



It is the duty of the Legislative Bill Room at each session to file for distribution for the use and convenience of the Members of the Legislature all bills, resolutions, journals, histories and other documents ordered by the Senate or Assembly. Legislative bills and publications are also available to the general public for free distribution, not to exceed two copies of any such bill or publication. However, in accordance with Joint Rule 13 of the Legislature, no complete listing of bills is available for free distribution but may be obtained on a subscription basis from the Legislative Bill Room at a price fixed by the State Printer.

LEGISLATIVE REFERENCE SERVICES

CALIFORNIA STATE LIBRARY

Library and Courts Building, Capitol Avenue between 9th and 10th Streets Hours: Monday-Friday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

The State Library offers the resources of its collection of some 560,000 volumes.

The Administrative-Legislative Reference Service coordinates requests from legislators involving materials and research in various sections of the Library, prepares a regular monthly bibliography on issues of legislative interest and special reading lists on request. Assistance is also given on research problems.

The California Section is prepared to supply books on the history and description, resources and industries of the State.

The Government Publications Section offers official documents of Federal, State, county, municipal and foreign governments. Complete files of the Journal and Appendices of the California Legislatures from 1850 to date are maintained, as well as long files of printed reports and publications from California state departments.

The Law Section offers for use the bills and journals of previous sessions of the California Legislature, the statutes and court reports of other American states, the United States, Great Britain, Canada, and Australia. Compiled laws on a wide variety of subjects are available, and the bills, reports, calendars, and proceedings of the current session of Congress.

The general Reference Section is equipped to supply information along lines of general interest: history, economics, technical fields, sociology, and current events. About 2,000 current magazines provide the latest information on subjects in their fields.

LEGISLATIVE BUDGET COMMITTEE AND LEGISLATIVE AUDITOR

The Legislative Budget Committee through its Legislative Auditor stands always ready to serve the Members of the State Legislature individually or collectively in conducting investigations and reporting facts for legislative purposes.

Joint Rule No. 37 provides * * * " "the Legislative Auditor shall assist any Member of the Legislature or any committee thereof in any matter, and to that end shall make available to such members or committees any records, documents, or other data under his control."

The Legislative Budget Committee ascertains facts and makes recommendations to the Legislature and to the houses thereof concerning the state budget, the revenues and expenditures of the State and of the organization and function of the State, its departments, subdivisions and agencies with a view of reducing the cost of State Government and securing greater efficiency and economy.

In 1943, the committee was made repository for all documents and materials of all committees, except standing committees, when the work of such committees is concluded.

Pursuant to subdivision (d) of Section 9900, Government Code, as amended, the Legislative Auditor is designated as the person embraced by the definition of "Clerk" set forth in that section. (Assembly Rule No. 27, and Senate Rule No. 9.7.)

The office of the committee is under the direction of A. Alan Post, Legislative Auditor, and is located in Room 306 of the State Capitol; telephone GI lbert 2-4711, Local 4656.

WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION

Members of the Legislature, officers and attaches of the Senate and Assembly, injured while in the performance of their duties, come within the scope of the workmen's compensation laws. Benefits are anticipated in the budget, and administered by the State Compensation Insurance Fund.

In cases of injury, please inform the Speaker of the Assembly or the Chief Clerk of the Assembly and write or phone direct to the State Compensation Insurance Fund, Forum Building, Sacramento, phone GI 2-4711, Extension 4706, who will assist you in the preparation of a proper report. See Joint Rule 41 (S. C. R. 15, Res. Chap. 87, Stats. 1953) for Industrial Injury Reports.


