This bill would authorize cities and counties, in addition to current local posting requirements, to notify the California Environmental Protection Agency (Cal/EPA) of any public meetings regarding the adoption or amendment of certain regulated substances. This bill would expand the mandate on local agencies by requiring them to also notice the repeal of those ordinances. Cal/EPA would then be required, to the extent local agencies voluntarily send that information to the Agency, to post it on the Agency's Internet site.

Existing law requires local agencies to provide public notice within the affected community prior to adopting or amending any such ordinance. In fact, many cities and counties already make this information available on their Internet website. Because this

information is readily available to the public, any additional requirements for the State to post that information would be unnecessarily duplicative.

WHEREAS, Upon the occasion of his retirement as a Member of the California State Assembly, representing the 31st District, the Honorable Cruz M. Bustamante is deserving of special recognition and the highest commendation; and

WHEREAS, Assembly Member Cruz Bustamante was born to Dominga and Cruz Bustamante, Jr., in Dinuba in 1953, and he is a first-generation Californian and the first Latino to become Speaker of the Assembly; and

WHEREAS, In his term as Speaker, from December 1996 to February 1998, the California Legislature reduced class size in the

Dear Mr. Wilson: I respectfully request that this letter be printed in the Assembly Journal for purposes of clarifying the intent of my Assembly Bill 1024. This measure directs the California Commission

on Teacher Credentialing (CCTC) to adopt regulations that provide for the acquisition of significant preparation in teaching dance or theatre by holders of single subject credentials in any of the current credentials. The CCTC assures me that the preparation requirements for those voluntarily seeking dance and/or theatre concentrations would only be obtainable within the appropriate and relevant single subject credentials presently offered.

I introduced AB 1024 to adopt recommendations as a result of SCR 31, Chapter 128, Statutes of 1994. The report issued pursuant to SCR 31 by the CCTC is entitled *The Qualifications of Dance and Theater Teachers in California Schools: State Policy Issues and Options*. In its current form, AB 1024 reflects the options from the report that the Office of Child Development and Education and the CCTC believed were important first steps to take to improve the quality of theater and dance teaching in the state.

VETO MESSAGE—ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 1643

Governor's Office, Sacramento

August 28, 1998

To the Members of the California Assembly:

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 1643 without my signature.

This bill would, among other provisions, reject the California Appellate Court decision in *Marks v. Loral Corporation* (57 Cal. App. 4th 30, 1997), and declare that the opinion does not affect existing law in any way.

This bill is similar to Senate Bill No. 1098 (Kopp), which was recently vetoed. That measure had also attempted to invalidate the court of appeal decision which was narrowly focused to allow an employer to choose employees with lower salaries although that *might* result in choosing younger employees. The court found that if the choice is in fact based on salary, there is no age discrimination. As I have previously stated, this strikes me as a fair interpretation of the age discrimination statute which prohibits discrimination against specified individuals because of their age. The court in *Marks* did not authorize or sanction employers using salary as a pretext for a decision really based on age. In that instance, the employer would rightfully be subjected to an age discrimination claim.

It is an unacceptable practice for employers to use age as a criterion in the workplace unless otherwise required by law. On the other hand, in a competitive market based economy like California's, employment decisions which consider salary appear reasonable.

Veto Message—Assembly Bill No. 1815

Governor's Office, Sacramento
August 28, 1998

To the Members of the California Assembly:

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 1815 without my signature.

This bill would exempt limited English proficient (LEP) pupils for thirty months after they have begun receiving instruction primarily in English. This thirty month exemption equates to over three academic years, or one-third of the years a pupil may take the Standardized testing and Reporting (STAR) test.

It is inappropriate to deny one class of individuals the opportunity to participate in the educational benefits of the STAR test based solely on the individual's English language proficiency. This bill is inconsistent with the agreement reached last year on how LEP pupils would be tested under the STAR program and, in fact, would compromise the value of the data obtained this year. One very valuable component of the STAR program is that it delivers to parents and teachers baseline performance data that will allow them to track a pupil's achievement over time.

This bill also contains an additional denial of educational opportunity by exempting pupils who entered school with no reading skills and who have been enrolled continuously in the district for fewer than 180 days (essentially one school year). This provision unfairly impacts pupils from highly migratory families and effectively excludes these pupils from participation in a fundamental component of the State's education system. The primary purpose of the statewide test is to provide information on the academic status and progress of individual pupils to their parents and their teachers. The denial of the opportunity to take the STAR test would run counter to legislative intent governing the statewide testing program.

In addition, this bill would require the administration of the test of applied academic skills (commonly known as the matrix test) beginning in the Spring of 1999. Neither the matrix test nor performance standards have been developed. The recently enacted education trailer bill (SB 1564, Ch. 330, 1998) addresses performance standards and matrix test development, providing for a phased-in adoption of the matrix test beginning in December 1999. This bill would dismantle the agreement reached on this issue.

Finally, the requirements that the Superintendent of Public Instruction develop alternative versions of the STAR and matrix tests for English learners may introduce issues of proprietary rights to the extent that the tests included would be "versions" of those developed and published by private entities.

Legislative Intent—Assembly Bill No. 1755

AB 1755 (Keeley) Net Energy Metering: Solar Energy

Assembly Bill 1755 contained two sections which together remove significant obstacles to the use of solar energy technology in California.

The first section made changes to California's existing net metering law, Section 2827 of the Public Utilities Code, which updates the law to reflect the fact that electric industry restructuring has taken place, and which addresses several areas where issues have arisen since the enabling net metering legislation was enacted into law in 1996.

My intent was that the following provisions of the legislation become law. First, I wanted to ensure that small commercial customers, in addition to residential customers, be able to benefit from net metering. I also wished to ensure that customers would not have to install additional electric meters at their own expense, since in virtually all cases the customer's existing meter can be used to provide net metering. I wanted to ensure that net metering customers would pay only for the net amount of electricity they consume over a yearly period, that they pay kilowatt-hour consumption-based charges only on that net electricity consumption, and that they not pay any consumption-based

charges on the electrical output of the eligible solar or wind electrical generating system.

Further, it was my intent that any entity offering net metering in California would, at a minimum, offer it under terms which are at least as favorable as the terms outlined in the legislation. I wanted to ensure that a net metering customer could have an annualization period commencing on a date of their own choosing, and that net metering customers would not be required to install unnecessary or duplicative hardware, purchase excessive liability insurance, or perform unnecessary tests. Finally, I wanted to ensure that as long as solar energy systems utilize hardware that meets the product safety guidelines referenced in the legislation, and in particular the Underwriters Laboratories certification, no further product testing or approval processes will be required of net metering customers by utilities or other energy service providers.

The second section of the legislation reinstates a property tax exemption for solar energy systems which expired due to a sunset provision in 1994. Property taxes levied on solar energy systems are a significant impediment to their purchase and use, and this section removes this obstacle. My intent in this section was to clarify that the original tax exemption language, in referencing the "parts" which constitute an active solar energy system, also covers spare parts specifically purchased, designed or fabricated for installation in an active solar energy system that may be kept on hand by solar energy system users, owners or operators. This provision is consistent with the intent of the prior solar energy system property tax exemption laws, and no provisions of this section in any way reduce the property tax exemption benefits that solar system owners enjoyed under the original law.

This was clearly a typographical error as evidenced by the other three direct references to November 3, 1998, in the text of the measure. Thank you for this opportunity to clarify the record.

Dear Mr. Wilson: I am writing to clarify the intent behind Section 10 of my Assembly Bill 2128, relating to the deposit of funds by local agencies with depository institutions.

The analysis of the bill prepared by the Assembly Banking and Finance Committee correctly notes that, as a result of the transfer last year of the Local Agency Security Program from the Department of Financial Institutions (“DFI”) to the State Treasurer (AB 1432 (Papan), Chapter 375, Statutes of 1997), the Treasurer as the new administrator—unlike the previous administrator DFI—is precluded by federal and state laws from receiving prior notification of the closing or placing into receivership of a depository institution holding local agency funds. As a result, local agency funds on deposit with an institution to be closed or seized, which are collateralized by securities held by a second institution (the “agency” institution), were potentially placed at risk following a closure of the depository until the administrator could issue a “no release order” to the agency institution holding the collateral for the funds.

Section 10 of AB 2128 amends Section 53656 of the Government Code to now place the responsibility on the “agency” institution to not release any security held to secure a local agency deposit *unless* the administrator (i.e. the State Treasurer) issues an order authorizing the release in those cases where the depository has been taken over by a federal or state regulator or put into receivership. An oversight in the bill fails to provide a mechanism for placing the “agency” institution on notice regarding the closure of the depository institution. However, it is my understanding that in the case of a depository that has been seized or closed, such a request would come from the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation in its capacity as receiver or conservator of the depository. Accordingly, the agency of depository will or should know that the depository is in the hands of the FDIC at the time the request is made.

Although I will be retiring from the Legislature at the end of this year, I would encourage the enactment of a cleanup measure next year to make clear that a violation of statute would occur only in those instances where the agent of depository knew or should have known depository’s closure. Otherwise, the cost or availability of such agency services which facilitate the placing of public funds on deposit may be negatively impacted.

Assemblyman Don Perata and I are carrying Assembly Bill 1100 which would require certain health care service plan contracts or disability insurance policies that are issued, amended or renewed on or after July 1, 1999, to provide coverage for the diagnosis and medically necessary treatment of specified severe, biologically based mental illnesses for persons of all ages, under the same terms and conditions applied to other medical conditions.

Assembly Bill 1100 is intended to expand access to adequate mental health care for all Californians who suffer from those illnesses.

This bill is not intended to be interpreted by regulatory agencies, health plans or insurers to restrict access for persons with severe, biologically based mental illnesses to psychological services which have been determined to be medically necessary. Any such interpretation or application would only serve to further restrict access to important mental health services, undermining the intent of this legislation.

The purpose of this letter to the journal is to clarify a provision of my AB 682 (Morrow), regarding emergency health care services.

Section 1371.4 of the Health and Safety Code is designed to ensure that health care service plans provide coverage for emergency services and care up to the point of stabilization. After that point, the provider must call the plan for authorization in order to ensure reimbursement.

The amendments to Section 1371.4, enacted by AB 682, help clarify this purpose by stating that the definition in Section 1371.1 of the Health and Safety Code control the construction of this section. Among the definitions newly added to Section 1371.1 is a definition of “stabilized” or “stabilization,” which clarifies that a patient or enrollee is stabilized when the patient’s medical condition is such that no material deterioration is likely to result from a transfer, in other words, “stabilized” means safe for transfer.

In addition, the words “transferred or” were deleted from subdivision (a) of Section 1371.4 to eliminate conflict with the definition of “stabilized.” The deletion of the words “transferred or” does not result in any substantive change of the existing statute.

Dear Mr. Wilson: I authored Assembly Bill 2594, which is Chapter 327 of 1998. That measure provides the framework for operation of the Repeat Offender Pilot Project in several counties.

In the rush to include Assembly Bill 2594 as a State budget trailer bill, two drafting errors remained uncorrected. The first error is a reference in Section 744 of the Welfare and Institutions Code to a nonexistent subdivision in Section 745 of the Welfare and Institutions Code. Prior amendments had deleted the need for subdivisions in Section 745, but Section 744's reference to subdivision (b) was not deleted.

The second error is a technical failure to clarify, following June 10, 1998, amendments, that the Multi-Agency At-Risk Youth Program (MAARYC) operated by Los Angeles County may operate and receive funds as part of the Repeat Offender Pilot Project and may continue its focus upon early intervention, rather than waiting for minors to be declared wards of the juvenile court for the first time. The bill contains a reference to the MAARYC program, but the reference needs some clarifying language.

The debate and analyses all clearly indicate that these were inadvertent drafting errors. I intend to introduce urgency legislation in December to make the necessary corrections. In the meantime, the Board of Corrections should begin to develop the necessary selection criteria and funding deadlines to conform with the intention of the legislation.

AB 1102 establishes a number of benefit improvements for members of the State Teachers' Retirement System, including an additional retirement allowance for members with 30 or more years of service. This additional allowance was also intended to be made available to members who retired from STRS, reinstated their membership and subsequently re-retired, and had a total of at least 30 years over the course of their entire career. Unfortunately, the specific language added to Sections 24209 and 24210 of the Education Code did not clearly state that intent.

STRS staff has stated that they will evaluate the most appropriate way to achieve that intent, and will propose the necessary technical changes in legislation next year.

Thank you for this opportunity to state my intent for the record.

The Senate Appropriations Committee suggested that the cost of each rifle would likely be \$230. It is my intent in enacting AB 48 that those who relinquish and have a receipt should be compensated for their actual cost. Those who do not have a receipt should receive \$230, a reasonable fair market value for the rifle.

Dear Mr. Speaker: I submit this letter to the Assembly Journal to make clear the legislative intent of my Assembly Bill 2339, which was approved today by the Legislature.

It is my intent that Sections 2 and 8 of AB 2339 provide a mechanism to ensure that cleanups carried out under the Bay Protection and Toxic Cleanup Program (BPTCP) do not duplicate efforts being implemented under other state or federal regulatory programs, and that the efforts of the BPTCP focus on high priority contaminated areas where action is needed.

During discussions about these provisions of the bill, the State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) raised questions about mechanisms for ensuring accountability for those sites under other programs. There may be toxic hot spots under the jurisdiction of another regulatory program for which a Regional Water Quality Control Board (RWQCB) has raised questions regarding the equivalency of the cleanup requirements compared to the BPTCP. For those toxic hot spots, it is my intent that the RWQCB demonstrate the conditions of the

statewide consolidated toxic hot spots cleanup plan that are not being met which pose a significant threat to public health, safety or the environment.

In case of a disagreement between a RWQCB, a lead agency, and/or an affected party, it is also intended that the site designation committee created by Chapter 6.65 of the Health and Safety Code (consisting of the Secretary of Environmental Protection, the Director of Toxic Substances Control, the Chairperson of the SWRCB, the Director of Fish and Game, the Director of the Office of Environmental Health Hazard Assessment, and the Chairperson of the State Air Resources Board) will decide whether the RWQCB has demonstrated that there is a significant threat to public health, safety or the environment, and therefore, if it is necessary for the lead agency to impose additional conditions on the cleanup effort. In the case of a toxic hot spot with a federal lead agency, the federal agency should be included in the decision-making process.

I believe this clarifying letter will enable the RWQCBs and SWRCB to move forward expeditiously to implement the statewide consolidated toxic hot spots cleanup plan prepared pursuant to Section 13394 of the Water Code.

Members of the Assembly: As requested by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee, the Bureau of State Audits presents its audit report concerning the use of bond proceeds issued under the Marks-Roos Local Bond Pooling Act of 1985 (act). This report concludes that the cities of Waterford and San Joaquin have exploited the act to generate lucrative fees by financing highly speculative projects that do not directly benefit their cities. The cities established Public Finance Authorities (PFA) which issued \$148.9 million in bonds to finance projects located throughout the State and, in return, received \$1.3 million in fees. However, they exercised little control over the projects to ensure their viability and control costs, and many of the projects are not generating sufficient revenues to make debt payments. Unless the PFAs are able to raise the money to make these payments, they will default on the bonds. The cities of Lake Elsinore, Coalinga, and Oroville also engaged in questionable, though less egregious,

practices. Finally, although the other seven cites did not appear to have misused the act, four exposed bondholders to increased risk by financing projects outside their jurisdictions.

Members of the Assembly: As requested by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee, the Bureau of State Audits presents its audit report concerning the annual cost to the State for incarcerating inmates under the jurisdiction of the Department of Corrections (department). The report reviews the department's own calculation of inmate costs at the 32 prisons and determines whether the included cost factors are appropriate and reasonable. We also calculated the annual incarceration costs per inmate for each of the 32 state-run prisons operating during fiscal year 1996-97, as well as a statewide cost per inmate. This report concludes that the department's calculation appropriately includes most of the direct and indirect operating costs but lacks certain indirect operating costs as well as capital costs for prison construction and expansion. Our calculation includes all operating (direct and indirect) costs and capital costs. We found that per-inmate costs vary significantly from one prison to another. Annual costs per inmate for the 32 prisons ranged from \$18,562 to \$38,554 for fiscal year 1996-97. The statewide average was \$24,807.

In conclusion, we recommend that, to accurately determine the cost of incarceration, the department should include all costs, both operating and capital, when calculating how much the State pays annually to incarcerate criminals.

Members of the Assembly: As requested by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee, the Bureau of State Audits presents its audit report

concerning the Prison Industry Authority's (PIA) purchase and resale of finished goods and services. This report concludes that the PIA bought finished goods from the private sector 656 times and lost \$208,000 on their resale during the period we reviewed with the losses being subsidized by customers buying the PIA's other goods and services. Further, for some items it frequently purchases from the private sector, the PIA does not plan ahead to meet its customers' demands. Instead, the PIA sometimes uses emergency procurement procedures inappropriately to purchase finished goods and services, which limits competition and may not reflect the lowest cost. In addition, the PIA does not technically have the legal authority to buy and resell finished goods and services to its customers. This authority is vested in the Prison Industry Board and has not been delegated to the PIA. Finally, the PIA is acting strictly as a middleman in its purchase and resale of processed eggs, a product the PIA does not produce. Such an arrangement does not contribute to its mission of promoting inmate employment, duplicates the efforts of other state procurement units, and may result in additional administrative costs.

This bill would require the Department of Health Services to review the adequacy of prenatal nutrition information available to physicians providing healthcare to pregnant women, and report its findings to the Legislature by January 1, 2000.

This bill is unnecessary. Physicians have the training and experience to review for themselves the adequacy of available prenatal information.

This bill would require health care service plans to provide coverage for all medically necessary pediatric vaccines and to augment a physician's capitation rate for any vaccines that are added to the Recommended Childhood Immunization Schedule. The bill would also prohibit a plan from including pediatric vaccines in the capitation rate of a physician who is individually capitated.

This bill is not about providing children with vaccines. Existing law already requires health care service plans to provide pediatric vaccines pursuant to the most current version of the Recommended Childhood Immunization Schedule/United States, jointly adopted by the American Academy of Pediatrics, the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices, and the American Academy of Family Physicians.

This bill is really about how physicians are paid. These matters are best left to the contracting parties. This bill would also establish a precedent for excluding services and procedures from the capitation rate, resulting in increased health care costs.

This bill would require health care service plans and disability insurers that provide coverage for outpatient prescription drug benefits to include coverage for a variety of federal Food and Drug Administration approved prescription contraceptive methods. Religious organizations that object to contraceptives for religious reasons would be exempt. However, employees of these exempt religious organizations with a family income up to 400 percent of the federal poverty level would be entitled to coverage through the California State-Only Family Planning Program.

Few can argue with the benefits of this bill; requiring health plans and disability insurers to provide coverage for contraceptives and including a religious exemption clause. However, it is inappropriate for taxpayers to pay for contraceptives for certain employees that earn up to 400 percent of the federal poverty level, or over \$65,800 for a family of four. This bill would now be law but for the author's insistence that a state program designed for the working poor be used to provide benefits for those not in need of state assistance.

Having advocated contraception services for the poor for years, I am disappointed and frankly disgusted that a bill that could have so easily

served as a vehicle to provide such services was needlessly burdened with so inappropriate a requirement. This is the second time that the author has made such an unfortunate choice.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 88 without my signature.

This bill would authorize school districts, community college districts and county superintendents of schools to elect a new early retirement option for employees who are members of the State Teachers' Retirement Systems (STRS).

This bill would permit retirement at or over age 55, without an allowance reduction, if the total of the member's age and credited service is a least 85 (Rule of 85).

This bill is similar to Assembly Bill 276 (Filante, 1991), and Assembly Bill 449 (Horcher, 1993), which were both vetoed. The reasons for those vetoes have not changed. This measure does not include fiscal safeguards to determine if the program is truly cost neutral, nor does it set a time limit for district financing of the enhanced benefits.

More importantly, by creating an incentive for teachers to retire, this bill is contrary to current efforts to retain qualified teachers to implement the Class Size Reduction Program. Further, the funding of the "Rule of 85" would come from existing Proposition 98 allocations, which could be better spent in the classroom.

Lastly, I continue to question the need for yet another early retirement option for STRS members. Many options currently exist such as the standard early retirement, the "30 and out," the limited term reduction, the two year golden handshake, and other early retirement incentives.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 2156 without my signature.

This bill would, among other provisions, extend the statutory time period for filing administrative complaints regarding Labor Code violations from thirty days to one year.

This bill is unnecessary. Current law provides that individuals who believe they have been discharged from employment or discriminated against in violation of any provision of the Labor Code may file a complaint with the Labor Commissioner within thirty days after the occurrence of the violation. However, that thirty-day period may be extended for good cause. Moreover, the complainant has the option of filing a civil action and pursuing the matter through the courts. There is no requirement to file a complaint with the Labor Commissioner *before* initiating civil action.

Extending the complaint period could encourage the filing of frivolous complaints which nevertheless would require time consuming, difficult and costly investigations. The current statutory time frame is intended to make employees whole through reinstatement

or reimbursement as quickly as possible. This process has provided a fair, efficient, and effective remedy to complaints of Labor Code violations.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 2163 without my signature.

This bill would authorize the award of attorney fees against any employer if payment of workers' compensation benefits is unreasonably delayed or refused subsequent to the issuance of an award.

Current law provides that employees injured in the course of employment may be entitled to various workers' compensation benefits depending on the nature and severity of the injury. When payment of these benefits has been unreasonably delayed or refused, the Workers' Compensation Appeals Board is authorized to increase the award by 10 percent. This "penalty" has been determined by the courts to apply to the entire award rather than the unpaid portion. Consequently, significant penalties may be assessed for small amounts left unpaid or delayed.

Moreover, the Division of Worker's Compensation is required to audit carriers, self-insured employers and third party administrators and to impose penalties against them for failure to pay any undisputed portion of a claim or to comply with a penalty assessment.

The existing penalty structure for delayed workers' compensation payments has been criticized for being too harsh in some cases, but too lenient in others. The Commission on Health, Safety and Workers' Compensation is currently studying the audit function and is expected to issue recommendations for a more rational penalty structure this fall. It would be premature to simply add attorneys fees to the existing penalty structure for some cases at this time.

This bill states that factors affecting environmental quality include "environmental hazards."

This bill makes a change in law that is unnecessary and misleading. Clearly, environmental hazards are one of many factors which affect

environmental quality. Adding this language will only send a signal that additional amendments are needed to list other possible factors.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 2295 without my signature.

This bill would permit specified individuals who retire from state service prior to January 1, 1999, and who are eligible to enroll in a health benefits plan sponsored by the California Public Employees' Retirement System (CalPERS), at the time of retirement, to enroll in that plan during a 60-day open enrollment period in 1999.

Current law requires a state employee to be enrolled in a CalPERS sponsored health plan at the time of separation from employment and to retire within 120 days of separation in order to continue coverage into retirement. This bill would allow individuals who elected not to enroll in a health benefits plan prior to separation and retirement from state service, to enroll themselves and eligible family members during a specified open enrollment period.

This measure could result in significant general fund costs to pay health benefit premiums for additional annuitants, dependents and survivors who previously forfeited those benefits. Since this group of retired employees and their survivors would be eligible to enroll during an open period, no health exam would be required. Moreover, since the bill provides that the annuitant shall be eligible for the "applicable employer contribution" without defining that amount, it is conceivable that the annuitant and his/her survivors would receive more post-retirement health benefits than the employee who elected to continue health benefit coverage prior to separation from employment.

I understand from the author of this measure that CalPERS may not have adequately informed some state employees that failure to elect coverage prior to retirement would be irrevocable. CalPERS is considering administrative remedies on behalf of those members. That appears to be the appropriate solution.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 2365 without my signature.

This bill would authorize agencies that contract with the Public Employees' Retirement System (PERS), to provide an enhanced benefit level for their members under the "1959 survivor" benefit program. This new benefit level would include an automatic annual cost-of-living adjustment (COLA).

This bill is similar to Senate Bill 1229 (McCorquodale), which was vetoed in 1992. In that veto message I stated that I strongly support frequent review by public employers of the adequacy of the survivor

benefits they pay. Although it is somewhat more complex administratively, it is more fiscally responsible to authorize additional benefits periodically rather than enact a benefit which includes an automatic COLA.

The following year, I signed Senate Bill 887 (Hughes, 1993), which was consistent with the veto message. That bill enacted a new benefit level without the automatic COLA, thus balancing the benefit increases against the public entity's ability to pay them.

Although the cost of supporting the "1959 survivor" benefit program is relatively small and despite the present existence of an accumulated surplus of employee assets, this bill contains indexation and automatic escalators which would eliminate the flexibility a contracting agency currently enjoys when it determines its budget. That flexibility is not only prudent, but a necessary part of a practical budget process.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 2603 without my signature.

This bill would, among other provisions, create the Local Government Labor Relations Improvement Act of 1998, and would require that any complaint that alleges a violation of the Meyers-Milias-Brown Act or of any rule or regulation which has been adopted by a public agency, be processed as an unfair practice charge by the state Public Employment Relations Board (PERB).

Under current law, the Meyers-Milias-Brown Act allows public agencies to develop rules, regulations and procedures governing collective bargaining and resolution of disputes between employers and recognized bargaining representatives in each jurisdiction. This Act is unique among the state's collective bargaining laws because it permits each local public employer to develop its own rules and regulations governing employment relations.

Local governmental labor relations disputes are more appropriately resolved at the local level. Transferring authority for resolution of these disputes to the state will cause delay and disruption to labor-management relations and will unfairly restrict local officials in their ability to respond to the particular needs of their community.

This bill is virtually identical to AB 885 (Honda), which was vetoed in 1997, and SB 277 (Hughes), which was vetoed in 1994. The reasons supporting those vetoes have not changed. There is no need to substitute for the current appointments process a cumbersome election process costing the Teachers' Retirement Fund over \$150,000 a year.

Proposition 162 established in the state constitution the responsibilities and priorities for STRS Board members. As such, Board members are responsible for representing the interests of the entire system, not just those of individual constituencies. Conducting elections to name parochial representatives would undermine this principle.

This bill would require the Economic Research and Strategic Planning Unit within the Trade and Commerce Agency to develop by July 1, 1999, quantifiable benchmarks, goals, and objectives to determine the success and effectiveness of each of the Agency's programs. The Agency is to develop these items in coordination with the Legislature, the Department of Finance, the State Auditor, the Legislative Analyst, and the customers and users of the Agency's programs—within existing resources.

In compliance with existing law, the Trade and Commerce Agency has already prepared a strategic plan and updates it annually. In its strategic planning process, the Agency systematically evaluates its evolving nature with respect to California's global, fast-moving economy. It defines its long-term objectives, identifies quantifiable benchmarks and goals, develops strategies to reach those objectives and goals, and requests appropriate budgetary modifications to carry out those strategies.

This bill creates a duplicative and unnecessary statutory obligation.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 1941 without my signature.

This bill would require sex education course materials and instruction to be medically accurate, and prohibit racial, ethnic, and gender bias in the course materials and instruction. The bill would define medically accurate as supported by research, recognized as accurate and objective by leading medical, psychological, psychiatric and public health organizations and agencies.

This bill is largely duplicative of current law. Current law requires all instructional materials to be accurate, objective and current. Current law

also provides protections against racial, ethnic and gender bias.

To the extent some school districts are providing inaccurate information or biased instruction in violation of state law, actions other than enactment of additional state legislation should be pursued to remedy the problem.

Moreover, the definition of “medically accurate” is so broad and vague that it may create more problems than it solves. No criteria are provided to determine who or what are “leading medical, psychological, psychiatric, and public health organizations and agencies.” But to such unknown entities is entrusted the role of determining the adequacy of instructional programs, and therefore the power to find them inadequate. Such findings could provide the basis for lawsuits which put districts to the expense of seeking to satisfy a standard which this bill does not precisely define.

Great care—and therefore much greater specificity—should be taken in conferring such power.

This bill would require the Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG), in consultation with the San Bernardino Association of Governments (SANBAG), to review existing studies and make recommendations in a report to the Legislature on the feasibility of developing a distribution center in the Inland Empire in order to supplement existing distribution centers operating within the Alameda Corridor Project.

This bill is virtually identical to ACR 85 (Resolution Chapter 60, Statutes of 1996). The review and recommendations requested by that measure were completed by Caltrans and delivered to the Legislature earlier this year.

This bill would mandate the same review and recommendations from SCAG. However, another regional agency, the SANBAG, has already contracted with a private consultant to do a much more comprehensive study of intermodal goods movement by rail and road through the Inland Empire region.

I recognize the fact that this bill now suggests additional study of infrastructure and access improvements to the Interstate 10 corridor between Interstate 15 and 215. Those improvements are indeed necessary, and many are already programmed in the State Transportation Improvement Program to be completed in the next five years.

Further, the decision as to the feasibility or need of a private distribution center is a question better left to the private entities who would be investing the capital to construct an Inland Empire distribution center.

This hardly seems the best preparation for the instruction beginning in kindergarten which is mandated by Proposition 227.

This bill would require every health care service plan to establish and maintain a documented system for ensuring that the plan and its contracting providers provide timely access for enrollees to a plan representative by telephone, and to urgent, nonurgent, and referral appointments.

This bill is unnecessary. Existing law already requires plans to make all services readily available and accessible at reasonable times. In addition, existing regulations already require plans to have a documented system for monitoring and evaluating accessibility of care, including a system that addresses waiting time and appointment problems.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 1992 without my signature.

This bill would require any school district applying for state building funds to include specifications for a hard-wired or wireless connection to a public switched network in new classrooms or portable classrooms.

This bill is very similar to AB 2371, which I vetoed in 1996, and AB 676 which I vetoed in 1997. While this bill addresses concerns noted in both veto messages, I still believe that the decision to provide a phone in each classroom is one that belongs at the local level. I recently signed SB 50 which affords districts broad discretion over the expenditure of school building funds. Under SB 50, districts would be specifically authorized, but not required, to use funds to provide a phone in every classroom.

In addition, this bill would apply to building projects approved for the State School Building Lease Purchase Program. However, under the provisions of SB 50, school building projects would no longer be approved pursuant to that program. Therefore, if the November school bond passes, this bill would be virtually obsolete before it would become operative.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 2224 without my signature.

This bill would allow small school districts to be eligible for class size reduction (CSR) funding if the average class size is no more than 20 for

all participating classes in the district. This bill further states that the number of pupils in any class included in the average may not exceed 22.

I recognize that districts do not have control over their enrollment and that this unpredictability may be compounded in small districts. However, by allowing class sizes to be averaged over the district, this bill would erode the integrity of the goal of class sizes of no more than 20 pupils. Class size reduction funding should be limited to those who actually achieve smaller class sizes. The CSR program already provides flexibility for classes to compensate for changing enrollment during the school year. The requirement for 20 pupils per class is based on the average size for each class over the entire school year. I believe that the current law provides sufficient flexibility, even to small districts, to accommodate variable enrollment and ensure the goal of the program is met.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 2233 without my signature.

This bill would establish complex guidelines to progressively restrict issuance of teacher credential waivers over a five-year period. It does allow, however, waivers if the Commission on Teacher Credentialing verifies that school districts have attempted to hire credentialed teachers but were unable to do so.

While the goal of ensuring that California teachers are qualified has merit, the bill is overly prescriptive and would establish confusing criteria for issuance of credential waivers. This could lead to inconsistent administration of waivers in California's 8,000 public schools, and some schools may delay filling teaching positions if they believe they can no longer obtain waivers.

In addition, the need for the bill is unclear, since schools do not appear to be overusing waivers. The Commission on Teacher Credentialing reports that only 1.5 percent of the total number of teachers are serving under waivers.

Finally, the Commission on Teacher Credentialing already reviews waiver applications to ensure that schools have attempted to recruit credentialed teachers and that the schools have selected the most qualified persons available.

This year I signed AB 1181 (Escutia), Chapter 31, Statutes of 1998, which requires Medi-Cal managed care plans to refer enrollees with specialized medical conditions, including GHPP eligible patients, to a specialist or specialty care center for the purpose of having the specialist coordinate the enrollee's health care. In addition, procedures exist for referring an enrollee to the GHPP if the Medi-Cal managed care plan does not contract with an appropriate specialist.

This bill does not specify a methodology to ensure that the proposed alternative instructional delivery attendance accounting method equates to average daily attendance and may result in a fiscal incentive for districts to serve a lower number of students.

Further, the bill may result in a diversion of existing ROC/P resources to serve adults, when existing law requires that priority in providing services be given to youth between the ages of 16 and 18 years. Finally,

although the bill requires the establishment of accountability measures, the bill does not require these measures be implemented and it is silent regarding the entity responsible for the development and implementation of such measures.

This bill would provide that unaccredited law schools may comply with current requirements for libraries by providing reasonable access to specified types of law books and treatises and provides that the law schools may comply with this requirement via access to electronic means, such as providing access to personal computer for on-line, Internet and CD-ROM research services.

California Rule of Court 957 establishes minimal requirements for law schools not accredited by the California Committee of Bar Examiners. This rule was promulgated by the Supreme Court. The establishment of standards for unaccredited law schools is currently a power of the Supreme Court. It is not appropriate for the Legislature to attempt to second guess the Supreme Court on what are and are not appropriate standards for unaccredited law schools. The Supreme Court has the authority to amend Rule of Court 957 and can consider whether the changes proposed in this bill are appropriate.

This bill would allow the State Allocation Board to use lease revenues from relocatable classrooms for deferred maintenance. Additionally, it creates a new set aside within the deferred maintenance program to assist districts that have a disproportionate number of facilities over thirty years or for districts who will use the funds to increase the health and safety on school campuses.

The redirection of lease revenues is not necessary given the recent augmentation to the deferred maintenance fund of over \$100 million contained in the 1998 budget. These funds are better spent to purchase more relocatable classrooms.

At a time when we are trying to simplify the existing State School Building Lease Purchase Program, I also am concerned with the establishment of a new "set aside" for districts with a large number of older facilities. The state program already contains provisions for districts in critical hardship situations. The existing State School Building Lease Purchase Program provides modernization funding for facilities over thirty years and if the electorate passes the Public Education Facilities Bond Act of 1998, that program would extend to school facilities over 25 years old.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 2651 without my signature.

This bill would, among other provisions, require the Department of Industrial Relations (DIR), to implement a system that provides for the electronic filing of a material data safety sheet (MSDS).

Current law (Labor Code Section 6394), requires manufacturers of specified hazardous substances to provide a MSDS to DIR. Existing law (Labor Code Section 6390), also requires these manufacturers to provide the MSDS directly to the purchaser of the hazardous substance.

I am not convinced that requiring manufacturers to send a MSDS to DIR continues to be necessary. In 1996, I issued Executive Order W-131-96, which required all state agencies to review mandates and regulations in an effort to streamline state government and to assure that all laws and regulations are necessary and effective. To that end, DIR determined that requiring manufacturers of specific hazardous substances to provide a MSDS to DIR served no purpose in furthering occupational safety and health protections, yet cost manufacturers and the state significant moneys to submit, handle and store these documents. Accordingly, DIR sponsored legislation to eliminate this requirement in 1995 and 1997.

Since the law already requires a manufacturer to send a MSDS directly to an employer/purchaser of the hazardous substance, and

considering that this data is easily accessible over the Internet, the expansion envisioned by this bill is unnecessary.

This bill would provide that an employee that does not proficiently speak or understand the English language shall be entitled to the services of a qualified interpreter during the course of medical treatment for worker's compensation.

Section 4600 of the Labor Code provides that an injured worker that does not proficiently speak or understand the English language shall be entitled to the services of a qualified interpreter when physicians are performing medical-legal evaluations to determine eligibility for worker's compensation benefits.

This measure will extend interpreter services during the course of medical treatment. Although the bill addresses what may be a real issue in some cases, it does so in a manner that may recreate problems seen in the past with excessive, inappropriate billings from medical clinics which used their own employees for this purpose. It would be more appropriate to permit payment of an outside interpreter where necessary, so that the entity requesting the service does not profit from providing it.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 1169 without my signature.

This bill would require the Resources Agency and member agencies within it, to post on their Internet websites, any documents "disseminate[d] to the public" or "available in print to the public," and to maintain on that website meeting agenda and summary reports of meetings for one year.

Ambiguously drafted, this bill would appear to result in an obligation to place on the Internet virtually any document accessible to the public under the Public Records Act. Thus, any constituent correspondence sent to a member of the public and any internal memorandum, including inter-office memos, not exempt from disclosure under the Public Records Act would appear to have to be posted on the Internet. Each time a document is created, legal staff would have to spend time determining whether the document is subject to disclosure under the Public Records Act and other staff would have to post it on the Internet. Most of these documents would be of very little interest or value to the general public.

There is no justification for the human or computer resources that would be necessary to implement this bill. Each of the specific documents identified in this bill are readily available to the public. Those items not already available on the Agency's website can be obtained within ten days upon request under the Public Records Act, with the strong exception of Agency and departmental bill analyses submitted to the Governor. Under current law, those documents are exempt from disclosure under the Public Records Act and specifying such documents in the bill without amending the Public Records Act would unfairly mislead the public into assuming those documents are also accessible. In sum, this bill would consume considerable taxpayer funds to post on the Internet, vast numbers of documents of little interest to the public and already available under the Public Records Act.

This bill is also inconsistent with the Healthy Families Program goal of providing children coordinated full service care from a managed health care plan. An LEA billing option is also unlikely to receive federal approval because of duplicate payments to the Healthy Families

Program and the LEA. The bill may also result in increased General Fund costs because of duplicate payments to the Healthy Families Program and the LEA.

There is no clear evidence that attendance accounting for Adult Education and ROC/P is overly burdensome. The nature of these programs is significantly different from regular K-12 education programs because pupil participation does not occur in full-day increments. Therefore, the more precise attendance accounting methods required by existing law are appropriate for these programs.

I also believe that this bill is unnecessary. Providers may already establish parallel attendance accounting methods as long as they continue to meet the existing legal requirements. If providers can document a more effective way to accurately account for pupil attendance, revisions to the current law could be considered at that time.

This bill would declare that the Department of Parks and Recreation should fund half of the costs of a project to replace the safety railing at Blufftop Park, a state-owned, locally operated park unit in Huntington Beach, when developing a spending program for deferred park maintenance at state parks.

In 1987, the City of Huntington Beach entered into a contract with the Department of Parks and Recreation to operate a portion of the Bolsa Chica State Beach. In exchange for receiving all revenue from the property, the City expressly agreed to take responsibility for all costs associated with developing, maintaining, and operating the property until the year 2006. In fact, the State has entered into such agreements with 25 other communities.

The existing operating agreement allows the City of Huntington Beach to apply to the State for facility improvements. Should the City choose to submit such a grant request, the Department would review and evaluate it against all other competing programs in terms of statewide significance and funding availability. Circumvention of this process is simply not warranted, and would be unfair to the other cities with whom the State has contracted.

This bill would limit the price that a government agency may charge to a school district for property that will be used for outdoor recreational purposes to attempt equity with laws governing the sale of school district property to another governmental entity. Under current law, schools are required to offer to sell surplus property to another public agency at a deep discount, usually resulting in a sales price of roughly 25 percent of market value.

This bill is very similar to SB 1689, which I vetoed in 1996. The concerns noted at that time are still valid. While the bill may result in a more equitable treatment between public entities in the sale and purchase of surplus land, the whole approach is in the wrong direction. We should be enacting laws that encourage public agencies, including school districts, to get rid of surplus property at a fair market value, rather than acquiring property from each other at fire sale prices.

The bill would require the Department of General Services (DGS) to determine the eligibility of any contractor on the list maintained by DOIT for purposes of determining whether they meet the requirements of a responsible bidder under the State Contract Act.

This bill is unnecessary. Pursuant to Executive Order W-163-97, state departments and agencies require standardized Year 2000 Problem compliance provisions in all applicable contracts with state contractors. The bill would add cumbersome administrative procedures that would not provide meaningful Year 2000 Problem compliance.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 2116 without my signature.

This bill would add two new selection criteria to the existing School Violence Reduction program: 1) the demonstrated need for a program due to increased or high incidents of school crime reported through the California Safe Schools Assessment (CSSA); and 2) a high percentage of pupils in the school or school district who qualify for free or reduced price meals or whose families receive aid pursuant to the Cal Works program.

In 1996, I signed AB 3492 (Chapter 200, Statutes 1996), establishing the current School Violence Reduction Grant Program and ten criteria selecting schools and school districts to receive grant funds. These ten selection criteria, in general, require applicants to demonstrate a need for the program and a capacity to administer an effective one.

The first of the two proposed criteria duplicates the existing requirement that an applicant demonstrate that conflict or violence is a substantial and continuing problem for pupils and staff. The other proposed criterion is that the applicant has a high percentage of pupils who qualify for free and reduced price meals or whose families receive aid through the CalWORKS program. While school violence is

disproportionately prevalent in schools with high poverty, this is not always the case. Drugs and violence invade too many schools in too many communities. Middle class neighborhoods are not immune nor are less affluent areas inevitably condemned to high crime. The addition of this criterion would create a significant potential for an inequitable selection process.

This bill would provide that, where a successive or concurrent insurer, as defined, settles with its insured as a partial settlement of the claims made against the insured in a pollution claim, as defined, the insurer or its insured may apply for a court order determining that the partial settlement is a good faith and reasonable approximation of the insurer's liability, as specified.

This bill was intended to promote the quick and fair resolution of environmental claims with multiple insurers. Unfortunately, it ignores the fundamental problem that exists in all multiparty environmental litigation disputes: fair allocation of costs for clean-up of toxic sites. Under the scheme in AB 2157, an insured would suffer even more delays in resolving environmental claims because of the extra layer of litigation that is generated by this bill.

AB 2157 contemplates a procedure where a settling insurer will notify all other involved insurers and attempt to prove before the court why its settlement was in 'good faith' and should extinguish all its liability on the claim to both the insured and the other insurers. Non-settling insurers could challenge the settlement as to its fairness. However, rather than providing a simplified or expedited method to resolve these issues, the bill would simply move the coverage litigation from its separate forum to this hearing. AB 2157's procedures would create a series of lengthy and complex mini-trials within a main trial each time an insurer seeks to settle. These mini-trials would have at issue, and at risk, the same issues in a separate coverage case, and would often involve extensive discovery and motion practice, often involving millions of dollars, and take years to resolve.

I just signed SB 50, which includes a \$9.2 billion school bond for the November ballot and creates a new program for state assistance for

school facilities. The new program significantly streamlines the state school building process and introduces significant cost saving incentives for local school building projects. Under the new facilities program, districts would have greater control and discretion over the use of state assistance for facilities and would benefit from any savings generated by facilities projects.

I continue to support greater flexibility and responsibility at the local level for school construction projects and cost containment. This bill would introduce further complexities into the state school building program at a time when we are seeking to simplify the process. Because SB 50 will encourage cost savings for all school building projects, the concept of a state operated pilot for this purpose is both unnecessary and obsolete.

This bill would require funding and completion of remaining retrofit soundwalls from the 1989 Retrofit Soundwall Priority List.

This bill would impose on the state costs to construct retrofit soundwalls that should be borne by local and regional entities. In signing SB 45 by Senator Kopp (I-San Francisco) last year, I intended that construction of retrofit soundwalls be a regional decision and not a mandate upon state transportation resources. As well intentioned as

AB 1686 may be, the bill benefits primarily one county, Los Angeles County, at the expense of transportation funding for other urban counties in Southern and Northern California.

Further, this bill was amended late in the legislative process to require that the state funding would count towards the 60-40 North/South funding formula, rather than being taken "off the top." This late amendment unfairly results in a financial benefit to northern California at the expense of southern California.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 2280 without my signature.

This bill would require property owners who enter into construction contracts for more than \$1 million to provide the general contractor financial security for the project. The security must be in the form of a surety bond equal to 50 percent of the contract, a letter of credit for 15 percent of the contract or a cash deposit of 3 months worth of payments under the contract. The bill would also require property owners to provide the general contractor with a copy of the construction mortgage or deed of trust certified by the county recorder.

Contract matters such as payment terms and the use of security instruments are best left to the contracting parties. General contractors are free to negotiate terms that are similar to the provisions of this bill. Similarly, property owners should be able to negotiate these issues without legislative interference.

This bill would appropriate funds to reimburse interest overpayments to the General Fund by certain borrowers under the 1976 Safe Drinking Water Program.

Funds to reimburse those borrowers were included in the 1998–99 Budget for the Department of Water Resources. Payments will be made pursuant to stipulated judgments in two lawsuits that were filed by the named borrowers. Enactment of this bill would provide duplicate sources of payment for the same obligations.

To the Members of the California Assembly:

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 2521 without my signature.

This bill would permit local enforcement agencies (LEAs) to recover costs for defending themselves against frivolous appeals of denials of a solid waste facility permit; would eliminate the prohibition against members of an independent hearing panel from serving more than two consecutive two-year terms; would require an LEA to issue written notice of a proposed denial of a facility permit; and would provide that a cease and desist order issued by an LEA against a solid waste facility operator would remain in force and effect until overturned by a hearing panel or court of law.

Existing law (Public Resources Code, section 45017) currently authorizes a cease and desist order to take effect immediately, regardless of appeal, in instances that pose an imminent and substantial threat to the public health and safety or to the environment, or more specifically, if the public health and safety and environment can only be protected by the operator's immediate compliance. This bill would extend that provision to include virtually any activity for which the LEA is authorized to issue an order, including not only an activity that actually results in some hazard or pollution, but any activity for which a hazard or pollution is reasonably foreseeable, regardless of whether or not an actual threat is imminent.

While I support the bill's protections against frivolous administrative appeals, I am concerned that this legislation unnecessarily infringes on the due process rights of those subject to an enforcement proceeding by an LEA. Current law already provides to LEAs the immediate enforcement tools where there is a need to quickly protect public health and safety or the environment. The tools for the enforcement of the types of scenarios envisioned by this legislation are already in place. Accordingly, this bill is unnecessary.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 930 without my signature.

This bill would require bicycles to have two-colored rear reflectors and allow bicycle riders to wear reflective footwear or ankle bands. This bill would also require local agencies, to the extent feasible, to utilize

new traffic loop detectors designed for bicycles, and to implement new traffic lights designed for bicycle riders.

While I recognize the need for improved transportation safety for bicycles, I believe that this bill would impose indeterminate costs on the state. Although this bill indicates that bicycle loop detectors must be installed only to the extent that such bicycle detectors are feasible, it imposes a reimbursable mandated cost on local agencies. It is inappropriate to impose these unknown costs on the state general fund, when they are clearly a local responsibility.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 1161 without my signature.

This bill would require telephone corporations to annually notify new and existing residential telephone customers of the availability of caller identification services, or caller ID.

Current law already provides for the notification of caller ID services. California's telephone companies not only comply with this law, but also provide additional notification to their customers as a matter of good business practice. While this bill is apparently intended to provide increased consumer protection, it will do little to that end.

Further, the Public Utilities Commission is mandated to promulgate policies and regulations related to telephone utilities and caller ID services. Given the complexities of the industry and its technology and continual changes in consumer interest, modifications to the caller ID notification policies are better established under the flexibility of the PUC's regulatory function.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 1685 without my signature.

This bill would require that county boards of supervisors and city councils, when establishing boundaries of specified districts, conform to the boundaries of existing cities and communities of interest. This bill would also require that at least one public hearing be held on any proposal to adjust the boundaries of a city council or charter city district prior to a vote on that proposal.

The intent of the bill is to reduce community fragmentation and observe community of interest in the course of local redistricting. However, this bill is flawed. It would authorize counties to conduct public hearings prior to revising the boundaries of supervisorial districts, but require city councils to conduct these same public hearings. I understand that this disparity was unintentional. Nevertheless, the requirement for public hearing is arguably even more important in the redistricting of counties and should be imposed.

Further, language should be added indicating that such hearings—as a necessary incident of the redistricting inherent in self-government—is not a reimbursable mandate.

As written, the bill does not require conduct of a hearing by counties and does subject the state to a local claim for reimbursement.

In that veto message, I stated that forgiving counties for errors in allocating fines, forfeitures and penalty revenues sets a bad precedent and encourages fiscal irresponsibility. That message still applies.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 2437 without my signature.

This bill would establish a new level of benefits for state and school employee participants in the “1959 Survivor Benefit” program until January 1, 2009.

The Public Employees' Retirement System (PERS) prescribes a pre-retirement death benefit for the survivors of members who are not subject to social security. This benefit, commonly referred to as the “1959 Survivor Benefit,” is paid as a monthly allowance to an eligible survivor.

Under current law, state and local agencies may elect to provide a pre-retirement death benefit enhancement through the collective bargaining process. This measure eliminates that discretion by requiring state and local governments to provide this benefit. The issue here is not whether the enhancement is warranted. It is the impropriety of circumventing the collective bargaining process.

Despite the present existence of an accumulated surplus of employee assets, retirement benefits are more appropriately increased only by negotiation required by the collective bargaining process.

As long as state law requires that state and local governments engage in collective bargaining as public employers, it is improper to circumvent the required negotiation by legislation.

This bill would exempt specified school employees from submitting to fingerprinting and background checks. Specifically, the bill would exempt applicants whom school districts determine necessary due to emergency or exceptional situations if delay in hiring could endanger student health or safety; employees not located at schoolsites who would not have contact with students; and students who work temporarily or part-time in the district that they attend.

This well intentioned bill would create exceptions to the otherwise absolute requirement that no person be employed by a primary school or school district before submitting fingerprints and completing a background check.

The vesting of discretion to exempt applicants from background checks in a thousand school districts is ill advised. The concerns which give rise to this bill are better addressed by completing the process of bringing the CAL ID.2 fingerprint system online. Funding for that program has been authorized.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 860 without my signature.

This bill would establish the Comprehensive Teacher Preparation and Education Program and, in doing so, would codify and change the governance of existing efforts of providing teacher training through partnerships between higher education institutions and school districts.

This bill is unnecessary. This program already exists and receives funding through the K–12 categorical mega-item and is overseen by the Intersegmental Coordinating Council. Establishing detailed program guidelines in statute would make it difficult for local programs to respond to unique local conditions or to modify programs as may be necessary in the future.

Furthermore, I cannot support the governance changes to the existing program that are proposed in this bill. The Commission on Teacher Credentialing, not the Superintendent of Public Instruction, has jurisdiction over teacher preparation.

Finally, I recently signed SB 2042 which encourages postsecondary institutions to offer integrated programs that enable students to engage in professional preparation course work and intensive field experience in schools concurrent with subject matter course work and preparation. The provisions of SB 2042 more effectively address the need identified in this bill.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 2004 without my signature.

This bill would expand the notice and due process requirements for student loan debtors by modifying the procedures related to the referral of delinquent student loans by the Student Aid Commission to the Franchise Tax Board.

This bill would provide student loan debtors that were referred to the Franchise Tax Board with greater appeal rights than other debtors. I do not believe that the rights of severely delinquent loan debtors should be expanded beyond the rights of those who attempt to repay their debt. In addition, the excessive administrative process required by this bill would diminish the state's ability to collect on delinquent student loan accounts, thereby reducing the level of actual debt collected.

Current law provides for the referral of a student loan to the Franchise Tax Board only after other attempts to collect the debt have failed, and allows for the return of a referral back to the Student Aid Commission from the Franchise Tax Board if the amount of the repayment is disputed. I believe that current law provides a reasonable balance

between the due process rights of students and the right of the state to collect repayment of delinquent loans.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 2282 without my signature.

This bill would provide that counties may use the automated vital statistics system (AVSS) to transmit infant mortality data to the Department of Health Services. The Department would be required to start processing this data within six months after the death of a child. When the data collected demonstrates the need to improve the quality of obstetrical care at a hospital, the hospital shall establish a plan of action to address the identified problem.

This bill is a hollow solution to a serious problem. Counties provide the Department with infant mortality data in varying time frames and formats. Thus, the ability of the Department to develop timely quality of care information is inextricably linked to the counties, transmission of this data. This bill ignores this important fact and permits, rather than mandates, the counties to provide infant mortality data to the Department using the AVSS. The bill then requires the Department to start determining quality of obstetrical care trends within six months after the death of a child. However, since county participation in the AVSS is voluntary and not subject to the six month requirement, the Department's efforts are based on incomplete county data, rendering the results meaningless.

The counties and the Department are working on a more constructive program. The counties have begun development of an electronic death registration system (EDRS) at the local level to reduce the time in which all death data are transmitted to the Department. The Department has provided local assistance funds for a pilot project of the EDRS.

This bill would, among other provisions, raise juror compensation by \$5 per day after the first day.

There is no compelling evidence to suggest that a \$5 per day increase in juror compensation will make a difference in the number of persons willing to serve on a jury.

I have signed instead, Senate Bill No. 1947 (Lockyer), that will require the Judicial Council to change California's jury system to allow jurors to complete their duty within one day, unless they are immediately seated on a jury. Under this measure, jurors will have also fulfilled their jury duty service if they are challenged during the voir dire process and then dismissed, or if they were not selected during voir dire

questioning but dismissed at the end of the day. These reforms will diversify and increase representation of jury pools by allowing more people to participate in the process.

This bill would mandate an increase in the required number of public hearings held by the county committee on school district reorganization when it receives a petition to reorganize and create a new school district with attendance in excess of 15,000 pupils.

While public input in decision making is essential, current law already authorizes the county committee to hold as many hearings as it deems necessary to ensure adequate public input. This bill does not appear to solve any known problem with the current local process that could not be solved at the local level. In addition, this bill could create problems at the local level because it would increase the number of required hearings without adjusting current time requirements for holding those hearings.

Moreover, the state could be required to pay for these added hearings through the mandate claims process. I believe that school district reorganization is primarily a local issue, unique to each district and county. The strict state-prescribed requirements contained in this bill unnecessarily infringe upon the local authority over this matter.

Veto Message—Assembly Bill No. 368

To the Members of the California Assembly:

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 368 without my signature.

This bill would add a provision to the Labor Code that authorizes a pregnant firefighter and her physician to determine when she should cease active firefighting.

While the intent of this bill—to protect pregnant employees from forced leaves of absence—is commendable, such protections already

exist under current law in the Fair Employment and Housing Act (FEHA) found in the Government Code.

The FEHA provides job protections to pregnant employees. Under this Act, while forcible transfers and leaves of absence are prohibited, employers are required to transfer a pregnant employee to a less hazardous or strenuous position at her request. Moreover, under FEHA, the pregnant employee is entitled to four months of pregnancy disability leave with a guarantee of reinstatement to the same position at the expiration of the leave or transfer.

This bill would diminish the protections currently available to pregnant firefighters. For example, a pregnant firefighter would be required to obtain a physician's opinion as to her need for a transfer or leave of absence. The FEHA requires an employer to accept a certification of disability from the employee's "health care provider," that includes a broader field of professionals than physicians. Additionally, this bill could be interpreted by employers as requiring a pregnant firefighter to obtain permission from her physician in order to continue working, a practice that is prohibited under the FEHA. Moreover, because this bill would add a provision to the Labor Code, it is unclear how it would interact with the provisions of the FEHA in the Government Code.

This measure would add confusion to the already complex leave provisions under the FEHA and its implementing regulations by creating a subgroup of pregnant firefighters within the protected class of pregnant employees. The FEHA provides the same protections to pregnant firefighters as it provides to all pregnant employees. There is no reason to create special protections for a subgroup of employees.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 1827 without my signature.

This bill would require a school district to give a district employee the opportunity to present information that is relevant to an incident which may be the basis of suspension or expulsion and require an employee to reveal such information upon request by a school principal.

The bill formalizes the attendance and agenda of meetings which take place prior to a school administrator recommending action on a suspension or expulsion, and, in doing so, the bill curtails school administrators' ability to engage in informal meetings with pupils and their parents. The approach taken in this bill is inconsistent with the respective role of teachers and administrators generally in such matters and state discipline laws specifically. Current law provides ample opportunity for school employees to share relevant information without creating an additional mandate as this bill does.

Further, requiring a school employee to share information in the presence of a pupil and the pupil's parent when that information is not a matter of public record could place that employee in danger of retaliation. That threat would have a chilling effect on the willingness of

school staff to participate in such proceedings and, as a result, produce a consequence that is completely counter to what is intended by the bill.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 1877 without my signature.

This bill would establish an Inspector General in the Department of Veterans Affairs. The bill would also require veteran home administrators to consult with the Inspector General before adopting admission rules and regulations. This bill would add the State Treasurer and the Director of Finance to the California Veterans Board as ex officio members.

There is no need to establish an inspector general within the Department of Veterans Affairs. The Secretary of Veterans Affairs has already appointed an internal auditor within the department who conducts inquiries into matters contained in this bill. Members of the veterans homes, as well as veterans in the community at large, have unfettered access to the internal auditor and to the newly-established department ombudsman.

The State Treasurer and Director of Finance should not be added to the California Veterans Board as ex officio members. The Treasurer and Director of Finance are members of the Veterans Finance Committee of 1943, which approves all bond sale recommendations and interest rate determinations by the department and Board. This provision would have diminished the effectiveness of the checks and balances between the Board and Veterans Finance Committee of 1943. In addition, Board members should be veterans and the Treasurer and Director of Finance may not always be veterans.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 2339 without my signature.

This bill would extend monitoring and surveillance activities for the State Water Resources Control Boards (SWRCB) Bay Protection and Toxic Cleanup Program (BPTCP) and would require the SWRCB and coastal Regional Water Quality Control Boards (RWCQB) to implement a consolidated, statewide cleanup plan to remediate identified toxic hot spots. The bill would also exempt dischargers from the requirements of the BPTCP cleanup plan if they are remediating or contributing to the cost of remediating these sites under other specified federal or state regulatory programs.

AB 2239 represents a step backwards in the BPTCP. Dischargers would be excused from being required to meet adopted water control standards if they participate or contribute in any way in another specified remediation plan. Those provisions are extremely broad, and

could be used to let the biggest polluters off the hook for making only the slightest contribution to the cleanup effort. Requiring those dischargers to accept additional cleanup responsibilities would require the approval of the Site Designation Committee, a body created to settle issues of jurisdiction, not compliance.

Finally, the provision of this bill that calls for implementation of the final plan “with all deliberate speed” could be interpreted to force immediate implementation. The existing process requires the plan to include findings and recommendations for the establishment of a toxic hot spot program (Water Code section 13394(i)). The purpose of this provision is to allow all affected stakeholders, including the public, the opportunity to review and evaluate every aspect of the completed plan, including scope, feasibility, and cost (including potential for recovery of costs). To call for the implementation of a plan that has not been completed and for which a funding plan has not been identified would not only be premature, it would be irresponsible.

Concerns have been raised by both rural and urban counties as to the adequacy of transportation services. County boards of supervisors, however, may allocate CalWORKs funds from within the county block grant should they wish to provide additional transportation services.

Additionally, the use of the federal TANF block grant for CalWORKs-eligible recipients would cause their five year federal TANF eligibility to be used even if the transit services were the only benefits provided.

Veto Message—Assembly Bill No. 34

To the Members of the California Assembly:

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 34 without my signature.

This bill would require health care service plans and disability insurers to provide coverage for screening, diagnosis and treatment for breast cancer, including reconstructive surgery. It would also prohibit plans and insurers from denying coverage on the basis of genetic characteristics. Finally, the bill would eliminate utilization review.

This bill is unnecessary. Existing law, Health and Safety Code Section 1345(b) already requires plans to provide diagnostic laboratory and diagnostic and therapeutic radiologic services. Plans are also required to provide coverage for preventive health services. More specifically, Health and Safety Code Section 1367.65 and Insurance Code Section 10123.81 require coverage for mammography. Health and Safety Code Section 1367.6 and Insurance Code Section 10123.8 also require coverage for a mastectomy, including coverage for prosthetic devices or reconstructive surgery to restore and achieve symmetry. I have also just signed AB 7 (Brown) and AB 1621 (Figueroa), which enhances the coverage for women receiving treatment for breast cancer and reconstructive surgery.

In addition, existing law, Health and Safety Code Section 1374.7 and Insurance Code Section 10140, already prohibits discrimination in health insurance coverage on the basis of genetic characteristics. Finally, it would be inappropriate to eliminate utilization review. The proper use of utilization review ensures that the patient receives the proper care in a coordinated manner.

This bill would require health care service plans and disability insurers to provide a second medical opinion if requested by an enrollee or an insured when medically necessary or appropriate or if any one of five conditions occurs.

Consumers should have access to medically necessary second medical opinions. However, this bill is flawed in one respect. Enrollees and insureds would be able to obtain a second medical opinion from a physician not associated with his or her medical group even though a qualified physician is available. There is no evidence that qualified physicians within the same medical group do not provide professional and unbiased second medical opinions. To the contrary, there is every indication that physicians who are colleagues continue to apply the highest professional standards when providing second medical opinions. Providing duplicative fee-for-service payments to a

non-contracting physician will only increase the cost of health care without improving the quality of care.

However, it is unclear how a report to the Legislature on the number of plans that provide this type of coverage will help consumers make informed choices. Consumers may obtain this information directly from the health plan.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 1931 without my signature.

This bill would require the Department of Social Services to create a new certification program for agencies that refer clients to a residential care facility for the elderly (RCFE).

There are provisions in this bill that warrant support. Agencies should be prohibited from offering monetary incentives in exchange for client referrals and receiving any gratuity from a facility beyond the amount specified in the contractual agreement.

This bill, however, would impose different regulatory processes and dual fees on many referral agencies. The Department of Health Services (DHS) already licenses those agencies that make referrals to a skilled nursing home or intermediate care facility. Under this bill these same facilities who also refer to a residential care facility for the elderly would now be subject to regulation by the Department of Social Services.

Before proceeding down the path of duality of regulation, there should be exploration of allowing DHS, which already exercises such responsibility, to be the single agency certifying and policing referral agencies for both kinds of referral.

Finally, the bill sets an arbitrary fee at \$750 to administer the program. This fee is insufficient to support the regulatory program

envisioned in this bill. The funding level and appropriate fee should be established as part of the budget process.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 2025 without my signature.

This bill would create a major new state program to provide direct state stipends to child care workers and enhanced reimbursement rates and funding to child care programs to raise staff compensation levels in the child care field.

While recognizing the important role child care providers play in caring for our children, I do not believe it is appropriate for the State of California to provide wage subsidies or otherwise interfere in the private child care market. This bill would introduce state regulation of wages into a field that is currently controlled by the market and allow direct wage supplements to private sector employees. This may constitute a gift of public funds.

Additionally, a statewide program of this nature would require significant expenditures, diverting critical resources from providing subsidized child care to low-income families to nonsubsidized private providers. I believe that this is inappropriate at a time when demand for child care for low-income families is increasing significantly as they enter the work force in our improving economy and transition from welfare to work under California's new CalWORKs program. Further, I already deleted a provision in the 1998 Budget Act that would set aside \$5 million of any federal fund child care increases to be used for this purpose noting at that time that decisions on the use of future funds should be made during deliberations on future budgets.

Finally, the Department of Education is already addressing this issue through less obtrusive methods through its approved Child Care Quality Plan required by the Federal government for receipt of Federal assistance. Also, the Student Aid Commission offers programs that forgive student loans for certain child care staff development costs.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 2237 without my signature.

This bill would require the California Environmental Protection Agency, the Resources Agency, and the Department of Health Services to incorporate so-called "environmental racism" or "environmental justice" issues in their selection criteria for environmental loans and

grants. The bill would also require those agencies to place information on environmental loans and grants on the Internet in a form more easily understandable to prospective applicants.

While the goal of making better information more easily available is laudable, the bill is an ill-advised attempt to shift the primary focus of a simple grant or loan program aimed at improving the environment from an evaluation based on objective physical standards to one based upon a subjective assessment of socio-economic impact of pollution.

The evidence indicates that communities with the highest exposure to environmental risks are receiving State loans and grants. The State environmental laws do not provide separate, less stringent requirements, or lower standards in low-income communities.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 1264 without my signature.

This bill would require California law enforcement officers to collect information, including race or ethnicity and approximate age and gender, about all motorists subject to traffic stops during a three year reporting period. In addition, the Department of Justice would be required to collect and report statistical reports in its annual crime statistics report.

AB 1264 is the product of a number of reports, both anecdotal and statistical, which provide evidence that African American and Hispanic citizens are subject to a disproportionate number of traffic stops.

Observers differ regarding whether these reports reflect the propensity of officers to make legally justifiable stops on a selective basis or whether some officers make stops without justification.

As our enforcement agencies become more ethnically diverse, California's peace officers have internal, as well as public, pressure to conduct their duties in a fair, nondiscriminatory manner. Most comply out of fundamental decency, others because of training or the scrutiny of their peers. Law enforcement must strive to be racially blind. It must be demanded, beginning at the academy level.

Nonetheless, some officers, like members of every profession, may fail to fulfill their duties and indulge in biases. This bill would seek to record such incidents over a period of three years at a cost of tens of millions of dollars. The bill, however, ensures that neither officers or motorists would be identified by name, only in the aggregate. Accordingly, it would be impossible to take meaningful corrective action.

This bill offers no certain or useful conclusion, assuredly nothing that would justify the major commitment of time, money, and manpower that this bill requires. The investment contemplated by AB 1264 could be more immediately and productively employed by enhancing officer training, encouraging dialogue between enforcement agencies and

racially diverse community groups, and taking forceful action against those officers who abuse the privilege of serving all of California's citizens.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 285 without my signature.

This bill would require: 1) the School/Law Enforcement Partnership to provide specified information about domestic violence and sexual assault to school districts and county offices of education, 2) the Commission on Teacher Credentialing (CTC) to develop and implement standards for prospective teachers so that they can recognize, and appropriately respond to, victimized children, and 3) the Superintendent of Public Instruction (SPI) to develop teacher training requirements on domestic violence recognition and prevention.

While I agree with the author that domestic violence continues to be a widespread problem that seriously impacts children, I have concerns with the approach taken in this bill for addressing the problem. This bill proposes a domestic violence program within the existing School/Law Enforcement Partnership, which was originally established to control violence on schoolgrounds. While this partnership already provides assistance to school districts regarding child abuse reporting requirements, this bill would create a new role for the partnership that would divert attention and necessary resources away from its primary mission to curb on-campus violence to focus on broader domestic violence issues that may or may not directly effect a pupil or the school environment.

Further, current law already gives teachers and administrators wide latitude to make determinations of abuse, which they are required to report to the proper authorities. In fact, Education Code Section 44691 already requires the Department of Education to develop staff development seminars and instruction for school personnel in the detection of child abuse and neglect and the proper action to take in cases of suspected abuse and neglect. In addition, the Office of Child Abuse Prevention is charged with disseminating information to all school districts regarding the detection of child abuse.

Veto Message—Assembly Bill No. 118

To the Members of the California Assembly:

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 118 without my signature.

This bill would require the Department of Health Services to complete a Treatment Authorization Request (TAR) determination for all terminally ill Medi-Cal recipients within three working days of submission. The bill would also require the department to notify the provider of services who submitted the TAR, by facsimile, or telephone within one working day, if the TAR is denied or deferred for further information.

While there are services needed by individuals with terminal illness that must be received without delay, Medi-Cal already has procedures that address those circumstances. The current process allows for a medical service provider to provide services to a recipient needing urgent services without delay and then submit a TAR to secure retroactive approval of payment for the services provided. If the service is provided in an emergency room, a claim can be submitted without prior approval.

In less urgent situations where the provider recognizes a need for timely delivery of services, the provider may submit a TAR and speak with a Medi-Cal medical consultant about an accelerated review. Providers may also access the toll free telephone number 12 hours a day, seven days a week to determine the status of a TAR.

The Medi-Cal program makes determinations on over 2 million TARs each year in an average of 3.8 days. This bill is unnecessary.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 2040 without my signature.

This bill would require the Department of Health Services to establish a 10-year repayment period for Medi-Cal overpayments owed by an acute care hospital with a psychiatric unit in Kern County and for a Kern County District Hospital that provided provides skilled nursing services. The bill specifies that the interest on the unpaid balance will accrue at a rate equal to the rate earned by the Pooled Money Investment Account.

This bill circumvents existing federal and state law governing reimbursements of hospitals. The bill threatens the fiscal integrity of the Medi-Cal program by creating the precedent for resolving the financial difficulties of hospitals by seeking similar legislation, a solution that I cannot support.

The hospitals do not dispute the amount owed, had not exercised their right to appeal nor fully exhausted their administrative remedies with the Department of Health Services. The Department of Health Services is authorized under current statutory authority to negotiate with any hospital that has taken advantage of the statutory appeal process. Additionally, this unusually long period for repayment results in the lost

interest born entirely by the General Fund because the federal government obtains immediate repayment from the State.

This bill sets a bad precedent, increases the potential for default and threatens the fiscal integrity of the state reimbursement process.

For the zero-tolerance policy to have the maximum effect, it needs to be enforced without ambiguity so that the message is heard by all pupils. This bill would convey that zero-tolerance for serious offenses is no longer the policy of the state.

AB 1605 is a technical bill of importance to the Public Utilities Commission. I call on the Legislature to re-introduce this bill in its December session as an urgency bill and pass it to the next Governor for signature as soon as possible.

This bill would require the Department of Alcohol and Drug Abuse to convene a task force to study the proliferation, over concentration, and business practices of narcotic treatment programs. The bill would also modify existing laws governing the licensing of narcotic treatment programs and revise the rate setting methodology for narcotic treatment doses and ingredient costs.

The goals of this legislation are commendable and shared by the Administration. But the bill is not only unnecessary duplication of efforts presently underway, its specificity would in fact conflict with and impede these efforts.

This bill is duplicative of department program procedures and regulations. The department implemented a uniform reimbursement process for ingredient costs and monthly dosing rates in the 1998–99 fiscal year. The Department is also currently in process with its advisory work group assessing the siting, availability and accessibility of programs. Additionally, existing state regulations require similar requirements for a strong rehabilitative component and control of contagious diseases.

This bill will have the unintended consequence of increasing costs for mobilehome park residents. Price controls that eliminate any reasonable profit will cause park operators to increase rents and other types of charges, further distorting the housing market. In addition to eliminating

any reasonable profit, the bill does not allow the park owner to recover the capital invested in building the distribution system. This may cause park owners to stop providing distribution services, thus forcing park residents to rely on more expensive alternatives.

This bill would exempt a schoolbus driver from the flashing red signal lights and stop signal arm requirements when loading and unloading pupils at specified locations.

Last year, I signed Assembly Bill 1297, the Thomas Edward Lanni Schoolbus Safety Act of 1997, which requires that all schoolbus drivers activate their bus's flashing red lights when stopped for the purpose of loading or unloading students. I signed last year's bill to ensure that California's school children are protected when traveling to and from school on a school bus. This law is comparable to laws in 49 other states.

AB 2375 seeks to repeal provisions of last year's bill by putting in statute exemptions to the mandatory flashing red light requirement. The law has been in place for less than one year, which is hardly enough time to determine if exemptions are needed. If evaluations show that exemptions are necessary, I call on children safety groups across California to work with state and local law enforcement, as well as parents and teachers, to enact Legislation that improves safety for school children and motorists, rather than making changes that lessen the burden on bus drivers and school districts to comply with the law.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 399 without my signature.

This bill would include self-employed individuals in the health insurance regulatory framework for small employer groups. The bill would also provide for state implementation of the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1997 (HIPAA).

The federal government is presently enforcing the portability provisions of HIPAA because the Legislature last year refused to move the Administration's proposal to have the state do so. As a result, California is one of only three states with federal rather than state enforcement. The provisions of this bill, which are those of the Administration bill (AB 830, Brewer), now propose state implementation, and are good for California. California, not the federal government, will do a better job of enforcing the portability provisions of HIPAA.

However, the provisions of this bill including self employed individuals in the regulatory framework for small employer groups will upset the stability recently achieved in this once volatile market. The bill would distort this market by shifting higher risk individuals from the individual health insurance market to the small employer group market, thus increasing costs for all small employers.

Provisions in the bill to prevent this cost shift are inadequate. Instead of increasing access to health insurance coverage, this bill would actually cause some small employers to drop coverage for their employees.

Those who are serious about providing maximum access to health coverage must remember who pays for it. Improving the affordability of insurance is the key to providing more working Californians with quality health insurance coverage. The author would have achieved that goal and a signature had he simply presented the Administration's affordable proposal.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 1368 without my signature.

This bill would create the Carl Moyer Air Quality Standards Attainment Program to provide grants to individuals, businesses, and/or

public agencies for the purchase of new, low-emission technology for heavy duty engines, the development of low-emission technologies, and the installation of infrastructure at sites designated to dispense vehicle fuel that reduce oxides of nitrogen (NOx). The purpose of this program is to reduce NOx emissions from heavy-duty diesel engines, which are a significant source of pollution.

Earlier this year, I submitted a \$50 million May Revision proposal to provide economic incentives for the purchase of low-emission technology for diesel engines as a cost-effective means of reducing NOx emissions. The Air Resources Board advises me that the most cost-effective means available to reduce pollution from large diesel engines is to replace those engines with lower-polluting alternatives. The Legislature ultimately decided to fund only \$25 million of that proposal. This bill would further dilute the amount of money available for this purpose by diverting funds to research and infrastructure projects. Furthermore, it would create a number of separate accounts and rigidly control funding for project types by percentage allocation.

As this bill is inconsistent with the program put forward by this Administration, I am directing the Air Resources Board, under its general statutory authority and in a manner consistent with the Clean Air Plan, to provide grants for the replacement of heavy-duty diesel engines using funds allocated in the 1998 Budget Act for that purpose.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 1889 without my signature.

This bill would require the State Board of Pharmacy to conduct a study of medication error rates and negative drug interactions and would appropriate \$300,000 from the Board's Contingent Fund for that purpose.

Concerns have been raised about the integrity, validity, adequacy of funding and confidentiality of the proposed study. The bill's reference to "placebo" prescriptions is inappropriate, a study of errors in the filling of prescriptions or the failure of pharmacists to take into account potentially harmful drug interactions should be accomplished by studying fictitious, rather than "placebo," prescriptions. In addition, no matter what transgressions might be discovered while conducting the contemplated study, no disciplinary or corrective action could be taken.

The information which would be provided by this study could also be provided by various national organizations which are currently collecting data on drug prescription error rates, employing definitions different than those proposed by AB 1889. This bill is at best premature and, if adequate data is compiled by the pending studies, potentially unnecessary. In the interim, the Board has, consistent with the recommendation of the National Association of Boards of Pharmacy, encouraged pharmacies to develop in-house quality assessment procedures.

This bill would require the Department of Corporations to follow specified procedures when assisting consumers who have complaints about their health care service plan. The bill would also require the Department to contract with third-party organizations to provide advocacy on behalf of consumers.

This bill is unnecessary. The 1997–98 budget bill increased annual assessments on health plans by \$6.2 million to allow the Department of Corporations to assist more consumers with complaints about their health plans and to commence enforcement actions. In addition, there are numerous existing third-party organizations that advocate on behalf of consumers. For example, the Center for Health Care Rights is operating the Pilot Health Care Consumers' Information and Assistance Program in the Sacramento area. I have signed legislation, SB 1191 (Chapter No. 47, Statutes of 1998) which provides confidentiality and nondiscrimination protections to the program.

Veto Message—Assembly Bill No. 2501

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 2501 without my signature.

This bill would require school principals to obtain oral permission from a parent or guardian before making an elementary school pupil available to a peace officer for interrogation. In cases involving secondary school students, the principal would be required to inform the pupil of the right to have a parent, guardian, or school staff member present during the interrogation.

This bill is based upon anecdotal reports of excesses engaged in by overzealous peace officers who conducted intrusive interrogations of pupils on school sites. There is no evidence that these alleged abuses are widespread or systematic. In fact, there is ample reason to believe that

fewer abuses occur in California than elsewhere. California has banned corporal punishment and strip searches of juveniles, practices which have led to complaints in other states.

Peace officers often have reason to come onto school sites. Hundreds of schools have peace officers regularly stationed on campus. Many more have peace officers who regularly come onto the campus in conjunction with educational and crime prevention programs, such as the D.A.R.E. program. Despite this significant presence of peace officers on campus only a few, isolated allegations of abuse have been identified. As a result of the high police presence on campuses, many school sites are safer than the neighborhoods in which the student live.

Peace officers are not on campus just to investigate criminal behavior. Increasingly they serve as mentors, counselors, and instructors. When cast in such roles should an officer's question constitute interrogation?

This bill assumes that an adversarial relationship should exist whenever officers question students. By advising students, particularly those in middle and senior high schools, that they do not have to talk to an officer, there is an inference that the officer is an adversary who cannot be trusted. Furthermore, this bill would place school officials in the awkward and inappropriate role of criminal defense counsel for the interrogated student. The terms of the bill are sufficiently confusing so that the nature of the interrogation and the roles of the parties are generally unclear but clearly conflicted.

There are a number of current constitutional and statutory protections that shield juveniles from excessive and unreasonable interrogations. In light of these protections, the lack of evidence of widespread abuse, and the potential chilling effect on the officer-student dialogue, the dangers posed by this bill outweigh its benefits.

Veto Message—Assembly Bill No. 2560

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 2560 without my signature.

California has since 1989 prohibited possession or sale of "assault weapons," specifically identifying 58 firearm models by brand (Penal Code 12275 et seq.).

This bill would define as "assault weapons," a class of semi-automatic firearms possessing certain physical features. In addition, the bill would prohibit the manufacture and sale of "large capacity" ammunition magazines and increase penalties for use of "high capacity firearms."

The way to prevent tragedies of the kind in which a deranged gunman has massacred numerous victims in just minutes or seconds, by delivering semi-automatic fire upon a group, is to put beyond the gunman's reach the capacity to wreak such carnage. That requires limiting magazine capacity, and hoping that illegal magazines of a greater, prohibited capacity are not available to a deranged person on the black market.

More than a year after its introduction, this bill still imposed no limitation on the purchase or sale of high capacity magazines.

In its final form, after insistence by this office, it does. But regrettably, AB 2560 mixes together issues of capacity and cosmetics with too little attention given to capacity and too much to cosmetics. If this bill's focus were high speed sports cars, it would first declare them "chariots of death" and then criminalize possession of Ramblers equipped with racing stripes and wire wheels.

Perversely, AB 2560 would purport to authorize manufacture of magazines larger than permitted under preemptive federal law, while defining assault weapons in terms of features which have little to do with the capacity or lethality of the weapons in question. As a result, after fifteen amendments, AB 2560 may be more susceptible to constitutional attack than the law it seeks to replace. By design or happenstance, it is a maze which would entrap the unwary, generate endless litigation, and provide the author manifold opportunities for corrective legislation. California deserves better.

In fact, the author's refusal to accept requested changes that would have earned a signature—coupled with his recent inflammatory charge that a veto of his plainly flawed bill will make me responsible for a legacy of murder victims—have virtually invited a veto, suggesting he would rather have an issue than a solution and a signature.

And the charge itself is not only self-serving and outrageous, but a cynical effort to con the public about what kind of legislation actually will protect—and has protected—they against gun violence. It is not the author's version of gun control.

Under the best of circumstances, AB 2560 would not provide one percent of the crime reducing impact of "10-20-Life." In 1994, I signed bills authorizing "Three Strikes," "One Strike Rape," and eighty-five percent mandatory time for violent felons. The following year, I signed laws imposing the death penalty for offenders who murder during a carjacking or driveby-shooting. Last year, I signed "10-20-Life" imposing tough penalties on offenders who commit felonies using firearms. Violent crime has decreased steadily since 1993. In 1993, there were 4,095 homicides in California. In 1997, there were 2,579.

This reduction of over 1,500 annual homicides was accompanied by a remarkable reduction in the number of handgun sales during the same period (434,000 in 1993, 204,000 in 1997). Neither reduction is attributable to confusing gun control laws. The correlation is direct and obvious; the imposition of penalties which resulted in a reduction in crime gave confidence to a fearful public and resulted in a decline in guns purchased for self-protection.

The reduction in crime is not over. California's murder and violent crime rate was lower in 1997 than at any time in more than thirty years; murder and other violent crime rates continue to plummet. In Fresno, where local television stations warn prospective offenders of the length of sentences imposed under "10-20-Life," murder and armed robbery have dropped an extraordinary fifty percent in the first half of 1998. During the same period, the statewide murder rate has decreased more than twenty two percent, the largest drop in history and part of an unprecedented five year decrease of over fifty percent. Again, these

most recent decreases follow a 1997 experience reflecting the lowest violent crime rates in over thirty years.

That's how to deal with gun violence.

Veto Message—Assembly Bill No. 278

To the Members of the California Assembly:

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 278 without my signature.

This bill would add the phrase "infants and children" to current law directing state agencies to set health-protective air quality standards; require an air monitoring pilot program at three locations around the state near a day care center or school and an evaluation of the air quality monitoring system in the aftermath of the pilot project; require adoption of control measures for toxic air contaminants by January 1, 2004; and require businesses located within 1,000 feet of a school or day care center to be inspected at least once a year, if that facility has more than one regulatory violation in five years' time.

Proponents argue that new scientific studies suggest that our standards must be re-evaluated, and that current practice depends on the use of safety factors (or uncertainty factors) that were developed as a technique by risk assessors more than 30 years ago. However, those same supporters fail to offer a single piece of evidence, scientific or otherwise, which suggests that California's standards are not protecting the health of all Californians, including infants and children. The studies referenced merely point out that children, like all Californians, are exposed to air pollution and that such exposure has health implications. In the absence of specific evidence that our standards are inadequate, supporters of this legislation have suggested that additional safety factors should be applied to our current standards to make sure infants and children are protected. In doing so, they advocate the very approach they criticize as anachronistic.

California has the most stringent air quality standards in the world. And State scientists are continually reviewing new scientific evidence to ensure that no emerging science calls into question the validity of those health-protective standards. The most recent, comprehensive review of air quality standards—perhaps the most comprehensive review ever of all available science—was completed by U.S. EPA when it reviewed its ozone and particulate matter standards last year. The new standards were based solely on health data, without consideration for economic or technical considerations. Yet California's air quality standards are still more stringent than those proposed federal standards

for smog and PM 10. This is further confirmation of California's conservative approach to health protective standards.

California laws, regulations and administrative practices appropriately focus on sensitive populations. Despite the rhetoric surrounding this bill, rarely do children and infants fit that definition. In fact, for five of the six federal ambient air pollutants, children are not the most sensitive population. This point was most succinctly stated by one of the bill's sponsors—the Natural Resources Defenses Council—when it correctly observed in its “Children At Risk” report issued less than a year ago that the elderly are at greatest risk from air pollution (page 33).

Certainly we do not know everything about the health effects of air pollution; some data gaps do exist. That's why during the first years of my administration, the Air Resources Board initiated a 10-year study of the chronic health effects of air pollution on children. This \$11.5 million study, conducted under the auspices of the USC School of Medicine, is tracking 5,000 children in a dozen Southern California communities and measuring the impacts of ambient air pollution on their health and development. The study is currently in its sixth year.

In addition, the Office of Environmental Health Hazard Assessment has nearly concluded a multi-year effort to develop guidelines for exposure assessment and stochastic analysis. These guidelines incorporate original research conducted under the auspices of the Air Resources Board and others, including water consumption rates, food consumption rates, breathing rates and soil ingestion rates—those physiological differences that AB 278's sponsors correctly point out make children unique when compared to adults. These guidelines will be completed and peer-reviewed by the State's Scientific Review Panel this fall.

These efforts will continue to inform the standard-setting process, and fulfill our commitment to improving the scientific underpinnings of our public health protection efforts.

Veto Message—Assembly Bill No. 434

To the Members of the California Assembly:

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 434 without my signature.

This bill would specify procedures for economic or capacity profiling and prohibits health care service plans and contracting providers from discriminating against individual providers that have a substantial number of patients with serious medical conditions. The bill would also require plans and provider groups to make available to any providers with whom it contracts the criteria used to credential individual providers, terminate contracts, or fail to renew contracts.

Health plans and medical groups should not discriminate against providers simply because they care for seriously ill patients. However, this bill includes unrelated provisions interfering with the contractual relationship between health plans, medical groups and contracting

providers. The parties may determine for themselves the criteria upon which a contract will terminate or not be renewed.

I have instead signed Senate Bill 984 which requires health plans to provide the public and the Department of Corporations with information about how economic profiling is used and how the health plan ensures that medical decisions are rendered by qualified medical providers, unhindered by fiscal and administrative management considerations.

I signed legislation in 1992 to create the NER to assist state and local agencies in locating parents who are delinquent in their child support obligations and to enforce collection of amounts due. Last year I signed AB 67 (Escutia), Chapter 606, Statutes of 1997, which expanded the NER by requiring all California employers to report new hires to the NER, effective July 1, 1998. In addition to this recent expansion of the NER, I also signed AB 573 (Kuehl), Chapter 599, Statutes of 1997, which required a study of expanding the NER further to include independent contractors.

The AB 573 study has just been released. It concluded that because the NER is so new there is insufficient data to determine whether further expansions of the NER would be cost effective in increasing child support, and that further study is required. In fact, it is unclear that the significant costs in collecting and reporting data regarding those who are independent contractors of state contractors and those who receive state loans and grants will result in increased child support collection. Also, much of the data required by this bill is already reported to state and local enforcement agencies from other sources.

An approach which offers greater expectation of results is AB 1396 (Alquist), which I have signed. It requires state contractors to comply with state and federal child and family support obligations.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 1642 without my signature.

This bill would suspend certain clean air specifications for all gasoline produced in California and provide a special exemption for blends of gasoline containing 10 percent ethanol, unless the Air

Resources Board (ARB) makes certain findings before March 31, 1999. The bill would further require that the Environmental Policy Council, comprised of the six boards and departments under the auspices of the California Environmental Protection Agency, to evaluate the environmental implications of all existing and future gasoline regulations.

Eliminating the limitation on oxygen content in gasoline will result in more smog-forming emissions from the more than 20 million cars and trucks in California. Similarly, the special consideration given to 10 percent ethanol blends will result in significant new emissions from vehicles using such fuel. In order to protect the public health benefits of the Cleaner Burning Gasoline, which is removing more than 1 billion pounds of pollution a year from our air, the ARB would be forced to spend millions of dollars to demonstrate, once again, the validity of its technically and scientifically supported fuel regulations in a time frame that is unachievable and by testing methods that are prohibitively expensive.

Furthermore, the provisions of the bill relating to the Environmental Policy Council's review of proposed and established fuel regulations create the possibility that all existing fuel regulations will be re-written. Those regulations were developed over many years, and resulted in a multi-billion dollar investment by the refining industry to produce the world's cleanest gasoline. An evaluation of the multi-media environmental consequences of regulations should be considered—and they are being considered by the California Environmental Protection Agency. But the prospect of reinventing these regulations, which have proven to be successful in reducing public exposure to toxic emissions from gasoline by 30–40 percent, and eliminating the smog from the equivalent of 3.5 million vehicles on our highways, is not warranted.

The answer to California's oxygenate issues is enactment of HR 630 (Bilbray) and S 1576 (Feinstein), which will allow California to proceed with its own oxygenate-free regulations, unfettered by federal interference. California's gasoline regulations allow for the clean air benefits of our reformulated fuel to be realized without the use of any oxygenate at all. However, the federal Clean Air Act amendments of 1990 explicitly mandate the use of oxygenate in gasoline. My administration has supported for several years the enactment of an amendment, first introduced by Representative Bilbray, to provide an exemption for California from this unnecessary federal mandate.

Ultimately, AB 1642 is unnecessary. Its expensive test procedures will confirm the need for the regulatory specifications already in place. For those who support the bill on the basis that California regulations have prohibited the use of ethanol as an oxygenate, I would only point to the use of ethanol by one of California's largest refiners, while still meeting California's gasoline regulations. This legislation, while purporting to provide access to the market, seeks to enhance the advantage of this product. There are no regulatory barriers to its use, and State law should not be used as a means to achieve market advantage, especially when the consequences will foul our air.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 2048 without my signature.

This bill would require health care service plans to disclose to the public the criteria used to authorize or deny health care services for the specific procedures or conditions requested.

The stated purpose of this bill is to provide the public, media and consumer organizations with a comparison tool to review health plans. This bill, however, would not accomplish this purpose. Clinical guidelines are not standardized procedures applicable to all patients in the same way. They instead require the physician to take the patient's individual circumstances into account and to exercise sound medical judgment. This inherent flexibility renders side by side comparisons meaningless and may actually mislead patients into expecting inappropriate treatment.

The bill is also unnecessary. Existing law already requires the health plan to disclose its clinical guidelines if used as a basis to deny services

to a specified patient. In addition, I have signed AB 607 (Scott, Chapter No. 23, Statutes 1998), which allows consumers to use a standardized benefits matrix to compare health plans.

This bill would require various agencies to adopt regulations, provide training and develop emergency response plans specific to the transportation of high-level radioactive waste and spent nuclear fuel. This bill would impose a fee on shippers to pay for these activities.

This bill is unnecessary, would blur lines of authority, and would increase costs to California businesses and the General Fund. It seeks to establish a regulatory system that unnecessarily overlaps and duplicates existing requirements. Current state and federal law already provide safeguards to ensure that high-level radioactive waste and spent nuclear fuels are transported safely. The duplication created by this bill could lead to uncertainty as to responsibility on the part of local response agencies and state regulatory agencies, especially the Office of Emergency Services, State Fire Marshal and California Highway Patrol. This bill would have the unintended consequence of negatively impacting their ability to properly coordinate emergency planning and preparedness.

Veto Message—Assembly Bill No. 1100

To the Members of the California Assembly:

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 1100 without my signature.

This bill would require health care service plans and disability insurers to provide coverage for biologically based severe mental illness under the same terms and conditions as applied to other medical conditions.

This bill is one of numerous health insurance mandates passed by the Legislature in recent years. While such mandates may be desirable when reviewed individually, their collective costs are substantial and contribute to the rising costs of health insurance coverage. These increasing costs are directly linked to the ever higher number of uninsured workers. Just last week the Census Bureau reported that the number of Americans without health insurance rose sharply last year to 43.4 million and the proportion of Americans lacking coverage reached the highest level in a decade, 16.1%.

According to the UCLA Center for Health Policy Research (UCLA), 8 out of 10 uninsured Californians are in working families. 59% of these uninsured California employees cite the high cost of health insurance as a very important reason they lack coverage. The cheapest product an employer can offer its workers is a health maintenance organization (HMO). The average employee share of the premium for family coverage in an HMO is \$142 per month. For a full-time, minimum wage worker, this represents 16% of their gross annual income. Thus, it is not surprising that many working families choose to remain uninsured even though they receive coverage through their employer. Californians for Affordable Health Reform state that for every one percent increase in insurance premium costs, up to 40,000 Californians will lose health care coverage.

The authors' letter states that this bill's mandate will not increase premiums, and cite the California Public Employees Retirement System (PERS) as estimating a "possible fiscal impact of '\$0'." The authors misrepresent the PERS fiscal analysis. PERS estimates premium increases of .003% to as much as 3.4%. This translates into annual program costs ranging from \$0 at the low end to \$56 million at the high end. More importantly, the PERS estimate is lower than what is expected for other health care purchasers because PERS already voluntarily provides relatively generous mental health benefits.

The authors have also stated that mental health parity will only cost \$1 per person per year. However, the authors again misrepresent the facts. A RAND study published in The Journal of the American Medical Association found that "removing the typical average annual limit of \$25,000 would increase mental health care costs by about \$1 per enrollee per year under managed care." JAMA, November 12, 1997, Vol. 278, No. 18, page 1536. This bill would mandate coverage far beyond simply eliminating an annual cap and would as a consequence result in increased premium costs.

Several California health plans estimate the increased premium costs of AB 1100 to be in the range of 1–5%. Applying the rule of thumb supplied by Californians for Affordable Health Reform, that means that from 40,000 to 200,000 employees now covered will be priced out of

the market by this premium increase. The estimates vary depending on the health plan and the particular market in which they offer coverage. Premium increases will also be disproportionately higher for individuals and small employers. One California insurer estimates that this group will experience premium increases of three to four times more than larger employers as a result of this bill. The high cost of mandates like this bill is the reason why many small employers do not provide health insurance coverage for their employees. UCLA states that 95% of employers in California are small firms (3 to 50 employees) and 34% of all employees in California work in small firms. Only 49% of employees in small firms get coverage through their own employer, compared to 70% of employees in large firms (500 or more employees).

The authors' letter attaches great significance to the fact that "mental illness insurance parity laws are in place in nineteen other states." The authors' implication that this bill is similar to the laws enacted in these states is false. Information provided by the National Association for the Mentally Ill indicates that most of these states do not require the level of coverage mandated by this bill. In fact, some of these states do not mandate coverage at all, but simply require that insurers offer the coverage to those who wish to purchase it. Many of them only require parity if the employer chooses to cover the benefit, and others only require that parity apply to lifetime and annual caps. In addition, several states exempt small employers and allow employers to opt out if premiums increase.

The authors' have specifically pointed to the experience of New Hampshire and Texas as evidence that this bill will not increase health insurance premiums. New Hampshire has had legislation similar to this bill in place since 1995 with minimal increases in premiums reported. However, New Hampshire has had a mental health mandate in place since 1975. The 1995 legislation only imposed an incremental increase in required benefits, resulting in a commensurate increase in premiums. It is disingenuous for the authors to compare the comprehensive mandate in AB 1100 to the incremental change enacted in New Hampshire. Texas also enacted legislation similar to this bill in 1997. However, unlike this bill, Texas exempted small employers with 50 or less employees. Even so, several Texas health plans are already projecting premium increases of 4-8% as a result of the mandate.

California working families should have access to affordable mental health insurance coverage. Accordingly, the authors have been presented by this office with several options that would have provided considerably expanded mental health coverage. However, the authors have instead engaged in a shortsighted "all or nothing" strategy that would impose on California employers coverage beyond what other states require and, in the case of many small employers, unaffordable cost increases. The unintended net effect could well be a loss of access to any coverage. Most states that have passed mental health legislation have only done so in the last two years. Change of this magnitude should be made incrementally as we learn more about the impact of this type of legislation on the number of uninsured.

Veto Message—Assembly Bill No. 1715

To the Members of the California Assembly:

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 1715 without my signature.

This bill would require the Insurance Commissioner to establish an insurance policy registry for policies covering persons in Europe between 1920 and 1945. Any insurer or related company doing business in California would be required to provide specified information to the Commissioner within 180 days. The insurer would also be required to provide a comparison of the names of holders and beneficiaries of the policies and the names of the victims of the Holocaust. The names of victims of the Holocaust would be provided by the Department of Insurance and may be obtained from the Yad Vashem repository in Israel. Insurers would be required to certify the disposition of the policy proceeds. The Commissioner would be required to suspend the ability of an insurer to do business in this state if it fails to comply with all of the requirements of this bill within 210 days. Finally, the bill states legislative findings that the international Jewish community is in active negotiations with responsible insurance companies toward agreements to create an international commission to resolve outstanding insurance claims, and that the bill is necessary because these negotiations are unresolved.

In addition to this bill, I have before me Senate Bill 1530 (Hayden), which would establish a comprehensive program to resolve the insurance claims of Holocaust victims, survivors and their heirs. I have signed SB 1530 because it is the better solution to bring prompt payment to those who have been denied justice for far too long. However, this bill, AB 1715, is inconsistent with SB 1530.

This bill would require insurers to collect information unrelated to resolving the claims of Holocaust victims, survivors and heirs. Insurers would be required to provide data on all insurance policies sold in Europe from 1920–1945, not just those sold to Holocaust victims. This information must be matched with lists of the names of victims of the Holocaust. However, only partial lists exist.

The procedure established in SB 1530 is far superior. In addition to maintaining a registry with policy information related to the Holocaust, the Department of Insurance would be required to use onsite teams to search the archives of insurers and conduct investigations into unpaid claims related to the Holocaust. Whereas AB 1715 requires reliance upon whatever records remain in the hands of the insurers, SB 1530 creates an on-site team of investigators to examine not only the insurers' records but any other evidence that Holocaust victims were issued policies that remain unpaid. These investigators will be, in effect, "insurance archeologists." By contrast, the comparison of lists envisioned in AB 1715 would seem intended to set up a class action that may be fraught with problems. It might well prove a more uncertain and more time-consuming process than the more labor-intensive on-site investigation proposed by SB 1530. The Department would also be required to cooperate with other states and the international commission on Holocaust claims. In addition, the Department would be required to suspend the ability of an insurer to do business in California if it failed

to pay any valid claim to Holocaust survivors, victims or heirs.

Importantly, SB 1530 appropriates \$4 million to the Department to conduct its investigation, while this bill remains unfunded. Thus, the Department is actually able to devote time and resources to resolving claims rather than merely collecting data.

Also, the stated justification for this bill is that negotiations to establish an international commission to resolve claims has not been completed. This is no longer accurate. A Memorandum of Understanding was entered into on August 25, 1998 between five major European insurance companies, the National Association of Insurance Commissioners, the Government of Israel, the World Jewish Restitution Organization and the Conference of World Jewish Claims Against Germany to establish an international commission to resolve insurance claims of Holocaust victims, survivors and heirs.

Finally, I would prefer to see the time and resources of the insurers spent in payment of valid claims by Holocaust victim policy holders, survivors, or heirs, than expended in compiling a massive database that seems likely to produce far less relevant and useful information than the more painstaking approach of SB 1530. The two bills conflict in approach. SB 1530 holds greater promise of timely justice for Holocaust victims.

Veto Message—Assembly Bill No. 2231

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 2231 without my signature.

This bill would require that a final fish consumption advisory issued by the Office of Environmental Health Hazard Assessment (OEHHA) regarding fish and shellfish contamination identify the contamination hazard, and be posted at public fishing locations in languages used by people that frequent those locations. The bill would also require the Department of Health Services (DHS) to make health advisory pamphlets available to state and local agencies.

This bill is ambiguous and unnecessary. OEHHA is currently authorized to produce fish advisories (Fish and Game Code §7715). It is unclear what purpose would be served by restating that authority in the Health and Safety Code. It is also unclear whether this bill would require DHS to assume responsibility for posting these advisories, or if that responsibility would remain the responsibility of the local health departments. This lack of clarity could lead to confusion among affected agencies which could result in advisories not getting posted. Failure to post, as specified in the bill, could create an unintended liability for each of the jurisdictions.

Existing law ensures that public health is protected. The state should continue to issue its advisories in a clear, consistent manner, using its existing statutory authority, and local jurisdictions should retain the flexibility to determine the best method for warning fishermen of the dangers of eating contaminated fish.

Veto Message—Assembly Bill No. 1617

To the Members of the California Assembly:

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 1617 without my signature.

This bill enacts the "Religious Freedom Protection Act," which would prohibit any state or local government from enacting or applying a facially neutral law, ordinance, or regulation which substantially burdens a person's exercise of religion unless the government can demonstrate that the law, ordinance, or regulation (1) furthers a compelling governmental interest and (2) uses the least restrictive means of furthering that compelling governmental interest. This test would apply to all state or local laws, "whether adopted before or after the effective date of this chapter," and could be asserted as a claim or defense in any judicial proceeding. It bears emphasis that the bill's focus is on laws that regulate conduct claimed to be motivated by religious beliefs, not religious beliefs—which are fully protected by the First Amendment.

This country has been a beacon for religious freedom. Many of the earliest settlers came to America to escape religious persecution. Few principles epitomize America's unique national character as does the First Amendment's right to freedom of religion. But this bill goes beyond the guarantees under the First Amendment or the California Constitution. Poorly drafted, it sets standards for assessing the validity of laws which would have untold consequences not contemplated by its supporters: It would engender litigation by prisoners and criminal defendants alike, who claim that the laws which protect and preserve order burden their religious beliefs. It would open up the prospect of invalidating laws ranging from the payment of taxes to compulsory vaccination laws, to drug laws, to land use laws, to laws against racial discrimination. Indeed, so broad is this bill that the federal version of this Act—before the U.S. Supreme Court struck it down as unconstitutional—was used in the Proposition 187 litigation to argue that Proposition 187 was invalid because it burdened religious tenets.

Ironically, this law is not only unnecessary in light of the existing California constitutional guarantee of the free exercise of religion (Cal. Const., Art. I, §4), but more importantly, it threatens law enforcement, is unworkable, and is of doubtful constitutionality.

1. Background

The bill is largely a response to two U.S. Supreme Court decisions. In 1990, in *Employment Division v. Smith*, 494 U.S. 872 (1990), the U.S. Supreme Court, in a decision delivered by Justice Scalia, upheld an Oregon criminal law which prohibited the possession of controlled substances, including peyote, against a challenge under the Free

Exercise Clause of the First Amendment, and therefore ruled that Oregon could deny unemployment benefits to persons dismissed from their jobs because of their religiously inspired use of an illegal drug, peyote. The Court declined to require that a facially neutral criminal law that burdened a religious practice—ingesting peyote for sacramental purposes—had to be justified by a compelling governmental interest. Instead, it ruled that “[t]o make an individual’s obligation to obey such a law contingent upon the law’s coincidence with his religious beliefs, except where the State’s interest is ‘compelling’ . . . contradicts both constitutional tradition and common sense.” 494 U.S. at 885.

The Court observed that “[a]ny society adopting such a system would be courting anarchy, but that danger increases in direct proportion to the society’s diversity of religious beliefs.” It concluded that “we cannot afford the luxury of deeming presumptively invalid, as applied to the religious objector, any regulation of conduct that does not protect an interest of the highest order.” 494 U.S. at 888.

The Congress enacted the Religious Freedom Restoration Act of 1993 in response to the Supreme Court’s decision in *Employment Division v. Smith*. That Act—like the bill here—seeks to prohibit government from substantially burdening a person’s exercise of religion unless the application of the burden furthers a compelling governmental interest by the least restrictive means.

In June, 1997, the U.S. Supreme Court struck down the Religious Freedom Restoration Act in *City of Boerne v. Flores* on the grounds that Congress did not have authority under Section 5 of the Fourteenth Amendment to enact such a law. The California Legislature has now passed this bill to enact the federal Religious Freedom Restoration Act at the state level and to establish the compelling interest test rejected in *Employment Division v. Smith*.

II. The Act is Unnecessary

This bill, to the extent it seeks to restore the compelling interest test rejected in *Employment Division v. Smith*, is unnecessary.

The protections guaranteed under the California Constitution’s free exercise clause in Article I, section 4 are independent of those safeguarded under the First Amendment. *See* Cal. Const., Article I, section 24.

And the California Supreme Court confirmed two years ago that the California courts have construed the California Constitution’s free exercise clause “to afford the same protection for religious exercise as the Federal Constitution before *Employment Division v. Smith*, *supra*, 494 U.S. 872.” [Emphasis added.] (*See Smith v. Fair Employment and Housing Commission*, 12 Cal. 4th 1143, 1177 (1996).) Accordingly, the primary concern of proponents of this bill—the abandonment of a compelling interest test—is unwarranted.

Unfortunately, this bill would go further than the compelling interest test utilized by the courts before *Employment Division v. Smith* and would create a means to challenge facially neutral laws by prisoners, criminal defendants, and others.

III. The Bill Creates An Unworkable Standard That Would Engender Litigation by Prisoners, Criminal Defendants and Others

Under the bill, any facially neutral law, regulation, ordinance, or other governmental action could not be applied to substantially burden

a person's exercise of religion unless the government demonstrates that the burden (1) furthers a compelling governmental interest and (2) is the least restrictive means of furthering that interest. However, the test is uncertain and will result in the invalidation of laws preserving public safety and welfare:

- First, judicial decisions do not offer a generally applicable definition of "substantial burden," *See, e.g., Smith v. Fair Employment and Housing Commission* 12 Cal. 4th 1150, 1169 (1996). Application of this test will be uncertain.
- Second, the U.S. Supreme Court has warned that the bill's requirement that laws be the "least restrictive means" of furthering a compelling interest adds "a requirement that was not used in the pre-*[Employment Division v.] Smith* jurisprudence" that this bill purports to codify. *See City of Boerne v. Flores*, 117 S.Ct. 2157, 138 L.Ed.2d 624, 648 (1997). Thus, this bill goes beyond the constitutional protections for religion that its supporters believed they are restoring.

Unfortunately, the "least restrictive means" requirement would open the door for constitutional challenges by prisoners to laws and regulations, which challenges are currently denied under the Supreme Court's decision in *Turner v. Safley*, 482 U.S. 78, 90 (1987). That decision specifically ruled that a prison regulation that impinges on inmates' constitutional rights "is valid if it is reasonably related to legitimate penological interests." *Id.* at 89. The Court emphasized that this is "not a 'least restrictive alternative' test: prison officials do not have to set up and then shoot down every conceivable alternative method of accommodating the claimant's constitutional complaint." *Id.* at 90-91.

By invalidating any facially neutral law or regulation which substantially burdens a person's exercise of religion unless the government demonstrates that the law or regulation is the least restrictive means of furthering a compelling governmental interest, correction officials can and will be sued over a variety of facially neutral laws and regulations by prisoners who claim that alcohol, a specific diet, sacred knives, conjugal visits, and satanic bibles are all part of their free exercise of religion.

Likewise, under the bill, criminal defendants could raise religious objections to drug laws, seek to justify domestic violence based on a purported religious belief that wives should be submissive to their husbands, and could seek to resurrect the diminished capacity defense for defendants who are under the influence of drugs when they commit crimes. In each case, the State would have to show that these criminal laws are the "least restrictive means" of furthering its compelling interests in these laws. While no one can predict the outcome of these challenges, we can predict that law enforcement will be thwarted, delayed, and consumed in litigation.

For these reasons, the bill has been strongly opposed by sheriffs, police chiefs, peace officers, corrections officials, and prosecutors.

IV. The Bill Transfers Legislative Responsibilities to the Judiciary And Is Constitutionally Suspect

Although it is not a constitutional amendment, this bill would establish a statutory test of invalidity, which the courts could use to restrict or invalidate laws enacted by the Legislature, “whether adopted before or after the effective date of this chapter.” In essence, instead of each Legislature addressing the issue of religious accommodation on a bill-by-bill basis, the bill would transfer from the Legislature to the judiciary the determination of whether a law—which meets the test for protecting religious freedom under the U.S. and California Constitutions—should be restricted further, or invalidated, because it fails to meet the “compelling interest/least restrictive means” test established by this proposed statute.

In short, one statute will restrict, depending upon the judgment of a court—the scope of a subsequent statute passed by a majority of the people’s representatives and signed by the Governor. This places in the court the power to amend statutes, and therefore raises serious separation of powers concerns under Article III, section 3 of the California Constitution since the judiciary may not amend statutes.

V. Conclusion

Few rights are as important in America, or epitomize America’s values, as the right to freedom of religion. Both the U.S. and California Constitutions guarantee that right. But this bill, as it is drafted, goes beyond those guarantees and sets a test many laws would fail, engendering litigation by prisoners and criminal defendants who would claim that the laws which protect us and preserve order burden their religious beliefs. It would weaken prison regulations and law enforcement with costly lawsuits seeking to subordinate our criminal laws to criminal defendants’ supposed religious beliefs. Those literally doing the Lord’s work through prison ministries have urged that I sign the bill and seek subsequent enactment of a state analogue to the federal Prison Litigation Reform Act. They have generously offered to help move such a bill through the Legislature. I value their offer of assistance (and totally agree with the need for prison litigation reform), just as I value and endorse the work prison ministries do in our prisons where it is so critically needed. Prison officials should be strongly encouraged to welcome their efforts. But the concerns occasioned by AB 1617 argue that the restraints of such a prisoner litigation reform act should first be in place to protect against the abuses by California’s activist prisoner rights bar that this bill might otherwise invite.

And prisoner litigation reform, were it in place, does not address the problem of criminal defendants not yet in prison who assert a religious basis for criminal conduct as a defense in order to stay out.

Moreover, the bill raises a serious constitutional objection that it invites the Legislature to violate the Separation of Powers Doctrine by abandoning its responsibility to consider accommodations for religious freedom on a bill-by-bill basis. Instead, through this bill, the Legislature would put in the hands of private litigants and the courts the decision whether to restrict or invalidate perfectly valid laws—laws which comply with the constitutional right to freedom of religion—on the grounds that they nonetheless impinge on conduct which is claimed to be substantially motivated by religious beliefs. Rather than establishing a test which risks the unintended and wholesale invalidation of perfectly

valid laws that protect our safety and welfare, the Legislature should decide on a bill-by-bill basis whether and how to accommodate conduct motivated by religious concerns. As much as I treasure the religious freedom that is our nation's heritage, I cannot in good conscience sign this bill.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 96 without my signature.

This bill would make the North Coast Railroad Authority (NCRA) eligible for various transportation funds, including the State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) fund, and make the NCRA eligible for funding from both interregional and regional funds. The NCRA would also be eligible for Public Transportation Account funding for planning purposes.

California's State Highway Account, derived from state gasoline taxes, is appropriately reserved for street and highway funding, as well as passenger rail service. This bill inappropriately provides the NCRA, a freight rail line, access to funding from the State Highway Account.

The NCRA must have stronger financial support for capital improvements and maintenance from local government and the business community to be sustained as a viable operation. I recognize that the railroad plays an important role in the economy of the northwest region, but this endeavor should not be the sole responsibility, or even the central responsibility, of state government.

This bill would require employers who provide sick leave benefits to their employees to permit those employees to use up to fifty percent of their sick leave to care of their ill child. This bill substantially limits an employer's right to design benefit programs that meet both the needs of the employees, as well as the economic requirements of the business. Since neither state nor federal law requires employers to provide sick leave benefits to their employees, this bill would discourage employers, not currently offering sick leave benefits, from doing so in the future. Moreover, this measure may act as a disincentive for those employers who currently provide sick leave benefits, to continue them in the future.

The cumulative impact of these various provisions will only increase health care costs while doing little to improve the quality of health care. We should focus our efforts on reforming the managed health care system instead of dismantling it and placing health insurance coverage beyond the means of working class families.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 462 without my signature:

This bill would, among other provisions, remove the Uninsured Employers' Fund (UEF) exemption from liability for the payment of

penalties and interest charges due to late payment of workers' compensation claims.

Under current law, the UEF is administered by the Director of Industrial Relations (DIR) and provides workers' compensation benefits to workers of uninsured employers who do not have the resources to pay the benefits. The DIR attempts to recover the costs of the benefits from those uninsured employers. However, the benefits paid from the UEF primarily come from the state General Fund.

While I am supportive of efforts to improve the timely payment of workers' compensation benefits to injured employees, this bill would unfairly subject the UEF to penalties and interest charges. As the remedy of last resort, the UEF handles the most troublesome workers' compensation cases, which makes it difficult for the UEF to pay claims within the same time frames allowed other parties. This bill would penalize the UEF and increase the costs to the state General Fund for the failure of employers to properly maintain workers' compensation liability insurance. That is inappropriate.

Veto Message—Assembly Bill No. 468

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 468 without my signature.

This bill would make numerous changes to the current California Beverage Container and Litter Reduction Act. The bill would increase fees paid by consumers, decrease fees paid by manufacturers, and increase appropriations to the Department of Conservation for payments to participants for handling fees, curbside programs, and conservation corps grants. In addition, this bill would provide funds for a curbside recycling pilot program in the City of San Diego.

The signature message of SB 1178 three years ago requested the State Legislature to enact significant and substantive market-based reforms to the Beverage Container Recycling Program when it next considered changes to that program. This bill not only lacks such reforms, it actually increases many of the most egregious subsidies and inequities of the current program.

Instead, the Legislature sent me AB 468, which raises the costs on consumers by at least \$12.5 million annually by imposing a new five cent deposit on 20 oz. containers. The increased costs and existing surpluses are then used to increase subsidies to various participants in the program. That means a six pack of soda will now cost 15 cents more, and the program will be no better. It is difficult to understand why the Legislature increased subsidies for a program that is already operating with a significant surplus, only to distribute the new subsidies and the surplus in a similar manner designed to bankrupt the program within three to four years—and for a program that recovers only 22% of all the glass and plastic that is recycled in California. Scrap dealers—who recover 66% and receive no subsidy—rightly complain that the law unfairly discriminates in favor of their competitors.

This Administration has consistently sought reform to this program in four major areas: reducing inequitable subsidies and fees; increasing

consumer convenience and enabling the consumer to drive recycling rates higher, removing the impetus to significantly alter the program on a triennial basis; and eliminating the burgeoning Beverage Container Recycling and Litter Reduction Fund surpluses permanently. This bill would accomplish none of these important goals. To the contrary, it continues and increases inequitable subsidies without even requiring additional actions to justify them.

The bill also sets a terrible precedent of pork-barreling the fees to be paid for curbside recycling. The author has allocated 60% of all such funding for the entire state to activities within his district.

This veto should come as no surprise to anyone. While I deeply regret the financial discomfort this action may place upon certain California manufacturers, implementation of this bill would cost consumers an additional \$12 million annually. The Legislature should act quickly to approve legislation which actually removes inequitable subsidies, eases the onerous processing fees paid by manufacturers, and enacts significant market-based reforms to encourage higher recycling rates.

Veto Message—Assembly Bill No. 750

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 750 without my signature.

This bill would permit a public agency to enter into a competitively bid public works contract when a bid protest is made, pending the final decision on the protest. The bill would also provide that, if the contract is later determined to be invalid due to a defect or defects in the competitive bidding process, the contractor can be paid reasonable costs, as specified, for services performed if four conditions are met:

- The contractor proceeded with construction, alteration or repair based upon a good faith belief that the contract was valid;
- The public entity has determined that the work was performed satisfactorily;
- Contractor fraud did not occur in obtaining the contract or in the performance of the contractor;
and
- The contract does not otherwise violate statutory or constitutional limitations.

While I am supportive of providing fair payment to contractors who proceed in good faith to work on a contract, the remedy offered by AB 750 may be worse than the affliction it seeks to address. The sponsors of this measure have cited only two court decisions in the last 60 years, which left open the question of how or if contractors would be compensated when their contracts were voided. Yet there are many cases where the court has vacated contracts, and within the decision allow for reasonable compensation. Further, in the two cases where the right to compensation was undermined, the public agencies acted equitably and declined to file suit to recover monies that were previously paid to contractors. Under the provisions of this bill, those

same agencies would be required to seek disgorgement of any profit the contractor received even if construction were completed.

Accordingly, the bill would appear to respond to a problem that has not yet materialized while ensuring that informal remedies which have worked in the past are replaced by a rigid and arguably unconstitutional statutory standard. AB 750 is, at best, premature.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 818 without my signature.

This bill would require health plans to ensure that enrollees that are infected with HIV are afforded care consistent with current federal guidelines relating to the treatment of HIV. This bill also requires health plans to inform enrollees as to what steps, if any, the plan has taken to provide referral to physician practices that have substantial experience in the treatment of HIV. The bill would require the Department of Health Services to establish risk-adjusted capitated rates for managed care plans based on HIV-related treatment costs.

This bill is unnecessary. Existing law already requires that health plans provide health care services consistent with good professional practice standards. Additionally, the Department often does risk-adjusted rates taking into account many factors including age, sex, high cost of AIDS drug and treatment costs. Establishment of an illness-based rate is contrary to the principles of managed care and could result in violation of federal law related to rate setting methodology.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 1052 without my signature.

This bill would require that drugs approved by the federal Food and Drug Administration for the treatment of acquired immune deficiency syndrome (AIDS) or human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) be added to the drug formularies of Medi-Cal managed care plans.

The Department of Health Services already makes available through either Medi-Cal managed care plans or the Medi-Cal fee-for-service program all drugs approved by the federal Food and Drug Administration for the treatment of persons infected with AIDS or HIV. This practice allows the department to respond immediately to the release of any new drugs approved for this disease. Although the intent of this bill was to codify existing practice, this bill creates new processes

and policies not now employed by the Department. These processes could delay access to new approved drugs.

This bill, while well intended, would have the opposite effect of its intended goal.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 1059 without my signature.

This bill would require health care service plans and disability insurers that provide health insurance benefits to employers to offer coverage for domestic partners of employees.

Domestic partner health benefit coverage is an issue that is more appropriately left to negotiations between employers and employees. This coverage is available for both large and small employers who wish to provide the benefit, as evidenced by the many employers who choose to do so.

This bill would also increase the cost of health insurance. No definition for "domestic partner" is provided. Accordingly, almost any person living with a covered employee would be eligible for benefits. Coverage would not only be extended to the relationships contemplated by the author, but also to roommates and heterosexual couples who live together but do not marry. This will increase the cost of insurance because premium rates for dependent coverage are based on stable family relationships. The lack of a definition for "domestic partner" lends itself to instability, fraud and adverse selection.

Most importantly, this bill is clearly only the beginning of the domestic partnership debate. Enactment of this bill would likely result in more extravagant domestic partner legislation that uses these insurance coverage provisions as a precedent for "domestic partner" rights which are currently allowed for only traditional family members.

Veto Message—Assembly Bill No. 1070

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 1070 without my signature.

AB 1070 would prohibit a public agency from requiring contractual indemnity provisions in a public works contract which requires design professionals, including engineers and architects, to defend, indemnify, or hold harmless the public agency from any liability, damages, and litigation costs, including attorney's fees, except for damages and liabilities caused by the negligence, recklessness, or willful misconduct of the design professional.

Current law, Civil Code section 2782, does not permit public agencies to require contractors or design professionals to indemnify the public agency in a construction contract against liability for damages arising from the sole negligence or willful misconduct attributable to the

public entity. This bill would further limit public agencies by prohibiting the public agency from requiring design professionals in a construction contract to agree to indemnify the public agency against liability for the design professional's own errors and omissions which do not rise to the level of negligence, recklessness, or willful misconduct.

No design is likely to be perfect. The law acknowledges that some errors or omissions will occur in the work of even the most competent professional. Such imperfection does not necessarily constitute negligence, but sometimes results in additional public costs. When addressing liability for what may be described as innocent mistakes, it does not appear to be an affront to common decency for the parties to contractually agree to shift the burden of responsibility for correcting these errors to the design professional who created them. At the very least, the State should exercise caution before declaring that such agreements are contrary to public policy in all circumstances. Design professionals and public agencies should have the contractual flexibility to negotiate agreements allocating risk between themselves without undue statutory impediments.

Indeed, last year, in response to concerns that design professionals did not have ample opportunity to consider the terms of public works indemnification agreements, I signed AB 994 (Sweeney, ch. 722, 1997), which provides that in contracts for architectural design services over \$10,000, any indemnification clause must be disclosed in the request for bids and set forth in bold type. This bill, addressing the same concern, was introduced before AB 994 became operative, on July 1 of this year and is, at best, premature.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 1712 without my signature.

This bill would validate the property tax allocation to the Educational Revenue Augmentation Fund (ERAF) from four fire districts in Santa Clara County in fiscal years 1993–94 through 1996–97, inclusive, and the misallocation from one library district in San Joaquin County in 1992–93.

The allocation errors in Santa Clara County were discovered by an internal audit and have been corrected prospectively. Without legislative relief, the affected fire districts must repay the ERAF approximately \$11 million. While I am not unsympathetic to the impact this miscalculation will have on the affected fire districts, I am generally opposed to the forgiveness of audit exceptions in property tax allocation audits. However, I have directed the Department of Finance to negotiate a repayment schedule that will not impair the ability of the affected fire districts to continue to deliver their vital public safety services without undue hardship.

I am less sympathetic to the provision affecting San Joaquin County. It is my understanding that the misallocation of property taxes from this library district was fixed in 1993–94 on a prospective basis. However,

the county chose not to correct the 1992–93 amount of \$291,000. Forgiveness is not a proper response for intentional wrongdoing.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 1748 without my signature.

This bill would establish the California Osteoporosis Prevention and Treatment Education Program within the Department of Health Services for purposes of informing and educating the public about osteoporosis. The bill would appropriate \$250,000 for the Program.

Osteoporosis is a serious, under-recognized public health problem. Only 23 percent of those afflicted are aware of their condition. However, the \$250,000 appropriation is clearly inadequate for the comprehensive nature of this Program. In addition, the Department already has the authority to establish an osteoporosis prevention and treatment education program. Accordingly, I am directing the department to explore developing an osteoporosis treatment and education program. Adequate funding should be obtained through the annual budget process.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 1870 without my signature.

This bill would require employers to allow employees to use up to two weeks of Family Rights Act leave to care for a child who is unable to attend school or day care for health reasons.

The California Family Rights Act (CFRA), legislation that I signed into law, provides qualifying employees with up to 12 weeks of leave per year for their own "serious health condition," to care for a parent, spouse or child who has a "serious health condition," or to give birth to or bond with a newborn or adopted child.

This bill would amend the CFRA to allow qualifying employees to use two of the 12 weeks to stay home with a child who suffers from a routine childhood illness.

While I support family values and empathize with the challenges faced by working parents, this bill would expand the CFRA well beyond its original scope. CFRA was intended to provide job protections to parents of **seriously or terminally ill** children to alleviate the burden of having to choose between salvaging their job and caring for a child under horrific circumstances. This bill would place an onerous burden on business by requiring qualifying employers, in essence, to provide an alternate form of day care when an employee's child does not meet the school's health standards for attendance. While I encourage employers to voluntarily provide time off to parents whose children catch routine

colds and flus, it would be unfair to impose such a requirement on businesses that face their own set of challenges.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 1873 without my signature.

This bill would require the Department of Health Services to establish a Type 1 Diabetes working group charged with developing an integrated treatment program for children with diabetes.

Given the work already underway in the Department, and the current authority vested in the Director to undertake appropriate actions related to diabetes management, this bill is unnecessary.

The Department of Health Services currently administers a Diabetes Control Program which provides diabetes surveillance, education and explores appropriate avenues for improving diabetes statewide. This program also has the ability to bring in experts as necessary to obtain expertise in diabetes diagnosis, treatment or education. The Department of Health Services is also conducting a project to demonstrate the effectiveness of intensive case management of the Medi-Cal population. Initial findings indicate high success with the proper management of patients with diabetes.

Over 15,000 children in California are diagnosed with Type I diabetes. The average lifetime cost for a child diagnosed at age three is \$600,000. The cost to their quality of life, however, cannot be measured. Therefore, I am directing the department to convene appropriate experts to explore public and private strategies that can be implemented to reduce the burden of diabetes in California.

This bill would prevent the Medi-Cal Program from ensuring that only medically necessary emergency services are provided and will result in substantial General Fund cost increases. In 1997, more than \$41 million in medically unnecessary services were identified. An appeal process is currently available to ensure that providers are properly reimbursed.

This bill would establish a Department of Water Resources Emergency Subaccount in the Disaster Response-Emergency Operations Account (DREOA), and would transfer \$5 million from the Reserve for Economic Uncertainties (General Fund) to the Subaccount. This bill would extend the DREOA sunset date from July 1, 2000 to July 1, 2010, and would authorize the Department of Water Resources (DWR) to encourage, review and use flood-fighting plans developed by local agencies.

Under the Natural Disaster Assistance Act (Government Code 8645 et seq.), the Director of Finance is authorized to allocate funds from the DREOA to state agencies for disaster operation costs incurred as a result of a Gubernatorial declaration of emergency. Those funds are available to fund activities related to any natural disaster. The creation of a separate fund specifically for flood control related activities is unnecessary, and would not result in faster deployment of State resources to aid local agencies.

It also would require the Department of Health Services to develop Medi-Cal ICF/DD-N rates for this new level of service.

This bill is premature. The 1998 budget contains provisions for conducting research to create a new regulatory framework and rate structure that will assure delivery of necessary levels of nursing and habilitative services in these types of facilities. Until this research is completed, it is difficult to judge whether an ICF/DD-N will provide the level of monitoring or direct care necessary to best serve the needs of individuals who require continuous care.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 2404 without my signature.

This bill would Enact the Sea Life Conservation Act, which would require the Department of Fish and Game (Department) to prepare, or contract for the preparation of a study that identifies necessary modifications to existing marine managed areas (MMAs) and sea life reserves. The bill would require the Fish and Game Commission (Commission), on or before January 1, 2002, to adopt a plan to redesign and manage California's MMA's, following submission of the plan to the Joint Committee on Fisheries and Aquaculture for their review and comment. Once the plan is adopted, the Commission would be vested with the authority to regulate the taking of fish for any purpose, including commercial fishing, within an MMA.

This bill is unnecessary. The Resources Agency is the lead agency for the Marine Managed Areas Project Interagency Workgroup, whose goal is to make recommendations for changes in the existing sea life reserve system. This intergovernmental/academic approach was recommended in California's Ocean Resources: an Agenda for the Future, the Administration's strategy for the protection and management of California's ocean ecosystem, released in March of 1997. This interdisciplinary group is in the process of completing a report containing recommendations to improve the existing system of MMAs to develop a more effective and efficient consolidated system. Duplicating existing activities should be avoided rather than required where they will serve no useful purpose.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 2522 without my signature.

This bill would subject the state to specific provisions of the Labor Code governing the payment of overtime wages. This bill would also authorize the Department of Industrial Relations, Division of Labor Standards Enforcement to investigate violations of those provisions.

Current law exempts the state from the application of specified provisions of the Labor Code regarding the payment of overtime wages. Overtime pay is required, however, by the Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA). Overtime pay provisions are also contained in collective bargaining agreements. The appropriate agency for the enforcement of overtime pay requirements under the FLSA is the United States Department of Labor, Wage and Hour Division, not the state Labor Commissioner's Office.

This bill unnecessarily creates conflicting authorities and duplicates existing remedies for the enforcement of overtime pay. In the event of overtime wage disputes, state employees may take advantage of remedies already available under the FLSA or through the grievance

procedures provided in their collective bargaining agreements. The legislative creation of multiple overlapping enforcement options is not the answer.

This bill would establish the Breast Cancer Treatment Program within the Department of Health Services to provide breast cancer treatment services to uninsured and underinsured women with incomes at or below 200 percent of the federal poverty level. The bill would also allow Program funds to be used to subsidize premiums for participants in the Major Risk Medical Insurance Program (MRMIP) in lieu of treatment provided by the Program.

Funding for this program was deleted from the 1998–99 Budget Act because it represented the first use of General Fund monies to provide breast cancer treatment services to women above entitlement-income thresholds for Medi-Cal. The augmentation would have been insufficient to address the anticipated program costs or to keep pace with treatment demands if the programs were so expanded. Similarly, this bill would expand these services above entitlement-income thresholds for Medi-Cal and would create General Fund pressure to keep pace with expanding treatment demands.

This bill would establish the Foster Children's Health Care Services Act to provide a comprehensive foster care Medi-Cal benefit package and make various changes to Medi-Cal eligibility for foster children. The bill would also require the Health and Welfare Agency to coordinate services for foster children including creating an Interagency Coordination Council for Foster Care.

Medical care is currently available to all foster care children through a county eligibility process that is required by federal law to be completed within 45 days. The need for urgent medical attention is also available immediately with an "immediate need" Medi-Cal card.

I appreciate the need for special attention to the health care needs of this group of vulnerable children, but I do not believe that this bill will significantly improve existing procedures. The Departments of Social Services, Health Services and Mental Health should continue to work together to ensure the county welfare departments, foster care parents and caregivers are provided all the necessary information to take

advantage of the existing benefits available to foster children to ensure they receive medical care in a timely manner.

Since there has been no demonstrated problem with the current public works contracting process, the changes required by this bill appear unwarranted.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 20 without my signature.

This bill would implement a federal optional Medicaid benefit, increasing the Medi-Cal income threshold to 250 percent of the federal poverty level for working disabled persons who must meet the federal definition of disabled and are otherwise Medi-Cal eligible.

Last year I vetoed a similar bill (AB 1099, Migden) because the expansion was not authorized by federal Medicaid law and thus would have created a state-only program. Since then, Congress passed the Balanced Budget Act of 1997 granting states the option of providing Medicaid to disabled working individuals who would not qualify otherwise.

While this bill would not expand a state-only program and the intent is consistent with my principles and policy of encouraging individuals to move from public assistance to work, the General Fund costs of this

program could be as high as \$27 million. This estimate does not include the approximately 450,000 disabled individuals who are not currently connected to any federal or state health plan that could be eligible for this program. While it is unlikely that all those individuals would be eligible or interested in the program, the potential price tag of the program is staggering.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 1110 without my signature

This bill would prohibit the Commission on Judicial Performance from investigating or imposing discipline on a judge "solely on the basis of a judicial decision or an administrative act found to be incorrect legally" or on the basis of "[a] dissenting opinion in an appellate case which does not adhere to precedent set by a higher court" Notwithstanding the foregoing, the bill also provides that it should not be "construed to affect the application of any of the Canons of the California Code of Judicial Ethics," suggesting that the contradictory purpose of this bill is either to do nothing or to prohibit discipline of certain judicial actions which violate the Canons of the Code of Judicial Ethics

The bill is unconstitutional, largely unnecessary, overly broad, and an inappropriate effort to interfere with a single proceeding concerning a particular judge.

First and foremost, the bill is unconstitutional. Under the California Constitution, the Legislature is not authorized to restrict (or expand) the types of judicial conduct which constitute a basis for discipline. Proposition 190 was approved by the voters in 1994 and provided as part of Article VI, section 18 of the California Constitution that the "Supreme Court shall make rules for the conduct of judges, both on and off the bench," and that the Commission on Judicial Performance may discipline a judge for willful misconduct, persistent failure or inability to perform the judge's duties, habitual intemperance in the use of intoxicants or drugs, conduct prejudicial to the administration of justice that brings the judicial office into disrepute, or improper action or dereliction of duty. *See* Cal. Const. Art. VI, sec. 18(m), (d). The Legislature has no authority to restrict the *constitutional* scope of misconduct under Article VI, section 18, or to restrict the Commission's power to discipline under that same article.

Under the Constitution, it is the Supreme Court that is to make rules for the conduct of judges, and it is the Commission that may discipline a judge for misconduct, which determination may be reviewed by the California Supreme Court. Where the judicial branch is to share power with the Legislature in promulgating rules, the Constitution has so stated, as in the case of the Judicial Council's right to adopt rules for court administration, practice and procedure. In that case, the Constitution provides that these rules shall "not be inconsistent with statute." *See* Cal. Const. Art. VI, section 6. The Constitution does not provide a similar sharing of power here.

To those judges who support this bill because it reduces the scope of judicial acts subject to discipline, keep in mind that if the Legislature

has the authority to make such rules, it can just as easily make rules that expand the types of judicial acts subject to discipline, which can raise serious separation of powers issues.

Second, the bill is largely unnecessary. It would bar the Commission on Judicial Performance from imposing discipline “on the basis of a judicial decision or an administrative act found to be incorrect legally” or a dissenting opinion which does not adhere to the precedent set by a higher court. Canon 1 of the California Code of Judicial Ethics already provides that “[a] judicial decision or administrative act later determined to be incorrect legally is not itself a violation of this Code.”

However, whereas the Code of Judicial Ethics provides that a judicial decision or administrative act later determined to be incorrect legally does not alone constitute a violation, this bill would appear to bar discipline for even those decisions or acts that are intentionally or knowingly incorrect. Thus, the bill is overbroad. For instance, the bill would appear to excuse a judge who acts well beyond his or her authority, such as directing a jury to return a guilty verdict in a criminal action, on the grounds that the judge cannot be disciplined for a legally incorrect decision—although the California Supreme Court has previously concluded that this constitutes willful misconduct. See *McCullough v. Commission on Judicial Performance*, 49 Cal.3d 186, 192 (1989).

Finally, this bill is an inappropriate effort to interfere with a single proceeding against a particular judge. This bill was a direct response to the institution of formal proceedings by the Commission on Judicial Performance concerning Justice J. Anthony Kline’s conscious refusal in the case of *Morrow v. Hood Communications, Inc.*, 59 Cal. App. 4th 924, 927 (1997), to adhere to a precedent established by the California Supreme Court. In his dissenting opinion in *Morrow*, Justice Kline stated that he could not “as a matter of conscience apply the rule announced [by the California Supreme Court] in *Neary v. Regents of the University of California*, 3 Cal. 4th 273 (1992)],” which permitted parties to stipulate to a reversal of a trial court judgment. A spirited debate, particularly in the legal and judicial community, has followed the institution of formal proceedings by the Commission. However, it should be clear that the issue which has given rise to this bill is not a simple error in legal analysis, but a willful decision by a lower court judge to refuse to comply with the law established by a higher court. The sponsors of this bill apparently believe that the proposed legislation will protect Justice Kline because Justice Kline has publicly argued that his willful refusal to comply with the law constitutes at most an error of law over whether the law permits a willful refusal to follow the law under the circumstances here. Whether this refusal rises to the level of misconduct or warrants any form of discipline must be left to the Commission’s proceedings, and possibly the California Supreme Court, but this issue—which goes to the heart of the role of an inferior court judge in our judiciary—should not be shortcut by an unconstitutional enactment.

While I am supportive of most of the provisions of this bill, I cannot support at this time one section which will alter the water's edge determination for multinational corporations. This provision was added to the bill late in the legislative session, with little or no policy debate. It could have a negative affect on the California business community, and has the potential to result in a tax increase.

I call on the Legislature to move swiftly next year to enact the Taxpayer Bill of Rights, and to fully evaluate and debate the water's edge provision.

This bill would include specified classifications, including criminalists and latent print analysts at the Department of Justice, in the state safety retirement membership category.

Current law requires a determination that the duties of a classification meet the requisite criteria for safety retirement and that this enhanced benefit be agreed to in collective bargaining. Neither condition has occurred.

Although the state and the employee organization have been engaged in collective bargaining for over three years, this issue has never been proposed. Moreover, neither the employee organization nor the Department of Justice has asked the state to study these classifications for inclusion in safety retirement.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 1663 without my signature.

This bill would enact a statewide public health reporting system for Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV) using a unique identifier method that does not report the name or any other identifying information about the person infected. This bill would also increase

civil penalties for violating existing confidentiality laws related to Acquired Immunodeficiency Syndrome (AIDS) and HIV public records.

California is one of only nine states that does not track HIV infection. California law, however, does require that persons with AIDS, and approximately 80 other diseases, be reported by name to the Local Health Officer.

Tracking the HIV/AIDS epidemic using only AIDS case data tells us where the epidemic was ten years ago, but not what is currently happening or where the epidemic is headed. The new AIDS drugs are delaying the onset of AIDS and thus delaying AIDS case-based epidemiological information. In contrast, HIV infection reporting would provide far more timely information about where and how new infections are occurring so that education and prevention efforts can be effectively targeted at high-risk populations and communities. Furthermore, HIV reporting would give a much better estimate of the population in need of care and treatment services, especially for those who have yet to develop AIDS.

Public health officials and physicians are divided on the best way to report HIV infection. The author and supporters of this measure argue that reporting HIV test results by name will deter individuals from seeking testing or medical care. However, The National Centers for Disease Control (CDC) found that HIV name based reporting systems resulted in less than a 2 percent decline in the number of those seeking HIV testing.

Concerns over confidentiality and discrimination should not be used to justify an inadequate reporting system. Existing law ensures confidentiality and protects those with HIV or AIDS from discrimination. Health and Safety Code Section 120980 provides that the result of an HIV test may not be disclosed to any third party absent written authorization. The California Fair Employment and Housing Act and regulations prohibit discrimination in employment or housing. The Unruh Civil Rights Act prohibits discrimination by business establishments and discrimination in the use of public accommodations. Most importantly, Health and Safety Code Section 120980 prohibits using the results of an HIV test for determining an individual's eligibility for employment. Thus, any further concerns over privacy and discrimination do not warrant designing a reporting system that does not adequately provide for partner notification. Irrational concerns over privacy should not interfere with what must be our highest priority, interrupting the chain of HIV transmission.

Thirty states are successfully using a name based HIV reporting system while only two states, Maryland and Texas, use a unique identifier based system similar to this bill. The CDC found that the Maryland and Texas systems had so many inaccurate and incomplete reports that it was difficult to obtain useful data and to trace and notify partners of possible HIV infection. As a result of these significant defects, Texas is abandoning its unique identifier based system in favor of a name based HIV reporting system.

California is now experiencing a dramatic increase in HIV infections among lower-income and minority women. These are preventable infections resulting from partner contact and intravenous drug use. We know, from our experience with the 80 other reportable, communicable diseases, that we can minimize the exposure and deaths resulting from

this terrifying disease. We must not ignore the experience of 30 other states and implement an inadequate HIV reporting system that, in the end, will result in tragic consequences.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 1687 without my signature.

This bill would require any school district that applies for funding under the Leroy F. Greene Act of 1998 for the construction or modernization of a school building to include an automatic fire detection and alarm system.

All school sites are currently required to have fire alarm systems. To ensure that funding is available for both the construction of new schools, and modernization of older schools, I recently signed Senate Bill 50, a comprehensive school facilities bond and building program reform measure. For new schools, school districts will be able to choose from all available technology, the best fire detection and alarm systems. For older schools, districts will have to ensure the existing detection systems are properly updated or replaced. And the new school building program provided by SB 50 will provide districts with greater local decision making and control over the design and construction of school building projects. Districts now will receive a block grant for school construction, which will allow districts to use school building funds for fire safety improvements, which could include the fire safety systems proposed in this bill.

While I encourage all districts to install the most effective fire detection systems as part of new school construction and modernization, I believe that the state role is to provide districts with financial assistance so that they can use funds to best meet priorities as determined locally.

This bill would require the Department of Social Services to establish a three-year pilot project to test the efficiency and cost effectiveness of an alternative group home program structure for up to 600 children in need of specialized services.

Consistent with my concerns about the foster care program, the Health and Welfare Agency, in cooperation with the Department of Social Services and other various stakeholders, are in the process of re-examining the role of group care in order to develop requirements that will ensure children are placed in permanent and stable environments while meeting their special needs. This process will also result in assessing the rate structure for the group homes. The results of

this re-examination is expected to be released by April, 1999 with the goal that the proposal can be implemented in the budget. The Department of Social Services is also implementing the Child Welfare Demonstration Project recently approved by the federal Department of Health and Human Services for innovative services for children that will include group homes.

This bill addresses goals similar to the activities already underway but also creates a potential General Fund liability by allowing a county to implement a project without cost controls with the state responsible for over expenditures.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 1864 without my signature.

This bill would, among other provisions, increase various Political Reform Act monetary threshold limits and codify the current law on "aiding and abetting" liability.

There is no question that the adjustments this bill would make to the limits and threshold amounts in the Political Reform Act—which have generally remained unchanged since 1974—are long overdue. Indeed, I would have signed a separate bill containing only these adjustments. Raising the threshold limits to a realistic level is a worthwhile goal that the Legislature should, in its next session, pursue.

However, this bill would also codify a flawed provision setting the contours of liability for those who "aid and abet" others to violate the Political Reform Act. As currently drafted, the bill arguably would immunize from criminal prosecution the very class of aiders and abettors most culpable of criminal conduct: those who purposefully cause others to violate the Political Reform Act. Moreover, the bill would arguably codify a wholesale exemption from criminal prosecution for those with filing obligations under the Act, preventing

the criminal prosecution of even those filers who have acted with criminal intent—or, in some cases, gross negligence.

It is incumbent on the Legislature to augment the current law on aiding and abetting by enabling the vigorous enforcement of California's Political Reform Act against intentional violators, irrespective of whether they have filing obligations. At the same time, the Legislature ought to craft the same common sense exemption—as exists in the current law and is carried in the present bill—from criminal liability for those who provide advice that is innocent but incorrect.

Rather than sign this bill and begin a piecemeal process of fixing aiding and abetting liability under the Political Reform Act, the Legislature should define such liability by spelling out with sufficient clarity: who is covered; for what type of conduct; and what civil and/or criminal penalties apply.

The allocation errors in Santa Clara County were discovered by an internal audit and have been corrected prospectively. Without legislative relief, the affected fire districts must repay the ERAF approximately \$2.7 million. While I am not unsympathetic to the impact this miscalculation will have on the fire district, I am generally opposed to the forgiveness of audit exceptions in property tax allocation audits. However, I have directed the Department of Finance to negotiate a repayment schedule that will not impair the ability of the district to continue to deliver its vital public safety services without undue hardship.

County district attorneys are required to collect child support payments on behalf of children who are receiving public assistance and every other child for whom those services are requested.

District attorneys are subject to federal and state program compliance audits. Their funding is dependent upon compliance with federal and

state regulations. A state hearing process for child support collections would create a heavy additional burden on the State and counties, diverting child support enforcement resources to activities to support the hearing process.

The Secretary of Business, Transportation and Housing enforces the Holden Act and has issued regulations which provide for the monitoring of lending patterns. The regulations also provide a procedure for applicants, who believe they have been discriminated against, to file a complaint.

In addition, the federal Department of Justice and the Department of Housing and Urban Development examine lending and financial information reported pursuant to the Home Mortgage Disclosure Act to determine if a pattern of lending is in fact redlining.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 2534 without my signature.

This bill would constrain general contractors to withhold only that percentage, or less, in retention proceeds from a subcontractor that is being withheld by the principal, whether public or private; and would apply these provisions to all contracts for the construction of any work of improvement entered into on or after January 1, 1999. These provisions would not apply to subcontractors who do not provide payment or performance bonds, and would not apply to retention withheld by lenders per construction loan agreements.

Earlier this year I signed AB 2084 which will effectively authorize a standard for public works projects equivalent to the universal standard proposed by this bill.

Public agencies and public utilities are held to levels of practice which are often stricter and less flexible than those which apply to the private sector. This is sometimes necessary to ensure that the public trust and public dollars are protected. Mandatory notice, competitive bid and low bid requirements fit the public but not private model. The public must strive to treat each citizen in an antiseptically equal manner—all like situated taxpayers and ratepayers must pay the same rate, all eligible contractors must be given an opportunity to submit the lowest bid.

In the private sector preferred or long term customers often receive lower prices. Those with the best credit pay less interest. Contracts can be awarded to the highest bidder or without any bid process at all. While government should often seek to imitate the private sector, the private sector should rarely seek to imitate government. More often than not when government intrudes into the private sector it imposes mandates which burden and impede the flexibility and profitability of private business.

Occasionally, it is appropriate for the state to intervene. In this instance, however, the size of retentions can be freely negotiated. In those cases where the new state standard can be equitably applied to private contracts it should be mirrored not mandated.

I support the establishment of veterans facilities when need can be demonstrated. The second of four authorized Southern California Veteran Homes is currently under construction. Current law require that

demand be demonstrated for a third and fourth facility in Southern California before those projects, or any additional projects, may proceed. Further, since veterans from all geographic locations across the state can reside in any of the state's homes, statewide capacity would have to be challenged before additional construction would appear prudent. AB 2725 is premature.

This bill addresses goals similar to the activities underway which should be completed before making narrow rate classification changes such as those proposed in this bill.

Veto Message—Assembly Bill No. 964

To the Members of the California Assembly:

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 964 without my signature.

This bill would require the Integrated Waste Management Board (IWMB) to submit a report to the appropriate fiscal and policy committees in the Legislature describing its expenditures for grants, loans and contracts under the tire recycling program. The bill would also allow the IWMB or its contractor access to sites where tires are being stockpiled illegally, after the IWMB has issued a civil liability order and made a finding that the site represents a significant threat to public health or the environment.

This bill is unnecessary. The information describing expenditures under the tire recycling program is public information that is already provided through the budget process. If members of the Legislature are interested in more detail about such expenditures, all they need to do is ask.

Similarly, authority to restrict activities on, and gain access to, property representing an imminent threat to the public health or environment already exists. The Department of Justice routinely files, and obtains such orders on behalf of government agencies when an imminent threat to public health can be established. Those orders can be obtained in a matter of days. The process outlined in this bill, which requires the IWMB to issue an administrative civil liability order before gaining access to the property, will take at least five months, or as long as 19 months. This bill does nothing to provide additional tools to the IWMB to address imminent threats to the public health or environment, but it does expand the administrative authority of the IWMB and erode the Constitutional rights of property owners.

It might be appropriate for the IWMB to possess additional authority to remediate environmental threats through the use of inspection warrants. This is the existing mechanism available to other environmental agencies such as the Department of Toxic Substances

Control and the State Water Resources Control Board. Such a mechanism would provide for Constitutional considerations, but essentially accomplish what the author seeks under this bill.

Public awareness of stockpiled tires, and the environmental threats posed by such sites, is heightened because of the recent Royster tire pile fire in Tracy. It is worth noting that the Royster tire pile was in existence for more than a decade, ample time under even the lengthiest legal process to obtain site access to use state resources to stabilize and remediate this tire pile. Unfortunately, the State was engaged in a protracted legal battle with the owner of the site over the fundamental question of his need for a permit. However, existing statute provides the independent IWMB the authority to take appropriate remedial action, and, in fact, legal proceedings to gain access to the property were instituted just prior to the accidental fire that occurred in Royster.

Today I have signed Assembly Bill No. 117, which will provide for an extension of the 25-cent tire fee consumers pay when they purchase new tires. The revenue generated from this fee is intended to address the environmental consequences of tires being generated every year in California and so-called legacy, or stockpiled, tires. I have directed the IWMB to focus its attention on remediation of stockpiled tires. Assembly Bill No. 117 also calls for a study, which, in part, will address the strategies necessary to eliminate stockpiles of tires. The authors of that report must look critically at the question of site access to remediate stockpiled tires, but those who research this question must also consider existing authorities because those authorities are adequate to the task of protecting public health and the environment from imminent threats, if they are appropriately pursued. The use of inspection warrant, is the most expeditious remedy to seek additional assurances that site access can be obtained for the purposes of cleaning up other sites.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 542 without my signature.

This bill would require Caltrans to consult with intercity bus companies on feeder bus service provided for intercity rail passengers under California's intercity rail program. Additionally, the bill prohibits the department, after January 1, 2003, from funding bus service parallel to state-funded rail routes and from providing bus service to intercity bus passengers.

While this bill seeks to restrict subsidized competition and save tax dollars, I am concerned that it will severely limit the intercity rail program. Bus feeder routes are awarded to the lowest bidder, which enhances competition between private sector providers. Intercity rail serves a specialized market that is significantly different from intercity bus services. The success of this program relies on the dedicated feeder system. If these services decline, ridership will decrease, requiring additional state subsidies to make up the losses.

Although I agree that the rail program should be competitive on a long-term basis with other modes of transportation, I am concerned that this bill would prematurely end the State's effort to build intercity passenger rail as a capacity addition to California's highways. The recently enacted budget includes funds for expanded service along existing rail lines to increase ridership on the Capitol Corridor (rail service to increase from four to six trains daily) and the San Joaquin Corridor (rail extension to Sacramento from Stockton). Ridership on these routes has increased 36 percent over the last five years, a trend I expect to continue.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 952 without my signature.

This bill would, among other provisions, eliminate the sunset that allows a portion of the amount payable on each dollar wagered on quarter horse racing to remain at five cents.

Current law (Business and Professions Code Section 19405) defines "breakage" as the odd cents by which the amount payable on each dollar wagered exceeds a multiple of ten cents. For quarter horse racing until January 1, 1999, "breakage" is defined as the odd cents by which the amount payable on each dollar wagered exceeds a multiple of five

cents. Under existing law (Business and Professions Code Section 19606.1) "breakage" is distributed as additional license fees, commissions, purses and the like.

This bill would remove the sunset to allow the "breakage" for quarter horse racing to remain at five cents. As such, less money would be distributed to the general fund and the two-tiered level of breakage that currently exists would remain.

I have consistently supported efforts to provide substantial tax relief to this industry to ensure its continued competitiveness. Recently, I signed Senate Bill 27 (Maddy), that will provide approximately \$40 million annually in tax relief to the horse racing industry. Therefore, additional tax relief at this time is unwarranted.

This bill would grant specified temporary employees a preferred right to reappointment by requiring notification by March 15 regarding the employment status in the next school year and by providing an appeal process to challenge a district's intent not to rehire.

This bill limits the flexibility of local community college governing boards to employ temporary employees by requiring districts to make offers of reemployment driven by arbitrary statutory deadlines rather than student needs. This bill also imposes a new reimbursable state mandate on districts by requiring new employment monitoring and appeal processes.

This bill will hamper the ability of a community college district to respond to the educational needs of the communities they serve. Changing demand for occupational training requires that the colleges be able to expand or reduce faculty specialization rapidly. Community colleges need to preserve their ability to ensure the teaching faculty, they need to accommodate the changing educational needs of the persons who come to their institutions for instruction.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 1205 without my signature.

This bill would revise the definition of private postsecondary educational institutions and make technical and clarifying amendments to the Private Postsecondary and Vocational Education Reform Act.

AB 1205 would expand the Private Postsecondary and Vocational Education Reform Act to apply to institutions that operate administrative offices in California but do not solicit or enroll California residents in their programs. This provision elicits questions on how out of state institutions located in California are to be regulated and how

California institutions should be regulated if they have offices located in another state. There is no question that an institution located in California and offering educational services to California residents is subject to regulation by the Bureau of Private Postsecondary and Vocational Education (Bureau). However, if that institution only operates an administrative office in California and does not offer any educational services to California residents, it is appropriate that regulation be provided by the state where the institution is located.

It is my understanding that the Attorney General's office is currently working with other states on the appropriate regulatory relationship between California and states, especially given that technology has allowed these schools to offer distance learning through computers and other electronic means. Signature on this bill would therefore be premature.

I would note, however, that the Bureau has a duty to take action against any school with an administrative office in California that is misrepresenting itself to potential students as an approved California educational institution.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 1381 without my signature.

This bill would expand the number of child care agencies that would be eligible to lease state-owned portable classrooms purchased with state general obligation bond funding to include agencies that contract with school districts for the provision of extended day care services to school-aged children.

Last year, I supported the establishment of a child care facilities revolving loan program. The program was established with \$25 million and augmented with an additional \$13.3 million this year. This fund will be replenished through annual lease payments from providers who lease-purchase the portables overtime. Although the Department of Education has yet to allocate any funding under this program, I believe that when it is finally operable, this program will provide an ongoing funding source for child care facilities, thus eliminating the need for state school bonds for this purpose. Therefore, this legislation appears unnecessary.

I further note that this bill would create additional workload at the Office of Public School Construction at a time when we are attempting to streamline the state school facilities program.

This bill would allow the California Coastal Commission to require a project applicant to hire a scientist or technical expert that is mutually agreeable to both the applicant and the Commission to provide expert testimony on project applications pending before the Commission. The bill directs the Commission to adopt guidelines relating to this process and to approve the guidelines via the Administrative Procedures Act.

This bill fails to identify standards or threshold requirements that the Commission would be required to consider prior to making a determination that independent review is necessary. This decision will be totally subjective on the part of the Commission. The bill requires the Commission to adopt guidelines addressing how the Commission will frame questions to the experts; how information must be communicated to the Commission, and what type of expert is required for particular projects. However, there is nothing requiring those guidelines to define the types of projects that will be subject to independent review, how the term "conflicting scientific information" will be defined, or to require the Commission to accept the information provided by an independent reviewer.

The process proposed by this bill would provide a hardship for most applicants by assuring increased costs—without guaranteeing better projects will result.

It should be noted that districts have received an abundance of support for this program. For example, districts and county superintendents of schools have been provided hundreds of millions of dollars in supplemental grant funding and general purpose revenue limit funding that could be directed to home-to-school transportation needs based on local priorities.

This bill would appropriate \$300,000 from the General Fund to establish the Family Maintenance Health Care Pilot Project in Los Angeles County. The pilot project would address health concerns with regard to abused and neglected children who remain at home while participating in the Family Maintenance Program. It would identify these children and establish physician and staff education programs, case management, and a data tracking system.

I deleted an item from the Budget which would have required \$350,000 of federal Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment Act (CAPTA) funds to be dedicated to the same project AB 822 proposes. At that time, I stated that the pilot project appeared to be meritorious; however all of the federal CAPTA funds available for 1998–99 had been committed to other continuing child abuse prevention projects. I recommended then, and continue to recommend that Los Angeles County apply for funding in the next grant cycle.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 1183 without my signature.

This bill would prohibit an employer from delaying the payment of workers' compensation benefits for a work-related injury or illness in anticipation of the recovery of amounts from a third-party for the same injury or illness.

Current law provides penalties for the late payment of workers' compensation benefits and, if any portion of a benefit payment is "unreasonably delayed," the entire benefit amount is subject to a ten percent penalty. This measure modifies only that aspect of the

penalty law allowing carriers to recover penalties in subrogation claims and does not address any of the other problems associated with the workers' compensation penalty process. While I support a review of the penalties associated with the payment of workers' compensation benefits, I cannot support it being done on a piecemeal basis.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 1654 without my signature.

This bill would revise the Adoption Assistance Program's (AAP) statutory guidelines by eliminating the requirement that statewide median income data be used as a guideline by adoption caseworkers when determining AAP payments for adopting families. The bill changes the process for renewal of the AAP payments to a reassessment of the child's needs every two years. The bill also clarifies that the county of residence of the relinquishing parent is responsible for making AAP payments in cases where the child has been voluntarily relinquished.

It has been, and continues to be, the policy of this State to encourage adoptions. The Adoption Initiative-Adoption Advisory Council is currently considering recommendations from work groups on post-adoption services. The Council and its work groups are composed of representatives from the Administration, the Legislature, local government, and child advocacy groups. The issues considered by the Council and those raised by this bill are complex. Changes in family income are taken into account when awarding or modifying child support orders in family law cases. No child support award is permanent and all are subject to review upon a change in circumstances until the child attains his or her majority. The fact that a foster family has adopted a child does not mean that the family should be awarded an annuity by the State whose payments will continue unchanged, regardless of the family's financial circumstances and regardless of the needs of the child. The Advisory Council is more likely to take all perspectives into account in their recommendations; statutory changes should await the Council's recommendations.

The Legislative Analyst's Office can prepare reports without the need for a statutory mandate. This bill would do nothing more than shuffle funding around for the Self-Help Housing Program. It is unnecessary.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 2432 without my signature.

AB 2432 would require all new State public building for which design and construction begins after January 1, 2000, except publicly-funded schools, colleges, and universities, to exceed the minimum building energy-efficiency standards mandated by the California Building Code. This bill would require all State office buildings for which construction begins after June 30, 2000, that are used in whole or in part as State offices, to follow "green" building standards and would require the California Integrated Waste Management Board to create regulations for these buildings by January 1, 2000. This bill would also require that all current State buildings, except for public school, college, and university buildings, when renovated or remodeled to be retrofitted with all energy-efficiency measures, materials, and devices that are feasible and cost effective.

In 1994, I issued Executive Order W-83-94, which addressed energy-efficiency issues. I directed State agencies to incorporate practices and technologies in public construction and building retrofitting in order to reduce the long-term energy costs of public works projects. In accordance with this executive order, State agencies now incorporate energy-efficient technologies along with environmentally-friendly practices in construction and renovation when it is feasible, cost effective, and consistent with good design. Enactment of these standards has already led to substantial energy saving, benefiting both the taxpayer and the environment.

This Administration offered to assist the author in creating a bill that would augment the current Administration practice of designing and building State offices that are models of energy efficiency. Unfortunately, the proposed amendments were rejected by the author. This bill is overly prescriptive and attempts to have the State drive an emerging market. Governments have failed, on many occasions, to identify and incorporate, much less prescribe, the correct state-of-the-art technologies. If energy-efficient technology and know-how warrants more attention, market forces in the private sector are more likely to successfully identify and develop them; government fiat is unlikely to do so.

This bill is not necessary. The Department conducts a thorough investigation of the need for program flexibility. This investigation often includes consultation from health professional organizations as well as hospital personnel. Additionally, most requests for program flexibility relate to changes to the physical plant, administrative issues or techniques to address outdated regulatory areas. Moreover, the posting of the request and comments by employees results in additional costs without any likelihood of improving quality of care.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 1966 without my signature.

This bill would create a minimum funding guarantee for the University of California (UC) and the California State University (CSU) by requiring the state to provide funding increases to UC and CSU based on the rate of growth of the State General Fund.

I yield to no one in my appreciation of UC and CSU and of their importance to California. However, I believe that the best way to provide appropriate financial support and predictable level of funding to UC and CSU is through a carefully negotiated compact between our state and the two systems of higher education. This type of compact properly balances funding assurances for the systems; and taxpayer assurances of higher performance and productivity; and increased student assurances that they will have access to the classes permitting their graduation in four years. This bill falls short of all of these objectives.

Last year I vetoed AB 1415, a measure virtually identical to this bill. I continue to believe that there is a better way to honor our obligation to provide resources necessary to assure the success of UC and CSU than by the rigidity of the statutorily mandated auto-pilot spending of this bill.

Negotiations with the systems are nearly complete. I plan to unveil, this Fall, a new compact that maintains California's commitment to excellence for the University of California and the California State University systems.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 2031 without my signature.

This bill would require that any person who would have been eligible for services under specified mental health, developmental disabilities and health services programs, as of July 16, 1996, shall continue to be eligible for these services regardless of immigration status, as long as the person meets all other eligibility requirements.

The Federal Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Act of 1996 requires California, if it chooses to provide benefits to unqualified aliens after August 22, 1996, to enact laws to restore benefits at state-only cost.

It has not been my goal to remove benefits whose termination would not act as a disincentive for illegal immigration and must be maintained for compassionate reasons. As such, I proposed, over a year ago, to continue serving all residents, regardless of immigration status, in the following programs: Victims Witness Assistance Program Center, Rape Crisis Center, Child Protective Services, the Child Health and Disability Prevention Program and those under civil commitment by the courts in state developmental centers. These programs are critical to public safety and public health.

In addition, I proposed to "grandfather" individuals currently enrolled in the In-Home Supportive Service Program, the California Children's Services program, the Genetically Handicapped Persons Program, the Long-Term Care Program and certain clients in state developmental centers. These programs are critical for compassionate reasons.

It is unfortunate, however, that the Legislature chose to ignore my request to provide these services and instead send a bill that clearly violates the intent of the federal policy that wisely sought to discourage illegal immigration by removing incentives for it.

This bill would authorize the Emergency Medical Services Authority (EMSA) to take a licensing action against emergency service personnel for unprofessional conduct, as defined. The bill would also authorize EMSA to obtain federal background checks as part of the licensure procedure.

This bill would improve EMSA's ability to protect the public from emergency service personnel with a criminal background or who have engaged in unprofessional conduct. However, the definition of "excessive force" conflicts with existing standards applicable to law enforcement personnel when a peace officer must first deal in a law enforcement mode, for example, with a suspect, and then provide the

suspect with emergency medical attention. This may subject law enforcement officers who are also licensed by EMSA to conflicting standards. EMSA should resolve this technical issue and promptly reintroduce the bill.

It is appropriate to regulate the sale of a nonprofit hospital to a for profit hospital because the use of the hospital is converted from a nonprofit public use to a private, for profit use. However, those same considerations do not apply when the hospital remains a not for profit entity. Existing law is sufficient to protect the public interest because nonprofit to nonprofit transfers result in hospitals that continue to be owned by nonprofit public benefit corporations which are subject to review by the Attorney General.

This bill would require that the names, addresses, and phone numbers of Individual Care Providers be subject to disclosure under the Public Records Act. Existing law does not allow phone numbers to be released. The bill would also require release of information to the public of only those providers in counties who are not represented by an exclusive bargaining agent.

This bill conflicts with state labor relations law by eliminating a Public Authority's discretion, as an employer under current law, to release names, addresses and phone numbers about employees where the collective bargaining agreement is silent on the issue. Thus, the bill creates an unfair distinction between the release of names, addresses, and phone numbers of unionized and non-unionized care providers.

In addition, the release of phone numbers in addition to names and addresses under current law is an unwarranted invasion of privacy. Existing law which provides access to the names and addresses of care providers is sufficient for organizing and information sharing purposes.

I am supportive of the policy contained in this measure, though not supportive of removing parental choice as to the kind of child care. However, the State must have a two percent reserve. I hope that a future Legislature and Governor will reconsider this policy if resources permit them to do so.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 1155 without my signature.

AB 1155 would direct the Department of General Services to accept a deed on behalf of the Controller's Office in lieu of foreclosure for 160 acres of land located in the Santa Monica Mountains in Los Angeles County. This land is the security for a note which was assigned to the Controller's Office by the Mountains Recreation and Conservation Authority. The note was due, in the amount of \$1.2 million, on March 26, 1996. It has not been paid. The 160 acres of land has a current appraised value of \$480,000.

The 160 acres are located in a wilderness area. State acquisition of this land will permit completion of the Backbone Trail of the Santa Monica Mountains. The federal government has expressed interest in acquiring this land for purposes of extending the Trail and is willing to grant federal park lands to the State Department of Parks and Recreation in exchange.

A little history is necessary in order to properly understand this bill. The 160 acres which are the subject of this bill were part of the estate of a prominent Southern Californian, who died in 1991. The estate owed approximately \$607,000 to the State in estate taxes. On January 6, 1993, the estate sold the 160 acres to the Mountains Recreation and Conservation Authority. The estate received a \$10,000 down payment and a note for \$950,000 (plus interest) which was set to mature on March 26, 1996 with a balloon payment of \$1.2 million. The note was secured by a deed to the 160 acres. In 1994, the State Controller agreed to accept an assignment of the note from the estate in lieu of the estate taxes, interest, and penalties, which were projected to reach \$900,000 upon the note's maturity. As part of this agreement, the Controller agreed to refund \$150,000 to the estate when payment was received. Unfortunately, payment was never received; the Mountain Recreation and Conservation Authority defaulted on the note when it matured on March 26, 1996. The State has not yet received any of the taxes, interest,

and penalties which are owed to it by the estate, which have now risen to over \$1.05 million.

This bill is sponsored by the State Controller. It would direct the Department of General Services to accept the deed for the 160 acres in lieu of foreclosure and in full satisfaction of all taxes and interest owed to the State. Under the best of circumstances, this process would result in lost revenue of over \$500,000. The State may, under current law, foreclose and proceed against the estate for any deficiency.

Acceptance of a promissory note secured by property with an apparent value of one-third to one-half of the value of the note has foreseeable consequences. The absence of any periodic payments and the willingness of the estate to pay \$1,200,000 (less a \$150,000 refund) to settle its indebtedness, which was on the due date \$900,000, should have provided ample warning that the public interest required a more plausible repayment plan. Acceptance, now, of the 160 acres in lieu of tax payment is appropriate only if the Controller's Office would accept from any similarly-situated estate \$500,000 in land as a bartered exchange in satisfaction of a \$1 million tax liability. Because this type of deal-making would be inconsistent with fundamental notions of fair dealing and equal treatment by government, so too is the well-intentioned proposal incorporated in the provisions of this bill.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 1664 without my signature.

This bill would, among other provisions, establish participation goals of 30 percent for small business and 3 percent for disabled veteran business enterprises for the majority of state contracts and would require state departments to establish rules for the implementation of their participation goals.

Under current law, the State's Office of Small and Minority Business (OSMB) within the Department of General Services provides information services and assistance to small businesses to encourage their participation in state contracting. Also, under current law, small businesses certified by the OSMB can qualify for a 5 percent bid preference in evaluations of state solicitations.

While I am in favor of encouraging small business participation in state and local contracts, this bill is not an efficient or reasoned means to accomplish that and runs counter to the State's efforts to streamline the procurement process. First, the bill would add another mandatory participation goal program to the state contracting process. In the past, mandatory participation goals have added two to eight weeks to the public notice period for bid solicitations, increasing state costs by millions of dollars annually and delaying procurement. Second, the bill would burden state agencies with additional paperwork and process requirements. Third, the bill would create confusion, as it would add a second definition of "small business" in connection with state

contracting. Finally, there is no reasoned basis for an across-the-board 30 percent participation goal, unrelated to the agency or the industry involved in the procurement. It is entirely arbitrary.

The OSMB is currently in the process of expanding, via the regulatory process, the threshold levels for small business certification. As a result of increasing these thresholds, the OSMB believes that small businesses will qualify for and obtain state contract work.

Much effort has been put forth this year to secure legislation that would assist small businesses in state contracting. Among other things, this Administration has sought to require prompter payment by state government to small business (which depends on a reliable and constant cash flow), better information over bid opportunities, and incentives for subcontracting with small businesses. However, establishing yet another mandatory goal program is not only counterproductive but a flawed substitute for real reform.

Veto Message—Assembly Bill No. 574

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 574 without my signature.

This bill would make it an unlawful employment practice for an employer to request any employee or prospective employee to agree to arbitrate any claims prior to the existence of an actual dispute. Additionally, under the bill, any such arbitration agreement would not be enforced, despite long-standing federal and state policy that written arbitration agreements are to be enforced.

This bill is a bad precedent, bad law, and bad policy. First, it sets a bad precedent. By making an employer's request to an employee to agree to arbitration an "unlawful employment practice" under the California Fair Employment and Housing Act, it denigrates this State's protections against discrimination by equating the innocence of an employer's request for an arbitration agreement with the malevolence of discrimination based on race, religious creed, color, national origin, ancestry, physical disability, mental disability, medical condition, marital status, age, and sex, any of which constitutes an unlawful employment practice.

An employer's request for an arbitration clause in an employment agreement—in conformity with long-standing federal policy in favor of arbitration—should not subject the employer to an unlawful employment practice charge and the financial penalties associated with it.

Secondly, the bill is bad law because it is largely preempted by the Federal Arbitration Act. The Federal Arbitration Act requires the enforcement of any written arbitration agreement in any contract "evidencing a transaction involving commerce" "save upon such grounds as exist at law or in equity for the revocation of any contract." 9 U.S.C. §2. The U.S. Supreme Court has ruled that the Federal Arbitration Act "is a congressional declaration of a liberal federal policy favoring arbitration agreements, notwithstanding any state substantive or procedural policies to the contrary." *Moses H. Cone*

Memorial Hospital v. Mercury Construction Corp. 460 U.S. 1, 24 (1983). The court has accordingly invalidated state statutes that bar litigants from using arbitration to resolve disputes. *See, e.g., Perry v. Thomas* 482 U.S. 483 (1987) (holding that Labor Code §229 is preempted by the Federal Arbitration Act). Hence, this bill's prohibition of, and refusal to enforce, arbitration agreements between an employer and employee are preempted, except for those arbitration agreements which do not fall within the reach of the Federal Arbitration Act (*i.e.*, those agreements not within the reach of the Commerce Clause or contracts of employment of seamen, railroad employees, or other classes of workers engaged in foreign or interstate commerce, which are exempt under 9 U.S.C. §1). Since the U.S. Supreme Court has thus far interpreted broadly the scope of the Federal Arbitration Act, this bill would be largely preempted by the Federal Act. Employers would face the uncertainty of deciding whether a request for an arbitration agreement was an unfair employment practice or an action favored, and enforced, under federal law.

Arguments by the bill's supporters that this bill is not preempted because it does not affect the enforcement of arbitration agreements, but merely penalizes the creation of such agreements are absurd and belied by the bill's provisions that expressly address enforcement of arbitration agreements between employers and employees. Moreover, penalizing employers who request arbitration agreements subject to the Federal Arbitration Act is clearly inconsistent with the Federal Act's enforcement of arbitration agreements. The doctrine of federal preemption is sufficiently broad to make a state statute void to the extent it stands as an obstacle to the accomplishment of the full purposes and objectives of Congress, *Maryland v. Louisiana* 451 U.S. 725 (1981), and thus, penalizing an employer for seeking to make an arbitration agreement that is favored and enforced under federal law is preempted.

Third, this bill is bad policy. It would prohibit any agreements to arbitrate as part of any employment contract, whether that agreement is with an executive officer or personnel in the company's mail room—regardless of the benefits of arbitration to that individual in terms of cost and efficiency. Arbitration can help both employers and employees keep their litigation expenses down and speed resolution of disputes, to their and society's benefit, promoting a favorable jobs climate in this State and preserving personal finances. For instance, arbitration allows an employee to resolve disputes that he or she could not afford to litigate in court, or where the amount in controversy makes it uneconomical to proceed with litigation. It is no answer to say that this bill permits an employer and employee to agree to arbitration after a dispute arises. After a dispute has arisen, one party or the other often sees an advantage to litigating; thus, the best way to realize the benefits of arbitration is to agree to it in advance.

Finally, this bill is not necessary to protect employees. The underlying argument in favor of this bill is not that arbitration is bad, but that some employees may be coerced into signing an unfair or unconscionable arbitration agreement. However, concerns over unconscionable or adhesion contracts can be addressed in the code provisions addressing those subjects. After all, the Federal Arbitration Act provides that arbitration agreements need not be enforced on any ground that exists at law or in equity for the revocation of any contract, such as unconscionability. Nor is this bill necessary to allow litigation in

court of civil rights claims: The Ninth Circuit has recently ruled that employers cannot require employees to arbitrate discrimination claims under Title VII of the Civil Rights Act. *See Duffield v. Robertson Stephens & Co.*, 144 F.3d 1182 (9th Cir. 1998).

In short, far from there being any need for this bill, there is a compelling need to veto it.

This bill would, among other provisions, prohibit funds which are raised to support or oppose a ballot measure from being transferred to another ballot measure.

This bill is unnecessary. Existing law allows donors to place "non-transfer" conditions on their contributions if they so choose. Moreover, this bill would inhibit those in the private sector from involvement in ballot measure elections by restricting their ability to raise funds for several ballot measures at the same time based on common goals, subject matter or supporters. It is inappropriate to limit that participation.

I am returning Assembly Bill No. 378 without my signature.

This bill would require the Controller to refund, on or before April 1, 1999, any amounts lost by cities for possessory interest taxation during the 1997–98 fiscal year due to the collection of in lieu fees from racing associations.

Existing law authorizes horse racing associations, either through on-site or satellite wagering, to pay one-third of 1% of their pari-mutuel wagers to local governments in lieu of paying locally imposed license, business or excise fees and taxes. Essentially, local governments voluntarily accept racing association revenues in lieu of receiving local taxes from the racing associations. This law is intended to ensure that all local taxes are waived when a city or county accepts a percentage of the racing wagers.

The City of Del Mar agreed to accept horse racing wagers in lieu of taxing the racing association. Subsequently, the County of San Diego levied a possessory interest tax upon the association. Then, in 1995, AB 304 (Tucker, Ch. 959) was enacted to clarify that when a possessory interest tax is levied upon a private horse racing association for use of a publicly owned fairground, the possessory interest taxes shall be deducted from the percentage of wagers allocated to local governments. While that measure results in a significant loss of revenues for the City of Del Mar, it maintains the original intent of the law that local

governments accept horse racing dollars in exchange for not levying taxes.

This bill would totally undercut the agreement embodied in the law.

Under existing law, an employee of an independent contractor is protected against harassment by a customer of the independent contractor, or any of the customer's employees, if the employee of the independent contractor is in fact under the control of the customer. The customer in this case would be considered a joint employer. That is as it should be.

But this bill would, among other provisions, seek to extend liability so as to hold employers liable for the harassment of independent contractors.

California's discrimination laws are predicated on the traditional employer and employee relationship, which under both the Labor and Government Codes require certain duties and responsibilities. This bill would give protection against discrimination to non-employees who are independent contractors engaged in independently established businesses with, among other things, the right to control how and when their work is performed.

On this date I have signed Assembly Bill No. 1292.

This bill would enact the Academic Improvement and Achievement Act to provide grants to school districts working in partnership with colleges, businesses, and community organizations to improve student performance and increase college participation.

I am reducing the \$20 million local assistance appropriation because substantial partnership start-up activities required for program eligibility will limit the number of partnerships qualifying for funding during 1998–99. Additionally, the appropriation for the State Department of Education to administer this program and the college preparation programs enacted by AB 2216, AB 2363 and SB 1697 would exceed the department's administrative costs.

Therefore, I am reducing the appropriation in paragraph (a) of Section 2 from \$20,000,000 to \$5,000,000, and I am reducing the appropriation in paragraph (b) of Section 2 from \$300,000 to \$160,000.

SEC. 2(a) The sum of ~~twenty~~ five million dollars ~~(\$20,000,000)~~ (\$5,000,000) is hereby appropriated from the General Fund to the Superintendent of Public Instruction for allocation to local education agencies for the purposes of, and

in accordance with, Chapter 12 (commencing with Section 1020) of Part 7 of the Education Code.

(b) The sum of ~~three~~ one hundred sixty thousand dollars ~~(\$300,000)~~ (\$160,000) is hereby appropriated from the General Fund to the Superintendent of Public Instruction to administer the grants under Chapter 12 (commencing with Section 11020) of Part 7 of the Education Code, under SB 1697 of the 1997–1998 Regular Session if that bill is enacted and takes effect on or before January 1, 1999, under AB 2216 of the 1997–98 Regular Session if that bill is enacted and takes effect on or before January 1, 1999, and under AB 2363 of the 1997–98 Regular Session if that bill is enacted and takes effect on or before January 1, 1999.

This level of funding will provide state subsidies for 37,500 economically disadvantaged students. Although enrollment of economically disadvantaged students in advanced placement courses will continue to grow over time, \$1.5 million will fully fund this program for 1998–99.

SEC. 5. (a) The sum of ~~two~~ one million five hundred thousand dollars ~~(\$2,500,000)~~ (\$1,500,000) is hereby appropriated from the General Fund to the State Department of Education for purposes of Section 52244 of the Education Code.

I am signing Assembly Bill No. 2274 with a deletion.

This bill would require the State Department of Education to collect and summarize data on pupil achievement, outcomes, and characteristics for all alternative education programs in addition to data

on their funding from various sources, and appropriate \$100,000 to the Department of Education for this purpose.

It is my understanding that this bill is in response to my veto of AB 792 (Havice), a 1997 bill that would have established a method to equalize continuation school funding. In my veto message for AB 729, I stated that we needed information on what impact, if any, the different rates of continuation school funding are producing in student outcomes and achievement. The data collection described in this bill would address many of the concerns raised in my veto of AB 729 and could provided the basis for a meaningful evaluation of continuation school funding and effectiveness.

Although I am signing AB 2274, I am deleting Section 2 in its entirety, which includes the \$100,000 General Fund appropriation. The Department of Education should already be collecting the sort of information described in this bill as part of ongoing program evaluation and administration. But since they have failed to collect the most basic information on these programs, I will support this measure. However, I cannot support providing additional funding for the Department of Education to perform an activity that is already within their existing scope of responsibility.

I am signing Assembly Bill No. 1812 with a reduction.

This bill would appropriate monies from the General Fund to the San Joaquin Area Flood Control Agency for the Stockton Metropolitan Area

Flood Control Project, and to San Luis Obispo County for house laterals and infrastructure improvements.

The appropriation for the San Joaquin Area Flood Control Agency exceeds the normal and customary State share of nonfederal costs. Therefore, I am reducing the appropriation contained in Section 1 by \$2,427,000 to reflect the proper amount. The revised appropriation shall be \$12,625,000. The \$12,000,000 provides 70 percent of the projected nonfederal share of \$17,000,000 for the flood control project, and the \$625,000 provides 50% percent of the projected non share of \$1,250,000 for environmental enhancements.

I am deleting section 2 of this bill. This section would have used public monies to fund improvements on private property (i.e house laterals for connection to a sewer system). While numerous sewer collection system projects have been funded by the State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) assistance programs, the costs of installation of the house laterals have always been paid for by the property owners. There is some question as to whether this appropriation is legal, or whether it would constitute a gift of public funds.

This bill would establish a 17-member California Drug-Free Commercial Truck and Bus Driver Task Force which would develop recommendations to improve the State's alcohol and drug policy for commercial truck and bus drivers.

The State's zero tolerance policy for drug and alcohol use by commercial drivers is in place and is being enforced. Rather than establishing a task force to study the issue, the Legislature should have passed legislation to strengthen our zero tolerance policy, and close any loopholes that exist in current law.

In signing this bill, it is my expectation that this task force will act quickly to recommend, and the Legislature will without further delay enact at a minimum mandatory drug testing and increased penalties. The safety of truck drivers and the general motoring public is too important to be put at continued grave risk by 10,000 drivers under the influence of intoxicating drugs, and those who would protect them—but not the public.

This bill would amend the California Marketing Act of 1937 to authorize a California milk marketing order to offer coupons which may be redeemed for private brand name butter or cheese in its promotion efforts under specified circumstances, but only if such offering is incidental to the generic promotion of California milk products and

participation is made available on a nondiscriminatory basis to all retailers and producers of California milk products.

California marketing orders and commissions have played a key role in ensuring the success of agriculture in this state. However, marketing order programs have traditionally been limited to the generic promotion of specific products. They are paid by industry assessment, with the intended purpose of promoting the product, not the brand. A number of producers have expressed concern that expanding this promotion to include private brand or trade name coupons will negatively impact free competition, making it increasingly difficult for small independent brands to compete in the marketplace.

The commendable intent of the sponsors is to update the Act to enable California's milk producers to remain competitive with those from other states. However, the concerns expressed by opponents merit serious and careful attention. This bill contains a two-year sunset, during which the Department of Food and Agriculture must closely monitor and scrutinize the impacts of this provision on the cheese and butter markets. The responsibility is not theirs alone. Industry representatives must cooperate in making information available that will allow a full and complete analysis of all impacts prior to any discussion of reauthorization in the future.

As such, this program should be viewed solely as a pilot. The test will be not only whether it enhances markets for California milk products but does so on the non-discriminatory basis expressly required by the terms of the bill.

I am signing AB 1241 with the following understanding:

This bill provides authority to the Department of Fish and Game and to the Fish and Game Commission that is essential for sound management of marine living resources and sets a new course for fisheries management in California. However, any fair reading of the bill reveals that, due to its ambitious goals as an "organic act" for executive branch regulation, this herculean legislative effort contains some serious flaws that must be addressed in implementation and legislative clean up. As with any effort of this magnitude, a cautious interpretation will be the key to its success.

The current regulatory regime has been relied upon by commercial fishery participants as an orderly and well understood framework for carrying out their livelihoods as commercial enterprises for many years. Any new system must recognize and respect the importance of that order to existing fisheries, and this bill must be implemented in a way that does not undermine that system and create uncertainty and confusion that could destroy the confidence and lawful manner in which most commercial fishing businesses conduct themselves. For that reason, it is imperative that the new policies, fishery management plans, and procedures contained in this bill apply only to the fisheries named in the bill. Those fisheries are the nearshore finfish fishery, the white seabass fishery, emerging fisheries and, to the extent practicable,

fisheries for which the Commission or Department had regulatory authority prior to January 1, 1999. Practicability, in this context, shall be based on the resources available to the Department for scientific research, analysis, scientific review and public participation to meet the standards set in the bill

The procedural requirements of the bill will undoubtedly invite potentially costly processes, that will severely encumber the already limited resources that the Department and Commission have available for acquiring the scientific information for the fishery management plans. This bill, with a narrow exception, creates new duties but no commensurate funding. The small permit fee for nearshore commercial fishing boats will not cover the costs of the fishery management plan for that fishery complex. Corollary legislation that I signed this year authorizes \$2.2 million upon appropriation annually from the Marine Life and Marine Reserve Management Account, beginning in FY 1999–2000, for marine fisheries management. However, the source of funds is uncertain, and may merely represent a redirection of funds within the Department, to the detriment of other legislated mandates. Although the bill states that its provisions apply to the extent that funding is available, expectations may well exceed available resources. There is no question that implementation of the specified fishery management plans and the preparation of the numerous reports are activities which are unfunded in the bill. I am therefore directing the Department to implement the provisions of this bill in proportion to the funds available.

Finally, it must be acknowledged that, even with the scope of the bill's applicability limited to the above named fisheries, this is an ambitious new scientific and regulatory endeavor for the Department and the Commission. The policies in this bill will be thoroughly assessed in the management of these three fisheries and hopefully provide a model for managing additional California fisheries. Because the bill's provisions are untested, time and evaluation are clearly needed to allow every constituency, including the Department and Commission, to ascertain the efficacy of this model before applying it to the entire ocean ecosystem. Therefore, I am also directing the Department to report to the Governor and Legislature by July 1, 1999 and by July 1, 2000 on their evaluation of this new management model, along with recommended legislative changes needed to clarify the terms of this bill and to streamline the administrative procedures it lays out. To assist in the completion of this task, I am directing the Department to establish an advisory committee, comprised of individuals from different parts of the state, representing commercial fishing, recreational fishing, seafood marketing, and academic interests.

On balance, this bill represents an opportunity to create a comprehensive, scientifically grounded, and consistent approach to management of marine fisheries off California's coast. There is sufficient reason to believe that with cautious implementation, the regulatory regime will in fact increase the resource and its harvestability, and thus merits my approval.

On this date I have signed Assembly Bill No. AB 117.

This bill would extend for 18 months the 25-cent-per-tire fee paid by consumers for deposit into the California Tire Recycling Fund (Fund). The revenues generated by this fee are used to promote and develop alternatives to the landfill disposal of whole waste tires, protect the public health and safety and the environment. This bill would require the Integrated Waste Management Board (IWMB) to report on the status of waste tire and programs needed to provide sustainable end uses. It also states that the IWMB should emphasize permitting, enforcement, and cleanup of waste tires when administering the Fund.

To date, the IWMB appears to have done a relatively good job at diverting tires from landfills. However, there remains approximately 15 million tires stockpiled around the state. In the past decade, the most significant reduction in those stockpiled tires has resulted from accidental fires. The most recent fire occurred at the so-called Royster tire pile near Tracy. Collectively, the estimated 9–10 million tires consumed by fire in the recent past, which burn uncontrolled when they catch fire, represent the most egregious threat to the environment. The thick, black smoke degrades air quality with toxic plumes, and the residue poses a potential threat to water as contaminated ash blankets surface water located in the area, and poses the threat of leaching into the soil and finding its way to the groundwater table.

The goal of any environmental regulatory structure is to contain the damage to the environment and then move as quickly as possible to eliminate the threat to public health and safety. Accordingly, as a companion to this bill, I am issuing an Executive Order directing the IWMB and the Department of Finance to consult and coordinate to maximize available reserves in the waste tire account toward cleanup and abatement of stockpiled tires. I am further directing the Waste Board to assess its budgeting priorities and direct the revenue garnered from this fee extension to those purposes that the Legislature has directed it to emphasize.

In this way, further impetus is given to the effect of this bipartisan legislation, and keeps faith with our commitment to environmental stewardship.

Members of the Assembly: As required Chapter 1044, Statutes of 1990, as amended, the Bureau of State Audits presents its audit report concerning the State's use of various procurement methods to acquire goods or services and the administration and oversight of these methods by the Department of General Services (DGS). This report concludes that departments paid higher than necessary costs when they purchased goods through the California Multiple Award Schedules (CMAS) program because they did not always compare value among vendors or negotiate price reductions. Our report also states that departments incurred unnecessary administrative costs by using fiscal agents to obtain services from vendors. Further, we point out that weak DGS oversight of the CMAS program led to reduced assurance that vendors adequately complied with program requirements and that departments paid fair and reasonable prices for goods and services. Similarly, weak oversight of master service agreements contributed to the inappropriate use of this procurement method. Finally, departments may experience confusion and lost staff time when guidance from different DGS divisions is inconsistent.

Members of the Assembly: As requested by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee, the Bureau of State Audits presents its audit report concerning the Cal-Mortgage Loan Insurance Program (Cal-Mortgage), a division of the Office of Statewide Health Planning and Development (OSHPD), that guarantees loans for health facility construction. This report concludes that although many of Cal-Mortgage's clients are high-risk borrowers, it has not used all available information to assess an applicant's financial viability, nor has it established its maximum level of acceptable risk when insuring a borrower. Further, Cal-Mortgage does not effectively monitor its borrowers. Weaknesses in its monitoring include inconsistent methods to oversee borrowers, a lack of formal procedures for this oversight, and insufficient supervision. Finally, because Cal-Mortgage does not have criteria for identifying problem borrowers that require executive management intervention, the director of OSHPD may not be fully aware of the risk present in Cal-Mortgage's portfolio.

Members of the Assembly: As requested by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee, the Bureau of State Audits presents its audit report concerning the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority's (MTA) current and future fiscal outlook, given its debt structure. This report concludes that the MTA has taken a number of steps to ensure that its existing and proposed long-term debt structure is conducive to its overall financial viability and solvency. For example, it has prepared a seven-year restructuring plan for addressing future anticipated deficits that, if carefully monitored, should help in balancing the MTA's future years' budgets. Furthermore, our analysis indicates that the MTA is continuing to ensure that its long-term debt structure falls within prescribed limits for ongoing solvency. The MTA is also projecting local sales tax receipts, a primary source of debt repayment, using more conservative assumptions than in past years.

We found that as of June 30, 1998, the MTA had approximately \$3.2 billion in outstanding long-term debt with aggregate future interest payments totaling \$2.8 billion, and that approximately 24 percent of its fiscal year 1997-98 operating expenditures will go toward servicing its debt. However, the MTA does not prepare analyses justifying the type and composition of its new debt and has yet to issue a formal policy that encompasses its goals and strategies regarding long-term debt. We believe taking these actions would further strengthen the MTA's overall financial viability.

This report concludes that Lahontan is not fulfilling all of its regulatory responsibilities, and uses flawed work plans to manage its workload. In addition, Lahontan has not consistently ensured prompt resolution to water quality violations. Specifically, it did not always follow up on permit violations, take enforcement actions promptly, and escalate enforcement action when dischargers failed to comply with initial actions. Further, this report concludes that the state board needs to more closely and effectively monitor regional boards and could do more to ensure that regional boards consistently address violations of water quality.

STATEMENT OF ASSEMBLY EXPENDITURES PRINTED IN JOURNAL

The following Statement of Assembly Expenditures was ordered printed in the Journal:

Dear Mr. Speaker: Transmitted herewith is the annual report of Assembly expenses. It includes the total expenditures by Member, committee, leadership office, service operation, and overhead according to various categories for the 12-month period ending November 30, 1997. Every expenditure made from the Assembly Operating Fund during this period is accounted for. Additionally, the report includes an itemization, by Member, of per diem expenditures from the General Fund during the same period of time.

It is important to note that this report is compiled on a cash basis. Therefore, the cost of goods and services incurred by a Member during the preceding reporting period but paid for during the current period are included. Furthermore, some goods and services which were received toward the end of this reporting period were not paid for until the beginning of the December 1997–November 1998 reporting period and are, therefore, not included in this expenditure report.

The following indicates the types of expenditures which are included within each classification:

Staff Salary: This includes the salaries paid to all employees in the Member's district office as well as those employees who work in the Member's Capitol office, provided they are not committee or leadership office personnel. The salaries of the latter group of employees are included in the specific detail report for each of the respective committee and leadership offices.

All Assembly personnel are classified according to job descriptions approved by the Assembly Rules Committee. The committee has established specific salary ranges for each of the classifications. The salary within a range for a specific employee reflects a combination of years of service in his or her position and his or her own job performance since the amount of annual merit salary increases is based on evaluations of each employee's work. Thus, a Member whose office staff includes employees with substantial Assembly seniority, and/or outstanding records of service, will have a higher total expenditure for salaries than will a Member who employs more junior personnel.

Member Travel and Per Diem: Separate totals are shown for in-state travel and out-of-state travel. Most in-state travel expenditures are for attendance at interim committee hearings. Out-of-state travel expenditures are generally for participation in conferences dealing with an issue area pertinent to the legislative specialty of the Member or are for investigative trips.

Staff Travel: Almost all expenditures reported, by Member, in this category, are for mileage reimbursements to district office personnel. The staff travel expenditures reported, by committee, are generally costs incurred in connection with interim committee hearings which are generally held away from Sacramento for the convenience of citizens who wish to provide testimony to the committees.

Car Lease: The amount reported in this category is the share of the automotive lease payment made by the Assembly Rules Committee. Assembly policy stipulates that a car will be leased for the legislative use of each Member but that the Assembly will pay only 90% of the monthly lease rate or \$400, whichever is less. The Member must pay the difference from personal funds.

Car Maintenance: The costs reported in this category will vary significantly because of the variance in the number of miles driven by the Members. Members in large-sized districts and Members who represent districts wherein air travel between the Capitol and the district is not practical tend to utilize their cars more than other Members. Accordingly, the maintenance costs of such cars is likely to be higher than for others.

Gas and Oil: Expenditures in this category are for gasoline and oil supplied to cars and private aircraft for legislative business. These costs, too, vary for the same reasons as those affecting car maintenance.

Car Rental, Staff and Member: This expenditure category includes the use of state-owned pool cars and commercial rental cars by both the Member and his/her staff in the course of legislative business.

This category, as listed in the Support Services section of the report, includes, in addition to car rental, the costs of gas, oil, and maintenance for cars utilized by the office of the Sergeant at Arms.

District Office Rent, Maintenance and Utilities: Each Member is entitled to rent an office within the district he/she represents so that constituents may have direct access to their legislators. In some of the larger districts, two or three offices are sometimes authorized. Accordingly, Members representing districts in high-rent metropolitan areas or Members representing large districts requiring more than one office will be reported with higher expenditures in this category than will other Members. Costs included in this expenditure item are rent, utilities (except telephone), janitorial service, and incidental maintenance costs.

Telephone and Telegraph: All telephone charges (except equipment installation charges for the Capitol phones) are reported in this expenditure category. Included are district office phones, Capitol phones, credit card charges, and state lease-line charges. Members who will likely have higher charges than many of their colleagues are those representing districts which are either far from the Capitol, in areas not serviced by the state lease-line network, or in regions which cover large geographic areas.

Postage: The category includes the total amount expended for postage except for the postage utilized in the mailing of legislative mailings.

Communications—Printing and Postage: The costs included in this expenditure category are printing, handling and mailing of legislative mailings authorized under provisions of Proposition 73 of June, 1988.

Furniture and Equipment: This category includes the purchase, rental, and maintenance of certain furniture and equipment items utilized in the Capitol and district offices of the Members. It does not include the purchase of items which will, during the course of their usefulness, be utilized by a number of Members during succeeding years. Expenditures for items of that description are reported in the Furniture and Equipment category as General Overhead expenditures.

Office Supplies: Stationery items, other printing costs charged to the Assembly Operating Fund, general office supplies, and related miscellaneous supplies utilized in the Members' Capitol and district offices are reported in this expenditure category.

Subscriptions and Publications: Each Member is authorized to subscribe to the newspapers generally circulated within his/her district and to certain metropolitan daily newspapers. Members representing districts which include many cities and towns will frequently have higher expenditures in this category than will Members representing relatively compact areas. Expenditures for subscriptions and publications incurred by the committees and leadership offices are reported separately. Each committee is authorized to purchase relevant books and to subscribe to periodicals specializing in the subject matter of the committee for which the expenditure is made.

Miscellaneous Services: Most of the expenditures shown in the Miscellaneous Services category for the Members are for services such as telephone answering services in district offices and newspaper clipping services. Included in this category for the committee reports are such items as witness expenses, meeting expenses, data-processing costs, and other miscellaneous services.

A number of operational costs incurred by the Assembly are not directly attributable to any of the Members, committees, leadership offices, or support services. Such expenditures are classified as General Overhead and are reported according to the following categories:

Miscellaneous Salaries: Accrued vacation payments made to terminating employees, and salaries paid to employees on extended sick leave are reported in this category.

Employee Benefits: This expenditure category includes the Assembly's contribution to the OASDI (Social Security) fund, the Public Employees' Retirement System, various health and dental insurance premiums, the Compensation Insurance Fund, and unemployment and disability insurance.

Building, Rent, Maintenance and Utilities: Reported in this expenditure category are construction and remodeling costs and the rent, maintenance, and utilities for offices (other than Members' individual district offices) utilized and paid for by the Assembly outside the Capitol.

Telephone: This listing is for the cost of telephone equipment installation in all Assembly offices except for the Member's district office.

Furniture and Equipment: The expenditure indicated in this category is for the purchase, rental, and maintenance of furniture and equipment not reported elsewhere in the report. Most furniture and equipment is considered a capital investment which will be used, through the years, by a number of different Members or other offices and can therefore not be appropriately reported as an expense on behalf of any particular Member or office.

Office Supplies: The amount shown in this expenditure category represents office supplies which were purchased by the Assembly for the use of Members and other offices but which were not distributed to any such offices before the end of this reporting period.

Annotated Codes and Law Books: Each Member's office and certain other Assembly offices are furnished with Annotated California Codes and certain other law books. The cost of these books is considered a capital expenditure in the same manner as many furniture and equipment items, and is therefore reported in this General Overhead category.

Meeting Expenses: This expenditure category includes certain costs incurred by the Assembly relative to the conduct of Assembly Sessions and Joint Sessions of the Legislature which cannot be readily charged to any other expenditure category, rental costs for some meeting rooms, and some conference registration fees.

Freight, Moving and Delivery: This expenditure category includes costs incurred for the transport of furniture, supplies, and other items which are not chargeable to any particular office.

Printing Reimbursements: This category reflects the charges made for printing performed by the Assembly.

Other Miscellaneous Services: The major expenditures reported in this category are for the costs of photography services related to official Assembly publications, vehicle liability insurance, and organization memberships.

Study Contracts: From time-to-time the Assembly finds it practical to contract with individuals, firms, universities, and other governmental agencies in order to expand its research capability with respect to specific projects. The costs reported in this category are for payments made under such contracts during this period.

The next report of Assembly expenditures will be for the period between December 1, 1997 and November 30, 1998.

Good afternoon. I want to begin by thanking Senate President pro Tem Bill Lockyer and Assembly Speaker Cruz Bustamante for their kind invitation to jointly address both Houses of the Legislature as you begin a new legislative session. I am very pleased and honored to see so many of my colleagues present from the Supreme Court and the Judicial Council, as well as leaders of the Bar and other special guests.

As Chief Justice of California and leader of the Judicial Branch of Government, I very much appreciate the opportunity to speak to you today about its successes, and the challenges that currently confront it. For me, preparing for this important occasion has provided a time to reflect upon the implications of the actions that we in government contemplate today and the consequences of those actions for the world we will live in tomorrow.

Dwight Eisenhower once observed that "The history of free men is never really written by chance but by choice—their choice." There are many important choices for us to make about the administration of justice in our state in order to ensure its continued independence and effectiveness.

California is known for being in the forefront of changes that cut across *all* aspects of our society. And California's court system has shared that distinction. Over the past ten years, case filings in our Superior Courts have increased by 31 percent. The mix of cases has changed, and the disparity in caseload in various counties has increased as new laws have come on the books.

While the ever increasing diversity of the population we serve represents a great strength and resource of our society, it has required courts to deal with the more than 200 languages spoken in our state—as well as the different understandings and expectations about the administration of justice that individuals bring from every corner of the globe.

The ebb and flow of economic tides have brought more and more unrepresented litigants into our courts, particularly in the family courts, which resolve critical matters such as marital dissolution, child support, and child custody. I was astonished to learn that in an average of 60% of such cases, one party does not have a lawyer, in another 30% neither side has a lawyer, and in only 10% of such cases are *both* sides represented by counsel.

Accompanying the many changes affecting our system is the heightened publicity surrounding court cases. That, in turn, has increased the public's scrutiny of the courts, often *unaccompanied* by much-needed education about the important role that an independent court system plays in our society.

The Judicial Branch has actively responded to the new challenges invoked by these and other changes in society. It has done so in the

face of a fundamental factor in the governmental landscape that has affected *every* aspect of court operations—fewer resources in the face of increased demands. Yet I believe our judicial system has still been able to be very responsive, in part due to the strong cooperation and assistance it has received from the Legislative and Executive Branches of Government.

The underlying theme that flows through all of the Judicial Branch's efforts is a simple one: To keep our courts accessible so they can continue to serve the people of California by providing a fair and objective forum for the adjudication of disputes. With your much appreciated help, our steps to meet this goal have taken numerous paths.

Last year, for example, you created twenty-one new trial court judgeships and five new appellate court judgeships. These were the first new judicial positions in almost ten years. The budget also provided funds to establish a "Three Strikes Relief Team." This designated group of retired judges has been specially trained to provide assistance to courts that have seen increasing backlogs due to the impact of three strikes legislation. Beginning this month, I will be assigning 22 relief team judges to nine courts for periods lasting from four weeks to four months.

The Judicial Council's Court Profiles Committee extensively reviews court operations statewide to assess the need for new judgeships. Last year, it identified a need for 61 positions, and we were pleased that the judgeships that were created tracked the priority set by the committee's recommendations. An acute need for additional trial court judgeships remains, and this year you will be asked to consider creating the remaining 40 of these most needed new positions.

With your help last year, the ballot information regarding appellate court positions was reformed. As promised, the Judiciary is developing methods to provide useful, easily available supplemental information to the voters.

Last year saw enactment of Assembly Member Bill Morrow's AB 195, a bill designed to expedite the record correction process in capital appeals, which are brought directly to the Supreme Court. Our court is very concerned with the problem of unrepresented defendants on death row—147 at last count—and we hope that in the coming session you will carefully consider measures coming before you that can help alleviate this problem.

The Legislature also has played a critical role in setting the stage for what has proved to be a highly effective development in court reorganization. The Trial Court Realignment and Efficiency Act of 1991, together with amendments and refinements to that Act and the Judicial Council's adoption of extensive rules, provided impetus to instituting comprehensive coordination efforts statewide. Local courts have been required to determine how best to coordinate the use of all available administrative and judicial resources across Superior and Municipal Court lines.

Some 18 counties are substantially fully coordinated. For Example, in Sacramento, Riverside, San Mateo, Marin, San Bernardino, Napa, and Solano, the Superior and Municipal Courts share court administrators and clerk's office employees. They use the cross-assignments of judicial officers from each level of trial court,

under the direction of a single presiding judge, to perform the entire range of judicial functions, as needed.

The benefits are clear. Coordination eliminates redundant case processing. It reduces costs for courts, litigants, and taxpayers alike. Coordination enables courts to best use all resources, helping them to better weather budget cuts, and affording greater flexibility. At the same time, because fashioning a coordination program is a local enterprise, the governing statewide standards and guidelines allow accommodation to local conditions.

Overseeing the coordination process is the Judicial Council, which is the constitutionally created entity charged with oversight of the Judicial Branch. It has responsibility for adopting rules and procedures for the courts. As Chief Justice of California, I chair the Council, and I am joined by 14 additional judges, four members of the State Bar, and two legislators. Last year, Senator Charles Calderon and Assembly Member Bill Morrow provided valuable insight and information as your designated members on the Council. Court administrators and others play a vital role as advisory members.

The staff arm of the Judicial Council is the Administrative Office of the Courts. It provides a wide range of support to the Judicial Council and the courts. The AOC is very ably led by its talented and dedicated director, Bill Vickrey, who along with staff from the AOC's Office of Governmental Affairs, led by our very capable Ray Lebov, are known to most of you as frequent visitors to your offices on behalf of the courts.

The Council relies on the work of several specialized advisory committees, whose members are drawn from the ranks of the Judiciary, the Bar, and the public. Over 300 volunteers devote substantial time and expertise to studying and making recommendations about diverse facets of the practices and procedures governing our judicial system.

I have had first hand exposure to the success of the coordination efforts statewide, not only from my vantage point as chair of the Council, but also due to a commitment I made soon after becoming Chief Justice. I resolved to visit the courts in every county—something, I am told, that no prior Chief Justice of our state had set out to do. There are those who have suggested that perhaps I should be committed for having made such a commitment, but by the end of 1996, I had journeyed to 20 of the 58 counties. I hope to visit the courts in the remaining 38 counties by the end of this year. It has been a truly invigorating and inspiring enterprise.

Although before becoming Chief Justice I had served 24 years as a judge at all levels, from Municipal Court on up, I embarked on this outreach effort in order to gain a more direct sense of the issues facing the courts statewide—and to share with the courts my vision for the future of our branch of government. As part of this undertaking, I also have met with legislative leadership and the Governor and others in the Executive Branch, as well as different constituencies in the Bar—prosecutors and criminal defense, plaintiffs bar and civil defense, representatives of county government, and the press. As a former president of the California Judges Association, it has also been important to me to forge a close working relationship between that important organization and the Judicial Council. My overall goal is to foster continuing, active,

informed dialogue about how we can ensure that California's judicial system will be prepared to serve our citizens into the next century.

In addition to my efforts, members of the Judicial Council will be personally visiting different court locations to learn more about court activities across the state. They will also be sending written updates on the Council's efforts to the courts in their area. We hope to enhance and encourage the free flow of information to and from the Judicial Council and all interested sources.

Those are only a few of the actions our judicial system has taken to ensure it remains responsive and capable of anticipating and meeting the challenges that face it. We have moved ahead with many other initiatives as well. The Council's operations cover subjects that range from court interpreters to cameras in the courts. Its educational arm, the Center for Judicial Education and Research, along with the Judicial Administration Institute of California, offers an ever broader list of courses on substantive and administrative skills. A statewide court community planning workshop scheduled for September will bring together—from each county—teams of judges, administrators, Bar members, and members of the public. They will learn about innovative programs and how to plan for the future of their local courts. The goal is to increase community involvement in court planning and operations.

In cooperation with the State Bar, the Council also is working to increase pro bono representation by California's attorneys. I could go on at greater length—but mercifully will not—listing the many activities of the Council, the AOC, and our local courts. Our focus is to create *statewide* standards that accommodate *local* differences. The idea is *not* to micro-manage the local courts, but to provide a framework for improvement and service to the public. With these goals in mind, I would like to turn to what lies ahead.

Harry Truman once stated: "We don't propose, like some people, to meet today's problems by saying they don't exist, and tomorrow's problems by wishing that tomorrow wouldn't come." The Judicial Branch has shown that it too is committed to dealing with the problems of today, anticipating and planning for what lies ahead, and looking forward to tomorrow—all with the understanding and assistance of our sister branches of government.

One area that clearly needs improvement is information management. The courts utilize an incompatible, insufficient mix of data processing and hand-collected information systems. Discordant and too often non-existent capabilities make it difficult to collect and manage the information that all three branches of government need in order to accurately plan for the future of the courts—or to assess the impact of changes once made.

After completing a review of automation systems used in courts across the country as well as in California, the Judicial Council's advisory committee on technology has laid out a plan to bring the courts into the 20th and 21st centuries. Local county plans have been completed during the past year. Data standards will be adopted this summer. It is essential that we seize the opportunity now to advance in this area. If we do not, our courts will be locked in a Tower of Babel, unable to effectively learn from or communicate with one another—or to provide the Legislative and Executive Branches and the public with complete and up-to-date information concerning the

operations of our courts and their caseloads.

Another critical area that needs attention is the confidence of the public in our courts. Public perceptions about the courts are colored not only by press reports on sensational cases, but also by the experiences of citizens called to jury service—the only direct contact that most citizens have with our court system. It has become increasingly clear that the call to jury service frequently is ignored and—when answered—may breed only frustration and resentment. Adverse experiences with the jury system too often can prolong the resolution of cases and lead to disrespect for all parts of our government.

The Judicial Council's Blue Ribbon Commission on Jury System Improvement identified a host of ways to enhance the experience of jurors. The report revealed that the overall yield of jurors reporting for service ranged from a low of five percent in one major metropolitan county (a figure I understand has somewhat improved more recently) to over 60 percent in some of our more rural counties. Over 1.6 million citizens report for jury service every year.

Some proposed measures will cost the state money—increasing juror compensation, paying for mileage, reimbursing parking, meal, and child and dependent care expenses. Others, such as encouraging local officials to negotiate with local transportation providers to offer free public transportation to jurors already have been tried with some success in counties as disparate as Stanislaus and San Diego. The cost is minimal to the transportation company, while the benefit to the system in good will is high.

One approach successfully used in several venues is to limit service to one day, one trial. Once a juror appears, he or she needs serve only on one case, and if not selected that day, is dismissed for the year. Another possible initiative would be to encourage public and private employers to continue to pay salaries while employees serve on juries. Some employers already do. An increasing number do not. For private employers, offering reasonable tax credits or similar inducements—acknowledging their contribution to the public benefit—may prove persuasive. We must explore and encourage implementation of these and related measures that will restore the public's willingness to participate and its confidence in our jury system. Senate Bill 14, introduced by Senator Calderon, and the governor's budget each contain a number of these proposals.

As I mentioned earlier, the underlying theme of the Judicial Branch's efforts is providing a fair and accessible system of justice. This past year saw the release of the Council's report on the implementation of recommendations to address problems involving gender bias. The Council's Special Advisory Committee on race and ethnic bias will make its report and recommendations to the Council this month.

On an ongoing basis, the Council's advisory committee on access and fairness continues to gather information and formulate appropriate responses to problems involving all forms of bias, including adequate access for the disabled.

Meaningful access also is implicated by the increase in litigants without counsel who appear each day in our courts. "Family Court 2000" is a program developed by the Judicial Council's Family and Juvenile Law Advisory Committee. It includes proposals to

simplify procedures while protecting the parties' rights, to increase access to legal services, and to encourage settlement of disputes through alternative means such as mediation, negotiation, and arbitration when possible. The committee will submit recommendations to the Council in 1997.

Already, Ventura County is experimenting with providing a user-friendly information kiosk and easy to understand forms to assist litigants in family court.

For the past three years, the Council has focused on another aspect of family law: Domestic violence. Just a few days ago, the Council held the second annual reunion of its original state conference on family violence and the courts. This conference brought together—and continues to unite—representatives from district attorneys' offices, battered women groups, probation departments, social workers, police officers, and other professionals in the field to work with courts to formulate coordinated programs to prevent family violence and to address it comprehensively when it does occur.

Similarly, Court-Appointed Special Advocate—or CASA—programs provide a model of how new approaches can reap important benefits. CASA projects provide court-appointed lay community volunteers who assist children and the courts during the long and often confusing dependency process.

The troubling problem of juvenile delinquency also is being reviewed. The Judicial Council's Family and Juvenile Law Advisory Committee is exploring access to possible alternative dispositions, and providing appropriate care, treatment, and guidance consistent with holding youngsters accountable for their behavior and protecting the public.

The actions our Judicial Branch has taken and will continue to pursue are intended to continue the tradition of a responsive, fair, and accessible system of justice for the benefit of the people of California. We are heeding Lord Macaulay's admonition: "Reform, that you may preserve."

You have heard just a few of the many initiatives that can produce major effects on the future operation of the courts. Although the Judicial Branch is focusing on several individual areas of reform, the one reform necessary for success in preserving our fundamental system of justice is ensuring a stable, adequate source of funding for the courts.

Historically, funding for California's court system developed on a piecemeal basis. Before 1988, the state funded only basic benefits for trial court judges, and a few selected programs. Starting with the Brown-Presley Trial Court Funding Act of 1988, the state committed to increased funding through block grants based upon the number of judicial positions in each county.

The Trial Court Realignment and Efficiency Act of 1991 provided increased state funding, with a goal of an increase of five percent each year to 70 percent by 1995-96. That percentage has yet to be met. Last fiscal year saw the state providing only approximately 35 percent of court funding—and this year saw the dramatic decline in the state General Fund contribution reach 65.5 percent, plummeting from \$507 million in fiscal year 1990-1991 to \$175 million today.

In 1992, the Trial Court Budget Commission, under the supervision of the Judicial Council, was established to oversee the trial court budget development process and to prepare an annual state court budget. The process has been refined, and a functional budgeting process was launched in 1994-95. Through the work of the Trial Court Budget Commission, the Council for the first time collected statewide data on costs and expenditures.

But the effective use of the Commission's work has been stymied. Over the years, the bifurcated system that divides responsibility for court funding between the state and the counties has led to more and more problems, with the courts sometimes falling between the cracks. The budget process has become a full-time burden for the courts, which must deal with two separate, uncoordinated systems with neither having clear funding responsibility. Planning—both local and statewide—of necessity is often piecemeal and tentative. There is no one mechanism to hold courts accountable for the administration of justice statewide—and no flexibility for courts to address urgent needs.

The administration of justice is perhaps the most fundamental service provided by government. I firmly believe that the quality of justice cannot and must not be allowed to vary county to county, dependent upon the ability and willingness of each county to adequately fund its courts in the face of the other growing demands upon county government.

During the last legislative session, a remarkable consensus was achieved. Together, you—the Legislature—the Governor, the counties, the courts, law enforcement, and the various segments of the Bar, hammered out an agreement not only on the concept of state funding for the trial courts, but also on a precise mechanism by which to achieve it.

AB 2553, introduced last year, would have embodied this solution. Under this proposal, the state agreed to assume full responsibility for funding the trial courts—including future growth—and capped county payments, required counties to continue funding certain functions, and provided further assistance to small counties.

Some new revenues were to be obtained through civil filing fees that were acceptable to various components of the Bar. Cities and counties agreed to split the growth in fine revenues.

In the final hours of the legislative session, however, the bill failed because of disagreement over an issue relating to meet-and-confer requirements for court employees. The Judicial Council, along with many others in the Judiciary, the counties, the Bar, and our sister branches of government, has been actively seeking to resolve this problem in a manner acceptable to all parties involved. The Judicial Council is working on a Rule of Court, which would be adopted by the Council pursuant to statutory direction in the trial court funding bill. We firmly believe this would be just as enforceable as a statutory provision and would, while protecting the fair and reasonable expectations of court employees, reasonably preserve the ability of the courts to manage their own affairs.

We should not and must not halt the momentum toward fashioning a much-needed, permanent long-term solution. We must for once and for all put an end to the yearly crisis plaguing all 3 branches of government caused by the courts having to run to you for more

money as they face the imminent closing of the courtroom doors.

A letter I received last month from the Alpine Superior Court anticipates that this month will see "A total shutdown of the courts in our county until such time as state funding becomes available. We have no money for jury trials, courts reporters, courthouse and courtroom security, [and] interpreters . . . ; shortly after the first of the year we will have no funds with which to meet payroll."

The Judicial Council anticipates the courts in as many as 8 counties possibly closing this month and sending layoff notices to employees. Courts may close in 8 more small to medium sized counties in February. By mid-March, the situation will be critical, with the courts in another 11 counties in jeopardy, and by April the courts in 24 additional counties—or a possible total of 51 out of 58 counties—will be in a crisis situation.

Last year saw the need for enactment of a supplemental emergency appropriation for the courts—SB 99—which was used to bail out not only the courts in smaller counties but those in large counties as well, including Los Angeles. The renewed threat of closed courts must not be taken lightly. It is a real and imminent threat to the fundamental functioning of government and thus to the well-being of the public we serve. And such a hand-to-mouth existence is no way to administer justice in our great state.

Bills now pending in both houses of the Legislature, introduced by Senator Lockyer, Senator Johannessen, and Assembly Member Pringle, would revive the agreement reached last year and translate it into reality. I pledge, personally and on behalf of the Judicial Council, to continue to work unceasingly to see state funding implemented.

A justice system that must focus *not* on what is deserved and required by the people we serve, but simply on keeping its doors open day-to-day, cannot effectively perform its functions. An independent judicial system is one in which the courts are able to decide the cases that come before them, free of external influences or fear of fiscal or political retribution. An independent judicial system is the cornerstone of our democratic system of government. Insufficient, inconsistent, and uncertain funding for our courts threatens to erode that foundation.

You possess the tools to strengthen that system and to ensure the highest quality administration of justice for the people of California. We have the largest judiciary in the western world (almost 1,600 judges—almost double the size of the federal judiciary) and I believe the finest judiciary anywhere. Yet the total segment of state funds dedicated to supporting the courts this year amounts to less than 1% of the state budget. The structural reforms necessary to provide reliable state support for the courts are before you. We must not let this opportunity pass. We must not fail in our collective responsibility to ensure the stability of one of our three co-equal branches of government.

I know that together we can ensure the successful operation of our court system far into the future. On behalf of the Judicial Branch, I thank you for the many actions you have undertaken to assist our branch in fulfilling our mandate to serve the public. I appreciate the time that many of you have given me and others to discuss the concerns and aspirations of the Judicial Branch, and that you have

spent visiting your local courts and meeting with our judges. For those of you who have not yet participated in our Day on the Bench Program, I urge you to do so—it can be a real eye-opener.

I look forward to working with you in the years ahead. I know that together we can and will continue to preserve and enhance the ability of our courts to render accessible justice to all.

I am grateful for your invitation to speak to you today. I hope you will be able to join me and members of the Judicial Council, the Bar, and the AOC staff at our annual reception for the Legislative and Executive Branches which will shortly follow this event, at the basement level of the Capitol Rotunda, and offer more information about the many activities in our courts. Let me close by wishing you all a productive legislative session and a happy, healthy, and congenial new year.

Good afternoon. It is a great pleasure to be here today. I want to thank Senator Lockyer and Speaker Bustamante for their invitation to address you on the State of the Judiciary. I also extend congratulations to Senator Burton and Assembly Member Villaraigosa on their new leadership posts. And I want to acknowledge the presence and contributions of members of the Supreme Court, of the Judicial Council and chairs of its advisory committees, and leaders of the Bar who are with us today.

Most of all, I want to begin by expressing my great appreciation to you—the leaders and members of both Houses of the Legislature—as well as Governor Wilson, for the extraordinary contributions you made last year to the administration of justice in our state. The enactment of the Trial Court Funding Act in the final moments of last year's legislative session inaugurated a fundamental alteration in the structure of the Judicial Branch. It constitutes one of the most important reforms for the California courts this century.

Your efforts have made it possible for the Judicial Branch to look forward to the next century confident that a stable and adequate source of funding will enable us to provide fair and accessible justice for all Californians. The strong leadership of Senator Lockyer, Assembly Member Escutia, and then-Minority Leader Pringle guided this historic change. But, momentous policy changes such as these require the prolonged efforts of many. In this case, it was a team effort in which many of you played roles that were essential to attaining this important goal. On behalf of the Judicial Branch and those we serve, I congratulate you and thank you for your farsighted and public-spirited action.

When I last spoke to you just over a year ago, I was in the midst of my visits to the courts in each of the fifty-eight counties of our state. I completed my journeys last August, one year after I began them, having met with judges, court administrators, staff, members of the bar, and often local officials, in each county. I also visited the justices and staff of the six courts of appeal and the two active native american courts in our state. These unprecedented visits provided me with a unique and personal look at courts across the state, their needs, and their accomplishments.

There are two main impressions from these visits that have stayed with me and that I want to share with you. First, the history of inadequate and uncertain funding all too often has substantially hobbled the ability of courts to serve the public at the level it deserves. My visits heightened my resolve to work unceasingly to make adequate and stable state funding a reality—and now that this top priority has been achieved, to ensure that it is implemented in a way that fulfills its promise. We must work together to provide the necessary resources for California's courts to provide the finest administration of justice necessary to protect and serve the public.

Second, and perhaps more importantly, I learned from my meetings that, despite significant barriers and challenges, the creativity,

dedication, and commitment of those who serve in the Judicial Branch has been and remains our most valuable asset. It is with great pride that I assure you that these individuals, whether from tiny counties like Alpine with only one superior court judge and one municipal court judge, to enormous Los Angeles with hundreds of judicial officers, stand ready, willing, and able to make the most of the opportunities available to them in serving the public.

Judges and staff up and down the state work in conditions that demand fortitude, courage, and selflessness. In a one-judge court in San Luis Obispo, I visited a court that had been the site of an armed hostage confrontation a few years before. Since then, no funds have been available to provide an adequate security system. So, today stacks of law books placed in front of the bench serve not as a research source but as a protective barrier. Unfortunately, such measures are not unique—judges in other counties have had to resort to similar steps for protection.

Security is a significant issue up and down the state. Some courts have no metal detectors. In others, equipment is standing idle because there are no funds to operate it. In some courts, handcuffed defendants must be transported through the clerk's office or through public hallways where litigants, witnesses, jurors, and the general public await court proceedings.

In some counties, there are not enough bailiffs to protect every courtroom. This is a particular problem in family law courts, where the greatest incidence of in-court violence has occurred over the past several years. Witnesses, parties, judges, and lawyers, all have fallen victim to in-court violence. Our courts, which should be a haven for reasoned dispute resolution, too often are sites where dangerous emotions flare. The public, litigants, staff, and judges must be protected and feel secure. Our courthouses must be bastions that protect public safety in every sense, not locations where people are at physical risk of harm.

I found many courts struggling to keep their doors open for a five-day week because of the inadequacy of funds available for staffing. Hopefully, this situation will not recur now that state trial court funding has been enacted. I encountered several courts whose employees had not had cost-of-living raises for extended periods, and were attempting to cope with the extra burden created by numerous vacant positions. I saw the Chambers of a Plumas County judge that had been fashioned out of a converted mop closet. And in Huntington Park's courthouse in Los Angeles County, I found one individual, Commissioner Gilbert Lopez, whose situation in many ways symbolizes how the best of our system can rise above the worst.

On the downside, the much needed additional courtroom occupied by Commissioner Lopez had to be created from the jury assembly room, and his Chambers were fashioned from space appropriated from a public restroom. When this reconstruction was completed, no money was left to furnish either area, and this is where some of the best comes in. The Commissioner, in his home workshop and at his own expense, built the jury box, bench, and bailiff's desk for his courtroom, and the furniture for his Chambers. His can-do spirit and concrete contribution provide a tangible symbol of the willingness of judicial officers and staff

to take that extra step far beyond their job descriptions to make sure that the system can function and the public can be properly served.

As we begin implementation of trial court funding, the next major enterprise will be to provide adequate physical facilities for the courts. Court facilities—like safe schools and highways—are a vital part of California's infrastructure. The Public deserves not only to be safe, but also to see its business transacted in a setting that comports with the importance that the proceedings bear to the lives of so many individuals. The public deserves courthouses in which access to the effective, orderly administration of justice is a given, not a challenge.

AB 233, The bill creating the state funding plan, provides for a task force to survey current courthouse facilities and recommend necessary improvements and additions. I anticipate—from my personal observations—that this task force will discover that these needs are great. Basic facilities have been neglected to an extent that many courts are severely hindered in their ability to administer justice. In fact, some court facilities are in such poor shape they are in imminent danger of being flattened by the next major earthquake.

My mention, a moment ago, of the Commissioner's courtroom carved out of a jury Assembly room highlights another grave difficulty for our courts and for the public's perception of the Judicial Branch—indeed of the public's perception of government as a whole: The poor way jurors frequently are treated under our current system. The pervasive message too often is that we neither respect the contributions of jurors, nor value their time. Inadequate facilities are only one part of problem.

When I obeyed a jury summons and reported for duty in a Los Angeles County courthouse last June, I took my seat on the floor with others as we waited for the jury assembly room to open up. And I observed in my courthouse visits across the state that juror facilities frequently are too small, do not provide basic services for those waiting, and may not even be clean. There are very few individuals who would willingly spend day after day in a molded plastic seat under fluorescent lights with no place to relax, receiving scant information about what is expected of them or why they must wait. Nor do those subjected to such conditions leave with a sense of a judicial system that is attentive to the public's needs.

The Judicial Council's Commission on Jury System Improvement, with a diverse membership from the courts and the public, has provided a wide-ranging series of suggestions for improving the experience of those called for jury service and increasing the number of individuals who respond to a jury summons ready and willing to serve. The Judicial Council has adopted some of the Commission's suggestions and has sought your help in creating the statutory changes required to enable others to be implemented.

The need to increase the number of our citizens participating as jurors is clear—in one county the response rate to summons dipped as low as six percent. That situation is simply unacceptable and has disturbing ramifications for our concept of participatory democracy and may help explain some of the unexpected jury verdicts that we hear about.

A variety of measures to increase and improve the level of participation by our citizens in jury duty already are being explored. Although the telephone on-call system used by some courts, including the one to which I was summoned, is far superior to requiring the juror's

presence at the courthouse for up to two weeks at a time, it still makes it impossible for jurors and their employers to plan with certainty. The approach that I favor is called the one-day-or-one-trial system used in many courts: A juror, once summoned, appears at the courthouse. If selected for a jury, his or her service for that trial satisfies the juror's obligation for the year. If not selected for a trial that day, the juror is excused and the one-day appearance fulfills the juror's obligation for the year.

One improvement that courts cannot achieve without your assistance involves increasing juror pay from the measly statutory \$5 per day now available—a low among the states—to a more meaningful figure. Other steps urged by the Council, such as providing reimbursement for child or dependent care if necessary to enable the juror to serve, paying adequately for meals, parking, and transportation, or, as San Diego and Stanislaus counties already have done, arranging with local mass transportation providers to offer free service to and from the courthouse to anyone who displays juror identification, can have a tremendous impact by reinforcing for the public the fact that we in government consider jury service to be an important public duty.

Some years ago, jury exemptions, which then applied haphazardly to numerous classes of individuals, were wiped off the books by the Legislature. You did so recognizing that our justice system requires jury pools that are truly representative of our population.

Lack of necessary support for the fundamental jury structure in county after county has undermined that message. Many courts are taking the steps they can without statutory authority or additional resources to improve conditions.

But they can go only so far. That is where your role comes in. I am pleased that you have before you bills that would enact some of the reforms that I have just recommended. I urge you to consider providing adequate funds and authorization to ensure that our jury system becomes more representative of the people of our state, treats those who come to serve with respect, and ultimately enhances the public's confidence in our entire system of government.

For many individuals, jury service is their primary contact with government, and they base their attitude toward our entire system on their experience with that process. In short, this is not simply a court problem—it is a state government problem.

Another aspect of jury service that the Judicial Council presently is reviewing is jury instructions. Often, the instructions given to jurors by the judge at the conclusion of the trial are couched in arcane, antiquated language. Jurors must spend unnecessary time and effort determining what the instructions mean before attempting to apply them to the particular case.

I have appointed a special task force to review instructions given in both criminal and civil cases, and to translate them into clear, accurate, and easily understandable language. As legislators, each day you are confronted with the challenge of using language carefully to obtain the result you intend as you draft and amend bills. I am certain you can appreciate the difficulty and delicacy of our task and how important it is that the job be done properly.

Language is important in another way as well. More than 200 languages are spoken in our state, and over 120 require translation in our courts on any given day. Adequate court interpreter services are

fundamental to providing access to the courts and crucial to the integrity of judicial proceedings. Basic comprehension of the system that judges your fate is fundamental to our notion of justice. But in many counties, courts are stymied by the lack of available, qualified interpreters and consider this to be their number one problem.

We have request funds through a deficiency appropriation to cover the cost of growth in interpreter services this year, and have asked for further funding for next year's anticipated growth, and to permit a much deserved raise in rates that will make them more competitive with what is paid for interpreter services in the federal courts in this state. Let's make use of our increasingly multi-cultural society and attract young people into this vital profession.

Another facet of facilitating court communication, both internally and with the public, involves improving the ability of courts to utilize available technology. To plan effectively for the future of our judicial system, we need data that right now is unavailable. When you enter a local department store, they can tell you how many pairs of pants in a particular size and color are available within the store and in all stores in the chain across the United States. Commonplace inventory control and tracking easily provide the specific information retailers use to make projections and meet needs.

Walk into a courthouse and ask how many third-strike cases are pending on the criminal docket, and you most likely will be told that the information you seek is not available. Nor does cumulative data on a statewide level exist. This situation is further complicated by the incompatibility of much of the technology that is in place. In some locations, modern technology is a fact of life. In others, it is a distant dream.

The inconsistent development of data systems throughout the state frequently makes it impossible for courts to communicate within their own courthouse walls, with other courts, with the Judicial Council, with other public safety agencies, or with the public. The Judicial Branch often finds itself hampered in its planning process, and in assisting your Legislative Analyst and the Governor's Finance Department in their planning efforts, by our inability to provide you with meaningful caseload data.

Changes are underway to help cure this major barrier to effective planning and to responsive access for those we serve. A Judicial Council task force on technology is developing uniform data standards to improve our ability to collect information and to communicate among different systems. Techniques, such as document-scanning and creating records on computer discs, will facilitate case processing at every level.

We must have a plan for rational use of the available tools or we will not be able to realize their potential. Instead we will increase the risk of creating a twenty-first century, electronic version of the Tower of Babel.

When they can, courts are using technology to communicate directly with the public. State and local electronic bulletin boards allow litigants and lawyers to learn the status of a case or acquire general court data rather than requiring them to locate and interrupt a court clerk. The Judicial Council's website contains information about our statewide court system and provides instantaneous access to just-filed published California appellate court opinions.

Courts are providing interactive kiosks at which litigants and members of the public can obtain forms and information about how to

proceed in a particular legal action. In some counties, in up to sixty percent of family law cases one party lacks legal representation and in another thirty percent neither side has Counsel. The need to assist unrepresented defendants in a number of areas, including obtaining protective orders in domestic violence cases, was a theme I heard repeated by courts, local government and Bar leaders, and citizens across the state.

You have placed a great deal of trust in us by establishing a system of state funding—now I hope you will ensure that we possess the tools necessary to responsibly discharge our obligations and to provide you and the people of our state with a truly fair and accessible justice system in every venue, every day.

The judicial system is not relying on the wonders of technology alone to improve communication internally and with outside constituencies. Courts increasingly have realized that the duty to administer justice requires extending activities beyond the courtroom door.

The courts have realized the importance of ongoing dialogue with our sister branches of government and with the public. A Judicial Council task force on court-community outreach currently is exploring ways for courts to communicate more effectively with the public. It has held statewide hearings, and its recommendations and findings will provide the groundwork for an upcoming local court-community planning conference to more effectively involve the public in their courts.

I have participated in community forums in various parts of the state, including one in Orange County at the request of Assembly Member Bill Morrow and one in South Central Los Angeles at the request of Assembly Member Kevin Murray. And others from the Judicial Council are now visiting courts and communities around the state, to listen and learn.

The Judicial Branch has been a leader in studying problems arising from bias—real or perceived—in the court system, based on gender, ethnicity, race, sexual orientation, and disability—undertaking these studies at its own initiative. Not only have we had task forces studying these issues, but the Council has a permanent access and fairness advisory committee committed to learning more about these matters and providing the means to ensure that all Californians receive fair and equal access to our courts. We have focused on implementing the recommendations of our task forces so their reports do not merely gather dust on the shelf.

Courses based on findings and recommendations from the various studies are part of the developing core curriculum of the center for judicial education and research, which provides education for judges and court staff. Ensuring appropriate and effective communication with litigants, witnesses, and the public within the courts themselves is a principal aim of these efforts.

Relationships between the Judicial Branch and the Legislative and Executive Branches also have been a focus for our Branch. As one of three co-equal Branches of Government, the Judicial Branch appreciates the need to cooperate with, to inform, and to work with you in as many areas as possible.

Of course, the Judicial Branch differs in some fundamental ways from its sisters branches. The Legislative and Executive Branches are necessarily and properly political in nature, and responsiveness to the public and to political pressure are basic tenets of the role you play. The

framers of our Federal and State Constitutions provided the Judicial Branch with a very different role. The Judiciary interacts with the people's will only through the medium of the statutes and constitutional provisions that have been crafted by others, and the facts and arguments litigants bring to us in their actions.

It is only natural that each Branch of our State Government eyes the other two Branches through the lens of its own experience and obligations—and that this circumstance sometimes results in confusion or misunderstanding about particular actions or motives. Improved communications help all of us to better appreciate the different, complementary, and both independent and interdependent roles that we play in our democratic system of government.

Improved communication among our Branches in recent years has contributed to the enactment of many additional measures that are of particular importance to the Judicial Branch. Assembly Bill 195, effective in January of 1997, made substantial changes in the procedure for certification of the record in death penalty appeals. This important bill by Assembly Member Bill Morrow, is helping attack a root cause of delay in the processing of automatic appeals from death penalty judgments—the second of my priorities after trial court funding.

The Judicial Branch has been developing strategies to make the most effective use of this new provision, including a recent training program on the new requirements put on by Supreme Court staff for 150 participants. In addition, a project is now underway to ensure accurate reporting to you on the implementation of the bill by the trial courts.

Another major cause of delay in death penalty appeals remained even after enactment of AB 195, however. In the last legislative session, you and the Governor adopted a measure that will help solve a problem that has proved most intractable and troubling: Providing counsel for those under sentence of death. More than 160 individuals remain on death row without legal representation and therefore with cases that cannot be processed. The result is delay that unfairly affects the families and loved ones of victims, and defendants as well, and invariably reflects negatively on the integrity of the entire justice system.

Senate Bill 513, authored by Senator Lockyer, will make a difference. By increasing the pool of attorneys available to handle these matters and enhancing their compensation, the bill directly addresses some of the impediments to processing death penalty appeals in a timely fashion.

We have been working diligently to fully implement this legislation. Change will not occur overnight—the problem is complex and difficult—but I am confident that it will occur soon.

Another area in which you recently have been responsive is in providing the first new judgeships in almost ten years. In addition to the new judgeships created in 1996, forty new trial court positions were authorized last year but remain to be funded this year. Filling these positions is a vital step toward improving the administration of justice.

The fact that the courts have been able to stay as current as they have without much in the way of added resources during the past several years can be credited to their ability to break free of entrenched tradition and practice and adapt to current circumstances. I refer specifically to the tremendous progress that our Municipal and Superior Courts have made toward coordinating their use of all available administrative and

judicial resources under existing statutes and court rules adopted by the Judicial Council.

Many county court systems are now fully coordinated: In those courts, administrative duplication has been eliminated, procedures have been streamlined, and all judges are now available for assignment where they can be most productive and effective. In most remaining counties, major strides toward increased coordination have been made, and progress continues.

On the ballot in June is Senate Constitutional Amendment 4, now designated as Proposition 220. It will permit courts, on a county-by-county basis and upon a majority vote of the judges of each level of Trial Court, Municipal and Superior, to fully unify. Unification will dispense with all distinctions between these courts, thereby providing better service to the public and savings to taxpayers. SCA 4 is the final logical step in the move toward increased coordination that the Legislature has urged since its enactment of the Trial Court Realignment and Efficiency Act of 1991.

One critical area for the courts that you can expect to hear me discuss in the years ahead is the tension developing between private judging and the public courts. A variety of concerns have arisen as the use of private judges has expanded. Does the availability of these alternative mechanisms siphon off too much of the support needed for the maintenance of an efficient and viable public judicial system? Some fear the perception of a two-track system of justice where those who can afford it will pick the private judge of their choice and obtain a fast-track resolution of their dispute, relegating to our public courts those persons unable to afford private judges and those defendants and victims involved with criminal offenses.

There will always be a place for a variety of alternative methods of dispute resolution such as arbitration, mediation, and private judging. Nonetheless, an effective public justice system is absolutely crucial. By affording equal and fair and accessible justice to all, it knits together the diverse strands of our society. By issuing published opinions that establish precedent, it guides the actions of business entities and individuals as they go about their daily lives. It provides predictability and stability. It is part of the bedrock of our society that we must protect lest it be undermined.

We have not yet seen a thorough evaluation of the impact on the judicial system of the growing use of alternative dispute resolution methods. Tomorrow, I will announce appointment of a special task force to begin studying issues such as the difficult one of whether, how, and by whom private judging should be regulated and to report its findings and recommendations to the Judicial Council.

Private judging has had an impact on another aspect of the administration of justice—the retention of experienced judicial officers within our judicial system. In conjunction with the group studying alternative dispute resolution, I am also appointing a committee to study issues relating to how we can keep our most experienced judges from leaving the bench prematurely, to enter private judging or some other pursuit, thereby requiring us to pay not only their retirement benefits but the salary of the new judges who take their place.

I strongly believe that our court system should not serve merely as a training ground for a career in the private sector. It should maintain its

role as the place of service to which our finest legal talent aspires as the culmination of a career.

As you can see, the variety of issues that our system is addressing is enormous. Whether it is implementing trial court funding, improving the use of technology, or enhancing communication with you and with the public at large.

The duty of the Judiciary was described well by Chief Justice John Marshall of the United States Supreme Court when, in the early years of our republic, he remarked that the Supreme Court had an obligation not to “usurp power” and an equal obligation not to “shrink from its duty.” Our Branch is constantly seeking to maintain the appropriate balance—our duty is to serve the public in applying the law, and to perform the judicial function with integrity, care, and discretion. With your support, our Branch will continue its quest to meet these goals and to serve the public.

I am deeply honored to serve as the 27th Chief Justice of California. The individuals I have been fortunate to meet, both within and outside the Judicial Branch, the creativity and dedication I have encountered among judges, court staff, and lawyers, the commitment to public service and the public good that pervades our courts, all are proof of a vibrant system focused in the right direction. I know that working together, we can ensure that California’s Judiciary remains in the forefront of providing fair and accessible justice to all Californians.

Thank you again for your essential support in the time that I have served as Chief Justice. I look forward to demonstrating that the Judiciary is worthy of your trust and confidence, and to cooperating in new ways to enhance the administration of justice in our state for the benefit of the public we all serve.

I hope you will be able to join me and members of the Judicial Council and the A.O.C. staff at our annual reception for the Legislative and Executive Branches which will shortly follow this event, at the basement level of the Capitol Rotunda, and which will offer more information about the many activities in our courts. Let me close by wishing you all a productive legislative session.

I. LEGISLATIVE ORGANIZATION

Assembly General Officers

1. (a) The general officers of the Assembly are the following:

- (1) Speaker
- (2) Speaker pro Tempore
- Assistant Speaker pro Tempore
- Majority Floor Leader
- Minority Floor Leader
- (3) Chief Clerk
- Sergeant at Arms
- Chaplain

(b) Except for the officers listed in paragraph (2) of subdivision (a), each officer listed in subdivision (a) shall be elected by a majority vote of the duly elected and qualified Members.

(c) The Chief Clerk, subject to the approval of the Committee on Rules, shall determine the names and titles that shall appear on the frontispiece of all publications.

Hours of Meeting

2. The Speaker, or, in his or her absence, the Speaker pro Tempore, shall determine the time for convening the session, unless otherwise ordered by a majority vote of the Members present and voting.

Speaker to Call Assembly to Order

3. The Speaker, or, in his or her absence, the Speaker pro Tempore, shall, at the hour appointed for meeting, call the Assembly to order.

Roll Call and Quorum

4. Before proceeding with the business of the Assembly, both of the following shall be completed:

(1) The roll of the Members shall be called, and the names of those present shall be entered in the Journal. Forty-one Members constitute a quorum.

(2) The presiding officer shall announce the names of all Members who will be absent from that day's session and the reason for their absence.

Assignment of Desks to Members

5. Members shall be assigned to desks by the Committee on Rules.

Organization of Assembly

5.5. For the purposes of the organization of any regular session of the Assembly pursuant to Section 9023 of the Government Code, the person who was the Speaker when the previous regular session adjourned sine die, if he or she is reelected to the Assembly, shall be deemed to be the senior member elect.

II. RULES**Adoption of Standing Rules**

6. The adoption of the Standing Rules shall require an affirmative recorded vote of a majority of the duly elected and qualified Members. When once adopted, the Standing Rules shall remain in effect unless suspended or amended as provided in these rules.

Suspension of Rules

7. Any standing rule of the Assembly, except Rule 8, may be suspended temporarily by a vote of two-thirds of the Members present and voting, provided that the temporary suspension shall apply only to the matter under immediate consideration, and in no case may it extend beyond an adjournment.

Amending Standing Rules

8. No standing rule of the Assembly may be amended except by a resolution adopted by an affirmative recorded vote of a majority of the duly elected and qualified Members.

Mason's Manual

10. In all cases not provided for by the California Constitution, by the Assembly Rules, by the Joint Rules of the Senate and Assembly, or by statute, the authority shall be the latest edition of Mason's Manual.

III. ORGANIZATION OF COMMITTEES**Standing Committees**

11. Twenty-seven standing committees of the Assembly are hereby created, upon the several subjects, and titled respectively, as follows:

Water, Parks and Wildlife

Open Meetings

11.3. (a) Except as otherwise provided in this rule, all meetings of the Assembly or a committee thereof shall be open and public, and all persons shall be permitted to attend the meetings. As used in this rule, “meeting” means a gathering of a quorum of the Members of the Assembly or a committee in one place for the purpose of discussing legislative or other official matters within the jurisdiction of the Assembly or committee. As used in this rule, “committee” includes a standing committee, joint committee, conference committee, subcommittee, select committee, special committee, research committee, or any similar body.

(b) Any meeting that is required to be open and public pursuant to this rule, including any closed session held pursuant to subdivision (c), shall be held only after full and timely notice to the public as provided by the Joint Rules of the Assembly and Senate.

(c) The Assembly or a committee thereof may hold a closed session solely for any of the following purposes:

(1) To consider the appointment, employment, evaluation of performance, or dismissal of a public officer or employee, to consider or hear complaints or charges brought against a Member of the Legislature or other public officer or employee, or to establish the classification or compensation of an employee of the Assembly.

(2) To consider matters affecting the safety and security of Members of the Legislature or its employees, or the safety and security of any buildings and grounds used by the Legislature.

(3) To confer with, or receive advice from, its legal counsel regarding pending or reasonably anticipated litigation, or whether to initiate litigation, when discussion in open session would not protect the interests of the Assembly or committee regarding the litigation.

(d) A caucus of the Members of the Assembly that is composed of members of the same political party may meet in closed session.

(e) A closed session may be held pursuant to paragraph (3) of subdivision (c) under any of the following circumstances:

(1) An adjudicatory proceeding before a court, administrative body exercising its adjudicatory authority, hearing officer, or arbitrator, to which the Assembly or a committee, Member, or employee thereof is a party, has been initiated formally.

(2) Based on existing facts and circumstances, a point has been reached where, in the opinion of the Assembly or a committee thereof, on the advice of its legal counsel, litigation against the Assembly or a committee, Member, or employee thereof is reasonably anticipated.

(3) Based on existing facts and circumstances, the Assembly or a committee thereof has decided to initiate, or is deciding whether to initiate, litigation.

(4) To confer with, or receive advice from, its legal counsel and negotiator prior to the purchase, sale, exchange, or lease of real property by or for the Assembly or a committee thereof regarding

the price and terms of payment for the purchase, sale, exchange, or lease.

(f) Prior to holding a closed session pursuant to paragraph (3) of subdivision (c), the presiding officer of the Assembly or the chair of the committee, as appropriate, shall state publicly which paragraph of subdivision (c) is applicable. If the closed session is held pursuant to paragraph (1) of subdivision (e), the presiding officer or chair shall state the title of or otherwise specifically identify the litigation to be discussed, unless the presiding officer or chair states that to do so would jeopardize the ability to effectuate service of process upon one or more unserved parties, or that to do so would jeopardize the ability of the Assembly or the committee to conclude existing settlement negotiations to its advantage. If the closed session is held pursuant to paragraph (4) of subdivision (e), the notice of the closed session shall identify the real property that the negotiations may concern and the person with whom the negotiations may take place.

(g) The legal counsel for the Assembly or the committee shall prepare and submit to the Assembly or the committee a memorandum stating the specific reasons and legal authority for the closed session. If the closed session is held pursuant to paragraph (1) of subdivision (e), the memorandum shall include the title of or other identification of the litigation. If the closed session is held pursuant to paragraph (2), (3), or (4) of subdivision (e), the memorandum shall set forth the existing facts and circumstances on which the closed session is based. The legal counsel shall submit the memorandum to the Assembly or the committee prior to the closed session, if feasible, or, in any case, not later than one week after the closed session. The memorandum shall be exempt from disclosure under the Legislative Open Records Act contained in Article 3.5 (commencing with Section 9070) of Chapter 1.5 of Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 2 of the Government Code.

(h) For purposes of paragraph (3) of subdivision (c), "litigation" includes any adjudicatory proceeding, including eminent domain, before a court, administrative body exercising its adjudicatory authority, hearing officer, or arbitrator.

(i) For purposes of this rule, all expressions of the lawyer-client privilege other than those provided in this rule are hereby abrogated. This rule is the exclusive expression of the lawyer-client privilege for the purposes of conducting closed-session meetings pursuant to this rule.

(j) Disclosure of a memorandum required under this rule shall not be deemed a waiver of the lawyer-client privilege provided for under Article 3 (commencing with Section 950) of Chapter 4 of Division 8 of the Evidence Code.

Conference Committee Meetings

11.4. No Member may participate in a meeting of a conference committee considering any bill that is not open to the public.

Assembly Investigating Committees

11.5. (a) The standing committees of the Assembly created pursuant to Rule 11, with the exception of the Committee on Rules, are hereby constituted Assembly investigating committees and are authorized and directed to ascertain, study, and analyze all facts relating to any subjects or matters which the Committee on Rules

shall assign to them upon request of the Assembly or upon its own initiative.

(b) Each of the Assembly investigating committees shall consist of the members of the standing committee on the same subject as most recently constituted. The chairperson and vice chairperson shall be the chairperson and vice chairperson of the standing committee. Vacancies occurring in the membership of the committee shall be filled by the appointing authority.

(c) Each committee and any subcommittee, and its members, shall have and exercise all the rights, duties, and powers conferred upon investigating committees and their members by law and by the Joint Rules of the Senate and Assembly and the Standing Rules of the Assembly as they are adopted and amended from time to time, which provisions are incorporated herein and made applicable to the committee or subcommittee and their members.

(d) In order to prevent duplication and overlapping of studies between the various investigating committees herein created, no committee may commence the study of any subject or matter not specifically authorized herein or assigned to it unless and until prior written approval thereof has been obtained from the Committee on Rules.

(e) The Committee on Rules shall provide for the expenses of the above committees and their members and for any charges, expenses, or claims they may incur under this rule, to be paid from the Assembly Operating Fund and disbursed, after certification by the Chairperson of the Committee on Rules or his or her authorized representative, upon warrants drawn by the Controller upon the State Treasury.

Membership of Standing Committees

12. The Speaker shall determine the size, and appoint the membership and the chairperson and vice chairperson, of all standing committees and subcommittees. In appointing Members to serve on committees, the Speaker shall consider the preferences of the Members.

Committee on Rules

13. There is a Committee on Rules, which shall act as the executive committee of the Assembly. The committee shall consist of the Speaker, the chairperson, who shall be a Member selected by the Speaker, and eight other members, four to be selected by the Speaker and four, including the vice chairperson of the committee, to be selected by the Minority Leader. One alternate member of the Committee on Rules shall be selected by each party leader. Members and alternates so selected shall remain in office until their successors are selected as provided for in these rules. The Speaker or the Minority Leader may designate any member of their respective parties in lieu of or in addition to the alternate member to fill a temporary vacancy.

An alternate member may serve when a committee member of the same political party is absent. The Speaker shall preside or may designate the chairperson to preside.

No regular member of the Committee on Rules may simultaneously serve as a chairperson of any standing committee.

All meetings of the Committee on Rules that are required to be open and public shall be held in a room of appropriate size, and audio or video transmission of those meetings shall be provided.

Organization of Party Caucuses

13.1. Within two days after the general election held in November of each even-numbered year, the caucus of the political party having the greatest number of Members in the Assembly, and the caucus of the political party having the second greatest number of Members, each shall meet for the purpose of selecting their officers for the next regular session. The rules and procedures of each caucus shall be determined by that caucus, but may not be inconsistent with these rules.

Powers of the Committee on Rules

14. (a) The Committee on Rules shall have the following powers:

(1) To refer each bill and house resolution to a committee, as provided by these rules.

(2) To appoint all employees of the Assembly not otherwise provided for by statute. It shall have authority to terminate, to discipline, to establish, and to modify the terms and conditions of employment of, or to suspend, with or without pay, any employee of the Assembly.

(3) To make studies and recommendations designed to promote, improve, and expedite the business and procedure of the Assembly and of the committees thereof, and to propose any amendments to the Rules deemed necessary to accomplish these purposes.

(4) To adopt additional policies or requirements regarding the use of cameras and other recording equipment at committee hearings or Assembly floor sessions.

(b) Both during sessions, and after final adjournment and until the convening of the next regular session, the Committee on Rules has the following additional powers and duties:

(1) To contract with other agencies, public or private, as it deems necessary for the rendition and affording of those services, facilities, studies, and reports to the committee that will best assist it to carry out the purposes for which it is created.

(2) To cooperate with and secure the cooperation of county, city, city and county, and other local law enforcement agencies in investigating any matter within the scope of these rules and to direct the sheriff of any county to serve subpoenas, orders, and other process issued by the committee.

(3) To report its findings and recommendations to the Legislature and to the people from time to time and at any time.

(4) To do any and all other things necessary or convenient to enable it fully and adequately to exercise its powers, perform its duties, and accomplish the objects and purposes of these rules.

(5) To make available to the Assembly, or to any Assembly or joint committee, or to any Member of the Assembly assistance in connection with the duties of the committee or other legislative matters as the personnel under direction of the committee or its other facilities permit.

(6) To make available to and furnish to the Assembly, and to Assembly investigating committees created at this session and to

each of the members thereof, clerical, secretarial, and stenographic help as may be reasonably necessary for the Assembly to carry out its work, and for the committees and each of the members thereof, to make and carry on the studies and investigations required by or of them by the resolutions creating the committees, and for these purposes to employ additional stenographic and secretarial assistants as may be necessary, assign, reassign, and discharge these assistants and prescribe amounts, times, and methods of payment of their compensation. The committee shall allocate annually an amount for the operation of each investigating committee, which shall constitute the annual budget of the committee.

(c) During the times as the Assembly is not in session, the committee is authorized and directed to incur and pay expenses of the Assembly not otherwise provided for that the committee determines are reasonably necessary, including the repair, alteration, improvement, and equipping of the Assembly Chamber and the offices provided for the Assembly in the State Capitol and the Capitol Annex.

(d) The committee shall allocate sufficient moneys from the Assembly Operating Fund to support the Assembly's share of joint operations.

(e) The chairperson of the Committee on Rules shall appoint a Chief Administrative Officer of the Assembly, subject to the ratification of the Committee on Rules, who shall have duties relating to the administrative, fiscal, and business affairs of the Assembly that the committee shall prescribe. The Chairperson of the Committee on Rules or a majority of the membership of the Committee on Rules may terminate the services of the Chief Administrative Officer at any time. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the Speaker may appoint a temporary chief administrative officer for up to 90 days following the beginning of the session.

(f) The committee on Rules shall provide for the publication of a compilation of the photographs of accredited press representatives.

(g) The Committee on Rules may delegate powers to the Speaker by a majority vote of the membership of the committee.

Subcommittee on Sexual Harassment Prevention and Response

14.5. (a) The Subcommittee on Sexual Harassment Prevention and Response is hereby created as a subcommittee of the Committee on Rules. The subcommittee shall be composed of a total of six members, with the following four members appointed by the Chairperson of the Committee on Rules: two members of the Committee on Rules from the political party having the greatest number of Members in the Assembly and two members of the Committee on Rules from the political party having the second greatest number of Members. The two members from the political party having the second greatest number of Members shall be appointed from a list of nominees that the vice chairperson of the committee provides to the chairperson. The co-chairs of the Assembly Legislative Ethics Committee also shall be members of the subcommittee. The Chairperson of the Committee on Rules shall designate one of the members of the subcommittee to serve as chair of the subcommittee.

(b) The subcommittee shall formulate and recommend to the Committee on Rules procedures for the handling of any complaint of sexual harassment lodged against a Member of the Assembly or an Assembly employee. Those recommendations shall be submitted to the Committee on Rules no later than 30 days following the adoption of this rule.

(c) Following the submission of the recommendations pursuant to subdivision (b), the chair of the subcommittee may cause the subcommittee to convene to review and recommend further changes in procedures as subsequent events may require.

Committee on Rules

15. The Committee on Rules shall continue in existence during any recess of the Legislature and after final adjournment and until the convening of the next regular session, and shall have the same powers and duties as while the Assembly is in session. In dealing with any matter within its jurisdiction, the committee and its members shall have and exercise all of the rights, duties, and powers conferred upon investigating committees and their members by the Joint Rules of the Senate and Assembly as they are adopted and amended from time to time, which provisions are incorporated herein and made applicable to the Committee on Rules and its members.

Operating Fund Report

15.5. The Committee on Rules shall annually prepare a report to the public of expenditures as required by Section 9131 of the Government Code.

Independent Audit of Operating Funds

15.6. The Committee on Rules shall annually contract for an independent audit of the revenues and expenditures, for each fiscal year, from the Assembly Operating Fund. The organization performing the audit shall be selected by a majority of the membership of the Committee on Rules. The contract for the audit shall be awarded through a competitive bidding procedure. The audit shall be prepared in a manner and form to be determined by the organization performing the audit, and shall be consistent with generally accepted accounting principles.

The audit shall be completed and made available to the public within 180 calendar days following the completion of the fiscal year for which the audit is performed.

Performance Audit

15.7. The Committee on Rules shall annually contract for a comprehensive performance audit of all Assembly finances and operations. The organization performing the audit shall be selected by a majority of the membership of the Committee on Rules. The contract for the audit shall be awarded through a competitive bidding procedure. The audit shall be prepared in a manner and form to be determined by the organization performing the audit, and shall be consistent with generally accepted accounting principles.

All findings and recommendations reported by the auditing firm shall be made available to Members and to the public.

Rules Committee Resolutions

16. The Committee on Rules, acting unanimously by appropriate resolution, on behalf of and in the name of the Assembly, may extend congratulations, commendations, sympathy, or regret to any person, group, or organization, and may authorize the presentation of suitably prepared copies of these resolutions to the persons concerned and to their relatives.

Assembly Operating Fund

17. The Committee on Rules is the committee identified in Section 9127 of the Government Code. The balance of all money in the Assembly Operating Fund, including money now or hereafter appropriated, except the sums that are made available specifically for the expense of designated committees or for other purposes, is hereby made available to the Committee on Rules for any charges or claims it may incur in carrying out the duties imposed upon it by these rules or by Assembly or concurrent resolution. The money made available by this rule includes the unencumbered balances of all sums heretofore made available to any Assembly or joint committee by the Assembly, upon the expiration of that committee, and shall be expended as provided in these rules.

Expenditures

18. No Member or committee may incur any expense except as authorized pursuant to these rules or the Joint Rules of the Senate and Assembly, or as authorized by the Assembly or the Committee on Rules.

The Committee on Rules shall provide, by rules and regulations, for the manner of authorizing expenditures by Members, committees, officers, and employees of the Assembly that are not otherwise authorized by law, these rules, or the Joint Rules of the Senate and Assembly. These rules and regulations shall incorporate a provision whereby construction, alteration, improvement, repair, or maintenance of real or personal property, and the purchase of supplies and equipment, shall be governed by competitive bidding. Further, the rules and regulations shall provide for the payment of expenditures, as authorized by these rules and regulations, from the Assembly Operating Fund upon certification of claims therefor to the Controller by the Committee on Rules or its authorized representative.

No Member may be reimbursed for travel outside the State of California without prior approval of the Speaker or the Committee on Rules.

Rules and Regulations Governing Committees

20. All claims for expenses incurred by investigating committees of the Assembly shall be approved by the Committee on Rules, or its authorized representative, before the claims are presented to the Controller.

All proposed expenditures, other than expenditures of the funds of an investigating committee, shall be approved by the Committee on Rules or its authorized representative before the expenses are incurred, unless the expenditure is specifically exempted from this requirement by the resolution authorizing it.

No warrant may be drawn in payment of any claim for expenses until the approval of the Committee on Rules, or its authorized representative, has been obtained in accordance with this rule.

The Committee on Rules shall adopt rules and regulations governing the awarding of any contract by an investigating committee, and rules and regulations limiting the amount, time, and place of expenses and allowances to be paid to employees of Assembly investigating committees or other Assembly committees.

These rules may provide for allowances to committee employees in lieu of actual expenses.

Mileage is an allowance to a committee employee in lieu of actual expenses of travel. When travel is by private conveyance, mileage shall be allowed only to the operator of, and not to passengers in, a private vehicle. Claims for mileage by private conveyance must be accompanied by the license number of the vehicle and the names of state officers and employees riding as passengers.

Copies of all rules and regulations adopted pursuant to this rule shall be distributed to the chairperson of every investigating committee and of any other Assembly committee that has employees.

Fees for Witnesses

21. Each witness summoned to appear before the Assembly or any of its committees shall be reimbursed at a rate set by the Committee on Rules.

Assembly General Research Committee

22. (a) The Assembly General Research Committee is hereby continued as a permanent factfinding committee pursuant to Section 11 of Article IV of the California Constitution. The committee is allocated all subjects within the scope of legislative regulation and control, but may not undertake any investigation that another committee has been specifically requested or directed to undertake. The Assembly General Research Committee may act through subcommittees appointed by the Speaker in consultation with the Committee on Rules, and each of these subcommittees may act only on the particular study or investigation assigned by the Speaker in consultation with the Committee on Rules to that subcommittee. Each subcommittee shall be known and designated as a select committee. The Speaker is the Chairperson of the Assembly General Research Committee and may be a voting member of any subcommittee. Each member of the Assembly General Research Committee is authorized and directed to receive and investigate requests for legislative action made by individuals or groups, and to report thereon to the full committee. The Committee on Rules is authorized to allocate to any subcommittee from the Assembly Operating Fund those sums that the Committee on Rules deems necessary to complete the investigation or study conferred upon that subcommittee. The Committee on Rules shall further allocate, from time to time, to the Assembly General Research Committee from the Assembly Operating Fund those sums that are necessary to permit the Assembly General Research Committee and the members thereof to carry out the duties imposed on them. The committee has continuous existence until the time that its existence is terminated by a resolution adopted by the Assembly, and the committee is

authorized to act both during and between sessions of the Legislature, including any recess.

(b) The committee and its members shall have and exercise all the rights, duties, and powers conferred upon investigating committees and their members by the Joint Rules of the Senate and Assembly and the Standing Rules of the Assembly as they are adopted and amended from time to time at this session, which provisions are incorporated herein and made applicable to the committee and its members.

(c) The committee has the following additional powers and duties:

(1) To contract with other agencies, public or private, for the rendition and affording of services, facilities, studies, and reports to the committee as the committee deems necessary to assist it to carry out the purposes for which it is created.

(2) To cooperate with and secure the cooperation of county, city, city and county, and other local law enforcement agencies in investigating any matter within the scope of this rule and to direct the sheriff of any county to serve subpoenas, orders, and other process issued by the committee.

(3) To report its findings and recommendations to the Legislature and the people from time to time.

(4) To do any and all other things necessary or convenient to enable it fully and adequately to exercise its powers, perform its duties, and accomplish the objects and purposes of this rule.

Assembly Legislative Ethics Committee

22.5. (a) The Assembly Legislative Ethics Committee is hereby created. The committee shall consist of six Members of the Assembly, appointed by the Speaker. Notwithstanding any other rule of the Assembly, three members of the committee shall be from the political party having the greatest number of Members in the Assembly and three members shall be from the political party having the second greatest number of Members. Any temporary or permanent vacancy on the committee shall be filled within 10 days by a member from the same political party. All appointments, including appointments to fill permanent or temporary vacancies, of members from the political party having the second greatest number of Members in the Assembly shall be made from a list of nominees that the Minority Floor Leader provides to the Speaker. The Speaker shall designate one member of the committee from the political party having the greatest number of Members in the Assembly and one member of the committee from the political party having the second greatest number of Members to serve as co-chairs of the committee. The Speaker shall designate one of the co-chairs to serve as the presiding officer at any meeting or hearing conducted by the committee.

If a verified complaint is filed against a member of the committee, the Speaker shall temporarily replace the member with a Member from the same political party, who shall serve until the complaint is

dismissed or the Assembly takes final action on the complaint, whichever occurs first.

(b) The provisions of this rule, and of Rule 11.5 related to investigating committees, shall apply to the committee and shall govern its proceedings.

Prior to the issuance of any subpoena by the committee with respect to any matter before the committee, it shall, by a resolution adopted by the committee pursuant to a vote in accordance with subdivision (n), define the nature and scope of its investigation in the matter before it.

(c) Funds for the support of the committee shall be provided from the Assembly Operating Fund in the same manner that those funds are made available to other committees of the Assembly.

(d) (1) The committee shall have the power, pursuant to this rule and Article 3 (commencing with Section 8940) of Chapter 1 of Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 2 of the Government Code, to investigate and make findings and recommendations concerning violations by Members of the Assembly of any provision of Article 2 (commencing with Section 8920) of Chapter 1 of Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 2 of the Government Code or of any other provision of law or legislative rule that governs the conduct of Members of the Assembly, hereafter collectively referred to as "standards of conduct."

(2) The committee may, on its own action pursuant to a vote in accordance with subdivision (n), initiate an investigation of a Member of the Assembly.

(e) Any person may file with the committee a verified complaint in writing, which shall state the name of the Member of the Assembly alleged to have violated any standard of conduct, and which shall set forth the particulars thereof with sufficient clarity and detail to enable the committee to make a determination. The person filing the complaint thereafter shall be designated the complainant.

If a verified complaint is filed with the committee, the committee promptly shall send a copy of the complaint to the Member of the Assembly alleged to have committed the violation complained of, who thereafter shall be designated the respondent.

No complaint may be filed with the committee after the expiration of 12 months from the date the alleged violation is discovered or three years from the date of the alleged violation, whichever occurs first.

(f) (1) If the committee determines that the verified complaint does not allege facts, directly or upon information and belief, sufficient to constitute a violation of any standard of conduct, it shall dismiss the complaint and so notify the complainant and respondent.

(2) (i) If the committee determines that the verified complaint does allege facts, directly or upon information and belief, sufficient to constitute a violation of any standard of conduct, the committee promptly shall investigate the alleged violation and if, after this preliminary investigation, the committee finds that reasonable cause exists for believing the allegations of the complaint, it shall fix a time for a hearing in the matter, which shall be not more than 30 days after that finding. The committee may, however, seek an extension of this period, not to exceed an additional 30 days, which may be granted by a majority vote of the Committee on Rules.

(ii) If, after preliminary investigation, the committee does not find that reasonable cause exists for believing the allegations of the complaint, the committee shall dismiss the complaint. In either event, the committee shall notify the complainant and the respondent of its determination.

(3) The committee shall make its determination under paragraph (1) or (2) of this subdivision, pursuant to a vote in accordance with subdivision (n), not later than 90 days after first receiving a complaint that satisfies subdivision (e). The committee may, however, seek an extension, not to exceed 30 days, which may be granted by a majority vote of the membership of the Committee on Rules. If the committee has requested a law enforcement agency to investigate the complaint or if the committee knows the complaint is being investigated by a law enforcement agency, the time limits set forth in this subdivision shall be tolled until the investigation is completed.

(4) The committee's determination under paragraph (1) or (2) of this subdivision shall be stated in writing, with reasons given therefor, and shall be provided to the Assembly, and, in any case concerning an alleged violation of Article 2 (commencing with Section 8920) of Chapter 1 of Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 2 of the Government Code, shall be provided to the Attorney General, the Fair Political Practices Commission, and the district attorney of the county in which the violation allegedly occurred. This written determination is a public record and is open to public inspection.

(5) Any deliberations of the committee from the time of receipt of a complaint until it decides to dismiss the complaint or to set a hearing shall not be open to the public unless the respondent requests a public meeting.

(g) After the complaint has been filed, the respondent shall be entitled to examine and make copies of all evidence in the possession of the committee relating to the complaint.

(h) If a hearing is held pursuant to subdivision (f), the committee, before the hearing has commenced, shall issue subpoenas and subpoenas duces tecum at the request of any party in accordance with Chapter 4 (commencing with Section 9400) of Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 2 of the Government Code. All of the provisions of that chapter, except Section 9410 of the Government Code, shall apply to the committee and the witnesses before it.

(i) At any hearing held by the committee:

(1) Oral evidence shall be taken on oath or affirmation.

(2) Each party shall have these rights: to be represented by legal counsel; to call and examine witnesses; to introduce exhibits; and to cross-examine opposing witnesses.

(3) The hearing shall be open to the public.

(j) Any official or other person whose name is mentioned at any investigation or hearing of the committee, and who believes that testimony has been given that adversely affects him or her, shall have the right to testify or, at the discretion of the committee, to testify under oath relating solely to the material relevant to the testimony regarding which he or she complains.

(k) The committee shall have 15 days following the hearing within which to deliberate and reach its final determination on the matter as follows:

(1) If the committee finds that the respondent has not violated any standard of conduct, it shall order the action dismissed, shall notify the respondent and complainant thereof, and, in cases concerning an alleged violation of Article 2 (commencing with Section 8920) of Chapter 1 of Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 2 of the Government Code, shall transmit a copy of the complaint and the fact of dismissal to the Attorney General, the Fair Political Practices Commission, and the district attorney of the appropriate county. The complaint and the fact of dismissal transmitted pursuant to this paragraph are public records and open to public inspection.

(2) If the committee finds that the respondent has violated any standard of conduct, it shall state its findings of fact and submit a report thereon to the Assembly. This report shall be accompanied by a House Resolution, authored by the committee, which shall be introduced at the Chief Clerk's desk and then referred by the Committee on Rules to the Ethics Committee. The House Resolution shall include a statement of the committee's findings and the committee's recommendation for disciplinary action. Within seven days, the committee shall adopt the final form of the House Resolution and report it to the Assembly for placement on the Daily File. The committee also shall send a copy of those findings and report to the complainant and respondent, and, in cases concerning an alleged violation of Article 2 (commencing with Section 8920) of Chapter 1 of Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 2 of the Government Code, shall report thereon to the Attorney General, the Fair Political Practices Commission, and the district attorney of the appropriate county. The report submitted pursuant to this paragraph is a public record and open to public inspection.

After the receipt of a copy of the committee's final report and House Resolution, the Assembly expeditiously shall take appropriate action with respect to the respondent.

(l) The filing of a complaint with the committee pursuant to this rule suspends the running of the statute of limitations applicable to any violation of any standard of conduct alleged in the substance of that complaint while the complaint is pending.

(m) The committee shall maintain a record of its investigations, inquiries, and proceedings. All records, complaints, documents, and reports filed with or submitted to or made by the committee, and all records and transcripts of any investigations, inquiries, or hearings of the committee under this rule shall be deemed confidential and shall not be open to inspection, without the express permission of the committee, by any person other than a member of the committee, or an employee of the committee or other state employee designated to assist the committee, except as otherwise specifically provided in this rule. The committee may, by adoption of a resolution, authorize the release to the Attorney General or a district attorney of the appropriate county of any information, records, complaints, documents, reports, and transcripts in its possession that are material to any matter pending before the Attorney General or that district attorney. All matters presented at a public hearing of the committee and all reports of the committee stating a final finding of fact

pursuant to subdivision (k) shall be public records and open to public inspection. Any employee of the committee who divulges any matter that is deemed to be confidential by this subdivision shall be subject to discipline by the Committee on Rules.

(n) The committee may take any action authorized by this rule only upon the vote of not less than two members from the registered political party having the greatest number of Members in the Assembly and two members from the registered political party having the second greatest number of Members. Any vacancy on the committee does not reduce the votes required to take action.

(o) The committee may render advisory opinions to Members of the Assembly with respect to the standards of conduct and their application and construction. The committee may secure an opinion from the Legislative Counsel for this purpose or issue its own opinion. Any committee advisory opinion shall be prepared by committee members or staff and shall be adopted by the committee pursuant to subdivision (n).

(p) The committee shall conduct, at least semiannually, an orientation course on the relevant statutes and regulations governing official conduct. The curriculum and presentation of the course shall be established by the Committee on Rules.

The committee, in consultation with the Fair Political Practices Commission, shall conduct, at least annually, an orientation course on the relevant ethical issues and laws relating to lobbying. The committee shall impose fees on lobbyists for attending this course at an amount that will permit the participation of lobbyists to the fullest extent possible.

At least once each biennial session, each Member of the Assembly and each designated employee of the Assembly shall attend one of these courses.

Printing of Committee Reports

23. All requests for the printing of reports of Assembly committees shall be referred to the Committee on Rules. The Committee on Rules shall determine the number of copies needed and whether the report shall be printed in the Journal. In no event may more than 1,000 copies of any committee report be authorized by the Committee on Rules on the first printing, exclusive of the Journal copies if the report is to be printed therein, unless the Committee on Rules finds and determines that there is a special need for that report in greater numbers.

Upon determination by the Committee on Rules that additional copies of an Assembly committee report are required at any time following the first printing of the authorized number of copies, the Committee on Rules may authorize one or more additional printings in the numbers found by it to be necessary and may make funds available therefor.

No Assembly committee report may contain more than 100 pages, including the front and back cover thereof and any appendix, unless a greater number of pages has been approved and authorized by the Committee on Rules.

Assembly Employees

24. Every employee who works for a committee of the Assembly or a subcommittee of a committee, for a Member of the Assembly, for the Chief Clerk's office, or for the Sergeant at Arms, is an employee of the Assembly. All employees of the Assembly serve at the pleasure of the Assembly and the terms and conditions of their employment may be modified, or their employment may be terminated at will, at any time and without notice, by the Committee on Rules.

Every applicant for employment by the Assembly shall prepare a formal application for employment on forms prescribed by the Committee on Rules. The application shall include a statement of his or her present employment, his or her employment during the preceding two years, and other pertinent information that the Committee on Rules may require. The application shall be certified under penalty of perjury, and any willful false statement or omission of a material fact shall be punishable as perjury. If the application discloses any fact that indicates that the applicant has a personal interest that would conflict with the faithful performance of his or her duties, the applicant shall not be employed. All applications shall be retained in the records of the committee.

Every employee shall complete the Assembly ethics course in the first six months of his or her employment. Thereafter, every employee shall take the course in the first six months of every legislative session.

No employee may engage in any outside business activity or outside employment that is inconsistent, incompatible, or in conflict with his or her functions or responsibilities as an employee of the Assembly. Any employee who engages in any outside business activity or employment that is in any way related to his or her functions or responsibilities as an employee shall promptly notify the Committee on Rules of that business activity or employment.

Assembly Proceedings

25. Accredited press representatives may not be excluded from any public legislative meeting or hearing and may not be prohibited from taking photographs of, televising, or recording the committee or house hearings, subject to the following conditions:

- (1) This rule shall extend to all public legislative meetings.
- (2) Lights shall be used only when cameras are filming, and, when possible, proceedings in hearing rooms and the Chamber shall be filmed without lights.
- (3) Every effort should be made to set up filming equipment before hearings or sessions begin.
- (4) The committee chairperson or the Speaker shall be notified, as far in advance of the proceedings as possible, that recordings and television cameras will be present and filming.
- (5) To the extent practical, flash cameras shall not be used.
- (6) Photographs shall be taken in an orderly and expeditious manner so as to cause the least possible inconvenience to the committee or to the Members in the Chamber.

IV. ASSEMBLY FUNCTIONS

A. Duties of Assembly Officers

Duties of the Speaker

26. (a) The Speaker shall possess the powers and perform the duties prescribed as follows:

(1) To preserve order and decorum; he or she may speak to points of order in preference to the other Members, rising from his or her chair for that purpose.

(2) To decide all questions of order subject to appeal to the Assembly by any Member. On every appeal, the Speaker shall have the right to assign the reason for his or her decision.

(3) To name any Member to perform the duties of the Speaker, except that any substitution may not extend beyond adjournment.

(4) To have general direction over the Assembly chamber and rooms set aside for the use of the Assembly, including the rooms for use by Members as private offices.

(5) To allocate funds, staffing, and other resources for the effective operation of the Assembly.

(6) To appoint the membership of all standing and special committees, and their respective chairpersons and vice-chairpersons. The Speaker has approval power over the appointment of subcommittees of those standing and special committees.

(7) To establish a schedule of meetings of standing committees or subcommittees and to approve special meetings at a time different from the scheduled time.

(8) To have general control and direction over the Journals, papers, and bills of the Assembly.

(9) To act as Chairperson of the Committee of the Whole.

(10) To order the Lobby and Gallery cleared whenever he or she deems it necessary.

(11) To authenticate by his or her signature, when necessary or required by law, all bills, memorials, resolutions, orders, proceedings, writs, warrants, and subpoenas issued by order of the Assembly.

(b) The Speaker shall be ex officio member of all Assembly and joint committees with all of the rights and privileges of that membership, except the right to vote. In counting a quorum of any of those committees, the Speaker shall not be counted as a member.

(c) The Speaker shall, at each regular session, appoint a Member of the Assembly to serve on the Judicial Council pursuant to Section 6 of Article VI of the California Constitution.

Funerals and Other Ceremonies and Events

27. The Speaker may designate any one or more of the Members of the Assembly as the representatives of the Assembly to attend funerals and other ceremonies and events in appropriate circumstances. The Members so designated shall receive their expenses as provided in Joint Rule 35.

Selection of Officers

28. (a) The Speaker shall appoint all nonelected officers of the Assembly except the Minority Floor Leader.

(b) The Minority Floor Leader shall be selected by the caucus of the political party having the second greatest number of Members in the Assembly.

Duties of the Speaker pro Tempore

29. The Speaker pro Tempore shall perform those duties assigned by the Speaker, including the responsibility of presiding over sessions of the Assembly and advising the Members on parliamentary procedures of the house.

Majority Floor Leader

30. It shall be the duty of the Majority Floor Leader to make those appropriate motions, points of order, or other arrangements that may be necessary to expedite the proceedings of the Assembly, and he or she shall be responsible for the presentation of all matters that relate to the order of business, and to the promotion of harmony among the membership.

Caucus Chairpersons

31. The chairperson of the caucus of the political party having the greatest number of Members in the Assembly, and the chairperson of the caucus of the political party having the second greatest number of Members in the Assembly, shall perform those duties that are prescribed by their respective party caucuses.

Chief Clerk

32. The Chief Clerk of the Assembly shall have the following duties, powers, and responsibilities:

(a) To be charged with the responsibility of the keeping of the bills, papers, and records of the proceedings and actions of the Assembly and to have charge of the publication and distribution of those publications related thereto.

(b) To supervise Assembly employees who are engaged in duties related to subdivision (a).

(c) To act as Parliamentarian of the Assembly and to advise the officers of the Assembly and the Committee on Rules on parliamentary procedure and the Rules of the Assembly when called upon to do so.

(d) To prepare all bills, resolutions, histories, journals, and related publications for printing.

(e) To refuse to permit any bills, papers, or records to be removed from his or her office or out of his or her custody, except upon duly signed receipts from persons authorized.

(f) To mail, before the commencement of each regular session of the Legislature, to each Member a blank form on which the Member may indicate his or her committee preferences. Accompanying the blank form shall be mailed a stamped envelope addressed to the Chief Clerk of the Assembly for returning the form. After their

receipt, all those communications shall be held by the Chief Clerk of the Assembly and the information contained in the forms shall be forwarded to the Speaker.

(g) To perform other duties that are prescribed by law or the Committee on Rules.

(h) To make technical changes in measures and amendments pending before the Assembly. The Chief Clerk shall notify the Speaker and the author of the measure of any such change.

(i) To compare all bills, ordered or considered engrossed by the Assembly, with the engrossed copies thereof; before they pass out of the possession of the Assembly, to see that each engrossed bill is a true copy of the original, with those amendments that may have been made thereto; and to see that all engrossed bills are reported back in the order in which they were ordered engrossed.

(j) To assist the Committee on Rules, upon its request, in recommending the reference of bills to the appropriate standing committee.

The Assistant Chief Clerk shall have the powers and perform the duties of the Chief Clerk during his or her absence.

Sergeant at Arms

33. The Sergeant at Arms shall have the following duties, powers, and responsibilities:

(a) To attend the Assembly during its session, preserve order, announce all official messengers, and serve all process issued by authority of the Assembly and directed by the Speaker; the Sergeant at Arms shall receive actual expenses for himself or herself, or for an assistant, incurred in executing any process.

(b) To see that no person is admitted to the Assembly Chamber except in accordance with these rules.

(c) To have general supervision over the Assistant Sergeants at Arms and be responsible for their official acts and their performance of and regular attendance upon their duties.

(d) To execute all commands of the Speaker.

(e) To perform all other duties pertaining to his or her office as prescribed by law or Assembly rule.

The Chief Assistant Sergeant at Arms shall have the powers and perform the duties of the Sergeant at Arms during his or her absence.

Filling Interim Vacancies—Assembly Elected Officers

34. In the event a vacancy in any office, except Speaker, elected by the membership of the Assembly occurs during joint recesses, the Committee on Rules shall fill the office until the session reconvenes. If a vacancy occurs in the office of the Speaker during a joint recess, the Committee on Rules shall notify the membership within 15 days from the time the vacancy occurs and shall call a caucus of the membership of the Assembly for the purpose of filling the vacancy. This caucus shall be held at the State Capitol within 30 days from the time the vacancy occurs. Notice of the caucus shall be in writing and shall be mailed not less than 10 days prior to the meeting of the caucus. If the Committee on Rules fails to act within 15 days from the time the vacancy in the office of Speaker occurs, the Chief Clerk of the Assembly shall act in its place, following the procedure set forth

in this rule. Any person selected to fill any vacancy pursuant to this rule shall hold the office until the session reconvenes.

An affirmative recorded vote of a majority of the duly elected and qualified Members shall be required for the selection by the Assembly caucus of a person to fill a vacancy pursuant to this rule. The procedure for selecting the Speaker at the caucus shall be the same as the procedure required for the election of the Speaker at a session.

B. Printing

Authority for Printing

35. The State Printer may not charge any printing or other work to the Assembly other than as provided by law or Assembly rule, except upon a written order signed by the Chief Clerk of the Assembly or the Chief Administrative Officer of the Assembly. All invoices for printing furnished to the Assembly shall be itemized and rendered by the State Printer within 30 days after completion of the printing. When necessary, the Chief Clerk of the Assembly or the Chief Administrative Officer of the Assembly may order certain printed matter completed in advance of its regular order by the issuance of a rush order.

Ordering of Printing

36. The Chief Clerk is authorized to order, and shall have the responsibility for ordering, the printing of bills, resolutions, journals, daily files, histories, and related documents.

The Chief Clerk of the Assembly, or the Chief Administrative Officer of the Assembly, shall order other printing as directed or authorized by the Committee on Rules, and the written order for that printing shall be countersigned by the Speaker or a person designated by the Speaker. The Chief Clerk of the Assembly or the Chief Administrative Officer of the Assembly shall also order other printing as directed or authorized by resolution or motion of the Assembly.

Printing Assembly History and Legislative Handbook

37. During the session, the Chief Clerk shall cause to be printed and placed upon each Member's desk, prior to convening on Monday of each week, a complete history showing all actions taken upon each measure up to and including the legislative day preceding its issuance. For each legislative day intervening between the issuance of each Weekly History, there shall be printed a Daily Supplemental History showing only actions taken upon any measure since the issuance of the preceding Weekly History.

The Chief Clerk of the Assembly shall, as soon as practicable, in each even-numbered year, commence to compile a legislative manual or handbook, pursuant to Section 9740 of the Government Code.

V. LEGISLATIVE PROCEDURE

Order of Business

40. The order of business of the Assembly shall be as follows:
1. Roll Call
 2. Prayer by the Chaplain
 3. Reading of the Previous Day's Journal
 4. Presentation of Petitions
 5. Introduction and Reference of Bills
 6. Reports of Committees
 7. Messages From the Governor
 8. Messages From the Senate
 9. Motions and Resolutions
 10. Business on the Daily File
 11. Announcements
 12. Adjournment

Pledging of Allegiance to the Flag

41. At each session, following the prayer by the Chaplain, the Members of the Assembly and its officers and employees present in the Assembly Chamber shall pledge their allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America. The Speaker shall invite guests present in the Assembly Chamber to join in the pledge of allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America.

Reading and Correcting Journals

42. (a) The reading of the Journal of the previous day may be dispensed with, on motion, by a majority vote of the Members present and voting.

(b) All journals of the Assembly shall be corrected by the Minute Clerk and delivered to the Chief Clerk.

(c) A motion to correct any day's Journal or to print a letter in the Journal shall always be in order and shall require a majority vote of the Members present and voting.

Presentation of Petitions

43. Whenever petitions, memorials, or other papers are presented by a Member, a brief statement of the contents thereof may be made verbally by the introducer. Petitions are not debatable and shall be filed, or referred to a committee as the Speaker shall determine. Receipt of that presentation and its disposition shall be noted in the Journal.

Upon receipt of a petition for the impeachment of any person subject to impeachment by the Legislature, the Speaker shall, without comment or debate, forthwith refer the petition to committee.

Messages From the Governor

44. Messages from the Governor shall be delivered to the Chief Clerk or an assistant, and shall be read and ordered printed in the Journal unless otherwise ordered by an affirmative recorded vote of 54 or more Members.

Messages From the Senate

45. Messages from the Senate shall be delivered to the Chief Clerk or an assistant, and shall be read and ordered printed in the

Journal. The Committee on Rules shall refer each bill to a committee, unless upon a motion the Assembly, by an affirmative recorded vote of 41 or more Members, shall refer it to some other committee. The action to refer a bill shall not be debatable. The reference shall be entered in the Journal. Assembly bills that have been passed without amendment by the Senate shall be ordered to enrollment.

An Assembly bill amended by the Senate shall be placed upon the unfinished business file but shall not be eligible to be acted upon until it is on the unfinished business file for one legislative day, except that when the Assembly bill is placed upon the unfinished business file during the last two legislative days preceding (1) the January 31 bill passage deadline specified by Section 10 of Article IV of the California Constitution, (2) the scheduled commencement of the interim study recess, or (3) the scheduled commencement of the final recess as specified by the Joint Rules of the Senate and Assembly, it may be acted upon immediately.

Guests of the Assembly

45.5. Nothing in these rules shall prevent the Speaker or Speaker pro Tempore from permitting the introduction of a special guest or guests.

A. Bills and Resolutions

Bills Defined

46. (A) The word "bill," as used in these rules, includes a constitutional amendment, a concurrent resolution, and a joint resolution, except as otherwise specifically provided.

(b) A concurrent resolution and a joint resolution, other than a resolution ratifying proposed amendments to the United States Constitution and a resolution calling for a constitutional convention, shall be treated in all respects as a bill except as follows:

(1) It shall be given only one formal reading.

(2) It shall not be deemed a bill within the meaning of subdivision (a) of Section 8 of Article IV of the California Constitution.

Introduction and Reference of Bills

47. Each bill shall be signed by each Member who is an author or coauthor of the bill before it is introduced. If any bill is introduced that does not contain the signature of its author or coauthor, the bill, on motion of the Member whose name appears thereon without that signature, shall be stricken from the file by an affirmative recorded vote of 41 or more Members. In each legislative session, on the first day when bills are introduced under "Introduction and Reference of Bills," the roll shall be called from A to Z and, as each Member's name is called, the Member may introduce one bill, constitutional amendment, or concurrent or joint resolution. After this roll call, the preprint bills shall be introduced in numerical order.

After the introduction of preprinted bills, and subject to the provisions of the Joint Rules of the Senate and Assembly, any Member desiring to introduce a bill, constitutional amendment, or concurrent or joint resolution may at any time during a session send the same to the Chief Clerk's desk.

When received at the Chief Clerk's desk it shall, under the proper order of business, be numbered, read the first time, printed, and

referred to a standing committee, and a copy thereof shall be placed upon the desk of each Member before final passage.

All bills, constitutional amendments, and concurrent or joint resolutions introduced before the standing committees of the Assembly are appointed shall be referred to committee, the references to take effect when the committees are appointed.

Any committee may introduce a bill germane to any subject within the proper consideration of the committee in the same manner as any Member. No committee bill may be introduced unless it contains the signatures of a majority of all of the members, including the chairperson, of the committee. If all of the members of a committee sign the bill, at the option of the committee chairperson the committee members' names need not appear as authors in the heading of the printed bill.

Limitation on the Introduction of Bills

49. (a) A Member may introduce not more than 30 bills in the regular session.

(b) This rule does not apply to a constitutional amendment, any type of resolution, or a bill introduced by a committee pursuant to Rule 47.

(c) This rule may be suspended with respect to a particular bill by approval of the Committee on Rules.

Reference of Bills to Committee

51. Except as otherwise provided in this rule, the Committee on Rules shall refer each bill to a committee by a majority vote of the membership of the committee, unless upon a motion the Assembly, by an affirmative recorded vote of 41 or more Members, shall refer it to some other committee. A motion to refer a bill shall not be debatable, except as to the propriety of the motion, and it shall not open the main question to debate.

The Committee on Rules may require that, if a bill is reported out of the committee to which it has been referred, it shall be re-referred to another committee that shares jurisdiction of the subject matter of the bill.

Spot Bills

51.5. A bill that upon introduction makes no substantive change in or addition to existing law, and would not otherwise affect the ongoing operations of state or local government, except a bill stating legislative intent to make necessary statutory changes to implement the Budget Bill, may not be referred to a committee by the Committee on Rules. If the author subsequently proposes to the Committee on Rules to make substantive changes in the bill as introduced, the Committee on Rules may refer the bill to a committee, together with the proposed changes for consideration as author's amendments. A vote on passage of the bill may not be taken, however, until the bill with its amendments, if adopted, has been in print for at least 15 days.

Delivery of Bills to State Printer

52. After introduction and first reading, all bills shall be delivered to the State Printer.

Introduction of House Resolutions

53. All house resolutions shall be numbered and shall be referred to the appropriate committee by the Committee on Rules.

Each house resolution shall be signed by each Member who is an author or coauthor of the house resolution before it is introduced.

Resolutions by Member

54. A concurrent resolution or a house resolution may be introduced related to a present or former state or federal elected official or a member of his or her immediate family. Other resolutions for the purpose of commendation or congratulation of any person, group, or organization, or for the purpose of expressing sympathy, regret, or sorrow on the death of any person, shall be prepared as a Rules Committee Resolution and presented to the committee for appropriate action.

The Committee on Rules may approve exceptions to this rule for house resolutions. The Chief Clerk may not accept for introduction any house resolution that is contrary to this rule unless it is accompanied by the approval of the Committee on Rules.

B. Standing Committee Functions**Standing Committee Rules**

55. Subject to the Joint Rules of the Senate and Assembly, the Rules of the Assembly shall govern the conduct of all committee and subcommittee meetings.

Meetings of Standing Committees and Subcommittees

56. All standing committees and subcommittees shall meet at the hour and place provided by the schedule established by the Speaker, unless permission for a different hearing time is granted by the Speaker. No committee or subcommittee may meet during any session of the Assembly, nor may any Member of the Assembly attend a conference committee meeting on any bill during any session of the Assembly without first obtaining permission from the Assembly.

When an unscheduled meeting of a standing committee or subcommittee has been so ordered, the meeting shall convene in an area that is readily accessible to the public and the Assembly shall take care that every effort is made to inform the public that a meeting has been called. An unscheduled meeting of a committee or subcommittee shall not be held in the Assembly Chamber.

No bill may be set for hearing, nor may any notice thereof be published by an Assembly committee or subcommittee, until the bill has been referred to the committee or subcommittee. Nothing in this paragraph shall prevent a committee or subcommittee from acting with regard to a bill referred to it where the only action taken is to cause the bill to be reported to the Assembly with the recommendation that amendments be adopted and the bill be reprinted as amended and re-referred to the committee or subcommittee.

The several standing committees and subcommittees and their chairpersons are directed to adopt a procedure that assures that no committee or subcommittee shall commence the hearing of any bill after the hour of 6:00 p.m. at an afternoon meeting of the committee or subcommittee, or after the hour of 11:00 p.m. at an evening meeting, except that a hearing on a bill commenced prior thereto

may be continued thereafter for that period of time that the committee or subcommittee deems necessary.

The several standing committees and subcommittees and their chairperson may adopt a procedure under which bills are scheduled for hearing on the basis of like subject matter groupings.

Committee Analyses

56.5. Except as otherwise provided in this rule, each standing committee and subcommittee shall prepare an analysis of every bill it has set for hearing, which shall be available to the public in the office of the committee or subcommittee one working day prior to the date on which the hearing is to be held. In the case of a special meeting, or a meeting of the Committee on Appropriations or the Committee on Budget, or their subcommittees, the analysis shall be available to the public at the beginning of the hearing. No question concerning a committee's compliance with this rule with regard to any bill shall be in order following a vote on passage of the bill in that committee. As used in this rule, a "working day" is any day on which a house file is published.

A copy of each committee analysis shall be transmitted by the committee secretary to the Assembly Floor Analysis Unit at the same time it is made available to the public.

Committee Consultants: Floor Analyses

56.6. Except as otherwise provided in this rule, the consultants of a standing committee or subcommittee are responsible for monitoring bills assigned to their respective committee or subcommittee throughout the entire legislative process. Except for resolutions and bills on the Consent Calendar, a consultant of the appropriate standing committee shall prepare, in a timely fashion, an analysis of every bill on third reading or the unfinished business file, and of any amendment to a bill that is on the Assembly Floor, as directed by the Assembly Floor Analysis Unit.

The committee consultant who prepares the analysis shall transmit a copy of the completed analysis to the Assembly Floor Analysis Unit. The Assembly Floor Analysis Unit is responsible for final editing for grammar and format of all floor analyses.

Consent Calendar

56.7. If the chairperson of a committee or subcommittee, in advance of a hearing, proposes to recommend any bills for consideration on the Consent Calendar without hearing testimony on those bills in committee, a list of those bills shall be made available to the public at the same time as the committee analysis required under Rule 56.5.

Committee Quorum

57. Except as otherwise provided in this rule, a majority of the membership of any standing committee shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of its business, including the decision to recommend the adoption of any amendments to any bill. A majority of the membership of the committee, or a subcommittee thereof, shall be required to report a bill out of the committee or subcommittee,

respectively. Any vacancy on a standing committee shall not reduce the votes required to take action on a bill in that committee.

Whenever a member is disqualified pursuant to Joint Rule 44 or the Political Reform Act of 1974 (Title 9 (commencing with Section 81000) of the Government Code) from voting or taking any other action related to the passage, defeat, or amendment of a bill in committee, that disqualification shall be treated the same as a vacancy. The member shall advise the chairperson of a disqualification, and the chairperson shall announce which members are so disqualified at the commencement of the hearing on the bill.

Reconsideration

57.1. After a committee has voted on a bill, reconsideration may be granted only one time. Pursuant to subdivision (a) of Joint Rule 62, reconsideration may be granted within 15 legislative days or prior to the interim study joint recess, whichever occurs first. A vote on reconsideration may not be taken without the same notice required to set a bill for hearing unless that vote is taken at the same meeting at which the vote to be reconsidered was taken and the author is present. No action taken by a committee may be reconsidered except by a majority vote of the membership of the committee.

Bills Reported Back to Assembly

58. All committees shall act upon bills referred to them as soon as practicable, and when acted upon each bill shall be reported back to the Assembly forthwith; the chairperson of each committee is charged with the observance of this rule. The chairperson of each committee shall, insofar as practicable, report back bills in the same order as they were acted upon by the committee.

Appropriations Suspense File

58.2. The Committee on Appropriations may maintain a suspense file, to which bills may be referred by vote of a majority of the members of the committee present and voting, pending further consideration by the committee. A bill may be taken off the suspense file and heard, upon two days' notice published in the file, by a vote of a majority of the members of the committee present and voting. A bill removed from the suspense file for the purpose of amendment only, pursuant to Rule 68, shall be re-referred to the committee and shall be placed on the suspense file pending further consideration by the committee.

Voting in Committee

58.5. When a standing committee or subcommittee takes action on a bill, including reconsideration, the vote shall be by roll call vote only. All roll call votes taken in a standing committee or subcommittee shall be recorded by the committee secretary on forms provided by the Chief Clerk of the Assembly. The record of a roll call vote shall show, for each proposal voted upon: all votes for and against, all members absent, and all members not voting. The chairperson of each standing committee or subcommittee shall promptly transmit a copy of the record of the roll call votes to the

Chief Clerk of the Assembly, who shall cause the votes to be published in an appendix to the Journal on a monthly basis.

The committee secretary of each standing committee or subcommittee shall promptly transmit a copy of the record of the roll call votes to the Assembly Floor Analysis Unit.

A member may submit a written explanation of his or her vote, absence, or failure to vote on any bill or resolution, and that explanation shall be printed in the appendix to the Journal in the appropriate place, provided that no explanation may exceed 50 words in length.

At the request of the author or any member of the committee, the committee shall hold the roll open on any Assembly bill until the adjournment of the committee meeting. At no time may a bill be passed out by a committee without a quorum being present.

This rule shall not apply to any of the following:

- (a) Adoption of author's amendments to a bill.
- (b) Withdrawal of a bill from a committee calendar at the request of an author.
- (c) Return of bills to the house where the bills have not been voted on by the committee.
- (d) Votes of subcommittees of the Committee on Budget when considering the Budget Bill.
- (e) Votes of the Committee on Rules when referring bills to committees.

Subject Matter of Bill Recommended for Interim Study

59. Whenever it is the decision of a standing committee that a bill referred to that committee shall not be given a do-pass recommendation, but that the subject matter of the bill should be referred for study, that standing committee shall retain the bill in its possession and report its recommendation to the Assembly that the subject matter of the bill be referred to the Committee on Rules for that committee's assignment of the subject matter to an appropriate committee.

Nothing in this rule shall be construed to prohibit a committee from subsequently reporting the bill to the Assembly with a do-pass or do-pass as amended recommendation or from reporting it out of committee without further action on the final day of the session.

Committee Chairperson as Author

60. No chairperson of a standing committee shall preside at a committee hearing to consider a bill of which he or she is the sole author or the lead author, except that the Chairperson of the Committee on Budget may preside at the hearing of the Budget Bill by the Committee on Budget.

Reports of Committees

61. Specially prepared reports of standing and special committees shall be delivered to the Chief Clerk or an assistant, and shall be read and ordered printed in the Journal unless otherwise ordered by the Speaker or a majority vote of the Members present and voting.

When a report of a joint legislative committee is delivered to the Assembly Desk, the Speaker shall refer it to a standing committee for review and appropriate action.

Constitutional Amendments

62.5. All constitutional amendments shall be referred to the policy standing committee having jurisdiction of that subject matter and, upon being reported out of that committee, shall be re-referred to the committee having constitutional amendments within its jurisdiction.

C. Passage of Bills**Daily File**

63. There shall be printed an Assembly Daily File for each legislative day. The following listing shall constitute the order of business on the Daily File:

1. Special Orders of the Day
2. Second Reading, Assembly Bills
3. Second Reading, Senate Bills
4. Unfinished Business
5. Third Reading, Assembly Bills
6. Third Reading, Senate Bills

All bills on the Daily File shall be called for consideration, provided Rule 58 has been complied with in the order of their listing, unless otherwise ordered by unanimous consent or an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the Members present. All scheduled committee hearings, together with the list of bills to be heard, shall be published in the Daily File.

Copies of Bills for Action on Floor

64. No bill may be considered or acted upon on the floor of the Assembly unless and until a copy of the printed bill as introduced, and a printed copy of each amended form of the bill, have been placed upon the desks of the Members.

Second Reading of Bills

66. All bills shall be read by title the second time in the order of their appearance upon the second reading file. Upon second reading, Assembly bills reported without amendments shall be ordered engrossed, and Senate bills reported without amendments shall be ordered to third reading. All bills reported out of committee shall be placed on the second reading file for the next legislative day, and may not be read a second time until the next legislative day under that order of business. As used in this rule, "bill" does not include a joint or concurrent resolution, but does include a constitutional amendment.

Bills Requiring General Fund Appropriation

66.6. Until the Budget Bill has been enacted, the Assembly may not send to the Governor for consideration any bill appropriating funds for expenditure during the fiscal year for which the Budget Bill is to be enacted, except emergency bills recommended by the Governor or appropriations for the salaries and expenses of the Legislature.

Passage of Budget Bill

66.7. The Committee on Budget shall set spending limits for each subcommittee prior to subcommittee hearings.

Between the date upon which a committee on conference of the Budget Bill is appointed and the date the Assembly adopts the report of the conference committee, the Chairperson of the Committee on Budget shall provide regular written reports to the Members on the progress of the conference committee deliberations.

No Budget Bill may be considered or acted upon on the floor of the Assembly unless it does all of the following:

- (1) Balances expenditures with anticipated revenues.
- (2) Provides for a reserve of not less than 3 percent of the total of all expenditures for which appropriations are made in the Budget Bill for the fiscal year, or provisions for a reserve of not less than 1 percent and a specific plan to phase in a reserve of at least 3 percent within three years.
- (3) Is based upon no external borrowing by the state other than borrowing that the enacted Budget Bill or other statute would require to be repaid during that fiscal year.

Committee Amendments

67. Committee amendments reported with bills shall be considered upon their second reading, and the amendments may be adopted by majority vote of the Members present and voting. Assembly and Senate bills amended on second reading, whether by committee amendment or amendment from the floor, shall be ordered reprinted and returned to the second reading file. Assembly bills so amended shall be engrossed after printing.

Committee amendments reported with bills shall be prepared, or approved as to form, by the Legislative Counsel. Five copies of the committee amendments to Assembly bills and five copies of the committee amendments to Senate bills shall be delivered to the Chief Clerk's desk.

The Chief Clerk shall cause to be transmitted to the Assembly Floor Analysis Unit a copy of each committee report and committee amendment, unless the committee report or committee amendment is relative to a joint, concurrent, or house resolution.

Adoption of amendments to any bill in the Assembly prior to third reading, other than by a roll call, shall not preclude subsequent consideration in committee, or on the third reading by the Assembly, of the bill, those amendments, or any part thereof.

Author's Amendments

68. Upon request of the author of a bill, the chairperson of the committee to which the bill has been referred may, by his or her individual action taken independently of any committee meeting, cause the bill to be reported to the Assembly with the recommendation that amendments submitted by the author be adopted and the bill be reprinted as amended and re-referred to the committee.

Notwithstanding any other rule, a bill to be amended pursuant to this rule may not be placed on the second reading file for the adoption of those amendments.

Vote on Passage of Bill as Amended

68.5. Except as otherwise provided in this rule, a vote on passage of any bill in a standing committee or subcommittee shall be taken only when the bill is in print, including any previously adopted

amendments to the bill. A vote on passage of an amended bill, when the amended form of the bill is not in print, may be taken only if the sole effect of the amendment is to add coauthors to the bill or if the committee determines that the effect of the amendment upon the bill can be readily understood by all of the members and audience present at the hearing. In that circumstance, any member may require that the amendments be in writing at the time of their adoption.

Bill Analysis Prior to Third Reading

68.6. No bill may be considered on third reading unless and until an analysis of the measure has been distributed by the Assembly Floor Analysis Unit and placed upon the desks of the Members, unless otherwise ordered by the Speaker.

As used in this rule, “bill” does not include a joint or concurrent resolution, but does include a constitutional amendment.

Analysis of Conference Committee Amendments

68.7. No report of a conference committee on any bill, other than the Budget Bill, that recommends the substantive amendment of a bill may be considered unless and until an analysis of the proposed amendment has been distributed by the Assembly Floor Analysis Unit and placed upon the desks of the Members, unless otherwise ordered by the Speaker.

Printing of Conference Committee Reports

68.8. No conference report may be heard by the Assembly until it has been in print for two days prior to being taken up by the house.

Conference Committee: Substantial Policy Change

68.9. (a) No conference committee on any bill, other than the Budget Bill or a bill that is making statutory changes to implement the Budget Bill, may approve any substantial policy change in any bill if that substantial policy change has been defeated in a policy committee of the Assembly within the current legislative session. For purposes of this rule, the most recent action of a policy committee with regard to a substantial policy change shall be deemed the only action taken when the policy committee has taken inconsistent actions with respect to a substantial policy change.

(b) For purposes of subdivision (d) of Joint Rule 29.5, the term “heard” means that a printed bill with substantially similar language was before the appropriate committee and taken up at a regular or special hearing of the committee during the current legislative session; or that an amendment, which was drafted and given a request number or approved as to form by the Legislative Counsel, was before the committee and taken up at a regular or special hearing of the committee.

Amendments From the Floor

69. (a) Any Member may move to amend a bill during its second or third reading, and that motion to amend may be adopted by a majority vote of the Members present and voting.

No amendments to a bill offered from the floor, except committee amendments reported with bills, amendments offered with a motion to amend and re-refer a bill to committee, amendments deleting any number of words, amendments adding a total of not more than

25 words, or amendments previously printed in the Journal, shall be in order unless and until a copy of the proposed amendments has been placed upon the desks of the Members. If a copy of amendments adding a total of 25 words or less is not placed on the desks of Members, it shall be made available to the author of the bill, and the amendments shall be read in their entirety by the Chief Clerk prior to debate.

Amendments offered from the floor during a bill's second or third reading shall be prepared, or approved as to form, by the Legislative Counsel.

Before debate five copies of the proposed amendment to Assembly bills, and five copies of the proposed amendments to Senate bills, shall be delivered to the Chief Clerk's desk. One copy of the proposed amendment shall be transmitted by the Chief Clerk to the Assembly Floor Analysis Unit. Bills so amended upon second or third reading shall be reprinted and re-engrossed. The Chief Clerk shall order printed as many copies of all amended bills as he or she may determine to be necessary.

(b) (1) Amendments from the floor during a bill's second or third reading that would make a substantive change in the bill shall be submitted to the Chief Clerk's desk prior to the scheduled start of session on that legislative day.

(2) Upon receipt of the proposed amendments by the Chief Clerk, an analysis shall be prepared by the committee of origin in conjunction with the Assembly Floor Analysis Unit, and a copy of that analysis shall be distributed to each Member's desk prior to the beginning of debate on adoption of the proposed amendments, unless otherwise ordered by the Speaker.

(3) As used in this subdivision, "bill" does not include a joint or concurrent resolution, but does include a constitutional amendment.

(c) Paragraph (1) of subdivision (b) does not apply to (1) amendments to a bill taken up without reference to file, (2) amendments to a bill to add or delete an urgency clause, (3) amendments to a bill that are identical to other amendments submitted to the Chief Clerk's desk in accordance with the requirements of this rule, (4) amendments to a bill made by a motion to amend or a motion to substitute pursuant to Rule 91, as long as the amendments do not add more than a total of 25 words to, or do not delete more than a total 25 words from, the pending amendments, (5) amendments to the Budget Bill or to a bill that is making statutory changes to implement the Budget Bill, or (6) amendments to a bill to make the bill contingent upon the enactment of another bill, or to incorporate one or more statutory amendments proposed in another bill to avoid superseding those amendments.

(d) Any bill amended on the second or third reading file shall be ordered reprinted and returned to the third reading file, and may not be acted on by the Assembly until the bill, as amended, has been on the Daily File for one calendar day. This subdivision shall not apply to a bill that is amended to add or delete an urgency clause or to a bill that is amended to make statutory changes to implement the Budget Bill.

(e) No motion to amend a bill on the second or third reading file, other than committee amendments reported pursuant to Rule 57, shall be in order on the last two legislative days preceding (1) the

January 31 bill passage deadline specified by Section 10 of Article IV of the California Constitution, (2) the scheduled commencement of the interim study recess, or (3) the scheduled commencement of the final recess as specified by the Joint Rules of the Senate and Assembly.

Consideration of Political Reform Act Bills

69.1. Pursuant to Section 81012 of the Government Code, any bill that would amend the Political Reform Act of 1974 (Title 9 (commencing with Section 81000) of the Government Code) may not be passed until, 12 days prior to being considered for passage, the bill in its final form has been delivered by the Chief Clerk to the Fair Political Practices Commission for distribution to the news media and to every person who has requested the commission to send a copy of any such bill to him or her.

Electronic Distribution of Bills, Conference Reports, Amendments, and Analyses

69.5. Subject to subdivision (b) of Section 8 of Article IV of the California Constitution, any requirement that bills, conference reports, amendments, or an analysis be placed on the desks of the Members shall include electronic distribution of the same information to the desk of the Members through the Assembly Floor System, unless otherwise ordered by the Speaker.

Consideration of Bills Re-referred to Committee

70. Whenever a bill that has been amended and re-referred to committee is reported out by that committee, it shall be placed on the second reading file and may not be transferred therefrom to the third reading file until the following day.

Uncontested Bills

71. No bill may be placed on the Assembly Consent Calendar unless it has met the requirements of Joint Rule 22.1 with respect to each Assembly standing committee to which the bill has been referred.

Consideration of Concurrent and Joint Resolutions

73. A concurrent or joint resolution may be amended by a majority vote of the Members present and voting. The ayes and noes may not be called upon the adoption of concurrent resolutions, except those authorizing expenditures of money, unless regularly demanded, or required by statute or the California Constitution.

Adoption of Resolutions

74. Any resolution upon which a roll call vote is demanded shall require an affirmative recorded vote of 41 or more Members for adoption.

The adoption of any resolution authorizing the expenditure of money shall require an affirmative recorded vote of 41 or more Members.

Printing of Resolutions

75. When any previously printed house resolution is before the Assembly for adoption, it shall be printed in the Journal only if amendments to it have been adopted, in which case it shall be printed as amended. In the absence of those amendments, house

resolutions before the Assembly for adoption shall be referred to by day and page of the Journal as printed upon introduction. For the purposes of this rule, the adding of a coauthor shall not be deemed an amendment.

Concurrence in Senate Amendments

77. It shall require the same affirmative recorded vote to concur in any Senate amendment to an Assembly bill as the vote required by the California Constitution for the passage of the bill. A vote on concurrence may not be taken until the bill has been on the unfinished business file for one calendar day, except that when the bill is placed upon the unfinished business file during the last two legislative days preceding (1) the January 31 bill passage deadline specified by Section 10 of Article IV of the California Constitution, (2) the scheduled commencement of the interim study recess, or (3) the scheduled commencement of the final recess as specified by the Joint Rules of the Senate and Assembly, it may be acted upon immediately. The vote on concurrence shall be deemed the vote upon final passage of the bill.

Senate amendments to Assembly bills may not be concurred in unless and until an analysis of the measure has been distributed by the Assembly Floor Analysis Unit and a copy placed upon the desks of the Members, unless otherwise ordered by the Speaker. As used in this rule, "bill" does not include a joint or concurrent resolution, but does include a constitutional amendment.

Digest of Bills Amended in Senate

77.1. Whenever the Senate amends and passes an Assembly bill, the Legislative Counsel shall, within one day after the bill is passed by the Senate, prepare and transmit to the Chief Clerk and the Speaker a brief digest summarizing the effect of the Senate amendment. Upon receipt from the Legislative Counsel, the Chief Clerk shall cause the digest to be printed in the Daily File immediately following any reference in the file to the bill covered by the digest.

Substantially Amended Bills

77.2. If the analysis of an amendment adopted on the floor discloses that the amendment makes a substantial substantive change to a bill as passed by the last committee of reference, the bill, as amended, may be referred by the Speaker to the appropriate committee.

A bill that was previously reported from a policy or fiscal committee of reference in compliance with Joint Rule 61 is not subject to the deadlines in Joint Rule 61 if the bill is subsequently referred to a policy or fiscal committee pursuant to this rule.

If the digest to an Assembly bill that has been returned to the Assembly by the Senate for concurrence in Senate amendments discloses that the Senate has made a substantial substantive change in the bill as first passed by the Assembly, the bill may be referred by the Speaker to the appropriate committee.

Inactive File

78. Whenever a bill has been passed twice on the third reading file on two successive legislative days, it shall be placed forthwith upon a special file to be known as the inactive file. A bill also may be placed on the inactive file at the request of the author. When a bill has been placed on the inactive file, it may be returned to the third reading file by request of the author. Notice of the request to return the bill to the third reading file shall be published one day in advance in the Assembly File. The bill, when returned to the third reading file, shall then be placed at the foot of the third reading file.

When a bill, placed on the inactive file from the second reading file or the unfinished business file, is removed from the inactive file, it shall be returned to the foot of the second reading file or the unfinished business file, respectively, in the next published Daily File.

Engrossing and Enrolling Bills

79. The Engrossing and Enrolling Clerk shall engross and enroll all bills that come to his or her hands for that purpose, in compliance with the provisions of Section 9503 of the Government Code, and in the order of time in which the same shall be acted upon by the Assembly.

After final passage by both houses, any Assembly bill not amended by the Senate shall be ordered by the Speaker forthwith to be enrolled, as provided in Sections 9508 and 9509 of the Government Code. The Chief Clerk shall report both the day and hour each enrolled bill is presented to the Governor, which report shall be entered in the Journal.

VI. PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE**A. Motions and Questions****Precedence of Motions During Debate**

80. When a question is under debate or before the Assembly, no motions shall be received but the following, which shall take precedence in the order named:

- First—To adjourn;
- Second—To recess to a time certain;
- Third—To lay on the table;
- Fourth—For the previous question;
- Fifth—To set as a special order;
- Sixth—To postpone indefinitely;
- Seventh—To refer to or to re-refer;
- Eighth—To amend.

Questions of Order Decided Without Debate

81. All incidental questions of order, arising after a motion is made for any of the questions named in Rule 80 and pending that motion, shall be decided by the Speaker without debate, whether on appeal or otherwise.

Appeal From Decision of the Speaker

82. Any Member may appeal from a decision of the Speaker without waiting for recognition by the Speaker, even though another Member has the floor. No appeal is in order when another is pending,

or when other business has been transacted by the Assembly prior to the appeal being taken. Upon the appeal being seconded, the Speaker may give his or her reasons for the decision, and the Member making the appeal may give his or her reasons for the appeal, and the Speaker forthwith shall put one of the following questions to the Assembly:

- (1) "Shall the decision of the Speaker be sustained?"
- (2) "Shall the decision of the Speaker be overruled?"

An appeal cannot be amended and yields only to a motion to recess or adjourn, or to lay on the table, or a question of personal privilege. If an appeal is laid on the table, that action shall have no effect on the pending question.

An appeal cannot be debated when relating to indecorum, the transgression of rules, or the priority of business. A majority vote of the Members present and voting shall decide any appeal. In the event of a tie vote, the appeal is lost.

Speaker Explains Order of Business

83. The Speaker may, on his or her own motion or the motion of any Member, explain the order of business when the motion pending before the Assembly is not debatable. That explanation may not consume more than two minutes.

To Adjourn

84. A motion to adjourn is not debatable and cannot be amended, and is always in order, except: (a) when another Member has the floor; (b) when the Assembly is voting; or (c) during a call of the Assembly. The name of any Member moving an adjournment, and the hour at which the motion was made and adjournment taken, shall be entered in the Journal. A motion to adjourn shall be adopted by a majority vote of the Members present and voting.

When a motion to adjourn is made and seconded, it shall be in order for the Speaker, before putting the question, to permit any Member to state to the Assembly any fact relating to the condition of the business of the Assembly which would seem to render it improper or inadvisable to adjourn. That statement may not occupy more than two minutes and is not debatable.

An affirmative recorded vote of a majority of the duly elected and qualified Members is required to adjourn any session of the Assembly sine die.

To Recess to a Time Certain

85. A motion to recess to a time certain shall be treated the same as a motion to adjourn, except that the motion is debatable when no business is before the Assembly, and can be amended as to the time and duration of the recess. It yields only to a motion to adjourn.

To Lay on the Table

86. A motion to lay on the table is not debatable and cannot be amended.

A motion to table a bill, constitutional amendment, or concurrent or joint resolution is adopted by an affirmative recorded vote of 41 or more Members.

Any motion to lay on the table, if carried by 41 or more votes, carries with it the main question and everything that adheres to it,

except that a motion to lay an amendment on the table, if adopted, does not carry with it a bill, constitutional amendment, or concurrent, joint, or house resolution.

A motion to lay an amendment on the table is adopted by a majority vote of the Members present and voting.

A motion to lay on the table cannot be applied with respect to reconsideration.

The Previous Question

87. The previous question shall be put only when demanded by five Members, and its effect, when sustained by a majority vote of the Members present and voting, shall be to put an end to all debate and bring the Assembly to a vote only on the question then pending, except that the proponent of the matter pending shall be allowed not more than five minutes to close the debate.

Motion to Set Special Order

88. A motion to set any matter before the Assembly as a special order of business is adopted by an affirmative recorded vote of 54 or more Members. It is debatable only as to the propriety of setting the main question as a special order of business, and may be amended only as to the time.

Motion to Postpone to a Time Certain

89. A motion to postpone to a time certain shall be deemed and treated as a motion to set as a special order.

Motion to Postpone Indefinitely

90. The making of a motion to postpone indefinitely any bill, motion, or amendment opens the main question to debate. If the motion to postpone indefinitely prevails by an affirmative recorded vote of 41 or more Members, the main question may not be acted upon again during the session.

Motion to Amend

91. A motion to amend may itself be amended, but no “amendment to an amendment” may be amended. A motion to substitute shall be deemed to be a motion to amend and shall be considered the same as an amendment.

Only one substitute is in order when an amendment is pending. A motion to amend or to substitute is debatable, except where the main question to be amended is not debatable. Any motion to amend may be adopted by a majority vote of the Members present and voting.

A motion to amend that is decided in the negative is not again in order on the same day, or at the same stage of proceeding. The fact that a motion to amend by striking out certain words is decided in the negative does not preclude a motion to amend by adding words, or a motion to amend by striking out and inserting words, except that in no case may a further amendment be substantially the same as the one rejected.

Subject to the above provisions of this rule and Rule 69, a motion to amend is in order during the second or third reading of any bill.

Amendment To Be Germane

92. No amendment to any bill, other than a bill stating legislative intent to make necessary statutory changes to implement the Budget Bill, whether reported by a committee or offered by a Member, is in order when the amendment relates to a different subject than, is intended to accomplish a different purpose than, or requires a title essentially different than, the original bill.

No motion or proposition on a subject different from that under consideration may be admitted as an amendment.

No amendment is in order that changes the original number of any bill.

No Member may be added or deleted as an author or coauthor of a bill or resolution without his or her consent.

Consideration of Motions

93. No motion, whether oral or written, may be adopted until it is seconded and distinctly stated to the Assembly by the Speaker.

Motions in Writing

94. Upon request of the Speaker, all motions shall be reduced to writing and shall be read to the Assembly by the Speaker before being acted upon.

Withdrawal of Motions

95. After a motion is stated by the Speaker, or a bill, resolution, or petition is read by the Chief Clerk, it is in the possession of the Assembly.

Motion to Withdraw or Re-refer Bills

96. A motion to withdraw a bill or resolution from committee, or to re-refer a bill or resolution from one committee to another committee, may be made during the regular order of business. A motion to re-refer may be debated only as to the propriety of the reference, and shall require an affirmative recorded vote of 41 or more Members.

No bill or resolution may be withdrawn from committee and placed upon the file, except upon two days' notice thereof and an affirmative recorded vote of 41 or more Members.

A motion to continue a motion to withdraw a bill or resolution from committee shall require a majority of those members present and voting.

Re-reference of Measures on File

97. A motion to re-refer a bill or resolution that is on the Assembly Daily File to committee may be made during the regular order of business. The motion is debatable only as to the propriety of that reference and shall require an affirmative recorded vote of 41 or more Members.

Bills Stricken From File

98. A motion to strike from the file any bill or resolution requires an affirmative recorded vote of 41 or more Members. That bill or resolution may not be acted upon again during the session.

Motion to Rescind Action or Expunge Record

99. Previous to the approval of the Journal by the Assembly, any action may be rescinded and its record ordered expunged by the affirmative recorded vote sufficient to take that action originally, except that no action may be rescinded and the record expunged by a vote less than an affirmative recorded vote of 41 or more Members. No motion to rescind the action and expunge the record may be made twice on the same proposition.

A motion to rescind is not in order on any matter upon which a vote to reconsider has previously been taken in the Assembly.

Whenever any action of the Assembly is rescinded and its record ordered expunged, the record of the action expunged may not appear in any form whatsoever, except that the record of the proceedings on the motion to rescind and expunge shall appear in the Journal as and when printed.

Reconsideration of Vote

100. (a) A motion to reconsider a vote on the next legislative day shall be made on the same day the vote to be reconsidered was taken. No motion to reconsider shall be adopted unless it receives an affirmative recorded vote of 41 or more Members, except that it shall require a vote of 54 or more Members or 60 or more Members, respectively, to reconsider the vote on any matter originally requiring 54 or more votes or 60 or more votes, as the case may be. A motion to reconsider may be voted on without a second.

A motion to reconsider a vote shall be made by a Member voting on the question, and shall take precedence over all motions, except a motion to adjourn. Upon that motion being made, the matter to be reconsidered forthwith shall be placed upon the unfinished business file, and no further action may be taken prior to the next legislative day. When a motion to reconsider has once been made, the motion is the property of the Assembly. When reconsideration is granted, the matter to be reconsidered shall be before the Assembly in the same status it had prior to the vote being reconsidered.

(b) (1) Interim Study Recess:

No motion to reconsider the vote whereby amendments are concurred in on Assembly bills, the vote whereby a Senate bill is passed and returned to the Senate, or the vote whereby a conference committee report is adopted is in order on the last two legislative days preceding the interim study recess.

A motion to reconsider the vote whereby amendments are refused concurrence on Assembly bills, the vote whereby Senate bills are refused passage, or the vote whereby a conference committee report is refused adoption is in order on the last legislative day preceding the interim study recess. The motion may be taken up before the end of that legislative day.

As used in this paragraph, "bill" does not include a joint or concurrent resolution.

(2) January 31—Even-numbered Year:

No motion to reconsider the vote whereby an Assembly bill is passed to the Senate is in order on the last two legislative days preceding January 31 of the even-numbered year.

A motion to reconsider the vote whereby an Assembly bill is refused passage on its third reading is in order on the last legislative day preceding January 31 of the even-numbered year. The motion shall be taken up before the end of that legislative day.

As used in this paragraph, "bill" does not include a Senate bill, a constitutional amendment, or a joint or concurrent resolution.

(3) **Easter or Summer Recess:**

No motion to reconsider the vote whereby a bill is passed is in order on the last two legislative days preceding the Easter or Summer Recess as established by the Joint Rules of the Senate and Assembly.

(4) **Final Recess:**

No motion to reconsider the vote whereby a bill is passed is in order on the last two legislative days preceding the final recess.

A motion to reconsider the vote whereby a bill is defeated is in order on the day of the final recess. The motion shall be taken up before the end of that legislative day.

(c) Any Member voting on any matter may move to take up on the same day the motion, previously made by another Member, to reconsider the vote on that matter. A motion to take up on the same day a motion to reconsider the vote on a bill shall require an affirmative recorded vote of two-thirds of the Members present and voting. A motion to take up on the same day a motion to reconsider the vote on any motion, amendment, Assembly resolution, or proposition other than a bill shall require an affirmative vote of a majority vote of the Members present and voting. The motion to take up the reconsideration on the same day shall take precedence over the motion to reconsider and, upon demand of any Member, the motion to take up the reconsideration on the same day shall be put to an immediate vote. If the motion to take up the reconsideration on the same day is adopted, the motion to reconsider shall be the next order of business before the Assembly.

(d) A second motion to reconsider the same question is not in order, nor is a motion to reconsider reconsideration in order.

(e) A motion to continue a motion to reconsider shall require a majority vote of those Members present and voting.

Call of Assembly

101. After the roll has been called, and prior to the announcement of the vote, any Member may move a call of the Assembly. The Members present may order a call of the Assembly by a majority vote of the Members present and voting, and the Speaker shall immediately order the Sergeant at Arms to lock all doors and direct the Chief Clerk to prepare a list of absentees as disclosed by the last roll call. The list of absentees shall be furnished to the Sergeant at Arms, whereupon no Members shall be permitted to leave the Assembly Chamber except by written permission of the Speaker, and no person may be permitted to enter except Members, Senators, or officers, or employees of the Legislature in the official performance of their duties.

Each Member who is found to be absent, and for whom no leave of absence has been granted, shall be forthwith taken into custody wherever found by the Sergeant at Arms, his or her assistants, or any person designated by the Sergeant at Arms, including members of the California Highway Patrol, and sheriffs or their deputies, and brought to the Assembly Chamber.

No recess or adjournment may be taken during a call of the Assembly. Additional business may be conducted and calls placed regardless of the number of calls in effect. A call of the Assembly may be dispensed with at any time upon a majority vote of the Members present, that action to become effective upon the completion of the roll call and the announcement of the vote upon the matter for which the call was ordered, unless, prior to the announcement of the vote, the call is continued by a majority vote of the Members present.

Division of Question

102. Any Member may call for a division of the question, and the Speaker shall order the question divided if it comprehends propositions in substance so distinct that, one being taken away, a substantive proposition would remain for the decision of the Assembly. This rule does not apply to an individual bill or resolution.

B. Voting

Members Voting

104. Every Member in the Assembly Chamber when a roll call is required shall record his or her vote openly and without debate, unless the Assembly excuses that Member by a majority vote of the Members present and voting.

No Member may operate the voting switch of any other Member, except that a Member presiding at the time of a roll call, who is not the Speaker or the Speaker pro Tempore, may direct another Member on the Floor to operate the voting switch of the presiding Member, and any Member so presiding, including the Speaker and the Speaker pro Tempore, may also operate the voting switches at the rostrum of the Speaker and the Speaker pro Tempore, at their direction.

The name of any Member who refuses to vote as required by this rule, after being requested by the Speaker to do so, shall be entered in the Journal, together with a statement that he or she was present and did so refuse to vote. Any Member who refuses so to vote may, if he or she so desires, and immediately after the announcement of the vote, submit a written explanation of the failure to vote and that explanation shall be printed in the Journal, provided that no explanation may exceed 50 words in length.

In addition to the entry of his or her name in the Journal, any Member who refuses so to vote when required, and who has not been excused from doing so, may, immediately after the announcement of the vote, at the discretion of the Speaker or upon demand of any Member, be summoned to appear before the bar of the Assembly for public censure by the Speaker or by any Member designated by the Speaker. Censure of a Member as provided by this rule does not

constitute a bar to proceedings for his or her expulsion from the Assembly pursuant to Section 5 of Article IV of the California Constitution.

A Member may submit a written explanation of his or her vote on any bill or house resolution, and that explanation shall be printed in the Journal immediately following the vote, provided that no explanation may exceed 50 words in length.

A Member, prior to adjournment on the same legislative day, in the absence of any objection, may instruct the Chief Clerk to add his or her vote to any previously announced vote that had been taken during his or her absence, so long as the outcome of the vote is not thereby changed. The Chief Clerk shall record any vote additions or vote changes in the order signed by the Members at the Clerk's desk.

Ayes and Noes

105. The ayes and noes shall be recorded by the electrical voting system on the final passage of all bills, when an affirmative recorded vote of 41 Members or any vote above that number is required, when demanded by three Members, or when ordered by the Speaker. The names of the Members so voting shall be entered in the Journal.

Voting and Vote Changes

106. When once begun, voting may not be interrupted, except that, before the vote is announced, any Member may have the total pending vote flashed on the visible vote recorder. Prior to the announcement of the vote, the presiding officer shall instruct the Chief Clerk to record verbal votes from Members not at their desks. Any Member may move a call of the Assembly after the completion of the roll. A Member, prior to adjournment on the same legislative day, and in the absence of any objection, may instruct the Chief Clerk to change his or her recorded vote after the vote is announced, so long as the outcome of the vote is not thereby changed. The Chief Clerk may record any vote change only after the Member making the change has announced it to the Assembly.

Tie Vote

107. In case of an equal division, or tie vote, the question shall be lost.

VII. MEMBERS' DECORUM AND PRIVILEGES

Order in Speaking to Questions

108. When a Member desires to address the Assembly, the Member shall rise from his or her seat and respectfully address himself or herself to "Mr. Speaker" or "Madame Speaker." Upon being recognized, the Member may speak, confining himself or herself to the question under consideration. When two or more Members rise at the same time, the Speaker shall designate the Member who is entitled to the floor.

No Member may speak more than once during the consideration of any one question on the same day and at the same stage of proceeding, except that the author of a bill or resolution or the mover of a question shall have the right to open and close the debate thereon. No Member may be allowed to speak more than five

minutes to open and five minutes to close the debate on any question, including amendments, and no Member other than the author or the mover of the question may be allowed to speak more than five minutes thereon. No Member may yield to any other Member the time for which he or she is entitled to speak on any matter.

Motions

109. When a Member desires to make a motion, the Member shall obtain recognition as provided in Rule 108. Upon being recognized, the Member shall open by stating his or her motion, except in the case of a nomination, and in any other case may not speak to the merits of the motion at that time, but shall confine his or her remarks to those necessary to explain the motion. If the motion is in order and is seconded, it shall be stated to the Assembly by the Speaker. If the motion is debated, the Member who made it shall then be entitled to recognition to open the debate on the motion.

When a Member obtains the floor during debate upon any question that is pending before the Assembly and addresses the Assembly regarding the merits of the pending question, the Member may not be permitted to conclude his or her debate by making any motion or by demanding the previous question.

Leave of Absence

110. No Member may absent himself or herself from attendance at any session of the Assembly without leave of the Assembly. No Member may obtain that leave of absence or be excused for nonattendance except by a vote of 54 or more Members or by unanimous consent. A Member who obtains a leave of absence for personal business, or is excused for nonattendance for personal business, thereby waives his or her per diem allowance for attendance upon any session of the Legislature for which he or she secures that leave of absence or excuse. A Member may not obtain a leave of absence for legislative business or be excused for nonattendance for legislative business unless the Member has filed with the Speaker a statement of the legislative business for which he or she seeks that leave of absence or excuse. That statement shall be printed in the Journal.

If a Member is not recorded on the attendance roll within 30 minutes after the scheduled start of the session, the Member shall stand up before the Assembly and explain the reason he or she is late before he or she is recorded on the roll call for any vote. If a Member does not explain his or her reason for being late, any other Member may raise a point of order under this rule, whereupon the tardy Member's vote may not be recorded until an explanation is made.

Personal Privilege

111. Any Member may rise to explain a matter of personal privilege. A matter of personal privilege is a matter involving the Member's integrity, dignity, or honor. Upon rising to explain such a matter, the Member forthwith shall be recognized by the Speaker, but may not discuss a question in that explanation. Matters of personal privilege yield only to a motion to recess or adjourn.

Objection to Reading of Any Paper

112. Any Member, upon recognition by the Speaker, may object to the reading of any paper before the Assembly. When the objection is made, the question of reading shall be determined without debate by a majority vote of the Members present and voting, upon a brief statement by the Speaker of the substance of the objection.

Members at Chief Clerk's Desk

113. No Member or other person may be allowed at the Chief Clerk's desk while the ayes and noes are being recorded or the votes counted.

Members Called to Order for Transgressing Rules

114. If any Member transgresses the Rules of the Assembly, the Speaker shall, or any Member may, call the offending Member to order. The Member so called to order immediately shall take his or her seat, until the Speaker, without debate, has determined whether the Member is in order. That decision by the Speaker shall be subject to an appeal to the Assembly.

If any Member is called to order for offensive words spoken in debate, the person calling him or her to order shall state to the Assembly the words to which exception is taken. No Member may be held to answer, or be subject to censure by the Assembly, for language used in debate if other business has been transacted by the Assembly prior to exception being taken to the words spoken.

VIII. MISCELLANEOUS**Committee of the Whole**

115. The Assembly may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole at any time by a majority vote of the Members present and voting. While sitting as that committee, persons other than Members may address the committee. The Speaker of the Assembly, or any Member named by the Speaker, shall preside as Chairperson of the Committee of the Whole.

A motion that the Committee of the Whole "do now rise and report back to the Assembly," shall always be in order and shall be decided without debate. All actions of the Committee of the Whole shall be reported to the Assembly by the chairperson, but may not be entered in the Journal except upon motion and a majority vote of the Members present and voting.

Use of Assembly Chamber

116. The Assembly Chamber may not be used for any public or private business, other than legislative matters during the sessions or joint recesses of the Legislature, except by consent of 41 or more Members or, during a joint recess, of the Committee on Rules.

Use of Assembly Facilities: Smoking

117. The smoking of tobacco products is prohibited within any building, or portion of a building, occupied or used by Assembly Members or employees if the building or portion of the building is under the jurisdiction or control of the Assembly. This smoking prohibition shall apply to any outdoor area within five feet of an

entrance or exit to any building or portion of a building subject to this rule. This smoking prohibition shall apply to the Assembly Chamber, Assembly hearing rooms, and Assembly offices, and to hallways, stairways, and bathrooms within any building or portion of a building subject to this rule.

Floor of the Assembly: Telephones

117.5. No cellular telephone may be used on the floor of the Assembly during any session of the Assembly.

Meeting of the Assembly: Firearms

117.7. No person, except a peace officer acting within the scope of his or her employment, may carry or possess a firearm on the floor of the Assembly during any session of the Assembly or in a committee hearing room during any meeting of a committee or subcommittee.

Persons Admitted to Floor of the Assembly

118. No person other than Members of the Legislature, officers, employees of the Legislature, accredited members of the press, and guests may be admitted to the floor of the Assembly during any session of the Assembly. A guest of any Member may be admitted only upon presentation of a guest card of the Member countersigned by the Speaker. A guest card is valid only on the legislative day for which it is issued. No lobbyist, as defined by Section 82039 of the Government Code, may, under any circumstances, be admitted to the Assembly Chamber while the Assembly is in session.

Persons admitted to the Assembly Chamber, other than Members, may not be permitted to stand in the lobby in the rear of the Assembly Chamber while the Assembly is in session, but shall be required to occupy the seats provided for them.

Guests may be seated only in the chairs in the back of the rail in the rear of the Assembly Chamber, and may not be permitted to sit at the desks of the Members. No person other than an accredited newspaper representative may be permitted to sit at the press desks. A special section in the balcony may be reserved for those holding guest cards. Neither any person mentioned in this rule nor any other person, except a Member of the Legislature, may engage in influencing the passage or defeat of legislation in the Assembly Chamber.

No person other than a Member of the Legislature, the Sergeant at Arms or his or her assistants, the Chief Clerk or his or her assistants, or the Legislative Counsel or his or her representatives, may be permitted in the area of the floor of the chamber which is occupied by the desks of the Members.

Qualifications and Elections of Members

119. An affirmative vote of 41 or more Members shall be required to determine the qualifications and election of any Member pursuant to Section 5 of Article IV of the California Constitution. No motion to disqualify a Member is in order at the convening of a legislative session until a Speaker has been elected in accordance with Section 9023 of the Government Code.

Compensation and Expenses of Member Convicted of Felony

120. If a Member of the Assembly is convicted of a felony by a superior court, his or her right to further compensation or expenses is thereupon suspended, and his or her membership on any committee is thereupon suspended. If the conviction becomes final, the right of the Member to further compensation or expenses shall terminate and any compensation or expenses withheld shall be forfeited to the state. If the conviction is reversed by an appellate court or a motion for a new trial is granted, and the Member is thereafter found not guilty or the charges against him or her are dismissed, the amounts of the withheld compensation or expenses shall be paid to the Member and the suspension of his or her committee membership shall terminate.

Whenever a Member is convicted of a felony in the superior court, the Committee on Rules shall give written notice thereof to the Controller, directing him or her to discontinue any further payments to the Member unless and until the Committee on Rules notifies the Controller that the Member has been found not guilty or that the charges against him or her are dismissed. The Controller may not draw any warrant payable to that Member except as provided in this rule.

The Seal of the Assembly

121. The Seal of the Assembly may be used only by or on behalf of a Member of the Assembly, or when specifically authorized by the Committee on Rules.

**STANDING RULES OF THE SENATE
CONVENING AND SESSIONS**

Hours of Meeting

1. The Senate shall meet at 9:30 a.m., daily, except Sundays, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate.

Calling to Order

2. The President, President pro Tempore, Vice Chair of the Committee on Rules, or senior member present shall call the Senate to order at the hour stated and, if a quorum is present, shall proceed with the order of business.

Attendance of Members

3. No Senator may absent himself or herself from attendance upon the Senate without leave first obtained. A lesser number than a quorum of the Senate is hereby authorized to send the Sergeant at Arms, or any other person, for any and all absent Senators at the expense of the absent Senators, respectively, unless the excuse for nonattendance as shall be made to the Senate when a quorum is convened shall be judged sufficient, and in that case the expense shall be paid out of the Senate Operating Fund. The President or Acting President of the Senate, or less than a quorum present, shall have the power to issue process directly to the Sergeant at Arms, or to any other person, to compel the attendance of Senators absent without leave. Any Senator who shall refuse to obey that process, unless sick or unable to attend, shall be deemed guilty of contempt of the Senate, and the Sergeant at Arms, or any other person, to whom the process may be directed, shall have power to use such force as may be necessary to compel the attendance of the absent Senator, and for this purpose he or she may command the force of the county, or of any county in the state.

Order of Business

4. The order of business shall be as follows:
 - (1) Rollcall.
 - (2) Prayer by Chaplain.
 - (3) Privileges of the Floor.
 - (4) Communications and Petitions.
 - (5) Messages from the Governor.
 - (6) Messages from the Assembly.
 - (7) Reports from Committees.
 - (8) Motions, Resolutions and Notices.
 - (9) Introductions and First Reading of Bills.
 - (10) Consideration of Daily File:
 - (a) Second Reading.
 - (b) Special Orders.
 - (c) Unfinished Business.
 - (d) Third Reading.
 - (11) Announcement of Committee Meetings.
 - (12) Continuation of Privileges of the Floor.
 - (13) Leaves of Absence.
 - (14) Adjournment.

Executive Sessions

5. When a motion is adopted to close the doors of the Senate, on the discussion of any business that may, in the opinion of the Senate, require an executive session, the President shall require all persons, except the Senators, President of the Senate, Secretary, Minute Clerk, and Sergeant at Arms, to withdraw, and during the discussion of that business the doors shall remain closed. Every Senator and officer present shall keep secret all matters and proceedings concerning which secrecy shall be enjoined by order of the Senate.

OFFICERS OF THE SENATE**The President**

6. The President shall maintain order in the Senate Chamber, and in case of a disturbance or disorderly conduct outside the bar, or in the gallery, the President (or Chair of the Committee of the Whole) shall have the power to order the same cleared.

The President pro Tempore

7. The President pro Tempore shall, in the absence of the President, take the Chair and call the Senate to order, at the hour of the meetings of the Senate, and shall have the same powers as the President.

It shall be the particular responsibility of the President pro Tempore to secure the prompt and businesslike disposition of bills and other business before the Senate.

The President pro Tempore shall serve ex officio as a member of all Senate and joint committees of which he or she is not a regular member, with all of the rights and privileges of that membership except the right to vote. In counting a quorum of any of these committees, the President pro Tempore shall not be counted as a member.

The Vice Chair of the Committee on Rules shall, in the absence of the President pro Tempore, perform the duties, and have all powers and authority, of the President pro Tempore.

Presiding by Senators

8. The President pro Tempore of the Senate may name any Senator to perform the duties of the Chair in the absence of the President or the President pro Tempore. The Senator so named shall be vested, during that time, with all the powers of the President, and the Senator who performs these duties shall be known as the Presiding Officer.

Secretary of the Senate

9. It shall be the duty of the Secretary of the Senate to attend every session, call the roll, and read all bills, amendments, and resolutions, and all papers ordered read by the Senate or the presiding officer.

The Secretary of the Senate shall superintend all printing to be done for the Senate and shall have supervision over all attachés of the Senate. He or she shall assign, reassign, or transfer all attachés to their respective duties.

The Secretary of the Senate shall certify to, and transmit to, the Assembly all bills, joint and concurrent resolutions, constitutional amendments, and papers requiring the concurrence of the Assembly, immediately after their passage or adoption by the Senate.

The Secretary of the Senate shall also keep a correct Journal of the proceedings of the Senate, and shall notify the Assembly of the action by the Senate on all matters originating in the Assembly and requiring action on the part of the Senate.

The Secretary of the Senate shall have custody of all bills, documents, papers and records of the Senate and may not permit any of the bills, documents, records, or papers to be taken from the Desk or out of his or her custody by any person, except in the regular course of the business of the Senate.

Sergeant at Arms of the Senate

10. The Sergeant at Arms shall attend the Senate during all of its sittings, and shall execute the commands of the Senate from time to time, together with all process issued by authority thereof, as shall be directed to him or her by the President. The Sergeant at Arms is authorized to arrest for contempt all persons outside the bar, or in the gallery, found in loud conversation or otherwise making a noise to the disturbance of the Senate. The actual expenses for the Sergeant at Arms for every arrest and for each day's custody and releasement, and the traveling expenses for himself or herself and special messengers going and returning, shall be paid out of the Senate Operating Fund.

The Sergeant at Arms shall place copies of all bills, joint and concurrent resolutions, constitutional amendments, Journals, Histories, and Files, when printed, on the desks of Senators, at least one hour previous to the opening of the session.

Elected and Appointed Officers

10.5. On the first day of each session, the President pro Tempore, members of the Committee on Rules, Secretary of the Senate, and Sergeant at Arms shall be elected by a majority vote of the duly elected and qualified Members of the Senate and shall serve until their successors are elected and qualify. The Committee on Rules shall appoint an Assistant Secretary, a Minute Clerk, a Chaplain, and other employees with such duties as the committee requires.

Officers and Employees Compensation: Approval

10.6. The Controller is hereby authorized and directed to draw his or her warrants in favor of officers and employees who render services to the Senate, as certified by the Committee on Rules or by its authorized representative, from the fund set aside for the pay of officers and employees of the Senate at the rate of compensation certified by the committee or its representative, and the Treasurer is hereby directed to pay the same.

COMMITTEES OF THE SENATE

Appointment of Committees

11. The Committee on Rules shall consist of the President pro Tempore of the Senate, who shall be the chair of the committee, and four other Members of the Senate to be elected by the Senate. There is a vacancy on the committee in the event a member ceases to be a

Member of the Senate or resigns from the Committee on Rules. Any vacancy occurring during a summer, interim study, or final recess, except in the case of the President pro Tempore, shall be filled by the remaining members of the Committee on Rules. A vacancy occurring at any other time shall be filled by election of the Senate.

The Committee on Rules shall appoint all other committees of the Senate unless otherwise directed by the Senate and shall designate a chair of each committee so appointed and a vice chair of each standing committee.

In making committee appointments, the Committee on Rules shall give consideration to seniority, preference, and experience. However, in making committee appointments, the Committee on Rules shall, as far as practicable, give equal representation to all parts of the state.

Standing Committees

12. The standing committees of the Senate, the number of members, and subjects to be referred to each are set out below. The provisions set forth below as to the assignment of bills are intended as a guide to the Committee on Rules, but are not binding upon the committee.

(1) Agriculture and Water Resources, 11 members. Bills relating to agriculture and water.

(2) Appropriations, 13 members. Bills that are subject to Joint Rule 10.5 and are not referred to the Budget and Fiscal Review Committee. Bills that constitute a state-mandated local program.

(3) Budget and Fiscal Review, 13 members. The Budget Bill and bills implementing the Budget. Bills that directly affect the State Budget, including deficiencies and reappropriations.

(4) Business and Professions, 9 members. Bills relating to business and professional practices and regulations other than bills relating to horseracing, alcoholic beverages, oil, mining, geothermal, or forestry industries. Bills relating to health and dance studios.

(5) Constitutional Amendments, 5 members. Bills relating to constitutional amendments and constitutional amendments, when favorably reported out of the standing committee having jurisdiction of the subject matter.

(6) Criminal Procedure, 7 members. Bills amending the following:

(a) Evidence Code, relating to criminal procedure.

(b) Penal Code.

(c) Statutes of a penal nature not related closely to a subject included in another subdivision of this rule.

(d) Bills relating to the Youth and Adult Corrections Agency.

(7) Education, 9 members. Bills relating to education, higher education, and educational personnel other than noncertificated employees.

(8) Elections and Reapportionment, 5 members. Bills relating to elections and reapportionment.

(9) Energy, Utilities, and Communications, 9 members. Bills relating to public utilities and carriers, energy conservation and development of alternate sources, entertainment technology and

multimedia, and energy production related to utility generation, except legislation permitting the use of state-controlled lands. Bills relating to community antenna television.

(10) Finance, Investment and International Trade, 9 members. Bills relating to financial institutions, commerce, international trade, retail credit interest rates, and corporations.

(11) Governmental Organization, 11 members. Bills relating to state government organization, horseracing, public gaming, the National Guard, alcoholic beverages, and integrated waste management, and legislation permitting the use of state-controlled lands. Bills that have been considered by other committees having jurisdiction of the appropriate subject, for consideration of any question relating to state government.

(12) Health and Human Services, 9 members. Bills relating to public health, welfare, the blind and disabled, alcohol and drug abuse, mental health, and institutions related thereto.

(13) Housing and Land Use, 7 members. Bills relating to housing and land use.

(14) Industrial Relations, 7 members. Bills relating to labor, industrial safety, unemployment, workers' compensation and insurance, and noncertificated public school employees.

(15) Insurance, 9 members. Bills relating to insurance, indemnity, surety, warranty agreements, liens, claims, unclaimed property, collections, and franchises.

(16) Judiciary, 9 members. Bills amending the following:

(a) Civil Code, except measures related to retail credit interest rates.

(b) Code of Civil Procedure.

(c) Evidence Code, except matters relating to criminal procedure.

(d) Family Code.

(e) Probate Code.

(f) Bills relating to municipal and state court judgeships, court attachés, and personnel.

(17) Local Government, 7 members. Bills relating to local governmental procedure and organization. Bills that have been considered by other committees having jurisdiction of the appropriate subject, for consideration of any questions relating to local government administration.

(18) Natural Resources and Wildlife, 11 members. Bills relating to conservation and the management of public resources, fish and wildlife, regulation of oil, mining, geothermal development, acid deposition, wetlands and lakes, global atmospheric effects, ocean and bay pollution, forestry practices, recreation, parks, and historical resources, and beverage container recycling, except bills affecting the California Integrated Waste Management Act of 1989 or legislation affecting the Department of Boating and Waterways.

(19) Public Employment and Retirement, 5 members. Bills relating to state and local nonschool public employees and public employee retirement.

(20) Revenue and Taxation, 9 members. Bills relating to state and local revenues and taxation, except bills described in subdivision (a) of Rule 28.9.

(21) Rules, 5 members. Proposed amendments to the rules and other matters relating to the business of the Legislature.

(22) Toxics and Public Safety Management, 7 members. Bills relating to hazardous and toxic substances, siting of facilities managing hazardous materials, emergency planning responses, and household hazardous waste, except bills affecting the California Integrated Waste Management Act of 1989. Bills relating to natural disasters.

(23) Transportation, 9 members. Bills relating to the operation, safety, equipment, transfer of ownership, licensing, and registration of vehicles, aircraft, and vessels. Legislation affecting the Department of Transportation and the Department of Motor Vehicles. Bills relating to waterways, harbors, highways, public transportation systems, and airports.

(24) Veterans Affairs, 5 members. Bills relating to veterans and armories. Bills amending the Military and Veterans Code.

The standing committees of any regular session shall be the standing committees of concurrent special or extraordinary sessions unless otherwise ordered by the Senate.

Committee on Legislative Ethics

12.3. (a) (1) The Committee on Legislative Ethics is hereby created. The committee shall be appointed by the Committee on Rules and shall consist of six Senators, at least two of whom are members of the political party having the greatest number of members in the Senate and at least two of whom are members of the political party having the second greatest number of members in the Senate. The members of the committee shall serve two-year terms. The President pro Tempore and the Minority Floor Leader shall serve as ex officio, nonvoting members of the committee.

(2) The Committee on Rules shall select a Chair and a Vice Chair, who may not be members of the same political party. The Chair may not serve more than two consecutive two-year terms, and the Committee on Rules shall select a successor who is not a member of the same political party as the immediately previous Chair.

(3) Vacancies in the committee shall be filled within 30 calendar days by the Committee on Rules for the remainder of a term.

(4) If a complaint is filed against a member of the committee, the Committee on Rules shall temporarily replace the member with a Senator of the same political party, who shall serve until the complaint is dismissed by the committee or the Senate takes action as it deems appropriate, whichever occurs earlier.

(5) The Committee on Rules, upon the recommendation of the Committee on Legislative Ethics, shall appoint a Chief Counsel to assist the committee in carrying out its functions. The staff of the committee shall be considered permanent and professional, and shall perform their duties in a nonpartisan manner. No staff of the committee may engage in partisan activities regarding a Senate election campaign. The committee may retain independent counsel when necessary for specific investigations.

(b) The committee shall do all of the following:

(1) The committee shall formulate and recommend, for adoption by the Senate, standards of conduct for Senators and officers and employees of the Senate in the performance of their legislative

responsibilities. The Ethics Manual for Members, Officers, and Employees of the United States House of Representatives, as prepared by the Staff of the Committee on Standards of Official Conduct, 100th Congress First Session (United States Government Printing Office, Washington, 1987), the Code of Ethics (Article 2 (commencing with Section 8920) of Chapter 1 of Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 2 of the Government Code), and Joint Rule 44 shall serve as guides in the formulation of the standards of conduct.

(2) At the request of any Senator or officer or employee of the Senate, the committee shall provide an advisory opinion with respect to the standards of conduct of the Senate on the general propriety of past, current, or anticipated conduct of that Senator, officer, or employee. The opinion shall be rendered within 21 legislative days unless the Chair and Vice Chair agree otherwise. The committee may, with appropriate deletions to ensure the privacy of the individuals concerned, publish the advisory opinions for the guidance of other Senators, officers, or employees.

(3) The committee shall develop, issue, and annually update a clear, informative, and usable manual for the Senate based on the standards of conduct adopted by the Senate, including any advisory opinions published pursuant to paragraph (2).

(4) The committee shall conduct periodic workshops, at least once each calendar year, for Senators and officers and employees of the Senate, including workshops specifically designed for newly elected Senators and newly appointed officers and employees. At least once in each biennial session, each Senator, and each officer or employee of the Senate who is a designated employee under the Senate Conflict of Interest Code, shall attend one of these workshops. The workshops shall include, but not be limited to, a comprehensive review of all applicable statutes and Senate rules.

(5) After adoption by the Senate of the standards of conduct, the committee shall receive and review complaints alleging violations of the standards of conduct by Senators, or officers or employees of the Senate, in accordance with the procedures specified in subdivisions (c) to (s), inclusive.

(6) The committee shall maintain a record of its investigations, hearings, and other proceedings. All records, complaints, documents, and reports filed with, submitted to, or made by the committee, and all records and transcripts of any investigations or hearings of the committee shall be confidential and may not be open to inspection by any person other than a member of the committee or the staff of the committee, except as otherwise specifically provided for in this rule. Any member of the committee or any person on the staff of the committee who discloses any record, complaint, document, report, or transcript that is confidential shall be subject to discipline. The committee may, by a majority vote of the membership of the committee, authorize the release of any records, complaints, documents, reports, and transcripts in its possession to the appropriate enforcement agency if the committee determines that there is probable cause to believe that the violation or violations alleged in the complaint would constitute a felony or if the committee determines that the information is material to any matter pending before the enforcement agency.

(c) (1) Any person may file a complaint with the committee that alleges a violation of the standards of conduct.

(2) Except as provided in paragraphs (3) and (4), no complaint may be filed more than 18 months after the date that the alleged violation occurred.

(3) If the committee determines that the person filing the complaint did not know, or through the exercise of reasonable diligence could not have known, of the alleged violation within 18 months after the date that the alleged violation occurred, the complaint may be filed within three years after the date that the alleged violation occurred.

(4) If a complaint is filed within 60 days prior to an election at which a Senator or officer or employee is a candidate for elective office, the complaint shall be returned to the person filing the complaint, and the person shall be informed that the complaint may be filed with an appropriate enforcement agency and may be refiled with the committee after the election. The period of time for filing the complaint shall be extended for 60 days.

(5) No complaint may be filed if it alleges a violation that occurred prior to the adoption of the standards of conduct.

(d) A complaint shall satisfy all of the following requirements:

(1) It shall be in writing.

(2) It shall state the name of the person filing the complaint.

(3) It shall state the name of Senator, or the name and position or title of the officer or employee of the Senate, who is alleged to have committed a violation of the standards of conduct.

(4) It shall set forth allegations that, if true, would constitute a violation of the standards of conduct. The allegations shall be stated with sufficient clarity and detail to enable the committee to make a finding pursuant to subdivision (h).

(5) It shall state the date of the alleged violation.

(6) It shall include a statement that the allegations are true of the person's own knowledge or that the person believes them to be true, and shall be signed by the person under penalty of perjury.

(e) The committee, on its own motion, two-thirds of the membership concurring, may initiate a proceeding by filing a complaint that complies with paragraphs (1) to (5), inclusive, of subdivision (d).

(f) The committee shall promptly send a copy of a complaint to the Senator, or officer or employee of the Senate, alleged to have committed the violation, who shall thereafter be designated as the respondent.

(g) If a complaint is filed by a person other than the committee, the Chair and Vice Chair of the committee shall examine the complaint to determine whether it was filed in accordance with this rule and any rules of the committee. Within 15 calendar days after the complaint is filed, the Chair and Vice Chair shall provide to the committee a copy of the complaint and their opinion as to whether the allegations in the complaint, if true, would constitute a violation of the standards of conduct. If the committee, by a two-thirds vote of its membership, finds that the allegations, if true, would constitute a violation of the standards of conduct, the committee shall hold a hearing within 30 calendar days to conduct a preliminary inquiry. If

two-thirds of the membership of the committee fails to find that the allegations, if true, would constitute a violation of the standards of conduct, it shall dismiss the complaint and so notify the person who filed the complaint and the respondent, and the complaint shall not be made public.

(h) At the preliminary inquiry, the respondent may respond to the allegations in the complaint by written statement or oral testimony. If two-thirds of the membership of the committee finds that probable cause exists for believing that the respondent committed a violation of the standards of conduct, the committee shall issue a count-by-count statement of alleged violations. If two-thirds of the membership of the committee fails to find that probable cause exists, the committee shall dismiss the complaint. In either event, the committee shall immediately notify the respondent and the person who filed the complaint of its action. If the committee finds that probable cause exists, the statement of alleged violations shall be made public within seven days.

(i) Within 21 calendar days after the issuance of the statement of alleged violations, the respondent may file an answer that admits or denies each count. Upon request of the respondent, the committee may grant the respondent an additional 21 calendar days to respond.

(j) Within 60 days after the issuance of the statement of alleged violations, the committee shall hold a disciplinary hearing. If a majority of the membership of each party on the committee fails to find that the respondent committed a violation of the standards of conduct, the committee shall dismiss the complaint. If a majority of the membership of each party on the committee finds by clear and convincing evidence that the respondent committed a violation of the standards of conduct, the committee shall take the following action:

(1) If the respondent is a Senator, it shall hold a hearing to determine an appropriate sanction.

(2) If the respondent is an officer or employee, it shall transmit its findings to the Committee on Rules for appropriate action.

(k) (1) At the hearing to determine an appropriate sanction, two-thirds of the membership of the committee shall determine whether the violation is serious or minor.

(2) If the committee determines that a violation is minor or fails to determine that a violation is serious, two-thirds of the membership of the committee (A) shall, if it determines that the violation bears upon the exercise of a right or privilege, recommend that the Committee on Rules deny or limit that right or privilege and shall transmit its findings and recommendation to the Committee on Rules, or (B) shall impose any lesser sanction. Within 15 days after the imposition of a lesser sanction, the respondent may appeal the sanction imposed to the Committee on Rules.

(3) If the committee determines that a violation is serious, two-thirds of the membership of the committee shall recommend that the Senate take one or more of the following actions and shall transmit its findings and recommendation to the Senate:

(A) The denial or limitation of any right or privilege, if the violation bears upon the exercise of that right or privilege.

(B) A reprimand for a serious violation.

(C) A censure for a more serious violation.

(D) An expulsion for a most serious violation.

(l) The Senate shall, within 15 legislative days after receiving the findings and recommendation, vote on the recommendation of the committee. The Senate, by 21 votes, may deny or limit any right or privilege of, reprimand, or censure the Senator or, by 27 votes, may expel the Senator.

(m) The committee or Senate may defer any action required by this rule if other proceedings have been commenced on the same matter.

(n) (1) At all hearings, the Chief Counsel of the committee shall present the case. All relevant and probative evidence shall be admissible unless it is privileged. Witnesses may be called and cross-examined by the Committee and the respondent, and exhibits and other documents may be entered into the record. The respondent shall have the right to be represented by legal counsel or any other person of his or her choosing.

(2) If the committee receives, at any time, any exculpatory information relating to the alleged violation, the committee shall make the information available to the respondent.

(o) If the committee determines that the complaint was filed with malicious intent, it may request that the Committee on Rules reimburse the expenses incurred by the respondent.

(p) At any time during the proceedings, the respondent may admit that he or she committed a violation of the standards of conduct. If the respondent admits some but not all of the violations alleged in the complaint or the counts set forth in the statement of alleged violations, the committee shall find that the admitted violations constituted a violation of the standards of conduct and may continue the proceedings to determine whether the other alleged violations constituted violations of the standards of conduct. If the respondent admits to all alleged violations, the committee shall find that the admitted violations constituted a violation of the standards of conduct, terminate the preliminary inquiry or disciplinary hearing, and take the action required by paragraph (1) or (2) of subdivision (j).

(q) Meetings of the committee may not be open to the public until the committee finds that probable cause exists for believing that the respondent committed a violation of the standards of conduct. Subsequent meetings of the committee or Senate shall be public, and notice of any meeting shall be published in the Senate File for four calendar days prior to the meeting.

(r) If the committee finds that probable cause exists for believing that the respondent committed a violation of the standards of conduct, the transcript of any testimony given, or any documents admitted into evidence, at a public hearing and any report prepared by the committee subsequent to that finding that states a final finding or recommendation shall be open to public inspection.

(s) Upon request of the respondent, the committee may permit the respondent to inspect, copy, or photograph books, papers, documents, photographs, or other tangible objects that relate to the

allegations in the complaint. If the committee finds that probable cause exists for believing that the respondent committed a violation of the standards of conduct, the committee shall permit the respondent to inspect, copy, or photograph books, papers, documents, photographs, or other tangible objects that relate to the statement of alleged violations.

(t) (1) No Senator or officer or employee of the Senate may directly or indirectly use or attempt to use his or her official authority or influence to intimidate, threaten, coerce, command, or attempt to intimidate, threaten, coerce, or command any person for the purpose of interfering with the right of that person to file a complaint with the committee, or testify before, or in any way cooperate with, the committee or any panel.

(2) For the purpose of paragraph (1), "use of official authority or influence" includes promising to confer, or conferring, any benefit; effecting, or threatening to effect, any reprisal; or taking, or directing others to take, or recommending, processing, or approving, any personnel action, including, but not limited to, appointment, promotion, transfer, assignment, performance evaluation, suspension, or other disciplinary action.

(3) Nothing in this subdivision may be construed to authorize any person to disclose information the disclosure of which is otherwise prohibited by law.

(u) The committee may adopt rules governing its proceedings not inconsistent with this rule. The provisions of Joint Rule 36 relating to investigating committees shall apply to the committee to the extent those provisions are consistent with this rule.

(v) The powers and procedures set forth in subdivisions (b) to (u), inclusive, confer independent authority and may not be limited or altered by Joint Rule 45.

General Research Committee

12.5. The General Research Committee is hereby created pursuant to Section 11 of Article IV of the California Constitution, which relates to legislative committees. The committee consists of the 40 Senators, and the President pro Tempore is its chair. The committee is allocated all subjects within the scope of legislative regulation and control, but may not undertake any investigation that another committee has been specifically requested or directed to undertake. The General Research Committee may act through subcommittees appointed by the Senate Committee on Rules, and each of the subcommittees may act only on the particular study or investigation assigned by the Committee on Rules to that subcommittee. Each member of the General Research Committee is authorized and directed to receive and investigate requests for legislative action made by individuals or groups and to report thereon to the full committee.

The committee and its members shall have and exercise all of the rights, duties, and powers conferred upon investigating committees and their members by the Senate Rules and the Joint Rules of the Senate and Assembly. However, neither the committee nor its

members may issue a subpoena without the prior approval of the Committee on Rules. The committee has the following additional powers and duties:

(a) To contract with other agencies, public or private, for the rendition and affording of services, facilities, studies, and reports to the committee as the committee deems necessary to assist it to carry out the purposes for which it is created.

(b) To cooperate with and secure the cooperation of county, city, city and county, and other local law enforcement agencies in investigating any matter within the scope established by this rule, and to direct the sheriff of any county to serve subpoenas, orders, and other process issued by the committee.

(c) To meet and act at any place within the State of California and, when authorized in writing by the Committee on Rules to do so, to meet and act outside the state to carry out its duties.

(d) To report its findings and recommendations to the Legislature and the people from time to time.

(e) To act during sessions of the Legislature, including any recess.

(f) To do any and all other things necessary or convenient to enable it fully and adequately to exercise its powers, perform its duties, and accomplish the objects and purposes of this rule.

The Committee on Rules may allocate, from time to time, to the General Research Committee from the Senate Operating Fund those sums that are necessary to permit the General Research Committee and the members thereof to carry out the duties imposed on them. In addition, the Committee on Rules may allocate to any subcommittee from the Senate Operating Fund those sums that the Committee on Rules deems necessary to complete the investigation or study conferred upon that subcommittee.

Additional Committee on Rules Powers

12.7. In addition to other rights, duties and powers vested in the Committee on Rules, the committee and the members thereof shall have and exercise all of the rights, duties, and powers of the General Research Committee and the members thereof, as provided in Rule 12.5, with authority to act on any subject allocated by Rule 12.5 to the General Research Committee.

Committee on Rules

13. The Committee on Rules is charged with the general responsibility for the administrative functioning of the Senate. The committee shall have general charge of the books, documents, and other papers and property of the Senate and shall see that the same are properly kept, cared for, filed, or otherwise disposed of in accordance with law and the rules applicable thereto. The committee shall also have the duties of making studies and recommendations designed to promote, improve, and expedite the business and procedure of the Senate and of the committees thereof, including investigating committees consisting wholly or in part of Members of the Senate, and of proposing any amendments to the rules deemed necessary to accomplish those purposes.

The Committee on Rules shall continue in existence during any recess of the Legislature until the convening of the next regular session, and shall have the same powers and duties as while the

Senate is in session. The committee shall have the authority to fill vacancies in any Senate committee or in the Senate membership of any joint committee.

In dealing with any matter within its jurisdiction, the committee and its members shall have and exercise all of the rights, duties, and powers conferred upon investigating committees and their members by the Joint Rules of the Senate and Assembly as they are adopted and amended from time to time, which provisions are incorporated herein and made applicable to the Committee on Rules and its members.

The committee may make available to any Senate or joint committee, or any Member of the Senate, assistance in connection with the duties of the committee or other legislative matters as the personnel resources under the direction of the committee or its other facilities permit.

The committee shall make available to, and shall furnish to, the Senate investigating committees created at this regular session, and to each of the members thereof, secretarial and stenographic help as may be reasonably necessary for the committees and each of the members thereof to make and carry on the studies and investigations required by or of them by the resolutions creating the committees and, for that purpose, in addition to any other power or authority, the Committee on Rules may employ additional stenographic and secretarial assistants as may be necessary, assign and reassign the assistants, prescribe the amounts, times, and methods of payment of their compensation, and provide for the auditing of any and all records and accounts in respect thereto. The Committee on Rules shall have general supervision over all clerks, attachés, and employees of the Senate and shall have the powers and duties to suspend, discipline, or discharge any attachés or employees when necessary.

All employees on the payroll of the Senate are employees of the Senate and not of individual members, and they are under the direct control of the Committee on Rules. Any insubordination or inefficiency on the part of any employee shall be reported to the Committee on Rules.

The Committee on Rules shall constitute the Committee on Introduction of Bills and shall have charge of the engrossment and enrollment of bills, the contingent expenses of the Senate, and legislative printing, except insofar as these functions are delegated to the Secretary of the Senate.

The rooms, passages, and buildings set apart for the use of the Senate shall be under the direction of the Committee on Rules, and the committee may assign the press desks in the Senate Chamber to accredited newspaper representatives.

Executive communication of nominations sent by the Governor to the Senate for confirmation shall be referred to the Committee on Rules, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate, without debate.

The Committee on Rules shall, at each regular session, appoint a Member of the Senate to serve on the Judicial Council and shall have the authority during any joint recess to fill any vacancy in that position that occurs during the recess.

When a report of a joint legislative committee is delivered to the Senate Desk, the Committee on Rules shall refer it to a standing committee for review and appropriate action.

Expenses of Senate Committees

13.1. All claims for expenses incurred by investigating committees of the Senate, the Secretary of the Senate, and the Sergeant at Arms shall be approved by the Committee on Rules or its authorized representative before the claims are presented to the Controller.

All proposed expenditures, including furniture, equipment, and other property, but not including stationery supplies, shall be approved by the Committee on Rules or its authorized representatives before the expenses are incurred, unless the expenditure is specifically exempted from the provisions of this rule by the resolution authorizing it.

No warrant may be drawn in payment of any claim for expenses until the approval of the Committee on Rules, or its authorized representative, has been obtained in accordance with this rule.

The Committee on Rules may adopt rules and regulations limiting the amount, time, and place of expenses and allowances to be paid to employees of Senate investigating committees and regulating the terms and conditions of employment of their employees. Copies of all rules and regulations adopted pursuant to this rule shall be distributed to the chair of every investigating committee.

Alteration, Repair, Improvement to Senate

13.2. The Committee on Rules is authorized and directed to incur and pay expenses of the Senate not otherwise provided for as the committee determines are reasonably necessary, including the repair, alteration, improvement, and equipping of the Senate Chamber and the offices provided for the Senate in the State Capitol.

In order to avoid unanticipated reversions of appropriations for contingent expenses, the Committee on Rules may designate the appropriation from which payment shall be made pursuant to allocations to committees or for other purposes. If insufficient money is available in any appropriation to pay all claims pursuant to allocations charged against it, the committee shall designate another appropriation from which the allocations shall be paid.

Rooms and Property of Senate

13.3. The Committee on Rules is responsible for the safekeeping of Senate property. The Chief of the Bureau of Buildings and Grounds is directed to maintain the Senate Chamber and all the committee rooms and other rooms used by the Senators and officers of the Senate in a condition that they will be available for the use of the Senate at any time. It is further directed that no persons other than the Members, officers, and attachés of the Senate may occupy or use the offices, committee rooms, and other rooms now occupied by the Senate without permission as hereinafter provided, that the desks, furniture, and other equipment of the Senate shall be at the disposal of the Committee on Rules, and that no person except Members of the Senate may occupy any of the Senate's offices or make use of Senate equipment without permission of the committee or its authorized representative.

Inventory of Senate Property

13.4. The Committee on Rules is authorized and directed, through its authorized representative, to make and maintain a complete inventory of all property of the Senate, including all property in the possession or control of any Senate committee. The Committee on Rules shall have custody and control of all property of the Senate and shall adopt rules or orders as it may determine are necessary relating to the purchase, care, custody, and use or disposal thereof.

Status of Standing Rules for Regular Session

13.5. The adoption of the Standing Rules for any special session are not to be construed as modifying or rescinding the Standing Rules of the Senate for a regular session.

Operating Expense Fund

13.6. The Committee on Rules is the committee identified in Section 9126 of the Government Code. The balance of all money in the Senate Operating Fund, including money now or hereafter appropriated by the Legislature, except sums that are made available specifically for purposes other than the expenses of designated committees, is hereby made available to the Committee on Rules for any charges or claims it may incur in carrying out the duties imposed upon it by these rules or by Senate or concurrent resolution.

Rules Committee Appointees

13.8. The Committee on Rules shall review its nonlegislator appointees every two years. That review shall be completed not later than the 120th calendar day of the regular session in which the review is undertaken.

Appointees to the Regents of the University of California

13.9. No vote to confirm an appointment by the Governor to the Regents of the University of California shall be in order unless the Committee on Rules determines that the Governor has convened and consulted the advisory committee specified in subdivision (e) of Section 9 of Article IX of the California Constitution and that the advisory committee has held at least one public meeting for purposes of that consultation.

Schedule of Committee Meetings

14. The Committee on Rules shall propose to the Senate such schedules for regular meetings of the standing committees as will permit all members of each committee to attend without a conflict of committee engagements.

The committee may also propose such special committee meetings or special schedules of committee meetings as will facilitate the business of the Senate. Those schedules may provide a special schedule of committee meetings upon certain days of the week or to meet any special condition that may arise.

Powers of Standing Committees

16. Each standing committee of the Senate to which a proposed law or bill is assigned shall have full power and authority during the session of the Legislature, or any recess thereof, to make an

investigation and study concerning any proposed law or bill as the committee shall determine necessary to enable it to properly act thereon.

In the exercise of the power granted by this rule, each committee may appoint a secretary and employ clerical, legal, and technical assistants as may appear necessary when money has been made available therefor by the Senate.

Each standing committee is authorized and empowered to summon and subpoena witnesses, to require the production of papers, books, accounts, reports, documents, records, and papers of every kind and description, to issue subpoenas, and to take all necessary means to compel the attendance of witnesses and to procure testimony, oral and documentary. However, no committee may issue a subpoena without the prior approval of the Committee on Rules.

Each of the members of the standing committees is authorized and empowered to administer oaths, and all of the provisions of Chapter 4 (commencing with Section 9400) of Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 2 of the Government Code, relating to the attendance and examination of witnesses before the Legislature and the committees thereof, shall apply to the committees.

The Sergeant at Arms, or other person designated by the Sergeant at Arms or by the committee, shall serve any and all subpoenas, orders, and other process that may be issued by the committee, when directed to do so upon a vote of the majority of the membership of the committee.

All officers of this state, including the head of each department, agency, and subdivision thereof, all employees of the departments, agencies, and subdivisions of the state, the Legislative Counsel, and all other persons, whether connected with the state government or not, shall give and furnish to these committees upon request such information, records, and documents as the committees deem necessary or proper for the achievement of the purposes for which each standing committee was created.

Each standing committee may meet at the State Capitol and do any and all things necessary or convenient to enable it to exercise the powers and perform the duties herein granted to it, and may expend such money as may be made available by the Senate for that purpose, except that no committee may incur any indebtedness unless money shall have been first made available therefor.

Funerals

17.5. The Chair or Vice Chair of the Committee on Rules may designate any one or more of the Members of the Senate as a Senate committee to attend funerals in appropriate circumstances. The Members so designated may receive expenses as provided in Joint Rule 35.

The Chair or Vice Chair of the Committee on Rules, or any Member of the Senate designated by either of these officers, may incur such expense as may be necessary for the purchase on behalf of the Senate of suitable floral pieces for the funeral.

All expenses incurred pursuant to this rule are hereby ordered to be paid out of the money allocated from the Senate Operating Fund to the Committee on Rules and disbursed, after certification by the

Chair or Vice Chair of the committee or by the committee's disbursing officer appointed and designated therefor by the committee, upon warrants drawn by the Controller upon the Treasury.

Expenditures

18. No member of any committee may incur any expense chargeable to the Senate unless authorized by resolution of the Senate.

The Committee on Rules shall provide, by rules and regulations, for the manner of authorizing expenditures by Members, committees, and officers and employees of the Senate which are not otherwise authorized by law, these rules, or the Joint Rules of the Senate and Assembly, and for the payment of the expenditures from the Senate Operating Fund upon certification of claims therefor to the Controller by the Committee on Rules or its authorized representative.

Printing of Reports

18.5. All requests for the printing of reports of Senate committees shall be made to the Committee on Rules.

The Committee on Rules shall determine if the report is to be printed, the number of copies needed, and whether or not the report shall be printed in the Journal.

If the report is to be printed by the State Printer, he or she shall hold the type for each Senate committee report for a period of 90 days from the date of the first printing or for such other time as the Committee on Rules deems necessary.

PROCEDURES AND RULES

Joint and Concurrent Resolutions and Constitutional Amendments

19. Joint and concurrent resolutions and constitutional amendments shall be treated the same as bills under these rules, except that they shall have only one official reading, which reading shall occur after they have been reported by committee.

Parliamentary Rules

20. In all cases not provided for by the Constitution, these rules, the Joint Rules of Senate and Assembly, or statute, the authority shall be Mason's Manual (1979 edition).

Repeal, Amendment, or Suspension of Rules

21. No standing rule of the Senate may be repealed or amended except upon an affirmative vote of a majority of the Members of the Senate, one day's notice being given, except that any rule not requiring more than a majority vote may be temporarily suspended without that notice by a vote of a majority of the Members of the Senate. A rule requiring a two-thirds vote on any question may be amended only by a two-thirds vote on one day's notice, except that a rule requiring a two-thirds vote may be temporarily suspended without that notice by a two-thirds vote.

All proposed amendments to these rules shall, upon presentation, be referred to the Committee on Rules without debate.

Suspension of the Joint Rules

21.1. Pursuant to Joint Rule 33, no joint rule may be suspended by the Senate except with the concurrence of 27 Members unless a lower vote is prescribed by these rules or the Joint Rules of the Senate and the Assembly.

Permission of Committee on Rules

21.2. (a) Except as provided in subdivision (b), notwithstanding Rule 21 or 21.1, no Senate or Joint Rule may be suspended unless the Committee on Rules determines that an extraordinary circumstance exists that justifies the suspension.

(b) Notwithstanding Rule 21, Rule 38.5 may not be suspended unless the Committee on Rules determines that an extraordinary circumstance and overwhelming compelling public interest exist that justify the suspension.

Rules Governing Standing Committees

21.5. Except as otherwise provided in these rules, standing committees of the Senate shall be governed as follows:

(a) The officers of each Senate committee shall be a chair, vice chair, and secretary.

(b) The chair shall preside at meetings when present except when the committee is considering a bill of which he or she is the sole author or the lead author. Whenever the chair is not presiding, the vice chair shall assume the duties of the chair. In the absence of both, a member designated by the chair shall preside.

(c) The secretary shall keep a complete record of the meetings and actions taken by the committee. Bills favorable acted upon shall be reported to the Senate as expeditiously as the reports can be prepared.

(d) The committee shall meet in regular session on the day and hour designated by the Committee on Rules. Adjourned meetings or special meetings shall be held at the time fixed in the adjourning motion, or, for a special meeting, on the call of the chair.

(e) A special meeting may be called by the chair, with the approval of the Committee on Rules, by giving reasonable notice to all members of the committee, either in writing or by telephone, specifying the purpose of the meeting, the time and place thereof, and the matters to be considered at the meeting. Notice of hearing of bills as required by subdivision (a) of Joint Rule 62 may also be given in the Daily File. No matter may be considered at the special meeting unless specified in the notice.

A special meeting shall be scheduled so as to permit all members of the committee to attend without conflict with other scheduled committee meetings.

This subdivision may not be suspended by the committee.

(f) A majority of the members of the committee shall constitute a quorum. A majority vote of the committee shall be required to table a bill, remove it from the table, or reconsider a vote on a bill.

(g) No action may be taken on any measure outside of a duly constituted committee meeting.

(h) The chair shall set the hearings of bills and arrange the calendar for committee hearings. Notice of hearing of any bill shall be given to the author and other persons requiring notice. A bill may

not be considered in the absence of the author without his or her consent, except that a bill may be presented by the author's representative who is authorized in writing.

(i) A committee or a subcommittee thereof, by a majority vote of the committee, may meet in executive session for any purpose authorized by Section 9029 of the Government Code. Otherwise, all meetings shall be open and public.

(j) The chair shall direct the order of presentation of the arguments for and against matters for consideration by the committee, and shall permit questions to be asked by members of the committee in an orderly fashion and in keeping with proper decorum.

(k) Further consideration of a bill that has been voted out of a committee or defeated shall be by reconsideration only, as follows:

(1) A motion to reconsider a vote by which a bill is voted out shall be in order, and shall be voted upon at the same meeting. If the motion is carried by a vote of a majority of the committee, the bill may be considered at that meeting, provided the author is present, or at a subsequent meeting.

(2) The procedure for reconsideration of a bill that has been defeated shall conform to the requirements of subdivision (a) of Joint Rule 62. Any bill as to which reconsideration has been granted pursuant to this paragraph may not be heard again until a subsequent meeting of the committee, after being calendared in the Daily File.

(l) Any bill that has been laid on the table and is removed from the table at a later meeting may not be heard again until a subsequent meeting of the committee, after being calendared in the Daily File and after notice.

(m) When a committee adopts proposed amendments to a bill, the bill may be taken up for vote at that meeting or, if the committee or author requests, sent out to print before final action. If the amendments are not in proper form, they shall be prepared and submitted to the chair for approval before being reported to the Desk. Amendments submitted by the author which, in the opinion of the committee chair, are major or substantial shall be submitted to the committee at least two legislative days before the bill is scheduled for hearing.

(n) No bill may be set for hearing, nor may any notice thereof be published, by a Senate committee until the bill has been referred to the committee by the Committee on Rules.

(o) The chair may appoint, from the members of the committee, subcommittees of one or more members to consider and recommend to the full committee action on matters as may be assigned to the subcommittee for consideration from time to time by the chair. The chair may assign and reassign members of, and matters to, the various subcommittees. The recommendation of a subcommittee may be accepted by the affirmative vote of a majority of the members of the committee.

(p) Except as otherwise provided in the rules, any provision of this rule may be suspended by a majority vote of the full committee.

(q) In all cases not provided for by this rule, the Senate Rules, the Joint Rules of the Senate and Assembly, or statute, the authority shall be Mason's Manual (1979 edition).

Additional Rules

21.6. Committees may adopt additional rules that are not in conflict with Rule 21.5 or other rules.

Reporting Bills Out of Committee

21.7. The vote of not less than a majority of all members constituting a standing committee shall be required to report a bill out of committee.

Press Participation

21.8. Accredited press representatives may not be excluded from any public legislative meeting or hearing, and may not be prohibited from taking photographs of, televising, or recording the committee or house hearings, subject to the following conditions:

- (1) This rule shall extend to all public legislative meetings.
- (2) Lights may be used only when cameras are filming and, when possible, proceedings in hearing rooms and the chamber shall be filmed without lights.
- (3) Every effort should be made to set up filming equipment before hearings or sessions begin.
- (4) The committee chair or the Committee on Rules shall be notified, as far in advance of the proceedings as possible, that recordings and television cameras will be present and filming.
- (5) To the extent practical, flash cameras shall not be used.
- (6) Photographs shall be taken in an orderly and expeditious manner so as to cause the least possible inconvenience to the committee or to the Members in the chamber.

However, the chair of a committee may request any person to relocate or remove any object, or discontinue the use of any equipment, which is situated or used in a manner so as to disrupt the proceedings or to create a potential danger to, or substantially obstruct the view of, members of the committee or the public.

In case any person fails to respond to a request of the chair to relocate, remove, or discontinue the use of the objects or equipment, the committee may, by majority vote, require it.

INTRODUCTION AND REFERENCE OF BILLS**Introduction, First Reading, and Reference of Bills**

22. Any Senator desiring to introduce a bill shall send it to the Senate Desk.

When received at the Secretary's desk, the bill shall, under the proper order of business, be numbered, read the first time, referred by the Committee on Rules to a standing committee, and printed. The Committee on Rules shall check all Assembly bills before reference to committee and shall designate the committee to which they shall be referred.

All joint resolutions, concurrent resolutions, and Senate resolutions shall be automatically referred to the Committee on Rules upon introduction, and may be rereferred to any other standing committee upon the vote of a majority of the members of the Committee on Rules.

Unless otherwise ordered by the Senate without debate, the assignment of the bill shall then be complete and, after printing, the Secretary shall deliver the bill to the committee designated by the Committee on Rules.

Under the order of Messages from the Assembly, the Secretary shall read each Assembly bill the first time and shall read the name of the committee to which the bill has been assigned by the Committee on Rules. Unless otherwise ordered by the Senate without debate the assignment of the bill shall then be complete, and the Secretary shall deliver the bill to the committee so designated.

Bill Introduction Limitation

22.5. (a) A Member of the Senate may introduce not more than 65 bills in the regular session.

(b) This rule may be suspended with respect to a particular bill by approval of the Committee on Rules.

(c) This rule shall not apply to a constitutional amendment, any type of resolution, or a bill introduced by a committee with the signatures of a majority of its members, including its chair.

(d) This rule shall apply only to the 1997–98 Regular Session.

Introduction of Bills by a Committee

23. Any committee may introduce a bill germane to any subject within the proper consideration of the committee in the same manner as any Member.

Bill Introduction Deadline

23.5. The Senate Desk shall remain open for the introduction of bills from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. on the days designated in subdivision (a) of Joint Rule 54 as the deadlines for the introduction of bills in the first and second years of the regular session.

Introduction of Bills at Special Sessions

24. Whenever, at any special session, a bill is received at the Desk, under the order of Introduction of Bills, it shall be referred to the Committee on Rules, which shall decide whether or not the bill can properly be considered at the session. If, in the judgment of the Committee on Rules, the bill can be considered, the committee shall report the bill back and designate the committee to which it shall be assigned. Thereafter the bill shall be assigned a number by the Secretary, read the first time, and referred to the committee recommended by the Committee on Rules unless otherwise referred on motion without debate.

Resolutions

24.5. A Senate concurrent resolution or Senate resolution may be introduced relating to a present or former state or federal elected official or a member of his or her immediate family. Other resolutions for the purpose of commendation or congratulation of any person, group, or organization, or for the purpose of expressing sympathy, regret, or sorrow on the death of any person, shall be prepared as Rules Committee resolutions and presented to the Committee on Rules for appropriate action.

The Committee on Rules may approve exceptions to this rule for Senate resolutions. The Secretary may not accept for introduction any Senate resolution that is contrary to this rule unless it is accompanied by the approval of the Committee on Rules.

Senate Resolutions

25. All Senate resolutions eligible to be introduced under the rules, upon being presented, shall be given a number by the Secretary. A Senate resolution shall be printed, and indexed in the History and Journal.

Bills Authored by a Former Member

26. Whenever the author of a bill in the Senate is no longer a Member of the Legislature, upon a request of a committee or current Member of the house in which the bill was introduced, the Senate Committee on Rules may authorize that committee or Member to be the author of that bill. Absent that authorization, no action may be taken by a committee or the Senate with respect to a bill authored by a former Member.

BILLS IN COMMITTEE**Substitute Committee Bills**

27. A committee may amend into one bill related provisions germane to the subject and embraced within the title and, with the consent of the author, the committee may constitute the bill a committee bill by striking out of the heading of the bill the line "Introduced by" and the name of the author, and substituting therefor "Substitute committee bill of the Committee on" and the name of the committee.

Author's Amendments

27.5. Upon request of the author of a bill, the chair of the committee to which the bill has been referred may, by his or her individual action taken independently of any committee meeting, cause the bill to be reported to the Senate with the recommendation that amendments submitted by the author be adopted and the bill be reprinted as amended and rereferred to the committee.

Withdrawing a Bill From Committee

28. No bill or resolution may be withdrawn from committee except upon written notice being first given to the Committee on Rules and by 21 votes of the Senate.

Consent Calendar

28.3. (a) If a Senate bill or Assembly bill is amended in the Senate to create a new bill or to rewrite the bill, a standing committee may not place the bill on its consent calendar, and may not report the bill out of committee with the recommendation that it be placed on the consent calendar on the floor.

(b) For purposes of this rule, an amendment creates a new bill or rewrites the bill if the amendment (1) changes the subject of the bill to a new or different subject, or (2) adds a new subject to the bill that is different from, and not related to, the contents of the bill.

Referral of Bills

28.4. (a) If a Senate bill or Assembly bill is amended in the Committee on Appropriations to create a new bill or to rewrite the bill and the chair of the committee determines pursuant to Senate Rule 28.8 that (1) any additional state costs are not significant and do not and will not require the appropriation of additional state funds, and (2) the bill will cause no significant reduction in revenues, the

bill shall be reported to the Senate with the recommendation that it be placed on second reading, except that the bill first shall be referred to the Committee on Rules. Upon receipt of the bill, the Committee on Rules shall either refer the bill to an appropriate policy committee or order that the bill be placed on second reading.

(b) For purposes of this rule, an amendment creates a new bill or rewrites the bill if the amendment (1) changes the subject of the bill to a new or different subject, or (2) adds a new subject to the bill that is different from, and not related to, the contents of the bill.

Consideration of Constitutional Amendments, Bills, and Resolutions

28.5. Each constitutional amendment, bill, or resolution shall be authored by a Member or committee of the Legislature before it is considered or voted on by a committee or the Senate. Each amendment to a constitutional amendment, bill, or resolution shall be signed by a Member or committee of the Legislature prior to adoption by the Senate.

This rule shall apply only to the 1997–98 Regular Session.

Vote in Committee

28.7. Voting on the disposition of bill by committees shall be by rollcall vote only. A rollcall vote shall be taken on a motion to amend only if requested by any member of the committee or the author of the measure. All rollcall votes taken in committees shall be promptly transmitted by their respective chairs to the Secretary of the Senate, who shall cause a record of the rollcall votes to be printed in the Journal, together with the text of amendments voted upon where the rollcall has been recorded and the amendments adopted.

“Bill,” as used in this rule, shall include constitutional amendments but shall not include resolutions other than resolutions relating to voting procedures on the floor or in committee, ratifying proposed amendments to the United States Constitution, or calling for constitutional conventions.

This rule shall not apply to:

(a) Procedural motions that do not have the effect of disposing of a bill.

(b) Withdrawal of a bill from a committee calendar at the request of an author.

(c) A committee’s return of a bill to the Senate, if the bill has not been voted on by the committee.

(d) The assignment of bills to committee.

On a legislative day when the President pro Tempore or Minority Floor Leader is in attendance, he or she, in the absence of any objection, may instruct the committee secretary of a committee of which he or she is a member to add his or her vote to any previously announced vote that was taken while he or she was performing the responsibilities of the office of President pro Tempore or Minority Floor Leader, provided the outcome of the vote is not thereby changed. This provision does not apply to any rollcall after adjournment of the legislative day during which the rollcall in question was taken. The intent of this paragraph is to allow the President pro Tempore and the Minority Floor Leader to carry out

the unique and special duties of their offices without losing the opportunity to vote on matters before the committees of which they are members.

Appropriations Committee

28.8. Any bill referred to the Committee on Appropriations pursuant to Joint Rule 10.5 which does not appropriate money shall not be set for hearing and shall, along with any nonsubstantive amendments, promptly be reported to the Senate with the recommendation it be placed on second reading if the chair of the committee determines that (a) any additional state costs are not significant and do not and will not require the appropriation of additional state funds, and (b) the bill will cause no significant reduction in revenues.

State-Mandated Local Program Bills

28.9. (a) Any bill having a digest that, pursuant to Section 17575 of the Government Code, indicates that the bill requires state reimbursement to local agencies or school districts for costs mandated by the state shall be rereferred to the Committee on Appropriations. The bill shall not be rereferred to the Committee on Revenue and Taxation.

(b) Any bill rereferred to the Committee on Appropriations pursuant to this rule which does not appropriate money and does not contain a complete disclaimer of all of the provisions of Section 905.2 of, and Part 7 (commencing with Section 17500) of Division 4 of Title 2 of, the Government Code, need not be set for hearing any way, along with any nonsubstantive amendments, be reported to the Senate with the recommendation that it be placed on second reading if the chair of the committee determines, after consideration of the analyses of local costs prepared by the Legislative Analyst and the Department of Finance, that (1) any additional local costs are not significant and (2) the bill will cause no significant reduction in local revenues.

For the purposes of this rule, “complete disclaimer” means a provision in a bill that prohibits local agencies and school districts from filing claims with the State Board of Control for reimbursement for the costs of unfunded mandated programs or services.

(c) Whenever the Assembly amends and passes a Senate bill and the Senate must concur in the amendments, upon the request of any Senator the bill shall be rereferred to the Committee on Appropriations if, based upon the Legislative Counsel’s digest of the Assembly amendments, the bill (1) imposes state-mandated local costs without providing adequate reimbursement, or (2) contains a complete disclaimer. The Committee on Appropriations shall make a recommendation to the Senate regarding whether the Senate should concur in the Assembly amendments.

(d) Any bill referred to the Committee on Appropriations solely pursuant to this rule, and which otherwise would not be rereferred to the committee pursuant to Joint Rule 10.5, shall not be subject to the provisions of subparagraph (a) (1), (a) (6), (b) (3), or (b) (8) of Joint Rule 61.

CONSIDERATION OF BILLS**Order of Making Files**

29. When bills are reported from committee they shall be placed upon the Daily File, to be kept by the Secretary as follows: All bills when reported to the Senate by the committee shall be placed at the foot of the Second Reading Senate or Assembly File, in the order in which the reports are made and, after the second reading, shall be placed at the foot of the Senate or Assembly Third Reading File, in the order of reading. Unless otherwise ordered by the Senate the File shall be taken up in the following order: Senate Second Reading File, Assembly Second Reading File, Special Orders, Unfinished Business, Senate Third Reading File, Assembly Third Reading File. The bills upon the third reading shall be considered in the order in which they appear upon the File, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate.

A Senate Bill returned from the Assembly for concurrence in Assembly amendments may not be considered until it appears under Unfinished Business on the Daily File pursuant to Joint Rule 26.5 and an analysis is provided to each Senator pursuant to Senate Rule 29.8.

An inactive file shall be kept, to which bills and resolutions may be transferred at the request of the author, or on motion. Bills shall be so transferred when they have been passed on third reading file without action three successive times. Bills and resolutions may be transferred from the inactive file to the second reading file on motion and, after being read the second time, the bills shall take their place regularly on third reading file and be available for consideration and passage.

Bills, resolutions, and other questions may be transferred from the unfinished business file to the inactive file upon request or motion and may be returned to the unfinished business file by request or on motion.

Placement of any question on the inactive file shall not prejudice the question.

Committee Reports

29.1. If a bill is acted upon in committee before the relevant deadline specified in Joint Rule 61 and the committee votes to report the bill out with amendments that have not, at the time of the vote, been prepared by the Legislative Counsel, the Secretary of the Senate may subsequently receive a report recommending the bill for passage or for rereferral together with the amendments at any time within two legislative days after the deadline or, if the Legislature has recessed for the Summer Recess, within seven calendar days after the deadline.

Strike From File

29.2. A motion to strike any bill, resolution, or other question from the File shall require 21 votes. That bill, resolution, or other question may not be acted upon again during the session.

Bills Amended From the Floor

29.3. The consideration of a bill that has been amended by amendments offered from the floor, except committee amendments reported with bills or amendments offered with a motion to amend and rerefer a bill to committee, shall not be in order until the amended bill has been in print for not less than one legislative day. Any bill so amended shall be placed on the Second Reading File.

Amended Forms of Bills

29.5. No bill may be considered for passage unless and until a copy of the bill as introduced, and of each amended form of the bill, is on the desk of each Member.

Conference Reports

29.6. (a) No conference committee on any bill, other than the Budget Bill and the budget implementation bills, may approve any substantial policy change in any bill if that substantial policy change has been defeated in a policy committee of the Senate during the current legislative session.

(b) For purposes of subdivision (d) of Joint Rule 29.5, the term “heard” means that a printed bill with substantially similar language was before the appropriate committee and taken up at a regular or special hearing of the committee during the current legislative sessions, or that an amendment, which was drafted and given a request number or approved as to form by Legislative Counsel, was before the committee and taken up at a regular or special hearing of the committee.

Conference Committee Meetings

29.7. Before the adoption of a conference report by the Senate, any Senator may raise a point of order and put the following question to the chair of the committee on conference from the Senate: “Did the Committee on Conference meet at a public meeting attended by at least two of the Assembly Members and two of the Senate Members of the Committee on Conference and adopt the conference report by an affirmative rollcall vote of not less than two of the Assembly Members and two of the Senate Members constituting the committee on conference?” If the chair answers this question in the negative, the conference report shall be returned to the committee on conference and may not be further considered by the Senate until the committee, has met at a public meeting attended by at least two of the Assembly Members and two of the Senate Members of the committee, and has adopted the conference report by an affirmative rollcall vote of not less than two of the Assembly Members and two of the Senate Members constituting the committee.

Analysis of Bills, Conference Reports, and Floor Amendments

29.8. (a) With the exception of the Budget Bill and the budget implementation bill, no bill, unfinished business item, or report of a conference committee may be considered unless and until an analysis of each has been prepared by the Office of Senate Floor Analyses and placed upon the desks of the Senators, unless otherwise ordered by the President pro Tempore.

(b) No amendment from the floor shall be in order unless and until the amendment has been reviewed by the Office of Senate Floor Analyses. Upon a request by the Chair or Vice Chair of the Committee on Rules, or by the lead author of the measure to which a substantive amendment is proposed from the floor, an analysis thereof shall be prepared by the Office of Senate Floor Analyses and placed upon the desks of the Senators.

Consideration of Conference Reports

29.9. No conference report may be adopted by the Senate until it has been in print for two days prior to being taken up by the Senate.

Referral of Bills

29.10. (a) If the analysis, prepared in accordance with subdivision (b) of Rule 29.8, of proposed floor amendments to a bill, other than the Budget Bill, discloses that the amendments create a new bill or rewrite the current form of the bill, the amendments shall, prior to consideration of the amendments by the Senate, be referred to the Committee on Rules. If the amendments to the bill are proposed by any Senator other than the author of the bill or the Senator presenting the Assembly bill on the floor, action on the bill shall be deferred until after the Committee on Rules acts upon the amendments. Upon receipt of the amendments, the Committee on Rules by a majority vote of its membership may either (1) refer the amendments to an appropriate standing committee, or (2) return the amendments to the Senate floor for consideration.

If the amendments are referred to a standing committee, the committee shall meet and act upon the amendments no later than the next scheduled hearing of the committee. If the amendments are referred to a standing committee during a time when standing committees are not meeting, the standing committee shall meet and act upon the amendments as directed by the Committee on Rules and, in any event, within two legislative days of receipt of the amendments. Upon receipt of the amendments, the committee by a majority vote of the membership may do any of the following: (1) hold the amendments, (2) return the amendments to the Senate floor for consideration, or (3) return amendments as approved by the committee to the Senate floor.

If the amendments are referred to a standing committee during the time when no committee may meet, the Committee on Rules shall grant permission to suspend the joint rule to allow the committee to meet as directed by the Committee on Rules.

If the amendments are referred to the Committee on Rules on the last legislative day preceding a joint recess, the Committee on Rules and, if the amendments are referred to a standing committee, the standing committee, shall meet and act upon the amendments before adjourning for the recess. If the amendments are referred to the Committee on Rules on any of the three legislative days preceding February 1 or September 1 of an even-numbered year, the Committee on Rules and, if the amendments are referred to a standing committee, the standing committee, shall meet and act upon the amendments on the same legislative day.

(b) If the analysis, prepared in accordance with subdivision (a) of Rule 29.8, of a bill, other than the Budget Bill, that is returned to the Senate for a vote on concurrence discloses that the Assembly amendments create a new bill or rewrite the bill as passed by the Senate, action on the bill shall be deferred until the Committee on Rules acts upon the bill. The Committee on Rules by a majority vote of its membership may either (1) refer the bill to an appropriate standing committee, or (2) recommend that the bill be taken up for consideration of the Assembly amendments.

If the bill is referred to a standing committee, the committee shall meet and act upon the bill no later than the next scheduled hearing of the committee. If the bill is referred to a standing committee during a time when standing committees are not meeting, the standing committee shall meet and act upon the bill as directed by the Committee on Rules and, in any event, within two legislative days of receipt of the bill. Upon receipt of the bill, the committee by a majority vote of the membership may either (1) hold the bill, or (2) return the bill to the Senate floor for consideration of the Assembly amendments.

If the bill is referred to a standing committee during the time when no committee may meet, the Committee on Rules shall grant permission to suspend the joint rule to allow the committee to meet as directed by the Committee on Rules.

If the bill is referred to the Committee on Rules on the last legislative day preceding a joint recess, the Committee on Rules and, if the bill is referred to a standing committee, the standing committee, shall meet and act upon the bill before adjourning for the recess. If the bill is referred to the Committee on Rules on any of the three legislative days preceding February 1 or September 1 of an even-numbered year, the Committee on Rules and, if the bill is referred to a standing committee, the standing committee, shall meet and act upon the bill on the same legislative day.

(c) An amendment creates a new bill or rewrites the bill if the amendment (1) changes the subject of the bill to a new or different subject, or (2) adds a new subject to the bill that is different from, and not related to, the contents of the bill.

This rule shall apply only to the 1997–98 Regular Session.

Special Order

30. Any measure or subject may, by vote of a majority of those voting, be made a special order and, when the time fixed for its consideration arrives, the presiding officer shall lay it before the Senate.

Messages From the Governor or Assembly

31. Messages from the Governor or from the Assembly may be introduced at any stage of business except while a question is being put, while the ayes and noes are being called, or while a Senator is addressing the Senate.

Messages from the Governor or from the Assembly may be considered when indicated in the order of business or at any other time by unanimous consent or upon motion.

Engrossing Bills

32. All Senate bills, constitutional amendments, and joint and concurrent resolutions shall be engrossed after each amendment and before final action is taken on them in the Senate. Engrossment shall consist of comparing the printed engrossed bill with the original bill introduced and any amendments adopted to ascertain that it is correct. When a bill is reported correctly engrossed it shall be substituted for the original bill.

Enrolling Bills

33. All Senate bills shall be enrolled immediately following their final passage and receipt from the Assembly. An enrolled copy of every bill, amendment, or resolution shall be printed and examined to ascertain that it is a true and accurate copy of the measure as it was passed. It shall then be authenticated by the signature of the Secretary or an Assistant Secretary of the Senate and the Chief Clerk or an Assistant Clerk of the Assembly, and transmitted to the Governor.

DEBATE

Statement of Motion

34. No motion shall be debated until the same be distinctly announced by the President, and it shall be reduced to writing if desired by the President or any Senator, and read by the Secretary, before the same shall be debated.

Regulations as to Speaking

35. (a) When a Senator desires to address the Senate, he or she shall rise in his or her place, address the President, and, when recognized, proceed to speak through the public address system.

(b) No Senator may speak more than twice in any one debate on the same day, and at the same stage of the bill, without leave; Senators who have once spoken are not again entitled to the floor (except for explanation) so long as any Senator who has not spoken desires to speak.

(c) When two or more Senators arise at the same time to address the Senate, the presiding officer shall designate the Senator who is entitled to the floor.

(d) No Senator may be interrupted when speaking, and no question may be asked of him or her except through the presiding officer.

(e) The author of a bill, motion, or resolution shall have the privilege of closing the debate.

Order in Debate

36. When a Senator shall be called to order he or she shall sit down until the President shall have determined whether he or she is in order or not. Every question of order shall be decided by the President, subject to an appeal to the Senate by any Senator. If a Senator be called to order for words spoken, the objectionable language shall immediately be taken down in writing by the Secretary of the Senate.

Right to Address the Senate

37. No person other than a Member of the Senate, or the President thereof, may address the Senate while it is in session, except that the Senate may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole and, while sitting as a Committee of the Whole, may be addressed by persons other than Members.

QUESTIONS AND MOTIONS**Amendments to Bills**

38. When amendments to a bill are reported by a committee or offered from the floor, the amendments shall be submitted in quintuplicate.

Adoption of amendments to any bill in the Senate prior to third reading, other than by rollcall, shall not preclude subsequent consideration, in committee or on the third reading of the bill, of the amendments or any part thereof by the Senate.

Amendments to Be Germane

38.5. Every amendment proposed must be germane. In order to be germane, an amendment must relate to the same subject as the original bill, resolution, or other question under consideration.

A point of order may be raised that the proposed amendment or an amendment now in the bill, resolution, or other question under consideration is not germane, so long as the question is within control of the body. In that case the President pro Tempore shall decide whether the point of order is well taken. In the absence of the President pro Tempore, the Vice Chair of the Committee on Rules shall decide whether the point of order is well taken. If, in the opinion of the President pro Tempore or the Vice Chair of the Committee on Rules, the point of order is well taken, the question of germaneness shall on his or her motion be referred to the Committee on Rules for determination. The Committee on Rules shall make its determination by the following legislative day. If the point of order is raised and referral is made on the last legislative day preceding a joint recess, the Committee on Rules shall make its determination before adjourning for the recess.

The proposition shall remain on file until the determination is made. If, upon consideration of the matter, the Committee on Rules determines that the amendment is not germane, the bill, resolution, or other question shall be stricken from the file and may not be acted upon during the remainder of the session, provided that the author of a bill, resolution, or other question shall be given the opportunity to amend the bill, resolution, or other question to delete the portions that are not germane, in which case the bill, resolution, or other question may continue to be acted upon. If the Committee on Rules determines that the amendment is germane, the bill, resolution, or other question may thereafter be acted upon by the house.

Amendments From the Floor

38.6. No amendments to a bill offered from the floor, except committee amendments reported with bills or amendments offered with a motion to amend and rerefer a bill to committee, shall be in order unless and until a copy of the proposed amendments provided by the author has been placed upon the desks of the Members.

Motion to Lay on the Table

39. When an amendment proposed to any pending measure shall be laid on the table, it shall not carry with it or prejudice the measure.

Division of a Question

40. If a question in debate contains more than one distinct proposition, any Senator may have the same divided.

The Previous Question

41. The previous question shall be put in the following form: "Shall the question be now put?" It shall require a majority vote of the Senators present, and its effect shall be to put an end to all the debate except that the author of the bill or the amendment shall have the right to close, and the question under discussion shall thereupon be immediately put to a vote.

Call of the Senate

42. Upon a motion being carried for a call of the Senate, the President shall immediately order the doors to be closed, and shall direct the Secretary to call the names of the absentees as disclosed by the last previous rollcall. Thereupon, no Members shall be permitted to leave the Senate Chamber except by written permission of the President pro Tempore or, in his or her absence, of the Vice Chair of the Committee on Rules, or, in the absence of both, of another member of the Committee on Rules designated for that purpose by the President pro Tempore or the Vice Chair of the Committee on Rules. Those Members who are found to be absent and for whom no excuse or insufficient excuses are made may, by order of those present, be taken into custody, as they appear, or may be sent for and then taken into custody by the Sergeant at Arms whenever found, or by special messenger to be appointed for that purpose. In the absence of a quorum, a majority of the Members present may order a rollcall of the Senate and compel the attendance of absentees in the manner above provided.

A call of the Senate may be ordered after the roll has been called and prior to the announcement of the vote. A call of the Senate may be dispensed with at any time upon a majority vote of the Senators present, that action to become effective upon completion of the rollcall and the announcement of the vote upon the matter for which the call was ordered.

No recess may be taken during a call of the Senate. During any call, the call may be made to apply also to other items of business by a motion made and adopted by a majority vote of the Members present. Under those circumstances, when the call of the Senate is dispensed with as to any item of business, the call shall be deemed to be continued in effect until such other items of business as have been made subject to the call by a majority of the Members present shall have been acted upon. When a call of the Senate is ordered, pending the announcement of the vote upon the completion of a rollcall, the pending rollcall shall become unfinished business, the consideration of which shall be continued until further proceedings under the call of the Senate are dispensed with, when it will forthwith become the order of business before the Senate.

A motion to adjourn is not in order during a call of the Senate.

Reconsideration

43. On the day on which a vote has been taken on any question, a motion to reconsider the vote may be made by any Member.

The motion may be considered on the day made or on the succeeding legislative day, but may not be further postponed without the concurrence of 30 Members.

No vote by which a bill was passed may be reconsidered on the last legislative day preceding the interim study joint recess or the final recess, and no vote by which the bill was passed may be reconsidered on a Senate bill introduced during the first year of the biennium of the legislative session on January 31, or on the last legislative day immediately preceding January 31, of an even-numbered year.

When reconsideration of the vote by which any bill has passed has been demanded, the Secretary may not transmit it to the Assembly until the demand has been disposed of or the time for reconsideration has expired, but if the bill has already been transmitted to the Assembly the demand for reconsideration shall be preceded by a motion to request the Assembly to return the bill. The motion shall be put to a vote immediately without debate and, if not adopted, shall preclude a demand for reconsideration.

A demand to reconsider the vote on any debatable question opens the main question to debate, and the vote on the reconsideration shall be on the merits of the main question.

VOTING BY SENATE**Rescinding**

43.5. No action whereby a bill has been passed or defeated may be rescinded without the concurrence of 27 Members.

Voting on Rollcall

44. Whenever a rollcall is required by the Constitution or rules, or is ordered by the Senate or demanded by three Members, every Member within the Senate shall without debate answer "Aye" or "No" when his or her name is called.

The names of Members shall be called alphabetically.

No Senator may vote or change his or her vote after the announcement of the vote by the presiding officer.

On a legislative day when the President pro Tempore or Minority Floor Leader is in attendance throughout a session, he or she, in the absence of any objection, may instruct the Secretary of the Senate to add his or her vote to any previously announced vote that was taken while he or she was performing the responsibilities of the office of President pro Tempore or Minority Floor Leader, provided the outcome of the vote is not thereby changed. This provision does not apply to any rollcall after adjournment of the legislative day during which the rollcall in question was taken. The intent of this paragraph is to allow the President pro Tempore and the Minority Floor Leader to carry out the unique and special duties of their offices without losing the opportunity to vote on matters before the Senate.

Excused From Voting

45. When a Senator declines or fails to vote on call of his or her name, he or she may, after completion of the rollcall and before the announcement of the vote, be required to assign his or her reasons therefor and, the Senator having assigned them, the presiding officer shall submit the question to the Senate: "Shall the Senator, for the reasons assigned by him or her, be excused from voting?" which question shall be decided without debate. Unless the Senator is excused from voting he or she shall be required to vote.

Voting by Presiding Senator

46. When the President pro Tempore or any other Member of the Senate is presiding over the Senate he or she shall vote on rollcall the same as though he or she were not presiding.

Vote Required

47. Unless otherwise required by the Constitution, the Joint Rules of the Senate and Assembly, or these rules, any action that can be taken by the Senate requires only a majority vote of the Senate, a quorum being present.

The following actions require 30 votes:

(1) To dispense with the constitutional provision requiring a 30-calendar-day delay after introduction before a bill may be heard by any committee or acted upon by either house (Constitution, Art. IV, Sec. 8(a)).

(2) To postpone the reconsideration of a vote beyond the first legislative day succeeding the day the motion was made.

The following actions require 27 votes:

(3) To pass urgency statutes (Constitution, Art. IV, Sec. 8(d)).

(4) To suspend the constitutional provision requiring the reading of bills on three several days (Constitution, Art. IV, Sec. 8(b)).

(5) To pass bills over the Governor's veto (Constitution, Art. IV, Sec. 10).

(6) To prescribe compensation and reimbursement for travel and living expenses of the Members of the Legislature (Constitution, Art. IV, Sec. 4).

(7) To propose an amendment to or revision of the Constitution (Constitution, Art. XVIII, Secs. 1, 2).

(8) To amend or withdraw a proposed legislative constitutional amendment or revision (Constitution, Art. XVIII, Sec. 1).

(9) To classify or exempt personal property for property taxation purpose (Constitution, Art. XIII, Sec. 2).

(10) To permit an exemption of real property from taxation (Constitution, Art. XIII, Sec. 7).

(11) To remove a member of the Public Utilities Commission (Constitution, Art. XII, Sec. 1).

(12) To reconsider the vote by which a concurrent resolution proposing a constitutional amendment is defeated.

(13) To rescind the action whereby a bill has been passed or defeated.

(14) To suspend the rule against lobbying in the Senate Chamber.

(15) To concur in Assembly amendments to, or adopt a report of a committee on conference concerning, constitutional amendments or bills that require 27 votes for passage.

(16) To concur in any Assembly amendments to, or any conference report affecting, any Senate bill that contains an item or items of appropriation subject to Section 12(d) of Article IV of the Constitution.

The following actions require 21 votes:

(17) To amend or suspend the rules, except as provided in Rule 21.

(18) To pass bills, unless under other rules a greater vote is required (Constitution, Art. IV, Sec. 8(b)).

(19) To adopt joint or concurrent resolutions.

(20) To reconsider bills, or joint or concurrent resolutions.

(21) To confirm appointments by the Governor, unless a greater vote is required by statute, or to reconsider the same.

(22) To recall a bill from committee.

(23) To concur in Assembly amendments to, or adopt a report of a committee on conference concerning, joint or concurrent resolutions or bills that require 21 votes for passage.

(24) To change a rate of bank and corporation taxation, or tax on insurers, for state purposes (Constitution, Art. XIII, Secs. 27, 28).

(25) To strike from file.

Actions requiring 14 votes:

(26) To reconsider a vote by which a concurrent resolution proposing a constitutional amendment was adopted.

Vote Required for Amendments

48. A constitutional amendment or bill requiring a vote of two-thirds of the Members elected to the Senate for final adoption or passage may be amended by a majority of those voting.

CONTENTS OF SENATE JOURNAL

Proceedings to Be Printed

49. The proceedings of the Senate, when not acting as a Committee of the Whole, shall be entered in the Journal as concisely as possible, care being taken to record a true and accurate account of the proceedings.

The Journal shall state the name of the Senator presenting each Assembly bill, concurrent or joint resolution, or constitutional amendment to the Senate for final action.

Every vote of the Senate shall be recorded in the Journal.

Titles of Bills to Be Printed

50. The titles of all bills, joint and concurrent resolutions, and constitutional amendments when introduced and when acted upon by the Senate, and a brief statement of the contents of each petition, memorial, or paper presented to the Senate shall be printed in the Journal.

Other Matters to Be Printed

51. Messages from the Governor (other than annual messages and inaugural addresses) shall be printed in the Journal, unless otherwise ordered by the Senate.

Letters of transmittal presenting reports of committees and reports of state departments and agencies as shall be made to the Senate pursuant to law or resolution adopted by the Senate shall be printed in the Journal, but the reports shall be printed in the Appendix to the Journal unless otherwise directed by the Senate.

Duty of Secretary to Order Printing

52. It shall be the duty of the Secretary of the Senate, and he or she is hereby directed, to order for the Senate the necessary printing, including stationery for the Members, and to audit and approve all bills for printing to be charged to the Senate. The Secretary of the Senate shall order from the State Printer the number of copies of bills, Journals, Histories, Files, forms, and other printing as shall be necessary.

It shall further be the duty of the Secretary of the Senate to order bills and other legislative publications for which there is a demand, to be printed before the supply of same shall become exhausted.

Printing Only on Written Orders; Rush Orders

53. The State Printer may not charge any printing or other work to the Senate except as required by law unless he or she has a written order from the Secretary of the Senate prior to beginning the printing or other work. All printing orders by the Secretary of the Senate shall be delivered as directed by him or her. The Secretary of the Senate may, when necessity requires it, order from the State Printer the printing that he or she deems necessary to be printed in advance of the regular order of business, under a specially prepared written order to be known as a "Rush Order."

THE SENATE CHAMBER**Admission to the Senate Chamber**

55. (a) Persons who are not Members, officers, or employees of the Senate shall be admitted to the Senate Chamber only as follows:

1. The Members, officers, and assistant clerks of the Assembly.
2. The Legislative Counsel or his or her representatives.
3. The accredited press, radio, and television representatives.
4. Former State Senators and Assembly Members.

5. Visitors in the chairs reserved for that purpose, on invitation of the President or a Senator or on presentation of a pass.

(b) While the Senate is in session no person, except Members of the Legislature, shall engage in influencing the passage or defeat of legislation in any way in the Senate Chamber.

(c) No person meeting the definition of a lobbyist in Section 82039 of the Government Code may be admitted to the Senate Chamber while the Senate is in session.

(d) Only Members and officers of the Senate and Assembly, former Members of the Senate, assistant clerks of the Senate and the Assembly, the Legislative Counsel or his or her representatives,

Senate employees for the purpose of delivering messages and when so directed by a Member of the Senate, and members of the press who have seats assigned to them shall be permitted on the Floor of the Senate.

(e) The Senate Chamber is the Senate Chamber proper, the adjoining hallway, Rooms 3046, 3189, 3191, 3195, and 3196 of the Capitol Annex, and Room 215 of the Capitol.

(f) The Floor of the Senate is all of the Senate Chamber except the adjoining hallway and the rooms listed in subdivision (e), the visitors seating area, and the western portion of Room 3191.

(g) Notwithstanding any other provision of this rule, any person may be admitted to the western portion of Room 3191 to attend a meeting of a Senate, Assembly, joint, or conference committee.

(h) Notwithstanding any other provision of this rule, no person may be permitted on the Floor of the Senate while it is in session unless the person is wearing appropriate attire. Appropriate attire includes coats and ties for men. Accredited camerapersons, sound technicians, and photographers are excepted from this requirement. Floor of the Senate, for this purpose, has the same meaning set forth in subdivision (f).

(i) This rule may be suspended by a vote of two-thirds of the Members of the Senate.

**Standards of Conduct
of the Senate
(adopted by the Senate May 4, 1992)**

The Standards of Conduct of the Senate are as follows:

First—That each Senator and each officer and employee of the Senate has an obligation to exercise his or her independent judgment on behalf of the people of California, rather than for any personal gain or private benefit.

(a) No Senator or officer or employee of the Senate should accept anything from anyone that would interfere with the exercise of his or her independent judgment.

(b) No Senator or officer or employee of the Senate should accept outside employment that is inconsistent with the conscientious performance of his or her duties.

(c) No Senator should use the prestige of his or her office, and no Senate officer or employee of the Senate should use the status of his or her position for material or financial gain or private benefit.

Second—That each Senator has an obligation to provide energetic and diligent representation, and each officer and employee of the Senate has an obligation to provide energetic and diligent service on behalf of the Senate, with due consideration for the interests of all of the people of California.

(a) Each Senator and each officer and employee of the Senate has an obligation to be informed and prepared, recognizing all sides of an issue.

(b) Each Senator and each officer and employee of the Senate, when intervening on behalf of a constituent with any governmental agency should make every effort to ensure that decisions affecting any constituent are made on their merits and in a fair and equitable manner.

(c) Each Senator should be accessible to all constituents, making a special effort to attend to the concerns of those who might not otherwise be heard.

(d) Each Senator should fairly characterize the issues confronting the Legislature and accurately inform the public regarding the conduct of his or her office.

Third—That each Senator and each officer and employee of the Senate has an obligation to the public and to his or her colleagues to be informed about, and abide by, the rules that govern the proceedings of the Senate and the Legislature.

(a) Each Senator should perform his or her duties with courtesy and respect for both colleagues and those who may appear before them.

(b) In exercising the power of confirmation, each Senator should act with due regard for the general welfare of the people of California.

(c) Each Senator and each officer and employee of the Senate, when exercising oversight functions with respect to any governmental agency, should act in an informed fashion, with attention to the underlying policies being implemented and with due respect for the independence of the agency.

Fourth—Each Senator, when acting in a position of leadership, should exercise his or her power and carry out his or her responsibility so as to enhance reasoned and visible decisionmaking by the Senate.

Fifth—Each Senator has an obligation to treat every officer and employee of the Senate with fairness and without discrimination, and to ensure that each officer and employee performs only those tasks for which there is a legislative or governmental purpose.

Sixth—Each officer and employee of the Senate has an obligation to perform his or her properly assigned duties using his or her best judgment with diligence and a duty of loyalty to the Senate as an institution.

Seventh—Each Senator and each officer and employee of the Senate has an obligation to make proper use of public funds.

(a) No Senator and no officer or employee of the Senate may use state resources for personal or campaign purposes.

(b) Each officer and employee of the Senate is free to volunteer for, and participate in, campaign activities on his or her own time, but no officer or employee of the Senate may be intimidated, coerced, or compelled, as a condition of continued appointment or employment, to either volunteer time or contribute money to a candidate or campaign.

Eighth—Each Senator and each officer and employee of the Senate shall uphold the Constitution of California and the Constitution of the United States, and shall adhere to the spirit and the letter of the laws, rules, and regulations governing officeholder conduct.

Ninth—Each Senator and each officer and employee of the Senate shall conduct himself or herself in the performance of his or her duties in a manner that each does not discredit the Senate.

Tenth—Each Senator and each officer and employee of the Senate, is encouraged to report to the proper authority any apparent and substantial violation of these standards, or related statutes, regulations, and rules, and to consult with the Senate Committee on Legislative Ethics, or any other appropriate governmental agency, regarding the propriety of any conduct.

(Custom and Usage)

TEMPORARY JOINT RULES OF THE SENATE AND ASSEMBLY

Standing Committees

1. Each house shall appoint such standing committees as the business of the house may require, the committees, the number of members, and the manner of selection to be determined by the rules of each house.

Joint Meeting of Committees

3. Whenever any bill has been referred by the Senate to one of its committees, and the same or a like bill has been referred by the Assembly to one of its committees, the chairmen or chairwomen of the respective committees, when in their judgment the interests of legislation or the expedition of business will be better served thereby, shall arrange for a joint meeting of their committees for the consideration of such bill.

Effect of Adoption of Joint Rules

3.5. The adoption of the Joint Rules for any extraordinary session shall not be construed as modifying or rescinding the Joint Rules of the Senate and Assembly for any previous session, nor as affecting in any way the status or powers of the committees created by those rules.

Definition of Word "Bill"

4. Whenever the word "bill" is used in these rules, it shall include constitutional amendments, resolutions ratifying proposed amendments to the United States Constitution, and resolutions calling for constitutional conventions.

Concurrent and Joint Resolutions

5. Concurrent resolutions relate to matters to be treated by both houses of the Legislature.

Joint resolutions are those which relate to matters connected with the federal government.

Resolutions Treated as Bills

6. Concurrent and joint resolutions, other than resolutions ratifying proposed amendments to the United States Constitution and resolutions calling for constitutional conventions, shall be treated in all respects as bills except as follows:

- (a) They shall be given only one formal reading in each house.
- (b) They shall not be deemed bills within the meaning of subdivision (a) of Section 8 of Article IV of the California Constitution.
- (c) They shall not be deemed bills for the purposes of Rules 10.8, 53, 55, 56, and 61, and subdivisions (a) and (c) of Rule 54 and subdivisions (a) and (b) of Rule 62.
- (d) They shall not, except for those relating to voting procedures on the floor or in committee, be deemed bills for the purposes of subdivision (c) of Rule 62.

PREPARATION AND INTRODUCTION OF BILLS**Title of Bill**

7. The title of every bill introduced shall convey an accurate idea of the contents of the bill and shall be indicative of the scope of the act and the object to be accomplished. In amending a code section, the mere reference to the section by number shall not be deemed sufficient.

Division of Bill Into Sections

8. A bill amending more than one section of an existing law shall contain a separate section for each section amended.

Bills which are not amendatory of existing laws shall be divided into short sections, where this can be done without destroying the sense of any particular section, to the end that future amendments may be made without the necessity of setting forth and repeating sections of unnecessary length.

Digest of Bills Introduced

8.5. No bill shall be introduced unless it is contained in a cover attached by the Legislative Counsel and unless it is accompanied by a digest, prepared and attached to the bill by the Legislative Counsel, showing the changes in the existing law which are proposed by the bill. No bill shall be printed where the body of the bill or the Legislative Counsel's Digest has been altered, unless the alteration has been approved by the Legislative Counsel. If any bill is presented to the Secretary of the Senate or Chief Clerk of the Assembly for introduction, which does not comply with the foregoing requirements of this rule, the Secretary or Chief Clerk shall return it to the member who presented it. The digest shall be printed on the bill as introduced, commencing on the first page thereof.

Digest of Bills Amended

8.6. Whenever a bill is amended in either house, the Secretary of the Senate or the Chief Clerk of the Assembly, as the case may be, shall request the Legislative Counsel to prepare an amended digest and cause it to be printed on the first page of the bill as amended. The digest shall be amended to show changes in the existing law which are proposed by the bill as amended with any material changes in the digest indicated by the use of appropriate type.

Errors in Digest

8.7. If a material error in a printed digest referred to in Rule 8.5 or 8.6 is brought to the attention of the Legislative Counsel, he or she shall prepare a corrected digest which shall show the changes made in the digest as provided in Rule 10 for amendments to bills. He or she shall deliver the corrected digest to the Secretary of the Senate or the Chief Clerk of the Assembly, as the case may be. If the correction warrants it in the opinion of the President pro Tempore of the Senate or the Speaker of the Assembly, a corrected print of the bill as introduced shall be ordered with the corrected digest printed thereon.

Bills Amending Title 9 of the Government Code

8.8. A member who is the first-named author of a bill which would amend, add, or repeal any provision of Title 9 (commencing with Section 81000) of the Government Code, upon introduction or amendment of such bill in either house shall notify the Chief Clerk of the Assembly or the Secretary of the Senate, as the case may be, of the nature of such bill. Thereafter, the Chief Clerk of the Assembly or the Secretary of the Senate shall deliver a copy of such bill as introduced or amended to the Fair Political Practices Commission pursuant to Section 81012 of the Government Code.

Restrictions as to Amendments

9. A substitute or amendment must relate to the same subject as the original bill, constitutional amendment, or resolution under consideration. No amendment shall be in order when all that would be done to the bill is the addition of a coauthor or coauthors, unless the Rules Committee of the house in which such an amendment is to be offered grants prior approval.

Changes in Existing Law to Be Marked by Author

10. In a bill amending or repealing a code section or a general law, any new matter shall be underlined and any matter to be omitted shall be in type bearing a horizontal line through the center and commonly known as "strikeout" type. When printed the new matter shall be printed in italics, and the matter to be omitted shall be printed in "strikeout" type.

In any amendment to a bill which sets out for the first time a section being amended or repealed, any new matter to be added and any matter to be omitted shall be indicated by the author and shall be printed in the same manner as though the section as amended or repealed were a part of the original bill and was being printed for the first time.

When an entire code is repealed as part of a codification or recodification or when an entire title, part, division, chapter, or article of a code is repealed, the sections comprising such code, title, part, division, chapter, or article shall not be set forth in the bill or amendment in strikeout type.

Rereferral to Fiscal and Rules Committees

10.5. Bills shall be rereferred to the fiscal committee of each house when they would do any of the following:

- (1) Appropriate money.
- (2) Result in substantial expenditure of state money by: (a) imposing new responsibilities on the state or (b) imposing new or additional duties on a state agency or (c) liberalizing any state program, function, or responsibility.
- (3) Result in a substantial loss of revenue to the state.
- (4) Result in substantial reduction of expenditures of state money by reducing, transferring, or eliminating any existing responsibilities of any state agency, program, or function.

Concurrent and joint resolutions shall be rereferred to the fiscal committee of each house when they contemplate any action which would involve any of the following:

- (1) Any substantial expenditure of state money.
- (2) Any substantial loss of revenue to the state.

The above requirements do not apply to bills or concurrent resolutions which contemplate the expenditure or allocation of operating funds.

A bill which assigns a study to the Joint Legislative Budget Committee or to the Legislative Analyst shall be rereferred to the respective rules committees. Before the committee shall act upon such bill, it shall obtain from the Joint Legislative Budget Committee an estimate of the amount required to be expended to make the study.

This rule may be suspended in either house as to any particular bill by approval of the Committee on Rules of the house and two-thirds vote of the membership of the house.

Heading of Bills

10.7. No bill shall indicate in its heading or elsewhere that it was introduced at the request of a state agency or officer or any other person. No bill shall contain the words "By request" or words of similar import.

Consideration of Bills

10.8. The limitation contained in subdivision (a) of Section 8 of Article IV of the Constitution may be dispensed with as follows:

(a) A written request for such dispensation entitled "Request to Consider and Act on Bill Within 30 Calendar Days" shall be filed with the Chief Clerk of the Assembly or the Secretary of the Senate, as the case may be, and transmitted to the Committee on Rules of the appropriate house.

(b) The Committee on Rules of the Assembly or Senate, as the case may be, shall determine whether there exists an urgent need for dispensing with the 30-calendar-day waiting period following the bill's introduction.

(c) If the Committee on Rules recommends that the waiting period be dispensed with, the member may offer a resolution, without further reference thereof to committee, authorizing hearing and action upon the bill before the 30 calendar days have elapsed. The adoption of the resolution shall require an affirmative recorded vote of three-fourths of the elected members of the house in which the resolution is presented.

Printing of Amendments

11. (a) All bills amended by either house shall be immediately reprinted. Except as otherwise provided in subdivision (b), if new matter is added by the amendment, the new matter shall be printed in italics in the printed bill; if matter is omitted, the matter to be omitted shall be printed in strikeout type. When a bill is amended in either house, the first or previous markings shall be omitted.

(b) If amendments to a bill, including the report of a committee on conference, are adopted that omit the entire contents of the bill, the matter omitted need not be reprinted in the amended version of the bill. Instead, the Secretary of the Senate or the Chief Clerk of the Assembly, as the case may be, may select any such amended bill and cause to be printed a brief statement to appear after the last line of the amended bill identifying which previously printed version of the bill contains the complete text of the omitted matter.

Manner of Printing Bills

12. The State Printer shall observe the directions of the Joint Rules Committee in printing all bills, constitutional amendments, and concurrent and joint resolutions.

Distribution of Legislative Publications

13. The Secretary of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of the Assembly shall order a sufficient number of bills and legislative publications as may be necessary for legislative requirements.

No complete list of bills shall be delivered except upon payment therefor of such sum as may be fixed by the Joint Rules Committee for any regular or extraordinary session. No more than one copy of any bill or other legislative publication, nor more than a total of 100 bills or other legislative publications during a session, shall be distributed free to any person, office, or organization. The limitations imposed by this paragraph do not apply to Members of the Legislature, the President of the Senate, the Secretary of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of the Assembly for the proper functioning of their respective houses; the Legislative Counsel Bureau; Attorney General's office; Secretary of State's office; Controller's office; Governor's office; the Clerk of the Supreme Court; the clerk of the court of appeal for each district; the Judicial Council; the California Law Revision Commission; the State Library; the Library of Congress; the libraries of the University of California at Berkeley and at Los Angeles; and accredited members of the press. The State Printer shall fix the cost of such bills and publications, including postage, and such moneys as may be received by him or her shall, after deducting the cost of handling and mailing, be remitted on the first day of each month, one-half each to the Secretary of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of the Assembly for credit to legislative printing. Legislative publications heretofore distributed through the Bureau of Documents shall be distributed through the Bill Room. Unless otherwise provided for, the total number of each bill to be printed shall not be more than 2,500.

Legislative Index

13.1. The Legislative Counsel shall provide for the periodic publication of a cumulative Legislative Index which shall include tables of sections affected by pending legislation. The State Printer shall print the Legislative Index in such quantities, and at such times, as are determined by the Secretary of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of the Assembly. The costs of such printing shall be paid from the legislative printing appropriation.

Summary Digest

13.3. The Legislative Counsel shall compile and prepare for publication a summary digest of legislation passed at each regular and extraordinary session, which digest shall be prepared in a form suitable for inclusion in the publication of statutes. The digest shall be printed as a separate legislative publication on the order of the Joint Rules Committee and may be made available to the public in such quantities and at such prices as the Joint Rules Committee may determine.

Statutory Record

13.5. The Legislative Counsel shall prepare for publication from time to time a cumulative statutory record. The statutory record shall be printed as a legislative publication on the order of the Secretary of the Senate or the Chief Clerk of the Assembly.

OTHER LEGISLATIVE PRINTING**Printing of the Daily Journal**

14. The State Printer shall print in such quantity as directed by the Secretary of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of the Assembly, copies of the journal of each day's proceedings of each house. At the end of the session he or she shall also print, as directed by the Secretary of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of the Assembly a sufficient number of copies properly paged after being corrected and indexed by the Secretary of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of the Assembly, to bind in book form as the journal of the respective houses of the Legislature.

What Shall Be Printed in the Journal

15. The following shall be printed in the journal of each house:

(a) Messages from the Governor and messages from the other house, and the titles of all bills, joint and concurrent resolutions, and constitutional amendments when introduced in, offered to, or acted upon by the house.

(b) Every vote taken in the house, and a statement of the contents of each petition, memorial, or paper presented to the house.

(c) A true and accurate account of the proceedings of the house, when not acting as a Committee of the Whole.

Printing of the Daily File

16. A daily file of bills ready for consideration shall be printed each day for each house when the Legislature is not in joint recess except days when a house does not meet.

Printing of History

17. Each house shall cause to be printed, once each week, a complete history of all bills; constitutional amendments; and concurrent, joint, and house resolutions originating in, considered, or acted upon by the respective houses and committees thereof. A regular form shall be prescribed by the Secretary of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of the Assembly. Such history shall show the action taken upon each measure up to and including the legislative day preceding its issuance. Except for periods when the houses are in joint recess, for each day intervening there shall be printed a daily history showing the consideration given to or action taken upon any measure since the issuance of the complete history.

Authority for Printing Orders

18. The State Printer shall not print for use of either house nor charge to legislative printing any matter other than provided by law or by the rules, except upon a written order signed by the Secretary of the Senate, on behalf of the Senate, or the Chief Clerk of the Assembly or other person authorized by the Assembly, on behalf of

the Assembly. Persons authorized to order printing under this rule may, when necessity requires it, order certain matter printed in advance of the regular order, by the issuance of a rush order.

The Secretary of the Senate, on behalf of the Senate, and the Chief Clerk of the Assembly or other person authorized by the Assembly, on behalf of the Assembly, are hereby authorized and directed to order and distribute for the members stationery and legislative publications for which there is a demand, and, subject to the rules of their respective houses, to approve the bills covering such orders. All bills for printing must be presented by the State Printer within 30 days after the completion of the printing.

RECORD OF BILLS

Secretary and Chief Clerk to Keep Records

19. The Secretary of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of the Assembly shall keep a complete and accurate record of every action taken by the Senate and Assembly on every bill.

Secretary and Chief Clerk Shall Endorse Bills

20. The Secretary of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of the Assembly shall endorse on every original or engrossed bill a statement of any action taken by the Senate or Assembly concerning such bill.

ACTION IN ONE HOUSE ON BILL TRANSMITTED FROM THE OTHER

After a Bill Has Been Passed by the Senate or Assembly

21. When a bill has been passed by either house it shall be transmitted promptly to the other unless a motion to reconsider or a notice of motion to reconsider has been made or it is held pursuant to some rule or order of the house.

The procedure of referring bills to committees shall be determined by the respective houses.

Messages to Be in Writing Under Proper Signatures

22. Notice of the action of either house to the other shall be in writing and under the signature of the Secretary of the Senate or the Chief Clerk of the Assembly from which such message is to be conveyed. A receipt shall be taken from the officer to whom such message is delivered.

Uncontested Bills

22.1. Each standing committee may report an uncontested bill out of committee with the recommendation that it be placed on the consent calendar. The Secretary of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of the Assembly shall provide to each committee chairman or chairwoman appropriate forms for such report. As used in this rule, "uncontested bill" means a bill, except a revenue measure or a measure as to which the 30-day limitation prescribed by subdivision (a) of Section 8 of Article IV of the California Constitution has been dispensed with, which: (a) receives a do-pass or do-pass-as-amended recommendation from the committee to which it is referred, by unanimous vote of the members present provided a quorum is present; and (b) has no opposition expressed by any person present at the committee meeting with respect to the final version of the bill

as approved by the committee; and (c) prior to final action by the committee, has been requested by the author to be placed on the consent calendar.

Consent Calendar

22.2. Following their second reading and the adoption of any committee amendments thereto, all bills certified by the committee chairman or chairwoman as uncontested bills shall be placed by the Secretary of the Senate or the Chief Clerk of the Assembly on the consent calendar, and shall be known as "consent calendar bills." Any consent calendar bill which is amended from the floor shall cease to be a consent calendar bill and shall be replaced on the third reading file. Upon objection of any member to the placement or retention of any bill on the consent calendar, such bill shall cease to be a consent calendar bill and shall be replaced on the third reading file. No consent calendar bill shall be considered for adoption until the second legislative day following the day of its placement on the consent calendar.

Consideration of Bills on Consent Calendar

22.3. Bills on the consent calendar are not debatable, except that the President of the Senate or the Speaker of the Assembly shall allow a reasonable time for questions from the floor and shall permit the proponents of such bills to answer such questions. Immediately prior to voting on the first bill on the consent calendar, the President of the Senate or the Speaker of the Assembly shall call to the attention of the members the fact that the next roll call will be the roll call on the first bill on the consent calendar.

The consent calendar shall be considered as the last order of business on the daily file.

PASSAGE AND ENROLLING OF BILLS

Procedure on Defeat of More Than Majority Bill

23.5. Whenever a bill containing a section or sections requiring for passage an affirmative recorded vote of more than 21 votes in the Senate and more than 41 votes in the Assembly is being considered for passage and the urgency clause, if the bill is an urgency bill, or the bill, in any case, fails to receive the necessary votes to make all sections effective, no further action may be taken on the bill; provided that an amendment to remove all sections requiring the higher vote for passage from the bill shall be in order prior to consideration of further business. If the amendment is adopted, the bill shall be reprinted to reflect such amendment. When the bill is reprinted, it shall be returned to the same place on the file as when it failed to receive the necessary votes.

Enrollment of Bill After Passage

24. After a bill has passed both houses it shall be printed in enrolled form, omitting symbols indicating amendments, and shall be compared by the Engrossing and Enrolling Clerk and the proper committee of the house where it originated to determine that it is in the form approved by the houses. The enrolled bill shall thereupon be signed by the Secretary of the Senate and Chief Clerk of the Assembly and, except as otherwise provided by these rules, presented without delay to the Governor. The committee shall

report the time of presentation of the bill to the Governor to the house and the record shall be entered in the journal. After enrollment and signature by the officers of the Legislature, constitutional amendments, and concurrent and joint resolutions shall be filed without delay in the office of the Secretary of State and the time of filing shall be reported to the house and the record entered in the journal.

AMENDMENTS AND CONFERENCES

Amendments to Amended Bills Must Be Attached

25. Whenever a bill or resolution which shall have been passed in one house shall be amended in the other, it shall immediately be reprinted as amended by the house making such amendment or amendments. One copy of such amendment or amendments shall be attached to the bill or resolution so amended, and endorsed "adopted" and such amendment or amendments, if concurred in by the house in which such bill or resolution originated, shall be endorsed "concurred in," and such endorsement shall be signed by the Secretary or Assistant Secretary of the Senate, or the Chief Clerk or Assistant Clerk of the Assembly, as the case may be; provided, however, that an amendment to the title of a bill adopted after the passage of such bill shall not necessitate reprinting, but such amendment must be concurred in by the house in which such bill originated.

Amendments to Concurrent and Joint Resolutions

25.5. When a concurrent or joint resolution is amended, and the only effect of the amendments is to add coauthors, the joint or concurrent resolution shall not be reprinted unless specifically requested by one of the added coauthors, but a list of the coauthors shall appear in the journal and history.

To Concur or Refuse to Concur in Amendments

26. In case the Senate amends and passes an Assembly bill, or the Assembly amends and passes a Senate bill, the Senate (if it be a Senate bill) or the Assembly (if it be an Assembly bill) must either "concur" or "refuse to concur" in the amendments. If the Senate concurs (if it be a Senate bill), or the Assembly concurs (if it be an Assembly bill), the Secretary or Chief Clerk shall notify the house making the amendments and the bill shall be ordered to enrollment.

Reference to Committee

26.5. Pursuant to Rule 26, whenever a bill is returned to its house of origin for a vote on concurrence in an amendment made in the other house, the Legislative Counsel shall promptly prepare and transmit to the Chief Clerk of the Assembly and the Speaker of the Assembly in the case of an Assembly bill, or to the Secretary of the Senate and Chairman of the Senate Committee on Rules in the case of a Senate bill, a brief digest summarizing the effect of the amendment made in the other house. The Secretary or Chief Clerk shall, upon receipt from the Legislative Counsel, cause the digest to be printed in the Daily File immediately following any reference to the bill covered by the digest. A motion to concur or refuse to concur in the amendment shall not be in order until such time as the Legislative Counsel's Digest has appeared in the file or an analysis of

the bill has been prepared and distributed pursuant to Senate Rule 29.8 or Assembly Rule 77.

If the digest discloses that the amendment of the other house has made a substantial substantive change in the bill as first passed by the house of origin, the bill shall on motion of the Chairman of the Senate Committee on Rules, if it be a Senate bill, be referred to the Senate Committee on Rules for reference to an appropriate standing committee. If the bill is an Assembly bill it shall be referred by the Speaker to the appropriate committee.

Upon receipt of such a bill, the committee may vote to recommend concurrence or nonconcurrence in the amendment or the committee may hold the bill. The committee shall be subject to all the requirements for procedure provided under Rule 62 for committees other than for committees of first referral, and such other requirements for normal committee procedure as the Assembly or Senate may separately provide in the standing rules of their respective houses.

Any of the provisions of this rule may be dispensed with regard to a particular bill in its house of origin upon an affirmative vote of a majority of the members of that house.

Concurring in Amendments Adding Urgency Section

27. When a bill which has been passed in one house is amended in the other by the addition of a section providing that the act shall take effect immediately as an urgency statute and is returned to the house in which it originated for concurrence in the amendment or amendments thereto, the procedure and vote thereon shall be as follows:

The presiding officer shall first direct that the urgency section be read and put to a vote. If two-thirds of the membership of the house vote in the affirmative, the presiding officer shall then direct that the question of whether the house shall concur in the amendment or amendments shall be put to a vote. If two-thirds of the membership of the house vote in the affirmative, concurrence in the amendments shall be effective.

If the affirmative vote on either of such questions is less than two-thirds of the membership of the house, the effect is a refusal to concur in the amendment or amendments, and the procedure thereupon shall be as provided in Rule 28.

When Senate or Assembly Refuse to Concur

28. If the Senate (if it be a Senate bill) or the Assembly (if it be an Assembly bill) refuses to concur in amendments to the bill made by the other house, and when the other house has been notified of such refusal to concur, a conference committee shall be appointed for each house in the manner prescribed by these rules. The Committee on Rules in the case of the Senate and the Speaker of the Assembly in the case of the Assembly shall each appoint a committee of three on conference, and the Secretary of the Senate or the Chief Clerk of the Assembly shall immediately notify the other house of the action taken.

Committee on Conference

28.1. (a) The Senate Committee on Rules and the Speaker of the Assembly, in appointing a committee on conference, shall each select two members from those voting with the majority on the point about which the difference has arisen, and the other member from the minority, in the event there is a minority vote.

Whether a member has voted with the majority or minority on the point about which the difference has arisen is determined by his or her vote on the appropriate roll call, as follows:

(1) In the Assembly—

(A) The roll call on the question of final passage of a Senate bill amended in the Assembly when the Senate has refused to concur with the Assembly amendments.

(B) The roll call on the question of concurrence with Senate amendments to an Assembly bill.

(2) In the Senate—

(A) The roll call on the question of final passage of an Assembly bill amended in the Senate when the Assembly has refused to concur with the Senate amendments.

(B) The roll call on the question of concurrence with Assembly amendments to a Senate bill.

(b) Either house may suspend this rule by a two-thirds vote of the membership of the house.

Meetings and Reports of Committees on Conference

29. The first Senator named on the conference committee shall act as chairman or chairwoman of the committee from the Senate, and the first Member of the Assembly named on such committee shall act as chairman or chairwoman of the committee from the Assembly. The chairman or chairwoman of the committee on conference for the house of origin of the bill shall arrange the time and place of meeting of the conference committee and shall prepare or direct the preparation of reports. It shall require an affirmative vote of not less than two of the Assembly Members and two of the Senate Members constituting the committee on conference to agree upon a report, and the report shall be submitted to both the Senate and the Assembly. The committee on conference shall report to both the Senate and the Assembly. Such report is not subject to amendment, and if either house refuses to adopt such report, the conferees shall be discharged and other conferees appointed; provided, however, that no more than three different conference committees shall be appointed on any one bill. No member who has served on a committee on conference shall be appointed a member of another committee on conference on the same bill. It shall require the same affirmative recorded vote to adopt any conference report as required by the California Constitution upon the final passage of the bill affected by such report. It shall require an affirmative recorded vote of two-thirds of the entire elected membership of each house to adopt any conference report affecting any bill which contains an item or items of appropriation which are subject to subdivision (d) of Section 12 of Article IV of the California Constitution. The report of a conference committee shall be in writing, and shall have affixed thereto the signatures of each Senator and each Member of the Assembly consenting to the report. Space shall also be provided

where a member of a conference committee may indicate his or her dissent in the committee's findings. Any dissenting member may have attached to a conference committee report a dissenting report which shall not exceed, in length, the majority committee report. A copy of any amendments proposed in the majority report shall be placed on the desk of each member of the house before it is acted upon by the house.

The vote on concurrence or upon the adoption of such conference report shall be deemed the vote upon final passage of such bill.

Conference Committees

29.5. (a) All meetings of any conference committee on the Budget Bill shall be open and readily accessible to the public.

No conference committee on any bill may meet, consider, or act on the subject matter of the bill except in a meeting that is open and readily accessible to the public; unless the action is on a report determined by the Legislative Counsel to be nonsubstantive. The Legislative Counsel shall examine each proposed report and shall note upon the face of the report that the amendments proposed are "substantive" or "nonsubstantive" as the case may be.

The chairman or chairwoman of the conference committee of each house shall give notice to the file clerk of their respective houses of the time and place of such meeting. Notice of each public meeting shall be published in the file of each house one calendar day prior to the meeting, except that such notice shall not be required for a meeting of a conference committee on the Budget Bill. When the provisions of this subdivision are waived with respect to a meeting of any public conference committee, and when there is a meeting of a conference committee on the Budget Bill, every effort shall be made to inform the public that such a meeting has been called. When the provisions of this subdivision have been waived with respect to the meeting of any public conference committee, the chairman or chairwoman of the conference committee of each house shall immediately notify the chairman or chairwoman of the policy committee of their respective houses that considered the bill in question of the waiver, and of the time and place of the meeting.

(b) The first committee on conference of the Budget Bill, if such a committee is appointed, shall submit its report to each house no later than 15 days after the Budget Bill has been passed by both houses. If such report is not submitted by such date, the conference committee shall be deemed to have reached no agreement and shall so inform each house pursuant to Rule 30.7.

(c) A committee on conference of the Budget Bill shall only consider differences between the Assembly version of the Budget Bill as passed by the Assembly and the Senate version of the Budget Bill as passed by the Senate and shall not approve any item of expenditure nor control which exceeds that contained in one of the two versions before the conference committee.

(d) No conference committee on any bill, other than the Budget Bill, shall approve any substantial financial provision in any bill if such financial provision has not been heard by the fiscal committee of each house, nor shall any such conference committee approve substantial policy changes which have not been heard by the policy committee of each house.

(e) No waiver of the one calendar day file notice requirement of subdivision (a) shall be effective for longer than three calendar days.

Conference Committee Reports

30. Upon submission of the report of a committee on conference, if the report recommends that the bill be further amended, the bill shall be reprinted incorporating the amendments recommended by the conference committee. The consideration of the report of a committee on conference shall not be in order until the bill in the form recommended by the report of the committee on conference has both been in print and been noticed in the Daily File for not less than one legislative day.

If the conference committee's report recommends only that the amendments of the Senate or the Assembly "be concurred in," consideration of the report shall be in order at any time, and reprinting of the bill shall not be required, but notice shall appear in the Daily File for not less than one legislative day.

No conference committee report shall be in order unless it has been received by the Secretary of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of the Assembly at least three calendar days preceding the scheduled commencement of the summer, interim, or final recesses of the Legislature.

The provisions of this rule may be suspended as to any particular conference committee report by a two-thirds vote of the membership of either house.

This rule shall not apply to a report of a committee on conference on the Budget Bill.

Conference Committee Reports on Urgency Statutes

30.5. When the report of a committee on conference recommends the amendment of a bill by the addition of a section providing that the act shall take effect immediately as an urgency statute, the procedure and the vote thereon shall be as follows:

The presiding officer shall first direct that the urgency section be read and put to a vote. If two-thirds of the members elected to the house vote in the affirmative, the presiding officer shall then direct that the question of whether the house shall adopt the report of the committee on conference shall be put to a vote. If two-thirds of the members elected to the house vote in the affirmative, the adoption of the report and the amendments proposed thereby shall be effective.

If the affirmative vote on either of such questions is less than two-thirds of the members elected to such house, the effect is a refusal to adopt the report of the committee on conference.

Failure to Agree on Report

30.7. A conference committee may find and determine that it is unable to submit a report to the respective houses, upon the affirmative vote to that effect of not less than two of the Assembly Members and not less than two of the Senate Members constituting the committee. Such finding may be submitted to the Chief Clerk of the Assembly and the Secretary of the Senate in the form of a letter from the chairman or chairwoman of the committee on conference for the house of origin of the bill, containing the signatures of the members of the committee consenting to the finding and determination that the committee is unable to submit a report. The

Chief Clerk of the Assembly and the Secretary of the Senate, upon being notified that a conference committee is unable to submit a report, shall so inform each house, whereupon the conferees shall be discharged and other conferees appointed, in accordance with the provisions of Rule 29.

MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

Authority When Rules Do Not Govern

31. All relations between the houses which are not covered by these rules shall be governed by Mason's Manual.

Press Rules

32. (a) Persons desiring privileges of accredited press representatives shall make application to the Joint Rules Committee. Such application shall constitute compliance with any provisions of the rules of the Assembly or the Senate with respect to registration of news correspondents. Applications shall state in writing the names of the daily newspapers, periodic publications, news associations, or radio or television stations by which the press representatives are employed, and what other occupations or employment they may have, if any, and the press representatives shall further declare that they are not employed, directly or indirectly, to assist in the prosecution of the legislative business of any person, corporation, or association, and will not become so employed while retaining the privilege of accredited press representatives.

(b) The applications required by subdivision (a) of this rule shall be authenticated in a manner that shall be satisfactory to the Standing Committee of the Capitol Correspondents Association which shall see that occupation of seats and desks in the Senate and the Assembly Chambers is confined to bona fide correspondents of reputable standing in their business, who represent daily newspapers requiring a daily file of legislative news, qualified periodic publications, or news associations requiring daily telegraphic or radio or television service on legislative news. It shall be the duty of the standing committee, at its discretion, to report violation of accredited press privileges to the Speaker of the Assembly, or to the Senate Committee on Rules, and pending action thereon the offending correspondent may be suspended by the standing committee.

(c) Except as otherwise provided in this subdivision, persons engaged in other occupations whose chief attention is not given to newspaper correspondence or to news associations requiring telegraphic or radio or television service shall not be entitled to the privileges accorded accredited press representatives; and the press list in the Handbook of the California Legislature and the Senate and Assembly Histories shall be a list only of persons authenticated by the standing committee of correspondents. Accreditation may be granted to bona fide correspondents of reputable standing employed by periodic publications of general circulation, providing that the applicants are employed on a full-time basis in the capitol area preparing articles dealing with state government and politics, and that their publications are not organs or organizations involved in legislative advocacy.

(d) The press seats and desks in the Senate and Assembly Chambers shall be under the control of the standing committee of correspondents, subject to the approval and supervision of the Speaker of the Assembly and the Senate Committee on Rules. Press cards shall be issued by the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the Assembly only to correspondents properly accredited in accordance with the provisions of this rule.

(e) One or more rooms shall be assigned for the exclusive use of correspondents during the legislative session, which rooms shall be known as the Press Room. The Press Room shall be under the control of the Chief of the Office of Buildings and Grounds; provided, that all rules and regulations shall be approved by the Senate Committee on Rules and the Speaker of the Assembly.

(f) No accredited member of the Capitol Correspondents Association shall, for compensation, perform any service for state constitutional officers or members of their staffs, for state agencies, for the Legislature, for candidates for state office, or for a state officeholder, or for any person registered or performing as a legislative advocate.

(g) An accredited member of the association who violates subdivision (a) or (f) of this rule shall be subject to the following penalties:

(1) For the first offense, the Standing Committee of the Capitol Correspondents Association shall send a letter of admonition to the offending member, his or her employer, and the Joint Rules Committee. The letter shall state the nature of the member's rule violation and shall warn of an additional penalty for a second offense.

(2) For a second offense, the Standing Committee of the Capitol Correspondents Association shall recommend to the Joint Rules Committee that the member's accreditation be suspended or revoked and that he or she lose all rights and privileges attached thereto. The Standing Committee of the Capitol Correspondents Association shall also dismiss the member from the association.

Any member of the Standing Committee of the Capitol Correspondents Association may propose that the committee make an inquiry to determine if an association member has violated subdivision (a) or (f) of this rule. Upon a majority vote of the Standing Committee of the Capitol Correspondents Association, an inquiry shall be made.

Upon receipt of a signed, written notice from any association member of his or her belief that another association member may have violated subdivision (a) or (f) of this rule, the Standing Committee of the Capitol Correspondents Association shall commence an inquiry into the possible violation.

If the Standing Committee of the Capitol Correspondents Association determines by majority vote that an association member has broken an association rule, it shall inform the member of its finding. Within two weeks of notification, the member may request a meeting of the membership. If the member makes such a request, the Standing Committee of the Capitol Correspondents Association shall promptly schedule a meeting at the earliest possible time. After hearing the member and the committee review the circumstances of the alleged violation, the membership may, by majority vote, nullify the finding of the Standing Committee of the Capitol

Correspondents Association. If nullification does not occur, the Standing Committee of the Capitol Correspondents Association shall impose immediately the appropriate penalty.

Dispensing With Joint Rules

33. No joint rule shall be dispensed with except by a vote of two-thirds of each house, except as otherwise provided in these rules. If either house shall violate a joint rule, a question of order may be raised in the other house and decided in the same manner as in the case of the violation of the rules of such house; and if it shall be decided that the joint rules have been violated, the bill involving such violations shall be returned to the house in which it originated, and such disputed matter be considered in like manner as in conference committee.

Dispensing with Joint Rules: Unanimous Consent

33.1. Notwithstanding any other rule to the contrary, a joint rule that may be dispensed with by one house may be done so by unanimous consent if the rules committee of that house has approved.

Opinions of Legislative Counsel

34. Whenever the Legislative Counsel issues an opinion to any person other than the first-named author analyzing the constitutionality, operation, or effect of a bill or other legislative measure which is then pending before the Legislature or of any amendment made or proposed to be made to such bill or measure, he or she is authorized and instructed to deliver two copies of the opinion to the first-named author as promptly as feasible after the delivery of the original opinion and also to deliver a copy to any other author of the bill or measure who so requests. A copy of any letter prepared by the Legislative Counsel for the sole purpose of advising a member of a conflict between two or more bills as to the sections of law being amended, repealed, or added shall be submitted to the chairman or chairwoman of the committee to which each such bill has been referred.

Resolutions Prepared by Legislative Counsel

34.1. Whenever the Legislative Counsel has been requested to draft a resolution commemorating or taking note of any event, or a resolution congratulating or expressing sympathy toward any person, and subsequently receives a similar request from another Member of the Legislature, he or she shall inform that requester and each subsequent requester that such a resolution is being, or has been, prepared, and he or she shall inform them of the name of the member for whom the resolution was, or is being, prepared.

Resolutions

34.2. A concurrent resolution, Senate resolution, or House resolution may be introduced to memorialize the death of a present or former state or federal elected official or a member of their immediate families. In all other instances, a resolution other than a concurrent resolution, as specified by the Committee on Rules of each house, or as provided by the Joint Rules Committee in those cases which require that such resolution should emanate from both houses, shall be used for the purpose of commendation,

congratulation, sympathy, or regret with respect to any person, group, or organization.

No concurrent resolution requesting the Governor to issue a proclamation shall be introduced without the prior approval of the Committee on Rules of the house in which the resolution is to be introduced.

Identical Drafting Requests

34.5. Whenever it shall come to the attention of the Legislative Counsel that a member has requested the drafting of a bill which will be substantially identical to one already introduced, he or she shall inform such member of that fact.

Expense of Members

35. As provided in Section 8902 of the Government Code, each Member of the Legislature is entitled to reimbursement for living expenses while required to be in Sacramento to attend a session of the Legislature, or while traveling to and from or in attendance at a committee meeting, or while attending to any legislative function or responsibility as authorized or directed by legislative rules or the Committee on Rules of the house of which he or she is a member at the same rate as may be established by the State Board of Control for other elected state officers. Each member shall be reimbursed for travel expenses incurred in traveling to and from a session of the Legislature, or when traveling to and from a meeting of a committee of which he or she is a member, or when traveling pursuant to any other legislative function or responsibility as authorized or directed by legislative rules or the Committee on Rules of the house of which he or she is a member at the rate prescribed by Section 8903 of the Government Code.

Expense allowances for Members of the Senate and Assembly shall be approved and certified to the Controller by the Secretary of the Senate, on behalf of the Senate, and the Chief Clerk of the Assembly or other person authorized by the Assembly Committee on Rules, on behalf of the Assembly, weekly or as otherwise directed by either house, and upon such certification the Controller shall draw his or her warrants in payment of the allowances to the respective members.

Investigating Committees

36. In order to expedite the work of the Legislature either house, or both houses jointly, may by resolution or statute provide for the appointment of committees to ascertain facts and to make recommendations as to any subject within the scope of legislative regulation or control.

The resolution providing for the appointment of a committee shall state the purpose of the committee, and the scope of the subject concerning which it is to act and may authorize it to act either during sessions of the Legislature or, when such authorization may lawfully be made, after final adjournment.

In the exercise of the power granted by this rule, each committee may employ such clerical, legal, and technical assistants as may be authorized by: (a) the Joint Committee on Rules in the case of a joint

committee, (b) the Senate Committee on Rules in the case of a Senate committee, or (c) the Assembly Committee on Rules in the case of an Assembly committee.

Except as otherwise provided herein for joint committees or by the rules of the Senate or the Assembly for single house committees, each committee may adopt and amend such rules governing its procedure as may appear necessary and proper to carry out the powers granted and duties imposed under this rule. Such rules may include provisions fixing the quorum of the committee and the number of votes necessary to take action on any matter. With respect to all joint committees, a majority of the membership from each house constitutes a quorum and an affirmative vote of a majority of the membership from each house is necessary for the committee to take action.

Each such committee is authorized and empowered to summon and subpoena witnesses, require the production of papers, books, accounts, reports, documents, records, and papers of every kind and description, to issue subpoenas, and to take all necessary means to compel the attendance of witnesses and to procure testimony, oral and documentary.

Each member of such committees is authorized and empowered to administer oaths, and all of the provisions of Chapter 4 (commencing with Section 9400), Part 1, Division 2, Title 2 of the Government Code, relating to the attendance and examination of witnesses before the Legislature and the committees thereof, shall apply to such committees.

The Sergeant at Arms of the Senate or Assembly, or such other person as may be designated by the chairman or chairwoman of the committee, shall serve any and all subpoenas, orders, and other process that may be issued by the committee, when directed to do so by the chairman or chairwoman, or by a majority of the membership of the committee.

Every department, commission, board, agency, officer, and employee of the state government, including the Legislative Counsel and the Attorney General and their subordinates, and of every political subdivision, county, city, or public district of or in this state, shall give and furnish to these committees and to their subcommittees upon request such information, records, and documents as the committees deem necessary or proper for the achievement of the purposes for which each such committee was created.

Each committee or subcommittee of either house in accordance with the rules of that respective house and each joint committee or subcommittee thereof, may meet at any time during the period in which it is authorized to act, either at the State Capitol, or at any other place in the State of California, in public or executive session, and do any and all things necessary or convenient to enable it to exercise the powers and perform the duties herein granted to it or accomplish the objects and purposes of the resolution creating it with the following exceptions:

(a) When the Legislature is in session:

(1) No committee or subcommittee of either house shall meet outside the State Capitol without the prior approval of the Senate Committee on Rules with respect to Senate committees and

subcommittees and the Speaker of the Assembly with respect to Assembly committees and subcommittees.

(2) No committee or subcommittee of either house, other than a standing committee or subcommittee thereof, shall meet unless notice of such meeting has been printed in the daily file for four days prior thereto. This requirement may be waived by a majority vote of either house with respect to a particular bill.

(3) No joint committee or subcommittee thereof, other than the Joint Committees on Legislative Audit, Legislative Budget, and Rules, shall meet outside the State Capitol without the prior approval of the Joint Rules Committee.

(4) No joint committee or subcommittee thereof, other than the Joint Committees on Legislative Audit, Legislative Budget, and Rules, shall meet unless notice of such meeting has been printed in the daily file for four days prior thereto.

(b) When the Legislature is in joint recess each joint committee or subcommittee, other than the Joint Committees on Legislative Audit, Legislative Budget, and Rules, shall notify the Joint Rules Committee at least two weeks prior to any such meeting.

(c) The requirements placed upon joint committees by subdivisions (a) and (b) of this rule may be waived where it is deemed necessary by the Joint Rules Committee.

Each such committee may expend such money as may be made available to it for such purpose but no committee shall incur any indebtedness unless money shall have been first made available therefor.

No living expenses shall be allowed in connection with legislative business for a day on which the member receives reimbursement for expenses while required to be in Sacramento to attend a session of the Legislature. The chairman or chairwoman of each committee shall audit and approve the expense claims of the members of the committee, including claims for mileage in connection with attendance on committee business, or in connection with specific assignments by the committee chairman or chairwoman, but excluding other types of mileage, and shall certify the amount approved to the Controller, and the Controller shall draw his or her warrants upon the certification of the chairman or chairwoman.

Subject to the rules of each house for the respective committees of each house, and subject to the joint rules for any joint committee, the chairman or chairwoman of any such committee may appoint subcommittees and chairmen or chairwomen thereof for the purpose of more expeditiously handling and considering matters referred to it, and such subcommittees and the chairmen or chairwomen thereof shall have all the powers and authority herein conferred upon the committee and its chairman or chairwoman. The chairman or chairwoman of such subcommittee shall audit the expense claims of the members of such subcommittees and other claims, and the expenses incurred by it and shall certify the amount thereof to the chairman or chairwoman of the committee who shall, if he or she approves the same, certify the amount thereof to the Controller, and the Controller shall draw his or her warrant therefor upon such certification, and the Treasurer shall pay the same. Whenever such committee or any subcommittee thereof is authorized to leave the State of California in the performance of its duties, then such

committee or subcommittee shall, while out of the state, have the same authority as if it were acting and functioning within the state, and the members thereof shall be reimbursed for expenses.

Notwithstanding any provision of this rule, if the standing rules of either house require that expense claims of committees for goods or services or pursuant to contracts or for expenses of employees or members of committees be audited or approved, after approval of the committee chairman or chairwoman, by another agency of either house, the Controller shall draw his warrants only upon the certification of such other agency. All expense claims approved by the chairman or chairwoman of any joint committee, other than the Joint Legislative Budget Committee and the Joint Legislative Audit Committee, shall be approved by the Joint Rules Committee and the Controller shall draw his or her warrants only upon the certification of the Joint Rules Committee.

Except salary claims of employees clearly subject to federal withholding taxes and the requirement as to loyalty oaths, claims presented for services or pursuant to contract shall refer to the agreement, the terms of which shall be made available to the Controller.

Expenses of Committee Employees

36.1. Unless otherwise provided by respective house or committee rule or resolution, employees of legislative committees shall, when entitled to traveling expenses, be entitled to allowances in lieu of actual expenses for hotel accommodations, breakfast, lunch, and dinner, at the rates fixed by the State Board of Control from time to time in limitation of reimbursement of expenses of state employees generally; provided, that if an allowance for hotel accommodations, breakfast, lunch, and dinner is made by a committee at a rate in excess of those fixed by the State Board of Control the chairman or chairwoman of the committee shall notify the Controller of that fact in writing.

Appointment of Committees

36.5. The provisions of this rule shall apply whenever a joint committee is created by a statute or resolution which either provides that appointments be made and vacancies be filled in the manner provided for in the Joint Rules, or which makes no provision for the appointment of members or the filling of vacancies.

The Senate members of the committee shall be appointed by the Senate Committee on Rules; the Assembly members of the committee shall be appointed by the Speaker of the Assembly; and vacancies occurring in the membership of the committee shall be filled by the respective appointing powers. The members appointed shall hold over until their successors are regularly selected.

Appointment of Joint Committee Chairmen or Chairwomen

36.7. The chairman or chairwoman of each joint committee heretofore or hereafter created, except the Joint Legislative Budget Committee and the Joint Legislative Audit Committee, shall be appointed by the Joint Rules Committee from a member or members recommended by the Senate Committee on Rules and the Speaker of the Assembly.

Joint Committee Funds

36.8. Each joint committee, heretofore or hereafter created, except the Joint Legislative Budget Committee and the Joint Legislative Audit Committee, shall expend the funds heretofore or hereafter made available to it in compliance with the policies set forth by the Joint Rules Committee with respect to personnel, salaries, purchasing, office space assignment, contractual services, rental or lease agreements, travel, and any and all other matters relating to the management and administration of committee affairs.

Joint Legislative Budget Committee

37. In addition to any other committee provided for by these rules, there shall be a joint committee to be known and called the Joint Legislative Budget Committee, which is hereby declared to be a continuing body.

It shall be the duty of the committee to ascertain facts and make recommendations to the Legislature and to the houses thereof concerning the state Budget, the revenues and expenditures of the state, and the organization and functions of the state, its departments, subdivisions and agencies, with a view of reducing the cost of the state government and securing greater efficiency and economy.

The committee shall consist of eight Members of the Senate and eight Members of the Assembly. The Senate members of the committee shall consist of eight Members of the Senate appointed by the Senate Committee on Rules. The Assembly members of the committee shall consist of eight Members of the Assembly appointed by the Speaker of the Assembly. The committee shall select its own chairman or chairwoman.

Any vacancies occurring between regular sessions in the Senate membership of the Joint Legislative Budget Committee shall be filled by the Senate Committee on Rules, and the Senators appointed shall hold over until their successors are regularly selected. For the purposes of this rule, a vacancy shall be deemed to exist as to a Senator whose term is expiring whenever he or she is not reelected at the general election.

Any vacancies occurring between regular sessions in the Assembly membership of the Joint Legislative Budget Committee shall be filled by the Speaker of the Assembly, and the Members of the Assembly appointed shall hold over until their successors are regularly selected. For the purposes of this rule, a vacancy shall be deemed to exist as to a Member of the Assembly whose term is expiring whenever he or she is not reelected at the general election.

Any vacancy occurring at any time in the Assembly membership of the committee shall be filled by appointment by the Speaker. The committee shall have the authority to make rules to govern its own proceedings and its employees. It may also create subcommittees from its membership, assigning to its subcommittees any study, inquiry, investigation, or hearing that the committee itself has authority to undertake or hold and the subcommittee for the purpose of this assignment shall have and may exercise all the powers conferred upon the committee, limited only by the express terms of

any rule or resolution of the committee defining the powers and duties of the subcommittee. Those powers may be withdrawn or terminated at any time by the committee.

The Joint Legislative Budget Committee may render services to any investigating committee of the Legislature pursuant to contract between the Joint Legislative Budget Committee and the committee for which the services are to be performed. The contract may provide for payment to the Joint Legislative Budget Committee of the cost of the services from the funds appropriated to the contracting investigating committee. All legislative investigating committees are authorized to enter into those contracts with the Joint Legislative Budget Committee. Money received by the Joint Legislative Budget Committee pursuant to any such agreement shall be in augmentation of the current appropriation for the support of the Joint Legislative Budget Committee.

The provisions of Rule 36 shall apply to the Joint Legislative Budget Committee, and it shall have all the authority provided in such rule or pursuant to Section 11 of Article IV of the Constitution.

The committee shall have authority to appoint a Legislative Analyst, to fix his or her compensation and to prescribe his or her duties, and to appoint any other clerical and technical employees as may appear necessary. The duties of the Legislative Analyst shall be as follows:

(1) To ascertain the facts and make recommendations to the Joint Legislative Budget Committee and under its direction to the committees of the Legislature concerning:

(a) The state Budget.

(b) The revenues and expenditures of the state.

(c) The organization and functions of the state, its departments, subdivisions, and agencies.

(2) To assist the Senate Budget and Fiscal Review Committee and the Assembly Committees on Appropriations and Budget in consideration of the Budget and all bills carrying express or implied appropriations and all legislation affecting state departments and their efficiency; to appear before any other legislative committee; and to assist any other legislative committee upon instruction by the Joint Legislative Budget Committee.

(3) To provide all legislative committees and Members of the Legislature with information obtained under the direction of the Joint Legislative Budget Committee.

(4) To maintain a record of all work performed by the Legislative Analyst under the direction of the Joint Legislative Budget Committee and to keep and make available all documents, data, and reports submitted to him or her by any Senate, Assembly, or joint committee. The committee may meet either during sessions of the Legislature, any recess thereof, or after final adjournment, and may meet or conduct business at any place within the State of California.

The chairman or chairwoman of the committee or, in the event of that person's inability to act, the vice chairman or vice chairwoman, shall audit and approve the expenses of members of the committee or salaries of the employees, and all other expenses incurred in connection with the performance of its duties by the committee, and the chairman or chairwoman shall certify the amount approved to the Controller, and the Controller shall draw his or her warrants

upon the certification of the chairman or chairwoman, and the Treasurer shall pay the same to the chairman or chairwoman of the committee to be disbursed by the chairman or chairwoman.

On and after the commencement of a succeeding regular session those members of the committee who continue to be Members of the Senate and Assembly, respectively, continue as members of the committee until their successors are appointed, and the committee continues with all its powers, duties, authority, records, papers, personnel, and staff, and all funds theretofore made available for its use.

Upon the conclusion of its work, any Assembly, Senate, or joint committee (other than a standing committee) shall deliver to the Legislative Analyst for use and custody all documents, data, reports, and other materials that have come into the possession of the committee and that are not included within the final report of the committee to the Assembly, Senate, or the Legislature, as the case may be. The documents, data, reports, and other materials shall be available to Members of the Legislature, the Senate Office of Research, and the Assembly Office of Research, upon request.

The Legislative Analyst with the consent of the committee shall make available to any Member or committee of the Legislature any other reports, records, documents, or other data under his or her control, except that reports prepared by the Legislative Analyst in response to a request from a Member or committee of the Legislature shall only be made available with the written permission of the member or committee who made the request.

The Legislative Analyst, upon the receipt of a request from any committee or Member of the Legislature to conduct a study or provide information that falls within the scope of his or her responsibilities and that concerns the administration of the government of the State of California, shall at once advise the Joint Legislative Budget Committee of the nature of the request without disclosing the name of the Member or committee making the request.

The Legislative Analyst shall immediately undertake to provide the requesting committee or legislator with the service or information requested, and shall inform the committee or legislator of the approximate date when this information will be available. Should there be any material delay, he or she shall subsequently communicate this fact to the requester.

Neither the Committee on Rules of either house nor the Joint Rules Committee shall assign any matter for study to the Joint Legislative Budget Committee or the Legislative Analyst without first obtaining from the Joint Legislative Budget Committee an estimate of the amount required to be expended by it to make the study.

Any concurrent, joint, Senate, or House resolution assigning a study to the Joint Legislative Budget Committee or to the Legislative Analyst shall be referred to the respective rules committees. Before the committees shall act upon or assign the resolution, they shall obtain an estimate from the Joint Legislative Budget Committee of the amount required to be expended to make the study.

Citizen Cost Impact Report

37.1. Any Member or committee of the Legislature may recommend that the Legislative Analyst prepare a citizen cost impact analysis on proposed legislation. However, such a recommendation shall first be reviewed by the Committee on Rules of the house where the recommendation originated, and this committee shall make the final determination as to which bills shall be assigned for preparation of an impact analysis.

In selecting specific bills for assignment to the Legislative Analyst for preparation of citizen cost impact analyses, the Committee on Rules shall request the Legislative Analyst to present an estimate of his or her time and prospective costs for preparing the analyses. Only those bills which have a potential significant cost impact shall be assigned. Where necessary, the Committee on Rules shall provide funds to offset added costs incurred by the Legislative Analyst.

The citizen cost impact analyses shall include those economic effects which the Legislative Analyst deems significant and which he or she believes will result directly from the proposed legislation. Insofar as feasible, the Legislative Analyst shall consider, but not be limited to consideration of, the following:

- (a) The economic effect on the public generally.
- (b) Any specific economic effect on persons or businesses in the case of legislation which is regulatory.

The Legislative Analyst shall submit the citizen cost impact analyses when completed to the committee or committees and at the time or times designated by the Committee on Rules.

The Legislative Analyst shall submit from time to time, but at least once a year, a report to the Legislature on the trends and directions of the state's economy, and shall list the alternatives and make recommendations as to legislative actions which, in his or her judgment, will insure a sound and stable state economy.

Joint Legislative Audit Committee

37.3. The Joint Legislative Audit Committee is created pursuant to the Legislature's rulemaking authority and specific constitutional authority by Chapter 4 (commencing with Section 10500), Part 2, Division 2, Title 2 of the Government Code. The committee shall consist of seven Members of the Senate and seven Members of the Assembly who shall be selected in the manner provided for in these rules, of which one shall be the chairman or chairwoman of the fiscal committee for the Senate and one shall be the chairman or chairwoman of the fiscal committee for the Assembly. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in these rules, four members from each house constitute a quorum and the number of votes necessary to take action on any matter. The Chairman or Chairwoman of the Joint Legislative Audit Committee, upon receiving a request by any Member of the Legislature or committee thereof for a copy of a report prepared or being prepared by the Bureau of State Audits, shall provide the member or committee with a copy of such report when it is, or has been, submitted by the Bureau of State Audits to the Joint Legislative Audit Committee.

Study or Audits

37.4. (a) Notwithstanding any other provision of law to the contrary, the Joint Legislative Audit Committee shall establish priorities and assign all work to be done by the Bureau of State Audits.

(b) Any bill requiring action by the Bureau of State Audits shall contain an appropriation for the cost of any study or audit.

(c) Any bill or concurrent, joint, Senate, or House resolution assigning a study to the Joint Legislative Audit Committee or to the Bureau of State Audits shall be referred to the respective rules committees. Before the committees shall act upon or assign the bill or resolution, they shall obtain an estimate from the Joint Legislative Audit Committee of the amount required to be expended to make the study.

Waiver

37.5. The provisions of subdivision (b) of Rule 37.4 may be waived by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee. The chairman or chairwoman of the committee shall notify the Secretary of the Senate, the Chief Clerk of the Assembly, and the Legislative Counsel in writing when the provisions of subdivision (b) of Rule 37.4 have been waived. If the cost of a study or audit is less than one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000), the chairman or chairwoman of the committee may exercise the committee's authority to waive the provisions of subdivision (b) of Rule 37.4.

Administrative Regulations

37.7. (a) Any Member of the Senate may request the Senate Committee on Rules, and any Member of the Assembly may request the Speaker of the Assembly, to direct a standing committee or the Office of Research of their respective house to study any proposed or existing regulation or group of related regulations. Upon receipt of such a request, the Senate Committee on Rules or the Speaker of the Assembly shall, after review, determine whether such a study shall be made. In reviewing the request, the Senate Committee on Rules or the Speaker of the Assembly shall determine:

- (1) The cost of making such a study.
- (2) The potential public benefit to be derived from such a study.
- (3) The scope of the study.
- (b) The study may consider, among other relevant issues, whether the proposed or existing regulation:
 - (1) Exceeds the agency's statutory authority.
 - (2) Fails to conform to the legislative intent of the enabling statute.
 - (3) Contradicts or duplicates other regulations adopted by federal, state, or local agencies.
 - (4) Involves an overdelegation of regulatory authority to a particular state agency.
 - (5) Unfairly burdens particular elements of the public.
 - (6) Imposes social or economic costs which outweigh its intended benefits to the public.
 - (7) Imposes unreasonable penalties for violation.

The respective reviewing unit shall in a timely manner transmit its concerns, if any, to the Senate Committee on Rules or the Speaker of the Assembly, and the promulgating agency.

In the event that a state agency takes a regulatory action which the reviewing unit finds unacceptable, the unit shall file a report for publication in the daily journal of its respective house indicating the specific reasons why the regulatory action should not have been taken. The report may include a recommendation that the Legislature adopt a concurrent resolution requesting the state agency to reconsider its action or that the Legislature enact a statute to restrict the regulatory powers of the state agency taking the action.

Joint Rules Committee

40. The Joint Rules Committee is hereby created. The committee has a continuing existence and may meet, act, and conduct its business during sessions of the Legislature or any recess thereof.

The committee shall consist of the members of the Assembly Committee on Rules, the Assembly Majority Floor Leader, the Assembly Minority Floor Leader, the Speaker of the Assembly, and four members of the Senate Committee on Rules, and as many Members of the Senate as may be required to maintain equality in the number of Assembly Members and Senators on the committee, to be appointed by the Senate Committee on Rules. Vacancies occurring in the membership shall be filled by the appointing power.

The committee and its members shall have and exercise all of the rights, duties, and powers conferred upon investigating committees and their members by the provisions of the Joint Rules of the Senate and Assembly as they are adopted and amended from time to time, which provisions are incorporated herein and made applicable to this committee and its members.

The committee shall ascertain facts and make recommendations to the Legislature and to the houses thereof concerning:

(a) The relationship between the two houses and procedures calculated to expedite the affairs of the Legislature by improving that relationship.

(b) The legislative branch of the state government and any defects or deficiencies in the law governing that branch.

(c) Methods whereby legislation is proposed, considered, and acted upon.

(d) The operation of the Legislature, and the committees thereof, and the means of coordinating the work thereof and avoiding duplication of effort.

(e) Aids to the Legislature.

(f) Information and statistics for the use of the Legislature, and respective houses thereof, and the members.

Any matter of business of either house, the transaction of which would affect the interests of the other house, may be referred to the committee for action if the Legislature is not in recess, and shall be referred to the committee for action if the Legislature is in recess.

The committee has the following additional powers and duties:

(a) To select a chairman or chairwoman from its membership. The vice chairman or vice chairwoman of the committee shall be one of the Senate members of the committee, to be selected by the Senate Committee on Rules.

(b) To allocate space in the State Capitol Building and all annexes and additions thereto as provided by law.

(c) To approve, as provided by law, the appearance of the Legislative Counsel in litigation.

(d) To contract with such other agencies, public or private, as it deems necessary for the rendition and affording of such services, facilities, studies, and reports to the committee as will best assist it to carry out the purposes for which it is created.

(e) To cooperate with and secure the cooperation of county, city, city and county, and other local law enforcement agencies in investigating any matter within the scope of this rule and to direct the sheriff of any county to serve subpoenas, orders, and other process issued by the committee.

(f) To report its findings and recommendations, including recommendations for the needed revision of any and all laws and constitutional provisions relating to the Legislature, to the Legislature and to the people from time to time and at any time.

(g) The committee, and any subcommittee when so authorized by the committee, may meet and act without as well as within the State of California, and is authorized to leave the state in the performance of its duties.

(h) To expend such funds as may be made available to it to carry out the functions and activities related to the legislative affairs of the Senate and Assembly.

(i) To appoint a chief administrative officer of the committee, who shall have such duties relating to the administrative, fiscal, and business affairs of the committee as the committee shall prescribe. The committee may terminate the services of the chief administrative officer at any time.

(j) To employ such persons as may be necessary to assist all other joint committees, except the Joint Legislative Budget Committee and the Joint Legislative Audit Committee, in the exercise of their powers and performance of their duties. In accordance with Rule 36.8, the committee shall govern and administer the expenditure of funds by such other joint committees, requiring that the claims of such joint committees be approved by the Joint Rules Committee or its designee. All expenses of the committee as well as expenses of all other joint committees may be paid from the Operating Funds of the Assembly and Senate.

(k) To appoint the chairmen or chairwomen of joint committees, as authorized by Rule 36.7.

(l) To do any and all other things necessary or convenient to enable it fully and adequately to exercise its powers, perform its duties, and accomplish the objects and purposes of this rule.

The members of the Joint Rules Committee from the Senate may meet separately as a unit, and the members of the Joint Rules Committee from the Assembly may meet separately as a unit, and consider any action which is required to be taken by the Joint Rules Committee. If the majority of members of the Joint Rules Committee of each house at the separate meetings vote in favor of such action, the action shall be deemed to be action taken by the Joint Rules Committee.

The Joint Rules Committee shall meet not less than biweekly during a session of the Legislature, other than during a joint recess, at a regularly scheduled time and place. If the full committee fails to so meet, the members of the committee from the Senate shall meet

separately as a unit and the members of the committee from the Assembly shall meet separately as a unit within five days of the regularly scheduled meeting date.

The committee shall succeed to, and is vested with, all of the powers and duties of the Joint Committee on Legislative Organization, State Capitol Committee, the Joint Committee on Interhouse Cooperation, the Joint Legislative Committee for School Visitations, and the Joint Standing Committee on the Joint Rules of the Senate and the Assembly.

Review of Administrative Regulations

40.1. The Joint Rules Committee, with regard to joint committees, and the respective rules committee of each house, with regard to standing and select committees of the house, shall approve any request for a priority review made by a committee pursuant to Section 11349.7 of the Government Code and shall submit approved requests to the Office of Administrative Law. The Joint Rules Committee or the respective rules committee, and the committee initiating the request, shall each receive a copy of the priority review.

Subcommittee on Legislative Space and Facilities

40.3. (a) A subcommittee of the Joint Rules Committee is hereby created to be known as the Subcommittee on Legislative Space and Facilities. The subcommittee shall consist of three Members of the Senate and three Members of the Assembly, appointed by the Chairman or Chairwoman of the Joint Rules Committee, and the chairman or chairwoman of the fiscal committee of each house who shall have full voting rights on the subcommittee. The chairman or chairwoman of the subcommittee shall be appointed by the members thereof. For purposes of this subcommittee, the chairmen or chairwomen of the fiscal committees shall be ex officio members of the Joint Rules Committee, but shall not have voting rights on that committee, nor shall they be counted in determining a quorum. The subcommittee shall consider the housing of the Legislature and legislative facilities.

(b) The subcommittee and its members shall have and exercise all of the rights, duties, and powers conferred upon investigating committees and their members by the provisions of the Joint Rules of the Senate and Assembly as they are adopted and amended from time to time, which provisions are incorporated herein and made applicable to this subcommittee and its members.

(c) The subcommittee has the following additional powers and duties:

(1) To contract with such other agencies, public or private, as it deems necessary for the rendition and affording of such services, facilities, studies, and reports to the subcommittee as will best assist it to carry out the purposes for which it is created.

(2) To cooperate with and secure the cooperation of county, city, city and county, and other local law enforcement agencies in investigating any matter within the scope of this rule and to direct the sheriff of any county to serve subpoenas, orders, and other process issued by the subcommittee.

(3) To report its findings and recommendations to the Legislature and to the people from time to time and at any time.

(4) To do any and all other things necessary or convenient to enable it fully and adequately to exercise its powers, perform its duties, and accomplish the objects and purposes of this rule.

(d) The subcommittee is authorized to leave the State of California in the performance of its duties.

Claims for Workers' Compensation

41. The Chairman or Chairwoman of the Committee on Rules of each house, or a designated representative, shall sign any required worker's compensation report regarding injuries or death arising out of and within the course of employment suffered by any member, officer, or employee of the house, or any employee of a standing or investigating committee thereof. In the case of a joint committee, the Chairman or Chairwoman of the Committee on Rules of either house, or a designated representative, may sign any such report with respect to a member or employee of such joint committee.

Information Concerning Committees

42. The Committee on Rules of each house shall provide for a continuous cumulation of information concerning the membership, organization, meetings, and studies of legislative investigating committees. Each Committee on Rules shall be responsible for information concerning the investigating committees of its own house and concerning joint investigating committees under the chairmanship of a member of that house. To the extent possible, each Committee on Rules shall seek to insure that the investigating committees for which it has responsibility under this rule have organized, including the organization of any subcommittees, and have had all topics for study assigned to them within a reasonable period of time.

The information thus cumulated shall be made available to the public by the Committee on Rules of each house and shall be published periodically under their joint direction.

Joint Committees

43. Concurrent resolutions creating joint committees of the Legislature and concurrent resolutions allocating moneys from the Operating Funds of the Assembly and Senate to such committees shall be referred to the Committee on Rules of the respective houses.

Conflict of Interest

44. (a) No Member of the Legislature shall, while serving as such, have any interest, financial or otherwise, direct or indirect, or engage in any business or transaction or professional activity, or incur any obligation of any nature, which is in substantial conflict with the proper discharge of his or her duties in the public interest and of his or her responsibilities as prescribed by the laws of this state.

(b) No Member of the Legislature shall, during the term for which he or she was elected:

(1) Accept other employment which he or she has reason to believe will either impair his or her independence of judgment as to his or her official duties or require him or her, or induce him or her, to disclose confidential information acquired by him or her in the course of and by reason of his or her official duties.

(2) Willfully and knowingly disclose, for pecuniary gain, to any other person, confidential information acquired by him or her in the course of and by reason of his or her official duties or use any such information for the purpose of pecuniary gain.

(3) Accept or agree to accept, or be in partnership with any person who accepts or agrees to accept, any employment, fee, or other thing of value, or portion thereof, in consideration of his or her appearance, agreeing to appear, or taking any other action on behalf of another person regarding a licensing or regulatory matter, before any state board or agency which is established by law for the primary purpose of licensing or regulating the professional activity of persons licensed, pursuant to state law; provided, that this rule shall not be construed to prohibit a member who is an attorney at law from practicing in such capacity before the Workers' Compensation Appeals Board or the Commissioner of Corporations, and receiving compensation therefor, or from practicing for compensation before any state board or agency in connection with, or in any matter related to, any case, action, or proceeding filed and pending in any state or federal court; and provided that this rule shall not act to prohibit a member from making inquiry for information on behalf of a constituent before a state board or agency, if no fee or reward is given or promised in consequence thereof, and provided that the prohibition contained in this rule shall not apply to a partnership in which the Member of the Legislature is a member if the Member of the Legislature does not share directly or indirectly in the fee resulting from the transaction; and provided that the prohibition contained in this rule shall not apply in connection with any matter pending before any state board or agency on the operative date of this rule if the affected Member of the Legislature is attorney of record or representative in the matter prior to such operative date.

(4) Receive or agree to receive, directly or indirectly, any compensation, reward, or gift from any source except the State of California for any service, advice, assistance, or other matter related to the legislative process, except fees for speeches or published works on legislative subjects and except, in connection therewith, reimbursement of expenses for actual expenditures for travel and reasonable subsistence for which no payment or reimbursement is made by the State of California.

(5) Participate, by voting or any other action, on the floor of either house, or in committee or elsewhere, in the enactment or defeat of legislation in which he or she has a personal interest, except as follows:

(i) If, on the vote for final passage by the house of which he or she is a member, of the legislation in which he or she has a personal interest, he or she first files a statement (which shall be entered verbatim on the journal) stating in substance that he or she has a personal interest in the legislation to be voted on and notwithstanding such interest, he or she is able to cast a fair and objective vote on such legislation, he or she may cast his or her vote without violating any provision of this rule;

(ii) If the member believes that, because of his or her personal interest, he or she should abstain from participating in the vote on the legislation, he or she shall so advise the presiding officer prior to the commencement of the vote and shall be excused from voting on

the legislation without any entry on the journal of the fact of his or her personal interest. In the event a rule of the house, requiring that each member who is present vote aye or nay is invoked, the presiding officer shall order the member excused from compliance and shall order entered on the journal a simple statement that the member was excused from voting on the legislation pursuant to law.

(c) A person subject to this rule has an interest which is in substantial conflict with the proper discharge of his or her duties in the public interest and of his or her responsibilities as prescribed in the laws of this state or a personal interest, arising from any situation, within the scope of this rule, if he or she has reason to believe or expect that he or she will derive a direct monetary gain or suffer a direct monetary loss, as the case may be, by reason of his or her official activity. He or she does not have an interest which is in substantial conflict with the proper discharge of his or her duties in the public interest and of his or her responsibilities as prescribed by the laws of this state or a personal interest, arising from any situation, within the scope of this rule, if any benefit or detriment accrues to him or her as a member of a business, profession, occupation, or group to no greater extent than any other member of such business, profession, occupation, or group.

(d) A person subject to the provisions of this rule shall not be deemed to be engaged in any activity which is in substantial conflict with the proper discharge of his or her duties in the public interest and of his or her responsibilities as prescribed by the laws of this state, arising from any situation, or to have a personal interest, arising from any situation, within the scope of this rule, solely by reason of any of the following:

(1) His or her relationship to any potential beneficiary of any situation is one which is defined as a remote interest by Section 1091 of the Government Code or is otherwise not deemed to be a prohibited interest by Section 1091.1 or 1091.5 of the Government Code.

(2) Receipt of a campaign contribution regulated, received, reported, and accounted for pursuant to Chapter 4 (commencing with Section 84100) of Title 9 of the Government Code, so long as the contribution is not made on the understanding or agreement, in violation of law, that the person's vote, opinion, judgment, or action will be influenced thereby.

(e) The enumeration in this rule of specific situations or conditions which are deemed not to result in substantial conflicts with the proper discharge of the duties and responsibilities of a legislator or legislative employee or in a personal interest shall not be construed as exclusive.

The Legislature in adopting this rule recognizes that Members of the Legislature and legislative employees may need to engage in employment, professional, or business activities other than legislative activities, in order to maintain a continuity of professional or business activity, or may need to maintain investments, which activities or investments do not conflict with the specific provisions of this rule. However, in construing and administering the provisions of the rule, weight should be given to any coincidence of income, employment, investment, or other profit from sources which may be identified with the interests represented by those sources which are seeking

action of any character on matters then pending before the Legislature.

(f) No employee of either house of the Legislature shall, during the time he or she is so employed, commit any act or engage in any activity prohibited by any part of this rule.

(g) No person shall induce or seek to induce any Member of the Legislature to violate any part of this rule.

(h) Violations of any part of this rule are punishable as provided in Section 8926 of the Government Code.

Ethics Committees

45. The Senate Committee on Legislative Ethics and the Assembly Legislative Ethics Committee, respectively, shall receive complaints concerning members of their house and shall have the power to investigate and make findings and recommendations concerning violations by members of their house of the provisions of Article 2 (commencing with Section 8920) of Chapter 1 of Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 2 of the Government Code. Each house shall adopt rules governing the establishment and procedures of the committee in its house.

Designating Legislative Sessions

50. Regular sessions shall be identified with the odd-numbered year subsequent to each general election, followed by a hyphen, and then the last two digits of the following even-numbered year. For example: 1973–74 Regular Session.

Designating Extraordinary Sessions

50.3. All extraordinary sessions shall be designated in numerical order by the session in which convened.

Days and Dates

50.5. (a) As used in these rules, “day” means a calendar day, unless otherwise specified.

(b) When the date of a deadline, recess requirement, or circumstance falls on a Saturday, Sunday, or Monday that is a holiday, the date shall be deemed to refer to the preceding Friday. When the date falls on a holiday on a weekday other than a Monday, the date shall be deemed to refer to the preceding day.

Legislative Calendar

51. (a) The Legislature shall observe the following calendar during the first year of the regular session:

(1) **Organizational Recess**—The Legislature shall meet on the first Monday in December following the general election to organize. Thereafter, each house shall be in recess from such time as it determines until the first Monday in January, except when the first Monday is January 1 or January 1 is a Sunday, in which case, the following Wednesday.

(2) **Easter Recess**—The Legislature shall be in recess from the 10th day prior to Easter until the Monday after Easter.

(3) **Summer Recess**—The Legislature shall be in recess from July 14 until August 21. This recess shall not commence until the Budget Bill is enacted.

(4) **Interim Study Recess**—The Legislature shall be in recess from September 15 until the first Monday in January, except when the first

Monday is January 1 or January 1 is a Sunday, in which case, the following Wednesday.

(b) The Legislature shall observe the following calendar for the remainder of the legislative session:

(1) **Easter Recess**—The Legislature shall be in recess from the 10th day prior to Easter until the Monday after Easter.

(2) **Summer Recess**—The Legislature shall be in recess from July 5 until August 5. This recess shall not commence until the Budget Bill is enacted.

(3) **Final Recess**—The Legislature shall be in recess on September 1 until adjournment sine die on November 30.

(c) Recesses shall be from the hour of adjournment on the day specified to reconvene at the time designated by the respective houses.

(d) The recesses specified by this rule shall be designated as joint recesses.

Recall From Recess

52. Notwithstanding the power of the Governor to call a special session, the Legislature may be recalled from joint recess and reconvene in regular session by any of the following means:

(a) It may be recalled by joint proclamation, which shall be entered in the journal, of the Senate Committee on Rules and the Speaker of the Assembly or, in his or her absence from the state, the Assembly Committee on Rules.

(b) Ten or more Members of the Legislature may present a request for recall from joint recess to the Chief Clerk of the Assembly and the Secretary of the Senate. The request shall immediately be printed in the journal. Within 10 days thereafter, the Speaker of the Assembly, or if the Speaker is absent from the state, the Assembly Committee on Rules, and the Senate Committee on Rules shall act upon the request. If they concur in desiring to recall the Legislature from joint recess, they shall issue their joint proclamation entered in the journal no later than 20 days after publication of the request in the journal.

(c) If either or both of the parties specified in subdivision (b) does not concur, 10 or more Members of the Legislature may request the Chief Clerk of the Assembly or the Secretary of the Senate to petition the membership of the respective house. The petition shall be entered in the journal and shall contain a specified reconvening date commencing not later than 20 days after the date of the petition. If two-thirds of the members of the house or each of the two houses concur, the Legislature shall reconvene on the date specified. The necessary concurrences must be received at least 10 days prior to date specified for reconvening.

Procedure on Suspending Rules by Single House

53. Whenever these rules authorize suspension of the Joint Rules as to a particular bill by action of a single house after approval by the Committee on Rules of that house, the following procedure shall be followed:

(a) A written request to suspend the joint rule shall be filed with the Chief Clerk of the Assembly or the Secretary of the Senate, as the case may be, and shall be transmitted to the Committee on Rules of the appropriate house.

(b) The Assembly Committee on Rules or the Senate Committee on Rules, as the case may be, shall determine whether there exists an urgent need for the suspension of the joint rule with regard to the bill.

(c) If the appropriate rules committee recommends that the suspension be permitted, the member may offer a resolution, without further reference thereof to committee, granting permission to suspend the joint rule. The adoption of the resolution granting such permission shall require an affirmative recorded vote of the elected members of the house in which the request is made.

Introduction of Bills

54. (a) No bill may be introduced in the first year of the regular session after February 24 and no bill may be introduced in the second year of the regular session after February 23. These deadlines shall not apply to constitutional amendments, committee bills introduced pursuant to Assembly Rule 47 or Senate Rule 23, bills introduced in the Assembly with the permission of the Speaker of the Assembly, or bills introduced in the Senate with the permission of the Senate Committee on Rules. Subject to these deadlines, bills may be introduced at any time except when the houses are in joint summer, interim, or final recess. Each house may provide for introduction of bills during a recess other than a joint recess. Bills shall be numbered consecutively during the regular session.

(b) The Desks of the Senate and Assembly shall remain open, during a joint recess, other than a joint Easter, summer, interim, or final recess, for introduction of bills, during business hours on Monday through Friday, inclusive, except holidays. Bills received at the Senate Desk during such periods shall be numbered and printed. After printing, such bills shall be delivered to the Secretary of the Senate and shall be referred by the Senate Committee on Rules to a standing committee. Bills received at the Assembly Desk during such periods shall be numbered, printed, and referred to a committee by the Assembly Committee on Rules. After printing, such bills shall be delivered to the Chief Clerk of the Assembly. On the reconvening of each house, the bills shall be read the first time, and shall be delivered to the committee to which they were referred.

(c) A member may not author a bill during a session that would have substantially the same effect as a bill he or she had previously introduced during that session. This restriction shall not apply in cases where a previously introduced bill has been vetoed by the Governor or has had its provisions "chaptered out" by a later chaptered bill pursuant to Section 9605 of the Government Code. An objection may be raised only while the bill is being considered by the house in which it is introduced. In such case the objection shall be referred to the Committee on Rules of the house for a determination. The bill shall remain on file or with a committee, as the case may be, until such determination is made. If upon consideration of the objection the Committee on Rules determines that the bill objected to would have substantially the same effect as another bill previously introduced during the session by the author, the bill objected to shall be stricken from the file or returned to the desk by the committee, as the case may be, and shall not be acted upon during the remainder of the session. If the Committee on Rules determines that the bill

objected to would not have substantially the same effect as a bill previously introduced during the session by the author, the bill may thereafter be acted upon by the committee or the house, as the case may be. The Committee on Rules may obtain such assistance as it may desire from the Legislative Counsel as to the similarity of a bill or amendments to a prior bill.

This joint rule may be suspended by approval of the Committee on Rules and three-fourths vote of the membership of the house.

(d) During a joint recess, the Chief Clerk of the Assembly or Secretary of the Senate shall order the preparation of preprint bills when so ordered by any of the following:

- (1) The Speaker of the Assembly.
- (2) The Committee on Rules of the respective houses.
- (3) A committee with respect to bills within the subject matter jurisdiction of the committee.

Preprint bills shall be designated as such and shall be printed in the order received and numbered in the order printed. To facilitate subsequent amendment, preprint bills shall be so prepared that when introduced as a bill, the page and the line numbers will not change. The Chief Clerk of the Assembly and Secretary of the Senate shall publish a list periodically of such preprint bills showing the preprint bill number, the title, and the Legislative Counsel's Digest. The Speaker of the Assembly and Senate Committee on Rules may refer all preprint bills to committee for study.

30-Day Waiting Period

55. No bill other than the Budget Bill may be heard or acted upon by committee or either house until the bill has been in print for 30 days. The date a bill is returned from the printer shall be entered in the history. This rule may be suspended concurrently with the suspension of the requirement of Section 8 of Article IV of the Constitution or if such period has expired, this rule may be suspended by approval of the Committee on Rules and two-thirds vote of the house in which the bill is being considered.

Return of Bills

56. Bills introduced in the first year of the regular session and passed by the house of origin on or before the January 31st constitutional deadline are "carryover bills." Immediately after January 31, bills introduced in the first year of the regular session that do not become "carryover bills" shall be returned to the Chief Clerk of the Assembly or Secretary of the Senate, respectively. Notwithstanding Rule 4, as used in this rule, "bills" does not include constitutional amendments.

Appropriation Bills

57. Appropriation bills that may not be sent to the Governor shall be held, after enrollment, by the Chief Clerk of the Assembly or Secretary of the Senate, respectively. The bills shall be sent to the Governor immediately after the Budget Bill has been enacted.

Urgency Clauses

58. An amendment to add a section to a bill to provide that the act shall take effect immediately as an urgency statute shall not be adopted unless the author of the amendment has first secured the approval of the Committee on Rules of the house in which the amendments are offered.

Veto

58.5. The Legislature may consider a Governor's veto for only 60 days, not counting days when the Legislature is in joint recess.

Publications

59. During periods of joint recess, weekly, if necessary, the following documents shall be published: files, histories, and journals.

Committee Hearings

60. (a) No standing committee or subcommittee thereof may take action on a bill at any hearing held outside of Sacramento.

(b) A committee may hear the subject matter of a bill or convene for an informational hearing during a period of recess. Four days' notice in the daily file is required prior to the hearing.

(c) No bill may be acted upon by a committee during a joint recess.

*** Deadlines**

61. The following deadlines shall be observed by the Senate and Assembly. After each deadline, the Secretary of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of the Assembly shall not accept committee reports from their respective committees except as otherwise provided in this rule:

(a) Odd-numbered year:

- (1) Feb. 28—Last day for bills to be introduced.
- (2) April 25—Last day for policy committees to hear and report to fiscal committees fiscal bills introduced in their house.
- (3) May 16—Last day for policy committees to hear and report to the floor nonfiscal bills introduced in their house.
- (4) May 23—Last day for policy committees to meet prior to June 9.
- (5) May 30—Last day for fiscal committees to hear and report to the floor bills introduced in their house.
- (6) May 30—Last day for fiscal committees to meet prior to June 9.
- (7) June 6—Last day for each house to pass bills introduced in that house.
- (8) June 9—Committee meetings may resume.
- (9) July 18—Last day for policy committees to meet and report bills.
- (10) Aug. 29—Last day for fiscal committees to meet and report bills.
- (11) Sept. 1 through Sept. 12—Floor session only. No committee may meet for any purpose.
- (12) Sept. 12—Last day for each house to pass bills.

(b) Even-numbered year:

- (1) Jan. 16—Last day for policy committees to hear and report to fiscal committees fiscal bills introduced in their house in the odd-numbered year.
- (2) Jan. 23—Last day for any committee to hear and report to the floor bills introduced in that house in the odd-numbered year.
- (3) Jan. 31—Last day for each house to pass bills introduced in that house in the odd-numbered year.
- (4) Feb. 20—Last day for bills to be introduced.
- (5) April 24—Last day for policy committees to hear and report to fiscal committees fiscal bills introduced in their house.
- (6) May 8—Last day for policy committees to hear and report to the floor nonfiscal bills introduced in their house.
- (7) May 15—Last day for policy committees to meet prior to June 1.
- (8) May 22—Last day for fiscal committees to hear and report to the floor bills introduced in their house.
- (9) May 22—Last day for fiscal committees to meet prior to June 1.
- (10) May 29—Last day for each house to pass bills introduced in that house.
- (11) June 1—Committee meetings may resume.
- (12) July 3—Last day for policy committees to meet and report bills.
- (13) Aug. 14—Last day for fiscal committees to meet and report bills.
- (14) Aug. 17 through Aug. 31—Floor session only. No committee may meet for any purpose.
- (15) Aug. 31—Last day for each house to pass bills.

(* Note: Dates are based on 1997–98 Legislative calendar, usage and custom.)

(c) If a bill is acted upon in committee before the relevant deadline and the committee votes to report the bill out with amendments that have not at the time of the vote been prepared by the Legislative Counsel, the Secretary of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of the Assembly may subsequently receive a report recommending the bill for passage or for rereferral together with the amendments at any time within two legislative days after the deadline or, if the Legislature has recessed for the Summer Recess within seven calendar days after the deadline.

(d) Notwithstanding subdivisions (a) and (b), a policy committee may report a bill to a fiscal committee on or before the relevant deadline for reporting nonfiscal bills to the floor, if, after the policy committee deadline for reporting the bill to fiscal committee, the Legislative Counsel's Digest is changed to indicate reference to fiscal committee.

(e) Bills in the house of origin not acted upon during the odd-numbered year as a result of the deadlines imposed in subdivision (a) may be acted upon when the Legislature reconvenes after the interim study joint recess, or at any time the Legislature is recalled from the interim study joint recess.

(f) The deadlines imposed by this rule shall not apply to the rules committees of the respective houses.

(g) The deadlines imposed by this rule shall not apply in instances where a bill is referred to committee under Rule 26.5.

(h) The deadlines imposed by this rule shall not apply in instances where a bill is referred to a committee under Assembly Rule 77.2

(i) (1) Notwithstanding subdivisions (a) and (b), a policy committee or fiscal committee may meet for the purpose of hearing and reporting a constitutional amendment, or a bill that would go into immediate effect pursuant to subdivision (c) of Section 8 of Article IV of the Constitution of California, at any time other than those periods when no committee may meet for any purpose.

(2) Notwithstanding subdivisions (a) and (b) either house may meet for the purpose of considering and passing a constitutional amendment, or a bill that would go into immediate effect pursuant to subdivision (c) of Section 8 of Article IV of the Constitution of California, at any time during the session.

(j) This rule may be suspended as to any particular bill by approval of the Committee on Rules and two-thirds vote of the membership of the house.

Committee Procedure

62. (a) Notice of a hearing on a bill by the committee of first reference in each house or notice of an informational hearing shall be published in the file at least four days prior to the hearing. Otherwise, notice shall be published in the file two days prior to the hearing. Such notice may be waived by a majority vote of the house in which the bill is being considered. A bill may be set for hearing in a committee only three times. A bill is "set" for purposes of this subdivision whenever notice of the hearing has been published in the file for one or more days. If a bill is set for hearing, and the committee, on its own initiation and not the author's, postpones the hearing on the bill or adjourns the hearing while testimony is being taken, such hearing shall not be counted as one of the three times a bill may be set. After hearing the bill, the committee may vote on the bill. If the hearing notice in the file specifically indicates that "testimony only" will be taken, such hearing shall not be counted as one of the three times a bill may be set. A committee may not vote on a bill so noticed until it has been heard in accordance with this rule. After a committee has voted on a bill, reconsideration may be granted only one time. Reconsideration may be granted within 15 legislative days or prior to the interim study joint recess, whichever first occurs. A vote on reconsideration cannot be taken without the same notice required to set a bill unless such vote is taken at the same meeting at which the vote to be reconsidered was taken and the author is present. When a bill fails to get the necessary votes to pass it out of committee or upon failure to receive reconsideration, it shall be returned to the Chief Clerk of the Assembly or Secretary of the Senate of the house of the committee and may not be considered further during the session.

This subdivision may be suspended with respect to a particular bill by approval of the Committee on Rules and two-thirds vote of the members of the house.

(b) If the committee adopts amendments other than those offered by the author and orders the bill reprinted prior to its further consideration, the hearing shall not be the final time a bill may be set under subdivision (a) of this rule.

(c) When a standing committee takes action on a bill, the vote shall be by roll call vote only. All roll call votes taken by a standing committee shall be recorded by the committee secretary on forms provided by the Chief Clerk of the Assembly and the Secretary of the Senate. The chairman or chairwoman of each standing committee shall promptly transmit a copy of the record of the roll call votes to the Chief Clerk of the Assembly or the Secretary of the Senate, respectively, who shall cause the votes to be published as prescribed by each house.

The provisions of this subdivision shall also apply to action of a committee on a subcommittee report. The rules of each house shall prescribe the procedure as to roll call votes on amendments.

Any committee may, with the unanimous consent of the members present, substitute a roll call from a prior bill, provided that the members whose votes are substituted are present at the time of the substitution.

At no time shall a bill be passed out by a committee without a quorum being present.

The provisions of this subdivision shall not apply to:

(1) Procedural motions which do not have the effect of disposing of a bill.

(2) Withdrawal of a bill from a committee calendar at the request of an author.

(3) Return of bills to the house where the bills have not been voted on by the committee.

(4) The assignment of bills to committee.

(d) The chairman or chairwoman of the committee hearing a bill, may, at any time, order a call of the committee. Upon a request by any member of a committee or the author in person, the chairman or chairwoman shall order the call.

In the absence of a quorum, a majority of the members present may order a quorum call of the committee and compel the attendance of absentees. The chairman or chairwoman shall send the Sergeant at Arms for those members who are absent and not excused by their respective house.

When a call of a committee is ordered by the chairman or chairwoman with respect to a particular bill, he or she shall send the Sergeant at Arms or any other person to be appointed for that purpose for those members who have not voted on that particular bill and are not excused.

A quorum call or a call of the committee with respect to a particular bill may be dispensed with by the chairman or chairwoman without objection by any member of the committee or by a majority of the members present.

If a motion is adopted to adjourn the committee while the committee is operating under a call, the call shall be dispensed with and any pending vote announced.

The committee secretary shall record the votes of members answering a call. The rules of each house may prescribe additional procedures for a call of a committee.

Redistricting Bills

62.5. This rule applies only to bills affecting the boundaries of legislative, congressional, or State Board of Equalization districts.

(a) Except as specifically provided in this rule, Rules 28, 28.1, 29, 29.5, 30, 30.5, 30.7, 61 (except for paragraph (12) of subdivision (a) and paragraph (15) of subdivision (b) of Rule 61), and 62 shall not apply to bills affecting the boundaries of legislative, congressional, or State Board of Equalization districts.

(b) If the Senate (in the case of a Senate bill) or the Assembly (in the case of an Assembly bill) refuses to concur in amendments to a bill made by the other house, a committee on conference shall be appointed. The Speaker of the Assembly and the Senate Committee on Rules shall each appoint a committee on conference of three members, consisting of two members of the majority party and one member not of the majority party. The Secretary of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of the Assembly shall immediately notify the other house of the action taken.

(c) When a bill affecting the boundaries of legislative, congressional, or State Board of Equalization districts has been referred to a committee on conference, the chair of the committee on conference shall immediately request the Senate Committee on Elections and Reapportionment and the Assembly Committee on Elections, Reapportionment, and Constitutional Amendments to hold a public hearing on the bill. The committee on conference shall also hold a public hearing on the bill. The hearings of the policy committees and the committee on conference may be noticed and held concurrently.

(d) If either or both of the policy committees hold a public hearing on a bill pursuant to the request of the chair of the committee on conference, the policy committees may consider amendments to the bill, and may make recommendations on amendments to the committee on conference. A policy committee recommendation for an amendment may only be adopted by a roll call vote of the members of the policy committee.

(e) All proposed reports of a committee on conference, all proposed amendments to a proposed report of a committee on conference, and all proposed amendments presented to a policy committee shall be accompanied by appropriate maps, and no committee vote shall be taken on any proposed report of a committee on conference, any proposed amendment to a proposed report of a committee on conference, or any proposed amendment presented to a policy committee unless the proposed report or proposed amendment, with accompanying maps, has been available to the public for at least 24 hours. District boundaries contained in any proposed report or any proposed amendment shall not be required to be prepared or approved as to form by Legislative Counsel if the accompanying maps adequately reflect the district boundaries.

(f) All hearings of the policy committees and the committee on conference shall be open and readily accessible to the public, and shall be noticed in the Daily File for not less than two calendar days.

(g) The provisions of subdivision (e) prohibiting a committee vote on any proposed report of a committee on conference, any proposed amendment to a proposed report of a committee on

conference, or any proposed amendment presented to a policy committee unless the amendment, accompanied by appropriate maps, has been available to the public for at least 24 hours shall not apply in any of the following situations:

(1) The amendment proposed to a policy committee or the committee on conference does not change any district boundaries.

(2) The amendment proposed to a policy committee or the committee on conference is required to correct a technical error in the bill, and the proposed amendment would shift no more than 1 percent of the population of any district to any other district or districts.

(3) The amendment is a policy committee or committee on conference amendment that is proposed in response to amendments that have been proposed to the committee.

(h) Except as provided in subdivision (i), no vote may be taken in either house on any bill or any report of the committee on conference on that bill unless the bill or the report has been in print in Legislative Counsel form and available to the public, accompanied by appropriate maps, for at least 24 hours.

(i) If either house refuses to adopt the report of the committee on conference, the bill may be returned to the committee on conference for further consideration. If the bill is returned to the committee on conference for an amendment described in paragraph (1) or (2) of subdivision (g), the notice requirements of subdivisions (e) and (h) shall not apply.

(j) Notwithstanding any other rule to the contrary, this rule may be suspended upon a majority vote of the membership of each house.

Uniform Rules

63. No standing committee of either house shall adopt or apply any rule or procedure governing the voting upon bills which is not equally applicable to the bills of both houses.

Votes on Bills

64. Every meeting of each house and standing committee or subcommittee thereof where a vote is to be taken on a bill, or amendments to a bill, shall be public.

Conflicting Rules

65. The provisions of Rule 50 and following of these rules prevail over any conflicting joint rule with a lesser number.

PROCLAMATION OF THE GOVERNOR

To consider and act upon legislation relative to providing assistance to those persons and public entities that suffered losses as a result of the heavy rains and flooding in the counties for which I have proclaimed a State of Emergency.

I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will support and defend the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of the State of California against all enemies, foreign and domestic; that I will bear true faith and allegiance to the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of California; that I take this obligation freely, without any mental reservation or purpose of evasion; and that I will well and faithfully discharge the duties upon which I am about to enter.

ADOPTION OF STANDING RULES

Pursuant to unanimous consent granted earlier this day, Standing Rules of the Assembly were adopted in the 1997-98 First Extraordinary Session pursuant to the adoption of House Resolution No. 1 in the Regular Session (December 2, 1996, Assembly Journal, page 53):

STANDING RULES OF THE ASSEMBLY**1997-98 REGULAR SESSION****I. LEGISLATIVE ORGANIZATION****Assembly General Officers**

1. (a) The general officers of the Assembly are the following:

- (1) Speaker
- (2) Speaker pro Tempore
- Assistant Speaker pro Tempore
- Majority Floor Leader
- Minority Floor Leader
- (3) Chief Clerk
- Sergeant at Arms
- Chaplain

(b) Except for the officers listed in paragraph (2) of subdivision (a), each officer listed in subdivision (a) shall be elected by a majority vote of the duly elected and qualified Members.

(c) The Chief Clerk, subject to the approval of the Committee on Rules, shall determine the names and titles that shall appear on the frontispiece of all publications.

Hours of Meeting

2. The Speaker, or, in his or her absence, the Speaker pro Tempore, shall determine the time for convening the session, unless otherwise ordered by a majority vote of the Members present and voting.

Speaker to Call Assembly to Order

3. The Speaker, or, in his or her absence, the Speaker pro Tempore, shall, at the hour appointed for meeting, call the Assembly to order.

Roll Call and Quorum

4. Before proceeding with the business of the Assembly, both of the following shall be completed:

(1) The roll of the Members shall be called, and the names of those present shall be entered in the Journal. Forty-one Members constitute a quorum.

(2) The presiding officer shall announce the names of all Members who will be absent from that day's session and the reason for their absence.

Assignment of Desks to Members

5. Members shall be assigned to desks by the Committee on Rules.

Organization of Assembly

5.5. For the purposes of the organization of any regular session of the Assembly pursuant to Section 9023 of the Government Code, the person who was the Speaker when the previous regular session adjourned sine die, if he or she is reelected to the Assembly, shall be deemed to be the senior member elect.

II. RULES**Adoption of Standing Rules**

6. The adoption of the Standing Rules shall require an affirmative recorded vote of a majority of the duly elected and qualified Members. When once adopted, the Standing Rules shall remain in effect unless suspended or amended as provided in these rules.

Suspension of Rules

7. Any standing rule of the Assembly, except Rule 8, may be suspended temporarily by a vote of two-thirds of the Members present and voting, provided that the temporary suspension shall apply only to the matter under immediate consideration, and in no case may it extend beyond an adjournment.

Amending Standing Rules

8. No standing rule of the Assembly may be amended except by a resolution adopted by an affirmative recorded vote of a majority of the duly elected and qualified Members.

Mason's Manual

10. In all cases not provided for by the California Constitution, by the Assembly Rules, by the Joint Rules of the Senate and Assembly, or by statute, the authority shall be the latest edition of Mason's Manual.

III. ORGANIZATION OF COMMITTEES

Standing Committees

11. Twenty-seven standing committees of the Assembly are hereby created, upon the several subjects, and titled respectively, as follows:

- Insurance
- International Trade and Development
- Judiciary
- Labor and Employment
- Local Government
- Natural Resources
- Public Employees, Retirement and Social Security
- Public Safety
- Revenue and Taxation
- Rules
- Televising the Assembly and Information Technology
- Transportation
- Utilities and Commerce
- Water, Parks and Wildlife

Open Meetings

11.3. (a) Except as otherwise provided in this rule, all meetings of the Assembly or a committee thereof shall be open and public, and all persons shall be permitted to attend the meetings. As used in this rule, "meeting" means a gathering of a quorum of the Members of the Assembly or a committee in one place for the purpose of discussing legislative or other official matters within the jurisdiction of the Assembly or committee. As used in this rule, "committee" includes a standing committee, joint committee, conference committee, subcommittee, select committee, special committee, research committee, or any similar body.

(b) Any meeting that is required to be open and public pursuant to this rule, including any closed session held pursuant to subdivision (c), shall be held only after full and timely notice to the public as provided by the Joint Rules of the Assembly and Senate.

(c) The Assembly or a committee thereof may hold a closed session solely for any of the following purposes:

(1) To consider the appointment, employment, evaluation of performance, or dismissal of a public officer or employee, to consider or hear complaints or charges brought against a Member of the

Legislature or other public officer or employee, or to establish the classification or compensation of an employee of the Assembly.

(2) To consider matters affecting the safety and security of Members of the Legislature or its employees, or the safety and security of any buildings and grounds used by the Legislature.

(3) To confer with, or receive advice from, its legal counsel regarding pending or reasonably anticipated litigation, or whether to initiate litigation, when discussion in open session would not protect the interests of the Assembly or committee regarding the litigation.

(d) A caucus of the Members of the Assembly that is composed of members of the same political party may meet in closed session.

(e) A closed session may be held pursuant to paragraph (3) of subdivision (c) under any of the following circumstances:

(1) An adjudicatory proceeding before a court, administrative body exercising its adjudicatory authority, hearing officer, or arbitrator, to which the Assembly or a committee, Member, or employee thereof is a party, has been initiated formally.

(2) Based on existing facts and circumstances, a point has been reached where, in the opinion of the Assembly or a committee thereof, on the advice of its legal counsel, litigation against the Assembly or a committee, Member, or employee thereof is reasonably anticipated.

(3) Based on existing facts and circumstances, the Assembly or a committee thereof has decided to initiate, or is deciding whether to initiate, litigation.

(4) To confer with, or receive advice from, its legal counsel and negotiator prior to the purchase, sale, exchange, or lease of real property by or for the Assembly or a committee thereof regarding the price and terms of payment for the purchase, sale, exchange, or lease.

(f) Prior to holding a closed session pursuant to paragraph (3) of subdivision (c), the presiding officer of the Assembly or the chair of the committee, as appropriate, shall state publicly which paragraph of subdivision (c) is applicable. If the closed session is held pursuant to paragraph (1) of subdivision (e), the presiding officer or chair shall state the title of or otherwise specifically identify the litigation to be discussed, unless the presiding officer or chair states that to do so would jeopardize the ability to effectuate service of process upon one or more unserved parties, or that to do so would jeopardize the ability of the Assembly or the committee to conclude existing settlement negotiations to its advantage. If the closed session is held pursuant to paragraph (4) of subdivision (e), the notice of the closed session shall identify the real property that the negotiations may concern and the person with whom the negotiations may take place.

(g) The legal counsel for the Assembly or the committee shall prepare and submit to the Assembly or the committee a memorandum stating the specific reasons and legal authority for the closed session. If the closed session is held pursuant to paragraph (1) of subdivision (e), the memorandum shall include the title of or other identification of the litigation. If the closed session is held pursuant to paragraph (2), (3), or (4) of subdivision (e), the memorandum shall set forth the existing facts and circumstances on which the closed session is based. The legal counsel shall submit the memorandum to the Assembly or the committee prior to the closed

session, if feasible, or, in any case, not later than one week after the closed session. The memorandum shall be exempt from disclosure under the Legislative Open Records Act contained in Article 3.5 (commencing with Section 9070) of Chapter 1.5 of Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 2 of the Government Code.

(h) For purposes of paragraph (3) of subdivision (c), "litigation" includes any adjudicatory proceeding, including eminent domain, before a court, administrative body exercising its adjudicatory authority, hearing officer, or arbitrator.

(i) For purposes of this rule, all expressions of the lawyer-client privilege other than those provided in this rule are hereby abrogated. This rule is the exclusive expression of the lawyer-client privilege for the purposes of conducting closed-session meetings pursuant to this rule.

(j) Disclosure of a memorandum required under this rule shall not be deemed a waiver of the lawyer-client privilege provided for under Article 3 (commencing with Section 950) of Chapter 4 of Division 8 of the Evidence Code.

Conference Committee Meetings

11.4. No Member may participate in a meeting of a conference committee considering any bill that is not open to the public.

Assembly Investigating Committees

11.5. (a) The standing committees of the Assembly created pursuant to Rule 11, with the exception of the Committee on Rules, are hereby constituted Assembly investigating committees and are authorized and directed to ascertain, study, and analyze all facts relating to any subjects or matters which the Committee on Rules shall assign to them upon request of the Assembly or upon its own initiative.

(b) Each of the Assembly investigating committees shall consist of the members of the standing committee on the same subject as most recently constituted. The chairperson and vice chairperson shall be the chairperson and vice chairperson of the standing committee. Vacancies occurring in the membership of the committee shall be filled by the appointing authority.

(c) Each committee and any subcommittee, and its members, shall have and exercise all the rights, duties, and powers conferred upon investigating committees and their members by law and by the Joint Rules of the Senate and Assembly and the Standing Rules of the Assembly as they are adopted and amended from time to time, which provisions are incorporated herein and made applicable to the committee or subcommittee and their members.

(d) In order to prevent duplication and overlapping of studies between the various investigating committees herein created, no committee may commence the study of any subject or matter not specifically authorized herein or assigned to it unless and until prior written approval thereof has been obtained from the Committee on Rules.

(e) The Committee on Rules shall provide for the expenses of the above committees and their members and for any charges, expenses, or claims they may incur under this rule, to be paid from the Assembly Operating Fund and disbursed, after certification by the

Chairperson of the Committee on Rules or his or her authorized representative, upon warrants drawn by the Controller upon the State Treasury.

Membership of Standing Committees

12. The Speaker shall determine the size, and appoint the membership and the chairperson and vice chairperson, of all standing committees and subcommittees. In appointing Members to serve on committees, the Speaker shall consider the preferences of the Members.

Committee on Rules

13. There is a Committee on Rules, which shall act as the executive committee of the Assembly. The committee shall consist of the Speaker, the chairperson, who shall be a Member selected by the Speaker, and eight other members, four to be selected by the Speaker and four, including the vice chairperson of the committee, to be selected by the Minority Leader. One alternate member of the Committee on Rules shall be selected by each party leader. Members and alternates so selected shall remain in office until their successors are selected as provided for in these rules. The Speaker or the Minority Leader may designate any member of their respective parties in lieu of or in addition to the alternate member to fill a temporary vacancy.

An alternate member may serve when a committee member of the same political party is absent. The Speaker shall preside or may designate the chairperson to preside.

No regular member of the Committee on Rules may simultaneously serve as a chairperson of any standing committee.

All meetings of the Committee on Rules that are required to be open and public shall be held in a room of appropriate size, and audio or video transmission of those meetings shall be provided.

Organization of Party Caucuses

13.1. Within two days after the general election held in November of each even-numbered year, the caucus of the political party having the greatest number of Members in the Assembly, and the caucus of the political party having the second greatest number of Members, each shall meet for the purpose of selecting their officers for the next regular session. The rules and procedures of each caucus shall be determined by that caucus, but may not be inconsistent with these rules.

Powers of the Committee on Rules

14. (a) The Committee on Rules shall have the following powers:

(1) To refer each bill and house resolution to a committee, as provided by these rules.

(2) To appoint all employees of the Assembly not otherwise provided for by statute. It shall have authority to terminate, to discipline, to establish, and to modify the terms and conditions of employment of, or to suspend, with or without pay, any employee of the Assembly.

(3) To make studies and recommendations designed to promote, improve, and expedite the business and procedure of the Assembly and of the committees thereof, and to propose any amendments to

the Rules deemed necessary to accomplish these purposes.

(4) To adopt additional policies or requirements regarding the use of cameras and other recording equipment at committee hearings or Assembly floor sessions.

(b) Both during sessions, and after final adjournment and until the convening of the next regular session, the Committee on Rules has the following additional powers and duties:

(1) To contract with other agencies, public or private, as it deems necessary for the rendition and affording of those services, facilities, studies, and reports to the committee that will best assist it to carry out the purposes for which it is created.

(2) To cooperate with and secure the cooperation of county, city, city and county, and other local law enforcement agencies in investigating any matter within the scope of these rules and to direct the sheriff of any county to serve subpoenas, orders, and other process issued by the committee.

(3) To report its findings and recommendations to the Legislature and to the people from time to time and at any time.

(4) To do any and all other things necessary or convenient to enable it fully and adequately to exercise its powers, perform its duties, and accomplish the objects and purposes of these rules.

(5) To make available to the Assembly, or to any Assembly or joint committee, or to any Member of the Assembly assistance in connection with the duties of the committee or other legislative matters as the personnel under direction of the committee or its other facilities permit.

(6) To make available to and furnish to the Assembly, and to Assembly investigating committees created at this session and to each of the members thereof, clerical, secretarial, and stenographic help as may be reasonably necessary for the Assembly to carry out its work, and for the committees and each of the members thereof, to make and carry on the studies and investigations required by or of them by the resolutions creating the committees, and for these purposes to employ additional stenographic and secretarial assistants as may be necessary, assign, reassign, and discharge these assistants and prescribe amounts, times, and methods of payment of their compensation. The committee shall allocate annually an amount for the operation of each investigating committee, which shall constitute the annual budget of the committee.

(c) During the times as the Assembly is not in session, the committee is authorized and directed to incur and pay expenses of the Assembly not otherwise provided for that the committee determines are reasonably necessary, including the repair, alteration, improvement, and equipping of the Assembly Chamber and the offices provided for the Assembly in the State Capitol and the Capitol Annex.

(d) The committee shall allocate sufficient moneys from the Assembly Operating Fund to support the Assembly's share of joint operations.

(e) The chairperson of the Committee on Rules shall appoint a Chief Administrative Officer of the Assembly, subject to the ratification of the Committee on Rules, who shall have duties relating to the administrative, fiscal, and business affairs of the Assembly that the committee shall prescribe. The Chairperson of the Committee

on Rules or a majority of the membership of the Committee on Rules may terminate the services of the Chief Administrative Officer at any time. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the Speaker may appoint a temporary chief administrative officer for up to 90 days following the beginning of the session.

(f) The committee on Rules shall provide for the publication of a compilation of the photographs of accredited press representatives.

(g) The Committee on Rules may delegate powers to the Speaker by a majority vote of the membership of the committee.

Subcommittee on Sexual Harassment Prevention and Response

14.5. (a) The Subcommittee on Sexual Harassment Prevention and Response is hereby created as a subcommittee of the Committee on Rules. The subcommittee shall be composed of a total of six members, with the following four members appointed by the Chairperson of the Committee on Rules: two members of the Committee on Rules from the political party having the greatest number of Members in the Assembly and two members of the Committee on Rules from the political party having the second greatest number of Members. The two members from the political party having the second greatest number of Members shall be appointed from a list of nominees that the vice chairperson of the committee provides to the chairperson. The co-chairs of the Assembly Legislative Ethics Committee also shall be members of the subcommittee. The Chairperson of the Committee on Rules shall designate one of the members of the subcommittee to serve as chair of the subcommittee.

(b) The subcommittee shall formulate and recommend to the Committee on Rules procedures for the handling of any complaint of sexual harassment lodged against a Member of the Assembly or an Assembly employee. Those recommendations shall be submitted to the Committee on Rules no later than 30 days following the adoption of this rule.

(c) Following the submission of the recommendations pursuant to subdivision (b), the chair of the subcommittee may cause the subcommittee to convene to review and recommend further changes in procedures as subsequent events may require.

Committee on Rules

15. The Committee on Rules shall continue in existence during any recess of the Legislature and after final adjournment and until the convening of the next regular session, and shall have the same powers and duties as while the Assembly is in session. In dealing with any matter within its jurisdiction, the committee and its members shall have and exercise all of the rights, duties, and powers conferred upon investigating committees and their members by the Joint Rules of the Senate and Assembly as they are adopted and amended from time to time, which provisions are incorporated herein and made applicable to the Committee on Rules and its members.

Operating Fund Report

15.5. The Committee on Rules shall annually prepare a report to the public of expenditures as required by Section 9131 of the Government Code.

Independent Audit of Operating Funds

15.6. The Committee on Rules shall annually contract for an independent audit of the revenues and expenditures, for each fiscal year, from the Assembly Operating Fund. The organization performing the audit shall be selected by a majority of the membership of the Committee on Rules. The contract for the audit shall be awarded through a competitive bidding procedure. The audit shall be prepared in a manner and form to be determined by the organization performing the audit, and shall be consistent with generally accepted accounting principles.

The audit shall be completed and made available to the public within 180 calendar days following the completion of the fiscal year for which the audit is performed.

Performance Audit

15.7 The Committee on Rules shall annually contract for a comprehensive performance audit of all Assembly finances and operations. The organization performing the audit shall be selected by a majority of the membership of the Committee on Rules. The contract for the audit shall be awarded through a competitive bidding procedure. The audit shall be prepared in a manner and form to be determined by the organization performing the audit, and shall be consistent with generally accepted accounting principles.

All findings and recommendations reported by the auditing firm shall be made available to Members and to the public.

Rules Committee Resolutions

16. The Committee on Rules, acting unanimously by appropriate resolution, on behalf of and in the name of the Assembly, may extend congratulations, commendations, sympathy, or regret to any person, group, or organization, and may authorize the presentation of suitably prepared copies of these resolutions to the persons concerned and to their relatives.

Assembly Operating Fund

17. The Committee on Rules is the committee identified in Section 9127 of the Government Code. The balance of all money in the Assembly Operating Fund, including money now or hereafter appropriated, except the sums that are made available specifically for the expense of designated committees or for other purposes, is hereby made available to the Committee on Rules for any charges or claims it may incur in carrying out the duties imposed upon it by these rules or by Assembly or concurrent resolution. The money made available by this rule includes the unencumbered balances of all sums heretofore made available to any Assembly or joint committee by the Assembly, upon the expiration of that committee, and shall be expended as provided in these rules.

Expenditures

18. No Member or committee may incur any expense except as authorized pursuant to these rules or the Joint Rules of the Senate and Assembly, or as authorized by the Assembly or the Committee on Rules.

The Committee on Rules shall provide, by rules and regulations, for the manner of authorizing expenditures by Members,

committees, officers, and employees of the Assembly that are not otherwise authorized by law, these rules, or the Joint Rules of the Senate and Assembly. These rules and regulations shall incorporate a provision whereby construction, alteration, improvement, repair, or maintenance of real or personal property, and the purchase of supplies and equipment, shall be governed by competitive bidding. Further, the rules and regulations shall provide for the payment of expenditures, as authorized by these rules and regulations, from the Assembly Operating Fund upon certification of claims therefor to the Controller by the Committee on Rules or its authorized representative.

No Member may be reimbursed for travel outside the State of California without prior approval of the Speaker or the Committee on Rules.

Rules and Regulations Governing Committees

20. All claims for expenses incurred by investigating committees of the Assembly shall be approved by the Committee on Rules, or its authorized representative, before the claims are presented to the Controller.

All proposed expenditures, other than expenditures of the funds of an investigating committee, shall be approved by the Committee on Rules or its authorized representative before the expenses are incurred, unless the expenditure is specifically exempted from this requirement by the resolution authorizing it.

No warrant may be drawn in payment of any claim for expenses until the approval of the Committee on Rules, or its authorized representative, has been obtained in accordance with this rule.

The Committee on Rules shall adopt rules and regulations governing the awarding of any contract by an investigating committee, and rules and regulations limiting the amount, time, and place of expenses and allowances to be paid to employees of Assembly investigating committees or other Assembly committees.

These rules may provide for allowances to committee employees in lieu of actual expenses.

Mileage is an allowance to a committee employee in lieu of actual expenses of travel. When travel is by private conveyance, mileage shall be allowed only to the operator of, and not to passengers in, a private vehicle. Claims for mileage by private conveyance must be accompanied by the license number of the vehicle and the names of state officers and employees riding as passengers.

Copies of all rules and regulations adopted pursuant to this rule shall be distributed to the chairperson of every investigating committee and of any other Assembly committee that has employees.

Fees for Witnesses

21. Each witness summoned to appear before the Assembly or any of its committees shall be reimbursed at a rate set by the Committee on Rules.

Assembly General Research Committee

22. (a) The Assembly General Research Committee is hereby continued as a permanent factfinding committee pursuant to Section 11 of Article IV of the California Constitution. The

committee is allocated all subjects within the scope of legislative regulation and control, but may not undertake any investigation that another committee has been specifically requested or directed to undertake. The Assembly General Research Committee may act through subcommittees appointed by the Speaker in consultation with the Committee on Rules, and each of these subcommittees may act only on the particular study or investigation assigned by the Speaker in consultation with the Committee on Rules to that subcommittee. Each subcommittee shall be known and designated as a select committee. The Speaker is the Chairperson of the Assembly General Research Committee and may be a voting member of any subcommittee. Each member of the Assembly General Research Committee is authorized and directed to receive and investigate requests for legislative action made by individuals or groups, and to report thereon to the full committee. The Committee on Rules is authorized to allocate to any subcommittee from the Assembly Operating Fund those sums that the Committee on Rules deems necessary to complete the investigation or study conferred upon that subcommittee. The Committee on Rules shall further allocate, from time to time, to the Assembly General Research Committee from the Assembly Operating Fund those sums that are necessary to permit the Assembly General Research Committee and the members thereof to carry out the duties imposed on them. The committee has continuous existence until the time that its existence is terminated by a resolution adopted by the Assembly, and the committee is authorized to act both during and between sessions of the Legislature, including any recess.

(b) The committee and its members shall have and exercise all the rights, duties, and powers conferred upon investigating committees and their members by the Joint Rules of the Senate and Assembly and the Standing Rules of the Assembly as they are adopted and amended from time to time at this session, which provisions are incorporated herein and made applicable to the committee and its members.

(c) The committee has the following additional powers and duties:

(1) To contract with other agencies, public or private, for the rendition and affording of services, facilities, studies, and reports to the committee as the committee deems necessary to assist it to carry out the purposes for which it is created.

(2) To cooperate with and secure the cooperation of county, city, city and county, and other local law enforcement agencies in investigating any matter within the scope of this rule and to direct the sheriff of any county to serve subpoenas, orders, and other process issued by the committee.

(3) To report its findings and recommendations to the Legislature and the people from time to time.

(4) To do any and all other things necessary or convenient to enable it fully and adequately to exercise its powers, perform its duties, and accomplish the objects and purposes of this rule.

Assembly Legislative Ethics Committee

22.5. (a) The Assembly Legislative Ethics Committee is hereby created. The committee shall consist of six Members of the Assembly,

appointed by the Speaker. Notwithstanding any other rule of the Assembly, three members of the committee shall be from the political party having the greatest number of Members in the Assembly and three members shall be from the political party having the second greatest number of Members. Any temporary or permanent vacancy on the committee shall be filled within 10 days by a member from the same political party. All appointments, including appointments to fill permanent or temporary vacancies, of members from the political party having the second greatest number of Members in the Assembly shall be made from a list of nominees that the Minority Floor Leader provides to the Speaker. The Speaker shall designate one member of the committee from the political party having the greatest number of Members in the Assembly and one member of the committee from the political party having the second greatest number of Members to serve as co-chairs of the committee. The Speaker shall designate one of the co-chairs to serve as the presiding officer at any meeting or hearing conducted by the committee.

If a verified complaint is filed against a member of the committee, the Speaker shall temporarily replace the member with a Member from the same political party, who shall serve until the complaint is dismissed or the Assembly takes final action on the complaint, whichever occurs first.

(b) The provisions of this rule, and of Rule 11.5 related to investigating committees, shall apply to the committee and shall govern its proceedings.

Prior to the issuance of any subpoena by the committee with respect to any matter before the committee, it shall, by a resolution adopted by the committee pursuant to a vote in accordance with subdivision (n), define the nature and scope of its investigation in the matter before it.

(c) Funds for the support of the committee shall be provided from the Assembly Operating Fund in the same manner that those funds are made available to other committees of the Assembly.

(d) (1) The committee shall have the power, pursuant to this rule and Article 3 (commencing with Section 8940) of Chapter 1 of Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 2 of the Government Code, to investigate and make findings and recommendations concerning violations by Members of the Assembly of any provision of Article 2 (commencing with Section 8920) of Chapter 1 of Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 2 of the Government Code or of any other provision of law or legislative rule that governs the conduct of Members of the Assembly, hereafter collectively referred to as "standards of conduct."

(2) The committee may, on its own action pursuant to a vote in accordance with subdivision (n), initiate an investigation of a Member of the Assembly.

(e) Any person may file with the committee a verified complaint in writing, which shall state the name of the Member of the Assembly alleged to have violated any standard of conduct, and which shall set forth the particulars thereof with sufficient clarity and detail to enable the committee to make a determination. The person filing the complaint thereafter shall be designated the complainant.

If a verified complaint is filed with the committee, the committee promptly shall send a copy of the complaint to the Member of the

Assembly alleged to have committed the violation complained of, who thereafter shall be designated the respondent.

No complaint may be filed with the committee after the expiration of 12 months from the date the alleged violation is discovered or three years from the date of the alleged violation, whichever occurs first.

(f) (1) If the committee determines that the verified complaint does not allege facts, directly or upon information and belief, sufficient to constitute a violation of any standard of conduct, it shall dismiss the complaint and so notify the complainant and respondent.

(2) (i) If the committee determines that the verified complaint does allege facts, directly or upon information and belief, sufficient to constitute a violation of any standard of conduct, the committee promptly shall investigate the alleged violation and if, after this preliminary investigation, the committee finds that reasonable cause exists for believing the allegations of the complaint, it shall fix a time for a hearing in the matter, which shall be not more than 30 days after that finding. The committee may, however, seek an extension of this period, not to exceed an additional 30 days, which may be granted by a majority vote of the Committee on Rules.

(ii) If, after preliminary investigation, the committee does not find that reasonable cause exists for believing the allegations of the complaint, the committee shall dismiss the complaint. In either event, the committee shall notify the complainant and the respondent of its determination.

(3) The committee shall make its determination under paragraph (1) or (2) of this subdivision, pursuant to a vote in accordance with subdivision (n), not later than 90 days after first receiving a complaint that satisfies subdivision (e). The committee may, however, seek an extension, not to exceed 30 days, which may be granted by a majority vote of the membership of the Committee on Rules. If the committee has requested a law enforcement agency to investigate the complaint or if the committee knows the complaint is being investigated by a law enforcement agency, the time limits set forth in this subdivision shall be tolled until the investigation is completed.

(4) The committee's determination under paragraph (1) or (2) of this subdivision shall be stated in writing, with reasons given therefor, and shall be provided to the Assembly, and, in any case concerning an alleged violation of Article 2 (commencing with Section 8920) of Chapter 1 of Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 2 of the Government Code, shall be provided to the Attorney General, the Fair Political Practices Commission, and the district attorney of the county in which the violation allegedly occurred. This written determination is a public record and is open to public inspection.

(5) Any deliberations of the committee from the time of receipt of a complaint until it decides to dismiss the complaint or to set a hearing shall not be open to the public unless the respondent requests a public meeting.

(g) After the complaint has been filed, the respondent shall be entitled to examine and make copies of all evidence in the possession of the committee relating to the complaint.

(h) If a hearing is held pursuant to subdivision (f), the committee, before the hearing has commenced, shall issue subpoenas and

subpoenas duces tecum at the request of any party in accordance with Chapter 4 (commencing with Section 9400) of Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 2 of the Government Code. All of the provisions of that chapter, except Section 9410 of the Government Code, shall apply to the committee and the witnesses before it.

(i) At any hearing held by the committee:

(1) Oral evidence shall be taken on oath or affirmation.

(2) Each party shall have these rights: to be represented by legal counsel; to call and examine witnesses; to introduce exhibits; and to cross-examine opposing witnesses.

(3) The hearing shall be open to the public.

(j) Any official or other person whose name is mentioned at any investigation or hearing of the committee, and who believes that testimony has been given that adversely affects him or her, shall have the right to testify or, at the discretion of the committee, to testify under oath relating solely to the material relevant to the testimony regarding which he or she complains.

(k) The committee shall have 15 days following the hearing within which to deliberate and reach its final determination on the matter as follows:

(1) If the committee finds that the respondent has not violated any standard of conduct, it shall order the action dismissed, shall notify the respondent and complainant thereof, and, in cases concerning an alleged violation of Article 2 (commencing with Section 8920) of Chapter 1 of Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 2 of the Government Code, shall transmit a copy of the complaint and the fact of dismissal to the Attorney General, the Fair Political Practices Commission, and the district attorney of the appropriate county. The complaint and the fact of dismissal transmitted pursuant to this paragraph are public records and open to public inspection.

(2) If the committee finds that the respondent has violated any standard of conduct, it shall state its findings of fact and submit a report thereon to the Assembly. This report shall be accompanied by a House Resolution, authored by the committee, which shall be introduced at the Chief Clerk's desk and then referred by the Committee on Rules to the Ethics Committee. The House Resolution shall include a statement of the committee's findings and the committee's recommendation for disciplinary action. Within seven days, the committee shall adopt the final form of the House Resolution and report it to the Assembly for placement on the Daily File. The committee also shall send a copy of those findings and report to the complainant and respondent, and, in cases concerning an alleged violation of Article 2 (commencing with Section 8920) of Chapter 1 of Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 2 of the Government Code, shall report thereon to the Attorney General, the Fair Political Practices Commission, and the district attorney of the appropriate county. The report submitted pursuant to this paragraph is a public record and open to public inspection.

After the receipt of a copy of the committee's final report and House Resolution, the Assembly expeditiously shall take appropriate action with respect to the respondent.

(l) The filing of a complaint with the committee pursuant to this rule suspends the running of the statute of limitations applicable to any violation of any standard of conduct alleged in the substance of

that complaint while the complaint is pending.

(m) The committee shall maintain a record of its investigations, inquiries, and proceedings. All records, complaints, documents, and reports filed with or submitted to or made by the committee, and all records and transcripts of any investigations, inquiries, or hearings of the committee under this rule shall be deemed confidential and shall not be open to inspection, without the express permission of the committee, by any person other than a member of the committee, or an employee of the committee or other state employee designated to assist the committee, except as otherwise specifically provided in this rule. The committee may, by adoption of a resolution, authorize the release to the Attorney General or a district attorney of the appropriate county of any information, records, complaints, documents, reports, and transcripts in its possession that are material to any matter pending before the Attorney General or that district attorney. All matters presented at a public hearing of the committee and all reports of the committee stating a final finding of fact pursuant to subdivision (k) shall be public records and open to public inspection. Any employee of the committee who divulges any matter that is deemed to be confidential by this subdivision shall be subject to discipline by the Committee on Rules.

(n) The committee may take any action authorized by this rule only upon the vote of not less than two members from the registered political party having the greatest number of Members in the Assembly and two members from the registered political party having the second greatest number of Members. Any vacancy on the committee does not reduce the votes required to take action.

(o) The committee may render advisory opinions to Members of the Assembly with respect to the standards of conduct and their application and construction. The committee may secure an opinion from the Legislative Counsel for this purpose or issue its own opinion. Any committee advisory opinion shall be prepared by committee members or staff and shall be adopted by the committee pursuant to subdivision (n).

(p) The committee shall conduct, at least semiannually, an orientation course on the relevant statutes and regulations governing official conduct. The curriculum and presentation of the course shall be established by the Committee on Rules.

The committee, in consultation with the Fair Political Practices Commission, shall conduct, at least annually, an orientation course on the relevant ethical issues and laws relating to lobbying. The committee shall impose fees on lobbyists for attending this course at an amount that will permit the participation of lobbyists to the fullest extent possible.

At least once each biennial session, each Member of the Assembly and each designated employee of the Assembly shall attend one of these courses.

Printing of Committee Reports

23. All requests for the printing of reports of Assembly committees shall be referred to the Committee on Rules. The Committee on Rules shall determine the number of copies needed and whether the report shall be printed in the Journal. In no event may more than 1,000 copies of any committee report be authorized

by the Committee on Rules on the first printing, exclusive of the Journal copies if the report is to be printed therein, unless the Committee on Rules finds and determines that there is a special need for that report in greater numbers.

Upon determination by the Committee on Rules that additional copies of an Assembly committee report are required at any time following the first printing of the authorized number of copies, the Committee on Rules may authorize one or more additional printings in the numbers found by it to be necessary and may make funds available therefor.

No Assembly committee report may contain more than 100 pages, including the front and back cover thereof and any appendix, unless a greater number of pages has been approved and authorized by the Committee on Rules.

Assembly Employees

24. Every employee who works for a committee of the Assembly or a subcommittee of a committee, for a Member of the Assembly, for the Chief Clerk's office, or for the Sergeant at Arms, is an employee of the Assembly. All employees of the Assembly serve at the pleasure of the Assembly and the terms and conditions of their employment may be modified, or their employment may be terminated at will, at any time and without notice, by the Committee on Rules.

Every applicant for employment by the Assembly shall prepare a formal application for employment on forms prescribed by the Committee on Rules. The application shall include a statement of his or her present employment, his or her employment during the preceding two years, and other pertinent information that the Committee on Rules may require. The application shall be certified under penalty of perjury, and any willful false statement or omission of a material fact shall be punishable as perjury. If the application discloses any fact that indicates that the applicant has a personal interest that would conflict with the faithful performance of his or her duties, the applicant shall not be employed. All applications shall be retained in the records of the committee.

Every employee shall complete the Assembly ethics course in the first six months of his or her employment. Thereafter, every employee shall take the course in the first six months of every legislative session.

No employee may engage in any outside business activity or outside employment that is inconsistent, incompatible, or in conflict with his or her functions or responsibilities as an employee of the Assembly. Any employee who engages in any outside business activity or employment that is in any way related to his or her functions or responsibilities as an employee shall promptly notify the Committee on Rules of that business activity or employment.

Assembly Proceedings

25. Accredited press representatives may not be excluded from any public legislative meeting or hearing and may not be prohibited from taking photographs of, televising, or recording the committee or house hearings, subject to the following conditions:

- (1) This rule shall extend to all public legislative meetings.
- (2) Lights shall be used only when cameras are filming, and, when possible, proceedings in hearing rooms and the Chamber shall be

filmed without lights.

(3) Every effort should be made to set up filming equipment before hearings or sessions begin.

(4) The committee chairperson or the Speaker shall be notified, as far in advance of the proceedings as possible, that recordings and television cameras will be present and filming.

(5) To the extent practical, flash cameras shall not be used.

(6) Photographs shall be taken in an orderly and expeditious manner so as to cause the least possible inconvenience to the committee or to the Members in the Chamber.

IV. ASSEMBLY FUNCTIONS

A. Duties of Assembly Officers

Duties of the Speaker

26. (a) The Speaker shall possess the powers and perform the duties prescribed as follows:

(1) To preserve order and decorum; he or she may speak to points of order in preference to the other Members, rising from his or her chair for that purpose.

(2) To decide all questions of order subject to appeal to the Assembly by any Member. On every appeal, the Speaker shall have the right to assign the reason for his or her decision.

(3) To name any Member to perform the duties of the Speaker, except that any substitution may not extend beyond adjournment.

(4) To have general direction over the Assembly chamber and rooms set aside for the use of the Assembly, including the rooms for use by Members as private offices.

(5) To allocate funds, staffing, and other resources for the effective operation of the Assembly.

(6) To appoint the membership of all standing and special committees, and their respective chairpersons and vice-chairpersons. The Speaker has approval power over the appointment of subcommittees of those standing and special committees.

(7) To establish a schedule of meetings of standing committees or subcommittees and to approve special meetings at a time different from the scheduled time.

(8) To have general control and direction over the Journals, papers, and bills of the Assembly.

(9) To act as Chairperson of the Committee of the Whole.

(10) To order the Lobby and Gallery cleared whenever he or she deems it necessary.

(11) To authenticate by his or her signature, when necessary or required by law, all bills, memorials, resolutions, orders, proceedings, writs, warrants, and subpoenas issued by order of the Assembly.

(b) The Speaker shall be ex officio member of all Assembly and joint committees with all of the rights and privileges of that membership, except the right to vote. In counting a quorum of any of those committees, the Speaker shall not be counted as a member.

(c) The Speaker shall, at each regular session, appoint a Member of the Assembly to serve on the Judicial Council pursuant to Section 6 of Article VI of the California Constitution.

Funerals and Other Ceremonies and Events

27. The Speaker may designate any one or more of the Members of the Assembly as the representatives of the Assembly to attend funerals and other ceremonies and events in appropriate circumstances. The Members so designated shall receive their expenses as provided in Joint Rule 35.

Selection of Officers

28. (a) The Speaker shall appoint all nonelected officers of the Assembly except the Minority Floor Leader.

(b) The Minority Floor Leader shall be selected by the caucus of the political party having the second greatest number of Members in the Assembly.

Duties of the Speaker pro Tempore

29. The Speaker pro Tempore shall perform those duties assigned by the Speaker, including the responsibility of presiding over sessions of the Assembly and advising the Members on parliamentary procedures of the house.

Majority Floor Leader

30. It shall be the duty of the Majority Floor Leader to make those appropriate motions, points of order, or other arrangements that may be necessary to expedite the proceedings of the Assembly, and he or she shall be responsible for the presentation of all matters that relate to the order of business, and to the promotion of harmony among the membership.

Caucus Chairpersons

31. The chairperson of the caucus of the political party having the greatest number of Members in the Assembly, and the chairperson of the caucus of the political party having the second greatest number of Members in the Assembly, shall perform those duties that are prescribed by their respective party caucuses.

Chief Clerk

32. The Chief Clerk of the Assembly shall have the following duties, powers, and responsibilities:

(a) To be charged with the responsibility of the keeping of the bills, papers, and records of the proceedings and actions of the Assembly and to have charge of the publication and distribution of those publications related thereto.

(b) To supervise Assembly employees who are engaged in duties related to subdivision (a).

(c) To act as Parliamentarian of the Assembly and to advise the officers of the Assembly and the Committee on Rules on parliamentary procedure and the Rules of the Assembly when called upon to do so.

(d) To prepare all bills, resolutions, histories, journals, and related publications for printing.

(e) To refuse to permit any bills, papers, or records to be removed from his or her office or out of his or her custody, except upon duly signed receipts from persons authorized.

(f) To mail, before the commencement of each regular session of the Legislature, to each Member a blank form on which the Member may indicate his or her committee preferences. Accompanying the

blank form shall be mailed a stamped envelope addressed to the Chief Clerk of the Assembly for returning the form. After their receipt, all those communications shall be held by the Chief Clerk of the Assembly and the information contained in the forms shall be forwarded to the Speaker.

(g) To perform other duties that are prescribed by law or the Committee on Rules.

(h) To make technical changes in measures and amendments pending before the Assembly. The Chief Clerk shall notify the Speaker and the author of the measure of any such change.

(i) To compare all bills, ordered or considered engrossed by the Assembly, with the engrossed copies thereof; before they pass out of the possession of the Assembly, to see that each engrossed bill is a true copy of the original, with those amendments that may have been made thereto; and to see that all engrossed bills are reported back in the order in which they were ordered engrossed.

(j) To assist the Committee on Rules, upon its request, in recommending the reference of bills to the appropriate standing committee.

The Assistant Chief Clerk shall have the powers and perform the duties of the Chief Clerk during his or her absence.

Sergeant at Arms

33. The Sergeant at Arms shall have the following duties, powers, and responsibilities:

(a) To attend the Assembly during its session, preserve order, announce all official messengers, and serve all process issued by authority of the Assembly and directed by the Speaker; the Sergeant at Arms shall receive actual expenses for himself or herself, or for an assistant, incurred in executing any process.

(b) To see that no person is admitted to the Assembly Chamber except in accordance with these rules.

(c) To have general supervision over the Assistant Sergeants at Arms and be responsible for their official acts and their performance of and regular attendance upon their duties.

(d) To execute all commands of the Speaker.

(e) To perform all other duties pertaining to his or her office as prescribed by law or Assembly rule.

The Chief Assistant Sergeant at Arms shall have the powers and perform the duties of the Sergeant at Arms during his or her absence.

Filling Interim Vacancies—Assembly Elected Officers

34. In the event a vacancy in any office, except Speaker, elected by the membership of the Assembly occurs during joint recesses, the Committee on Rules shall fill the office until the session reconvenes. If a vacancy occurs in the office of the Speaker during a joint recess, the Committee on Rules shall notify the membership within 15 days from the time the vacancy occurs and shall call a caucus of the membership of the Assembly for the purpose of filling the vacancy. This caucus shall be held at the State Capitol within 30 days from the time the vacancy occurs. Notice of the caucus shall be in writing and shall be mailed not less than 10 days prior to the meeting of the caucus. If the Committee on Rules fails to act within 15 days from the time the vacancy in the office of Speaker occurs, the Chief Clerk of the Assembly shall act in its place, following the procedure set forth

in this rule. Any person selected to fill any vacancy pursuant to this rule shall hold the office until the session reconvenes.

An affirmative recorded vote of a majority of the duly elected and qualified Members shall be required for the selection by the Assembly caucus of a person to fill a vacancy pursuant to this rule. The procedure for selecting the Speaker at the caucus shall be the same as the procedure required for the election of the Speaker at a session.

B. Printing

Authority for Printing

35. The State Printer may not charge any printing or other work to the Assembly other than as provided by law or Assembly rule, except upon a written order signed by the Chief Clerk of the Assembly or the Chief Administrative Officer of the Assembly. All invoices for printing furnished to the Assembly shall be itemized and rendered by the State Printer within 30 days after completion of the printing. When necessary, the Chief Clerk of the Assembly or the Chief Administrative Officer of the Assembly may order certain printed matter completed in advance of its regular order by the issuance of a rush order.

Ordering of Printing

36. The Chief Clerk is authorized to order, and shall have the responsibility for ordering, the printing of bills, resolutions, journals, daily files, histories, and related documents.

The Chief Clerk of the Assembly, or the Chief Administrative Officer of the Assembly, shall order other printing as directed or authorized by the Committee on Rules, and the written order for that printing shall be countersigned by the Speaker or a person designated by the Speaker. The Chief Clerk of the Assembly or the Chief Administrative Officer of the Assembly shall also order other printing as directed or authorized by resolution or motion of the Assembly.

Printing Assembly History and Legislative Handbook

37. During the session, the Chief Clerk shall cause to be printed and placed upon each Member's desk, prior to convening on Monday of each week, a complete history showing all actions taken upon each measure up to and including the legislative day preceding its issuance. For each legislative day intervening between the issuance of each Weekly History, there shall be printed a Daily Supplemental History showing only actions taken upon any measure since the issuance of the preceding Weekly History.

The Chief Clerk of the Assembly shall, as soon as practicable, in each even-numbered year, commence to compile a legislative manual or handbook, pursuant to Section 9740 of the Government Code.

V. LEGISLATIVE PROCEDURE

Order of Business

40. The order of business of the Assembly shall be as follows:

1. Roll Call
2. Prayer by the Chaplain

3. Reading of the Previous Day's Journal
4. Presentation of Petitions
5. Introduction and Reference of Bills
6. Reports of Committees
7. Messages From the Governor
8. Messages From the Senate
9. Motions and Resolutions
10. Business on the Daily File
11. Announcements
12. Adjournment

Pledging of Allegiance to the Flag

41. At each session, following the prayer by the Chaplain, the Members of the Assembly and its officers and employees present in the Assembly Chamber shall pledge their allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America. The Speaker shall invite guests present in the Assembly Chamber to join in the pledge of allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America.

Reading and Correcting Journals

42. (a) The reading of the Journal of the previous day may be dispensed with, on motion, by a majority vote of the Members present and voting.

(b) All journals of the Assembly shall be corrected by the Minute Clerk and delivered to the Chief Clerk.

(c) A motion to correct any day's Journal or to print a letter in the Journal shall always be in order and shall require a majority vote of the Members present and voting.

Presentation of Petitions

43. Whenever petitions, memorials, or other papers are presented by a Member, a brief statement of the contents thereof may be made verbally by the introducer. Petitions are not debatable and shall be filed, or referred to a committee as the Speaker shall determine. Receipt of that presentation and its disposition shall be noted in the Journal.

Upon receipt of a petition for the impeachment of any person subject to impeachment by the Legislature, the Speaker shall, without comment or debate, forthwith refer the petition to committee.

Messages From the Governor

44. Messages from the Governor shall be delivered to the Chief Clerk or an assistant, and shall be read and ordered printed in the Journal unless otherwise ordered by an affirmative recorded vote of 54 or more Members.

Messages From the Senate

45. Messages from the Senate shall be delivered to the Chief Clerk or an assistant, and shall be read and ordered printed in the Journal. The Committee on Rules shall refer each bill to a committee, unless upon a motion the Assembly, by an affirmative recorded vote of 41 or more Members, shall refer it to some other committee. The action to refer a bill shall not be debatable. The reference shall be

entered in the Journal. Assembly bills that have been passed without amendment by the Senate shall be ordered to enrollment.

An Assembly bill amended by the Senate shall be placed upon the unfinished business file but shall not be eligible to be acted upon until it is on the unfinished business file for one legislative day, except that when the Assembly bill is placed upon the unfinished business file during the last two legislative days preceding (1) the January 31 bill passage deadline specified by Section 10 of Article IV of the California Constitution, (2) the scheduled commencement of the interim study recess, or (3) the scheduled commencement of the final recess as specified by the Joint Rules of the Senate and Assembly, it may be acted upon immediately.

Guests of the Assembly

45.5. Nothing in these rules shall prevent the Speaker or Speaker pro Tempore from permitting the introduction of a special guest or guests.

A. Bills and Resolutions

Bills Defined

46. (A) The word "bill," as used in these rules, includes a constitutional amendment, a concurrent resolution, and a joint resolution, except as otherwise specifically provided.

(b) A concurrent resolution and a joint resolution, other than a resolution ratifying proposed amendments to the United States Constitution and a resolution calling for a constitutional convention, shall be treated in all respects as a bill except as follows:

(1) It shall be given only one formal reading.

(2) It shall not be deemed a bill within the meaning of subdivision (a) of Section 8 of Article IV of the California Constitution.

Introduction and Reference of Bills

47. Each bill shall be signed by each Member who is an author or coauthor of the bill before it is introduced. If any bill is introduced that does not contain the signature of its author or coauthor, the bill, on motion of the Member whose name appears thereon without that signature, shall be stricken from the file by an affirmative recorded vote of 41 or more Members. In each legislative session, on the first day when bills are introduced under "Introduction and Reference of Bills," the roll shall be called from A to Z and, as each Member's name is called, the Member may introduce one bill, constitutional amendment, or concurrent or joint resolution. After this roll call, the preprint bills shall be introduced in numerical order.

After the introduction of preprinted bills, and subject to the provisions of the Joint Rules of the Senate and Assembly, any Member desiring to introduce a bill, constitutional amendment, or concurrent or joint resolution may at any time during a session send the same to the Chief Clerk's desk.

When received at the Chief Clerk's desk it shall, under the proper order of business, be numbered, read the first time, printed, and referred to a standing committee, and a copy thereof shall be placed upon the desk of each Member before final passage.

All bills, constitutional amendments, and concurrent or joint resolutions introduced before the standing committees of the

Assembly are appointed shall be referred to committee, the references to take effect when the committees are appointed.

Any committee may introduce a bill germane to any subject within the proper consideration of the committee in the same manner as any Member. No committee bill may be introduced unless it contains the signatures of a majority of all of the members, including the chairperson, of the committee. If all of the members of a committee sign the bill, at the option of the committee chairperson the committee members' names need not appear as authors in the heading of the printed bill.

Limitation on the Introduction of Bills

49. (a) A Member may introduce not more than 30 bills in the regular session.

(b) This rule does not apply to a constitutional amendment, any type of resolution, or a bill introduced by a committee pursuant to Rule 47.

(c) This rule may be suspended with respect to a particular bill by approval of the Committee on Rules.

Reference of Bills to Committee

51. Except as otherwise provided in this rule, the Committee on Rules shall refer each bill to a committee by a majority vote of the membership of the committee, unless upon a motion the Assembly, by an affirmative recorded vote of 41 or more Members, shall refer it to some other committee. A motion to refer a bill shall not be debatable, except as to the propriety of the motion, and it shall not open the main question to debate.

The Committee on Rules may require that, if a bill is reported out of the committee to which it has been referred, it shall be re-referred to another committee that shares jurisdiction of the subject matter of the bill.

Spot Bills

51.5. A bill that upon introduction makes no substantive change in or addition to existing law, and would not otherwise affect the ongoing operations of state or local government, except a bill stating legislative intent to make necessary statutory changes to implement the Budget Bill, may not be referred to a committee by the Committee on Rules. If the author subsequently proposes to the Committee on Rules to make substantive changes in the bill as introduced, the Committee on Rules may refer the bill to a committee, together with the proposed changes for consideration as author's amendments. A vote on passage of the bill may not be taken, however, until the bill with its amendments, if adopted, has been in print for at least 15 days.

Delivery of Bills to State Printer

52. After introduction and first reading, all bills shall be delivered to the State Printer.

Introduction of House Resolutions

53. All house resolutions shall be numbered and shall be referred to the appropriate committee by the Committee on Rules.

Each house resolution shall be signed by each Member who is an author or coauthor of the house resolution before it is introduced.

Resolutions by Member

54. A concurrent resolution or a house resolution may be introduced related to a present or former state or federal elected official or a member of his or her immediate family. Other resolutions for the purpose of commendation or congratulation of any person, group, or organization, or for the purpose of expressing sympathy, regret, or sorrow on the death of any person, shall be prepared as a Rules Committee Resolution and presented to the committee for appropriate action.

The Committee on Rules may approve exceptions to this rule for house resolutions. The Chief Clerk may not accept for introduction any house resolution that is contrary to this rule unless it is accompanied by the approval of the Committee on Rules.

B. Standing Committee Functions**Standing Committee Rules**

55. Subject to the Joint Rules of the Senate and Assembly, the Rules of the Assembly shall govern the conduct of all committee and subcommittee meetings.

Meetings of Standing Committees and Subcommittees

56. All standing committees and subcommittees shall meet at the hour and place provided by the schedule established by the Speaker, unless permission for a different hearing time is granted by the Speaker. No committee or subcommittee may meet during any session of the Assembly, nor may any Member of the Assembly attend a conference committee meeting on any bill during any session of the Assembly without first obtaining permission from the Assembly.

When an unscheduled meeting of a standing committee or subcommittee has been so ordered, the meeting shall convene in an area that is readily accessible to the public and the Assembly shall take care that every effort is made to inform the public that a meeting has been called. An unscheduled meeting of a committee or subcommittee shall not be held in the Assembly Chamber.

No bill may be set for hearing, nor may any notice thereof be published by an Assembly committee or subcommittee, until the bill has been referred to the committee or subcommittee. Nothing in this paragraph shall prevent a committee or subcommittee from acting with regard to a bill referred to it where the only action taken is to cause the bill to be reported to the Assembly with the recommendation that amendments be adopted and the bill be reprinted as amended and re-referred to the committee or subcommittee.

The several standing committees and subcommittees and their chairpersons are directed to adopt a procedure that assures that no committee or subcommittee shall commence the hearing of any bill after the hour of 6:00 p.m. at an afternoon meeting of the committee or subcommittee, or after the hour of 11:00 p.m. at an evening meeting, except that a hearing on a bill commenced prior thereto may be continued thereafter for that period of time that the committee or subcommittee deems necessary.

The several standing committees and subcommittees and their

chairperson may adopt a procedure under which bills are scheduled for hearing on the basis of like subject matter groupings.

Committee Analyses

56.5. Except as otherwise provided in this rule, each standing committee and subcommittee shall prepare an analysis of every bill it has set for hearing, which shall be available to the public in the office of the committee or subcommittee one working day prior to the date on which the hearing is to be held. In the case of a special meeting, or a meeting of the Committee on Appropriations or the Committee on Budget, or their subcommittees, the analysis shall be available to the public at the beginning of the hearing. No question concerning a committee's compliance with this rule with regard to any bill shall be in order following a vote on passage of the bill in that committee. As used in this rule, a "working day" is any day on which a house file is published.

A copy of each committee analysis shall be transmitted by the committee secretary to the Assembly Floor Analysis Unit at the same time it is made available to the public.

Committee Consultants: Floor Analyses

56.6. Except as otherwise provided in this rule, the consultants of a standing committee or subcommittee are responsible for monitoring bills assigned to their respective committee or subcommittee throughout the entire legislative process. Except for resolutions and bills on the Consent Calendar, a consultant of the appropriate standing committee shall prepare, in a timely fashion, an analysis of every bill on third reading or the unfinished business file, and of any amendment to a bill that is on the Assembly Floor, as directed by the Assembly Floor Analysis Unit.

The committee consultant who prepares the analysis shall transmit a copy of the completed analysis to the Assembly Floor Analysis Unit. The Assembly Floor Analysis Unit is responsible for final editing for grammar and format of all floor analyses.

Consent Calendar

56.7. If the chairperson of a committee or subcommittee, in advance of a hearing, proposes to recommend any bills for consideration on the Consent Calendar without hearing testimony on those bills in committee, a list of those bills shall be made available to the public at the same time as the committee analysis required under Rule 56.5.

Committee Quorum

57. Except as otherwise provided in this rule, a majority of the membership of any standing committee shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of its business, including the decision to recommend the adoption of any amendments to any bill. A majority of the membership of the committee, or a subcommittee thereof, shall be required to report a bill out of the committee or subcommittee, respectively. Any vacancy on a standing committee shall not reduce the votes required to take action on a bill in that committee.

Whenever a member is disqualified pursuant to Joint Rule 44 or the Political Reform Act of 1974 (Title 9 (commencing with Section 81000) of the Government Code) from voting or taking any

other action related to the passage, defeat, or amendment of a bill in committee, that disqualification shall be treated the same as a vacancy. The member shall advise the chairperson of a disqualification, and the chairperson shall announce which members are so disqualified at the commencement of the hearing on the bill.

Reconsideration

57.1. After a committee has voted on a bill, reconsideration may be granted only one time. Pursuant to subdivision (a) of Joint Rule 62, reconsideration may be granted within 15 legislative days or prior to the interim study joint recess, whichever occurs first. A vote on reconsideration may not be taken without the same notice required to set a bill for hearing unless that vote is taken at the same meeting at which the vote to be reconsidered was taken and the author is present. No action taken by a committee may be reconsidered except by a majority vote of the membership of the committee.

Bills Reported Back to Assembly

58. All committees shall act upon bills referred to them as soon as practicable, and when acted upon each bill shall be reported back to the Assembly forthwith; the chairperson of each committee is charged with the observance of this rule. The chairperson of each committee shall, insofar as practicable, report back bills in the same order as they were acted upon by the committee.

Appropriations Suspense File

58.2. The Committee on Appropriations may maintain a suspense file, to which bills may be referred by vote of a majority of the members of the committee present and voting, pending further consideration by the committee. A bill may be taken off the suspense file and heard, upon two days' notice published in the file, by a vote of a majority of the members of the committee present and voting. A bill removed from the suspense file for the purpose of amendment only, pursuant to Rule 68, shall be re-referred to the committee and shall be placed on the suspense file pending further consideration by the committee.

Voting in Committee

58.5. When a standing committee or subcommittee takes action on a bill, including reconsideration, the vote shall be by roll call vote only. All roll call votes taken in a standing committee or subcommittee shall be recorded by the committee secretary on forms provided by the Chief Clerk of the Assembly. The record of a roll call vote shall show, for each proposal voted upon: all votes for and against, all members absent, and all members not voting. The chairperson of each standing committee or subcommittee shall promptly transmit a copy of the record of the roll call votes to the Chief Clerk of the Assembly, who shall cause the votes to be published in an appendix to the Journal on a monthly basis.

The committee secretary of each standing committee or subcommittee shall promptly transmit a copy of the record of the roll call votes to the Assembly Floor Analysis Unit.

A member may submit a written explanation of his or her vote, absence, or failure to vote on any bill or resolution, and that

explanation shall be printed in the appendix to the Journal in the appropriate place, provided that no explanation may exceed 50 words in length.

At the request of the author or any member of the committee, the committee shall hold the roll open on any Assembly bill until the adjournment of the committee meeting. At no time may a bill be passed out by a committee without a quorum being present.

This rule shall not apply to any of the following:

- (a) Adoption of author's amendments to a bill.
- (b) Withdrawal of a bill from a committee calendar at the request of an author.
- (c) Return of bills to the house where the bills have not been voted on by the committee.
- (d) Votes of subcommittees of the Committee on Budget when considering the Budget Bill.
- (e) Votes of the Committee on Rules when referring bills to committees.

Subject Matter of Bill Recommended for Interim Study

59. Whenever it is the decision of a standing committee that a bill referred to that committee shall not be given a do-pass recommendation, but that the subject matter of the bill should be referred for study, that standing committee shall retain the bill in its possession and report its recommendation to the Assembly that the subject matter of the bill be referred to the Committee on Rules for that committee's assignment of the subject matter to an appropriate committee.

Nothing in this rule shall be construed to prohibit a committee from subsequently reporting the bill to the Assembly with a do-pass or do-pass as amended recommendation or from reporting it out of committee without further action on the final day of the session.

Committee Chairperson as Author

60. No chairperson of a standing committee shall preside at a committee hearing to consider a bill of which he or she is the sole author or the lead author, except that the Chairperson of the Committee on Budget may preside at the hearing of the Budget Bill by the Committee on Budget.

Reports of Committees

61. Specially prepared reports of standing and special committees shall be delivered to the Chief Clerk or an assistant, and shall be read and ordered printed in the Journal unless otherwise ordered by the Speaker or a majority vote of the Members present and voting.

When a report of a joint legislative committee is delivered to the Assembly Desk, the Speaker shall refer it to a standing committee for review and appropriate action.

Constitutional Amendments

62.5. All constitutional amendments shall be referred to the policy standing committee having jurisdiction of that subject matter and, upon being reported out of that committee, shall be re-referred to the committee having constitutional amendments within its jurisdiction.

C. Passage of Bills**Daily File**

63. There shall be printed an Assembly Daily File for each legislative day. The following listing shall constitute the order of business on the Daily File:

1. Special Orders of the Day
2. Second Reading, Assembly Bills
3. Second Reading, Senate Bills
4. Unfinished Business
5. Third Reading, Assembly Bills
6. Third Reading, Senate Bills

All bills on the Daily File shall be called for consideration, provided Rule 58 has been complied with in the order of their listing, unless otherwise ordered by unanimous consent or an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the Members present. All scheduled committee hearings, together with the list of bills to be heard, shall be published in the Daily File.

Copies of Bills for Action on Floor

64. No bill may be considered or acted upon on the floor of the Assembly unless and until a copy of the printed bill as introduced, and a printed copy of each amended form of the bill, have been placed upon the desks of the Members.

Second Reading of Bills

66. All bills shall be read by title the second time in the order of their appearance upon the second reading file. Upon second reading, Assembly bills reported without amendments shall be ordered engrossed, and Senate bills reported without amendments shall be ordered to third reading. All bills reported out of committee shall be placed on the second reading file for the next legislative day, and may not be read a second time until the next legislative day under that order of business. As used in this rule, "bill" does not include a joint or concurrent resolution, but does include a constitutional amendment.

Bills Requiring General Fund Appropriation

66.6. Until the Budget Bill has been enacted, the Assembly may not send to the Governor for consideration any bill appropriating funds for expenditure during the fiscal year for which the Budget Bill is to be enacted, except emergency bills recommended by the Governor or appropriations for the salaries and expenses of the Legislature.

Passage of Budget Bill

66.7. The Committee on Budget shall set spending limits for each subcommittee prior to subcommittee hearings.

Between the date upon which a committee on conference of the Budget Bill is appointed and the date the Assembly adopts the report of the conference committee, the Chairperson of the Committee on Budget shall provide regular written reports to the Members on the progress of the conference committee deliberations.

No Budget Bill may be considered or acted upon on the floor of the Assembly unless it does all of the following:

- (1) Balances expenditures with anticipated revenues.

(2) Provides for a reserve of not less than 3 percent of the total of all expenditures for which appropriations are made in the Budget Bill for the fiscal year, or provisions for a reserve of not less than 1 percent and a specific plan to phase in a reserve of at least 3 percent within three years.

(3) Is based upon no external borrowing by the state other than borrowing that the enacted Budget Bill or other statute would require to be repaid during that fiscal year.

Committee Amendments

67. Committee amendments reported with bills shall be considered upon their second reading, and the amendments may be adopted by majority vote of the Members present and voting. Assembly and Senate bills amended on second reading, whether by committee amendment or amendment from the floor, shall be ordered reprinted and returned to the second reading file. Assembly bills so amended shall be engrossed after printing.

Committee amendments reported with bills shall be prepared, or approved as to form, by the Legislative Counsel. Five copies of the committee amendments to Assembly bills and five copies of the committee amendments to Senate bills shall be delivered to the Chief Clerk's desk.

The Chief Clerk shall cause to be transmitted to the Assembly Floor Analysis Unit a copy of each committee report and committee amendment, unless the committee report or committee amendment is relative to a joint, concurrent, or house resolution.

Adoption of amendments to any bill in the Assembly prior to third reading, other than by a roll call, shall not preclude subsequent consideration in committee, or on the third reading by the Assembly, of the bill, those amendments, or any part thereof.

Author's Amendments

68. Upon request of the author of a bill, the chairperson of the committee to which the bill has been referred may, by his or her individual action taken independently of any committee meeting, cause the bill to be reported to the Assembly with the recommendation that amendments submitted by the author be adopted and the bill be reprinted as amended and re-referred to the committee.

Notwithstanding any other rule, a bill to be amended pursuant to this rule may not be placed on the second reading file for the adoption of those amendments.

Vote on Passage of Bill as Amended

68.5. Except as otherwise provided in this rule, a vote on passage of any bill in a standing committee or subcommittee shall be taken only when the bill is in print, including any previously adopted amendments to the bill. A vote on passage of an amended bill, when the amended form of the bill is not in print, may be taken only if the sole effect of the amendment is to add coauthors to the bill or if the committee determines that the effect of the amendment upon the bill can be readily understood by all of the members and audience present at the hearing. In that circumstance, any member may require that the amendments be in writing at the time of their adoption.

Bill Analysis Prior to Third Reading

68.6. No bill may be considered on third reading unless and until an analysis of the measure has been distributed by the Assembly Floor Analysis Unit and placed upon the desks of the Members, unless otherwise ordered by the Speaker.

As used in this rule, "bill" does not include a joint or concurrent resolution, but does include a constitutional amendment.

Analysis of Conference Committee Amendments

68.7. No report of a conference committee on any bill, other than the Budget Bill, that recommends the substantive amendment of a bill may be considered unless and until an analysis of the proposed amendment has been distributed by the Assembly Floor Analysis Unit and placed upon the desks of the Members, unless otherwise ordered by the Speaker.

Printing of Conference Committee Reports

68.8. No conference report may be heard by the Assembly until it has been in print for two days prior to being taken up by the house.

Conference Committee: Substantial Policy Change

68.9. (a) No conference committee on any bill, other than the Budget Bill or a bill that is making statutory changes to implement the Budget Bill, may approve any substantial policy change in any bill if that substantial policy change has been defeated in a policy committee of the Assembly within the current legislative session. For purposes of this rule, the most recent action of a policy committee with regard to a substantial policy change shall be deemed the only action taken when the policy committee has taken inconsistent actions with respect to a substantial policy change.

(b) For purposes of subdivision (d) of Joint Rule 29.5, the term "heard" means that a printed bill with substantially similar language was before the appropriate committee and taken up at a regular or special hearing of the committee during the current legislative session; or that an amendment, which was drafted and given a request number or approved as to form by the Legislative Counsel, was before the committee and taken up at a regular or special hearing of the committee.

Amendments From the Floor

69. (a) Any Member may move to amend a bill during its second or third reading, and that motion to amend may be adopted by a majority vote of the Members present and voting.

No amendments to a bill offered from the floor, except committee amendments reported with bills, amendments offered with a motion to amend and re-refer a bill to committee, amendments deleting any number of words, amendments adding a total of not more than 25 words, or amendments previously printed in the Journal, shall be in order unless and until a copy of the proposed amendments has been placed upon the desks of the Members. If a copy of amendments adding a total of 25 words or less is not placed on the desks of Members, it shall be made available to the author of the bill, and the amendments shall be read in their entirety by the Chief Clerk prior to debate.

Amendments offered from the floor during a bill's second or third

reading shall be prepared, or approved as to form, by the Legislative Counsel.

Before debate five copies of the proposed amendment to Assembly bills, and five copies of the proposed amendments to Senate bills, shall be delivered to the Chief Clerk's desk. One copy of the proposed amendment shall be transmitted by the Chief Clerk to the Assembly Floor Analysis Unit. Bills so amended upon second or third reading shall be reprinted and re-engrossed. The Chief Clerk shall order printed as many copies of all amended bills as he or she may determine to be necessary.

(b) (1) Amendments from the floor during a bill's second or third reading that would make a substantive change in the bill shall be submitted to the Chief Clerk's desk prior to the scheduled start of session on that legislative day.

(2) Upon receipt of the proposed amendments by the Chief Clerk, an analysis shall be prepared by the committee of origin in conjunction with the Assembly Floor Analysis Unit, and a copy of that analysis shall be distributed to each Member's desk prior to the beginning of debate on adoption of the proposed amendments, unless otherwise ordered by the Speaker.

(3) As used in this subdivision, "bill" does not include a joint or concurrent resolution, but does include a constitutional amendment.

(c) Paragraph (1) of subdivision (b) does not apply to (1) amendments to a bill taken up without reference to file, (2) amendments to a bill to add or delete an urgency clause, (3) amendments to a bill that are identical to other amendments submitted to the Chief Clerk's desk in accordance with the requirements of this rule, (4) amendments to a bill made by a motion to amend or a motion to substitute pursuant to Rule 91, as long as the amendments do not add more than a total of 25 words to, or do not delete more than a total 25 words from, the pending amendments, (5) amendments to the Budget Bill or to a bill that is making statutory changes to implement the Budget Bill, or (6) amendments to a bill to make the bill contingent upon the enactment of another bill, or to incorporate one or more statutory amendments proposed in another bill to avoid superseding those amendments.

(d) Any bill amended on the second or third reading file shall be ordered reprinted and returned to the third reading file, and may not be acted on by the Assembly until the bill, as amended, has been on the Daily File for one calendar day. This subdivision shall not apply to a bill that is amended to add or delete an urgency clause or to a bill that is amended to make statutory changes to implement the Budget Bill.

(e) No motion to amend a bill on the second or third reading file, other than committee amendments reported pursuant to Rule 57, shall be in order on the last two legislative days preceding (1) the January 31 bill passage deadline specified by Section 10 of Article IV of the California Constitution, (2) the scheduled commencement of the interim study recess, or (3) the scheduled commencement of the final recess as specified by the Joint Rules of the Senate and Assembly.

Consideration of Political Reform Act Bills

69.1. Pursuant to Section 81012 of the Government Code, any bill that would amend the Political Reform Act of 1974 (Title 9 (commencing with Section 81000) of the Government Code) may not be passed until, 12 days prior to being considered for passage, the bill in its final form has been delivered by the Chief Clerk to the Fair Political Practices Commission for distribution to the news media and to every person who has requested the commission to send a copy of any such bill to him or her.

Electronic Distribution of Bills, Conference Reports, Amendments, and Analyses

69.5. Subject to subdivision (b) of Section 8 of Article IV of the California Constitution, any requirement that bills, conference reports, amendments, or an analysis be placed on the desks of the Members shall include electronic distribution of the same information to the desk of the Members through the Assembly Floor System, unless otherwise ordered by the Speaker.

Consideration of Bills Re-referred to Committee

70. Whenever a bill that has been amended and re-referred to committee is reported out by that committee, it shall be placed on the second reading file and may not be transferred therefrom to the third reading file until the following day.

Uncontested Bills

71. No bill may be placed on the Assembly Consent Calendar unless it has met the requirements of Joint Rule 22.1 with respect to each Assembly standing committee to which the bill has been referred.

Consideration of Concurrent and Joint Resolutions

73. A concurrent or joint resolution may be amended by a majority vote of the Members present and voting. The ayes and noes may not be called upon the adoption of concurrent resolutions, except those authorizing expenditures of money, unless regularly demanded, or required by statute or the California Constitution.

Adoption of Resolutions

74. Any resolution upon which a roll call vote is demanded shall require an affirmative recorded vote of 41 or more Members for adoption.

The adoption of any resolution authorizing the expenditure of money shall require an affirmative recorded vote of 41 or more Members.

Printing of Resolutions

75. When any previously printed house resolution is before the Assembly for adoption, it shall be printed in the Journal only if amendments to it have been adopted, in which case it shall be printed as amended. In the absence of those amendments, house resolutions before the Assembly for adoption shall be referred to by day and page of the Journal as printed upon introduction. For the purposes of this rule, the adding of a coauthor shall not be deemed an amendment.

Concurrence in Senate Amendments

77. It shall require the same affirmative recorded vote to concur in any Senate amendment to an Assembly bill as the vote required by the California Constitution for the passage of the bill. A vote on concurrence may not be taken until the bill has been on the unfinished business file for one calendar day, except that when the bill is placed upon the unfinished business file during the last two legislative days preceding (1) the January 31 bill passage deadline specified by Section 10 of Article IV of the California Constitution, (2) the scheduled commencement of the interim study recess, or (3) the scheduled commencement of the final recess as specified by the Joint Rules of the Senate and Assembly, it may be acted upon immediately. The vote on concurrence shall be deemed the vote upon final passage of the bill.

Senate amendments to Assembly bills may not be concurred in unless and until an analysis of the measure has been distributed by the Assembly Floor Analysis Unit and a copy placed upon the desks of the Members, unless otherwise ordered by the Speaker. As used in this rule, "bill" does not include a joint or concurrent resolution, but does include a constitutional amendment.

Digest of Bills Amended in Senate

77.1. Whenever the Senate amends and passes an Assembly bill, the Legislative Counsel shall, within one day after the bill is passed by the Senate, prepare and transmit to the Chief Clerk and the Speaker a brief digest summarizing the effect of the Senate amendment. Upon receipt from the Legislative Counsel, the Chief Clerk shall cause the digest to be printed in the Daily File immediately following any reference in the file to the bill covered by the digest.

Substantially Amended Bills

77.2. If the analysis of an amendment adopted on the floor discloses that the amendment makes a substantial substantive change to a bill as passed by the last committee of reference, the bill, as amended, may be referred by the Speaker to the appropriate committee.

A bill that was previously reported from a policy or fiscal committee of reference in compliance with Joint Rule 61 is not subject to the deadlines in Joint Rule 61 if the bill is subsequently referred to a policy or fiscal committee pursuant to this rule.

If the digest to an Assembly bill that has been returned to the Assembly by the Senate for concurrence in Senate amendments discloses that the Senate has made a substantial substantive change in the bill as first passed by the Assembly, the bill may be referred by the Speaker to the appropriate committee.

Inactive File

78. Whenever a bill has been passed twice on the third reading file on two successive legislative days, it shall be placed forthwith upon a special file to be known as the inactive file. A bill also may be placed on the inactive file at the request of the author. When a bill has been placed on the inactive file, it may be returned to the third reading file by request of the author. Notice of the request to return the bill to the third reading file shall be published one day in advance

in the Assembly File. The bill, when returned to the third reading file, shall then be placed at the foot of the third reading file.

When a bill, placed on the inactive file from the second reading file or the unfinished business file, is removed from the inactive file, it shall be returned to the foot of the second reading file or the unfinished business file, respectively, in the next published Daily File.

Engrossing and Enrolling Bills

79. The Engrossing and Enrolling Clerk shall engross and enroll all bills that come to his or her hands for that purpose, in compliance with the provisions of Section 9503 of the Government Code, and in the order of time in which the same shall be acted upon by the Assembly.

After final passage by both houses, any Assembly bill not amended by the Senate shall be ordered by the Speaker forthwith to be enrolled, as provided in Sections 9508 and 9509 of the Government Code. The Chief Clerk shall report both the day and hour each enrolled bill is presented to the Governor, which report shall be entered in the Journal.

VI. PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE

A. Motions and Questions

Precedence of Motions During Debate

80. When a question is under debate or before the Assembly, no motions shall be received but the following, which shall take precedence in the order named:

- First—To adjourn;
- Second—To recess to a time certain;
- Third—To lay on the table;
- Fourth—For the previous question;
- Fifth—To set as a special order;
- Sixth—To postpone indefinitely;
- Seventh—To refer to or to re-refer;
- Eighth—To amend.

Questions of Order Decided Without Debate

81. All incidental questions of order, arising after a motion is made for any of the questions named in Rule 80 and pending that motion, shall be decided by the Speaker without debate, whether on appeal or otherwise.

Appeal From Decision of the Speaker

82. Any Member may appeal from a decision of the Speaker without waiting for recognition by the Speaker, even though another Member has the floor. No appeal is in order when another is pending, or when other business has been transacted by the Assembly prior to the appeal being taken. Upon the appeal being seconded, the Speaker may give his or her reasons for the decision, and the Member making the appeal may give his or her reasons for the appeal, and the Speaker forthwith shall put one of the following questions to the Assembly:

- (1) "Shall the decision of the Speaker be sustained?"
- (2) "Shall the decision of the Speaker be overruled?"

An appeal cannot be amended and yields only to a motion to recess or adjourn, or to lay on the table, or a question of personal privilege. If an appeal is laid on the table, that action shall have no effect on the pending question.

An appeal cannot be debated when relating to indecorum, the transgression of rules, or the priority of business. A majority vote of the Members present and voting shall decide any appeal. In the event of a tie vote, the appeal is lost.

Speaker Explains Order of Business

83. The Speaker may, on his or her own motion or the motion of any Member, explain the order of business when the motion pending before the Assembly is not debatable. That explanation may not consume more than two minutes.

To Adjourn

84. A motion to adjourn is not debatable and cannot be amended, and is always in order, except: (a) when another Member has the floor; (b) when the Assembly is voting; or (c) during a call of the Assembly. The name of any Member moving an adjournment, and the hour at which the motion was made and adjournment taken, shall be entered in the Journal. A motion to adjourn shall be adopted by a majority vote of the Members present and voting.

When a motion to adjourn is made and seconded, it shall be in order for the Speaker, before putting the question, to permit any Member to state to the Assembly any fact relating to the condition of the business of the Assembly which would seem to render it improper or inadvisable to adjourn. That statement may not occupy more than two minutes and is not debatable.

An affirmative recorded vote of a majority of the duly elected and qualified Members is required to adjourn any session of the Assembly sine die.

To Recess to a Time Certain

85. A motion to recess to a time certain shall be treated the same as a motion to adjourn, except that the motion is debatable when no business is before the Assembly, and can be amended as to the time and duration of the recess. It yields only to a motion to adjourn.

To Lay on the Table

86. A motion to lay on the table is not debatable and cannot be amended.

A motion to table a bill, constitutional amendment, or concurrent or joint resolution is adopted by an affirmative recorded vote of 41 or more Members.

Any motion to lay on the table, if carried by 41 or more votes, carries with it the main question and everything that adheres to it, except that a motion to lay an amendment on the table, if adopted, does not carry with it a bill, constitutional amendment, or concurrent, joint, or house resolution.

A motion to lay an amendment on the table is adopted by a majority vote of the Members present and voting.

A motion to lay on the table cannot be applied with respect to reconsideration.

The Previous Question

87. The previous question shall be put only when demanded by five Members, and its effect, when sustained by a majority vote of the Members present and voting, shall be to put an end to all debate and bring the Assembly to a vote only on the question then pending, except that the proponent of the matter pending shall be allowed not more than five minutes to close the debate.

Motion to Set Special Order

88. A motion to set any matter before the Assembly as a special order of business is adopted by an affirmative recorded vote of 54 or more Members. It is debatable only as to the propriety of setting the main question as a special order of business, and may be amended only as to the time.

Motion to Postpone to a Time Certain

89. A motion to postpone to a time certain shall be deemed and treated as a motion to set as a special order.

Motion to Postpone Indefinitely

90. The making of a motion to postpone indefinitely any bill, motion, or amendment opens the main question to debate. If the motion to postpone indefinitely prevails by an affirmative recorded vote of 41 or more Members, the main question may not be acted upon again during the session.

Motion to Amend

91. A motion to amend may itself be amended, but no "amendment to an amendment" may be amended. A motion to substitute shall be deemed to be a motion to amend and shall be considered the same as an amendment.

Only one substitute is in order when an amendment is pending. A motion to amend or to substitute is debatable, except where the main question to be amended is not debatable. Any motion to amend may be adopted by a majority vote of the Members present and voting.

A motion to amend that is decided in the negative is not again in order on the same day, or at the same stage of proceeding. The fact that a motion to amend by striking out certain words is decided in the negative does not preclude a motion to amend by adding words, or a motion to amend by striking out and inserting words, except that in no case may a further amendment be substantially the same as the one rejected.

Subject to the above provisions of this rule and Rule 69, a motion to amend is in order during the second or third reading of any bill.

Amendment To Be Germane

92. No amendment to any bill, other than a bill stating legislative intent to make necessary statutory changes to implement the Budget Bill, whether reported by a committee or offered by a Member, is in order when the amendment relates to a different subject than, is intended to accomplish a different purpose than, or requires a title essentially different than, the original bill.

No motion or proposition on a subject different from that under consideration may be admitted as an amendment.

No amendment is in order that changes the original number of any bill.

No Member may be added or deleted as an author or coauthor of a bill or resolution without his or her consent.

Consideration of Motions

93. No motion, whether oral or written, may be adopted until it is seconded and distinctly stated to the Assembly by the Speaker.

Motions in Writing

94. Upon request of the Speaker, all motions shall be reduced to writing and shall be read to the Assembly by the Speaker before being acted upon.

Withdrawal of Motions

95. After a motion is stated by the Speaker, or a bill, resolution, or petition is read by the Chief Clerk, it is in the possession of the Assembly.

Motion to Withdraw or Re-refer Bills

96. A motion to withdraw a bill or resolution from committee, or to re-refer a bill or resolution from one committee to another committee, may be made during the regular order of business. A motion to re-refer may be debated only as to the propriety of the reference, and shall require an affirmative recorded vote of 41 or more Members.

No bill or resolution may be withdrawn from committee and placed upon the file, except upon two days' notice thereof and an affirmative recorded vote of 41 or more Members.

A motion to continue a motion to withdraw a bill or resolution from committee shall require a majority of those members present and voting.

Re-reference of Measures on File

97. A motion to re-refer a bill or resolution that is on the Assembly Daily File to committee may be made during the regular order of business. The motion is debatable only as to the propriety of that reference and shall require an affirmative recorded vote of 41 or more Members.

Bills Stricken From File

98. A motion to strike from the file any bill or resolution requires an affirmative recorded vote of 41 or more Members. That bill or resolution may not be acted upon again during the session.

Motion to Rescind Action or Expunge Record

99. Previous to the approval of the Journal by the Assembly, any action may be rescinded and its record ordered expunged by the affirmative recorded vote sufficient to take that action originally, except that no action may be rescinded and the record expunged by a vote less than an affirmative recorded vote of 41 or more Members. No motion to rescind the action and expunge the record may be made twice on the same proposition.

A motion to rescind is not in order on any matter upon which a vote to reconsider has previously been taken in the Assembly.

Whenever any action of the Assembly is rescinded and its record ordered expunged, the record of the action expunged may not

appear in any form whatsoever, except that the record of the proceedings on the motion to rescind and expunge shall appear in the Journal as and when printed.

Reconsideration of Vote

100. (a) A motion to reconsider a vote on the next legislative day shall be made on the same day the vote to be reconsidered was taken. No motion to reconsider shall be adopted unless it receives an affirmative recorded vote of 41 or more Members, except that it shall require a vote of 54 or more Members or 60 or more Members, respectively, to reconsider the vote on any matter originally requiring 54 or more votes or 60 or more votes, as the case may be. A motion to reconsider may be voted on without a second.

A motion to reconsider a vote shall be made by a Member voting on the question, and shall take precedence over all motions, except a motion to adjourn. Upon that motion being made, the matter to be reconsidered forthwith shall be placed upon the unfinished business file, and no further action may be taken prior to the next legislative day. When a motion to reconsider has once been made, the motion is the property of the Assembly. When reconsideration is granted, the matter to be reconsidered shall be before the Assembly in the same status it had prior to the vote being reconsidered.

(b) (1) Interim Study Recess:

No motion to reconsider the vote whereby amendments are concurred in on Assembly bills, the vote whereby a Senate bill is passed and returned to the Senate, or the vote whereby a conference committee report is adopted is in order on the last two legislative days preceding the interim study recess.

A motion to reconsider the vote whereby amendments are refused concurrence on Assembly bills, the vote whereby Senate bills are refused passage, or the vote whereby a conference committee report is refused adoption is in order on the last legislative day preceding the interim study recess. The motion may be taken up before the end of that legislative day.

As used in this paragraph, "bill" does not include a joint or concurrent resolution.

(2) January 31—Even-numbered Year:

No motion to reconsider the vote whereby an Assembly bill is passed to the Senate is in order on the last two legislative days preceding January 31 of the even-numbered year.

A motion to reconsider the vote whereby an Assembly bill is refused passage on its third reading is in order on the last legislative day preceding January 31 of the even-numbered year. The motion shall be taken up before the end of that legislative day.

As used in this paragraph, "bill" does not include a Senate bill, a constitutional amendment, or a joint or concurrent resolution.

(3) Easter or Summer Recess:

No motion to reconsider the vote whereby a bill is passed is in order on the last two legislative days preceding the Easter or Summer Recess as established by the Joint Rules of the Senate and Assembly.

(4) Final Recess:

No motion to reconsider the vote whereby a bill is passed is in order on the last two legislative days preceding the final recess.

A motion to reconsider the vote whereby a bill is defeated is in order on the day of the final recess. The motion shall be taken up before the end of that legislative day.

(c) Any Member voting on any matter may move to take up on the same day the motion, previously made by another Member, to reconsider the vote on that matter. A motion to take up on the same day a motion to reconsider the vote on a bill shall require an affirmative recorded vote of two-thirds of the Members present and voting. A motion to take up on the same day a motion to reconsider the vote on any motion, amendment, Assembly resolution, or proposition other than a bill shall require an affirmative vote of a majority vote of the Members present and voting. The motion to take up the reconsideration on the same day shall take precedence over the motion to reconsider and, upon demand of any Member, the motion to take up the reconsideration on the same day shall be put to an immediate vote. If the motion to take up the reconsideration on the same day is adopted, the motion to reconsider shall be the next order of business before the Assembly.

(d) A second motion to reconsider the same question is not in order, nor is a motion to reconsider reconsideration in order.

(e) A motion to continue a motion to reconsider shall require a majority vote of those Members present and voting.

Call of Assembly

101. After the roll has been called, and prior to the announcement of the vote, any Member may move a call of the Assembly. The Members present may order a call of the Assembly by a majority vote of the Members present and voting, and the Speaker shall immediately order the Sergeant at Arms to lock all doors and direct the Chief Clerk to prepare a list of absentees as disclosed by the last roll call. The list of absentees shall be furnished to the Sergeant at Arms, whereupon no Members shall be permitted to leave the Assembly Chamber except by written permission of the Speaker, and no person may be permitted to enter except Members, Senators, or officers, or employees of the Legislature in the official performance of their duties.

Each Member who is found to be absent, and for whom no leave of absence has been granted, shall be forthwith taken into custody wherever found by the Sergeant at Arms, his or her assistants, or any person designated by the Sergeant at Arms, including members of the California Highway Patrol, and sheriffs or their deputies, and brought to the Assembly Chamber.

No recess or adjournment may be taken during a call of the Assembly. Additional business may be conducted and calls placed regardless of the number of calls in effect. A call of the Assembly may be dispensed with at any time upon a majority vote of the Members present, that action to become effective upon the completion of the roll call and the announcement of the vote upon the matter for which the call was ordered, unless, prior to the announcement of the vote, the call is continued by a majority vote of the Members present.

Division of Question

102. Any Member may call for a division of the question, and the Speaker shall order the question divided if it comprehends propositions in substance so distinct that, one being taken away, a

substantive proposition would remain for the decision of the Assembly. This rule does not apply to an individual bill or resolution.

B. Voting

Members Voting

104. Every Member in the Assembly Chamber when a roll call is required shall record his or her vote openly and without debate, unless the Assembly excuses that Member by a majority vote of the Members present and voting.

No Member may operate the voting switch of any other Member, except that a Member presiding at the time of a roll call, who is not the Speaker or the Speaker pro Tempore, may direct another Member on the Floor to operate the voting switch of the presiding Member, and any Member so presiding, including the Speaker and the Speaker pro Tempore, may also operate the voting switches at the rostrum of the Speaker and the Speaker pro Tempore, at their direction.

The name of any Member who refuses to vote as required by this rule, after being requested by the Speaker to do so, shall be entered in the Journal, together with a statement that he or she was present and did so refuse to vote. Any Member who refuses so to vote may, if he or she so desires, and immediately after the announcement of the vote, submit a written explanation of the failure to vote and that explanation shall be printed in the Journal, provided that no explanation may exceed 50 words in length.

In addition to the entry of his or her name in the Journal, any Member who refuses so to vote when required, and who has not been excused from doing so, may, immediately after the announcement of the vote, at the discretion of the Speaker or upon demand of any Member, be summoned to appear before the bar of the Assembly for public censure by the Speaker or by any Member designated by the Speaker. Censure of a Member as provided by this rule does not constitute a bar to proceedings for his or her expulsion from the Assembly pursuant to Section 5 of Article IV of the California Constitution.

A Member may submit a written explanation of his or her vote on any bill or house resolution, and that explanation shall be printed in the Journal immediately following the vote, provided that no explanation may exceed 50 words in length.

A Member, prior to adjournment on the same legislative day, in the absence of any objection, may instruct the Chief Clerk to add his or her vote to any previously announced vote that had been taken during his or her absence, so long as the outcome of the vote is not thereby changed. The Chief Clerk shall record any vote additions or vote changes in the order signed by the Members at the Clerk's desk.

Ayes and Noes

105. The ayes and noes shall be recorded by the electrical voting system on the final passage of all bills, when an affirmative recorded vote of 41 Members or any vote above that number is required, when demanded by three Members, or when ordered by the Speaker. The names of the Members so voting shall be entered in the Journal.

Voting and Vote Changes

106. When once begun, voting may not be interrupted, except that, before the vote is announced, any Member may have the total pending vote flashed on the visible vote recorder. Prior to the announcement of the vote, the presiding officer shall instruct the Chief Clerk to record verbal votes from Members not at their desks. Any Member may move a call of the Assembly after the completion of the roll. A Member, prior to adjournment on the same legislative day, and in the absence of any objection, may instruct the Chief Clerk to change his or her recorded vote after the vote is announced, so long as the outcome of the vote is not thereby changed. The Chief Clerk may record any vote change only after the Member making the change has announced it to the Assembly.

Tie Vote

107. In case of an equal division, or tie vote, the question shall be lost.

VII. MEMBERS' DECORUM AND PRIVILEGES**Order in Speaking to Questions**

108. When a Member desires to address the Assembly, the Member shall rise from his or her seat and respectfully address himself or herself to "Mr. Speaker" or "Madame Speaker." Upon being recognized, the Member may speak, confining himself or herself to the question under consideration. When two or more Members rise at the same time, the Speaker shall designate the Member who is entitled to the floor.

No Member may speak more than once during the consideration of any one question on the same day and at the same stage of proceeding, except that the author of a bill or resolution or the mover of a question shall have the right to open and close the debate thereon. No Member may be allowed to speak more than five minutes to open and five minutes to close the debate on any question, including amendments, and no Member other than the author or the mover of the question may be allowed to speak more than five minutes thereon. No Member may yield to any other Member the time for which he or she is entitled to speak on any matter.

Motions

109. When a Member desires to make a motion, the Member shall obtain recognition as provided in Rule 108. Upon being recognized, the Member shall open by stating his or her motion, except in the case of a nomination, and in any other case may not speak to the merits of the motion at that time, but shall confine his or her remarks to those necessary to explain the motion. If the motion is in order and is seconded, it shall be stated to the Assembly by the Speaker. If the motion is debated, the Member who made it shall then be entitled to recognition to open the debate on the motion.

When a Member obtains the floor during debate upon any question that is pending before the Assembly and addresses the Assembly regarding the merits of the pending question, the Member may not be permitted to conclude his or her debate by making any motion or by demanding the previous question.

Leave of Absence

110. No Member may absent himself or herself from attendance at any session of the Assembly without leave of the Assembly. No Member may obtain that leave of absence or be excused for nonattendance except by a vote of 54 or more Members or by unanimous consent. A Member who obtains a leave of absence for personal business, or is excused for nonattendance for personal business, thereby waives his or her per diem allowance for attendance upon any session of the Legislature for which he or she secures that leave of absence or excuse. A Member may not obtain a leave of absence for legislative business or be excused for nonattendance for legislative business unless the Member has filed with the Speaker a statement of the legislative business for which he or she seeks that leave of absence or excuse. That statement shall be printed in the Journal.

If a Member is not recorded on the attendance roll within 30 minutes after the scheduled start of the session, the Member shall stand up before the Assembly and explain the reason he or she is late before he or she is recorded on the roll call for any vote. If a Member does not explain his or her reason for being late, any other Member may raise a point of order under this rule, whereupon the tardy Member's vote may not be recorded until an explanation is made.

Personal Privilege

111. Any Member may rise to explain a matter of personal privilege. A matter of personal privilege is a matter involving the Member's integrity, dignity, or honor. Upon rising to explain such a matter, the Member forthwith shall be recognized by the Speaker, but may not discuss a question in that explanation. Matters of personal privilege yield only to a motion to recess or adjourn.

Objection to Reading of Any Paper

112. Any Member, upon recognition by the Speaker, may object to the reading of any paper before the Assembly. When the objection is made, the question of reading shall be determined without debate by a majority vote of the Members present and voting, upon a brief statement by the Speaker of the substance of the objection.

Members at Chief Clerk's Desk

113. No Member or other person may be allowed at the Chief Clerk's desk while the ayes and noes are being recorded or the votes counted.

Members Called to Order for Transgressing Rules

114. If any Member transgresses the Rules of the Assembly, the Speaker shall, or any Member may, call the offending Member to order. The Member so called to order immediately shall take his or her seat, until the Speaker, without debate, has determined whether the Member is in order. That decision by the Speaker shall be subject to an appeal to the Assembly.

If any Member is called to order for offensive words spoken in debate, the person calling him or her to order shall state to the Assembly the words to which exception is taken. No Member may be held to answer, or be subject to censure by the Assembly, for language used in debate if other business has been transacted by the Assembly prior to exception being taken to the words spoken.

VIII. MISCELLANEOUS**Committee of the Whole**

115. The Assembly may resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole at any time by a majority vote of the Members present and voting. While sitting as that committee, persons other than Members may address the committee. The Speaker of the Assembly, or any Member named by the Speaker, shall preside as Chairperson of the Committee of the Whole.

A motion that the Committee of the Whole “do now rise and report back to the Assembly,” shall always be in order and shall be decided without debate. All actions of the Committee of the Whole shall be reported to the Assembly by the chairperson, but may not be entered in the Journal except upon motion and a majority vote of the Members present and voting.

Use of Assembly Chamber

116. The Assembly Chamber may not be used for any public or private business, other than legislative matters during the sessions or joint recesses of the Legislature, except by consent of 41 or more Members or, during a joint recess, of the Committee on Rules.

Use of Assembly Facilities: Smoking

117. The smoking of tobacco products is prohibited within any building, or portion of a building, occupied or used by Assembly Members or employees if the building or portion of the building is under the jurisdiction or control of the Assembly. This smoking prohibition shall apply to any outdoor area within five feet of an entrance or exit to any building or portion of a building subject to this rule. This smoking prohibition shall apply to the Assembly Chamber, Assembly hearing rooms, and Assembly offices, and to hallways, stairways, and bathrooms within any building or portion of a building subject to this rule.

Floor of the Assembly: Telephones

117.5. No cellular telephone may be used on the floor of the Assembly during any session of the Assembly.

Meeting of the Assembly: Firearms

117.7. No person, except a peace officer acting within the scope of his or her employment, may carry or possess a firearm on the floor of the Assembly during any session of the Assembly or in a committee hearing room during any meeting of a committee or subcommittee.

Persons Admitted to Floor of the Assembly

118. No person other than Members of the Legislature, officers, employees of the Legislature, accredited members of the press, and guests may be admitted to the floor of the Assembly during any session of the Assembly. A guest of any Member may be admitted only upon presentation of a guest card of the Member countersigned by the Speaker. A guest card is valid only on the legislative day for which it is issued. No lobbyist, as defined by Section 82039 of the Government Code, may, under any circumstances, be admitted to the Assembly Chamber while the Assembly is in session.

Persons admitted to the Assembly Chamber, other than Members, may not be permitted to stand in the lobby in the rear of the

Assembly Chamber while the Assembly is in session, but shall be required to occupy the seats provided for them.

Guests may be seated only in the chairs in the back of the rail in the rear of the Assembly Chamber, and may not be permitted to sit at the desks of the Members. No person other than an accredited newspaper representative may be permitted to sit at the press desks. A special section in the balcony may be reserved for those holding guest cards. Neither any person mentioned in this rule nor any other person, except a Member of the Legislature, may engage in influencing the passage or defeat of legislation in the Assembly Chamber.

No person other than a Member of the Legislature, the Sergeant at Arms or his or her assistants, the Chief Clerk or his or her assistants, or the Legislative Counsel or his or her representatives, may be permitted in the area of the floor of the chamber which is occupied by the desks of the Members.

Qualifications and Elections of Members

119. An affirmative vote of 41 or more Members shall be required to determine the qualifications and election of any Member pursuant to Section 5 of Article IV of the California Constitution. No motion to disqualify a Member is in order at the convening of a legislative session until a Speaker has been elected in accordance with Section 9023 of the Government Code.

Compensation and Expenses of Member Convicted of Felony

120. If a Member of the Assembly is convicted of a felony by a superior court, his or her right to further compensation or expenses is thereupon suspended, and his or her membership on any committee is thereupon suspended. If the conviction becomes final, the right of the Member to further compensation or expenses shall terminate and any compensation or expenses withheld shall be forfeited to the state. If the conviction is reversed by an appellate court or a motion for a new trial is granted, and the Member is thereafter found not guilty or the charges against him or her are dismissed, the amounts of the withheld compensation or expenses shall be paid to the Member and the suspension of his or her committee membership shall terminate.

Whenever a Member is convicted of a felony in the superior court, the Committee on Rules shall give written notice thereof to the Controller, directing him or her to discontinue any further payments to the Member unless and until the Committee on Rules notifies the Controller that the Member has been found not guilty or that the charges against him or her are dismissed. The Controller may not draw any warrant payable to that Member except as provided in this rule.

The Seal of the Assembly

121. The Seal of the Assembly may be used only by or on behalf of a Member of the Assembly, or when specifically authorized by the Committee on Rules.

The bill load of this committee is more than substantial, constituting more than a third of the total committee workload of the House. The subject matter deals with the protection of public safety. Proponents and opponents deserve a committee which is neither unwieldy in size, nor one with members who have other committee conflicts.

There are 41 bills on calendar for tomorrow. If each received only 15 minutes, the hearing would require ten hours. I expect it to last substantially longer.

The reduced committee will have the following membership: Assemblymembers Robert Hertzberg, Chair, Jan Goldsmith, Vice Chair, Larry Bowler, George House, Kevin Murray, Grace Napolitano, Don Perata and Carl Washington.

Dear Speaker Bustamante: I would like to commemorate and thank the San Diego SuperComputer Center for their enormous contributions to the State during our recent flooding.

Winter storms during the first part of the new year have devastated large portions of California. States of emergency have been declared in more than 40 (out of 58) California counties. The California Resources Agency (CRA) is the agency responsible for providing electronic information on the floods; it is headquartered in Sacramento, in the middle of the flooding regions. When the storms put CRA at risk of flooding, the San Diego SuperComputer Center (SDSC) stepped in and assisted with a contingency plan.

The SDSC is one of four national facilities established by the National Science Foundation to advance basic science and engineering research and industrial competitiveness through the effective application of high-performance computational technologies.

The onset of storms requires the compilation of storm and flood conditions data by CRA. This information is disseminated to the public and is critical to public safety. CRA has developed a system called the California Environmental Resources Evaluation System (CERES) to provide electronic data describing California's environment from many contributors. With January's extreme conditions, there was concern for the systems viability in the event Sacramento went under water. SDSC expediently established a mirror to the CRA's CERES site to handle the emergency situation.

CERES data includes bulletins; emergency assistance, preparedness and recovery; emergency declarations from the governor's office; images, including some from NASA, hydrologic data; media coverage; road, snow and weather conditions; and Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta atlas from the California Department of Water Resources.

While flooding caused by the storms was a primary concern, there was also a risk that the CERES site would become flooded with hits from interested Web users. Because this could be anticipated, CRA was working with SDSC for the purpose of warehousing CERES data on SDSC information archives. The onslaught of flooding required immediate action. SDSC responded and quickly undertook successful completion of the contingency plan.

Through the efforts of SDSC's John Helly, Jeff Makey, Chris Daharsh, Mike Vildibill, Don Doering, and others at SDSC, a Web server was made available as well as disk space to store more than four gigabytes of CERES data. The SDSC-based CERES Web server is on-line at <http://ceres.sdsc.edu/> with links still pointing to the original CERES site.

Thank you to the professionals at SDSC for providing us with peace of mind had the worst-case scenario become reality. Fortunately, thus far, the floods have not invaded the CRA offices.

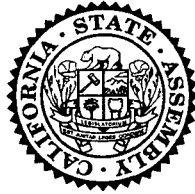
