**CALIFORNIA STATE ASSEMBLY
MEMORIAL SERVICE**

Wednesday, September 12, 2001

Prior to the convening of the Assembly's Regular Floor Session, Members of the California State Assembly, staff and guests gathered in the Assembly Chamber for a special Memorial Service in the wake of Tuesday's tragic terrorist attack on America in Washington, DC and New York City.

OPENING REMARKS BY ASSEMBLY CHAPLAIN

Chaplain of the Assembly, Rabbi Mona Alfi offered the following opening remarks:

We have gathered together today to mourn for those who were murdered, to pray for the rescue of those who might still be alive and for the healing of those who have been injured.

Each of us comes from a different faith, a different history that brings us to this country. But we are united as Americans, united in our belief that our faith urges us to work towards peace.

I would like to thank the members of the Assembly for inviting all of the visiting members of the clergy in joining us today, recognizing the diversity of our community, and that each faith has something to teach us, and wisdom in which we can find comfort.

REMARKS BY SPEAKER OF THE ASSEMBLY

Rabbi Alfi invited Speaker Robert M. Hertzberg to the Rostrum, whereupon he offered the following remarks:

“Yesterday’s terrible actions by heartless and cowardly terrorists have shaken our country.

“Across the United States, across California, and in this very building, Americans are struggling today to cope with an unspeakable horror, with the calculated slaughter of hundreds—if not thousands—of innocent people.

“The full human toll is not yet known. What little we know is unfathomable—the images seared forever into the heart of every American. We surely face difficult days ahead, as we learn more about the tragic loss of life—including the 266 people lost aboard aircraft bound for Los Angeles and San Francisco.

“In California, where we have known fires, floods and earthquakes, we often see firefighters and police officers rushing into harm’s way to render assistance.

“Yesterday’s tragedy is compounded by the fact that so many emergency personnel also lost their lives in a valiant effort to save others.

“We send our heartfelt condolences to the families who will bear forever the scars of this atrocity—and they will remain in our thoughts and prayers. But we will not let these acts of terrorism bring our country to a halt, nor can they stop the process of government that guarantees our cherished freedoms.

“So, after a brief ceremony this morning to honor those who have been killed, we will go on with the business of the people.

“That is what we were elected to do. That is what democracy calls on us to do. And the best memorial we can offer to those who have died is to see that our democracy—and the free and open society that nourishes it—goes on. God bless us all.”

You should know that I spent Saturday and Sunday night at the World Trade Center last weekend and had it not been for session I would have still been there today. Mr. Chief Clerk: I am writing to clarify my intent, as author of Assembly Bill 1090, regarding new Civil Code provision 2941(b)(1)(D).

Subdivision (D) provides, in pertinent part:

“If the note or deed of trust, or any copy . . . is electronic, upon satisfaction . . . any electronic original, or electronic copy . . . shall be altered to indicate that the obligation is paid in full.”

Concern has been expressed to me that this provision could be construed to require all electronic copies of paper original documents to be marked “paid” when the loan is satisfied. That is not my intent. Rather, new subdivision (D) is intended to apply only in situations where the original note and deed of trust executed by the borrower are electronic. Where the original note and deed of trust are electronic, new subdivision (D) requires the electronic original, and any electronic copies of the electronic original not previously marked solely for use as a copy, to be marked “paid” upon satisfaction.

Dear Dotson: The terrible events of this week have touched the lives of all Americans, but have had a direct effect on dozens of California families, including one of my constituents. Several Californians perished in the catastrophe of the World Trade Center, the Pentagon, or on board the airplanes hijacked by the terrorists attacking our nation.

Those fallen Californians leave spouses, children, parents and others who depended on them for their financial sustenance. These survivors now find themselves in fear for their financial security even while they contend with the enormous grief. We cannot replace those who have been lost, but we can do something meaningful to ensure that those left behind can pay their mortgages, educate their children and rebuild their lives.

Federal legislation (H.R. 2884) has been introduced to exempt from income tax wages paid in 2000 and 2001 to employees lost in the terrorist act. I am informed that California will most likely conform to

that provision when the Legislature reconvenes in January. This is an important first step, but there is an additional step needed to get benefits into the hands of aggrieved survivors now.

California employers of workers who perished should be encouraged to assist survivors by paying a benefit to the families left behind. However, such a payment would either be deemed compensation, and thus taxable income subject to withholding for the survivors, or a gift which would be nondeductible for the employers.

I intend to author urgency retroactive legislation to ensure that the maximum amount of money is received now by families by making it clear that such payments are excluded from gross income. This legislation will also encourage employers to pay such an optional benefit by ensuring that it is fully deductible for employers.

I encourage my colleagues to join me in this much-needed effort.

Dear Dotson: On September 7, 2001, my AB 636 was amended at the continued insistence of the Department of Social Services to delete Section 3(c)(3) of the bill, which read:

In establishing compliance thresholds for each outcome measure, the workgroup shall take into consideration the extent to which the child welfare system is funded to meet the minimum workload standards recommended by the study conducted pursuant to Chapter 785 of the Statutes of 1998.

It was with great reluctance that I accepted this amendment. It is critically important that the state at least **consider** the importance of providing adequate resources to reduce social worker caseloads as recommended by the study conducted pursuant to SB 2030 (Costa) of 1998, in establishing compliance thresholds for counties. It is perhaps the most important investment we will make in improving the outcomes for foster children and youth upon which California's child welfare system will be judged by the federal government. **I continue to expect that the recommendations developed by the Task Force be fair and reasonable toward counties, given the resources afforded to them by the state.**

California's success in improving our fractured child welfare system, and minimizing future federal penalties, depends upon a genuine partnership between multiple state agencies, counties, schools, foster providers, parents and child advocates to work cooperatively toward the federally-required outcomes-based system. The accountability sought

in AB 636 is meant not only for individual counties—it is meant for the state as well, in the spirit of the partnership AB 636 is designed to foster, for the benefit of children and families dependent on California's child welfare system.

**Legislative Intent—Conference Committee Report
High Priority Schools Grant Program
for Low Performing Schools**

Gentlemen: A number of issues have arisen relative to the conference committee report on AB 961, the High Priority Schools Grant Program for Low Performing Schools. This letter is to clarify the intent of the Conference Committee relative to the conference report and the relationship of the High Priority Schools Grant Program for Low Performing Schools to current law.

1. With respect to funding. All schools participating in the High Priority Schools Grant Program (HPSGP) are required to participate in the Immediate Intervention/Underperforming Schools Program (II/USP). Current law (EC 52054.5) provides for all schools participating in the Immediate Intervention/ Underperforming Schools program (II/USP) to receive \$200 per pupil. The new HPSGP provides an additional \$200 per pupil to schools. Thus, it is intended that a total of \$400 per pupil be available to all schools participating in HPSGP.

2. With respect to textbooks and instructional materials. It is the intent of the conference committee that all pupils be provided with standards aligned textbooks and instructional materials. Therefore, nothing in this bill should be construed to impede timelines in existing law or AB 466 (Strom-Martin) which provide schools sufficient time to adopt state standards aligned textbooks and instructional materials approved by the State Board of Education.

Specifically, the conference committee report requires that participating schools certify that their teachers will participate in the professional development programs authorized by AB 466 (Strom-Martin). This measure, in turn, requires that schools use State Board of Education-approved instructional materials in grades K–8 in order to qualify for funding under AB 466.

There are, however, serious timeline inconsistencies between AB 466 and AB 961. For example, State Board approved materials in English/ Language Arts will not even be available until January 2002 and districts are not required under AB 466 to use those materials until 2003–04. It is the intent of the conference committee that to participate in AB 961, districts certify that they will also participate in the professional development programs provided in AB 466, but that districts not delay their implementation of AB 961 because they may exercise the flexibility provided to them in AB 466.

3. With respect to timelines of public hearings and the involvement of the school community at large. It is the intent of the conference committee that during the initial application process, schools and their districts hold the public meeting at a time that allows sufficient time for input from all interested parties in the school community at large, including the business community, community-based organizations, and local government.

4. With respect to sanctions and interventions. Current law (52055) requires that the governing board of a school failing to meet its annual short-term growth within 12 months must hold a public hearing to ensure that members of the school community are aware of the lack of progress. It is the intention of this conference committee that this same practice continue for schools participating in the HPSGP after 24 months. Further, current law (52056.5) states that schools failing to meet annual state growth targets are subject to sanctions, as specified under 52055.5. This conference report does not change current law. Further, it is the intent of this conference committee that following the intervention of the State Board of Education as an intermediate step to provide assistance and direction to school districts with schools that continue to fail to meet their growth targets, these schools will still be subject to existing sanctions [52055 (c)] at the discretion of the SPI and SBE.

5. With respect to the team established to prepare the school action plan. It is provided in current law and therefore also available in the HPSGP that the team established to develop the school action plan may also provide ongoing involvement throughout the implementation period and any subsequent interactions in the case of state intervention. In addition, that team and the entire school community, including local government, business and community-based organizations, is expected and encouraged to participate whole heartedly throughout the implementation of this school plan.

Dear Assemblyman Washington: This is in response to your letter of September 13, 2001 requesting information regarding the Byrne Formula Grant Program administered by the California Office of Criminal Justice Planning (OCJP).

The purpose of the Byrne Formula Grant Program is to provide seed money to State and local units of government to allow them to develop, implement, evaluate and replicate innovative projects that have a positive impact on drug abuse and violent crime, and then institutionalize those projects with state or local funds. Section 502 of the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act makes all States eligible to apply for and to receive Byrne formula grants. "State," as defined in Section 901(a)(2), means any State of the United States and includes the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the Commonwealth of Mariana Islands, the Virgin Islands, Guam and America Samoa.

The State Administrative Agency (SAA) is the organization designated by the Governor of that State to be responsible for the administration of the Byrne Formula Grant Program. In this case, OCJP has been designated the California SAA.

Byrne Formula Grant Program funds awarded to the State are further subgranted to State agencies and units of local government to carry out programs contained in an approved strategy. Awarding subgrants of Byrne Formula funds is one of the most important functions of the S.A.A.

In Section 504(f) of the Act, Congress has imposed a maximum funding period of 4 years (48 months) in the aggregate for projects funded under the Byrne Formula Grant Program. The purpose of this four-year rule is to encourage innovative programming, with States, local governments, and other grant recipients assuming the cost of programs proven to be successful following a reasonable period of

Federal support. Four years of funding provides a fair opportunity to demonstrate the value of funded programs and projects without creating a long-term dependency on Federal funding to support operational programs, regardless of their success. However, this funding prohibition falls only on individual subgrants, not on general programs funded by the SAA over time. That is, the SAA may fund different projects under the same program for more than 4 years, but it cannot fund the same projects under the same program for more than 4 years.

The Act identifies 28 purpose areas which are eligible for funding. However, the SAA could allocate all of its funds in a few of the purpose areas, if justified under its statewide strategy and permitted under state law.

Your letter requested responses to four specific questions relating to the Drug Endangered Children Program. The Drug Endangered Children Program is a previously funded program by the California SAA. DEC is no longer eligible to receive Byrne funding based on the 48 Month Rule which states "With the exception of multijurisdictional drug task forces, victim' assistance programs, or multijurisdictional gang task force, all projects funded with Byrne Formula Grant Program funds are restricted to four years of funding. This means that Byrne funds cannot be awarded to a subgrant recipient for a project that has already received four years of aggregate funding."

Finally, the SAA, not BJA, may establish mechanisms and procedures to review and award subgrants, as long as they are fair, and applied consistently. The State may establish programs priorities for submission of the applications based on their strategy and criteria.

"The creditor is required to provide, or continue to provide, the information required by this paragraph only if the cardholder has not paid more than the minimum payment for six consecutive months, after July 1, 2002."

Concern has been expressed to me that this provision could be construed to require that information specific to a cardholder's debt be provided beginning as July 1, 2002. In fact, my intent in inserting this date into this sentence was to provide that the counting of any six-month

period would begin on July 1, 2002. Consequently, the first time that the specific information may be required to be provided is January 1, 2003.

Dear Mr. Speaker: I respectfully submit this letter to clarify the intent of AB 910. I have authored this bill to protect wildlife conservation easements from urban and infrastructure development initiated by public agencies.

Although state law and easement contracts well protect conservation easements against private encroachment, properties under conservation easements are still largely vulnerable to condemnation from public agencies seeking to use them for alternative purposes. This legislation would effectively raise the “legal bar” necessary to condemn easement properties. Such enhanced legal protection is necessary because conservation easements, which represent substantial public investments and protect some of California’s most critical wildlife habitat, increasingly come under threat from urban growth.

Under AB 910, a public agency attempting to condemn a privately-held easement property, as defined in Section 1235.170 of the Civil Code of Procedure, must prove, by clear and convincing evidence, that its proposed use represents a higher public use than wildlife protection. The bill would furthermore require consultation between each of the public agencies with a stake in the easement property. Thus, AB 910 helps to ensure that the wildlife habitat values of private lands under easement receive due consideration during condemnation proceedings.

Indeed, AB 910 does not preclude the establishment of some public infrastructure across easement properties. Governmental entities may still obtain other easements, which do not interfere with wildlife conservation over the property in question. As provided in Civil Code of Procedure Section 1240.510, the proposed use may be accommodated, as long as the public infrastructure does not “unreasonably interfere” with the purposes of the conservation easement.

In summary, the balanced approach provided in AB 910 would help ensure that taxpayer-supported wildlife conservation easements withstand threats from urban growth over the long-term. Please do not hesitate to contact me if you have any questions or concerns.

Dear Mr. Wilson: Assembly Bill 1025 requires that every employer “shall make reasonable efforts to provide [employees] with the use of a room or other location, other than a toilet stall, in close proximity to the employee’s work location, to express milk in private.” I have been requested to clarify how AB 1025 would apply in a workplace, such as a small restaurant, which is so limited in space that there may be no place where an employee can express breast milk in private without fundamentally altering the structure of the building.

It is my intention that “reasonable efforts” would not include a requirement that an employer make significant structural alterations to a building. Thus, for example, it would be unreasonable to require a small restaurant that consists of nothing more than a dining area, kitchen, and bathroom, to construct a room specifically for the purpose of providing employees with a place to express milk in private. Doing so would eliminate space that is being used for another purpose essential to the operation of the business. However, I believe that such a situation should be the exception rather than the rule. Most workplaces have an office or other suitable location that can be made available to employees who desire to express breast milk in private. Moreover, if such a space is not immediately available, space can be found which can be readily converted or modified so that it can be used for that purpose. It should also be noted that nothing in AB 1025 prohibits an employer from making available space that is used for more than one purpose.

AB 1025 is intended to be a common sense piece of legislation designed to reasonably accommodate nursing mothers who need to express breast milk while at work.

Dear Mr. Speaker: My Assembly Bill 1176 adds Section 5307.2 to the Labor Code to clarify that the Administrative Director (AD) of the Division of Workers’ Compensation has the sole authority to promulgate a schedule regulating facility fees charged by outpatient surgery centers. The section also requires the Administrative Director to consider several specific factors when developing such a schedule.

The experience California had with the promulgation of the hospital inpatient fee schedule led me to include Section 5307.2 in AB 117.

Although it took more than three years to develop, the hospital inpatient fee schedule has been a disaster for injured workers, hospitals and insurance carriers. The AD has revised the fee schedule twice in the last year and a half, and yet many provisions remain problematic.

Recently, the Commission on Health and Safety and Workers' Compensation commissioned a study on the feasibility of promulgating an outpatient surgery center facility fee schedule. The draft report recommended a drastic reduction from the current market driven rate for these services. However, there was no analysis of why outpatient surgery centers exist; what it costs to operate them; how surgery centers improve outcomes; or how they provide quicker access to care, often with more technologically advanced equipment; or the resulting negative impact on surgery centers, hospitals and injured workers.

Section 128737 of the Health and Safety Code already requires the Office of Statewide Health Planning and Development (OSHDP) to begin collecting extensive outpatient surgery center in January 2002. Any effort by the Administrative Director to establish a fee schedule should include a detailed analysis of several years' of credible published information from this extensive independent data base.

If California is to regulate facility fees charged by outpatient surgery centers, it must be done in a manner that considers the interests of injured workers, employers and the surgery centers themselves. It is with this objective that I included Labor Code Section 5307.2 in my Assembly Bill 1176.

Thank you for permitting me to explain my intentions.

Dear Mr. Wilson: The intent of Assembly Bill 1287 is to delete objectionable language and to set appropriation levels for important outreach programs that are funded through the University of California. In acting on this measure, the Legislature in no way sanctions the Governor's use of his line item veto authority to add language to appropriation legislation or to delegate the Legislature's appropriation authority.

As part of the veto message for Item 6440-001-0001 of Section 2 of the Budget Act of 2001 (SB 739, Chapter 106, Statutes of 2001), the Governor inserted the words "up to" before the dollar amounts provided in Provision 10 that was established by the Legislature for various outreach programs. By doing so, the Governor created unprecedented discretion for the University of California to fund the programs at whatever level they determined, or even to not fund the programs at all. Moreover, his actions effectively delegated the Legislature's ability to determine funding priorities. The transferring of funding authority to the University of California by the Governor undercuts the Legislature's authority to appropriate funding in the manner in which it sees fit. In passing AB 1287, the Legislature is expressing its displeasure in the Governor's actions.

The Governor's action with respect to this item may well be unconstitutional. Rather than litigating the issue at this time, the Legislature believes that enacting AB 1287 is the most expedient and least disruptive method of correcting the budget item. We recognize that the State is now two and one-half months into the fiscal year, that University of California campuses are preparing to commence the school year and that program reductions adverse to the Legislature's desires could already be in process. Immediate action is necessary to protect from possible harm the outreach programs and the individuals served by them so as to ensure that the University student population in future years appropriately reflects the diversity of the people of our State.

Let the record show that AB 1287 reestablishes the Legislature's role in setting appropriation levels for University of California outreach programs and is not intended in any way to sanction or endorse the Governor's action of adding language to the Budget Act or the delegation of the Legislature's appropriation authority.

I offer this letter to clarify the legislative intent of Section 1 of Assembly Bill (AB) 1719 (Chapter 219, Statutes of 2001).

Section 1 of AB 1719 amended Education Code Section 89005.5, which was added to the code by Senate Bill 1392 (Davis) Chapter 847; Statutes of 1982. As placed in the code in 1982, this section stated that the name “California State University” is the property of the state, and that no person shall, without the permission of the Trustees of the California State University, use this name or any abbreviation of it in a number of specified ways, including to imply, indicate or otherwise suggest that any product or service of an organization is connected or affiliated with by the California State University.

AB 1719 amended Education Code 89005.5 to clarify that the name “California State University” includes the name of the California State University campuses, and their abbreviations, in which the words “California State University” do not appear: California Polytechnic State University, San Luis Obispo; California State Polytechnic University, Pomona; California Maritime Academy, Humboldt State University, Sonoma State University, San Francisco State University, San Jose State University, and San Diego State University.

In amending this section, AB 1719 is consistent with Education Code Section 89001, which lists the institutions that comprise the California State University, and expresses the intent of the Legislature in enacting SB 1392 in 1982.

Re: Letter to the Journal on AB 61 (Florez)

We respectfully submit this letter to clarify the purpose of AB 61.

This measure is fully and solely intended to provide funds for planning, design and construction of water systems for communities predominantly populated by farmworker and low-income families. The bill is intended to encourage adequate public systems to serve low-income, farmworker families. The access provided by AB 61 to the Safe Drinking Water State Revolving Fund administered by the State Department of Health Services with the addition of the phrase "private not-for-profit water companies" is intended to permit the access to planning, design and construction funds to small, rural not-for-profit companies whose projects are intended to serve low-income, farmworker families.

Finally, we believe that the current language of AB 61 is sufficiently ambiguous that it is essential that clarifying legislation be introduced during the 2002 Legislative Session in order to clarify the purposes of these changes in accordance with this letter. This legislation will be authored by Senator Burton, President pro Tempore.

This bill would allow higher education joint-use instructional facilities constructed after January 1, 2002, to be built to the standards contained in the California Building Standards Code rather than the Field Act if the Trustees of the California State University system or the Regents of the University of California are constructing the facilities.

I strongly support the Field Act, which provides greater earthquake protections for California schools than the California Building Standards Code. An exemption would be inconsistent with the State's policy of ensuring structural safety.

Veto Message—Assembly Bill No. 1030

To Members of the California State Assembly:

I am returning Assembly Bill 1030 without my signature.

This bill would appropriate \$140,000 and require the Superintendent of Public Instruction (SPI), in consultation with the Department of Health Services, to contract with a non-profit organization to conduct a study that would examine the lack of pupil school locker space, the weight of students' textbooks, and possible alternatives to students carrying heavy backpacks. The study would also examine the correlation between students' use of heavy backpacks and spinal damage, and the SPI would be required to report the study's findings to the Legislature by January 1, 2003.

While I am concerned with potential student health problems, there does not appear to be any documentation of long term problems caused by the use of backpacks. Medical experts advise that the incidence of any back, neck and shoulder pain can be minimized through use of a

well padded, adjustable back pack worn correctly to distribute the weight evenly. It is more appropriate that parents and local communities determine whether this is an issue of concern and work with local school districts for solutions.

For these reasons, I cannot sign this bill.

I am returning Assembly Bill 316 without my signature.

This bill would create a pilot grant program through January 2004 to fund one weekend parental involvement activity in each participating elementary school, subject to funds being appropriated in the Annual Budget Act or other measure, and would require the participating school to submit a self-evaluation to the Department of Education (CDE) by May 1, 2003. This bill would also limit the grant amount to be appropriated for this purpose to \$150,000 in any fiscal year and would require the CDE to compile the information and provide it to the Legislature by July 1, 2003.

This bill would create a new pilot program, for which no funding is appropriated in the Budget Act of 2001. I am a great proponent of greater parental involvement in educational activities and have signed three bills that provide \$15 million to support more parental involvement programs. These funds are in the 2001 Budget. If this pilot program, worthy though it may be, was extended statewide it would require an additional \$132 million. Given our rapidly declining economy there are no resources to support this program.

For these reasons, I cannot support the bill.

Further, this bill would require the department to report to the Governor and Legislature, by March 15, 2002, on the proposed rate-setting mechanism as well as strategies and incentives to improve recruitment and retention of qualified staff.

Establishing a rate-setting mechanism to adjust rates for local agencies providing services to developmentally disabled consumers is an important priority that merits review. However, DDS is currently conducting a study, expected to be completed in the fall of 2001, that addresses development of rate-setting mechanisms. Although the rate study specifically addresses residential care, geographic cost factors are also expected to be addressed and the information gained would be relevant to all high-cost area providers. It is more appropriate to await the results of the current residential rate-setting study before requiring a new study.

This bill requires that all state-owned or state-run institutions to purchase California grown fruit and produce before considering the purchase of produce grown outside of the state. Unfortunately, the 5% preferential allowance contained in the bill could result in significant costs to state and local governments and may also invite retaliatory actions by our domestic trading partners. Given the rapid decline of our economy and a budget shortfall of \$1.1 billion through the first three months of this fiscal year alone, I have no choice but to oppose additional General Fund spending.

I believe strongly in the goal of promoting California products. This year, I initiated a "Buy California" program, agreed to by the Legislature, which appropriated \$5 million to encourage consumer nutritional and food awareness and to foster purchases of high-quality California agricultural products. California received an additional \$12 million from the federal government to assist this program. Coupled with in-kind contributions from the agricultural industry, I believe this approach is a more effective means of encouraging Californians to increase their consumption and purchase of California produce.

I am returning Assembly Bill 1686 without my signature.

This bill would establish the Rice Straw Utilization Program by allowing end users of rice straw to claim a \$15 per ton tax credit for rice straw. To achieve this goal, the bill would appropriate \$788,000 from the General Fund, an amount equal to the unallocated rice straw tax

credits from 1997 through 2000. Moreover, it would create pressure for an estimated \$350,000 General Fund appropriation each year until 2007. Given the rapid decline in the economy and a budget shortfall of \$1.1 billion through the first three months of this fiscal year alone, I have no choice but to oppose additional General Fund spending.

The State, however, has dedicated significant resources to finding alternative uses for rice straw and biomass. In 1997, legislation was signed that established a two-year, \$5 million, grant program to develop alternative uses for rice straw. This was supplemented by an additional \$1 million in this year's budget. In 2000, I signed into law legislation that provided \$2 million for the Agricultural Biomass Utilization Account for the purpose of providing grant incentives for businesses that utilize biomass, including rice straw. These grants will be awarded by the Department of Food and Agriculture in the near future and I believe that we should give this program time to accomplish its purposes before embarking on a new approach. Finally, I recently approved the re-allocation of \$3.5 million to support the expansion of the Agricultural Biomass to Energy Incentive Grant Program by signing SB 64xx.

For the long-term benefit of the environment and the agricultural economy, we must work together to resolve the rice straw problem, and I remain committed to supporting the development of alternative uses for rice straw.

The 2001 Budget Act provided over \$26.6 billion to K–12 districts for discretionary purposes. Moreover, our economy is rapidly declining with a revenue shortfall of \$1.1 billion in the first three months of the fiscal year alone. Therefore, I do not believe that the supplemental funding provided in this measure is warranted, and I must return this bill without my signature.

Last year, I authorized \$2 million in the budget for the California Technology Assistance Project to conduct the 2001 School Technology Survey. This very detailed survey was just completed in August and contains much of the information requested in the AB148 study. Further, the California Technology Assistance Project is currently examining how to connect schools to the Digital California Project as well as developing a Digital California Project instruction manual for schools. These two items, alone or in concert, should be able to provide the information the author of AB 148 would like. Moreover, we cannot afford anymore new General Fund spending since our economy is rapidly declining and revenues are running \$1.1 billion below budget predictions in the first three months alone.

I applaud Assemblywoman Zettel's intentions and am pleased that she shares my vision for bringing technology to our schools and to our students.

This bill would establish the Youth Mentoring and Safe Communities Grant Program, which would provide grants to local public libraries for specified youth programs during non-school hours.

I support mentoring, after-school, conflict resolution, and other programs dedicated to improving the lives of youth in California. For this reason, I have provided substantial state funding in the 2001 Budget Act for various programs in these areas. For example, the 2001 Budget Act includes \$23.9 million for mentoring programs designed to assist at-risk youth to become productive members of society and reduce juvenile crime, teenage pregnancy, gang association, and the high school dropout rate. In addition, the Budget increased funding for the Carl Washington School Safety and Violence Prevention Act from \$71 million to more than \$82 million. Moreover, the Budget contains nearly \$53 million for the Public Library Foundation, which provides funding for local libraries to use in a wide variety of areas.

Consequently, based on the level of funding already available to other programs that provide a wide range of services to California youth, and because the state has experienced a \$1.1 billion revenue shortfall in the

first three months of this fiscal year, we unfortunately cannot afford to create a new program with \$400,000 of additional costs no matter how worthy.

This bill authorizes the PDI participants to apply to their school districts of employment for the reimbursement of accommodation costs if their schools are at least 70 miles from and require over 1½ hours travel time to an institute site.

While I support widely distributing PDIs across the state, I cannot support an additional \$800,000 in General Fund spending at this time. Our economy is rapidly declining and revenues have fallen \$1.1 billion below expectation during the first three months of this fiscal year. Moreover, I signed SB 573 last year, which created opportunities for teachers who live far away from institute sites to receive training through on-line courses.

This bill would require the Office of Statewide Health Planning and Development to administer scholarship and grant programs for students pursuing a bachelor's or master's degree in gerontology or medical residents who complete a fellowship in geriatrics in exchange for three years of practice in geriatrics/gerontology after graduation.

I have supported increasing the professional skills of the health service clinicians to appropriately respond to senior health issues. Last year, I signed AB 1820 (Wright) the "Geriatric Medical Training Act" which requires, after January 1, 2004, applicants for a physician's license to have completed coursework in geriatric medicine in medical school or in postgraduate medical education training and requires the Medical Board of California to establish criteria that providers of continuing medical education follow to ensure attendance by licensees throughout the entire course.

While this bill has merit, it creates a new unfunded program in a period of rapid decline in our economy and a budget shortfall of \$1.1 billion through the first three months of this fiscal year alone.

Although this bill may provide health studios with greater flexibility in providing a variety of services to their customers, I am concerned that this bill will permit health club studios to increase fees by up to 150%.

I would be willing to consider a bill that raises the \$1,000 limit on contracts, but only if it truly adds meaningful consumer protections such as a lower threshold for pro-rated refunds and a reasonable limitation on nonrefundable initiation fees.

I am returning Assembly Bill 142 without my signature.

This bill would prohibit a contract between a health care service plan and a health care provider from requiring or allowing the provider to accept financial risk for certain medications. This bill also requires the plans to reimburse providers on a fee-for-service basis for the medications the provider acquires pursuant to this bill.

This bill interferes with the private contractual relationships between plans and providers on many levels. Not only does it limit a plan and provider's ability to contract for the provider to assume the risk for certain medications, it sets the reimbursement rates for those services. Moreover, this bill effectively eliminates a plan's ability to use its strong purchasing power to buy medications in bulk at discounted rates. Not only is it bad public policy for the government to dictate the contractual relationships of private parties, this bill will lead to higher costs for consumers and employers.

Two years ago I signed SB 260, which created the Financial Solvency Standards Board within the Department of Managed Health Care. The FSSB has been working diligently with the Department to implement the provisions of SB 260 and meets monthly to continue its goal of providing comprehensive recommendations that address the complex issue of provider solvency of the State's managed health care system.

The Department and the FSSB should be allowed to continue its important work before new legislation in this area is considered.

This bill would make it the policy of the State, in selecting locations to lease, construct, or purchase buildings for the conduct of state business, to give priority to sites within mixed-use or commercial districts that have the greatest number of specified characteristics.

This measure is substantially the same as AB 2494 that I vetoed last year. I continue to believe that the planning goals and policies outlined in AB 545 are laudable, yet some of the specified characteristics may be inconsistent with one another and may result in frivolous litigation as a result of the negative and unintended consequences caused by the bill. The Department of General Services (DGS) works closely with state agency clients, local officials, and others to select appropriate sites, utilizing criteria substantially similar to that set forth in this bill. These include minimizing costs to the state and meeting community goals such as revitalizing inner cities and renovating historic buildings where appropriate. As I stated in my veto message of AB 2494, many such efforts are underway or have recently been completed.

Concurrent with action on this legislation, I am signing an Executive Order that recognizes the state's responsibility to consider the impacts of its real estate decisions on local communities while not obligating it to rigid standards that would invite litigation and jeopardize real estate negotiations.

I am returning Assembly Bill 1091 without my signature.

This bill, which is similar to legislation I vetoed last year, would prohibit any agreements between state departments and private entities that contain a "noncompetition" clause. Unfortunately, such a measure would eliminate any opportunity for future public-private partnerships to address California's infrastructure needs to meet the state's anticipated population growth over the next 20 years.

While the bill purports to have no effect on existing contracts, it would, in fact, impact the existing franchise agreement with the California Private Transportation Company (CPTC), owner of the State Route 91 franchise. That agreement grants CPTC the right to extend its facilities and protects the franchise from future changes in law that might impair the agreement. Because construction of one or more of the authorized extensions could require creation of an amended and restated franchise agreement signed after the effective date of this bill, that agreement could be declared void, thereby exposing the state to hundreds of millions of dollars in reimbursements to CPTC.

As I indicated in my veto of AB 2091 last year, "the State has a contractual relationship with the owners of the State Route 91 toll facility. Any participation by the State in abrogating our responsibilities

under that agreement makes the State vulnerable to legal action by the franchisee.” For these reasons, I cannot sign this bill.

Moreover, pending approval by the federal Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services, I have also provided \$150.2 million to expand the HFP to provide coverage to an estimated 138,000 uninsured parents with family incomes at up to 250 percent of the FPL. Additionally, in the 2001 Budget Act I have provided \$49.6 million to support HFP/Medi-Cal for Children outreach activities.

While I agree with the goal of maximizing enrollment health-care coverage, given the rapid decline of our economy and a budget shortfall of \$1.1 million through the first three months of this fiscal year alone, I have no choice but to oppose additional General Fund spending.

I am returning Assembly Bill 367 without my signature.

This bill would require school district governing boards to submit physical performance test results in writing to the parent or guardian of a student in grades 5, 7, and 9; require K–8 schools to double the physical education requirement for 7th and 8th grade students; require the California Department of Education (CDE) to develop curriculum content standards for school district physical education and ensure that districts are in compliance with statutory physical education requirements; and extend the sunset date for CDE's oversight of physical education from January 1, 2002 to January 1, 2007.

This bill would impose significant state-mandated costs upon school district governing boards by requiring school districts to report school physical fitness test results, in writing, to each pupil's parent or guardian. This bill's mandated reporting requirement would be reimbursable, resulting in General Fund costs in the millions of dollars. More significantly, the requirement to increase by 50% physical education time would result in additional costs of approximately

\$300 million annually. Given the rapid decline of our economy and a budget shortfall of \$1.1 billion through the first three months of this fiscal year alone, I have no choice but to oppose additional General Fund spending.

I agree with the intent of this legislation to encourage a higher level of physical fitness in our state's youth and I support the extension of CDE's oversight of physical education until January 1, 2007. However, I do not believe that increasing reporting requirements of local school districts is the proper way to improve student fitness. I would consider legislation that meets the goal of increasing students' physical fitness without mandating additional requirements on school districts.

For these reasons, I cannot support AB 367.

This bill would (1) add an alternate public member to the Commission on State Mandates, (2) limit the Commission from representing itself in court actions, (3) extend the time period by which local government agencies and school districts can file a claim for

reimbursement, (4) reduce the time period by which the State Controller's Office can audit a claim, (5) change the way claims are reimbursed through the State Mandates Claims Fund, and (6) change the way claims are removed from the State Mandates Apportionment System.

I believe that the existing timeframes for filing reimbursement claims with the state are quite generous and provide sufficient opportunity for local entities to submit reimbursement claims, therefore the changes proposed by this bill are unnecessary. In addition, by restricting the time period for the State Controller's Office to audit claims, this bill exposes the state to higher mandate claim costs. Further, while the state is required to reimburse local entities for costs mandated by the state, it should not be the State's responsibility to monitor the submission of claims by local governments and school districts to ensure claims are filed by the statutory timeframes. Accordingly, I am returning AB 745 without my signature.

In addition, because local transportation agencies receive close to three times the amount of the state's share of the Transportation Development Act funds, I would strongly encourage local transit agencies to make purchase and maintenance of this equipment a priority to secure the safety of both drivers and the public.

We have already provided a \$600,000 grant from Proposition 13 monies and will work with the author to try to identify other existing sources of money from other than the General Fund. Given these existing programs, the case for a new grant program is not compelling.

This bill would require health care service plans to consider various factors when developing rates by July 1, 2002 for the reimbursement of providers for the treatment of HIV-positive enrollees. This bill would also require that the Department of Health Services develop such risk-adjusted rates, subject to independent review by an outside 3rd party, to be applicable to managed care plans and primary care case management programs, for the treatment of HIV-positive Medi-Cal recipients.

This legislation improperly places an outside entity in the position of determining Medi-Cal rates which would set a bad precedent for other Medi-Cal rate adjustments. Requiring a particular rate-setting methodology would also limit DHS' ability to negotiate capitation rates with managed care plans in the future.

I am, however, very concerned about ensuring access to specialists for HIV/AIDS patients, which is why I signed AB 2168 last year designed to provide HIV/AIDS patients with access to standing referrals with specialists. I have been disturbed to find that due to a lack of board certification for such physicians (there is no definition of an HIV/AIDS specialist) it has been difficult for the Department of Managed Health Care to fully implement AB 2168.

Therefore, I am directing the Director of the Department of Managed Health Care to develop and adopt a regulation, to take effect as soon as possible, that defines an HIV/AIDS specialist for the purposes of this law. I believe that this approach will ensure that HIV-positive patients achieve increased access to HIV/AIDS specialists.

I have also proposed expanding continuity of care laws to ensure that people with HIV whose doctors group becomes insolvent or whose contracts are terminated with HMOs have access to the same doctor until the next open enrollment period.

I am very hopeful that these changes will increase access to the best care possible for persons with HIV.

I am returning Assembly Bill 504 without my signature.

This bill requires that when local school districts and the State Allocation Board develop and approve plans for “cookie cutter” schools that consideration be given to pupil and faculty safety. This consideration would include the placement, design or adequacy of school features, as it pertains to the siting of schools, traffic patterns, ingress and egress of pupils, and security devices, including alarms and other electronic safety devices.

I believe existing law places the highest priority on student safety and security starting with The Field Act of 1933. All plans utilizing school bond funds must be approved by the State Architect for compliance with the Field Act along with fire, life and safety issues. The Department of Education reviews school plans for siting issues, traffic patterns, and ingress and egress compliance. The State and local Fire Marshals approve fire safety issues and emergency access issues. The Carl Washington School Safety and Violence Prevention Act provides funds for school communication systems and finally the Department of Toxics must review and approve schools plans relating to toxic and other environmental safety issues. This year, I signed Senate Bill 575 (O'Connell) an important safety measure that requires automatic fire sprinklers in public school classrooms.

In addition to laws that insure the safe construction and operation of our schools, California has numerous student safety measures in place such as the School Safety and Violence Prevention Act, the School Law Enforcement Partnership, the Safe School Plan Implementation Grants, the Safe and Drug Free Schools program and the Communities Act Safety Plans for New Schools as well as dozens of state regulations.

I am a longstanding advocate of safe design, construction and operation of schools and student security. However, given the rapid decline of our economy and a budget shortfall of \$1.1 billion through the first three months of this fiscal year alone, I cannot support additional General Fund spending on a measure that is covered under existing law.

This bill would increase the Special Death Benefit payable on and after January 1, 2002, with respect to a deceased member who have been 50 years of age or older on January 1, 2001, eliminate the six-month limitation on highest compensation reciprocity when there is a break in service between memberships, and allow former members of a County Employees' Retirement Law of 1937 ('37 Act) retirement system, who withdrew their retirement contributions from the first system, and who are now employed by a different employer, as specified, to redeposit those contributions without reestablishing membership in the first system.

Providing a one-time increase in the Special Death Benefit allowance of California Public Employees' Retirement System's State members, as specified, would result in a present value cost of \$75.5 million, and would require additional State retirement contributions of \$6.4 million (1.9 million General Fund) annually.

The provision of this bill allowing former employees of '37 Act retirement systems to retain the right to repurchase retirement credits would result in an unfunded liability since '37 Act retirement systems currently assume no liability associated with refunded service credits.

Because these costs are not included in the 2001 Budget Act and because California's economy is weakening and State revenues are falling, I must return this bill without my signature.

The property would generate revenue for construction of the City's proposed "Great Expectations" project, a project that includes, among other elements, a new Transbay Transit Terminal and, as required by the bill, extension of the Peninsula Commute train to the new terminal.

While I support this exciting new project, I cannot support this bill because it would jeopardize the project schedule and cost estimates for completion of the west approach seismic retrofit portion of the San Francisco-Oakland Bay Bridge seismic retrofit and replacement project. This important safety project MUST proceed without delay.

Additionally, it contains provisions that would inadvertently impact improvements previously agreed to by the author and Caltrans. Although the author has agreed to sponsor cleanup legislation, it would not take effect in time to address the identified problems.

Caltrans has existing authority that allows it to transfer state-owned property to local governments through administrative processes. These processes allow the State to address key issues affecting the seismic retrofit program, and also allow for the consideration of appropriate terms and conditions under which the property would be transferred.

Accordingly, I am directing Caltrans to initiate procedures to transfer the property administratively with the necessary protections for the State that will also allow an important regional transportation improvement to proceed.

This bill seeks to reduce unnecessary calls to the 911 emergency telephone system by authorizing every local public agency to establish a 311 non-emergency telephone system. This 311 system would be funded by the imposition of an additional surcharge on intrastate telephone communication services.

It would be premature to implement this program at this time. The Department of General Services (DGS) has conducted research on the implementation of nonemergency pilot projects and has recommended that the State not invest in a 311 system without conclusive information regarding the relative benefits of such a program. Because this bill would authorize an additional surcharge to support this program, there should be significant justification to support the proposed level of the increase. None of the pilot studies have been able to provide this justification. In addition, local governments are already authorized to impose telephone surcharges on users within their jurisdictions, and

may use those revenues to establish nonemergency telephone systems. To the extent that individual communities determine a 311 program to be beneficial, local jurisdictions may implement such programs under existing law.

Finally, funding for the implementation and development of technical and operational standards for a 311 system are not included in this bill. For these reasons, I cannot sign this bill.

However, the bill makes no provision to ensure that projects for Indian tribes won't supercede projects planned in the State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP), and it doesn't contain sufficient safeguards or specific requirements to ensure that both local and regional transportation plans are not negatively affected by tribal funded and supported projects.

In vetoing similar legislation last year, I stated that "it is imperative that the greater community be given the opportunity to participate in the issues surrounding the proposed highway developments." This bill would interject the state into local land use and planning decisions best left to local communities and governments.

I am returning Assembly Bill 104 without my signature.

This bill would increase fees on every San Francisco Bay Area motorist by up to \$4 without a vote of the electorate for the purpose of funding water quality projects that mitigate the effects of pollution caused by motor vehicles.

I have supported and the state has provided substantial funding for these types of important projects. Proposition 13, approved by the voters last year, provides \$190 million for water quality nonpoint source projects and \$90 million for watershed protection and pollution

prevention projects. In addition, I have just signed Assembly Bill 1602, which if approved by the voters on the March 2002 statewide ballot, will provide additional funds to protect our natural resources, including funds that can help address motor vehicle-related water pollution. Specifically, AB 1602 includes \$300 million for water quality projects to protect our beaches, lakes, streams and rivers from pollution.

Given the rapid decline of our economy and increasing layoffs, the amount of money this program would raise does not warrant the additional burden on the motoring public.

I am returning Assembly Bill 177 without my signature.

This bill would authorize a school district superintendent or designee to address the academic needs of pupils suspended for more than five days. In addition, the bill would require the superintendent or designee to inform the parent or guardian of the pupil's right to have his/her academic needs addressed along with options available to meet those needs. Lastly, the bill would deem any testimony provided in an expulsion hearing to be privileged information pursuant to Civil Code provisions.

While the bill permits school districts to choose to address the academic needs of a student on extended suspension, it requires school districts to inform the parent of the pupil's right to have academic needs addressed. This parental notification requirement, though laudatory, creates a state mandate of several million dollars. Additionally, it is not clear to me that the vast majority of the school districts are not currently providing suspended students with academic material and course work when requested. Further, I strongly support the provisions of the bill that modify the rights of witnesses in expulsion hearings that enhance the ability of expulsion proceedings witnesses to come forward without risk of retaliatory civil suits, and I would consider a bill accomplishing this purpose.

However, because AB 177 will result in several million dollars of mandated costs, I cannot support this measure.

This bill would make various changes regarding curriculum, model academic standards, and the attributes of career technical education courses within grades 7 through 12. These changes include revising the process by which the Superintendent of Public Instruction develops and the State Board of Education adopts curriculum standards, requiring development of model curriculum standards by May 1, 2003 for

career technical education courses, and requiring CSU, as well as requesting UC, to develop model academic standards and a high school accreditation process related to recognizing career technical education as university preparation. The bill states it is the intent of the Legislature to appropriate funds for this purpose in the 2001–02 Budget Act.

I am supportive of improving career technical education, as evidenced by the \$5.5 million included in the 2001–02 budget for this purpose. I am also supportive of the concept of having a role for employers and stakeholders in developing the model curriculum standards. However, the funds appropriated in the 2001–02 Budget Act could not be used by the Department of Education to develop the model curriculum because they are only available for allocation to local education agencies. As a consequence, this bill would impose new General Fund costs in the hundreds of thousands of dollars on the Department of Education. I am also concerned that this bill may have the potential for significant local assistance cost pressures by compelling districts to change curriculum to meet new requirements of the postsecondary institutions. Given the rapid decline of our economy and a budget shortfall of \$1.1 million through the first three months of this fiscal year alone, I have no choice but to oppose additional General Fund spending.

I am returning Assembly Bill 769 without my signature.

This bill would establish the School-to-Career Technology Training Center Program. Twenty work force coalitions would each receive \$25,000 grants to develop training centers to provide technology instruction to CalWORKs recipients. These centers would be open for at least four hours per day and also would allow these recipients to access centers after normal school hours. Participating high schools would receive funding through either existing programs or, if providing after-school service, adult education average daily attendance (ADA) funds. Participating industries would be required to provide specified benefits to program graduates.

I am concerned that this bill would permit school districts or county offices of education to use a variety of fund sources that are currently dedicated to other programs or services, including core academic instruction. If participating schools are unable to redirect existing funds, the bill could create a Proposition 98 General Fund cost pressure of up to \$10 million. Furthermore, this bill creates an ongoing cost of at least \$1.1 million to provide adult education ADA for adults who utilize the training centers after regular school hours, and a one-time cost of \$500,000 for planning grants. Given the rapid decline of our

economy and a budget shortfall of \$1.1 billion through the first three months of this fiscal year alone, I have no choice but to oppose additional General Fund spending.

For these reasons, I cannot support this measure.

Given the

rapid decline of our economy and a budget shortfall of \$1.1 billion through the first three months of this fiscal year alone, I have no choice but to oppose additional General Fund spending.

For these reasons, I cannot sign this bill.

This bill would allow Adult Education in Correctional Facilities programs to increase their Average Daily Attendance (ADA) by up to 5.0 percent above the current statutory increase of 2.5 percent from 2002–03 to 2005–06, inclusive, if the increase is a result of an increase in the number of courses in the prevention of domestic violence and substance abuse. Programs that receive this proposed increase would be required to maintain, for three years, records on inmate enrollment in these courses and completion rates.

I support the Adult Education in Correctional Facilities Program and the services they provide to help reduce recidivism. This bill would triple the statutory growth in funding from 2.5 to 7.5 percent. Given our declining economy and the loss of \$1.1 billion in revenues in the first 3 months of the fiscal year alone, we cannot commit to such an increase. In fact, I recently asked all of my departments outside of law enforcement to prepare budget cuts of 15 percent. Finally, if these classes have demonstrated their effectiveness in reducing recidivism, I would expect correctional facilities to provide these classes on a priority basis from within existing resources.

For these reasons, I cannot support this measure.

This bill would specify that the 1992–93 allocation from the Special District Augmentation Fund to the Los Angeles County Consolidated Fire Protection District (District) be based on the amount of property taxes “identified for transfer” to the District, not the amount of property taxes actually received by the District.

In a May 2001, State Controller's Office (SCO) audit of Los Angeles County, the SCO found that the Los Angeles County Auditor-Controller improperly allocated property taxes retroactive to 1992–93. As a result, the Education Revenue Augmentation Fund (ERAF) owes the District funds the District overpaid to the ERAF from 1992–93 through 1996–97. The SCO also found as part of that calculation correction, that the District owes the ERAF approximately \$9 million annually since 1993–94. It is my understanding that there is disagreement between the SCO and the District with regard to offsetting the amount that is owed to the District with the amounts that the District underpaid based on the calculation correction.

I am vetoing this bill because it would result in the ERAF not receiving the prospective \$9 million annual payment it is due from the District. Without these property tax revenues for schools, the State's General Fund would be required to make up this funding. In addition, I believe it is premature to address the prospective amounts owed to the ERAF based on the SCO audit without also addressing the retroactive amounts owed to the District.

This bill would establish the Elder and Dependent Adult Financial Abuse Protection Program within the Office of Criminal Justice Planning, the purpose of which would be to combat the financial abuse of elder and dependent adults.

Notwithstanding the merits of the bill, it creates a new statewide program requiring new General Fund allocation at a time when the economy is rapidly declining and state revenues have fallen \$1.1 billion during the first three months of this fiscal year alone, below budget predictions.

In addition, budgeted resources already exist to combat elder abuse. Over the past two years, I have expanded the Adult Protective Services program (APS) statewide by providing counties with funding to combat elder abuse both physical and financial. The 1999 Budget Act included a \$34.9 million allocation to the APS for enhanced investigation of reports of elder and dependent abuse, including financial abuse. This funding also included services for victims including emergency shelter, in-home protective care, food and transportation. I have also signed

legislation authorizing counties to create interagency elder death review teams, assisting the prosecution of elder abuse cases, and training nursing home staff in the recognition and reporting of such abuse. The Attorney General's Office also has a significant level of state and federal resources to investigate and prosecute cases of elder abuse.

For these reasons, I must veto this measure.

I am returning Assembly Bill 69 without my signature.

This bill would allow specific governmental entities in Los Angeles County, which are currently Southern California Edison customers, to enter into direct-access electricity contracts with the Los Angeles Department of Water and Power.

Last June, approximately two percent of the customer load in the territory served by the three investor-owned utilities (IOUs) were receiving power from direct access providers. The Public Utilities Commission (PUC) recently suspended direct access, but the percentage of load subject to direct access transactions grew to as much as 13 percent or more prior to the suspension. That growth creates a significant and unfair cost burden for those customers who continue to receive power from the IOUs and the Department of Water Resources.

This rapid growth in direct access necessitates more concise cost-containment provisions for the remaining IOU customers than those contained in this bill, and those provisions should apply to *all* direct access contracts.

Moreover, this bill does not clearly authorize fees to cover costs that may result when direct access customers return to service with an IOU, which would create new and unanticipated procurement obligations for the IOU. Those new procurement obligations could come about solely because the direct access provider no longer chooses to provide service to its customers because of rising electricity costs, and instead passes that burden on to the IOU and its customers.

Any efforts to allow direct access must be equitable for all stakeholders.

The State of California, however, had to step in to assume the responsibility of buying power since January because the state's flawed deregulation scheme drove two of three of our investor-owned utilities toward the brink of bankruptcy—PG&E eventually filed for bankruptcy. Since mid-February the State also assumed the responsibility for purchasing power for the customers of Sempra, as well as PG&E and Southern California Edison.

The state has incurred costs of approximately \$10 billion to keep the lights on and must sell revenue bonds to reimburse taxpayers for those expenditures. Any new municipal utility district must be structured in a way to bear its fair share of those costs. This bill makes no provision in that regard.

I would, however, sign legislation next year that meets the conditions I have expressed in this message.

I believe strongly that it is time to increase the level of compensation benefits offered to injured workers. It is also time to make significant improvements to the system so it better serves both the injured workers and all Californians. A comprehensive bill to improve the system should have four goals:

- 1) Providing a significant benefit increase for injured workers;
- 2) Promoting early and sustained return to work within the person's medical and work restrictions;
- 3) Implementing effective medical cost containment measures while assuring the quality of care provided; and
- 4) Targeting benefit dollars to achieve the best outcomes for injured workers.

I am concerned about the net economic impact of SB 71 and AB 1176 in these shaky economic times since I do not believe the two bills taken together adequately address the final three goals listed above.

Since there is a general agreement about the need to increase benefits for injured workers, I believe that if we work together, the legislature, my staff and the interested parties can craft a comprehensive bill reaching all four goals before the 2002 legislative session begins. For the above reasons, I must veto this bill.

Existing law specifies the percentages of the total amount wagered that are deducted for the "takeout" (i.e. license fees, purses, and commissions). This bill would allow thoroughbred racing associations and horsemen to agree between themselves to change the percentages. I do not believe this is good public policy.

Additionally, this measure would promote an activity that could have a potential for a negative impact on the horse racing industry. For example, if the agreement were to decrease the takeout, the amount returned to the wagering public would be increased. However, if the agreement were to increase the takeout, then the amount of money returned to the wagering public would be decreased. Because the bill does not specify a maximum cap for the negotiated percentage, it could dramatically change the current statutory framework. No case has been made for such a drastic change.

Many people, including breeders, depend on a healthy horse racing industry. I would be open, however, to any changes to existing statutory formulas that the California Horse Racing Board recommends. I note that the Board is opposed to this measure.

As a result, I am deleting the \$7 million General Fund appropriation contained in the bill.

This bill reauthorizes the pesticide mil assessment, which funds approximately 60% of the programmatic activity of the Department of Pesticide Regulation (DPR), at the current rate of 17.5 mils until June 30, 2004. I am signing this bill to maintain the current assessment rate because it does not add an additional financial burden on the

regulated industries. Moreover, this action will avoid the potential for the assessment to revert to an unacceptably low level in future years.

However, I am directing the Director of DPR to bring the stakeholders together as specified by this bill to help craft a longer term solution for support of the Department.

I am committed to the continuation of California's nationally renowned pesticide regulatory program and the benefits it provides. Because DPR has sufficient funding for the current fiscal year, I believe that addressing the funding shortfall for the 2002-03 fiscal year during the budget development process would be more appropriate.

The Program will greatly assist efforts to increase academic performance in California schools by enabling 176,000 teachers and 22,000 instructional aides or paraprofessionals to participate in high-quality professional development activities over a four-year period.

However, I am reducing from the bill the \$1.0 million of the \$1.2 million appropriation to the Department of Education for purposes of administering the Mathematics and Reading Professional Development Program. The compelling need for this level of funding is unclear, as the 2001 Budget Act appropriates \$515,000 to the Department of Education for the purpose of Program administration, which is responsible for the most significant workload. I am sustaining \$200 thousand to assist the Superintendent of Public Instruction in allocating the funding for this important program.

Additionally, in subsequent legislation, the provision requiring the State Board of Education to establish an appeal process for audit

findings for this program should be removed. This provision conflicts with current law, which established the Education Audits Appeal Panel.

I have signed Assembly Bill 343 with a deletion. I am deleting the appropriation in Section 4(b) of up to \$250,000 for the educational grant program created in Section 2 of this bill. Section 2 would create the grant program by adding Section 31119 to the Public Resources Code. Section 4(b) would allocate funds originally appropriated in Schedule (3) of Item 3760-301-00001 of the 2000 Budget Act to fund the new program.

This bill would allow the State Coastal Conservancy to use up to \$250,000 of a General Fund capital outlay appropriation to undertake educational projects for all ages relating to the protection, preservation, enhancement or maintenance of coastal resources and to award grants to nonprofit organizations, educational institutions and public agencies for this purpose. The bill would also allow the reallocation of \$3,750,000

General Fund originally appropriated for the purchase and restoration of the Bel Marin Keys property to purchase alternate properties in Marin County.

I cannot support the \$250,000 General Fund allocation at this time. To the extent that grant funding is awarded by the Conservancy to local educational agencies or to community colleges, such funds would raise the Proposition 98 funding guarantee by the same amount, thus reducing future budgetary flexibility.

Although grants awarded from non-General Fund sources should not affect the Proposition 98 guarantee, I am concerned that there may be confusion on this point in the future. Consequently, I urge the legislature to pass corrective legislation clarifying that this program cannot be used to award grants to local educational agencies or community colleges when the source of funds for those grants is the General Fund.

I am signing Assembly Bill 1018 with a line item veto.

This bill establishes the Industry-Based Certification Incentive Grant Program, which is an innovative approach to using one-time funds for matching the skills that are taught to students with the certification standards that are set by an industry. AB 1018 would allow the Department of Education (SDE) to redirect funds identified in this bill to develop model curriculum standards. Finally, this bill would require the SDE to allocate any savings resulting from this program for the purposes of the School-to-Career Technology Training Center Program, which is contained in AB 769 (Goldberg).

I am signing this bill, with the understanding that the funding earmarked for this bill will fully fund both planning grants and implementation grants, on a one-time basis, for the Industry-Based Certification Incentive Grant Program. I must however, delete the funding which is provided for the SDE for model curriculum standards, as this provision would be in conflict with the constitutional restrictions on the use of Proposition 98 funds. In addition, I am deleting the provision that requires the SDE to allocate any savings from the Industry-Based Certification Incentive Grant Program to the Industry Based Certification Incentive Grant Program. AB 769 would result in significant costs, which I cannot commit to given the fiscal condition of the state.

The following language reflects my veto action:

SEC. 3. (a) (1) Of the amount specified in Schedule (27) of Item 6110-485 of Section 2.00 of the Budget Act of 2001, four million ~~four~~ *three* hundred fifty thousand dollars (~~\$4,450,000~~) (\$4,350,000) is hereby allocated to the State Department of Education as follows:

(1) Four million three hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$4,350,000) for purposes of the Industry-Based Certification Incentive Grant Program established by Article 3.5 (commencing with Section 52360) of Chapter 9 of Part 28 of the Education Code.

(2) One hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) for purposes of Section 51226 of the Education Code.

(b) The State Department of Education shall allocate any of the funds described in subdivision (a) that it determines are not necessary for those purposes to any of the following purposes:

(1) Article 3.5 (commencing with Section 52360) of Chapter 9 of Part 28 of the Education Code; Industry-Based Certification Incentive Grant Program.

(2) Section 51226 of the Education Code.

(3) Chapter 17.1 (commencing with Section 52360) to Chapter 9 of Part 28 of the Education Code; the School-to-Career Technology Training Center Program.

On this date I have signed Assembly Bill 649 with these instructions.

In settlement of the matter of CAHP v. DPA et al. (Case No. C032246, the case before the State of California Third District Court of Appeal), it is the intent of Assembly Bill 649 (Negrete McLeod) that the State shall compensate sworn represented Bargaining Unit 5 employees of the California Association of Highway Patrolmen (CAHP) the estimated average total compensation for each corresponding rank for the Los Angeles Police Department, the Los Angeles Sheriff's Office, the San Diego Police Department, Oakland Police Department and the San Francisco Police Department. Total compensation shall include base salary, education incentive pay, physical performance pay, longevity pay and retirement contributions made by the employer on behalf of the employee.

The State and the CAHP shall utilize the survey methodology outlined in the document "Description of Survey Process Pursuant to Government Code 9827 Regarding the Recruitment and Retention of California Highway Patrol Officers" dated July 1, 2001. This survey methodology will be maintained as a permanent agreement between the State and the CAHP and will be introduced in legislation January 2002. Increases in the total compensation resulting from this subdivision shall be implemented through memorandum of understanding pursuant to the Ralph C. Dills Act. Failure to reach agreement shall not relieve the State of its obligation to compensate sworn represented officers of the California Highway Patrol consistent with methodology included in the above titled document.

The Appellate Court gave a verbal order to the parties to file their motion to dismiss this case based on the fact that the parties reached a settlement on or before November 14, 2001.

It requires the Commissioner of the California Highway Patrol (CHP) to collect accident statistics on these vehicles on an ongoing basis and present a report to the Legislature in order to allow both the Administration and the Legislature the opportunity to suggest necessary changes to the law. AB 67 also creates a safety committee led by the CHP Commissioner to design a safety video and provide maps of approved roadways which the motor home industry has pledged to place in **all** vehicles over 40 feet in length sold throughout the country. I believe that as a result of these measures, California will lead the nation in terms of safety measures governing the use of motor homes over 40 feet in length.

I am signing Assembly Bill 544 which would amend the Escrow Law to limit the Escrow Agents' Fidelity Corporation (EAFC) coverage to losses occurring in California, would require escrow agents to be responsible to EAFC for losses of escrow funds caused by employees who have failed to have current certificates from EAFC, and would remove a redundant provision from the definition of "trust obligation."

AB 544 does not make substantive changes to the definition of "trust obligation" in the Escrow Law, but instead removes a redundant provision. In light of this change, the definition of "trust obligation" continues to include all money and property on deposit or in trust with the escrow agent, including the types of checks deleted from the definition of "trust obligation."

With this understanding, I am signing AB 544 because it will not have an impact on existing law and programs.

To the Members of the California Legislature:

I am signing AB 489 which will add important safeguards to existing law to protect borrowers of certain home loans from lending practices and loan terms which are unfair or potentially deceptive. Such loans target our most vulnerable citizens—seniors, first generation immigrants, and lower income families. By focusing on the serious abuses of a small minority of lenders, this bill establishes significant new protections for consumers in California.

I am concerned, however, that AB 489 does not contain definitive language that would preempt local governments from enacting their own versions of anti-predatory lending legislation. As a result, California lenders could be faced with the need to comply with multiple local ordinances in addition to current federal and state legislation in this field. Without a clear preemption provision, the lending community may be faced with the difficult decision of withdrawing from certain markets. I do not believe this would well serve the consumers of California and I would urge the Legislature to address this important issue.

In addition, the bill precludes equity based lending for covered loans, even though it has been demonstrated that such loans serve a legitimate need. Given the uncertainties of our economy, the bill may limit access to capital for those who need it most. Access to one's own equity may allow for the start of a new business, or allow a recently displaced worker additional time to secure new employment. I would again urge the Legislature to address the borrowing needs of those displaced by short term economic downturns and give such borrowers an alternative to selling their home.

Many of these shelters had been consistently funded for years and serve rural areas where women and children who are victims of violence may find few other safe places to turn for help. I am particularly disturbed by the fact that the nation's longest-serving domestic violence shelter, located in Pasadena, lost funding because they used too many pages to describe their program.

My Administration, from Day One, has strongly supported programs to end domestic violence and protect women and children from abuse. I am directing the Department of Finance to report back to me on ways of streamlining all programs that provide financial support for domestic violence shelters in and effort to maximize existing funding and keep this important safety net intact.

I am directing that the department request authority for the needed investigative positions through the 2002–03 budget process.

Implementing the new fraud detection provisions as part of the AAG system will mean that the Department will not meet the bill's implementation deadline of July 1, 2002, nor will it meet the required date of July 1, 2004 for a report on the impact of AAG on WIC. Consequently, I am requesting that the author pursue legislation to extend the implementation deadlines.

This bill will create a San Diego County Regional Airport Authority and transfer operation of San Diego International Airport-Lindbergh Field from the Unified Port District to the new Airport Authority.

The authors of this legislation, Assemblymember Howard Wayne and Senator Steve Peace are to be commended for measurably advancing the airport debate in San Diego County. For decades, civic leaders have considered a number of sites for a new international airport, including Camp Pendleton, Carmel Valley, joint use of Rodriguez International Airport in Tijuana, Miramar Marine Air Station, North Island Naval Air Station, offshore, Otay Mesa, and an expanded Lindbergh Field.

My reluctance in signing this bill stems from three concerns:

1. The transfer of San Diego International Airport to the new Authority by December 2, 2002 would be premature. Planning for a new or expanded airport and a decision on its location should precede the transfer of airport operations from the Unified Port District to the Regional Airport Authority.
2. This legislation fails to clearly vest land use powers in the Authority.
3. The Regional Airport Authority's recommendation on the location of a new international airport or expanded Lindbergh Field should be subject to a countywide public vote.

However, I am signing this bill because it advances the public debate on the future of Lindbergh Field.

Vesting exclusive responsibility in this single Authority to determine San Diego's long term airport needs is good public policy. Transferring airport facilities and providing authority to coordinate airport related mass transit with transportation planning agencies is also a positive step towards consolidating infrastructure decision making in the county. In addition, a certified audit of San Diego International Airport, commissioned jointly by the Unified Port District and the Regional Airport Authority will provide essential and objective revenue information.

The incremental approach to airport siting embodied in AB 93 is preferable to no approach at all. For this Airport Authority to

successfully accomplish its mission it must have the ability to plan and site an airport, a dedicated revenue stream, and the support of San Diego County's electorate. Therefore, I have asked for and received a commitment from the authors that urgency legislation will be introduced in January 2002 to accomplish the following:

- Provide the Regional Airport Authority with clear authority to plan and site a new international airport or expand Lindbergh Field.
- Require the Port of San Diego to fund all operating expenses of the Regional Airport Authority until the effective date of the transfer of San Diego International Airport.
- Require a countywide public vote on the recommendation of the Regional Airport Authority for an expanded Lindbergh Field or the site of a new international airport. This vote is to occur no sooner than November 2004, and no later than November 2006.
- Clarify that designating the Regional Airport Authority as the only county agency to receive state or federal grants for airport planning and improvements will not jeopardize the receipt and pass through of those grants.
- Postpone the effective date of the transfer of San Diego International Airport operations and property until the voters of San Diego County have approved the site recommendation of the Regional Airport Authority.

PROCLAMATION OF THE GOVERNOR

The following Proclamations of the Governor were received and printed in the Journal:

PROCLAMATION

by the
Governor of the State of California

WHEREAS, an extraordinary occasion has arisen and now exists requiring that the Legislature of the State of California be convened in extraordinary session; and

WHEREAS, on January 3rd, 2001, I convened the 2001–02 First Extraordinary Session of the Legislature to deal with a broad range of energy issues, including the availability and supply of electrical power and natural gas; and

WHEREAS, on May 14th, 2001, after the first extraordinary session was adjourned, I convened the Second Extraordinary Session of the Legislature to deal again with a broad range of energy issues; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary to convene the Third Extraordinary Session of the Legislature to conclude deliberations and take action on specific critical energy issues;

NOW, THEREFORE, I GRAY DAVIS, Governor of the State of California, by virtue of the power and authority vested in me by Article IV, Section 3(b) of the Constitution of the State of California, do hereby convene the Legislature of the State of California to meet in extraordinary session at Sacramento, California, on the 9th day of October, 2001, at a time appointed by each house of the Legislature of said day for the following purpose and to legislate upon the following subjects:

WHEREAS, on September 27, 2001, pursuant to Article IV, section 3(b) of the Constitution of the State of California I issued a Proclamation convening the Legislature of the State of California to meet in extraordinary session on October 9, 2001, to consider and act upon legislation affecting the operation, maintenance, finances, and financial viability of investor-owned utilities that provide electricity or natural gas to California residents and businesses, including their procurement portfolios and practices, and service by alternate energy providers in their service territory; and

WHEREAS, the principal purpose of that extraordinary session was to consider enactment of legislation to implement a Memorandum of Understanding between the California Department of Water Resources and Southern California Edison, an investor-owned utility whose financial viability has been the subject of serious concern; and

WHEREAS, on October 2, 2001 the California Public Utilities Commission and Southern California Edison announced that they have settled litigation pending between them in a manner which, if approved by the United States District Court for the Central District of California, will restore the financial viability of Southern California Edison; and

WHEREAS, that settlement agreement, if approved, will make it unnecessary for the Legislature to address further the financial viability of Southern California Edison in a third extraordinary session;

NOW, THEREFORE, I GRAY DAVIS, Governor of the State of California, by virtue of the power and authority vested in me by Article IV, Section 3(b) of the Constitution of the State of California, do hereby rescind the Proclamation issued on September 27, 2001, convening the Legislature of the State of California to meet in extraordinary session on October 9, 2001.

EXECUTIVE ORDER D-46-01

by the

Governor of the State of California

WHEREAS, the siting of state offices in central business districts or “downtowns” can strengthen and revitalize California’s cities and towns; and

WHEREAS, the state owns, purchases, builds, and leases property, including office space, worth billions of dollars for educational, correctional, recreational, conservation, transportation, communication, public health and related public functions; and

WHEREAS, the state, having completed a legislatively mandated inventory of all its property pursuant to its asset management function established by Executive Order D-77-89, ought to engage in clear, consistent, coherent, and comprehensible practices, priorities, principles, policies, and programs concerning its holdings; and

WHEREAS, given the significant impact of the state’s commercial real estate investment, the state’s policy herein shall guide the location of both leased and newly acquired state offices. This policy is designed to support sound growth patterns in California’s cities and towns, by using existing state-owned assets, reducing costs to the state and its taxpayers in leases and operating expenses, ensuring accessibility to state services and facilities for both customers and employees, reducing traffic congestion, and improving air quality.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, GRAY DAVIS, Governor of the State of California, by virtue of the power and authority vested in me by the Constitution and statutes of the State of California, do hereby issue this order to become effective immediately:

IT IS ORDERED that as the state’s chief real estate manager, the Department of General Services, as well as other entities managing state properties in populated areas shall give priority to the needs of public entities and the populations they serve consistent with the cost-effective use of state revenues.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the ownership of facilities shall be preferred where the need is continuing and long-term.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that existing resources and facilities shall be used where adequate and appropriate.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that sound and smart growth patterns shall receive maximum support consistent with the foregoing state priorities, including the following considerations:

- a) Preferred siting or leasing in a central city or area of similar character immediately adjacent thereto;
- b) Construction or renovation of state-owned office buildings with site plans and architectural designs of the highest quality;
- c) Sensitivity to building design and scale and environmental concerns;
- d) Proximity to public transit and other needed infrastructure;
- e) Proximity to affordable and available housing;
- f) Pedestrian access to retail and commercial facilities, and exploiting opportunities for mixed use;

- g) Indications of the need for neighborhood economic revitalization;
- h) Opportunities to utilize structures of historic, cultural or architectural significance;
- i) Communication with residents, property owners and businesses regarding local concerns;
- j) Advice and recommendations of local elected officials and their staff with consideration to any incentives offered by local government.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the Department of General Services is given responsibility and authority for implementing this order. All other state agencies and departments shall cooperate accordingly.

I FURTHER DIRECT that, as soon as hereafter possible, this order be filed in the Office of the Secretary of State and that widespread publicity and notice be given to this order.

STATEMENT OF ASSEMBLY EXPENDITURES PRINTED IN JOURNAL

The following Statement of Assembly Expenditures was ordered printed in the Journal:

The Honorable Robert M. Hertzberg

Speaker of the Assembly

State Capitol, Sacramento, California

Dear Mr. Speaker: Transmitted herewith is the annual report of Assembly expenses. It includes the total expenditures by Member, committee, leadership office, service operation, and overhead according to various categories for the 12-month period ending November 30, 2000. Every expenditure made from the Assembly Operating Fund during this period is accounted for. Additionally, the report includes an itemization, by Member, of per diem expenditures from the General Fund during the same period of time.

It is important to note that this report is compiled on a cash basis. Therefore, the cost of goods and services incurred by a Member during the preceding reporting period but paid for during the current period are included. Furthermore, some goods and services which were received toward the end of this reporting period were not paid for until the beginning of the December 2000–November 2001 reporting period and are, therefore, not included in this expenditure report.

The following indicates the types of expenditures which are included within each classification:

Staff Salary: This includes the salaries paid to all employees in the Member's district office as well as those employees who work in the Member's Capitol office, provided they are not committee or leadership office personnel. The salaries of the latter group of employees are included in the specific detail report for each of the respective committee and leadership offices.

All Assembly personnel are classified according to job descriptions approved by the Assembly Rules Committee. The committee has established specific salary ranges for each of the classifications. The salary within a range for a specific employee reflects a combination of years of service in his or her position and his or her own job performance since the amount of annual merit salary increases is based on evaluations of each employee's work. Thus, a Member whose office staff includes employees with substantial Assembly seniority, and/or outstanding records of service, will have a higher total expenditure for salaries than will a Member who employs more junior personnel.

Member Travel and Per Diem: Separate totals are shown for in-state travel and out-of-state travel. Most in-state travel expenditures are for attendance at interim committee hearings. Out-of-state travel expenditures are generally for participation in conferences dealing with an issue area pertinent to the legislative specialty of the Member or are for investigative trips.

Staff Travel: This category includes the expenditures incurred for the Capitol and district staff traveling for legislative business. It also includes mileage reimbursements to district office personnel. The staff travel expenditures reported by committee, are generally costs incurred in connection with interim committee hearings which are generally held away from Sacramento for the convenience of citizens who wish to provide testimony to the committees.

Car Lease: The amount reported in this category is the share of the automotive lease payment made by the Assembly Rules Committee. Assembly policy stipulates that a car will be leased for the legislative use of each Member but that the Assembly will pay only 90% of the monthly lease rate or \$400, whichever is less. The Member must pay the difference from personal funds.

Car Maintenance: The costs reported in this category will vary significantly because of the variance in the number of miles driven by the Members. Members in large-sized districts and Members who represent districts wherein air travel between the Capitol and the district is not practical tend to utilize their cars more than other Members. Accordingly, the maintenance costs of such cars is likely to be higher than for others.

Gas and Oil: Expenditures in this category are for gasoline and oil supplied to cars and private aircraft for legislative business. These costs, too, vary for the same reasons as those affecting car maintenance.

Car Rental, Staff and Member: This expenditure category includes the use of state-owned pool cars and commercial rental cars by both the Member and his/her staff in the course of legislative business.

This category, as listed in the Support Services section of the report, includes, in addition to car rental, the costs of gas, oil, and maintenance for cars utilized by the office of the Sergeant at Arms.

District Office Rent, Maintenance and Utilities: Each Member is entitled to rent an office within the district he/she represents so that constituents may have direct access to their legislators. In some of the larger districts, two or three offices are sometimes authorized. Accordingly, Members representing districts in high-rent metropolitan areas or Members representing large districts requiring more than one office will be reported with higher expenditures in this category than will other Members. Costs included in this expenditure item are rent, utilities (except telephone), janitorial service, and incidental maintenance costs.

Telephone and Telegraph: All telephone charges (except some equipment installation charges) are reported in this expenditure category. Included are the charges for district office phones, Capitol phones, and mobile phones. Members who will likely have higher charges than many of their colleagues are those representing districts which are either far from the Capitol, or in regions which cover large geographic areas.

Postage: The category includes the total amount expended for postage except for the postage utilized in the mailing of legislative mailings authorized under provisions of Proposition 73 of June 1988.

Communications: The costs included in this expenditure category are primarily for handling and mailing of legislative mailings authorized under provisions of Proposition 73 of June 1988.

Furniture and Equipment: This category includes the purchase, rental, and maintenance of certain furniture and equipment items utilized in the Capitol and district offices of the Members. It does not include the purchase of items which will, during the course of their usefulness, be utilized by a number of Members during succeeding years. Expenditures for items of that description are reported in the Furniture and Equipment category as General Overhead expenditures.

Office Supplies: Stationery items, other printing costs charged to the Assembly Operating Fund, general office supplies, and related miscellaneous supplies utilized in the Members' Capitol and district offices are reported in this expenditure category.

Subscriptions and Publications: Each Member is authorized to subscribe to the newspapers generally circulated within his/her district and to certain metropolitan daily newspapers. Members representing districts which include many cities and towns will frequently have higher expenditures in this category than will Members representing relatively compact areas. Expenditures for subscriptions and publications incurred by the committees and leadership offices are reported separately. Each committee is authorized to purchase relevant books and to subscribe to periodicals specializing in the subject matter of the committee for which the expenditure is made.

Miscellaneous Services: Most of the expenditures shown in the Miscellaneous Services category for the Members are for services such as telephone answering services in district offices and newspaper clipping services. Included in this category for the committee reports are such items as witness expenses, meeting expenses, data-processing costs, and other miscellaneous services.

A number of operational costs incurred by the Assembly are not directly attributable to any of the Members, committees, leadership offices, or support services. Such expenditures are classified as General Overhead and are reported according to the following categories:

Miscellaneous Salaries: Accrued vacation payments made to terminating employees, and salaries paid to employees on extended sick leave are reported in this category.

Employee Benefits: This expenditure category includes the Assembly's contribution to the OASDI (Social Security) fund, the Public Employees' Retirement System, various health, dental, vision, and life insurance premiums, the Compensation Insurance Fund, unemployment and disability insurance, and any other benefits approved by the Rules Committee.

Building, Rent, Maintenance and Utilities: Reported in this expenditure category are construction and remodeling costs and the rent, maintenance, and utilities for offices (other than Members' individual district offices) utilized and paid for by the Assembly outside the Capitol.

Telephone: This listing is for the cost of telephone equipment installation in all Assembly offices.

Furniture and Equipment: The expenditure indicated in this category is for the purchase, rental, and maintenance of furniture and equipment not reported elsewhere in the report. Most furniture and equipment is considered a capital investment which will be used, through the years, by a number of different Members or other offices and can therefore not be appropriately reported as an expense on behalf of any particular Member or office.

Office Supplies: The amount shown in this expenditure category represents office supplies which were purchased by the Assembly for the use of Members and other offices but which were not distributed to any such offices before the end of this reporting period.

Annotated Codes and Law Books: Each Member's office and certain other Assembly offices are furnished with Annotated California Codes and certain other law books. The cost of these books is

considered a capital expenditure in the same manner as many furniture and equipment items, and is therefore reported in this General Overhead category.

Meeting Expenses: This expenditure category includes certain costs incurred by the Assembly relative to the conduct of Assembly Sessions and Joint Sessions of the Legislature which cannot be readily charged to any other expenditure category, rental costs for some meeting rooms, and some conference registration fees.

Freight, Moving and Delivery: This expenditure category includes costs incurred for the transport of furniture, supplies, and other items which are not chargeable to any particular office.

Other Miscellaneous Services: The major expenditures reported in this category are for the costs of photography services related to official Assembly publications, vehicle liability insurance, and organization memberships.

Study Contracts: From time-to-time the Assembly finds it practical to contract with individuals, firms, universities, and other governmental agencies in order to expand its research capability with respect to specific projects. The costs reported in this category are for payments made under such contracts during this period.

The next report of Assembly expenditures will be for the period between December 1, 2000 and November 30, 2001.

Members of the Assembly: As required by California Government Code, Section 8542, et. seq., the Bureau of State Audits (bureau) presents its audit report concerning our review of the Department of Health Services' (department) financial statements for the Safe Drinking Water State Revolving Fund and its compliance with federal laws and regulations applicable to the Capitalization Grants for Drinking Water State Revolving Fund program (program) for the year ended June 30, 2001. The department contracted with the bureau to perform this audit to satisfy a federal audit requirement.

This report concludes that the department was in compliance with federal laws and regulations governing the program. Additionally, the department's Safe Drinking Water State Revolving Fund (fund) financial statements are fairly presented. However, we did identify weaknesses in the department's accounting and administrative controls over the fund. Specifically, the department demonstrated inaccurate record keeping and insufficient management review in preparing its financial statements for the fund.

Members of the Assembly: As requested by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee, the Bureau of State Audits presents its audit report concerning a review of the Department of Veterans Affairs' (department) cash management for itself and its three homes for veterans.

This report concludes that the department's poor billing practices have resulted in a large decline in the reimbursements that it has collected for services provided by its veterans homes. The department has not billed for all the services that its homes provide, and has delayed for long periods before submitting claims for those services it did bill. Additionally, the department lacks adequate knowledge of the data in its billing management information system (information system), and thus cannot accurately estimate the amount of unbilled claims available for reimbursement. Because these flawed billing practices have kept it from collecting reimbursements to which it is entitled, the department has received additional funds from the General Fund to replenish cash shortfalls.

Furthermore, the department has not supplied proper oversight and controls for the fiscal operations of its homes, and it lacks key tools and resources, such as accurate management reports and budgeting tools. Poor management of the department's information system has resulted in serious data deficiencies and known errors that the department is not resolving aggressively.

Finally, the department has attempted unsuccessfully to compensate for its poor billing practices by obtaining loans from the General Fund, and by limiting expenditures at headquarters and the homes. Decreased reimbursements and the department's lack of success in decreasing expenditures have caused the department to draw on state funds that could be available for other uses. Although the Legislature requested a report as of August 31, 2001, of the department's needs for cash, the department did not fulfill this request adequately. Moreover, the next report, due in December 2001, may also fail to meet the Legislature's requirements.

EXECUTIVE ORDER D-51-02

by the

Governor of the State of California

WHEREAS, the people of California have a rich and strong tradition of community service and volunteerism; and

WHEREAS, there are many opportunities for citizens to serve through nonprofit agencies, places of worship, places of employment, schools, colleges and universities, and governmental agencies; and

WHEREAS citizen participation through service and volunteerism

can help significantly in improving California's schools, health and human services, public safety, and environment; and

WHEREAS, greater participation in service and volunteerism promotes civic responsibility and participation, develops community leadership and brings Californians together; and

WHEREAS, many of the State's efforts to better serve the people of California would be more effective if coordinated with, and supported by, citizens involved in service and volunteerism; and

WHEREAS, the California Commission on Improving Life Through Service has been the lead State agency for promoting service and volunteerism throughout California; and

WHEREAS, the mission and effectiveness of the California Commission on Improving Life Through Service will be improved if it is reorganized and placed under the auspices of the Governor's Office;

NOW, THEREFORE, I GRAY DAVIS, Governor of the State of California, by virtue of the power and authority vested in me by the Constitution and statutes of the State of California, do hereby issue this Executive Order to become effective immediately:

IT IS ORDERED that the Governor's Office on Service and Volunteerism (GO SERV) is established under the auspices of the Governor's Office of Planning and Research. The duties and responsibilities of GO SERV shall include the following:

1. Serving as the State's lead agency for community service and volunteerism, informing the public of the value of and need for greater community service and volunteerism in California, calling upon all Californians to become involved, and challenging public and private institutions to create and support community service and volunteer opportunities.
2. Supporting and expanding opportunities for Californians of all backgrounds to help meet the State's key challenges through meaningful community service and volunteerism.
3. Promoting quality and innovation in service and volunteerism programs.
4. Partnering with other public agencies at the state, county and local levels, and the private and not-for-profit sectors to leverage greater resources and create more opportunities for service and volunteerism.
5. Bringing together and strengthening the field of service and volunteerism throughout California.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the Executive Director, the Deputy Director, and other key staff of GO SERV shall be appointed by the Governor and shall serve at the pleasure of the Governor. The present staff of the California Commission on Improving Life Through Services shall continue to serve at the pleasure of the Governor as staff of the GO SERV Commission.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the GO SERV Commission (Commission) is established within GO SERV to serve as California's "State Commission" for purposes of the National and Community Service Trust Act of 1993 (42 U.S.C. §12501 et seq.) and its implementing rules and regulations.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that, in keeping with the requirements of the National Community Service Trust Act, the GO SERV

Commission shall be constituted as follows:

1. The Commission shall include the following as voting members:
 - an individual with expertise in the educational, training and development needs of youth, particularly disadvantaged youth;
 - an individual with expertise in promoting the involvement of older adults in service and volunteerism;
 - a representative of a community-based agency or organization;
 - the Superintendent of Public Instruction;
 - a representative of local government;
 - a representative of local labor organizations;
 - a representative of business;
 - an individual between the ages of 16 and 25 who is a participant or supervisor of a service program for school-age youth, or of a campus-based or national service program; and
 - a representative of a qualifying national service program.
2. The Governor may appoint other voting or ex-officio, non-voting members such that total membership shall not exceed 25. A representative of the Corporation for National and Community Service shall serve as an ex-officio, non-voting member.
3. Voting members shall serve at the pleasure of the Governor for renewable terms of three years.
4. No more than fifty percent plus one member shall be from the same political party, as required by federal law.
5. The Commission shall elect from its voting members a Chairperson. The First Lady of California shall serve as the Honorary Chairperson of the GO SERV Commission.
6. Commission members shall serve without compensation but may be reimbursed for travel expenses and receive a per diem as appropriate.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the present members of the California Commission on Improving Life Through Service shall continue to serve as members of the GO SERV Commission for the remainder of their current terms.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that all State agencies and departments are hereby requested to cooperate with and assist GO SERV in carrying out its duties.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that Executive Order W-179-98 is rescinded in its entirety.

GOVERNOR'S ADDRESS PRINTED IN JOURNAL

Without objection, the following text of Governor Gray Davis' State of the State Address was printed in the Journal:

State of the State Address

Assembly Chambers, State Capitol

Tuesday, January 8th, 2002

Thank you, Lieutenant Governor Bustamante. Speaker Hertzberg, President Pro Tempore Burton, Speaker-designate Wesson, distinguished Members of the Legislature, Chief Justice Ron George and honorable Justices of the Supreme Court, including our newest justice, Carlos Moreno.

Please join me in welcoming Justice Moreno to our highest court.

My fellow Constitutional Officers, esteemed Cabinet Secretaries, friends and fellow Californians.

Please join me in welcoming the two most important women in my life—the love of my life, the First Lady of California, Sharon Davis, and the first lady of the Davis family, my mother, Doris Morell.

KEEPING CALIFORNIANS SAFE

The horrific events of September 11th shocked us all—and changed our world forever.

All four hijacked planes were bound for California.

On that darkest day, more than 100 fellow Californians paid the ultimate price for our freedom, as much as any soldier who ever fought in any war.

Tonight, we dedicate ourselves to building a future worthy of their sacrifice.

We're honored to have with us tonight Inez Paskins, whose husband Jerry perished in the World Trade Center. And Tom and Melanie Frost, who lost their daughter Lisa on United Flight 175.

God bless each one of you.

On September 11th, the world also saw our greatest strength in the courage of the passengers who made United Flight 93 a final stand against terror. I am honored to have with us the loved ones of two of those Northern California passengers.

Please join me in welcoming Alice Hoglan, the mother of Mark Bingham. And Kim, Sonali and Chris Beaven, the family of Alan Beaven.

Also with us tonight is Chief Rick Martinez of the Sacramento County Fire Department. Rick personifies the spirit of sacrifice as a leader of the urban search and rescue teams in New York City. They spent every waking hour in a dangerous valley of death in the hope of finding life. We thank you, Chief, and all six search and rescue teams from California who went to Ground Zero.

In the aftermath of these unspeakable attacks, we moved rapidly to protect Californians. I directed the California Highway Patrol to provide additional protection for our highways, dams and water supply. I activated the California National Guard to protect our airports and bridges.

We increased security for our power plants and food supply. We enhanced the state of readiness of our public health system.

In fact, no state has done more than California to protect its citizens and vital assets since the terrorist attacks. Now, many states are emulating our example.

Our ability to respond so rapidly was enhanced by actions we took back in 1999. That spring, I established the State Committee on Terrorism and the State Threat Assessment Committee. They gave us a head start in marshaling our forces for this war against terrorism.

After September 11th, I established the state Anti-Terrorism Information Center in the Attorney General's office and the Joint Information Center in my Office of Emergency Services. These actions have made California a model of preparedness.

In addition, I hired one of the country's most experienced anti-terrorist experts as my security adviser. He's a 10-year veteran of the California Highway Patrol and a 23-year veteran of the FBI. Please welcome George Vinson.

The horror of September 11th is seared in our hearts and minds forever.

But so, too, is the spirit of courage, sacrifice and patriotism to which this tragedy gave new life.

Tonight, we honor the valiant men and women of our Armed Forces. These guardians of justice and freedom are meeting the threat of terror with strength, bravery and resolve.

History shows that freedom exacts a high price. Many times, it requires the supreme personal sacrifice.

Last month, California lost a hero of our own, an elite Special Forces soldier—Army Staff Sergeant Brian Cody Prosser. Cody gave his life for his country—and for our freedom. It's my heartfelt honor to introduce Cody's mother and stepfather—Ingrid and Al Solhaug.

While we honor and support our fighting men and women overseas, we also pay tribute to those keeping us safe here at home. The men and

women of law enforcement and the California National Guard have put themselves in harm's way to protect our very way of life. For that, we owe them our deepest gratitude.

Please join me in honoring those Guard members here tonight.

My friends, the citizen-soldiers of the National Guard should not have to pay for the privilege of protecting us against terrorism. Many of the reserves called to duty left better-paying jobs behind. During these extraordinary times, the State should pay the difference between military and civilian pay for State employees who've been called up to duty.

Many private companies already make this commitment. I urge every other employer who can, to make their Guard employees whole.

Since September 11th, we acted swiftly to protect our airports, bridges, highways and dams, to secure our water supplies and electricity grid and to prepare our health facilities. But there is more we can and must do.

First, we're working with the Bush Administration to create a tiered system of public warnings when terrorist threats occur.

Second, we're asking the federal government to allow Highway Patrol officers to provide additional "sky-marshal" protection on in-state flights they're already taking in the course of their duties.

Third, we'll ensure that law enforcement officials—with the authority of the court—can monitor communications by suspected terrorists and allow "roving" wiretaps on suspects.

Fourth, we'll tighten controls over the transportation of toxic and hazardous materials.

In addition, I will ask the Attorney General to review new federal anti-terrorism legislation to ensure that California law is consistent with—and at least as tough—as national law. Attorney General Lockyer, I commend and applaud you for your vigilance and cooperation during these difficult times.

BUILDING THE FOUNDATION FOR A BRIGHT FUTURE

The events of September 11th also struck a major blow to our nation's economy. California, like most other states, is now faced with daunting challenges. After three years of unprecedented economic expansion in this State, the coming year will require some difficult choices.

But even with the budget cuts that will be necessary, California will still be *much stronger* than it was when I took office.

The Golden State's underlying economy remains more diverse and entrepreneurial than ever. When the economy does rebound—as we know it will—California will be better prepared to come roaring back because of the smart investments and dramatic progress we've made together over the past three years.

My friends, California has challenges ahead—but also a bright future.

I am proud to report to you tonight that—together—we've made good on the promise to lead California in a new direction, guided by lasting values.

Just look at what we've accomplished together:

Although unemployment has risen after September 11th, California has created 900,000 new jobs in the last three years—more than any other state in America.

When I took office in 1999, California was the world's seventh largest economy. Today—because of the extraordinary ingenuity and industry of Californians—we are the fifth-largest economy on the planet, surpassing both France and Italy.

Within 28 days of taking office, I traveled to Mexico to demonstrate the respect our only international neighbor deserves. Our trade with Mexico has increased three years in a row—and Mexico is now our largest trading partner. As a result, we've added 66,000 new jobs in California.

In education, we've made consistent and measurable progress:

We've recruited 15,000 new teachers for our schools, and 20,000 college students have taken advantage of our incentives to become future teachers.

100,000 teachers have received rigorous, world-class training under the auspices of the University of California.

More than 1,300 teachers have met the high national standards for prestigious national certification—a ten-fold increase in three years.

Last year alone, in part because of our incentives, 516 California teachers became Board-certified.

More than 200,000 teachers have taken advantage of our teacher tax credit.

And we've put a college education within the reach of hundreds of thousands of Californians.

For the first time ever, 100,000 students have earned Governor's Merit Scholarships, and nearly 200,000 will receive Cal Grants based on merit and need—the most ever at one time.

We take pride in all these numbers, but here's the one that counts the most: test scores have gone up *three years in a row*.

In health care, as well, the improvements are stunning:

More than one million California children have received health insurance who lacked coverage just three years ago. Today, the Healthy Families Program covers 500,000 kids—a ten-fold increase since I took office.

In fact, UCLA is about to announce the biggest two-year drop in the number of uninsured Californians since they began tracking those numbers.

California also leads the nation in HMO reform.

Nearly a quarter million Californians have been served by our new Department of Managed Health Care—the first such patient protection agency in any state. With the help of that Department, 40,000 Californians have taken on their HMO's—and won. They received the treatment their HMO denied—without having to go to court.

Our aggressive crackdown on Medi-Cal fraud has already saved \$228 million in taxpayers' money. By this time next year, it will have saved half a billion.

On public safety, we've:

Put more than 3,000 additional cops on our streets. And provided nearly 300 law enforcement agencies with state of the art equipment and access to new crime labs.

What else have we accomplished together?

600,000 families have benefited from our child-care tax credit.

We've made the largest investments in history in clean water, land conservation and coastal protection, while cutting state park fees in half.

An unprecedented \$6 billion in transportation improvements have been allocated by the Transportation Commission.

\$1.3 billion has been designated for local streets and roads.

Every one of these, my friends—every one—is a record achievement we can be proud of.

On top of these major investments, we have cut taxes by 4.3 billion dollars and put this money back into the pockets of California taxpayers.

In place of political promises, we've delivered bipartisan results to the people of this great State. Every step of the way, we've linked opportunity with accountability, progress with fiscal prudence.

MEETING THE ENERGY CHALLENGE

Now, no list of what we've achieved together would be complete without discussing our progress on energy. California defied the odds—and the prognosticators.

As all of you know, when I stood here last year we were facing an imminent implosion of our electricity system. The flawed deregulation scheme we inherited backfired catastrophically. We'd experienced the first forced blackouts since the Second World War. Experts were predicting 32 days of blackouts over the summer.

We were 100% exposed to the wildly fluctuating energy market. Merchant generators—and even some of our own municipal utilities—were gouging us unconscionably. Manufacturing firms and other businesses were threatening to leave California because of the disruption of power.

But, together, we confronted the challenge, and kept the power flowing to our homes and businesses, cities, and farms.

As always, the people of California deserve the credit. They responded to our "Flex Your Power" campaign, conserved in record numbers, earned rebates in historic amounts and helped reduce our energy demand.

But we also built more supply in record time. We licensed 17 new major power plants and 12 new peaker plants. Eleven of those plants were built and put on-line by the end of last year, including the first three major plants in 13 years. In 2001, we brought more new power on-line than in the previous 12 years combined, enough to power 2 million homes.

Against all odds, we also successfully pressured a reluctant federal government to finally restore price caps and consider refunds. We tamed the spot market with long-term contracts. And we established the California Power Authority to help ensure our energy future.

California has the most technologically advanced economy in the world—and it lives or dies on a stable supply of electricity. Our high tech industries cannot survive the lights flickering, much less going out.

Make no mistake: my overriding imperative last year was to ensure California had reliable electricity.

By doing so, we protected public health and safety, prevented a melt-down of our economy, kept business from leaving the State—and even created new jobs through expansions that were put on hold earlier in the year.

Now that the supply of natural gas has stabilized and the price has fallen, we are renegotiating some of the long-term contracts to ensure ratepayers a reliable supply of electricity at less cost.

But the recent collapse of Enron is another sign of the extreme volatility and uncertainty we still face in the deregulated energy sector.

We must continue to conserve. We must continue to build more plants, cleaner plants, more efficient plants to replace our aging facilities. We must maintain our vigilance to protect our economy and our citizens against further energy disruptions.

RESPONDING TO A SOFTENING ECONOMY

Now, with the same resolve we demonstrated during the energy crisis, we will squarely confront the current economic downturn and its consequences.

In the coming year, we must have the courage to make tough decisions in tough times. The Department of Finance and the Legislative Analyst agree that we are facing a shortfall of more than 12 Billion dollars. We will have to be smarter and more focused. And *we will*—with confidence in our eventual resurgence and still bright future.

But, in so doing, we will not back away from our historic commitments to education, economic growth, health care and public safety.

From Day One, we have exercised fiscal restraint and responsibility. In good times, we made smart investments in California's future. Still, even with our budgets flush—and well before the sharp decline of the technology sector and the attacks of September 11th—we were always careful with the taxpayers' dollar.

- We invested a substantial portion of our surpluses into one-time investments—such as transportation—instead of ongoing spending.
- With both Democratic and Republican votes, we passed two back-to-back, on-time budgets in 1999 and 2000—the first in 16 years.
- We established a \$2.6 billion reserve in the current budget year—the largest rainy day fund in 23 years.
- And I exercised my veto authority to cut \$7.4 billion in otherwise worthy proposals over three years.
- I also suspended allocation of \$2 billion in the current budget year, cut operating expenses by \$150 million and ordered an immediate hiring freeze.

While demonstrating good fiscal stewardship, we also addressed the critical issues facing California and provided for those most in need. After three years, we enter this new year with better schools, healthier families, increased worker protections and safer communities.

The budget I will submit to you in two days will be fair, will preserve the major gains of the last three years, will protect local government—and *will not increase taxes*.

I will call on you to close the budget gap with a combination of cutbacks, deferred spending, internal borrowing and accelerated revenue.

Here are the basic principles I used in formulating the budget:

First, my commitment to public education remains resolute.

Let me be clear: education will be protected above everything else in my Budget. For three years in a row, we've increased our investment in K-12 education and met or exceeded the Prop-98 guarantee. This year, once again, I intend to invest more in schools in 2002 than we did in 2001 AND we will meet the Prop-98 guarantee. That is how progress is preserved.

I have asked you to reduce some of the budget augmentations we made last year. But I will fight to protect those investments vital to the classroom itself, where teachers teach and students learn.

Second, we will maintain our full commitment to public safety. This is no time to weaken our resolve to combat crime and protect our citizens.

The terrible events of September 11th underscored the value to us all of those who protect America—police, sheriffs, firefighters and emergency medical personnel.

Third, I will expand our commitment to children.

I'll be proposing an expansion of safe and affordable child care to serve 100,000 more children. I'll propose an expansion of the Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention Program.

And, although I asked you to postpone the expansion of before and after school programs in the current year, in my budget, I'll propose an increase of \$75 million—the largest ever made to this program.

Fourth, I am opposed to balancing the State's budget on the backs of local government.

Whether we are elected at the State or local level, we all took the same oath—to serve the people. So I will continue the State's commitment to repay vehicle license fees to local government.

Fifth, I will not advocate raising taxes.

That would further burden individuals and businesses struggling to stay afloat in these difficult economic times.

These are the principles that guided me in preparing the budget. And, even with the cutbacks I will propose, *California will be much stronger than it was just three years ago.*

As a critical step in addressing our budget shortfall, I have called a concurrent Special Session of the Legislature. I urge you to take up as your first order of business \$2 billion in cuts in the current budget year that I called for in November. Failure to act quickly on these cuts will only increase the pain for our fellow citizens who depend on the State for vital services.

Given our softening economy, we must do everything we can to help those who've lost their jobs. We must also stimulate the economy and create new jobs.

Now, most of the tools to accomplish these goals are in the hands of our representatives in Washington. I urge the President and Congress to pass an economic stimulus package.

But we have to do our part, too. Here at the state level, we must do all we can to reinvigorate our economy.

First, I will ask you to make retroactive to September 11th the increases in unemployment benefits I approved last year. Those who lost their jobs, especially as a result of terrorism, deserve the higher levels of unemployment assistance that went into effect two days ago. This change alone will put \$400 million in benefits into the hands of laid-off California workers.

Second, I'll also be sending you legislation to authorize \$678 million dollars in lease revenue bonds to accelerate new public works projects that are ready to go.

Third, world-class schools need world-class facilities. I was proud to chair the successful Proposition 39 campaign that will help to finance the construction of local schools. But our state bond funds are exhausted. So I will urge you to support \$30 billion in school bonds over three general elections to build new schools and modernize existing ones.

One key component of California's workforce is our nursing corps.

We must recruit and train thousands of new nurses who are the backbone of our medical delivery system. In the coming weeks, I will propose measures to expand the number of nurses throughout the State. I will provide incentives to clinics and hospitals that support clinical placements for nursing students, new graduates and returning nurses. We will also remove barriers to qualified licensed nurses moving to California from other states and other countries.

Now, a faltering economy forces us to take a hard look at California's job training and workforce development system. It's a 4.6-billion-dollar Goliath made up of 34 different programs in 13 different agencies.

The demands of our new economy—especially in this time of change—requires a new approach. That is why I'll be sending you a proposal to reorganize these entities into a new Cabinet-level Labor and Workforce Development Agency.

In streamlining these programs, we will achieve greater accountability and efficiency. While we generate new jobs and serve our workers, we also need to protect our older citizens.

So I propose we reauthorize of the Medicare Drug Discount Program, which provides seniors the same prescription drug discounts the state enjoys—of 20–30 percent.

On one more issue that affects us all—protecting the individual privacy—we've already made significant strides.

We established the first statewide Office of Privacy Protection and our first "do not call" list for unwanted telemarketing calls. We've banned phantom calling, enhanced opt-out rights for credit card consumers and required businesses to tighten controls on dissemination of personal information.

But we have not done enough.

So I will propose legislation that, in clear and simple language, gives consumers more power to control whether, when and where sensitive, personal information may be used or sold by financial institutions. When we're done, we'll have the most comprehensive, consumer-friendly privacy laws in the nation.

THE TRUE MEASURE OF LEADERSHIP

Tonight, in this hard hour, the challenges of leadership are many.

Restoring abundance in a time of economic shortfall; Maintaining safety in a time of global conflict; Sustaining hope and tranquility in a time of fear and uncertainty;

The true measure of leadership is how we master these moments.

Because of the smart investments we've made together over the past three years, because of our fiscal caution, because we put progress above partisanship, we are better prepared to meet the challenges ahead.

If, on occasion, we doubt our capacity to succeed, let us find inspiration in the courageous passengers of Flight 93, who on an ordinary morning boarded an ordinary plane and did extraordinary things.

These were everyday people who upon realizing their fate summoned up the courage to overpower their captors. Their heroism rallied the nation and guaranteed that no more innocent lives would be lost.

We may never know how many thousands of lives they saved. But this we do know. Flight 93 was one of freedom's finest hours.

With God's grace—and with the courage of these heroes and our own lasting values as our guide—we will continue to turn adversity into accomplishment and lead this great State forward.

May God shine his magnificent grace on the United States of America. May God bless our great state. And may God bless each and every one of you.

Members of the Assembly: As requested by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee, the Bureau of State Audits presents its audit report concerning strategic planning, coordination, and customer service efforts of the Technology, Trade and Commerce Agency (agency).

This report concludes that the agency does not have an agency-wide strategic plan despite starting two agency-wide strategic planning processes in recent years. In addition, plans at the program level often lack elements of strategic planning such as goals for all significant aspects of program missions, targets for significant goals or targets that challenge performance, and a comparison of results with targets in external reports. This report also finds that external coordination of export services provided by the agency's International Trade and Investment Division is limited, but recent activities indicate a renewed focus on this issue. Finally, programs in the agency's Economic Development Division generally satisfy their customers but could benefit from formal processes to target and measure customer satisfaction.

Members of the Assembly: As required by Chapter 127, Statutes of 2000, the Bureau of State Audits presents its audit report concerning the State's procurement of drugs and medical supplies.

This report concludes that the State's procurement process for drugs and medical supplies still requires significant improvement. Expenditures for drugs by the five state agencies most frequently purchasing drugs increased by an average of 34 percent annually, from \$41.6 million in fiscal year 1996-97 to \$135.1 million in fiscal year 2000-01. The Department of General Services has explored a variety of options, but has not gone far enough in improving this process. For

example, it needs to more fully explore contracting directly with group purchasing organizations to ensure that the State is purchasing drugs at the lowest available price. Moreover, the State lacks a statewide process for purchasing medical supplies.

The report also concludes that the Department of Corrections' (Corrections) Health Care Services Division continues to have significant weaknesses that prevent it from effectively monitoring its pharmacies' purchase of drugs. Specifically, as of November 2001 it had not updated its formulary nor did it monitor compliance with the existing one. The purpose of the formulary is to promote the appropriate and cost-effective use of medications. It also lacks a utilization management program for drugs that could assist it in reducing costs. Also, pharmacy staff do not review monthly reports to ensure that drug purchases are cost-effective. Further, its pharmacy prescription tracking system cannot support monitoring, cost-containment, or day-to-day management of pharmacy services. However, Corrections does not intend to replace this system until 2006, and the development of the new system is already behind schedule. Finally, we found that Corrections is not eligible for some options, such as the State's AIDS Drug Assistance Program and the federal General Services Administration's supply schedule.

Members of the Assembly: As required by Assembly Bill 1 of the 2001-02 First Extraordinary Session, the Bureau of State Audits presents its audit report concerning the Department of Water Resources' (department) management of the power-purchasing program.

This report concludes that while the energy crisis has eased, there remains significant cost risks to manage. The department spent \$10.7 billion from January through September 2001 purchasing power on behalf of the investor-owned utilities and has assembled a portfolio of 57 long-term power contracts, valued at \$42.6 billion over a 10-year period, to cover future power purchases. However, the portfolio of contracts the department assembled in a time of crisis contains significant long-term cost risks that will need to be closely managed. For example, the portfolio leaves the department exposed to substantial market risk in high peak-demand periods if supply shortages occur and to substantial market risk with surplus contract amounts in other hours of the year. The terms and conditions of the long-term contracts are also problematic because the majority of the contracts may not ensure a reliable source of power in times of tight supply and high prices, and may not ensure that sellers follow through with the construction of proposed power plants. Instead, the contracts convey lucrative financial terms upon suppliers as a means to ensure they deliver power. Further, under most of the contracts, the department cannot terminate the contract or assess penalties even if the generators repeatedly or deliberately failed to deliver power at times when the State is in dire need of it. Finally, the department lacks the necessary infrastructure and staff to manage properly its energy purchases in the short-term market.

The Legislature and governor need to make many decisions about the State's future role in the power market. These decisions include whether the department will continue to buy energy on behalf of the investor-owned utilities, management of the market and legal risks of the long-term contracts, and other operational improvements needed to improve the department's management of the power-purchasing program.

This report concludes that the department, in general, has ensured that seismic retrofit projects funded with bond proceeds are consistent with the purpose of the Bond Act. In addition, the department has begun to reimburse the State Highway Account (highway account) and the Consolidated Toll Bridge Fund (toll bridge fund) for expenditures incurred during fiscal years 1994-95 and 1995-96 as required by the Bond Act. As of June 30, 2001, the department has reimbursed the highway account \$26.3 million and, according to the department, it intends to complete the reimbursement process for the highway account and the toll bridge fund before the Bond Act expires in 2005.

To the Senate and the Assembly of the California Legislature:

I submit for your consideration the Governor's Budget for 2002–03.

In the past three years, California has been blessed with the bounty of an economic expansion like no other in modern history. Working together, we wisely invested a substantial share of that bounty in one-time expenditures to build our infrastructure, improve our environment, and invest in technologies for the 21st century. The balance of these resources were invested in our most valuable asset—people. Together, we made record investments in improving our children's education, protecting public safety, expanding access to health care, and providing taxpayers with the largest tax relief in more than 20 years.

We have also faced some challenges. We navigated an energy crisis that many believed would bring California to its knees. We shared in the tragedy of September 11th with our fellow Americans, and now proudly share in our nation's resolve to defeat terrorism at home and abroad. Now we face a new challenge brought about by recession and economic uncertainty. PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS PRINTED IN JOURNAL

Without objection, the address by the Honorable Jordi Pujol was printed in the Journal:

**Address by the Honorable Jordi Pujol
President of Catalonia, Spain**

January 14, 2002

First of all let me convey to you the greetings of the people of Catalonia and thank you for your invitation to visit this Chamber.

I must also convey to you the greetings of the Parliament of Catalonia, which made a sister region relationship agreement with the California Senate in 1987. Yet another example of our relations is the 1986 agreement between the Governor of California and the Government of Catalonia on the occasion of the Bicentennial Celebration of Gaspar de Portolà, the discoverer of California, who was Catalan, and a number of activities of the Friends of Gaspar Portolà Foundation.

Let me briefly give you a little information about my country. Catalonia represents 6% of the area of Spain and 15% of its population, that is, 6.2 million inhabitants. The economy represents 19% of the Spain's GDP and 28% of its foreign trade. In comparative terms we could say that Catalonia's GDP 20% greater than that of Portugal and that its exports exceed those of countries such as Turkey or Israel.

It is a predominantly industrial country, but with a very strong service sector. And Catalonia has a very important tourist industry, which receives 12.4 million tourists a year, and contributes 10% of its GDP.

The capital of Catalonia is Barcelona. Barcelona is often mentioned in connection with the artists and architects with links with it (Gaudí, Miró, Dalí, Picasso, Pau Casals, Montserrat Caballé, etc), the success of the 1992 Olympic Games, or as an important center of attraction for hi-tech investments.

Catalonia is a part of Spain with a differentiated personality, based on its own language (Catalan), on a culture connected with this language, and on a collective consciousness and historical memory which are very much its own. The distinct nature of Catalonia within Spain has at various times in history been a source of confrontation.

However, since 1975 Catalonia has been able to play a vital role in the consolidation of democracy in Spain, in the transformation and rationalization of the structure of the state, in economic and technological modernization and its integration into Europe. At the same time it has achieved a considerable degree of recognition of its personality as a people, of its language and of its culture.

It was in 1986, early in this period which transformed Spain and at the same time strengthened the Catalan nation, that is seemed to us it would be very useful to know more about California, a land which is exceptionally dynamic and creative. A land which, like Catalonia, is not an independent nation-state, but does have a sufficient degree of self-government to be in control of its own destiny.

We wanted an answer to this question:

What is it that makes a country progress? Why is it that there are some countries that have abundant resources but do not progress, while others that are not so well endowed enjoy such economic, social and cultural growth and development.

There might be more than one answer to this question, but it seemed to us in Catalonia that California gave us one answer, probably one of the best answers. An answer based on entrepreneurial spirit, with abundant opportunity for initiative emerging from within the society itself, very creative, open to change and innovation. All in all it seemed to us in Catalonia that California was a welcome society, a society able to welcome all manner of people, involve them, integrating them into society itself and into the economy. Able to take in and adopt all sorts of new technologies, and able make new ideas its own, adopting them and improving on them. In short, a land that welcomes people, technologies, and ideas.

Hence, over 15 years ago we initiated what has become a sustained relation with California, with very frequent contacts.

In this time when the phenomenon of immigration is so important around the world, including here in California, in Europe and in Catalonia; in this time of globalization, with all the economic challenges, not to mention cultural challenges and the threat to identity that it implies, and the important role played by the audiovisual and cultural industry; at this time of rapid and radical change, we saw and still see California as a land worthy of study and worth getting to know very well. We see it as an example. This is why we want to renew and strengthen our relations with California.

So we in Catalonia value California as an example. Is there anything we Catalans can offer in return? Is there any way in which we are exemplary? It is difficult for us to offer ourselves as an example to California. We are the first industrial region in Spain and are now one of the fastest-growing regions in Europe. We contributed greatly to the transformation of Spain into a democracy. We are in a position to exercise a degree of Mediterranean leadership. None of this is particularly interesting in the USA. However, we are a country within Spain with a different language and culture, which we have preserved in spite of decades of immigration and centuries of persecution; we are a country that has received many immigrants without losing our identity or our cohesion: That is, we are a country that is faced not only with the challenge of competitiveness and modernity, but also with the challenge of the defense of our national identity, which must not be absorbed by a demographically much stronger language and culture, that of the nation-state of Spain. And the fact that we have always achieved this, peacefully and through dialog, with the complete rejection of violence: this perhaps is worth something in the eyes of the people of the United States and of the world.

When we saw the terrible terrorist attack on New York on 11 September we realized just how important it is to defend one's values and identity in a peaceful way. Catalonia immediately sided with the American people and gave its support to American policy and that of the Spanish central government, always fully backing US initiatives.

There is nothing special about this; many countries did the same. But not all countries have resolved their internal problems of language and culture, immigration and identity in such a peaceful and cooperative way as have we.

More than once I too have had to lead demonstrations against acts of terrorism which have caused sometimes one death, sometimes two, or three, or over twenty. This terrorism did not originate in Catalonia: its roots were elsewhere. But it manifested itself in Catalonia, it killed

citizens of Catalonia and above all it threatened peace and coexistence in Catalonia.

The terrorists sought to make us think that cultural, ethnic, religious or political differences must be resolved through violence; that Catalonia should make itself respected in Spain through violence. Fortunately we have been wise enough to reject such methods. Not only that: we have been able to transform our differences into a positive energy at the service of our country, that is, Catalonia, and at the service of Spain as a whole and of the idea of European unification. That is why, we suppose, that when in 1999 president Clinton accepted the Charlemagne Prize in the German city of Aachen for his contribution to peace and European unity, he explicitly referred to Catalonia as a healthy example, as an example of the ability to combine pride in one's own identity with peaceful coexistence.

That is something we are proud of.

Ladies and gentlemen of the Assembly, thank you very much for your attention.

Dear Mr. Schmidt and Wilson: In 1996, the Legislature established the Citizens' Option for Public Safety ("COPS") program by enacting Government Code Section 30061 et seq., which established in each county treasury a Supplemental Law Enforcement Services Fund ("SLESF") and required that amounts from the fund be allocated to the counties and to cities within a county for, among other things, front line law enforcement services.

In 2000 the Legislature established the Crime Prevention Act of 2000 program amending Government Code Section 30061 et seq., which added a juvenile justice component to the COPS program. Additionally, Government Code Section 30063 was amended to provide direction to the State Controller regarding the disposition of unspent funds and associated penalties for specific law enforcement entities required to report annually on the disposition of allocations.

Section 30063, while specifically identifying sheriffs, police, district attorneys, and referring to hearings and reports by the Supplemental Law Enforcement Oversight Committee (SLEOC), and other provisions relating to the COPS program, specifically does not reference probation or juvenile justice programs contemplated in Government Code Section 30061(b)(4).

The author did *not* intend that the provisions of Government Code Section 30063 et seq. apply to programs implemented through comprehensive multi-agency juvenile justice plans developed by local juvenile justice coordinating councils, and approved by Boards of Supervisors and the Board of Corrections pursuant to Government Code Section 30061 et seq.

REMARKS BY GOVERNOR

PRESENTATION OF SPEAKER WESSON

Former Speaker Hertzberg then presented the 65th Speaker of the California State Assembly, Hon. Herb J. Wesson, Jr., whereupon he addressed the assemblage.

ADDRESS BY SPEAKER HERB J. WESSON, JR.

Members, for each of us, there was a moment, an incident, a point in time when our vision for our future became clear to us. It may have been a word of advice from a relative, a book we read, or a suggestion from a teacher. It could have been just about anything, but something happened that transformed our lives.

For me, it was a speech I heard when I was 20 years old by Congressman Ron Dellums. He spoke with a passion about the human rights that all of us are entitled to—and the energy he spoke with, and the courage of his convictions, remains with me to this very day.

That was the moment I knew what I wanted to do with my life. I had no plan but I knew my goal—and today I stand before you exactly where I wanted to be—not as Speaker of the California State Assembly, but as a public servant.

Ron Dellums changed my life—and I am so lucky to have him here today joining us—so I can thank him for the inspiration he gave me when I was young and searching for direction.

Each of you has such a story, and everyone here is equally blessed to be exactly where we want to be, doing exactly what we want to do. Because each of us shares a passion to make California a better place.

On January 10th of this year, I was honored to be elected your Speaker. On that day, I tried to make it crystal clear that this Speakership was not about me, but about we.

So who are we?

Well, first and foremost we are the 80 fortunate men and women that 34 million Californians elected to serve them.

Make no mistake: we face great challenges. But I believe great people step forward to meet great challenges.

My mother is here today, bursting with pride. Everyone in this room has someone equally proud, because they know the great faith that the voters have placed in us.

Everyone on this floor also has someone they care so deeply about that they embody all our hopes for the future. For me, those are my sons.

I live to make the world a better place for them. And I know each one of you has someone like them—someone who gives you courage every day to fight the challenges we face to make California a better place.

Let me tell you a story about my sons.

When they were 8 years old, they wanted to play Pop Warner Football, so I signed them up. Three days later, the coach quit. He said he didn't want to coach a "bunch of clucks." So I took over.

And when I think back about my team, maybe we did look like a “bunch of clucks.” We played against teams that were bigger, faster, stronger and more athletic. On paper, they should have beaten us every time.

I coached for 13 years; we made it to the playoffs 12 times. We made it to the semi-finals 7 times. We won a conference title and we won a national championship.

Not a bad showing for a bunch of clucks that no one believed in. That experience taught me a lot. It taught me the importance of coming together as a team. It taught me that when you believe that every position is just as important as the quarterback or the runningback, you'll win.

And, it taught me that if you have courage and believe that anything is possible when you work together, you'll be champions.

Let me tell you where Coach Herb's clucks are today:

- The Phillips twins are at Harvard, getting their Ph.D's.
- One kid nicknamed “outlaw” who would steal anything that wasn't nailed down—he's a doctor.
- And there was one kid—a kid who didn't have a lot of self-esteem who played tight end. I remember saying to the other coaches that this kid could run like a racehorse. So I told them we should move this kid to running back. That kid? That's the kid who went to the University of Nebraska as a star runningback and now he's one of the leading rushers in the NFL. His name is Ahmad Green—one of my clucks.

When I coached, the most important thing I would tell my kids was this: all I want? All I want is all you got. All I want is all you got. I don't want anymore. I won't accept any less.

And I promised them—and I promise you—I'll give you all I've got too.

And you know what else those kids taught me? They taught me what it means to be great. Greatness requires rising to great challenges.

If you ask any of the kids that I coached about when they felt the proudest or what was their major accomplishment—they won't tell you about the times we beat teams 30 or 40 to nothing. Those were good times and fun times, but that's not what made them great.

They remember the tough times—they remember the great challenges when no one believed in us but us. They'll tell you about the games that we won 14–12, or the championship that we won 7–6. Those were the times they knew—and I knew—they had given all they had.

Members, we face a great challenge. This is our moment. It's time to step up the challenges with greatness of our own. You don't just wake up one day and say I'm great. You don't just practice to become great. You have to see the greatness within yourself, and then stand up and dare to be great.

People won't remember what you did during the easy times. People will remember how you tackled the tough challenges. All I want, is all you've got.

And, there are a few plays of my own that I want to send in. First of all, some of the people who elected us what us to be their voice. And I intend to make sure their voices are heard. We won't balance the budget on the backs of the voiceless, just as we will not balance the budget on the backs of business, or teachers, or local government.

And, I also believe we must provide opportunities for all—opportunities for those left behind, or discriminated against or unable, through no fault of their own, to take part in the American dream.

No one thought my kids could win. We had a lot more critics than believers.

You've got to be careful not to listen to the critics because a lot of it is envy and jealousy. My kids rose above criticism. Members, we must too.

We'll get criticized by the newspapers; we'll get criticized by our so-called friends. But members, in my 50 years, I have never seen a statue erected to a critic. But a lot of statues have been built to those who had the courage of their convictions.

The critics are wrong. They were wrong about my football team, and they're wrong about you. Members, this Assembly team is full of talent. If we believe in ourselves, if we come together, we can accomplish anything we set our minds to.

A reporter told me last week that when I spoke of my colleagues, when I spoke about the Assembly, that I was bragging about them—like I was conceited about the California Assembly. I looked him square in his eyes and said, "I'm not conceited, I'm convinced." Because I know my colleagues will do the job they came to do. No one will convince me any different. I am so proud of you members. All I want is all you got.

Years ago, I once heard a speech by Les Brown about African Americans. He said that we were the descendants of those who refused to die. All of us are immigrants in this country—not all of us by choice. Some of us by chance.

We are the descendants of those who refused to die. On the long voyage from Africa to America, there was a group of people who willed themselves to death. There was another group of people who, during exercise periods, would jump overboard and feed themselves to the sharks. But there was also a third group of people who refused to die. They had hope. They knew that one day, somehow, we would survive, we would be free, and we would have power and influence again.

The ancestors of Ron Dellums refused to die. My ancestors refused to die. And every one of us on this floor—immigrants all—are the descendants of hard-working and hopeful people who refused to give up, no matter what the odds. We must come together, in the great tradition of American diversity, to solve the problems of the most diverse state in the nation. History led us all here, and history will judge what we do.

I believe we will rise to the greatness our challenges require. I have faith in all of you, in the great Country we live in, and in a God Who watches over all of us.

We have everything—all of the tools, the right minds, the diversity—everything we need to succeed is within our grasp. The only thing that can stop us is us, but I know we'll succeed.

All I want is all you've got.

To the Members of the California Legislature:

I am signing Assembly Bill 1414, which requires the Department of Fish and Game to prepare draft management plans for properties acquired after January 1, 2002. The bill requires the drafts to be completed and available for public review within 18 months of recordation. In addition, the bill requires the Resources Agency to develop and maintain a database of lands and easements acquired by the departments, boards, commissions, and conservancies under its authority and issue a series of annual reports on land acquisitions, future acquisition priorities and potential funding sources. By its own terms, the provisions of this bill will not become effective until funding is appropriated for its purposes.

Although I am signing this bill because its provisions have merit, I am concerned about the costs that would be incurred to implement this measure. The Resources Agency estimates costs of approximately \$500,000 annually to design and maintain the database, a portion of which can be absorbed within existing resources through the Agency's "California Legacy Project". However, any new General Fund expenditures would be difficult to justify at a time when departments' base budgets are being reduced to ensure the State lives within its means. Nevertheless, I am directing the Agency and the Departments of Fish and Game and Finance to explore options for funding this program with non-General Fund resources, including the use of bond funds that would become available with the passage of Proposition 40.

Gary Granville

Gary Granville died last Thursday of a heart attack. He was 72. Gary ran his own machine shop in Orange for 20 years. But at the age of 40, with three daughters at home, he earned a degree in Journalism from California State Fullerton to fulfill a lifelong dream to be a writer. He worked at the *Fullerton News Tribune* and then joined the *Daily Pilot*. As a reporter he earned the praise and respect of his colleagues and earned many awards for his outstanding work.

He received an appointment as county clerk in 1985 and remained in that position until 1994. In 1993 he encouraged the Board of Supervisors to eliminate the clerk of the court's office, including his own job, a move that saved taxpayers approximately \$750,000. In 1994 he ran for the combined office of clerk-recorder. He won the election and remained in office until his death.

He was well known throughout Orange County for his work, but even more impressive was the kind of person he was and his charitable nature. As the county's commissioner of weddings, Gary performed over one hundred weddings a year for the past 5 years, and performed as many as 5 weddings a day. He donated his fees, which totaled over the years to more than \$25,000 to charity. He also used his lunch hours to volunteer his time to teach reading to troubled teens.

On a personal note, after I learned that we Legislators could marry people, I called Gary's office to learn what needed to be done. He personally came to my office to swear me in and to tell me how to give advice to couples.

Gary Granville is survived by his wife Joanne, his three daughters and his eight grandchildren.

The Citizens of Orange County have lost a fine public servant. Our prayers are with him and his family.
