the division of the nine weeks of daytime racing days equally between the California Horse Racing Association for Harness Horse racing, and the Peninsula Racing Association for Quarter Horse racing, with the balance of the racing dates available for night racing under existing law to be granted to these associations providing proper facilities for such racing are made available, and be it further

*Resolved*, That the Chief Clerk of the Assembly is directed to send a copy of this resolution to the California Horse Racing Board.
