





BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF BILLS AND CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS AS INTRODUCED IN THE ASSEMBLY AT THE FIFTY-THIRD (EXTRAORDINARY) SESSION. (PREPARED BY LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL)

The following applies only to bills and constitutional amendments as introduced. Because of the time element no attempt has been made to digest each measure in detail Each description purports to contain only a statement of the subject of the measure and what appears to be its principal features

A.B. 1—BASHORE AND OTHERS. Amends Secs. 2224 and 2227, adds Sec. 2225 5, repeals Secs. 2226 and 2229, W. & I. C., re aid to the aged.

Adds provision that board of supervisors is to determine if spouse or adult child of recipient of aid has filed a State income tax return and is pecuniarily able to support or contribute to support of recipient before proceeding against such person in manner now provided.

Prohibits recipient of aid from transferring real property except for valuable and reasonably adequate consideration. Provides for recording notice that aid has been granted. Provides for certificate of justice of peace or municipal court judge us to circumstances of transfer and adequacy of consideration. Provides for notice of discontinuance of aid.

Repeals provisions authorizing supervisors to take agreement that recipient will not transfer or encumber his property. Repeals provision for claim of county against estate of recipient.

Cancels agreements heretofore executed and provides procedure to effectuate cancellation.

A B. 2-PELLETIER AND OTHERS. New act.

Authorizes city of the first and one-half class to create a municipal department under board of five commissioners. Authorizes department to establish and maintain buildings and adjuncts for public assemblies and other purposes specified in Sec. 2 of bill.

Provides for the issuance of revenue bonds and prescribes method of payment

A.B. 3-TURNER. Amends Sec. 14, Act 3421, re horse racing.

Provides for payment to State of odd cents on redistributions as to all amounts over \$10,000 wagered on a single race.

A.B. 4—ATKINSON. Amends Sec. 2227, repeals Secs. 2226 and 2229, W. & I. C., re aid to aged.

Repeals provision re agreement by recipient of aid not to transfer or encumber his real property.

Cancels existing agreements and provides procedure to effectuate cancellation

Declares that transaction described in section added constitutes a trust receipt transaction, and makes provisions applicable to trust receipts transactions applicable to such transactions.

AB 6-KING AND OTHERS. Amends Sec. 13101, H. & S. C, re compensation of State Fire Marshal.

Provides for salary of \$6,000 per year payable out of State Fire Marshal's fund.

A.B. 7-KING AND OTHERS. Adds Sec. 13109.5, H. & S. C., re fire protection and prevention at hospitals, institutions and schools in Department of Institutions.

Authorizes fire marshal to station salaried assistant at such institutions for maintenance and use of fire equipment, training of attendants, and establishing institutional fire departments. Provides for compensation of such assistants

Appropriates \$75,000 from general fund

A.B. 8-DOYLE AND KELLEMS. Adds Sec. 59, Act 8493, the Retail Sales
Tax Act of 1933, and Sec. 4.3, Act 8495a, the Use Tax Act of 1935,
re exemptions.

Exempts from both acts American flags and any versious of the Holy Bible

Changes minimum franchise tax from \$25 to \$25 or 1/20 of 1 per cent of the value of bank's or corporation's assets in this State, whichever is greater, but this tax is not to exceed \$10,000.

A.B 20—PEEK. Amends Sec. 8, Act 8488, the Bank and Corporation Franchise Tax Act

Limits dividend deduction to dividends received from bank or corporation 95 per cent of whose stock is owned by taxpayer, or by taxpayer and any other bank or corporation 95 per cent of whose stock is owned by (1) the taxpayer or (2) another bank or corporation 95 per cent of whose stock is owned by taxpayer

A.B. 21-PEEK Amends Sec. 8, Act 8488, the Bank and Corporation Franchise Tax Act.

Prohibits deduction for interest if (1) indebtedness on which interest is paid matures more than one year from date and the obligation to pay interest is conditional upon or measured by the amount of the earnings or profits of the taxpayer, or (2) the obligation has no fixed date of maturity

Provides that where charitable contribution is made in property, the basis of the property for purpose of determining gain or loss from sale thereof, or the fair market value of the property at the time of contribution, whichever is lower, is the amount of the contribution.

A.B. 22-PEEK. Amends Sec. 14, Act S488, the Bank and Corporation Franchise Tax Act.

Changes provisions regarding transactions between affiliated banks and corporations.

A.B. 23-PEEK. Amends Sec. 3, Act 8494a, The Corporation Income Tax Act of 1937.

Raises rate from 4 per cent to 5 per cent

A.B. 24-PEEK. Amends Sec. 7, Act 8494a, The Corporation Income Tax Act of 1937.

Restricts gross income dividend deduction to dividends received from another corporation 95 per cent of whose stock is owned (1) by taxpayer, or (2) by taxpayer and another corporation 95 per cent of whose stock is owned by taxpayer or by still another corporation 95 per cent of whose stock is owned by taxpayer

A.B. 25-PEEK. Amends Sec. 7, Act 8494a, The Corporation Income Tax Act of 1937.

Makes same change as to corporations covered by this act as A.B. 21 makes as to corporations affected by act amended thereby.

A.B. 26-PEEK. Amends Sec. 14, Act 8494a, The Corporation Income Tax Act of 1937

Changes provisions regarding transactions between affiliated corporations.

A B 27—PEEK Amends Sec. 24, adds Sec. 24.1, Act 3796, the Alcoholic Beverage Control Act.

Control Act.
Increases tax on distilled spirits sold by rectifiers and wholesalers.

Imposes floor tax on distilled spirits held for sale by on- or off-sale distilled spirits heensees. Not applicable if packages of distilled spirits bear excise stamps evidencing payment of distilled spirits excise tax under section 24 of act.

- A.B. 28—PEEK Amends Sec. 23, Act 3796, the Alcoholic Beverage Control Act Increases tax on beer, wine, and sparkling hard cider.
- A.B. 29—PEEK. Amends Sec. 23, Act 3796, the Alcoholic Beverage Control Act Increases beer tax from \$.62 to \$1.55 per barrel
- A.B 30—PEEK. Amends Sec. 5, Act 3796, the Alcoholic Beverage Control Act Increases license fees of beer manufacturers, distilled spirits manufacturers, rectifiers, distilled spirits wholesalers, beer and wine wholesalers, retail package off-sale beer and wine licensees, on-sale beer and wine licensees and distilled spirits manufacturers agents

- AB. 31—PEEK. Amends Secs. 4 and 5, Act 8495, the Inheritance Tax Act. Increases rate of tax.
- A.B. 32-PEEK. Amends Secs 14 to 18, inc , Act 8495c, the Gift Tax Act of 1939 Increases rate of tax.
- A B 33-PEEK. New act, the Severance Tux Act.

Imposes tax on privilege of severing petroleum, natural gas or natural gaso

time from the earth and prescribes the rates.

To be administered by State Board of Equalization. Money to be deposited in severance tax fund and used for administration, payment of refunds, and payment into the general fund.

AB. 34-PEEK New act, the Tobacco Tax Act

Imposes tax on cigarettes, cigars, and other forms of tobacco. Requires permit to deal in tobacco

Administered by State Board of Equalization. Money to be used for administration, refunds, and payment into general fund.

AB 35-PEEK New act, the Tobacco Use Tax Act.

Supplements Tobacco Tax Act (A.B. 34) by imposing tax on storage, use or other consumption of tobacco products in this State.

Provisions as to Administration and proceeds similar to those in Tobacco Tax Act.

A B. 36-PEEK. Amends Sec. 22, Act 5130d, the Transportation Tax Act.

Deletes provision exempting carriers who operate solely within cities, between cities, or between cities and private property. Exempts gross receipts from transportation wholly within limits of private property.

AB 37-PEEK. Amends Act 3421, re horse race licenses.

Increases the license fee paid to the State from flat 4% to 4% on first ten million dollars and 8% on all over ten million dollars handled during one meeting in the wagering pools. Provides that total deduction by licensee shall not exceed 12% and the odd cents on redistribution.

A.B. 38-STREAM AND REAVES Amends Secs. 867 and 868, F. & G. C., re yellow-tail, barracuda and white sea bass.

Deletes restriction on use of yellow-tail to consumption as fresh food fish.

Permits use of certain gill nets to take yellow-tail, barracuda and white sea bass. Prohibits use of purse seine or round haul net to take these species and prohibits possession of them on boat carrying such nets, except as to fish coming from waters off Mexico.

AB. 39—CROWLEY AND MEEHAN. Amends Secs. 2007 and 2227, repeals Secs. 2226 and 2229, W. & I C, re aid to aged.

Repeals provisions re agreements by recipients of aid not to transfer or encumber real property, and provisions re rights of county against estate of recipient

Requires boards of supervisors to release existing agreements.

AB. 40-LORE AND ROBERTSON New act.

Appropriates \$5,000,000 for relief of hardship and destitution due to unemployment.

A B 41-LORE AND ROBERTSON. New act

Appropriates \$95,500,000 for relief of hardship and destitution due to unemployment, including not more than \$750,000 for administrative expenses of Controller

Provides for use of \$50,000 of appropriation as revolving fund of Relief Administrator when each payments are necessary. Also provides for use of \$500,-000 as revolving fund to be used in connection with Surplus Commodities Stamp Plan.

AB 42-PEEK AND OTHERS Amends Secs 2007 and 2227, repeals 2226 and 2229, re aid to aged

Deletes provisions reagreements by recipients of aid not to transfer or encum-

ber real property and provisions re rights of county against estates of recipients.

Cancels existing agreements (Sec. 3) and provides alternative procedure if it is held unconstitutional to cancel them (Sec. 4).

A.B 43-LORE. Amends Secs 2007 and 2227, repeals Secs. 2226 and 2229, re aid to aged.

Repeals provisions re agreements of recipients and county's interest in recipient's estate,

Makes it unlawful to aid applicant to dispose of property for purpose of obtaining or continuing to receive aid to which applicant not entitled.

AB. 44-FULCHER AND MILLER, GEO P. New act.

Generally validates, so far as State and Federal Constitutions permit, organization, boundaries, selection or appointment of governing officers or boards, acts, proceedings, and bonds of public bodies defined in Sec. 1, Subd. (a).

AB 45-KI CHEL AND WATSON Adds Sees. 2.1 and 19.5, Act 5682, the Orange County Flood Control Act.

Provides for purchase and retirement of outstanding bonds and for payment of installments of principal and interest on such bonds.

A B. 46-LEONARD AND OTHERS. Adds Sec. 4383, Pub. Res. C., re forest Lands

Permits Director of Natural Resources to apply for and administer lands deeded to State for taxes and suitable for public use under any procedure established by law for administration of such lands by State agencies. (See A.B. 47.)

A.B. 47-LEONARD AND OTHERS. Amends, repeals, and adds various Secs., Pol. C., and Rev. & Tax. C., re tax deeded lands.

Creates land classification commission and advisory committee and provides for classification and disposal of lands deeded to State for taxes.

Abolishes right of redemption as to lands sold to State for taxes in future. Provides procedure for termination of existing rights of redemption.

Provides for classification of lands suitable for public use and administration thereof by appropriate public agencies. Other lands may be disposed of as provided in bill Oil and mineral lands are to continue to be under State Lands Commission.

 $\Lambda~\rm B~48--ROSENTHAL~AND~OTHERS.$ Amends Act 3895, re licensing and regulation of itinerant merchants

Redefines itinerant merchants as one who buys farm products for resale and transports them on highways to point outside county where acquired for purpose of Defines farm products.

Repeals provisions re-bond of licensees. Provides for revocation and cancellation of licenses.

A.B. 49—MALONEY. Adds Sec. 3629.2, Pol. C., amends Sec. 531, adds Sec. 451.5, Rev. & Tax C., re records of assessors.

Provides that records of assessors shall be open to inspection by local, State, or Federal officers under rules and regulations adopted by State Board of Equalization.

Amendment re property escaping taxation puts in Rev. & Tax. C. provision which appears in Pol C. Sec. 3649, as amended by Chapter 1008, Stats. 1939

A.B. 50-MALONEY. Amends Act 8495c, the Gift Tax Act of 1939.

Makes one-half of community property when transferred to husband, as well as when transferred to wife, subject to tax. Adds transfers to State or U. S. to list of exempt charitable transfers. Excepts transfers by alien nonresident of U. S from certain exempt transfers (other than charitable transfers and exempt transfers of intangibles).

Permits Controller to permit inspection of gift or inheritance tax records by local, State or Federal tax officials. Permits Controller to exchange information

with other tax officials.

Repeals provision requiring consent of Controller for certain transfers of

corporate stock.

Makes numerous other changes apparently to clarify procedure and administration.

A.B. 51-PEEK. New act. General Validating Act of 1940.

Validates organization, boundaries, governing officers or boards, acts, proceedings, and bonds of public bodies. "Public body" defined in Sec. 1 of bill.

A.B. 52—DALEY AND OTHERS. Adds Sec. 5014, Pub. Res. C., re State Park and Maintenance Fund.

Provides that money in fund not otherwise appropriated is appropriated for operation, maintenance, and extension of State park system.

A B 53-ATKINSON AND PEEK. Adds Sec 2, Act 4401, re tide and summerged lands granted to city of Long Beach.

Permits expenditure of revenues from lands granted by act for public parks and beaches. Provides city may assist State in acquiring park, playground, recreational center or beach for recreational purposes. Permits city to convey to State land or beach area acquired under bill.

A.B. 54—EVANS AND OTHERS. Adds Sec. 651a1, Civ. C., re corporations conducting universities, colleges, seminaries, or schools of nursing.

Permits corporation authorized to conduct hospital to conduct school of nursing if corporation files evidence, as provided in bill, of ownership of property of value of at least \$50,000.

A.B. 55-DONNELLY. Amends Sec. 1300 17, Ag. C., re assessments by Director of Agriculture in connection with marketing orders.

Recasts provisions as to assessments for administration, advertising and sales promotion to permit use of base other than one now specified. Relieves director of necessity of returning pro rata share of assessments when items to be returned are small. Makes other minor changes.

A.B. 56-WOLLENBERG AND OTHERS. Amends title, adds Sec. 8, Act 2450, re Golden Gate International Exposition.

Expands title to include references to county exhibits, disposal of buildings and property, and authority to do such acts as will promote success and increase attendance.

Permits securing the holding of convention of either major political party, or both of them, in 1940.

Appropriates \$150,000.

AB. 57-HAWKINS. New act, the California State Housing Authority Law.

Creates authority with 5 members, appointed by Governor for staggered terms. To undertake slum clearance and projects for housing persons of low income.

Area of operation defined in Sec 6 of bill and, in general, not to overlap jurisdiction of existing local authorities. Powers of authority outlined in Sec. 22.

Provides for issuance of revenue bonds, payable from revenue or grants and contributions of U.S. or others.

Appropriates \$25,000.

AB. 58—HAWKINS. Amends Secs. 2, 3 and 4, Act 3484, the Housing Cooperation Law, re aid by public bodies to housing projects pursuant to California State Housing Authority Law. (See AB 57.)

Amends act to include appropriate references to proposed California State Housing Authority Law. Changes reference from Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works to the United States Housing Authority

Provides for cooperation as to projects within area adjacent or contiguous to area in which public body may act.

A.B 59-HOUSER. New act. Appropriates \$28,500,000 for relief.

Allocates for expenditure in February, 1940, one million dollars, and not over two and one-half million during each month to February 1, 1941. Unexpended sums for one month can be expended in any succeeding month but not over three million in any one month.

None of appropriation to be used upon production for use plan or for relief of person engaged on production for use program. Limits administrative expenses to 15 per cent. Limits family relief to \$57.50 per month. Requires three year residence Prohibits payment to alien who can not show lawful entry. Makes civil service laws applicable to positions in S. R. A. the salaries of which are paid from appropriation, but does not include administrator.

A.B. 60—O'DONNELL, ROBERTSON AND BURNS, MICHAEL J. Adds Division IX, Pub. Res. C., re soil conservation.

Codifies provisions of Act 147, without changing general purposes of act Deletes provisions re determination of unreasonableness of land use by directors of soil conservation district, leaving question of unreasonable use of lands to courts. Adds provision for enjoining violation of land use regulations. Generally makes changes incident to codification.

A.B. 61—MILLER, GEORGE P., GANNON AND CROWLEY. New act, re salary adjustments for State officers and employees.

Appropriates \$1,490,000 to emergency fund to be allocated for salary adjustments under State Civil Service Act for persons whose salaries are paid from general fund. Adjustments to date from time employee became entitled thereto. Money also available for adjustments in future.

A.B. 62-COLLINS. New act.

Provides for submission to voters at November, 1940, election of constitutional amendments proposed by Legislature at special session. Provides for submission of arguments within 60 days after end of session.

A.B. 63-LEONARD. Amends Act 5215, re municipal utilities.

Extends act to apply to counties, cities and counties, districts, or public corporations which have power to make improvements in act. Amends title of bill to refer to public utilities and works and improvements mentioned in the Improvement Act of 1911 and deletes specification of water works, electric power works, gas works, lighting works and other public works and utilities. Incorporates by reference certain provisions of Improvement Act of 1911, Improvement Bond Act of 1915, and the Street Opening Act of 1903.

A.B. 64-DESMOND. New act.

Appropriates \$35,000 for contingent expenses of Assembly, including expenses of committees.

A.B. 65-HOUSER. New act, re limitation on expenditure of relief appropriation.

Applies to appropriations other than those in 1939 Budget Act, in Chapter 668, Stats. 1939, and special session appropriations which expressly provide for exemption

Prohibits expenditure for production for use program or as relief for relief client for time engaged on production for use program. Recommends expenditure on public works projects.

Limits administrative expenses to 15 per cent. Limits payment to one family to \$57.20 per month. Prohibits payments to persons not resident in State three years or more or to alien unless he shows entry was legal.

Puts SRA, except administrator, under civil service for duration of appropri-

ation.

A.B. 66-TURNER. Amends Act 3421, re horse racing.

Prohibits board from requiring tracks to hold charty days or races. Increases license fee from flat 4 per cent to 4 per cent on first 5 million, 5 per cent on second 5 million, 6 per cent on third 5 million, 7 per cent on fourth 5 million, and 8 per cent on all over 20 million handled during entire meeting in wagering pools.

Provides for deposit of excess over 4 per cent in general fund. Limits total cut of track and State to 12 per cent plus the breaks: the odd cents on redistributions over next lowest multiple of ten.

A.B. 67—STREAM AND DALEY. Amends Secs. 3834.11, 3834.14, 3834.16, and 3834.17, adds Sec. 3834.18, Pol. C., amends Secs. 3696, 3699, 3705, 3706, and 3707, Rev. & Tax. C., re public auction of tax deeded property.

Permits last assessee of property to apply for sale and to bid in property at appraised price. Such sale is to have effect of redemption.

Permits sale at minimum price fixed by supervisors.

A.B. 68—STREAM AND DALEY. Adds Secs. 3881c and 3881d, Pol. C., and 5200 to 5204, Rev. & Tax. C., re compromises of tax actions.

Provides for compromise of action attacking tax, on order of governing body of city, city and county, or county with consent of its legal adviser. Basis of compromise is to be the fair market value of the property affected as determined by appraisal.

A.B. 69-ROSENTHAL. Amends Secs. 1 and 6, adds Secs. 1.5 and 1.6, Act 3895, re itinerant merchants.

Declares legislative intention to prevent unfair and destructive competition with common carriers.

Redefines itinerant merchants to limit term to buyers of farm or timber products who buy for resale and transport on highway to county other than one in which the products are acquired, for purpose of sale

Defines farm products (Sec. 6.5 as added by bill).

A.B. 70-HEISINGER. Amends various sections of H. & N. C., re San Francisco Harbor.

Provides for appointment of harbor commissioners by Governor with consent of Senate, for staggered terms. Provides for five rather than three commissioners Members are to be appointed so as to represent union labor, shippers, agricul-

ture, industry, and the State as a whole.

Provides for conciliation, mediation and arbitration of labor disputes in connection with the harbor under the jurisdiction of the board under conditions pre-

scribed by bill.

A.B. 71-MEEHAN. New act, the State Lottery Act of 1940.

Provides for State lottery to be conducted by unsalaried board appointed by Governor. Tickets to be sold, so far as practicable, by persons eligible for unemployment relief. Receipts to go: 10% for expense of administration, balance to increase old age pensions, up to increase of \$240 per year; the money to cumulate for that purpose.

A.B. 72—SAWALLISCH. New act.

Creates joint legislative committee to study, investigate, survey, and report regarding motor vehicles, needed changes in law, enforcement of existing laws, and operation of vehicles.

Committee to consist of three Senators and three Assemblymen. Appropriates \$2500.

A.B. 73—ANDREAS AND OTHERS. Amends Secs. 2007 and 2227, repeals Secs. 2226 and 2229, W. & I. C., re old age aid.

Repeals sections re agreements by recipient of aid not to transfer or encumber his property and re claim of county against recipient's estate. Cancels existing agreements made under the sections repealed and provides procedure for effecting cancellation of record.

AB. 74-DOYLE. New act.

Appropriates \$10,029.34 to meet deficiency in appropriation for printing constitutional amendments, Secretary of State's office, for 91st and 92d fiscal years.

A.B. 75-DOYLE. New act.

Appropriates \$28,578.69 to meet deficiency in appropriation for legislative printing, etc., incurred at 1939 session and current extra session.

A.B. 76—O'DONNELL AND OTHERS. Adds Sec. 18a, Act 1315, the Central Valley Project Act of 1933.

Authorizes issuance of \$50,000,000 of bonds in order to carry out such objects or purposes of the act as may be requested or approved by Secretary of Interior.

A.B. 77—DALEY, STREAM, AND RICHIE. Amends Sec. 92, Ag. C., re allocation of money appropriated for county and district agricultural fairs

Divides fairs into six classes, specifying by name the county or district fair in each class. Allocates appropriations annually to each fair according to its class: \$50,000 to class 1, \$40,000 to class 2, \$30,000 to class 3, \$25,000 to class 4, \$15,000 to class 5, \$10,000 to class 6. (See A.B. 78.)

A.B. 78—DALEY, STREAM, AND RICHIE. Amends Sec. 13, Act 3421, re allocation of money derived from horse racing.

Increases allocation to racing board from \$30,000 to \$40,000, to the Department of Finance from \$10,000 to \$20,000. Gives citrus fruit fairs \$100,000 instead of 5% of balance after specified deductions are made.

Appropriates \$1,125,000 to county and district fairs, instead of present 40% of balance after specific deductions and citrus fairs 5% is deducted. (See A B 77.)

Appropriates \$200,000 to California Polytechnic School, \$300,000 to University of California.

Balance to go to general fund.

A.B. 79-WATSON AND OTHERS. New act.

Appropriates \$1,600,000 for unemployment relief for expenditure during 91st fiscal year as provided in Unemployment Relief Act of 1935.

A.B. 80—EVANS AND OTHERS. Adds Sec. 651e, Civ. C., re corporations furnishing courses of instruction.

Provides that restrictions in 649a and 651. Civ. C., do not apply to corporations furnishing course of instruction and issuing certificates or diplomas or conferring degrees in connection with operation of hospital owned or operated by the corporation, if the corporation files instrument, as provided in bill, with Secretary of State, showing ownership of property worth \$50,000.

A.B. 81—WILLIAMSON AND OTHERS. Amends Act 3796, the Alcoholic Beverage Control Act, re the Golden Gate International Exposition.

Extends exception as to importers licenses and importing so as to apply

through 1940.

Permits beer or wine manufacturer to have interest in one location, and its license, fixtures, and appurtenances, at exposition during 1940, if the Board of Equalization is notified of selection of the one location by the manufacturer.

A.B. 82-WILLIAMSON, WATERS AND POULSON. Amends Sec. 27, Act 8488, the Bank and Corporation Franchise Tax Act

Authorizes cancellation of tax, interest, or penalty illegally levied or assessed To apply to taxable years commencing after June 30, 1938.

A.B. 83-WILLIAMSON, WATERS AND POULSON. Amends Sec. 28, Act 8494, The Personal Income Tax Act.

Provides that when tax, interest, or penalty is not paid when due the franchise tax commissioner may file with recorder a certificate stating the amount due and other matters specified in bill. Effect of certificate is that amount due becomes lien on property of taxpayer.

Provides for enforcing lien by warrant which has effect of writ of execution.

A.B. 84—MEEHAN. Repeals Sec. 10886, amends Sec. 10885, adds Secs. 10885 1 to 10886, Insurance Code, re-certificates of advancements for advances to mutual life and disability insurers on the stipulated premium plan with provision for assessments.

Provides for certificates of advancement made for purposes of organization, or to promote or conserve insurer's business or to enable it to qualify as mutual legal reserve insurer or to comply with laws.

Provides for limit on amount of issue and for redemption of certificates.

A.B 85—HAWKINS. Amends Secs 2007 and 2227, repeals Secs. 2226 and 2229, Welfare and Institutions Code, re-old age aid.

Repeals sections re agreements by recipients of aid not to transfer or encumber property and re claim of county against estate of recipient. Provides for release of such agreements by supervisors either with or without consideration. Deletes provisions re approval by Department of Social Welfare of consents to transfers and releases of hens by supervisors.

A.B. 86-WILLIAMSON AND FULCHER. New Act.

Provides for raising revenue by taxation and licensing of off-track wagering on horse races.

Provides for commissioner to be appointed by Attorney General, Controller, and chairman of California Horse Racing Board.

Provides for licensing of off-track wagering establishments and clearing houses. Limits number and restricts location of establishments, and requires certain showing of responsibility of applicant.

License fee is \$1,000 per year, with proportionate reduction if for portion

Tax is 5 per cent on amount of money handled, payable daily, with penalty if not paid as provided. Appropriates \$50,000 to commissioner, \$25,000 out of general fund to be paul

back from revenues, \$25,000 from revenues.

Balance of receipts from act to go to general fund.

A.B 87-POUI SON. New Act.

Appropriates \$60,000,000 for unemployment relief. Divides 98 per cent to be expended by quarters: 91st fiscal year, 3d quarter, not over 12 per cent; 4th quarter, not over 16 per cent; and not over 16 per cent, 18 per cent, 20 per cent, and 16 per cent for successive quarters of 92d fiscal year. Amount unexpended in any quarter may be spent in any succeeding quarter. 2 per cent of appropriation allocated: 13 per cent for Controller's expenses, 3 per cent for Relief Accounting Commission and eligibility survey

Places limitations and restrictions on expenditure of appropriation (Secs. 4, 5, 6 and 7).

Creates accounting commission of five certified public accountants (Sec. 8) Commission to establish rules as to standards of accounting practice to assist Controller in determining administrative expenditures of the Relief Administrator and making cost comparisons. Provides for continuous audit and survey of eligibility by Controller.

Provides for central assistance index file by which all agencies granting relief and other forms of public assistance may clear cases, and requires Relief Administrator to clear his cases through index file, except in emergencies.

A.B. 88—LYON. Adds Sec. 33.5, Act 8493, the Retail Sales Tax Act of 1933, and Sec. 27 5, Act 8495a, the Use Tax Act of 1935.

Provides that acts and proceedings under Sales Tax Act or under Use Tax Act are declared effective regardless of whether liability arises under the Sales Tax Act or Use Tax Act.

A.B. 89-MILLER, GEORGE P. Adds Art. 7.5, and Sec. 135, Act 6342, the State Lands Act of 1938.

Provides that State Lands Commission may itself extract, recover, and sell oil and gas instead of leasing the State lands under its jurisdiction.

A.B. 90-ROSENTHAL. Amends Secs. 5, 6 and 13, Act 3421, re horse racing. Provides for designation by Governor of chairman of California Horse Rucing Board. Chairman to receive \$7,500, other members \$3,000 per year. Salary of secretary increased from \$4,000 to \$5,000 per year.

Increases amount allocated to board for support from \$30,000 to \$55,000 per year. Provides for annual \$5,000 special contingent (secret service) fund for board, exempt from certain provisions of Pol. C. re audit, etc.

A.B. 91-ROSENTHAL. Amends Sec. 13, Act 3421, re money received by State from horse racing licenses.

Increases allocation to horse racing board from \$30,000 to \$55,000 per year. Increases allocation to Department of Finance from \$10,000 to \$25,000 per year. Deletes provision re allocation to citrus fruit fairs of 5% of balance after specific sums mentioned in section are allocated.

Provides for payment into general fund of 25% of balance after specific sums

are allocated.

Divides 45% of balance after specific allocations and general fund's 25% are taken out to county and district agricultural fairs and includes citrus fruit fairs among the distributees of this 45%.

Balance of fund is to go as now provided in section.

A.B. 92-ROSENTHAL Amends Sec. 92, Ag. C, re allocation of appropriations to agricultural fairs.

Includes citrus fruit fairs as defined in Sec. 94, Ag. C., in provisions relating to allocation of appropriations to county, district, and combined county and district fairs.

A.B. 93-ROSENTHAL Amends Sec. 13, Act 3421, re allocation of money from

Increases amount allocated to Department of Finance for supervision from \$10,000 to \$25,000 per year.

A.B. 94-WILLIAMSON AND OTHERS. Amends Act 2450, re Golden Gate International Exposition.

Appropriates \$516,266 to commission and provides for participation in fair in 1940. Authorizes use of \$85,000 in connection with county exhibits. Commission given broad general powers to conduct activities and promote increased attend-

ance. Powers outlined in Sec. 5 of act as added by bill.

Provides for disposal or demolition of property on termination of fair, and

deposit of proceeds in State treasury.

A.B. 95-GILBERT AND OTHERS. Amends Sec. 2160, W. & I. C., re qualifications for applicants for old age aid.

Reduces minimum age from 65 to 60 years.

A.B. 96-BASHORE AND OTHERS. Amends Secs. 2224 and 2227, repeals Secs. 2226 and 2229, W. & I. C., re aid to aged.

Repeals provisions re agreements by recipients of aid not to transfer or encumber property and re claims of county against estates of recipients and similar agreements by surviving spouses of recipients.

Cancels existing agreements under sections repealed. Provides for execution

and recording of instruments of cancellation.

Deletes provision re approval by Department of Social Welfare of consents of

supervisors to transfer property covered by such agreements. Recasts provisions of Sec. 2224 re proceedings against responsible kindred of

recipient.

A.B. 97—CASSIDY. New act, re licensing and taxing slot machines.

Taxes and provides for licensing slot machines as defined in bill (Sec. 5). Tax is \$25 per quarter Administered by State Board of Equalization.

Appropriates \$50,000 for administration. Revenues to go into general fund.

A.B. 98-KING AND WATERS. Adds sec. 28b, Act 8199, the Improvement Act of 1911, re refunding, reassessment, and adjustment of improvement assessments and assessment bonds.

Permits municipality to bear part of cost of certain improvements in consideration of the more than local use thereof. Provides procedure for paying bonds and assessments and for reimbursing assesses who have already paid,

A.B. 99-KING AND WATERS. Adds sec. 18b, Act 8198, the Street Opening Act of 1903, re refunding, reassessment, and adjustment of improvement assessments and assessment bonds.

Permits municipality to bear part of cost of certain improvements in consideration of the more than local use thereof Provides procedure for paying bonds and assessments and for reimbursing assesses who have already paid.

A.B. 100-FULCHER Adds sec. 135.4, Veh. C., re taking of bail by members of highway patrol

Permits taking amount of bail indorsed on warrant being served by member of patrol.

A.B. 101-ATKINSON AND PEEK. Adds article to Pol. C., re Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control.

Creates new department to succeed to certain powers of State Board of Equalization in relation to alcoholic beverage control Provides for appointment of Director, and of advisory board to be appointed from districts established by bill. Effective July 1, 1941, if constitutional amendment ratifying it is adopted before then.

A.B. 102-KING. New act, re relief through self-help cooperatives.

Provides that if \$900,000 of special session relief appropriation (defined in sec. 2) is not set aside for self-help cooperatives (defined in sec. 1), that amount of unexpended balance of the appropriation reverts to general fund.

Requires assistance to self-help cooperatives to be administered through Bureau of Self-Help Cooperatives in State Relief Administration.

A.B. 103-LYON AND OTHERS. New act.

Provides that \$1,500,000 of money appropriated by Chap. 364, Stats. 1937, may be expended by the California Pacific Exposition Commission in $1\frac{1}{2}$ class cities for buildings, etc., for public assemblies, conventions, exhibitions, trade fairs, trade shows, and other civic, commercial, cultural, and recreational purposes. Authorizes commission to make contracts to construct, establish, maintain and operate such facilities.

A.B. 104-VOIGT. Amends Sec. 10, Act 3421, re racing days.

Deletes provision that California Horse Racing Board may allocate racing days to race track licensees. Provides that board shall allocate number of racing days prescribed in bill for various classes of licensees.

A.B. 105-DALEY AND OTHERS. New act, the Relief Expenditure Act of 1940.

Regulates expenditure of money appropriated for relief. Applies to appropriations made for 91st and 92d fiscal years, except by 1939 budget, Ch. 668, Stats. 1939, Ch. 5, Stats. 1940, and acts specifically exempted.

Provides for expenditure through countres and for county standards. Declares policy of granting relief in kind when possible. Limits relief to family to \$57.20 monthly except in emergencies, and no family is to receive money if it, or member of it, is receiving aid from W. P. A.

Prohibits, with certain exceptions, expenditure for person who has not been a resident for 3 years, who has received relief in that period from tax supported agency, or who has lost residence by reason of absence for 1 year. Prohibits relief to aliens. Requires applicant to prove eligibility.

Probibits relief if recipient is making payments on personal property purchases

of over \$5 per month or if family owns more than one automobile.

Prohibits certain political activities.

A.B. 106-MRS. DALEY AND OTHERS. New act, the Self-Help Cooperative Act of 1940.

Appropriates \$500,000 as revolving fund for self-help cooperatives. from Relief Expenditure Act. To be expended through Bureau of Self-Help Cooperatives in SRA under supervisor of self-help cooperatives.

A.B. 107-MRS. DALEY AND OTHERS. New act, the Camp Expenditure Act of 1940.

Appropriates \$1,400,000 for relief pursuant to Sec. 3, Subds. (c) and (d), the California Unemployment Relief Act of 1935, Act 8780e. Money to be expended at rate of not over \$200,000 per month from June 1, 1940, to July 1, 1941.

A.B. 108—DALEY AND OTHERS. New act, the Relief Administration Support Act of 1940

Appropriates \$100,000 for support of SRA and Relief Commission, June 1, 1940-July 1, 1941.

A.B. 109—LORE. New act, the Production for Use Act of 1940.

Appropriates \$350,000 for production for use projects.

AB. 110-HAWKINS. New act, the Low Cost Housing Authority Reemployment

Declares policy of providing safe and sanitary dwelling accommodations for persons of low income. Creates Department of State Loan Value and Mortgage Housing to be governed by California Loan Value and Mortgage Housing Authority, consisting of three members, appointed by Governor with consent of Senate for staggered terms.

Authorizes issuance of \$100,000,000 par value bonds to mature in not to exceed 40 years. Bonds not State obligations and are payable as provided in bill.

Provides for mass construction of groups of dwelling units costing not over \$2,500 each. Provides for purchase by individuals through loans by Authority up

to 95 per cent of value, and for insurance of loans.

A.B. 111-VOIGT. New act.

Provides for licensing persons using mechanical cigarette or cigar vending machines. License fee is to be \$25 per year. Administered by State Board of Equalization.

A.B. 112-FULCHER. New act, the Coin Vending Machine Tax Act.

Imposes tax of \$25 per year on coin operated machines vending or dispensing cigarettes or music. Administered by State Board of Equalization. Revenues to go to General Fund; \$50,000 appropriated annually to board for administration.

A.B. 113-LYON. New act.

Provides for expenditure of one-half of one per cent of appropriations for relief during 91st and 92d fiscal years in conjunction with National Youth Administration program. Of this one-half of one per cent, one-half thereof is to be expended through Department of Education, one-third through Department of Natural Resources, and one-sixth through SRA.

A.B. 114—ATKINSON. Adds Art. 7.5, and Sec. 135, Act 6342, the State Lands Act of 1938.

Provides that State Lands Commission may itself extract, recover, and sell oil and gas from State lands under its jurisdiction as well as lease such lands for such purposes as now provided.

A.B. 115—GILMORE AND OTHERS. Amends Sec. 13, Act 3421, re annual allocation of money in the fair and exposition fund.

Increases amount allocated to California Horse Racing Board from \$30,000 to \$55,000, and amount allocated to Department of Finance from \$10,000 to \$25,000. Makes new allocation of \$125,000 annually to No. 1a District Agricultural Association. Deletes provision giving citrus fairs 5 per cent of balance after specific amounts are allocated and provides that 25 per cent of said balance is to go into general fund. Provides that citrus fruit fairs share with the county and district agricultural fairs and changes the amount so allocated.

A.B. 116-O'DAY AND OTHERS. New act.

Appropriates \$1,600,000 for relief for expenditure during 91st fiscal year.

A.B. 117-DOYLE. New act.

Provides that \$60,000 of money appropriated for relief shall be used in conjunction with Federal programs to provide lunches in public schools for children of persons suffering from hardship and destitution due to and caused by conditions arising out of widespread unemployment.

A.B. 118—VOIGT AND DOYLE. Adds Sec. 3817c9, Pol. C., and Secs. 4256.7 and 4258.7, Rev. & Tax. C., re installment payments of taxes and redemption from tax sales.

Extends 10-year payment plan by permitting commencement of payments on or before July 1, 1941, on property sold to State on or before July 6, 1939. Payment to include certain interest from July 1, 1937, to date of payment.

A.B. 119-DALEY. New act.

Permits expenditure of \$200,000 of money appropriated for relief for WPA sewing projects.

A.B. 120—KUCHEL AND WATSON. Amends Act 5682, the Orange County Flood Control Act.

Same as A.B. 45, except A.B. 120 is urgency measure.

A.B. 121—ROBERTSON AND OTHERS. Amends title and sec. 34, adds secs. 5.2, 5.3, 5.4, and 31.1, Act 8493, the Sales Tax Act of 1933, re exemptions

Exempts receipts from sales of newspapers from the act and declares that such was always the legislative intent.

- A.B. 122-GREEN AND OTHERS. Reenacts A.B. 5 (Ch. 27), re vehicle trust receipt transactions as urgency measure.
- A.B. 123-MALONEY AND OTHERS. Amends Act 3796, the Alcoholic Beverage Control Act, re Golden Gate International Exposition.

Same as A.B. 81, except A.B. 123 is urgency measure.

A.B. 124-WILLIAMSON. Amends Act 8495c, the Gift Tax Act of 1939, re tax on transfers of property.

Declares that for purposes of act wife has community interest regardless of time property acquired. Deletes exception of alien donee from annual exemption and prohibits only specific exemptions as to such donees. Redefines certain terms. Provides that payment of gift tax is not consideration for transfer of property affected.

A.B. 125-DONNELLY. Amends sec. 1300.17, Ag. C., re assessments in connection with marketing orders.

Reenacts Ch. 28 (A.B. 55), first extraordinary session, with minor change and with urgency clause.

A.B. 126-DALEY AND OTHERS. New act.

Appropriates \$46,500 for State Parks.

Repeals Chapter 26 (S.B. 43) first extraordinary session 1940, and reenacts provisions thereof as urgency measure.

A.B. 127-MRS. DALEY AND OTHERS. New act.

Creates the California Department of Employment to which are transferred all the duties and jurisdiction of the Relief Administrator, Relief Commission, Department of Social Welfare, Department of Employment, and the California Employment Commission. Provides that the various county governments shall administer both unemployment and indigent relief and that they may contract with credit agencies to investigate the financial condition of applicants. Counties may enter into agreements for the joint administration of this act or the Indigent Act.

Requires five years' residence of all persons who enter the State after June 1, 1940. The three-year requirement is retained for persons who entered before that date, but during either of those periods the applicant must not have received public or private assistance except from legally responsible relatives. Persons meeting the residence requirement for indigent aid and those receiving relief from the SRA or WPA prior to June 1, 1940, must also be assisted. Determination of residence as a man the various acquiries in practical for

the SRA or WPA prior to June 1, 1940, must also be assisted. Determination of residence as among the various counties is provided for.

Limits the total relief allowance to \$58 except in extraordinary cases where additional aid may be extended in kind. Provides that all income with specified exceptions (sec. 52) must be deducted. Retains the alien restriction now contained in S.B. 81.

Declares ineligible persons any member of whose family is making payments where a chattel programs or conditional sales contract in excess of \$5.00 a month

upon a chattel mortgage or conditional sales contract in excess of \$5.00 a month. License plates for all other than one automobile shall be delivered to the county.

Provides for a work program.

Requires that not less than 82% of the State's contribution shall be expended for direct grants to relief clients. Provides that the State shall pay \$ of the direct and administrative costs and the county shall pay \$. Provides that the State shall contribute \$ of the sums expended by the counties for Old Age Security

after deducting the amount of the federal subvention.

Prohibits certain political activities. Provides for the transfer of unemployment relief by January 1, 1941.

A.B. 128—DILLS AND OTHERS. Adds Sec. 5.18, Act 8493, the Retail Sales
Tax Act of 1933, and Sec. 4.11, Act 8495a, the Use Tax Act of 1935, re exemption of live stock and poultry.

Repeals Ch. 6 (A.B. 10) of 1940 first extraordinary session and reenacts provisions thereof as urgency measure.

A.B. 129-COLLINS AND OTHERS. New act.

Provides for submission of A.C.A. 6 (Res. Ch. 20, first extraordinary session 1940) to people at election November 5, 1940.

A.B. 130—ROBERTSON AND OTHERS. Adds Sec. 2.5, Act 8493, the Retail Sales Tax Act of 1933, and Sec. 2.5, Act 8495a, the Use Tax Act of 1935, re exemption of publications.

Exempts from definition of "sale" in Sales Tax Act and "purchase" in Use Tax Act, the transfer of publications regularly issued at intervals not exceeding one month. Declares that Legislature never intended that gross receipts of sales of newspapers of general circulation should be subject to either tax and declares that such receipts shall not be included in measuring the taxes regardless of time of transfer of newspaper.

A.B. 131-DONNELLY. Amends Sec. 1300.17, Ag. C., re marketing order assess-

Reenacts Ch. 28 (A.B. 55) of fist extraordinary session 1940, with urgency clause. Also provides that money is to be placed in special fund in State treasury and exempt from the audit prescribed by Sec. 669, Pol. C.

A.B. 132—HOUSER. Amends title and adds Secs. 1e, 1f, 1g and 1h, Act 5215, the Municipal Improvement Act of 1913. (This act previously amended by Ch. 35 (SB. 64) first extraordinary session 1940.)

Makes act subject to "Special Assessment Investigation, Limitation and Majority Protest Act of 1931."

Requires reports to or consent of county or city in which work is to be done in certain cases.

A.B. 133—Stream. Amends Secs. 867 and 868, F. & G. C., re yellow-tail, barra-cuda and white sea bass.

Repeals Ch. 24 (A. B. 38), 1st Ex. Sess. 1940, and reenacts provisions as urgency measure.

A.B. 134-GILMORE and O'THERS. Amends Sec. 6, Act 2450, re Golden Gate International Exposition.

Provides that property and equipment used for live stock exhibits and shows is to go to District In Agricultural Association at end of fair (as formerly provided in Ch. 945, Stats. 1939). Other property to be disposed of pursuant to section amended by bill (as provided in Ch. 39 (A. B. 94) 1st Ex. Sess. 1940).

A.B. 135-DALEY and OTHERS. New act, re relief.

Appropriates \$25,347,091 and unexpended balance of appropriation made by Ch. 12. 1st Ex. Session 1940, for relief of hardship and destitution and administration of act to March 31, 1941, including not over \$500,000 for administrative expenses of Controller.

Limits expenditures to 82 per cent for cash, wages, property and services, 3 per cent for work relief projects of which not over one-third may be spent for self-help cooperatives, production for use projects, consumer cooperatives or direct production projects; and 15 per cent for administration.

Limits allowance to \$58 per month per family, but permits relief in excess of that in commodities, services or relief in kind in extraordinary cases. Provides for deduction of net cash income of members of family. Restricts relief to certain residents (Sec. 10) and prohibits relief to certain aliens (Sec. 11). Requires applicant to establish eligibility. Prohibits relief to family making payments of \$5 or more on installment purchases other than for food or clothing. Requires expenditure of relief money for necessities. Prohibits relief to family having more than one automobile unless license plates for extra ones are delivered to SRA. Prohibits certain political activities. Permits State to employ services of credit agencies.

Makes other restrictions on expenditure of appropriation.

A.B. 136-ATKINSON. New act, re relief.

Appropriates \$55,000,000 for expenditure to and including March 1, 1941. Provides for payment of prevailing wage on work relief projects at monthly rate for WPA. Limits relief per family to \$75 per month and permits additional relief in kind. Prohibits deduction on account of National Guard drill or other pay. Prohibits relief to family owning more than one automobile unless plates surrendered. Prohibits certain political activities.

A.B. 137-FIELD. New act.

Appropriates \$160,000 to Relief Administrator and Relief Commission for work relief projects sponsored by State, county, city, public agency. Expenditure to be through such agency. To be expended for materials, equipment, supplies, transportation and administration. Men to be supplied from relief camps and supported from other relief appropriations. Men are to work not less than 120 hours per month.

A.B. 138-DALEY AND OTHERS. New act.

Provides that not less than \$900,000 of appropriation made by Unemployment Relief Appropriation Act of 1940 shall be expended for sponsorship contributions to WPA projects, other than sewing projects.

A.B. 139--POULSON. New act.

Appropriates \$500,000 to Relief Commission and Relief Administrator for self-help cooperatives. Defines self-help cooperative. Requires membership to be open to employable relief clients and persons in need of employment to avoid relief. Provides for revolving fund. Administration to be by bureau established by Relief Commission and Relief Administrator. Provides for board of trustees consisting of five members of administrative staff of bureau and five representatives of self-help trustees consisting and expanditure of funds. Provides for not over 5 units to advise on allocation and expenditure of funds. Provides for not over 5 per cent of expenditures of each cooperative to be paid for administration.

Limits market to relief clients, self-help cooperatives, and public institutions.

A.B. 140—TENNEY AND OTHERS. Adds Secs. 3897.4 and 3897.5, Pol. C., amends Sec. 3804, adds Secs. 3793.5 and 3793.6, Rev. & Tax. C., re taxation.

Provides that when property is tax deeded to State and also to another taxing agency the agreement or option to purchase of a taxing agency between it and the board of supervisors may provide for the pro-rata division of the net proceeds of sale to all agencies involved, after deducting expenses of sale and purchase as defined in bill. Permits delivery of deed to purchaser after publication and mailing of notice of agreement, if not redeemed within 21 days, without payment. Provides that deed cuts off right of redemption.

A.B. 141-GALLAGHER. Amends Sec. 1914, H. & N. C., re powers of Board of Harbor Commissioners for San Francisco Harbor.

Specifies that board may bring actions under Secs. 813-827, C. C. P., which provides for actions against vessels, including action for damage caused by them.

A.B. 142-LYON. New Act.

Makes appropriation to State Park Commission out of State Park Maintenance and Acquisition Fund for extension of park system in Del Norte County.

A.B. 143-SAWALLISCH. New Act, re Joint Committee on Motor Vehicle

Contains same provisions as Ch. 25 (A.B. 72) of first extraordinary session 1940, except under this bill committee can function prior to final adjournment of first extraordinary session 1940.

A.B. 144—LYON. Amends sec. 87, Ag. C., re district agricultural associations. Excepts twenty-third district association (Contra Costa County) from prohibition against associations leasing their race tracks.

A.B. 145-CRONIN AND OTHERS. New act, re greyhound racing.

Creates Greyhound Racing Board of three members appointed by Governor for four-year staggered terms. Members to receive \$15 for each day engaged plus expenses.

Classifies counties as 1st class, those with population of 1,000,000 or over; 2d class, those with population of 600,000 to 1,000,000; 3d class, those under 600,000 population.

Provides for license fee of \$5,000 for licensees in 1st and 2d class counties; \$50 per racing day in smaller counties.

Legalizes pari-mutuel betting on dog races. Levies State license tax of 4% of money handled.

A.B. 146-DOYLE New, act.

Appropriates \$30,000 to meet deficiency in appropriation for legislative printing, binding, etc., ninety-first and ninety-second fiscal years.

A.B. 147-DALEY AND BURNS, MICHAEL J. New act.

Appropriates \$42,000 from State Park Maintenance and Acquisition Fund for operating and maintaining State Park System during ninety-second fiscal year. Expenditure subject to provisions of Budget Act of 1939.

A.B. 148-DESMOND. New act.

Appropriates \$10,000 for contingent expenses of Assembly for Fifty-third (First Extraordinary) Session of Legislature, including expenses of committees.

A.B. 149-DALEY. Adds sec. 39, Unemployment Relief Act of 1940, re use of revolving fund.

Permits revolving fund to be used for financing Federal Stamp Plan for any commodities, goods or personal property as well as for Federal Food Stamp Plan.

A.B. 150-LEONARD Amends sec. 33, Chapter 47 of First Extraordinary Ses sion of 1940, re property taxation.

Changes effective date of provisions.

A C.A. 1-LORE. Adds Sec. 13, Art. XVI, Constitution

Relinquishes claims of State, counties, and agencies of government against property of old age aid recipients. Releases all liens, mortgages, or encumbrances taken by counties. Cancels all agreements not to transfer or encumber property executed pursuant to law re old age aid. Requires boards of supervisors to execute appropriate instruments of release, etc. Gives Legislature general powers in the premises. Amendment not to restrict operation of A C.A. 1 of 1939 if it is adopted at November election.

A C.A. 2-PEEK AND OTHERS. Adds Sec. 13, Art XVI, Constitution

Gives Legislature plenary power re release of old age liens and encum-Validates special session legislation on the subject. Not to affect A.C.A. 1 of 1939 if adopted at November election.

A.C.A. 3-MEEHAN. Amends Sec. 26, Art. IV, Constitution, re lotteries.

Authorizes Legislature to provide for a lottery and validates the State Lottery Act of 1940. (See A.B. 71.)

Appropriates the proceeds for old age security benefits

A.C.A. 4-ELEANOR MILLER AND OTHERS. Repeals Sec. 22, adds Sec. 23, Art. XX, re alcoholic beverages.

Provides that city, town, county, city and county, may regulate or prohibit sale of alcoholic beverage or adopt zoning ordinances. Legislature is to provide for local option elections and for enacting zoning ordinances. Specifies that Legislature is to retain jurisdiction over portions of State not put under local option.

Provides for county ordinances regulating sale of alcoholic beverages in judicial townships outside of cities. Provides for petition by voters and election in the

area affected.

A.C.A. 5-LYON. Adds Sec. 1.3, Art. IV, Constitution, re initiative measures.

Prohibits submission of initiative measure which is essentially a tax measure for 8 years after measure substantially the same is refused adoption by people, except upon supplemental petition so that total signers of original and supplemental petitions equal 25 per cent of voters voting for Governor at next preceding election of Governor.

A.C.A. 6-LORE AND OTHERS. Adds Sec. 13, Art. XVI, Constitution, re liens, mortgages, encumbrances, and agreements taken as security for aid to aged.

Relinquishes rights and claims of State, counties, and agencies of either against property of recipients of aid lawfully received and against such recipients personally. Cancels liens, mortgages and other encumbrances taken by counties as security for aid. Cancels agreements not to transfer or encumber property. Requires supervisors to execute appropriate instruments.

Gives Legislature plenary power to release and cancel such liens and obli-

Not to affect A. C. A. 1 of 1939 if it is approved at 1940 November election.

A.C.A. 7-ATKINSON AND PEEK. Adds sec. 24, Art. XX, Constitution, re alcoholic beverage control.

BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF BILLS AND CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS AS INTRODUCED IN THE SENATE AT THE FIFTY-THIRD (EXTRAORDINARY) SESSION (PREPARED BY LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL)

The following applies only to bills and constitutional amendments as introduced. Because of the time element no attempt has been made to digest each measure in detail. Each description purports to contain only a statement of the subject of the measure and what appears to be its principal features.

S.B. 1—SWING AND CRITTENDEN. Amends Secs. 2007, 2227 and 2229, repeals Sec. 2226, W. & I. C, relating to agreements as to real property required of recipients of old age aid.

Deletes authority to require agreements and provides for release by boards of supervisors of existing agreements.

S.B. 2-FOLEY. Amends Sec. 2227, repeals Secs. 2226 and 2229, W. & I. C., re release of agreements of recipients of old age aid concerning real property.

Deletes authority of boards of supervisors to require such agreements. Cancels existing agreements and provides procedure for such caucellation.

- S.B. 3-MFTZGER. Adds Sec. 250.1, F. & G. C., re fish and game district 1G.

 Permits taking deer in game refuge 1G during 1940 as provided for taking deer in district 1,
- S.B. 4—KENNY. Adds Sec. 3745, Veh C., re undercover plates.

Permits issuance of license plates for exempt vehicles regularly used by law enforcement officers, the record of which is not to be open to public inspection.

- S.B. 5-BROWN. Adds Sec. 862c, Act 5233, re powers of cities of sixth class.

 Permits agreements with and acceptance of contributions from U. S., State, or agency of either, in connection with water supply of city.
- S.B. 6-BREED. Amends Secs. 232 and 377.5, Veh. C., re installation of motor or engine in vehicle.

Provides for notice to department of motor vehicles of installation and payment of fee. Owner of 3 or more vehicles to pay fee only when vehicle sold. Bill not to modify powers of department to make rules as to temporary transfers of engines.

S.B. 7—BREED. Amends Sec. 164, Veh. C., re notice to legal owner as to registration numbers.

Deletes requirement that department give notice to legal owner of registration numbers assigned to vehicles owned by him Requires department to make information available to him at office of department if owner gives notice before December 1 of preceding registration year.

S.B. 8-BREED. Amends Secs. 210 and 252, repeals Secs. 211, 212, 213 and 214, Veh. C., re nonresident permits.

Deletes provisions for obtaining and displaying nonresident permits.

S.B. 9-BREED. Amends Secs. 66 and 67, Veh. C., re definitions of owner and legal owner

Includes in definition of owner the State, or any county, city and county, city, district, or political subdivision when entitled to possession of vehicle under lease, lease-sale, or rental-purchase agreement for 12 months or more

Includes in definition of legal owner the renter or lessor of such vehicle

- S.B. 10—BREED. Adds Sec. 2.5, Act 5135, re exemption from in lieu vehicle tax.

 Exempts vehicles operated by State, county, city and county, city, district, or political subdivision as lessee under lease, lease-sale, or rental-purchase agreement granting possession for 12 months or more.
- S.B. 11—BREED. New act. Cancels vehicle registration penalties and license fees under section 378, Veh. C., and Act 5135 (the in lieu tax) as to vehicles operated by State, county, city and county, city, district, or political subdivision under lease-sale or rental-purchase agreement of duration of 12 months or more.
- S.B. 12—BREED. Amends Sec. 374, Veh. C., re exemption from registration fees Exempts from registration fees vehicles operated by State, county, city, district, or political subdivision as lessee under lease-sale or rental-purchase agreement of duration of 12 months or more.
- S.B. 13—BIGGAR, GORDON AND CRITTENDEN. Amends Sec. 70, Act 1404, State Civil Service Act, re salary adjustments.

Provides that if money available is sufficient for only a limited number of adjustments, Department of Finance shall so certify and lowest salaried employees shall receive adjustments in preference to others.

S.B. 14-KENNY. Amends Sec. 11, Act 5135, the vehicle in lieu tax.

Allocates 5 per cent, rather than indeterminate sum not exceeding 3 per cent, of money in motor vehicle license fee fund to motor vehicle support fund for use of Department of Motor Vehicles.

S.B. 15—FLETCHER, KENNY AND PHILLIPS. Amends Secs. 3 and 5, Act 1489, re Colorado River commissioner.

Provides that commissioner shall act under direction of the Colorado River Board. Deletes provision that board is advisory.

Authorizes conferences with representatives of other States in Colorado River basin and the United States and others re development of basin, use of waters, and protection of interests of State and United States.

- S.B. 16—KENNY. Amends Sec. 5, Act 8494, the Personal Income Tax Act.

 Changes rates to vary between 1 per cent on net income not in excess of \$3,000 to 15 per cent on net income in excess of \$250,000.
- S.B. 17—KENNY. Amends Sec. 5, Act 8494, the Personal Income Tax Act, to change rates of tax.
- S.B. 18-KENNY. Amends Sec. 10, Act 8494, the Personal Income Tax Act, recredits.

Changes setup from allowing exemptions to allowing credits after tax has been computed, and specifies amounts of credits to be allowed.

S.B. 19—KENNY. Amends Secs. 8 and 9.3, Act 8494, the Personal Income Tax Act.

Provides for deduction for interest, taxes and licenses to extent constituting ordinary business expense, and limits other such deductions to \$500.

Provides that where charitable contributions are made in property the basis of property for determining gain or loss or the market value, whichever is lower, is amount of contribution.

S.B. 20—KENNY. Amends Secs. 7 and 9.4, Act 8494, the Personal Income Tax Act.

Changes basis for determining gain or loss on sale of capital assets.

S.B. 21—KENNY. Amends Sec. 12, Act 8494, the Personal Income Tax Act.

Provides, in effect, that income of trust established by parents for support of children is taxable to parents.

S.B. 22-KENNY. Amends Secs. 4, 4a and 23, Act 8488, the Bank and Corporation Franchise Tax Act.

Changes minimum rate on financial corporations (other than banks) from 4 per cent to 5 per cent.

Changes minimum rate on banks from 8 per cent to 9 per cent.

S.B. 23-KENNY. Amends Secs. 4 and 23, Act 8488, the Bank and Corporation Franchise Tax Act.

Changes minimum franchise tax from \$25 to \$25 or 1/20 of 1 per cent of the value of bank's or corporation's assets in this State, whichever is greater, but this tax 👝 is not to exceed \$10,000.

S.B. 24-KENNY. Amends Sec. 8, Act 8488, the Bank and Corporation Franchise Tax Act.

Limits dividend deduction to dividends received from bank or corporation 95 per cent of whose stock is owned by taxpayer, or by taxpayer and any other bank or corporation 95 per cent of whose stock is owned by (1) the taxpayer or (2) another bank or corporation 95 per cent of whose stock is owned by taxpayer.

S.B. 25-KENNY. Amends Sec. 8, Act 8488, the Bank and Corporation Franchise Tax Act.

Prohibits deduction for interest if (1) indebtedness on which interest is paid matures more than one year from date and the obligation to pay interest is conditional upon or measured by the amount of the earnings or profits of the taxpayer, or (2) the obligation has no fixed rate of maturity.

Provides that where charitable contribution is made in property, the basis of the property for purpose of determining gain or loss from sale thereof, or the fair market value of the property at the time of contribution, whichever is lower, is the amount of the contribution.

S.B. 26—KENNY. Amends Sec. 14, Act 8488, the Bank and Corporation Franchise Tax Act.

Changes provisions regarding transactions between affiliated banks and corporations.

S.B. 27—KENNY. Amends Sec. 3, Act 8494a, the Corporation Income Tax Act of 1937.

Raises rate from 4 per cent to 5 per cent.

S.B. 28-KENNY. Amends Sec. 7, Act 8494a, the Corporation Income Tax Act of 1937.

Restricts gross income dividend deduction to dividends received from another corporation 95 per cent of whose stock is owned (1) by taxpayer, or (2) by taxpayer and another corporation 95 per cent of whose stock is owned by taxpayer or by still another corporation 95 per cent of whose stock is owned by taxpayer.

Amends Sec. 7, Act 8494a, the Corporation Income Tax Act S.B. 29—KENNY. of 1937.

Makes same change as to corporations covered by this act as S.B. 25 makes as to corporations affected by act amended thereby.

S.B. 30-KENNY. Amends Sec. 14, Act 8494a, the Corporation Income Tax Act of 1937.

Changes provisions regarding transactions between affiliated corporations.

S.B. 31—KENNY. Amends Sec. 24, adds Sec. 24.1, Act 3796, the Alcoholic Beverage Control Act.

Increases tax on distilled spirits sold by rectifiers and wholesalers.

Imposes floor tax on distilled spirits held for sale by on or off-sale distilled spirits licenses. Not applicable if packages of distilled spirits bear excise stamps evidencing payment of distilled spirits excise tax under Section 24 of act.

- S.B. 32—KENNY. Amends Sec. 32, Act 3796, the Alcoholic Beverage Control Act. Increases tax on beer, still wine, and sparkling hard cuder.
- S.B. 33—KENNY. Amends Sec. 23, Act 3796, the Alcoholic Beverage Control Act. Increases beer tax from \$.62 to \$1.55 per barrel.
- S.B. 34—KENNY. Amends Sec. 5, Act 3796, the Alcoholic Beverage Control Act.

 Increases license fees of beer manufacturers, distilled spirits manufacturers, rectifiers, distilled spirits wholesalers, beer and wine wholesalers, retail package offsale beer and wine licensees, on-sale beer licensees, on-sale beer and wine licensees and distilled spirits manufacturers' agents.
 - S.B. 35—KENNY. Amends Secs. 4 and 5, Act 8495, the Inheritance Tax Act. Increases rate of tax
 - S.B. 36—KENNY. Amends Secs. 14 to 18, inc, Act 8495c, the Gift Tax Act of 1939.

 Increases rate of tax.

S.B. 37-KENNY. New act, the Severance Tax Act.

Imposes tax on privilege of severing petroleum, natural gas or natural gasoline from the earth and prescribes the rates

To be administered by State Board of Equalization. Money to be deposited in Severance Tax Fund and used for administration, payment of refunds, and payment into the general fund.

S.B. 38-KENNY. New act, the Tobacco Tax Act.

Imposes tax on cigarettes, cigars, and other forms of tobacco. Requires permit to deal in tobacco.

Administered by State Board of Equalization. Money to be used for administration, refunds, and payment into general fund.

S.B 39-KENNY. New act, the Tobacco Use Tax Act.

Supplements Tobacco Tax Act (S.B 38) by imposing tax on storage, use or other consumption of tobacco products in this State.

Provisions as to administration and proceeds similar to those in Tobacco Tax Act.

S.B. 40-KENNY. Amends Sec. 22, Act 5130d, the Transportation Tax Act,

Deletes provision exempting carriers who operate solely within cities, between cities, or between cities and private property. Exempts gross receipts from transportation wholly within limits of private property.

S.B. 41-KENNY. Amends Act 3421, re horse race licenses.

Increases the hoense fee paid to the State from flat 4 per cent to 4 per cent on first ten million dollars and 8 per cent on all over ten million dollars handled during one meeting in the wagering pools. Provides that total deduction by licensee shall not exceed 12 per cent and the old cents redistribution.

S.B. 42—GARRISON, WAGY, HOLLISTER AND POWERS. Adds Sec. 5.8, Act 8493, the Retnil Sales Tax Act of 1933, and adds Sec. 4.11, Act 8495a, the Use Tax Act of 1935.

Exempts from both acts gross receipts from sales of live stock and poultry of a kind the products of which ordinarily constitute food for human consumption.

S.B. 43—FLETCHER, KENNY, QUINN, BIGGAR AND COLLIER. Adds Sec. 5014, Pub Res. C., re funds.

Adds provision that all money in State Park Maintenance and Acquisition Fund not otherwise appropriated is appropriated to be expended for operation, maintenance, and extension of State park system.

8.B. 44—SLATER. New act. Appropriates \$313,850.82 from general fund for support of Department of Social Welfare during 91st and 92d fiscal

Transfers same amount from the old age administration account in the Social Welfare Fund to the General Fund.

S.B. 45—FLETCHER Adds Sec. 3817c9, Pol. C., and Secs. 4256.7 and 4258.7, Rev. & Tax. C., re installment payments of taxes and redemption from

Extends ten-year payment plan by permitting commencement of payments in installments, on or before July 1, 1941 on property sold to State on or before July 6, 1939. Payment to include certain interest from July 1, 1937, to date of payment.

8.B. 46-KENNY. Amends Secs. 130 and 130.1, Veh. C., re records of Department of Motor Vehicles.

Excepts from records open to public inspection those re physical condition of operators or chauffeurs. Permits department to give out information or sell copies of records at charge sufficient to pay cost. Provides for fees to be paid by persons in business of examining records.

S.B. 47-COLLIER, KENNY, POWERS AND METZGER. New act.

Generally validates, so far as State and Federal Constitutions permit, organization, boundaries, selection or appointment of governing officers or boards, acts, proceedings, and bonds of public bodies defined in Sec. 1, subd. (a).

- S.B. 48—SHELLEY. New act. Appropriates \$5,000,000 for relief of hardship and destitution due to and caused by unemployment.
- S.B. 49—SHELLEY. New act. Appropriates \$95,500,000 for relief of hardship and destitution due to and caused by unemployment, including not to exceed \$750,000 for administrative expenses of Controller.

Provides for use of \$50,000 of appropriation as revolving fund of Relief Administrator when cash payments are necessary. Also provides for use of \$500,000 of appropriation as revolving fund to be used in connection with Surplus Commodities Stamp Plan.

S.B. 50-BIGGAR, CRITTENDEN, METZGER, MIXTER, NIELSEN, PHIL-LIPS AND WAGY. New act.

Appropriates \$27,736,708 for relief of hardship and destitution. To be expended under Relief Expenditure Act of 1940 (see S.B. 51).

Provides for disbursement pursuant to schedule in Sec. 3 of bill from June, 1940, to May, 1941, inclusive. Provides for allocation to counties on basis of direct relief costs during fiscal year 1938-1939. Allocates \$3,000,000 as equalization fund for use in cases of abnormal increase of relief load in county. Allocates \$200,000 for administrative costs of Controller. None of appropriation available for support of State Belief Administration. State Relief Administration.

Effective only if Relief Expenditure Act of 1940 takes effect.

S.B. 51-BIGGAR AND OTHERS. New act, the Relief Expenditure Act of 1940.

Provides for expenditure of relief appropriations Applies to all appropriations for relief for expenditure in 91st and 92d fiscal years, except those in 1939 budget act, in Chapter 668. Stats 1939, and acts specifically providing otherwise.

Constitutes counties sole agencies through which appropriations are to be expended. Appropriation not to be expended except for relief of persons eligible under relief act, but act not to limit eligibility for relief except as to moneys appropriated. Permits counties to establish own standards of relief, within eligibility relief. bility rules.

Limits relief of family to \$60 per mouth. No appropriation is subject to supervision of Department of Social Welfare, and no county is obliged to administer relief other than as governmental agency under Relief Act and by use of money from appropriation subject to act.

Act to expire October 1, 1941.

S.B. 52—SHELLEY AND KENNY. Amends title and Sec. 8, Act 2450, re Golden Gate International Exposition.

Authorizes securing of holding of convention of either, or both, major political parties in 1940. Appropriates \$150,000.

S.B. 53—GARRISON, JESPERSEN, HOLLISTER, KENNY, POWERS AND SHELLEY. Adds Sec. 18a, Act 1315, the Central Valley Project Act

Authorizes issuance of \$50,000,000 of bonds in order to carry out and perform such objects or purposes of act as may be requested by Secretary of Interior. Provides for redemption of such bonds.

S.B. 54—KENNY. Adds Sec. 444.2, Pol. C, re transfers from special funds to general fund when insufficient cash in latter.

Provides for transfer upon determination by Governor that it can be made without interfering with objects for which special fund created. Provides for repayment from general fund when it contains sufficient "unapplied money" as that term is used in bill.

Limits amount of highway and motor vehicle money transferred under bill to \$5,000,000.

S.B. 55-KENNY AND PHILLIPS. Adds Sec. 580d, repeals Sec. 580c, C. C. P. re deficiency judgments.

Repeals and reenacts provisions without change in effect.

S.B. 56—KENNY. Adds Sec. 135.4, Veh. C., re taking of bail by members of highway patrol.

Permits taking amount of bail indorsed on warrant being served by member of patrol

S.B. 57—SWING AND OTHERS Amends Secs. 2007 and 2227, repeals Secs. 2226 and 2229, W. & I. C., re aid to aged

Repeals provisions re agreements not to transfer property by recipient of aid

and claims of county against recipient's estate.

Cancels existing agreements and provides procedure to effect cancellation.

Provides alternative procedure if courts hold statutory cancellation invalid.

- S.B. 58-SEAWELL. New act. Makes appropriation for legislative printing, etc.
- S.B. 59—QUINN AND BIGGAR. Amends Act 3895, re itinerant merchants.

Redefines itinerant vendor to restrict definition to person who buys farm or timber products for resale and transports them on public highways to point outside county where acquired for purpose of reselling them. Defines farm products Repeals bond provisions. Provides for suspension and revocation of licenses. Adopts certain administrative provisions of Public Utilities Act and provides for procedure and enforcement of act.

S.B. 60—SHELLEY, FOLEY, KENNY, HOLLISTER, GARRISON AND JES-PERSEN. Amends Act 2450, re Golden Gate International Exposition

Appropriates \$516,266 to commission and provides for participation in fair in 1940. Authorizes use of \$85,000 in connection with county exhibits. Commission given broad general powers to conduct activities and promote increased attendance. Powers outlined in Sec. 5 of act as added by bill.

Provides for disposal or demolition of property on termination of fair, and denotited according States transport.

deposit of proceeds in State treasury.

S.B. 61-SHELLEY. Amends Sec. 4, Act 3603, re industrial loan companies.

Specifies that additional charge permitted shall be for every kind or character

of service including brokerage.

Provides that total interest and other charges on loans of less than \$100 shall not exceed 21 per cent per month.

S.B. 62—JESPERSEN AND HOLLISTER. New act, the California State Housing Authority Law.

Creates authority with five members, appointed by Governor for staggered terms. To undertake slum clearance and projects for housing persons of low income.

Area of operation defined in Sec. 6 of bill and, in general, not to overlap jurisdiction of existing local authorities. Powers of authority outlined in Sec. 22. Provides for issuance of revenue bonds, payable from revenue or grants and contributions of U. S. or others.

S.B. 63—JESPERSEN AND HOLLISTER. Amends Secs. 2, 3 and 4, Act 3484, the Housing Corporation Law, re aid by public bodies to housing projects pursuant to California State Housing Authority Law. (See S. B. 62.)

Amends act to include appropriate references to proposed California State Housing Authority Law. Changes reference from Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works to the United States Housing Authority.

Provides for cooperation as to projects within area adjacent or contiguous to area in which public body may act.

S.B. 64-KEATING. Amends Act 5215, re municipal utilities.

Extends act to apply to counties, cities and counties, districts, or public corporations which have power to make improvements covered by the act. Amends title of bill to delete specification of water works, electric power works, gas works, lighting works and other public works and utilities and refers to public utilities and works and improvements mentioned in the Improvement Act of 1911. Incorporates by reference certain portions of the Improvement Act of 1911, Improvement Bond Act of 1915, and the Street Opening Act of 1903.

S.B. 65-KENNY. New act.

Appropriates \$75,000 for expenditure by Adjutant General for construction and equipment of aviation hangais, barracks, etc. and for conditioning landing fields, for California National Guard.

S.B. 66-BIGGAR. New act.

Appropriates \$525,000 to emergency fund to be allocated for salary adjustments of employees paid from general fund and drawing less than \$150 per month Applies to adjustments to which such employees have or may become entitled. Covers civil service and non-civil service employees.

S.B. 67—JESPERSEN. Amends Sec. 10885, adds Secs. 10885.1 to 10886, repeals 10886, Ins C., re certificates of advancement of mutual life insurer on stipulated premium plan with provision for assessment.

Provides for certificates of advancement to evidence advances for organization, to promote or conserve insurers business, or to enable it to qualify as mutual reserve insurer or to comply with laws.

Provides for payments to holders and for redemption of certificates. Provides for certificate of advancement fund to be created by setting aside not over 4% of gross premium income of insurer. Sets out form for certificates.

SB. 68—JESPERSEN. Amends, repeals and adds various sections of Div. 10, H. & S. C., re narcotics.

Amends provisions of the division on narcotics in many particulars relating to definitions, records, prescriptions, offenses, penalties, addicts, the seizure and sale of vehicles used in violating the narcotic law, and abatement of buildings, etc., so used.

S.B. 69—KENNY AND RICH. Adds Sec. 443.2, Pol. C., re payment of State warrants in legal tender.

Provides for payment in coin or currency of U. S. which is legal tender at time of payment, and for indorsement on warrant that it is so payable.

S.B. 70-SHELLEY. Amends Sec. 64, adds Sec. 54.1, Act 3796, the Alcoholic Beverage Control Act, re alcoholic beverages.

Extends through 1940 privileges of San Francisco Bay Exposition and commissioners of foreign governments exhibiting at fair in connection with importers' licenses and imported beverages.

Permits manufacturer of beer or wine to have interest in on-sale license

and location at one location at fair.

S.B. 71-PARKMAN. Adds Division IX, Pub. Res C., re soil conservation.

Codifies provisions of Stats. 1938 (Ex. Sess.): 7:48, as amended. Makes some substantive changes Deletes provision that board of directors of soil conservation district may by unanimous vote determine unreasonableness of land use. Leaves question of reasonableness of land use to courts. Adds to provisious re enforcement, provision for injunctive relief in case of violation of land use regulations. Makes other changes incident to codification and to clarify procedure. Otherwise, has same general scope and effect as present law.

- S.B. 72—BREED. Repeals and reenacts Chapter 3, Stats. 1940 (S. B 11). Cancels registration penalties and license fees under Sec. 378, Veh. C., and Act 5135 (the in lieu tax) as to vehicles operated by State, county, city, city and county, district, or political subdivisions under certain lease, lease-sale, or rental-purchase agreements.
- S.B. 73-SWING. New act, the Tobacco Tax Act.

Imposes tax on sale of cigarettes, cigars, and other tobacco. Administered by State Board of Equalization.

Appropriates (a) \$500,000 for enforcement of this act and Tobacco Use Tax Act, (b) money for refunds and judgments against State under said acts, and (c) balance for expenditure by Department of Social Welfare as aid to counties for maintaining aged persons under Old Age Security Law, to be allocated to counties by the department.

S.B. 74-POWERS. Amends Sec. 2, Act 2970, the Use Fuel Tax Act of 1937.

Excepts from definition of "motor vehicle" a self-propelled vehicle operated exclusively on a road constructed or owned by private persons and maintained by them; and provides that "highway" as used in act does not include such a road.

S.B. 75-SWING. New act, the Tobacco Use Tax Act.

Imposes tax on storage, use or consumption of cigars, cigarettes and other forms of tobacco. (See S. B. 73).

S.B. 76-SEAWELL. New act,

Appropriates \$30,000 for contingent expenses of Senate at special session, including expenses of committees created at the session

S.B. 77-KENNY. Adds Sec. 18b, Act 8198, the Street Opening Act of 1903, re refunding, reassessment, and adjustment of improvement assessments and assessment bonds.

Permits municipality to bear part of cost of certain improvements in consideration of the more than local use thereof. Provides procedure for paying bonds and assessments and for reimbursing assesses who have already paid.

S.B. 78—KENNY. Adds Sec. 28b, Act 8199, the Improvement Act of 1911, re refunding, reassessment, and adjustment of improvement assessments and assessment bonds.

Permits municipality to bear part of cost of certain improvements in consideration of the more than local use thereof. Provides procedure for paying bonds and assessments and for reimbursing assessees who have already paid.

S.B. 79-McBRIDE. New act.

Provides for expenditure of one-half of one per cent of appropriations for relief during 91st and 92d fiscal years in conjunction with National Youth Administra-tion program. Of this one-half of one per cent, one-half thereof is to be expended through Department of Education, one-third through Department of Natural Resources, and one-sixth through SRA.

S.B. 80-BIGGAR. New act.

Appropriates \$350,000 for relief, to be expended in pioneering production of economic plants of a kind ordinarily imported from foreign countries, including per-

fume, drug, dye, tanning, and oil plants.
Provides for separate agency within S. R. A. to administer appropriation so as to enable persons on relief to become self-supporting. Permits sale of products in any channel of trade and use of proceeds for further relief of persons whose labor and services produced such products.

S.B. 81-BIGGAR AND OTHERS. New act.

Appropriates \$12,200,000 for relief until June 1, 1940, including not over \$200,000 for Controller's expenses. To be available: \$5,500,000 during February and March, 1940, \$3,500,000 during April, 1940, and \$3,000,000 during May, 1940.

Lay-offs of personnel, if necessary, to be on basis of seniority. Reduction of relief, if necessary, to be prorated. Engibility as of date of act to continue.

Not less than 82 per cent to be expended directly for relief. Not over 3 per cent for works projects. Limits expenditures for production for use projects to

one-third of amount for works projects.

Limits family allowance to \$58 per month. Permits additional relief in forms other than cash and in extraordinary cases. Sets up residence requirements (Sec. 9). Prohibits after April 1, 1940, rehef to aliens unless entry is shown prior to July 1, 1924, or unless legal entry is shown since that date. Requires, after April 1, 1940, applicant to show eligibility under oath.

Prohibits after April 1, 1940, allowance to family, member of which is paying conditional sale or similar installments of over \$5 per month except for essential food or clothing. Requires all relief money to be spent by recipients for food, rent, utilities and other necessities.

Prohibits after April 1, 1940, exceptive for relief of family processing over Limits family allowance to \$58 per month. Permits additional relief in forms

Prohibits after April 1, 1940, expenditure for relief of family possessing over one automobile unless license plates for all over one are surrendered to S. R. A. Prohibits certain political activities (Sec. 15).

SB 82--PHILLIPS AND OTHERS. New act.

Appropriates \$480,000 to State Relief Administrator and Relief Commission to be expended through the State Department of Agriculture for distribution of Surplus commodities in conjunction with the Federal Government or agency thereof. Authorizes department to select other agency for the purpose. Eligibility to be determined pursuant to California Unemployment Relief Act of 1935 but not by Department of Agriculture.

S.B. 83-SHELLEY. Amends Act 3796, the Alcoholic Beverage Control Act, re the Golden Gate International Exposition.

Extends exemption as to importers' licenses and importing so as to apply

through 1940.

Permits beer or wine manufacturer to have interest in one location and its license, fixtures, etc., at the exposition in 1940 if Board of Equalization is notified of the selection of the location by the manufacturer.

- S.B. 84—SWING. New act. Validates organization, boundaries governing offi-cers or boards, acts, proceedings and bonds of school districts of all kinds
- S.B. 85-GARRISON. New act. Provides for submission of A.C.A. 6 (Res. Ch. 20), re old age liens, to people at election on November 5, 1940.

S.B. 86-PHILLIPS AND OTHERS. New act.

Creates the California Department of Employment to which are transferred all the duties and jurisdiction of the Relief Administrator, Relief Commission, Department of Social Welfare, Department of Employment, and the California Employment Commission. Provides that the various county governments shall administer both unemployment and indigent relief and that they may contract with credit agencies to investigate the financial condition of applicants. Counties may enter into agreements for the joint administration of this act or the indigent act. Requires five years' residence of all persons who enter the State after June 1, 1940. The three-year requirement is retained for persons who entered before that date, but during either of those periods the applicant must not have received public

or private assistance except from legally responsible relatives Persons meeting the

residence requirement for indigent aid and those receiving relief from the SRA or WPA prior to June 1, 1940, must also be assisted. Determination of residence as

among the various counties is provided for.

Limits the total relief allowance to \$58 except in extraordinary cases where additional aid may be extended in kind. Provides that all income with specified exceptions (sec. 52) must be deducted. tained in Senate Bill No. 81. Retains the alien restriction now con-

Declares ineligible persons any member of whose family is making payments upon a chattel mortgage or conditional sales contract in excess of \$5 a month. License plates for all other than one automobile shall be delivered to the county. Provides for a work program.

Requires that not less than 82 per cent of the State's contribution shall be expended for direct grants to relief clients. Provides that the State shall pay twothirds of the direct and administrative costs and the county shall pay one-third. Provides that the State shall contribute two-thirds of the sums expended by the

counties for Old Age Security after deducting the amount of the Federal subvention.

Prohibits certain political activities. Provides for the transfer of unemployment relief by January 1, 1941.

S.B. 87-KENNY, PHILLIPS, FLETCHER. Amends sections 3 and 5 of the Colorado River Control Act.

Deletes requirement that the board should act in an advisory capacity to the commissioner and adds as the duty of the commissioner under the direction of the board to confer with representatives of other States in the Colorado River Basin concerning problems arising out of the use of the waters in the Colorado River system

SB. 88-QUINN. New act.

Reenacts the provisions of Chapter 26 of the Statutes of 1940 as an urgency measure. Appropriates \$46,500 for the maintenance of the State Park System.

S.B. 89—MIXTER. Amends secs. 120, 157, 2630, 4106, 4110, 4153 and 4946, repeals and adds Ch. 4. Pt. 7, Div. I, adds sec. 2630.5, Rev. & Tax C., repeals and adds sec. 3819a, Pol. C, re redemption of property and transfer of tax redemption duties from auditor and treasurer to tax collector

Makes tax collector the redemption officer and transfers to him certain duties of auditor and treasurer.

Provides for preparation of abstracts of delinquent lists.

S.B. 90-PHILLIPS AND OTHERS. New act, re relief.

Appropriates \$24,347,901 and unexpended balance of appropriation made by Ch. 12, 1st Ex. Session, 1940, for relief of hardship and destitution and administration of act to March 31, 1941, including not over \$500,000 for administrative expenses of Controller.

The rate per month is optional but rate per quarter mandatory. Money unexpended in one quarter may be expended in subsequent quarter.

Limits expenditures to 82 per cent for cash, wages, property and services; 3 per cent for work relief projects of which not over one-third may be spent for self-help

cooperatives, production for use projects, consumer cooperatives or direct production

projects; and 15 per cent for administration.

Limits allowance to \$58 per mouth per family, but permits relief in excess of that in commodities, services or relief in kind in extraordinary cases. Provides for deduction of net cash income of members of family. Restricts relief to certain residents (sec. 10) and prohibits relief to certain aliens (sec. 11). Requires applicant to establish eligibility. Prohibits relief to family making payments of \$5 or more on installment purchases other than for food or clothing. Requires expenditure of relief money for necessities. Prohibits relief to family having more than one automobile unless license plates for extra ones are delivered to SRA. Prohibits certain political activities. Permits State to employ services of credit agencies.

S.B. 91—BREED Amends Secs. 232 and 377.5, Veh. C., and repeals Ch. 7, First Ex. Sess. 1940, re installation of motor vehicle engines and motors.

Repeals Ch. 7 (S.B. 6) First Ex. Sess. 1940 and re-enacts provisions thereof as urgency measure.

S.B 92—BREED. Amends Secs. 210 and 252, repeals Secs. 211, 212, 213 and 214, Veh. C., and repeals Ch. 13, First Ex. Sess. 1940, re nonresident permits.

Repeals Ch. 13 (S B. 8) First Ex Sess. 1940 and re-enacts provisions thereof as urgency measure.

S.B. 93—BREED Amends Sec 164, Vch. C., repeals Ch. 23, First Ex. Sess., 1940, re registration of vehicles.

Repeals Ch $\,23\,$ (S.R. 7) First Ex. Sess. 1940 and re-enacts provisions thereof as urgency measure.

S.B. 94—PHILLIPS Adds Sec. 39, Unemployment Relief Appropriation Act of 1940, re use of revolving fund

Provides that revolving fund for financing Federal Food Stamp Plan may also be used for financing Federal Stamp Plan for commodities or goods other than food

S.B. 95-KENNY, QUINN and BIGGAR New act.

Appropriates \$42,000 from State Park Maintenance and Acquisition Fund for operating and maintaining State Park System during Ninety-second Fiscal Year. Expenditure subject to Budget Act of 1939

S.B. 96-KENNY. Amends Sec. 8, Unemployment Relief Appropriation Act of 1940 (1940 (18t Ex. Sess.) Ch. 45), re-relief allowances.

Includes among items not to be considered in determining total relief allowance, supplemental relief allowances granted to those working on work relief projects

S.C.A. 1-SWING. Adds Sec. 23, Article XX, Constitution.

Creates Alcoholic Beverage Commission to administer liquor control laws, five members, one from each district created by section. Succeeds to powers of State Board of Equalization re liquor.

Provides for local option ordinances and for refusal of retail licenses by com-

S.C.A. 2—SWING AND OTHERS. Adds Sec. 13, Art. XVI, Constitution, re old age aid.

Gives Legislature plenary power re cancellation of agreements and liens as to property of recipients of old age aid. Not to affect A. C. A. 1 of 1939 if latter adopted at November election in 1940.
