

It is the duty of the Legislative Counsel to assist the Members of the Legislature, upon request, in the drafting and amendment of bills and resolutions; to prepare or assist in the preparation or amendment of legislative bills at the suggestion of the Governor or of any judge of a court of record or of any committee of the Legislature; upon request, to advise any state officer as to the preparation of bills to be submitted to the Legislature; and to co-operate with any legislative committee appointed to carry on investigations between sessions of the Legislature.

#### LEGISLATIVE BILL ROOM

The Legislative Bill Room is maintained under the direction of the Department of Finance pursuant to Section 9790 of the Government Code. It is the duty of the Legislative Bill Room at each session to file for distribution for the use and convenience of the Members of the Legislature all bills, resolutions, journals, histories and other documents ordered by the Senate or Assembly. Legislative bills and publications are also available to the general public for free distribution, not to exceed two copies of any such bill or publication. However, in accordance with Joint Rule 13 of the Legislature, no complete listing of bills is available for free distribution but may be obtained on a subscription basis from the Legislative Bill Room at a price fixed by the State Printer.

# LEGISLATIVE BUDGET COMMITTEE AND LEGISLATIVE ANALYST

The Legislative Budget Committee through its Legislative Analyst stands always ready to serve the Members of the State Legislature individually or collectively in conducting investigations and reporting facts for legislative purposes.

Joint Rule No. 37 provides \* \* \* "the Legislative Analyst shall assist any Member of the Legislature or any committee thereof in any matter, and to that end shall make available to such members or committees any records, documents, or other data under his control."

The Legislative Budget Committee ascertains facts and makes recommendations to the Legislature and to the houses thereof concerning the state budget, the revenues and expenditures of the State and of the organization and function of this State, its departments, subdivisions and agencies with a view of reducing the cost of State Government and securing greater efficiency and economy.

In 1943, the committee was made repository for all documents and materials of all committees, except standing committees, when the work of such committees is concluded.

# JOINT LEGISLATIVE AUDIT COMMITTEE AND AUDITOR GENERAL

The Joint Legislative Audit Committee determines the policies of the Auditor General, reviews his reports and makes reports and recommendations to the Legislature. It is the duty of the Auditor General to examine and report upon financial statements prepared by the executive branch of the State, and make special audits and investigations of any agency as may be required by the Legislature. He has access and authority to examine any and all books, accounts, reports, correspondence, etc., of any agency of the State.
