WHEREAS, An extraordinary occasion has arisen and now exists requiring that the Legislature of the State of California be convened in extraordinary session, now, therefore,

I, RONALD REAGAN. Governor of the State of California, by virtue of the power and authority in me vested by Section 3 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of California, do hereby convene the Legislature of the State of California to meet in extraordinary session at Sacramento, California, on the ninth day of September, 1968, at 12 00 o'clock moon of said day for the following purposes and to legislate upon the following subjects

Item No 1 To consider and act upon legislation relative to maximum unemployment disability benefits

Item No 2 To consider and act upon legislation relative to maximum workmen's compensation benefits.

No additional mailing list shall be allowed or authorized unless the sum of fifteen dollars (\$15) each is paid therefor, to the State Printer, which sim shall be credited to legislative printing and accounted for to the Legislature.

Dear Mr Speaker: Unanimous consent is asked to print this statement on the legislative intent of Assembly Bill 1 of the 1968 First Extraordinary Session

#### Section 3208.1

To nullify the effect upon the law of Workmen's Compensation of certain recent decisions of the Court of Appeals and of the Supreme Court, including Dow Chemical Co. vs. Workmen's Compensation Appeals Board, 67 AC 488, DeLuna vs. Workmen's Compensation Appeals Board, 258 ACA 271, Miller vs. Workmen's Compensation Appeals Board, 258 ACA 589, and Fruchauf Corporation vs. Workmen's Compensation Appeals Board, 252 ACA 600, this section declares that one neident or one exposure which produces any disability or need for treatment is a specific injury, that "cumulative injury" consists of repetitive traumatic activities extending over a period of time, the combined effect of which causes any disability or need for treatment, and declares that the date of a cumulative injury is the date when any disability is caused thereby.

#### Section 3208,2

To nullify the effect upon the law of Workmen's Compensation of certain recent decisions of the Court of Appeal and of the Supreme Court, including Dow Chemical Co vs Workmen's Compensation Appeals Board, 67 AC 488, DeLuna vs Workmen's Compensation Appeals Board, 258 ACA 271, Miller vs Workmen's Compensation Appeals Board, 258 ACA 589, and Friedauf Corporation vs Workmen's Compensation Appeals Board, 252 ACA 600, this section declares that when disability, need for treatment, or death, results from the combined effects of any combination of injuries, specific, cumulative, or both, all questions of fact and of law shall be separately determined with respect to each such injury, including apportionment of liability for any kind of benefits under the Workmen's Compensation laws.

Section 4454

The amendment of this section is declaratory of the existing law and clarifies the definition of average earnings to exclude so-called "fringe benefits" such as savings, wage continuation, wage replacement or stock acquisition programs or any benefit programs for which the employer pays or contributes to any persons other than the employee or his family.

Section 5303.

To nullify the effect upon the law of Workmen's Compensation of certain recent decisions of the Court of Appeal and of the Supreme Court, including Dow Chemical Co vs Workmen's Compensation Appeals Board, 252 ACA 271. Miller vs Workmen's Compensation Appeals Board, 252 ACA 589, and Fruchauf Corporation vs Workmen's Compensation Appeals Board, 252 ACA 600, the amendment of this section declares that no injury, whether specific or cumulative, shall, for any purpose whatsoever, merge into or form a part of another injury and that no award based on a cumulative injury shall include disability caused by any specific injury or by any other cumulative injury which caused or contributed to the existing disability, need for medical treatment or death

Relative to blind and visually handicapped persons

WHEREAS, It is the policy of the State of California to encourage and enable blind persons, visually handicapped persons, and other physically disabled persons to participate fully in the social and economic life of the state, and

WIIEREAS, This policy has been expressly reaffirmed and set forth in Senate Bill 369, enacted by the 1938 Regular Session of the Legis-

lature, and signed by the Governor (Chapter 461), and

WHEREAS, Such policy explicitly states that blind persons, visually handicapped persons, and other physically disabled persons shall have the same right as the able-bodied to the full and free use of the streets, highways, sidewalks, walkways, public buildings, public facilities, and other public places, and that blind persons, visually handicapped persons, and other physically disabled persons shall be entitled to full and equal access, as other members of the general public, to accommodations, advantages, facilities, and privileges of all common carriers, airplanes, motor vehicles, railroad trains, motor buses, streetcars, boats or any other public conveyances or modes of transportation, hotels, lodging places, places of public accommodation, amusement or resort, and other places to which the general public is invited, subject only to the conditions and limitations established by law, or state or federal regulation, and applicable alike to all persons, and

WHEREAS, It has come to the attention of the Legislature that blind persons have been denied such full and equal access to certain places and facilities of amusement at Cal Expo, and have furthermore been subjected to embarrassment and meconvenience as a result of attempting to assert their rights to such full and equal access; now, there-

fore, be it

Resolved by the Assembly of the State of California. That the California Exposition and Fair Executive Committee is requested to require immediately that full and equal access to all places and facilities of public accommodation, amusement, or resort at Cal Expo be assured to blind and visually handicapped persons, and be it further

# House Resolution No. 15

WHEREAS, An initiative measure to amend the State Constitution, known as the "Property Tax Limitation Initiative," will appear on the ballot at this year's November General Election; and

WHEREAS, Although purporting to afford relief to the overburdened taxpayer, it is irresponsibly shortsighted in concept and will inevitably prove to be disastrous in its execution; and

WHEREAS, It would drastically reduce the financial base of local government, and thereby cause a severe curtailment in the various services provided by local government and paid for primarily with property tax revenue; and

WHEREAS, It does not provide for any other source of revenue to replace that which would be lost by its adoption, so that as a consequence it will necessarily have the practical effect of forcing drastic increases in personal income and sales taxes, thereby shifting a disproportionate part of the tax burden from property to the individual; and

WHEREAS, The prime beneficiaries of the measure would be owners of commercial properties and large tracts of land, rather than single-family homeowners and the renters of property; and

WHEREAS, The measure poses a scrious threat to the traditional American principle of local control and participation in community services, particularly with respect to the schools, and its adoption would inexorably lead to an ever-increasing dependency of local government upon State and Federal funding of local governmental services, and

WHEREAS, All clams of its sponsors to the contrary notwithstanding, the measure represents a "tax trap" in every possible sense of the term; and

WHEREAS, In addition, the measure is so carelessly and ambiguously worded that, if adopted, it would be the subject of years of litigation in order to ascertain its full and actual scope and application; and

WHEREAS, A more responsible and equitable kind of property tax relief is feasible; and

WHEREAS. This legislative body is greatly concerned with the necessity of doing everything possible to protect the people of California from having foisted on them so cruel a hoax as the "Property Tax Limitation Initiative", now, therefore, be it

## Citation for Air Medal with "V" Device CWO Ray E. Johnson, Jr

On 6 and 7 September 1967 Warrant Officer Riv E Johnson, Jr, W3155438, United States Army, distinguished himself by heroism while engaged in aerial flight evidenced by voluntary action above and beyond the call of duty On 6 September a light fire team was scrambled from Dong Ba Thin to Toy Hoa, Republic of Vietnam, to assist a Republic of Korea unit that was still in heavy contact with a North Vietnamese army unit after five hours of fleres fighting. While empute to the area Warrant Officer Johnson, pilot of the wing ship, was informed by his team leader that the NVA unit was surrounded by the NOE's ma village and were extremely well entrenched. After the lead ship began its run Warrant Officer Johnson followed him into the hostile area. Immediately he was taken under heavy 50 calibre machine gun fire Drawing upon all the skills at his disposal Warrant Officer Johnson skillfully returned the enemy fire with his mini-guns, silencing several enemy targets. On repeated passes over the area he continually supplied superb suppressive fire over the entire village with his mini-gen until all the ship's ordnance was expended His extraordinary skill helped to account for 43 NVA (confirmed by body count), 30 NBA, 3 machine gun positions, 6 structures, and one aminumtion bunker destroyed

On 7 September two light fire teams were called back to Toy Hoa and Warrant Officer Johnson was again pilot of the wing ship Upon arriving at the area a call was sent out for a light team to escort a "dust-off" helicopter into a "hot" LZ The ground unit was in heavy contact with an unknown size force of NVA and a forward air controller reported that an American Special Forces leader was killed and other American and Vietnamese soldiers were wounded. Working directly with the FAC Warrani Officer Johnson covered the MedEvac ship with accurate suppressive fire so successfully that it was able to evacuate all the necessary personnel while sustaining no damage Later on in the same day the Sidewinders were called out to engage several enemy bunkers. After successfully destroying these difficult targets the team was required to perform a low-level visual reconnaissance through the enemy infested area. While on the recon the team was sent to engage a hill that had been a favorite hiding place for the Viet Cong Several runs were made over this area, destroying key hostile positions Low on fuel and ordnance, Warrast Officer Johnson was given the word to return to Toy Hoa While enroute to Toy Hoa a F A C made a blanket transmission on emergency transmission frequency asking any ship in the area to help him capture a wounded NVA officer for intelligence purposes After receiving permission from his team leader Warrant Officer Johnson broke formation and returned to the last battle site. He flew low and slow over the area in order to divert the attention of the officer while his other ship went in to pick up the officer, who turned out to be the assistant regimental commander This final mission was accomplished after dusk and with his twenty minute fuel light on His voluntary acts of heroism and tremendous firepower, combined with his skill as an army aviator were responsible for numerous enemy casualties and were key factors in the success of this important mission. His actions are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself, his unit, and the United States Army.

Executive Department State of California

WHEREAS, the Legislature of the State of California has been called in extraordinary session and has convened on September 9, 1968; and

WHEREAS, on account of an extraordinary occasion which has arisen and now exists, it is dremed desirable and necessary to submit an additional subject to the Legislature for consideration,

(e) Ninety-six cents (\$0.96); multiplied by the average daily attendance during the preceding fiscal year credited to all kindergarten, elementary, high school, jumor college and adult schools in the state and to county school tuition funds for allowances to school districts for the purposes of Section 6426

- (f) Sixty dollars and sixty loven cents (\$60.67) Fifty-seven dollars and seventeen cents (\$57.17) multiplied by the average daily attendance during the preceding fiscal year credited to all kindergarten, elementary, high school, junior college and adult schools in the state and to county school tuition funds during the preceding school year for basic aid, equalization aid, supplemental support, allowances for adults, and allowances to the county school tuition funds to be apportioned on account of average daily attendance
- (g) Three dollars and pfty cents (\$350) multiplied by the average daily attendance during the preceding school year credited to all kindergarten, elementary, high school, junior college and adult schools in the state and to county school tustion funds for purposes of Chapter 7.1 (commencing with Section 6750) of Division 6."

Gentlemen: A copy of the Auditor General's report on a review of the excess lands held by the State Division of Highways is hereby transmitted for your consideration.

The purpose of this review was to determine the conditions under which property in excess of that necessary for highway right of way is acquired, the controls exercised over excess parcels during the time they are held by the state, and the methods of disposing of such excess lands

The informal excess land records maintained by the Highway District Right of Way Departments show an inventory of 10,990 parcels, aggregating 30,016 acres, with a recorded cost of \$52,876,173, as of June 30, 1967.

Present methods of documenting and accounting for the acquisition of excess land are deficient in a number of respects, and the Auditor General has submitted a total of ten recommendations to improve this procedure.

The stated policy of the Division of Highways is to return excess land to private ownership as soon as possible. However, as a general rule efforts to dispose of excess parcels are not made until after the completion of construction. As of June 30, 1967, less than 25 percent of the value and only 15 percent of the recorded excess land inventory was classified as available for sale.

Our review of the records indicates that the average time period between acquisition and sale is approximately five years, and value of the recorded excess land inventors is equal to from 20 to 25 percent of the current annual expenditure for right of way. This investment in excess land represents the utilization of a substantial amount of highway money for other than its intended use.

## Opinion of Legislative Counsel

Dear Mr. Unruh:

# Question

If the second "resolved clause" were deleted from Senate Constitutional Amendment No 1 of the 1968 First Extraordinary Session of the Legislature, as amended in Senate September 16, 1968, would Proposition No. 9 still take effect, if both measures are approved by the voters at the November election?

# Opinion

If the second resolved clause is removed, it is our opinion that Proposition No. 9 will not take effect, if Senate Constitutional Amendment No. 1 receives the higher affirmative vote.

#### Analysis

In general, Proposition No 9 proposes to add Section 30 to Article XIII of the State Constitution to place limitations on property taxes and the issuance of bonds and these limitations are couched in terms of percentages of assessed and market value of property.

The first resolved clause of Senate Constitutional Amendment No. 1 proposes to add Section 1d to Article XIII to the Constitution to provide a \$750 property tax exemption for homeowners Moreover, the next-to-last paragraph in this resolved clause provides:

"Nothing in this Constitution shall constitute a limitation on the taxation of property, or on the bonding capacity of the state or of any city, city and county, county, or district, when based on a percentage of assessed or market value of property, provided, however, that the Legislature may establish maximum property tax rates and bonding limitations for units of local government."

The second resolved clause in this measure then goes on to state:

"AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That there is a conflict within the meaning of subdivision (b) of Section 24 of Article IV of the Constitution between this measure and Proposition No 9 and, therefore, as provided in that subdivision, if both measures are approved by the voters, the measure receiving the higher affirmative vote shall prevail"

In our opinion, there is a conflict between the next-to-last paragraph of the first resolved clause of Senate Constitutional Amendment No. 1 and Proposition No 9 within the meaning of subdivision (b) of Section 24 of Article IV of the Constitution This subdivision provides

"(b) If provisions of 2 or more measures approved at the same election conflict, those of the measure receiving the highest affirmative vote shall prevail."

On this basis, even if the second resolved clause were deleted from Senate Constitutional Amendment No. 1 and it received the higher affirmative vote at the November election, it is our opinion that Proposition No. 9 would not become effective.

However, it should be noted that if this second resolved clause is deleted and both measures win the approval of the voters and Proposition 9 receives the higher vote, there is a good possibility that the provisions of both Proposition 9 and many of the provisions of Senate Constitutional Amendment No 1 would be given effect

Fifth, that all other units of state and local government publicize to the fullest extent possible the availability of property tax relief for homeowners and the requirements for obtaining such relief; and be it further

Notwithstanding any provision to the contrary, the average daily attendance of pupils in a kindergarten shall be adjusted by a multiplication factor of 12 under all of the following conditions:

(a) The kindergarten day class is a minimum of 180 minutes

(b) The kindergarten teacher is assigned primary responsibility for no more than one session of kindergarten daily.

(c) Each kindergarten class shall not exceed a maximum enrollment of 30 pupils

(d) The kindergarten teacher shall be a full-time certificated employee and the full-time duties required of the kindergarten teacher shall be directly related to the kindergarten program

- (a) Record the actual attendance for the last schoolday of each school month Include attendance authorized under Section 10955
- (b) Divide the sum of the recorded days of actual attendance under (a) above by the number of school months the schools are maintained For the purposes of this section, any school month of less than 20 days is a school month.
- (c) The resulting quotient, plus the attendance credited to the district on account of education of seventh and eighth grade pupils in a junior high school pursuant to Section 11401, is the average daily attendance for the fiscal year.

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# TEXT OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT WHICH HAS BEEN APPROVED BY BOTH HOUSES OF THE LEGISLATURE, TOGETHER WITH THE YEAS AND NAYS TAKEN THEREON

# SENATE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 1

A resolution to propose to the people of the State of California an amendment to the Constitution of the state, by adding Section 1d to Article XIII thereof, relating to the homeowners' property tax exemption.

(Filed with Secretary of State September 20, 1968, Resolution Chapter 9)

Resolved by the Senate, the Assembly concurring, That the Legislature of the State of California at its 1968 First Extraordinary Session commencing on the ninth day of September, 1968, two-thirds of the members elected to each of the two houses of the Legislature voting therefor, hereby proposes to the people of the State of California that the Constitution of the state be amended by adding Section 1d to Article XIII thereof, to read:

SEC. 1d. The homeowners' property tax exemption shall apply to each dwelling, as defined by the Legislature, occupied by an owner thereof on the lien date as his principal place of residence. This exemption shall not apply to any dwelling if an owner thereof has been granted an exemption for the assessment year pursuant to Section 11, 11 or 11 to of this article, nor shall it apply to any property which the Legislature, by general laws, excludes from the exemption by reason of the fact that the tax on such property is paid either in whole or in part, either directly or indirectly, by the state or any political subdivision thereof. Only one homeowners' property tax exemption shall apply to each dwelling

There is exempt from taxation the amount of \$750 of the assessed value of the dwelling and this shall be known as the homeowners' property tax exemption. The amount of the exemption may be increased or decreased by the Legislature, a majority of all of the members elected to each of the two houses voting in favor thereof, but such exemption shall not be reduced below \$750 of such assessed value.

The Legislature shall provide by general laws for subventions to counties, cities and counties, cities, and districts in this state in an amount equal to the amount of revenue lost by each such county, city and county, city, and district by reason of the homeowners' property tax exemption No increase by the Legislature in the homeowners' property tax exemption above the amount of \$750 shall be effective for any fiscal year, unless the Legislature increases the rate of state taxes in an amount sufficient to provide subventions, and shall provide subventions, during such fiscal year to each county, city and county, city and district in this state a sum equal to the amount of revenue lost by each by reason of such increase.

Any revenues subvented by the state to replace revenues lost by reason of the homeowners' property tax exemption may be used by a county, city and county, city, or district for state purposes or for

county, city and county, city, or district purposes, as the case may be. Nothing in this Constitution shall constitute a limitation on the taxation of property, or on the bonding capacity of the state or of any city, city and county, county, or district, when based on a percentage of assessed or market value of property; provided, however, that the Legislature may establish maximum property tax rates and bonding limitations for units of local government.

For the 1968-1969 fiscal year only, the Legislature may effect the exemption by payment of \$70 to taxpayers in the manner specified in Senate Bill No. 8 of the 1968 First Extraordinary Session of the Legis-

lature, the provisions of which are hereby ratified.

And be it further resolved, That there is a conflict within the meaning of subdivision (b) of Section 24 of Article IV of the Constitution between this measure and Proposition No 9 and, therefore, as provided in that subdivision, if both measures are approved by the voters, the measure receiving the higher affirmative vote shall prevail.
