#### LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL OF CALIFORNIA

It is the duty of the Legislative Counsel to assist the members of the Legislature, upon request, in the drafting and amendment of bills and resolutions; to prepare or assist in the preparation or amendment of legislative bills at the suggestion of the Governor or of any judge of a court of record or of any committee of the Legislature; upon request, to advise any state officer as to the preparation of bills to be submitted to the Legislature; and to cooperate with any legislative committee appointed to carry on investigations between sessions of the Legislature.

This office is under the direction of Fred B. Wood and is located at Room 218 of the Capitol; telephone Gilbert 2-4711, Local 865.

# LEGISLATIVE BUDGET COMMITTEE AND LEGISLATIVE AUDITOR

The Legislative Budget Committee through its Legislative Auditor stands always ready to serve the Members of the State Legislature individually or collectively in conducting investigations and reporting facts for legislative purposes.

Joint Rule No. 37 provides \* \* \* "the legislative auditor shall assist any member of the Legislature or any committee thereof in any matter, and to that end shall make available to such members or committees any records, documents, or other data under his control."

The Legislative Budget Committee ascertains facts and makes recommendations to the Legislature and to the houses thereof concerning the state budget, the revenues and expenditures of the State and of the organization and function of the State, its departments, subdivisions and agencies with a view of reducing the cost of State Government and securing greater efficiency and economy.

In 1943, the committee was made repository for all documents and materials of all committees, except standing committees, when the work of such committees is concluded.

### LEGISLATIVE REFERENCE SERVICES

#### STATE LIBRARY

Information on pending legislation and assistance in consulting the laws of other states and countries are given members by the Laws and Legislative Reference Department of the California State Library, Library Building.

Bills and Journals of previous sessions of the California Legislature, reports of state departments, the statutes and court reports of other American states, the United States, Great Britain, Canada and Australia, and compiled laws on a wide variety of subjects are available for use. The bills of current sessions of the more important state legislatures and the bills, reports, calendars and proceedings of the current session of Congress are also on file.

### BUREAU OF PUBLIC ADMINISTRATION UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA

Legislative fact-finding assistance is offered to Members of the Legislature by the Bureau of Public Administration, University of California. Bureau facilities are available for special reports prepared at the request of individual legislators and legislative committees. The reports are concise, factual, objective, impartial. The bureau offers no recommendation as to the desirability of any proposed legislation. It limits its service to gathering and analyzing factual information.


